NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 12th April 2006

STREET LIGHTING

Nayland Parish Council decided at its April meeting to add street lighting to its risk assessment list following a letter from a resident complaining that poor lighting and an uneven pavement in Bear Street caused a heavy fall.

District councillor Chris Hunt said general street lighting in Nayland was inadequate but there was a problem because some people wanted the number of lights reduced rather than increased. It was agreed to inform the county council about the uneven pavement. Acting chairman Mary George pointed out village lighting was regularly reviewed by the parish council.

CLEAN NEIGHBOURHOODS AND ENVIRONMENT ACT

A letter was received from Defra saying the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005 was being enforced and from April 1 parish councils were able to issue fixed penalty notices for various minor offences in addition to dog control orders.

BIRD FLU

Clerk Wendy Sparrow said she had bird flu fact sheets available for anyone who kept poultry.

COUNCIL'S EMAIL ADDRESS

She added she had registered the council with the One Suffolk website with a link to Nayland's community website. The new parish council email address is: pc@naylandwithwissington.suffolk.gov.uk.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning decisions Mrs George said the doctors' surgery extension had been approved and the practice had assured the council the new dispensary would provide an area ensuring patient confidentiality. There were no proposals to increase the number of patients so additional parking spaces were not needed near the surgery. Mr Hunt said parking in Bear Street remained a problem and drivers had to exercise extra care.

Mrs George reported an application for the part-variation of planning approval for a garage and garden store at Hill Rise, Gravel Hill had been approved against the parish council's recommendation, Babergh saying the changes would have no adverse effect on neighbours. A plan to build a house in a side garden at 9 Wiston Road had been refused.

Members had no objection to an amended plan for a lower boundary fence with breaks at the Thatched Cottage, Bures Road, Wiston. They also accepted an amended scheme for a house in the side garden of 100 Bear Street, a swimming pool at the Ancient House, and the demolition and erection of a new house and garage at 36 Stoke Road. The council objected to a plan for a second dormer window at 20 Newlands Lane saying it affected neighbours' privacy.

A request from Nayland Royal British Legion to place a small sign alongside the Trafalgar Oak was turned down with the suggestion the branch should re-apply in a few years' time when the tree was bigger.

HORKESLEY HERITAGE CENTRE

Bunting and Sons informed the council they had decided to withdraw their Horkesley Park Heritage and Conservation Centre application but would re-submit it when amendments and improvements had been made.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Mrs Sparrow reported she and several councillors had walked round the village with a representative from the Flagship Housing Group and following a positive meeting he was doing some more investigations.

ANGLIA IN BLOOM

It was agreed the council should provide six flower tubs, two at each entrance to the village, as a contribution to Nayland's entry in the Anglia in Bloom competition.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Reporting on the district council's annual meeting, Mr Hunt said the local plan had been approved so Sudbury was destined to have 700 new houses at Chilton and 170 at Carsons Drive, Great Cornard. The council's new chairman was Rex Thake and vice-chairman Jennie Jenkins.

POLICE REPORT

PC Paul Wren reported two burglaries in March from an unoccupied house in Bear Street and business premises in Champions Hill. Both offences were linked to crimes across the county border and the CID were liaising with their Essex colleagues.

He said the first community support officers would be joining Hadleigh sector in the next few weeks, working initially at Pinewood near Ipswich. More would appear next year giving police higher visibility in villages.

He advised anyone with complaints over bad parking to email him so offenders could be targeted.

Nayland St. James Church Fete

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Annual Meeting: 10th May 2006

PARISH COUNCILLORS

Chairman Gerry Battye and vice-chairman Patricia Fuller were re-elected at Nayland Parish Council's annual meeting on May 10.

RECYCLING

Topics raised at the parish assembly included a request for a bottle bank but Mr Battye said no suitable site could be found. District councillor Chris Hunt said there was still value in recycled glass but waste collectors were only interested in centralised sites where they could gain maximum tonnage.

