Nayl and with Wissington Parish Council

Meeting: 14th February 2007

SATNAV

The council is to ask highways officials to look into several instances of satnav-guided lorries being directed through Nayland village centre. The problem first arose in December when an articulated lorry became stuck across the junction of Birch Street and Mill Street, holding up traffic for half an hour.

Councillors asked Suffolk County Council for expert advice and were told an isolated one-off incident would not warrant investigation by safety officers. But members heard at their February meeting there had been more cases of HGV vehicles trying to turn into Mill Street.

Mary George, who lives in Birch Street, said: "The December incident was the worst but I've seen three in the last couple of weeks. In one case two lorries were coming in opposite directions within about ten minutes of each other. Each had been directed off the A134 through the village and back to the A134."

The council agreed to challenge the county's response and ask highways staff to investigate further.

PLANNING

Considering recent planning applications, the council opposed a plan to build a two-storey side extension, garden pavilion, 2.4m high pergola and an artificial croquet lawn at Perry Farmhouse, Bear Street.

Chairman Gerry Battye said the land in question was much higher than the house and photographs taken showed the height of the site and the effect it would have on neighbouring gardens. Mrs George said when the houses in The Perry were built Babergh had said the meadow above was to be retained as grazing land. Objecting unanimously, councillors pointed out change of use was not included in the application. The pavilion which included a kitchen and study would be much higher than the house and would overlook neighbours' gardens. The council opposed any building on the field saying it was outside the village envelope and in a dominant position.

Applications accepted were a barn and stables at Longwood House, an outbuilding to house a pool room and a swimming pool at Sargents Farm, Wiston and a single-storey front extension at Gladwins Farm.

Plans approved by Babergh included a detached building to provide a warehouse with shop, sales, office and parking at Nags Building Supplies, now Travis Perkins, with various conditions. The development committee felt the plan which had been amended and amplified by the applicants was in accordance with the development plan and would not harm the character of the area.

FIRE STATION

Mr Battye said Suffolk County Council had approved a plan to replace Nayland fire station and training tower on the existing, extended site. The council wants to see the re-drawn plan to check the tower has been moved to the requested position.

DEDHAM VALE AND STOUR VALLEY PROJECT

A letter from Simon Amstutz, operations manager for the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project, said it had started to co-ordinate a bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund's landscape partnership scheme. It had been awarded a £48,000 project planning grant to draw up a larger bid to the scheme. Mr Amstutz added if successful the aim would not be to attract a large influx of visitors but to provide support for projects with long-term social and economic benefits for rural areas.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

After another site meeting at Harpers Estate the council backed amended plans for four low cost houses and will inform the Flagship Housing group so a planning application can go forward. Members heard several other sites in the village were being considered for future housing needs.

VILLAGE HALL

Reporting on the village hall, Rosemary Knox said a further informal meeting would be held on February 26 to discuss ideas for future hall maintenance. Following complaints over the new charges, local users would pay hourly rates and the increased Friday charge would revert to normal.

EDF ENERGY TRANSFORMER UNIT

Mr Battye said EDF Energy wanted to carry out work in the village which would mean installing a mounted transformer unit on Popps Piece near the Anchor bridge. The council agreed to inform the company it was an important village amenity site and was also liable to flood. A location to the west of the layby was preferred.

FOOTPATHS

It was decided to ask the county rights of way officer what was being done about clearing up the timber debris left on the Nayland section of a footpath in Arger Fen.

HEDGEROW SURVEY

Mrs Knox reported a hedgerow survey led by Terry Bannister would take place after May and volunteers would be welcome.

HARPERS HILL COUNTY WILDLIFE SITE

Following a letter from Joan Moore saying children were using part of the Harpers Hill county wildlife site as a cycle track the council asked to be kept in touch with the situation.

VILLAGE GATEWAY

Members have agreed the proposed village 'gateway' should be just outside the parish boundary on the approach road from Stoke-by-Nayland and the work should be carried out before the end of the financial year.

POLICE

The council heard PC Donna Jackson was the temporary replacement for community police officer PC Paul Wren who has retired.

