NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 13th December 2006

NAYLAND FIRE STATION

Plans to rebuild Nayland fire station on its present site were explained to the parish council at its December meeting.

Nayland's is one of eight fire stations in Suffolk being rebuilt or renovated under a private initiative scheme.

Divisional fire officer Paul Collins and Suffolk Fire Authority chairman Joanna Spicer attended the meeting to discuss the plan.

Chairman Gerry Battye said an earlier plan shown to villagers in August to build a new station on Harpers Hill had been dropped in favour of rebuilding on the current site but with the training tower moved to the west boundary.

Two neighbours, Rod Pawsey and Mary Fairhead, supported the need for a fire station in Nayland but objected to the tower's new position. Mr Pawsey also asked for a brick retaining wall to be built between the site and his property.

The parish council accepted the plan provided the proposed tower location was moved and backed Mr Pawsey's request for a brick boundary wall instead of the close-boarded fence.

Mr Collins later confirmed the tower was being relocated which would mean losing one disabled parking space. He said the new station would be built to the right of the present site at an angle and would include part of the land currently occupied by the former school house. Construction work would not interfere with the use of the station.

Mrs Spicer said the plan would go to the county council planning committee on January 25.

PLANNING

An application by the owners of the Tower House at Jane Walker Park, Wiston, to build a single and two- storey extension with a car port was strongly opposed by Bill Starling who said he represented several other residents. He stressed Tower House was an important part of the historic former TB hospital and the Grade II listed building should be preserved intact as a memorial to its founder Jane Walker and all the people who had worked there.

Mr Battye said members' opinions had changed following a site visit and the council opposed the plan feeling the proposal failed to respect the scale, frame, design and purpose of the original building. District councillor Chris Hunt said the application was unlikely to go to Babergh's development committee until January.

The council objected to an application to convert part of a side garage at 48 Bear Street into a shower room saying the loss of the garage would mean on-street parking and the 'horse-watering' was not part of the cottage.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING SCHEME

It was decided to suggest another site meeting with Doug Malins of the Flagship Housing Group to discuss the proposed low-cost housing development at the bottom of Harpers Estate and the amount of greensward being included in the front gardens.

BUNTING & SONS

Mr Battye said correspondence had been received from Bunting & Sons concerning a dog harassing sheep and the killing of two pigs on the farm. A further letter described the work being done at the flood stream and the layout of footpaths, pointing out bathing or paddling in the stream was not permitted. Cattle and other livestock were grazing the area and keeping it clear.

Members heard a letter from Martin Wright complaining he could not walk around the field between Court Knoll and the river in November because grazing animals were enclosed by an electric fence with gates at each end of the path. He said it was inappropriate to put a sign up saying it was a permissive right of way. Keen walker John Dowding said the footpath issue was extremely complex. If people had walked a route for more than 20 years it was up to them to go to the county council. Andora Carver, secretary of Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society, said she had heard from the Tendring Hall Estate the permissive path would be open all year except for the section between the two gates which would be closed for about three months between September and Christmas when livestock were grazing. The estate's agent said closure was necessary partly to protect walkers from cattle and partly to protect sheep from walkers' dogs.

Mr Battye said the term permissive path was confusing and the council decided to ask the county rights of way officer to write an explanatory piece for the Community Times.

HIGHWAYS

A letter from western area manager Jim Nunn said he had passed concerns about road safety outside the primary school to a colleague.

ALLOTMENTS

A request by a Leavenheath resident to rent an allotment was turned down as the one vacant plot was likely to be taken later in the year.

CRIME

Crimes reported during October were a theft from a car in Heycroft Way, an assault in Bear Street and a theft from a car in Stoke Road.

PARISH COUNCIL PRECEPT

The council agreed to ask for a £23,500 precept for 2007/8.