HIGHWAYS

Concern had been expressed over dangerous parking on the Mill Street corner and Mr Hunt said several owners had already been ticketed. Mr Battye said the council had no jurisdiction and the problem would be mentioned to Nayland's beat officer.

Bryan Smith said the road surface in Fen Street was showing signs of breaking up and urged residents to take action if they trod tar indoors. It was agreed to write to Babergh over the recycling of commercial waste, also queried at the assembly.

VILLAGE HALL

Reporting on the village hall, Mr Smith warned societies to support the executive because without more backing he said the committee might well give up and then there would be no hall.

DONATIONS

Charity donations of £65 each were agreed for Suffolk Family Carers, Homestart Babergh, Sudbury Citizens' Advice Bureau, Suffolk Accident and Rescue Service and the East Anglian Air Ambulance.

PARISH CLERK

With parish clerk Wendy Sparrow due to retire at the end of the year it was agreed to advertise the post in the June edition of the Community Times.

PLANNING

Mr Battye reported planning permission had been granted to an amended scheme for a two-storey house in the side garden of 100 Bear Street and a swimming pool at the Ancient House, Fen Street.

OPEN SPACES

After considering various suggestions it was agreed to name the Anchor Bridge amenity site Popp's Piece. Naming the Bear Street open space was left until next month.

Members heard a letter from Jean Dryden and Dr Robert Dryden objecting to the proposed coppicing of the hedge in Stoke Road, saying they would support additional hedge planting and suggesting Babergh should submit draft proposals to the parish council. It was decided to send the letter to the district council and to the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project asking for its views.

Following a letter from Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society concerning the five different designs of bollards in the village members agreed to write to the highways department pointing out the lack of uniformity.

ANGLIA IN BLOOM

Reporting on Nayland's Anglia in Bloom entry, Mr Smith said judges' chairman George Dawson, who attended the horticultural society's annual meeting, recommended not having too many flowers as judges were looking more for community spirit. He said the council's responsibility was the village's street furniture particularly seats. It was necessary to organise grass cutting, tidy Popp's Piece, the war memorial and horse-watering and arrange a litter-picking day. A portfolio was being put together showing developments in the village over the past few years.

Low Cost Housing Development

DETAILS have been revealed of a potential low cost housing development in Nayland.

Still in the early stages, the plan involves demolishing two empty council bungalows on Harpers Estate and replacing them with four two-bedroomed houses.

A recent survey showed 20 families needed low cost housing and the parish council joined forces with the Flagship Housing Group and Babergh Council to take the project forward.

Flagship's business development manager Doug Malins, who showed parish councillors initial sketches at their May meeting, said the site was suggested by Babergh as suitable for redevelopment.

"Bungalow accommodation is not very popular now and it was felt the land could be put to better use. We're working on it with planners but final drawings and plans will be agreed with the parish council before going to public consultation and submitting a planning application.

"We're also looking at other possible sites as there is a reasonable demand for affordable housing in Nayland. Village house prices are so high people on low incomes cannot find a place to live.

"It's all about keeping rural communities sustainable and encouraging people to stay in villages."

Parish council chairman Gerry Battye said: "We still have to go through the planning process but are very encouraged to have a potential site at last."

The last attempt by the council to provide low cost housing 15 years ago failed because no suitable land was available.

Annual Parish Assembly: 8th May 2006

VILLAGE HALL

Local organisations were urged to show more support for their village hall at Nayland's annual parish meeting.

Parish council chairman Gerry Battye said the hall was run by its local users and important issues similar to those before the millennium would have to be faced. He said increased charges were not going to cover the hall's long-term upkeep and major works would eventually have to be tackled.

Thanking the executive committee for all its work, he said the very poor turnout at the annual meeting by societies using the hall was most disappointing.

"Like other venues we don't seem to be able to amass money to pay for long term refurbishment.

"This year 23 per cent of the precept was allocated to the hall in one way or another. Society members must put their minds to this and decide how we can reach those people out there. We cannot take this hall for granted."

Mr Battye's words echoed those of treasurer Andrew Gowen who said the committee had no choice but to raise charges. If it had not been for a £2,000 bequest the hall would have made a loss last year. The committee would be looking again at reducing costs and at fundraising.