NAYLAND PLAYGROUP

Before the meeting Nayland Playgroup's funding co-ordinator Teresa Moriarty gave councillors a detailed presentation on the group's fundraising efforts for its proposed new building. Mrs Moriarty said the group would ask the council for a grant towards the £10,000 cost of architect's fees.

She explained the playgroup's present lease was due to run out in June and members had been working for some time to find a new site. A location on the school site had now been approved. The playgroup had an excellent reputation and a long waiting list, providing pre-school education for two-and-a-half to four-year-olds, mainly from Nayland, Leavenheath and Great Horkesley.

Mrs Moriarty said the new project would cost in the region of £200,000 and the building would also provide 'wrap-around' out of school child care, including breakfast and after school clubs, to be funded by the county education department.

The group had already raised £4,500 and was continuing to hold events but rather than wait for Suffolk County Council funding she said it was asking the parish council to contribute towards the professional fees so the project could continue immediately. The council will consider the request at next month's meeting.

TREE FELLING

A Bear Street resident has asked Nayland Parish Council whether householders can be notified when tree maintenance work is due to take place. The request at the March meeting followed recent work on trees behind 40-50 Bear Street. A letter from Dr June Freeman said she was concerned at the "lack of public transparency in the decision-making process" and asked if in future notices could be posted close to areas where trees were to be felled or coppiced so residents could express an opinion. In this case householders affected held opposing views over the work taking place.

Vice-chairman Patricia Fuller said the correct procedure had been followed and Babergh Council was responsible for posting public notices not the parish council. It was agreed to forward Dr Freeman's letter to the district council.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

The council heard a planning application by the Flagship Housing Group to build four low-cost houses in Harpers Estate was due to be submitted. A message from Ian Tibbett of Babergh Council said the Housing Corporation looked set to offer a £140,000 grant. Babergh was handing over the site backed with a £11,000 grant and the development should start in a few months time. It was agreed to contact Flagship's business development manager Kirsty Ayers querying the delay in submitting the plan.

VILLAGE HALL

Following a request from smokers who use the village hall the council backed the idea of building an outside shelter for them. Hall representative Rosemary Knox said one club which used the hall had warned it might find another venue if some form of canopy or shelter was not provided before the no-smoking rule becomes law. Councillors were in favour of an outside shelter being erected at the back of the building, subject to design and security.

Mrs Knox said the committee had agreed to raise funds by holding one big annual event and this year's would be on July 28. For future years someone was urgently needed to take over the organisation of this event.

NAYLAND PLAYGROUP

The council supported Nayland Playgroup's request for a grant towards its new building fund but will wait until next month to decide on the amount. Tibby Mimpriss said the playgroup had a well-produced business plan covering all areas and she was impressed with its commitment to future development.

Responding to the council's main concern, funding co-ordinator Teresa Moriarty said no Nayland child had ever been denied a place at playgroup. It had operated at capacity for the last 12 months and staff worked hard to ensure all children were accommodated. Concern was expressed over the uncertain future of middle schools in the schools review but it was felt Nayland Primary School had a long-term future. The group had no choice but to move from its present venue and work on plans for the new building had started some time ago. Mary George said as far as the schools review was concerned the county was divided into three and the Nayland area would be the last to change, possibly not until 2015. Members agreed the playgroup was a worthwhile cause and will decide on the council grant when the year's surplus becomes apparent at the end of the financial year.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Mrs Fuller said permission and listed building consent had been granted for a part single, part two-storey extension at Tower House, Jane Walker Park, Wiston, with conditions.

Members had no objection to an application for listed

building consent for internal alterations to Rose Cottage, Fen Street

Consulted by Leavenheath parish over a plan to building a two-storey house at Oak Cottage, Breach Grove, Kingsland Lane, and demolishing the existing house, members decided to look at the last application as well before considering their response.

TREE MANAGEMENT

Mary George reported on a site meeting to discuss tree management at the burial ground and it was agreed to go ahead with the contractor's quote for £420 plus VAT to lift trees and clear the debris, level holes around the cemetery, move a spoil heap and scatter grass seed. He was also asked to trim the willow trees overhanging the footpath beside the A134.