PARISH CLERK

As the meeting ended the work of Nayland's retiring parish clerk Wendy Sparrow was highly praised by councillor Mary George who said she had been an outstanding clerk for 25 years. Her words were echoed by Mrs Carver who spoke on behalf of village organisations.

Mrs Sparrow said she had seen lots of parish councillors come and go and thanked them all for their help and support, especially Mr Battye who has been chairman for 20 years.

TRAFFIC

An articulated lorry guided by a satellite navigation system became straddled across the Birch Street/Mill Street junction blocking the road for half an hour, councillors heard at their January meeting.

Mary George said the vehicle was travelling from Stoke heading for Colchester and instead of continuing along Bear Street tried to turn into Mill Street. As it tried to manoevre it reversed into a parked car which was dragged backwards and forwards.

"The lorry was being directed by satnav and it was a very dangerous situation which could happen again, "she said, "We failed to get a weight limit in Birch Street but with drivers now obeying satnav systems maybe we should try for one in the centre of the village."

Chairman Gerry Battye said a lot of legislation was involved with weight limits and basically the council wanted to stop heavy vehicles turning left at the junction.

It was agreed to ask Suffolk County Council highways authority for expert advice.

ANCHOR INN LIGHTING

Councillors and the village conservation society are being invited to share ideas with consultants devising a new outside lighting scheme for the Anchor Inn. Owners Bunting & Sons had to take down 11 floodlights after Babergh Council issued an enforcement notice.

A letter from Stephen Bunting said temporary lighting had been installed to meet safety requirements. For the pub's wellbeing Mr Bunting said it was essential to replace what had been removed with appropriate illumination. Lighting consultants were visiting the pub to discuss proposals and once a scheme was selected planning approval would be sought. Meanwhile all constructive suggestions were welcome.

He added representatives of the parish council, Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society and Babergh Council would be invited to the consultants' next meeting.

The council agreed to pass on Mr Bunting's letter to Babergh's enforcement officer John Winders for information.

FOOTPATHS

Following a query about permissive paths on the Tendring Hall Estate field between Court Knoll and the River Stour, a letter from Suffolk's assistant rights of way officer said he was only responsible for the maintenance of definitive paths and had no control over permissive paths which were the landowner's responsibility.

VILLAGE HALL

Reporting on the village hall, Rosemary Knox said the accounts showed better results than expected though they were not quite good enough. A serious roof leak had been found over a hall passage. Mrs Knox said the committee had accepted the principle that storage charges might be introduced. The hall's future maintenance and possible ways forward were to be discussed at a meeting.

EAST OF ENGLAND PLAN

The council received information on proposed changes to the East of England plan and Mrs Knox agreed to study them and report any implications for the parish council.

PLANNING

Mr Battye reported an appeal by Tony Harris, owner of the Hill Farm airstrip, had been dismissed and an enforcement notice over the use of the eastern runway upheld. The inspector's report said the appellant had failed to demonstrate the eastern runway had been used for the taking off and landing of light aircraft continuously for ten years between January 1995 and January 2005. No costs were

A plan to replace eight porches on the frontages of 45-59

Bear Street was accepted.

The council also accepted an application to carry out tree work at Lock Cottage every five years.

DEDHAM VALE AND STOUR VALLEY PROJECT CONFERENCE

Patricia Fuller and Tibby Mimpress reported on the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project conference. The Project has been awarded £48,500 lottery funding and has started consultation on how the money should be spent. Councillors agreed they wanted to be kept informed on progress so they could comment.

STREET LIGHTING

District councillor Chris Hunt said he would approach Babergh over a request for an additional street lamp in Parkers Way.

HIGHWAYS

Clerk Debbie Hattrell was asked to make inquiries about repairs to the Anchor Bridge which have only been done on

The council heard from Peter Ingram of Suffolk County Council a 'gateway' for Stoke Road had been ordered and would be installed shortly. He suggested it should be located away from the 30mph speed limit sign. A 'slow' mark and buff band would be placed on the road.