Cinema evenings were starting in the autumn and daytime use of the hall was being promoted. He said it was a wonderful facility, one of the best in the area, and it was up to villagers to make sure it prospered.

Retiring treasurer Alan Hodges said the field income would be reduced this year because two football teams had left. Economies with oil and heating had been introduced and the new licensing laws had proved a minefield.

"I don't think the government has any idea of the impact the laws have created with little minnows across the country trying to come to terms with a plethora of regulations not designed for us and with £500 worth of expenditure," he added.

STREET FAYRE

Former community council chairman Mr Gowen reminded villagers the Nayland street fair was on July 16 and a party to encourage interest was being held at his home, 43 Bear Street, on May 20. He said the Community Times made £1,300 profit last year and the council had given away £1,500 in grants.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

In his annual report Mr Battye said the parish council dealt with more than 60 planning applications from large scale developments to small extensions and opposed 14. Various subtle planning changes had taken place and there were instances in Nayland where Babergh's development committee did not agree with officers' recommendations.

A major initiative, a local housing needs survey, revealed 20 households were recognised as needing low cost housing. The council had entered into partnership with the Flagship

Housing Group and Babergh Council and possible village sites were being looked at.

Speed limits and yellow lines at the Anchor Bridge had been discussed but there were no easy solutions to a road network inhibited by a medieval street layout. The village was to get a gateway on Stoke Road to prevent speeding but not in Bear Street or Court Street.

With council administration increasing all the time Mr Battye praised the meticulous and careful work of parish clerk Wendy Sparrow who retires at the end of the year after 25 years. He said the position would be advertised in June.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his county council report Selwyn Pryor said he was concerned about potential regionalisation and stressed the importance of keeping a Suffolk fire brigade and police force. There was an enormous amount of development in and around Sudbury but the infrastructure was not in place to back it up so it would have a knock-on effect locally.

Questioned by Teresa Moriarty of Nayland Playgroup over the future of the temporary building sublet to the group, Mr Pryor said he had been assured there was no question of eviction and the county council would do its best to help the group find a new venue.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

District councillor Chris Hunt, in a detailed report, said Babergh had achieved beacon status for its recycling success and 'be active' team. Two local businessmen, Adrian Amos and Iain Wright, complained Babergh had done nothing about recycling commercial waste but Mr Hunt said the council was trying to work something out.

Asked about a bottle bank, Mr Battye said the collection vehicle was unable to negotiate the village hall entrance in Church Lane and it had not been possible to find another site. Illegal parking, particularly in Mill Street, was another concern but Mr Hunt said parking was a problem in every village. Several fixed penalties had been served but did not appear to have solved the problem.

SUFFOLK CONSTABULARY

P Sgt Clare Connick reported 30 crimes in Nayland last year, mainly burglaries from premises other than houses, with 24 undetected. Next year, she said, the area would have two community support officers who would be able to deal with ticketing offences and be seen patrolling.

LOVE, CALEY AND WALSH TRUST

Rosemary Knox, reporting on the Love, Caley and Walsh Trust, said Christmas bonuses had been given to 19 people over 80 who lived in the village, four to couples and gifts to six in residential care.

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STREET FAYRE: A résumé of planning of the Street Fayre was given. Entertainment would include; Jazz Band (Stoke-by-Nayland Middle School), Tiddlywinks race, Village Players, Nayland Choir, a Snail Race, Punch and Judy and stalls including Pimms, ice cream and a barbecue. Jenny Smith said she thought that entertainment was well covered since people also wanted time to look round. This was agreed.

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks confirmed deadline for next publication as Saturday 20 May.