OFF-ROAD CYCLING

District councillor Chris Hunt reported a number of keen young cyclists had approached him asking if the council could find them an off-road area to ride their bikes. Two possible sites were in front of the scout hut at the top of the recreation ground or the far end of the playing field. He felt it was a worthwhile request and members will discuss it next month.

HIGHWAYS

The council heard from Suffolk County Council the class of lorries barred from using the B1068 from Stoke by Nayland to Leavenheath was to change from 17 to 18 tonnes. Responding to proposed road safety improvements on the A134 it was agreed to ask for a *SLOW* sign at the top of Harpers Hill and to renew the council's request for a speed limit on the Nayland stretch. Mr Hunt said there was no point in retaining the illuminated sign at the side of the road as it had never worked properly.

NEWS IN BRIEF

A site meeting is to be held with EDF Energy to decide on the position of a mounted transformer the company wants to install on Pops Piece.

Anglian Water is to be asked to remove rubbish that has accumulated round the pumping station on the A134.

It was agreed to ask Babergh to provide a litter-picking team to clear the roadside in Harpers Hill. Mrs Mimpriss requested a further litter-pick at Wiston before the verges grow.

Babergh has asked if residents can keep an eye on the newly planted hedge in Stoke Road and water it if necessary.

Nomination forms for the local elections on May 3 have to be submitted to the returning officer by April 4.



NAYLAND IN BLOOM

Sadly, no white knight has come forward to take on the role of co-ordinator for an entry in 2007, so we have declined the Chair of Judges' invitation to participate.

Perhaps a willing volunteer will come forward for 2008, so that we can try to meet, or even, surpass, our 2006 achievement by entering once again.

Congratulations and thanks to Joan Moore for her hard work. Unfortunately the impetus will be lost as we are not participating this year.

In July, the weather was excellent for the Street Fayre which had once again been superbly planned by Andrew Gowen and was rewarded with real success.

September brought the second of our new initiatives. Again, led by Andrew and under the Chairmanship of his Honour Judge Watling, a First Response Group finally got underway. Training followed in the autumn and, although still short of the required number, but those participating can feel proud they are making a real contribution to the village.

Emergency First Response: Andrew Gowen said the team would be operational from 1st April and would be alerted via 999 emergency calls through the Communicator on duty.

50th Anniversary of the Nayland & District Women's Institute

Numbers may have fluctuated over 50 years but the enthusiastic spirit of Nayland Women's Institute is as strong as ever. Members celebrated their half-century with a birthday party attended by ten past presidents at the village hall on Monday. Special guest was founder member Joyce Fullbrook who was presented with a plant in recognition of her loyalty by president Shirley Scarlett.

Mrs Fullbrook recalled she paid 3s.6d. for her first annual subscription in 1957, now £26, and thoroughly enjoyed the friendships and interests she had gained through the WI.

Other guests included Suffolk West Federation chairman Pat Collinson, vice-chairman Rachel Swann and members from Leavenheath, Bures and Boxford.

Past presidents Pam Baker and Jean Dryden arranged a comprehensive exhibition of the institute's activities over five decades. The display covered sporting events, outings, literary competitions, a Suffolk Show performance, a church flower festival, village fetes and street fairs.

In the 70s members were asked to draw a map of the village and photographs were put in a book presented to the Queen to mark her silver jubilee.



The institute has also compiled a churchyard scrapbook and carried out a mile-square landscape survey, updated every five years, for Bury Records Office.

Nayland has won the Margaret Hitchcock Cup - an annual competition set by the federation - four times.

Members still make plenty of cakes and send a huge batch every May to the St Helena Hospice, Colchester.

Another past president Jeanette Finch made an iced cake for the birthday celebration and Ron Coxall from Stowmarket organised two lively country dancing sessions.

CONSERVATION SOCIETY

Any new plan for the Horkesley Park conservation and heritage centre will be firmly opposed by Nayland-with-Wissington Conservation Society.

Chairman John Alexander told the annual meeting a further application by Bunting & Sons was expected by the end of March and the society continued to oppose it.