POLICE

PC Paul Wren reported zero crime in Nayland during December but added he had issued three parking tickets around the Mill Street T-junction. He said police community support officer funding from the government had been cut so numbers were reduced throughout the force and 16 local villages would probably only have four officers between them.

It was agreed to write to the sector commander praising PC Wren's efforts following his retirement and asking for news of his replacement.

MORE THAN CLERKSHIP

After 25 years unsung commitment to the village Wendy Sparrow has retired from the post of Parish Clerk. As the Community Times goes to press a reception is being planned to mark Wendy's special contribution to village life.

Gerry Battye pointed out,' the Clerkship is a vital post. Wendy has done so much more than any of us in the village should expect'.

The reception will be held on 28th January.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Chairman: Alan Hodges 263982

BRIEF REPORT OF THE MEETING HELD ON 24TH JANUARY 2007

Eighteen members were present under the Chairmanship of Alan Hodges.

The minutes of the meeting held on 13 November were agreed.

FIRST RESPONSE

Andrew Gowen reported that 13 members of the village had successfully completed First Response training at the primary school over the last 2 weekends and it was hoped the team would become operational in the next few weeks. More volunteers were still required if it is to achieve 24 hour coverage over 7 days and another course was planned in April. People interested should contact him without delay. The meeting agreed to allocate the First Response team £400 to purchase basic equipment and it was agreed the Team should come under the auspices of the Community Council who would manage its finances.

NAYLAND IN BLOOM

The meeting still has to find an organiser if the village is to participate in 2007. A person needs to be identified by 12 March and members were asked to go out and recruit potential volunteers. Any volunteer interested should contact Joan Moore.

PA SYSTEM

A decision on the PA System for the Village Hall still needs to be made.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Accounts for 2006 still have to be finalised and Bryan Smith reported that some £3250 had been allocated in Grants; income was some £5000 and there had been a surplus of some £2000 on the year. Assets for the fund were some £15000. He felt that there needs to be more publicity about the ability of the Community Council to provide grants to village people and organisations.

COMMUNITY TIMES

Lorraine Brooks asked that future meetings should be linked to the publication deadlines for the Community Times to ensure its activities are properly reported. She will be investigating with Graham Griffiths the feasibility of publishing the Community Times on the Nayland and Wissington Web site.

CHRISTMAS BAZAAR

All those involved were thanked for their contribution. It was agreed that in future participating village societies should only pay £5 for the table and would not have to pay a contribution of their profits. The event was a money raising opportunity for the village societies.

CHRISTMAS TREE

This was considered to be very successful and the lights worked well. The meeting expressed thanks to the organisers and to Chapman's for providing the power.

VILLAGE QUIZ

This is taking place on Friday 2 March and it is important that it gets support from societies and individuals. It was agreed to provide a clearing for people who want to participate but cannot make a team.

SUFFOLK DIGITAL CINEMA

The Village Hall hopes to organise its first film show in the middle of March and the meeting felt that this was a very worthwhile initiative which needs to be supported.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

In winding up the meeting Alan Hodges:

- Hoped that we could have more representation at future meetings. It was important for the Village to have a strong Community Council.
- There were still vacancies for those interested to join the Executive Committee.
- Congratulated David George on his good citizen award from Babergh District Council and his comments were strongly supported by the meeting.



NAYLAND IN BLOOM

Following on from Nayland's successful entry in last year's Anglia in Bloom, a volunteer is needed to lead the organisation of the project again this year. They would be supported by the Community Council and a sub-committee would work with them.



NAYLAND AND WISTON FIRST RESPONSE TEAM

We have got going at last.

Thirteen volunteers from the newly formed Nayland and Wiston First Response Team took part in a training weekend at Nayland Primary School on

13th and 14th January. We are very grateful to the Headmistress, Mrs Raegan Delaney for allowing us to use the school's magnificent facilities.