EMERGENCY FIRST RESPONSE: Andrew Gowen outlined the progress made so far. He said about a dozen people, mostly young and keen, had responded, so this was enough to start. Andrew said he was very willing to set up and co-ordinate the initial meeting but not to lead. The setting up and training of a First Response team would take time if it were to have a solid foundation. Training Courses and rosters would need to be arranged, there was also the requirement of criminal record checks. The Boxford team had found it impossible to give 24 hour coverage. Further publicity would be given via the Community Times and Andrew would get someone to speak from Boxford and the East Anglian Ambulance Service at the first meeting. He pointed out that the necessary equipment, that is, a defibrillator was very expensive.

ANGLIA IN BLOOM: Joan Moore gave an update on this. Judging would take place on a weekday in the middle of July. George Dawson, Chair of Judges would be one of the judges for Nayland. The itinerary would be quite selective and 10 minutes were allowed for a small presentation. There would be a trial course walk on 18 June and the itinerary needed to be submitted by 30 June. Closer to the time organisations would be asked to take responsibility for a section of the village to assist with a general tidy up, litter-pick, etc and householders fronting main streets be asked to be particularly careful of tidiness.

VILLAGE HALL GARDENS: The date for the next tidying session was set on Saturday 4 July at 9 am.

SOCIETY REPORTS:

The Royal British Legion: Deliveries from the surgery now extended to Leavenheath, Assisington, Polstead, Stoke-by-Nayland and Nayland villages. A stall was planned for the Street Fayre plus a 'jazzing up' of the war memorial.

Playgroup: Their lease for the present building runs out in June 2007 so a site for a new building is required urgently. At the present time the Playgroup was full and running 5 days per week. The Planning Authority has no objection to the use of a piece of land in the garden of the school house. Fund raising would be given immediate priority; the Playgroup is a registered charity and would be applying for grants. A musical Coffee Morning will take place in the Village Hall on 8 July, entry fee £5 and later a sponsored fun run marathon. Chris Hunt, Babergh District Councillor, said that he thought there were some local grants available and undertook to do some research.

Village Players: Deborah Hodges was the new Chairperson. The last production had been successful. Auditions for the pantomime, Aladdin to be held in the Church Hall on Sunday 9 July and Wednesday 12 July and would be staged from 22-25 November. All were welcome to attend auditions.

Bowls: The Club had been promoted to the 1st Division. The Bowls Charity Tournament was on 4 June in aid of Air Ambulance and Child Line. It was possible a Charity Tournament could be arranged in aid of the Playgroup.

Horticultural Society: Joan Moore reported a successful AGM. A Morning Market was being held on 20 May. Outings included Open Gardens at Rosemary, East Bergholt on 6 June, and Broome Hill, Polstead on 14 June, an Open Evening at Philpots on 20 June, a coach trip to Peter Beale's Roses in Norfolk on 28 June, and a visit (by coach, if viable) to

Thompson & Morgan Open Field Trials on 29 and 30 July.

WI: The Church fête teas and baguette stall for Street Fayre had been arranged. Outings, open to all, included a Mystery Tour on 25 July; Althorp 9 August and Bluewater on 31st October. Group meeting in Village Hall later in the year during which Village Choir would entertain.

Conservation: Open gardens date 11 June. Invitation extended to add gardens to list. Request for help with teas and provision of cakes. Surplus money this year and next to go towards production of proposed Historic Buildings Book. Speaker at next meeting would be Pip Wright, subject: 'Stories from Old Suffolk Newspapers'. Sheep were now in the meadow and a contractor engaged to cut the towpath. The Society would run a stall at the Street Fayre and give assistance to Nayland in Bloom.

Parish Council: The Parish Council was looking for a paid handyman who could do repairs, ie seats. The next meeting was on Wednesday 14th June.

Village Hall: The gardening session on 8th April went well and good photos obtained for Anglia in Bloom. New leaflets were to be printed advertising the hall. It is up to everyone to ensure bills are paid on time and for us all to promote the hall. The field to be mowed and goal posts removed for Church Fête.

Treasurer's Report: In the absence of the Treasurer, there was no Treasurer's Report.