He said: "We're opposed to having more than 700,000 visitors a year, traffic chaos and the adverse impact on the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. There is no national need for this development which will have a bad effect on local businesses.

"It's a retail outlet masquerading as a conservation centre and the society will be ready with others to do everything we can to deal with it."

Over the year, he said, the society had launched two books which involved a great deal of work from the initial idea to the actual publication. Wendy Sparrow's book, *Memories of Nayland*, had sold so well the society broke even on its cost within a few months.


Similarly, much work had gone into Leigh Alston's forthcoming book on medieval buildings, centred on Nayland, which was due out in October. This was a major publication costing about £25,000 and he thanked secretary Andora Carver for her "sterling work" in gaining grants.

Mr Alexander said the society had made a significant contribution to Nayland's Anglia in Bloom success in the final presentation to the judges. It had also obtained enforcement orders over the use of a second runway at Nayland airfield and the Anchor Inn's exterior lighting.

With society membership increasing and more than 200 members it has been a very successful year. The group was financially sound and respected as a true voice on local

"In the year ahead we'll meet any challenge to the local environment with vigour," he added. "This village and its surroundings are our precious inheritance and it's our objective and duty to conserve them."

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
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



Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

For some the gardening year begins at Easter, this time they are in for a shock. In any event there would be a lot of weed growth to deal with, but this year with very little check to growth the situation may already be out of control. Even at M/S Hall, where gardening is a 12-month occupation, we face a bit of a jungle.

Looking back at February's article, it seems that the forecasters were predicting cold weather. In the event there wasn't much, but what we did get was rain, and more rain. John Werner's report next year will be interesting. Here despite being on a sort of plateau we have suffered flooding for the first time for 5 years or so, though the prime cause of this is the blocking and general

lack of maintenance of neighbouring ditches. Among beneficiaries, however, have been visiting Mallard from a neighbours pond. Whilst very tame and interesting to watch these duck are a mixed blessing, since their large feet can damage fragile plants. We now await the arrival of their young.

Daffodils and narcissi (all one family really) are having a good season, but are early like everything else and won't be seen in the Church at Easter. Other spring bulbs looking well now are Scillas, Chionodoxa (Glory of the Snow) and Muscari (Grape Hyacinths). All of these will naturalise, spread and self-seed.

An early shrub not often seen is Cornus Mas, the Cornelian Cherry, which produces masses of golden stars on bare stems now, and (not very) edible fruit in due course.

The Cornus, or Dogwood family is a large one. C. Alba shows its coloured bare stems in winter, gold, red and purple depending on the variety, and for best effect it should be cut down annually, about now in order to produce the new growth which provides next winter's show. Other species are C. Florida and C. Kousa and their hybrids, with their large bracts looking like flowers. The best cultivar is C. 'Norman Hadden' whose bracts start off white and change to pink; if you grow one Cornus choose this one, sadly our specimen died after the very dry summer of 2003.

There are many other species, some only happy in acid soil.

The Winter Jasmine (J. Nudiflorum) has now finished flowering, and should be hard pruned. A few years ago the OM/S thought one of his had been wrecked; next year it had its best flowering season.

Next time we meet gardens should be at their height.

PLAYGROUP FAIR

With a wide range of stalls selling all kinds of tempting goods, visitors to Nayland Playgroup's Spring fair were spoilt for choice.

Saturday's event which raised about £475 for the playgroup's building project attracted at least 200 people and the village hall was busy all afternoon.

Funding co-ordinator Teresa Moriarty said: "It was really worthwhile and a good thing to do the day before Mothering Sunday. Organic toiletries and jewellery sold particularly well."

The playgroup, whose lease on its present premises behind Nayland Primary School runs out in June, has been busy drawing up a business plan.

"We hope to make a formal bid for capital funding in May and have been working on costings for the actual building," she added. "The next couple of weeks will be spent with architects and quantity surveyors."

The group has received approval to site its new premises in a corner of the school field.

THE TWO COURTS OF NAYLAND

Have you ever wondered how the road or street in which you live got its name? In a lot of cases it is guite obvious: Mill Street, Stoke Road and Heycroft Way are self explanatory for instance. Having lived for many years in Court Street, I have often wondered when and how the street got its name. We shall probably never know for sure but it is interesting to speculate.