A First Response Team is trained to give oxygen and operate a defibulator and gives initial support to patients suffering heart or breathing difficulties. It is alerted by the Ambulance Trust when it receives a 999 call and aims to arrive at the patient's side to give immediate help before the ambulance arrives. Those initial few minutes can be vital in saving lives.

The training was organised by Jonathan Needle, the East of England Ambulance Trust First Response Coordinator. There were two excellent instructors and we were filled with masses of facts and had to undertake numerous practical exercises. The team consisted of a variety of people from the two villages aged from 20 years to 65. It was hard work, very interesting and enormous fun and all members felt very excited at the prospect of helping the most vulnerable members in the community.

The first meeting of the group takes place at 43 Bear Street at 7.30pm on Wednesday 31 January where we will be sorting out how the scheme will work. We hope to be up and running by mid March. We will keep you informed on progress. The aim is to provide 24 hour cover 7 days a week but this will only be achieved with more members. Thirteen is a good start but the team needs to recruit many more; so please contact Andrew Gowen, the Team co-ordinator, on 01206 262534 if you are interested.

Very soon Nayland residents will be able to see films without having to travel miles to neighbouring towns; the Village Hall Management Committee have become members of the Suffolk Digital Cinema Network. The SDCN, supported by Babergh District Council, allows village and smaller communities to use equipment to show films in village or school halls. The films are from a wide catalogue, both ancient and modern, and obtained via the Ipswich film library, and are the only charge as the equipment use is free.

The VHMC intend an early showing in the spring as soon as some members have been trained on how to manage the equipment. There have already been

some indications from groups as to the kind of films they would like to see and the SDCN publish the audience figures from showings within the network, so we know what are the most popular, although once we get it established in the village, that might not be the only factor.

There is also the opportunity to make an evening of it with ice creams, popcorn, dressing up and a glass of wine!


Well, the Christmas break is over and I hope the New Year has started in the way you wanted it to. From our point of view the break over Christmas looked very good; fourth

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON VILLAGE HALL TREASURER'S REPORT 15 January

Some Statistics from 2006 concerning the hire of the Hall (2005 figures are in brackets)

- Hired out for some 1200 (1005.5) hours over the year
- Village users had it for some 80% of the time and non residents used it for 20% of the time which is similar to last year.
- Assuming the Hall is available for 12 hours a day 365 days of the year; the usage average is 27.5% (23%) but the percentage use in the evenings or popular times is much higher.
- Cost of Running the Hall in 2006

Normal everyday expenditure for the year £12698.00 (£10732.00)

Usage of 1200 hours; the cost was:-

£ £10.58 (£10.67) per hour

- Depreciation of equipment of about £1047 is included in the 2006 expenditure and was not included in the 2005 expenditure. So the increase of £2000 running costs can be accounted for by the depreciation and the creases of 42% in fuel; 51% in water and 45% in electricity charges.
- · Income:
 - 1. There has been an increase of some £1000.00 in hall bookings compared with last year.
 - 2. Some £1676 of the income is for advanced bookings for 2007; but a similar sum was shown in the 2005 accounts for advanced bookings in 2006. They therefore balance out.
 - 3. Your VHMC has increased its own fundraising by some £500.00 to £1123 from the Village Lunches and sale of plants and we hope to increase this further during 2007 by the planned digital cinema shows.

Balance sheet

- In the 2006 balance sheet we have included assets of £7055 and included depreciation of £1047 in the expenses for the year. Furniture and utensils have been depreciated at 10% and electrical goods at 20% a year.
- The Hall has made a surplus of £835 on the year; this compares with a surplus of £880 for 2005 but this
 plus for this year would have been greater if the £1047 depreciation had not been included.
- Nevertheless this surplus is insufficient to cover the long term maintenance of the Hall and the VHMC and the village community needs to examine how it might raise extra funds. Ideally we need to make a surplus of at least £3 -5000 a year

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

The birds are back at last, not perhaps in quite their usual numbers, and with the exception of one species. The OM/S has been in the habit of throwing surplus apples on to the lawn in front of the house, and this usually produces half a dozen blackbirds and the odd thrush in no time at all; this year the apples remain untouched, until squirrels eventually find them.