Grants: Two applications had been received:

- 1st Nayland Cubs and Scouts requested a grant of £250. In spite of increased subs, the high insurance cover could not be met. Members approved this award.
- Request by the Conservation Society for £500 towards funding an Historic Buildings book. Conservation Society to fund writing, by Leigh Alston, architect and historian, which would be of interest to both local people and academics. The book would be available October/November next year. Total cost of publication would be £18,000, and the Conservation Society was making application from various funding bodies, who would be looking to see evidence of some local support. Members approved this award.

Youth Club: Members agreed to continue to pay in full the Village Hall fees. It was reported that numbers were also increasing, but at the same time funding was being withdrawn from Suffolk County Council.

Chairman's Report: To report to next meeting on Tuesday 4 July.

AOB: There was no other business.

Date of Next Meeting: Tuesday 4th July 2006

Babergh Council representative said that Grants were available and that he would make enquiries on behalf of the Playgroup.

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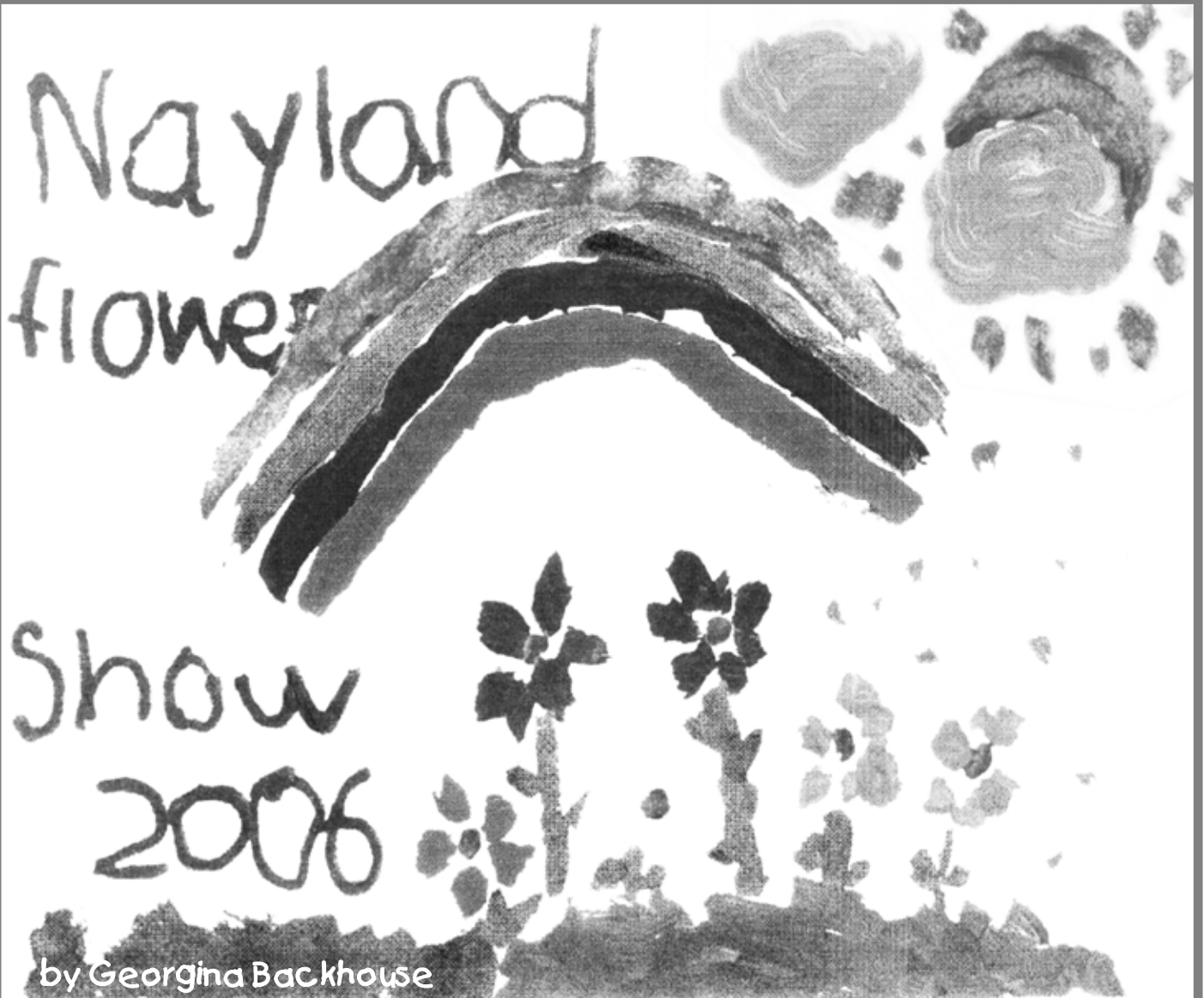