The most likely reason for the name is Court Knoll, Nayland's scheduled ancient monument. As most people know, this five acre field surrounded by a deep ditch was an ancient settlement called Eiland and is believed to be the original site of Nayland. Occupied by manorial buildings from at least the thirteenth century the first Manor Court would almost certainly have been held there. The historian Philip Morant, in 1768, referred to "the mansion house in a pasture ground called 'The Court' but no foundations of any part of it are to be seen except the Chapel." On the 1838 Tithe map the field is still called "The Court" but by 1886 the name Court Knoll was appearing on Ordnance Survey maps - I wonder if it was the Ordnance Survey who thought up this modern name. It probably took some time for local people to adopt the new name as I remember our late neighbour, May Wilson, who was born in 1907 and whose family lived here long before that, always referred to the field as "The Court".

As the ancient buildings on Court Knoll gradually disappeared the "new" village began to grow a short distance away from the site. At some stage village elders perhaps decided to use the old name for the street running from the heart of the new village to the site of the old. It would be interesting to be able to pinpoint when this happened. In fact some street names do originate from medieval times, others did not become fixed until Victorian times leading to some confusion on old maps. Court Street's name has remained constant at least since the eighteenth century while some others in Nayland have changed several times. The earliest reference to Court Street I have seen is in a Rate Roll in 1768.

Another possible reason for Court Street's name is Alston Court, formerly called Grooms until about 1905. The house passed through several families until the Alston family owned it for about two centuries from the eighteenth century. According to minutes of the Court of the Manor of Nayland with Downings, members of the Alston family were Stewards of the Manor Court during the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries. It seems quite likely that the Court proceedings would have been carried on in the home of the Steward and, in fact, the 1892 edition of White's Directory listed Miss Margaret Alston as living at "The Court House". Is it possible then that the street leading up to the Court ("Alston's Court") was named after it?

Until the bypass was built Court Street had been for centuries the main route from Colchester to Sudbury. As well as being an important highway I am sure my neighbours would agree with its description in a nineteenth century newspaper. An advertisement announced that an auction sale was to be held at the White Hart, Nayland, and the properties to be sold were to be found in Court Street described as "the preferable part of the town"!

PROSTATE CANCER

An increasing number of men, without symptoms, are now requesting the prostate cancer blood test (PSA).

Whilst prostate cancer is more common with increasing age it can still occur in men in their forties and fifties. There are racial and lifestyle factors, such as diet, that can influence risk and there is an increased incidence if your father or brother has been diagnosed with it. Many suggest PSA to detect early cancer. As a rough guide your PSA should be 1.5 less than the decade you are in (eg less than 4.5 for a man in his sixties) but PSA change is equally important and a rise of more than 2 points in a year may need investigation.

If the PSA is suspicious or the prostate feels abnormal an ultrasound scan, via the rectum, is performed and biopsies taken - undignified but not too unpleasant. If present prostate cancer samples are then given a Gleason Score and scans are performed to detect any evidence of spread outside the gland.

If the disease is confined to the prostate there are a variety of treatment options. In low risk situations without troublesome symptoms a period of surveillance may be all that is required. Others may benefit from the removal of the prostate. Until recently this has usually required an abdominal incision but it can now be performed by keyhole surgery with robotic assistance. Alternatively radiotherapy, either by external beam therapy or radioactive seed implant can be given. There are also some novel techniques with high frequency ultrasound (HiFU) and freezing but these are not widely available.

If the disease has spread beyond the confines of the prostate there is still excellent treatment available. Usually this employs hormonal manipulation with tablets or monthly injections that reduce or inhibit the body's natural testosterone. Successful

chemotherapy is becoming available but is usually reserved for advanced cases.

Whatever the stage of prostate cancer that may be diagnosed always take time to discuss the treatment options with your urologist/oncologist or a specialist nurse counsellor. There are many options and the results of treatment will probably be better than first imagined.

WILLIAM GRAY

A NOTED auctioneer and "highly respected professional" has died aged 79.