As a postscript to last issue's words on Cyclamen, the OM/S forgot to mention the other hardy species, which is just starting to flower. This is Cyclamen Coum, with leaves, which are more or less round and of a single colour, unlike the marbled leaves of C. Hederifolium. It doesn't spread as readily as the latter, but eventually forms a clump.

The name incidentally, should be pronounced Co' um, as a dissylable, not Coom, and presumably derives from the island of Cos in the Aegean, though it is found in Southern Europe and in Asia Minor.

Perusing back numbers of this article it seems that one winter flowering shrub never previously mentioned is the Chinese Witch Hazel, Hamamelis Mollis. The scented golden flowers appear now on bare stems, followed by the large felted leaved which later turn yellow in autumn. There are various cultivars with orange and red flowers, but in the OM/S' view the yellow species is the most effective, and looks good against a dark background.

The American Witch Hazel, H. Virginiana is not really garden-worthy since the flowers are obscured by its foliage. This is the source of the astringent lotion, and in edible capsule form is sometimes an effective remedy for haemorrhoids.

At the time of writing cold weather is forecast. If it does arrive those plants, which are unseasonably in full leaf will suffer a nasty shock. When the ground thaws out plants in pots and frames may well dry out and, surprisingly, need a little water.

By the way, the holly picked in November was still green and fresh in its plastic sack six weeks later; in the open air or indoors it had begun to shrivel.

WHAT'S IN A NAME

Local Government is constantly changing but, even so, I was surprised to read recently that in a new government White Paper there is an option for Parish Councils to change their title if they so wish. I wonder where that leaves the Parish Clerk, this post would probably also be renamed. From the point of view of the administration of the village a change of name for the Parish Council and Clerk would make no difference but I think from a historical point of view this would mark the end of an era.

Village administration has for centuries been carried out by the "parish". Until the Middle Ages the parish had been mainly a church unit which looked after the needs of

the village. However, the Tudor governments gave responsibilities for the poor, highways and petty law and order to civil parishes which often covered the same area as ecclesiastical parishes. Elected Parish "Councils" were created by the 1894 Local Government Act which divided England and Wales into 14,000 parishes whose boundaries generally followed those of the old civil parishes.

Whilst Parish Councils are only just over a hundred years old, by comparison, the office of Parish Clerk is an ancient one, going back to the Middle Ages. The Clerk was originally a man who was appointed to assist the parish priest and usually held his office for life, although some aspired to become priests themselves, serving a kind of apprenticeship and learning their trade while they served. Parish Clerks were indispensable to their priests, their duties including making arrangements for services, leading the congregation and generally looking after the church.

As yet I have not found any early references to Parish Clerks in Nayland's records but records of payments to clerks have been found elsewhere. In Cheswardine,



Salop, a glebe terrier of 1722 listed fees due to the "Clarke": 13/4d for looking after the Clock, paid annually at Easter. "He gathers likewise at Chrissmass an antient customery payment of several persons called Keech money ... whereby he is obliged to clean their seats and dress em against a good time"; at Easter, two Eggs for every Cock & Drake throughout the parish, at the churching of a woman 2d or 2 white loaves. Wages for a wedding were 4d, for Burying 4d for a grave in the churchyard and in the church or chancel 12 pence.

The Parish Clerk no doubt also assisted the priest in the administration of his more

civil duties before these were finally removed. After the 1894 Act the church and the state had quite separate roles in the parish, although even today there is still confusion in some people's minds. If the titles of the Parish Council and its Clerk were changed this would no doubt end any confusion but I think it would be a very sad day indeed. I feel privileged to think that I have been one small link in a very long chain of Parish Clerks which Nayland undoubtedly has had throughout the centuries. A change of name would somehow bring about an end to this link with the past.