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NAYLAND IN BLOOM

We are making progress towards preparing Nayland to look its best for when the judges visit in July. No date has yet been given, but look out for announcements in the local press and posters around the village.

Four committee meetings have been held and an itinerary has been set up. There is only an hour allowed for judging, so we have had to be very selective in deciding where to visit. However, we are allowed extra time for a small presentation in advance, and are arranging to set up display boards in the Village Hall. We also have to prepare a portfolio describing work carried out on areas not included in the itinerary, and ideas for further improving our environment in the future. This will include photographs as well as brief descriptions. A draft portfolio is now being considered by the committee, and the final, together with the itinerary and maps, will be submitted to the judges by the set date of 30th June.

We are also hoping that the school will enter its conservation areas in the section on awards for young people. Their endeavours certainly deserve recognition and encouragement. An extra 15 minutes is allowed for judges to look at these projects.

We shall need to have everywhere looking as spick and span as possible - no litter, graffiti or dog-fouling in sight. Work parties, involving village organisations and individuals will be arranged, so watch out to see when you will be needed!

EMERGENCY FIRST RESPONSE

As announced in the last edition the Community Council is trying to establish if there is any support to set up an Emergency First Response team in the village. We have had a response from 12 volunteers which is the bare minimum that we require so we need to recruit more members.

The Community Council will arrange a meeting later this year with the aim of:

- Being briefed by another response team and East Anglian ambulance.
- Setting up a Committee to run the service. We shall need a co-ordinator, chairman and treasurer.
- Developing fundraising for equipment although hopefully the Community Council will help.
- Arranging training.

Just to remind you the First Response Team is trained to give oxygen and operate a defibrillator and gives initial support until the ambulance arrives. Training and support is provided by the East Anglian Ambulance Trust but we have to raise money to purchase the equipment ourselves. A number of villages in East Anglia have set up such teams and we must should try to set up our own.

We need a Co-ordinator to manage a roster and a minimum of 12 volunteers to ensure we can give sufficient cover. Normally there is one member of the team on duty at a time who would hold the equipment. He/She would be alerted by the ambulance trust and would go to the person and provide help until the ambulance arrives. Training will be arranged over weekends and last about 2 days and there would be the occasional session of continuation training.

Boxford have had a team for 3 years and have been called out 300 times during that period. They try to have a 24 hour 7 day service but cannot always meet it as it depends on their volunteer availability. So 24 hours is not mandatory.

We have had 12 people express an interest but we need many more if we are to take up the challenge. If you are interested please contact Andrew Gowen on 01206 262534 or E Mail parkersag@yahoo.co.uk. 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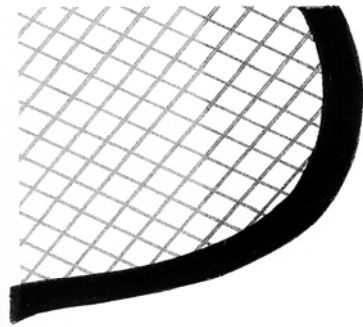

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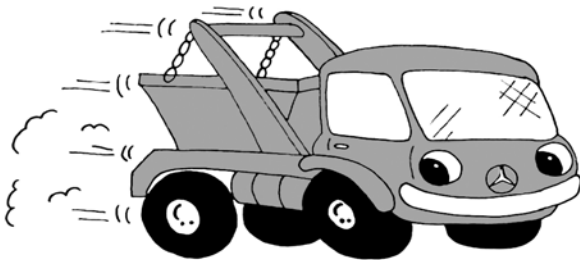