William Gray, of Bear Street, Nayland, was a full partner in Colchester firm Stanfords when he retired in the 1980s following its takeover by William H Brown.

Having joined C M Stanford and Son 40 years previously he was delighted when the firm was resurrected in the 90s as he felt the personal contact had been lost.

Born in Ingatestone, Essex, to Scottish farmers Hugh and Margaret Gray, he was educated in Brentwood. Later the family moved to Wormingford where he helped his father and brother improve Garnons & Bowdens Farm.

Soon after joining Stanfords he was made responsible for calf and store cattle sales together with Thorpe le Soken grading centre which existed then for prime stock while rationing and wartime controls were still in force.

He took the auctioneers' exams by correspondence course and later became a Chartered Surveyor, a Fellow in the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors and a full member of the Agricultural Valuers' Association.

Known to everyone as Willie, he enjoyed his relationship with clients and staff at Stanfords. His knowledge and expertise, especially with livestock and agricultural matters, were legend.

As well as livestock Mr Gray ran the Christmas poultry sales for many years and people supported them to watch his very personal auctioneering methods.

He met his wife Flora at Stanfords in the 60s and they moved to White Park Farm, Nayland, in the early 70s. After leaving the village in 2001 the couple returned last year.

Mr Gray played an enthusiastic part in village life and was a churchwarden in the 80s, helping in the re-building of the church hall after its roof blew off in the 1987 hurricane. He built up Nayland Church Fete into the success it is today and traditionally auctioned produce at the annual pub harvest services.

His other great interest was horse racing and he was a member of the Elite Racing Club.

Former Nayland vicar, Canon David Stranack, who assisted at Mr Gray's thanksgiving service at St James's, Nayland, said: "He was a great supporter and encourager. His faith and church meant a great deal to him and he will be greatly missed."





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





PLAYGROUP NEWS

We continue to work on our new building project. We have been fundraising with our Spring Fair and cake sales and will be hosting a number of other events later in the year. The Committee and Staff would like to thank the Community Council for their very generous support for this important community project. This is what we hope to achieve from our new building:

- to provide an 'Early birds' before school service where parents can leave their children in a safe environment from 8.00 a.m.
 The session will run until the start of school and will consist of free playtime.
- to increase the Playgroup morning session from 16 places to 24.
- to provide a lunch club for Playgroup and Ducklings children which will offer a packed lunch or a hot lunch which will be provided in the school hall. Thanks to the support of Raegan Delaney, we hope that this service will start after Easter.
- to provide an afternoon Playgroup session for up to 24 children.
 The funding structure of the Playgroup sessions will be
 slightly different. Children over 3 will still be funded for their 5
 sessions a week by the government. Additional sessions will
 be charged at a fair and competitive rate.
- to provide an After School Club running from 15.25 to 17.55 for children up to the end of year four (age 9).

If our plans to expand the Playgroup are successful, the number of children we will be registered for will be 24 (increase of 8 Early Education places which receive government funding) and

we will also be offering up to 24 Childcare places for preschool children. This means that there will be 24 places available for pre-school children at the morning sessions and 24 in the afternoon. This offers a substantial increase in the childcare provision for pre-school children from Nayland and the surrounding villages.

There seems to be a perception in the community that places at Nayland Playgroup are hard to come by. This is not the case. Our admissions policy is as follows:

It is our intention to make Nayland Playgroup accessible to children and families from all sections of the community. We operate the following admissions policy.

- We admit children to Nayland Playgroup from age 2½ years. In the first term children will be offered one to two sessions per week.
- We encourage parents and carers to apply for extra sessions as the child gets older. Sessions will be offered subject to availability and in order of date of birth.
- We arrange our admissions list in birth order. In times of high demand our policy may also take into account the vicinity of the home to the Playgroup; siblings already attending the setting and the number of sessions a child attends at another Nursery or Playgroup.

At the time of writing, all children who live in Nayland aged 2½ years and for whom applications have been received have been offered at least one session a week from the beginning of next term. The Playgroup staff work very hard to try to accommodate parents wishes. They have to try to balance OF-STED requirements for older children in the 3-4 year age group, with the wishes of parents whose children are 2½ - 3years.