Despite the strange effects of global warming (e.g. currently roses are still out spring flowers are shooting up and honey bees are flying) it is worth pointing out that total rainfall in 2003, 2005 and 2006 historically was about normal.

We had a bit of sleet and snow in January but the wettest month was August (3.93") and an inch fell in 16 hours on the 24th.

Next wet was May (3.75") and it was cold and wet particularly in the middle of the month. At least the afternoon of the Fete turned dry. It was very hot in late June and most of July.

It was warm and sunny in mid to late September. October (3.05") was notable for localised downpours and we had just over an inch in 12 hours on the 23/24th. Mainly the autumn was dry, however, and most trees kept their leaves about a month longer than normal until some frost and strong winds brought them down.

NAYLAND A CUCKOO CRYING



Hot ideas for Heritage Projects within the Stour Valley!

The Dedham Vale AONB and Stour Valley Project, seeks your help with ideas for Heritage Projects within the Stour Valley.

In December 2005, the Project team were awarded a 'Project Planning grant' of £48,500 by the Heritage Lottery for research into a larger bid to explore the historic landscape of the Stour Valley. If the resulting grant bid is successful, it will lead to some exciting heritage projects throughout the area.

The Heritage Lottery Fund Landscape Partnership grant scheme encourages individuals and groups to come together with the aim to promote heritage conservation.

Since December 2005, the Dedham Vale AONB and Stour Valley Project team have been co-ordinating the setting up of a valley wide partnership, including working with a team of consultants to undertake some of the initial work.

The partnership will put forward a programme of activities that aim to provide long-term social, economic and environmental benefits for rural areas. Activities may include opportunities to conserve, restore and celebrate built and natural features, celebrating cultural associations and activities. It will encourage more people to learn about the importance of their landscape heritage, including an improved understanding of local crafts and skills.

Simon Amstutz, Operations manager with the Project said, "The partnership is still looking for ideas for heritage projects that have the potential to be part funded by a successful Landscape Partnership application within the Stour Valley. Ideas could include those relating to the visible or hidden archaeology, the built or natural environment or ideas to improve understanding of the Stour Valley landscape".

Time to be counted

We may all hate bureaucracy and form filling but there can be a good purpose behind it. This year the church has to draw up a new Electoral Roll. This is done every few years just to keep us up to date.

As its name suggests the Electoral Roll is to do with voting. Each adult member of the church has the right to vote for the Parochial Church Council, and for representatives to sit on Deanery Synod. From there others are sent to Diocesan and General Synod. [No prize for guessing where that model came from! General Synod often sits in Church House Westminster.]

The idea of Synodical Government is to give everyone a voice. Anyone can raise an issue and have it debated from the local level to the centre. This has sometimes happened with really good effect.

However the Roll also serves to show the relative strength of the church: i.e. how many people count themselves as members and supporters of their local church. When a church faces a major crisis or change it will turn to its members for advice and support. [You don't have to be on the Roll to offer support, but it helps].

As we all know, the church is currently facing many different challenges, both locally and nationally, which makes this a good time for people to stand up and be counted.

We are ever grateful to the Friends of St. James and St. Mary's for the ways in which they enable us to care for our buildings. It is wonderful to have so much support to meet that challenge. But the church body is here to serve the parish in many different ways and that raises other issues. So if you care about the worship, work and witness of St. James' or St. Mary's church, and consider yourself to be a member of the congregation, please fill in a form and come on the Roll. [Forms will be in church.]

During Lent we will be thinking about Jesus in the wilderness working out his role as Son of God on earth. He had to stand up and be counted as on the side of the outcast and sinner, the poor and oppressed. His stand made him unpopular with many, and led him to the cross.

We can never be sure when we might be called on to make a stand.