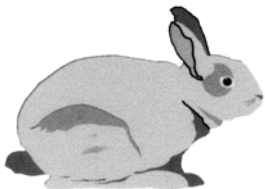

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader



The OM/S was going to start by writing of the extraordinary display of blossom on almost every flowering shrub, including wild blackthorn, but on looking back through the file sees that he said exactly the same a year ago, and proves the dictum that Old Men Forget. On reading further he sees that he tipped *Anchusa* "Loddon Royalist" as a food blue colour, which it is, and a long-flowering perennial, which it isn't. In the event the plants he grew flowered for a short time and promptly expired; it seems that they are liable to do just that, so are probably best treated as annuals.

At the time of writing Chelsea is once more in the offing. The OM/S recently read an article in a horticultural publication by a proper gardener who deplored the emphasis placed there on garden design, saying that the R.H.S. seemed to be catering more for customers with large cheque-books who wanted instant results, rather than hands-on gardeners who were interested in plants and were prepared to grow them. Hear, hear! Doubtless the usual crop of stainless steel, water, light bulbs and so forth will be on display.

The loss of a tree is often viewed as a tragedy; in retrospect it may be a blessing. An old apple (Newton Wonder) which had been approaching the end of its allotted span came down last autumn bringing with it a 10 year old Rambling Rector climbing rose which had previously been moved from another collapsed tree. In winter we dug up (excavated is perhaps the correct word) the old Rector and transported it, with very little in the way of fibrous root, to a new site in an old blackthorn hedge. Now it is producing flowering spurs from the new wood, and sprouting like mad from the old wood. The purpose of this tale is twofold, firstly to show that almost anything can be moved during its dormant period, provided that a large enough excavation is made and sufficient lifting gear (in our case two men) is available; secondly, the site of the old Newton is much improved, with more light at ground level. This of course was the experience of many gardeners after the Great Storm of 1987.

In this issue readers will be spared a lecture on another plant family; instead here are a few words on a plant not often seen in gardens, though in fact it is a rare British native. This is *Lithodora purpureo-caerulea*, now renamed *Buglossoides P-C* by the dreaded botanists; in fact it does bear some resemblance to Viper's Bugloss (*Echium*).

It forms clumps of dark green foliage, and produces deep gentian-blue flowers in May. It then sends out shoots 2 feet long which root (the technical term is *stoloniferous*). Thus it can be invasive and should not be planted in a border, unless the shoots are cut off. Here it completely covers a large mound of excavated subsoil from an old cesspit, and the effect when in flower is spectacular. The OM/S was given it (with various other good things) by the late Mrs Betty Burnett, of Lower Dairy House in Water Lane, a great plantswoman whose garden was a delight.

THE GREAT ENGLISH EARTHQUAKE

It is shocking to see on our television screens the scenes of devastation caused by earthquakes around the world and in this country we are very fortunate that we do not live under the threat of losing our lives or homes in this way. However, there have been minor earthquakes recorded in this area and the most famous is that which occurred on the 22nd April 1884.

Peter Haining, in his book *The Great English Earthquake* published in 1976, gives an account of the drama, based mainly on press reports and eye witness accounts handed down. Colchester seems to have been the epicentre and many of its buildings suffered damage. Surrounding villages and towns in Essex and Suffolk felt the tremors as far north as Stowmarket and as far south as London.

Here in Nayland the shock was reported to be "severe" and the Congregational Church had its cross and a major part of the spire thrown down. First reports claimed that the whole spire had been destroyed and that it had fallen on a passerby, killing him instantly. However, it transpired that in fact a pedestrian had been narrowly missed by the falling masonry. A very similar incident had happened at Lion Walk Church in Colchester and in Stowmarket a man working on the church there was injured by an oak beam thrown down by the vibration.

As well as damage to the Congregational Church in Nayland the Church of St. James was shaken and the tower cracked which eventually led to the complete restoration of the tower in 1963. In fact it was recorded that a total of 300 churches and chapels needed urgent repair after the tremor.

A Sudbury man passed on his mother's recollection of that eventful day. "My mother was ill in bed when the earthquake happened. My grandmother who was nursing her had gone into town to do some shopping. People everywhere were suddenly scared by a rumbling and shaking and were running out of the shops and houses, and bricks and masonry were falling about. When grandma got back to mother she found her bed had slithered across the room to the opposite wall. It was not until later they discovered there had been an earthquake."



It seems that several deaths were reported immediately after the event but in later reports these were reduced to injuries. The *Essex Telegraph* said that "... perhaps even more mysterious than the earthquake itself is the marvellous immunity from injury to person enjoyed by those whose lives were so dangerously imperilled ... in this visitation structures have been levelled by thousands and the attendant casualties have been of the most trivial character. Christians everywhere will recognise in this the hand of merciful Providence."

After the earthquake there were many reports of portents and premonitions and one astrologer from Ipswich wrote to the *East Anglian Daily Times* saying that the earthquake had been foretold by the stars.

Whatever the truth, as the *Essex Telegraph* stated: "... there seems little doubt that a premonitory shock was felt between five and six o'clock on Monday night, many persons thinking it was the rumbling of distant thunder".

PLASTIC BAGS & YOUR BLUE BIN

Thanks to the efforts of Nayland and Wissington residents and those in neighbouring towns and villages, Babergh district now recycles almost a third of its rubbish. This means we are officially the fourth highest dry recycler in the Country!

However, you may have recently read in the press and Babergh District Council's 'Sort It' publication, that plastic bags, carrier bags and film (including cellophane, crisp packets and cling film) should no longer be put in the blue household recycling bin. But why the change you may be wondering? The reason is principally because more and more shops are now issuing plastic bags that are made of a degradable / bio-degradable material that can not be recycled (and it is not value for money for the Council Tax payer to have the sorting facility slowed down to examine what is or is not degradable).

Our advice in relation to plastic bags and carrier bags, is therefore to do the following, in order of priority:

1. Avoid;
2. Reduce;
3. Reuse;
4. Recycle/Recover;
5. Dispose

Therefore, in the first instance try and avoid (or reduce) using plastic bags and instead use an ordinary shopping bag or more rugged plastic 'bag for life' that many retailers now issue.

Secondly, if you must use carrier bags, then reuse them when shopping or to wrap putrescible food waste in your black bin, or take them to a local charity shop who may accept the non degradable variety. As for recycling, some supermarkets take back plastic bags for recycling, although this is usually only possible for non degradable plastic bags. Hence the starch based bags will degrade into confetti like pieces and can not be recycled. As a last resort put them in your black bin.

Importantly, please ensure that all recyclables are put clean and loose in the bin, as bagged recyclables in anything other than Council issued sacks will be left by the collection crew.

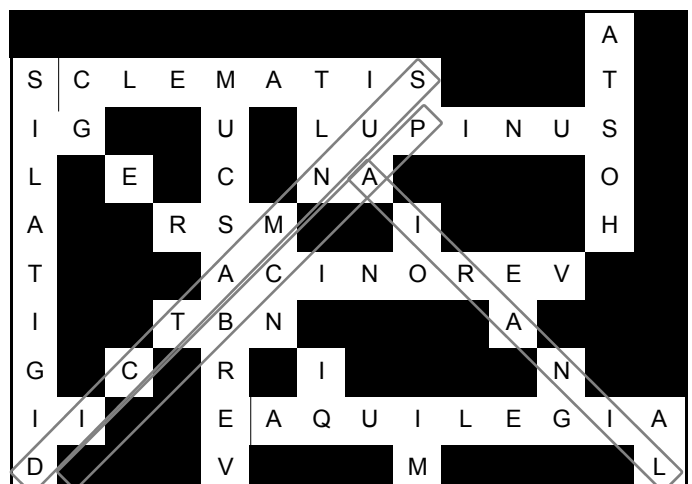
