NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 14th October 2009

RECYCLING

Susannah Cole, Recycling Officer with Babergh District and Mid Suffolk District Council, was present at the meeting to discuss a proposal for a bottle bank situated on land owned by Bunting and Sons by the entrance to Nayland Meadow. The meeting heard that there were no plans on the horizon for a door to door collection of glass. During the discussions Susannah Cole advised that one option would be to have a trial site which would not involve obtaining planning permission.

Hector Bunting, representing Bunting and Sons and Transition Nayland, said the newly formed Transition group felt recycling facilities for various materials were lacking in the village. He confirmed that this proposal was for just for a bottle bank and felt the bank would be sustainable and added that it could generate income. They originally considered the possibility of siting a bank at the Anchor Inn or this site.

There had been some objections to the proposals including from the Conservation Society. They add that the Land Company, who own Nayland Meadow in perpetuity for the village, dedicate their access through this area as a permitted path which dog walkers and others use.

Several councillors felt that the visual effect on the entrance to the village would be undesirable and wished to know the exact siting and screening details of the proposed bank.

Councillors appreciate that the quality of life of neighbours to any bottle bank site would be affected and the noise generated may be heard some distance away. Concerns where raised that this site was too far from the village to enable easy access to those without cars and that those with cars may just continue to use the bottle banks available at Leavenheath, Stoke by Nayland or other sites. The question of vehicle access and road traffic issues also raised concerns.

Looking over details of previously proposed sites, going back to 1985, some councillors felt that attitudes may have changed over time and it could be worth considering whether some previously rejected sites would now be viable.

After considerable discussion it was agreed that a working party led by Ray Spencer would look at all previous sites in addition to the current proposal and report back at the next meeting.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Richard Cave reported on the review of car parking charges in Sudbury and Hadleigh and the possibility of charges of £1.50 for long stay parking.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

James Finch reported there was no further news on the Local Government Review. A separate initiative led by the County Council aims for major collaboration. He advised of two public consultations; the School Organisation Review which proposes young people remaining at their primary school until the age of eleven, before transferring to a secondary school, eliminating the need of middle schools, and National Grid's public consultation about proposals to reinforce the high voltage electricity network with a new line of power pylons from Bramford to Twinstead.

He advised that Birch Street would be closed from 2 November until 20 November but he was in discussions to see whether closure could be avoided as this would cause problems with buses, refuse collections as well as local and through traffic. Horkesley Road would be closed on 25 and 26 November for resurfacing work.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Councillors heard that Nayland Flying Club had raised concerns with Babergh about this new development which is under their flight path. It may be necessary to conduct a noise assessment.

Mr Battye reported that the land transfer for the site was progressing slowly. The pledge for £10,000 towards a footpath along Wiston Road required legalities and planning permission to

be finalised. It was added that any contribution from the County Council Quality of Life Budget would need to be finalised before the end of November. There is no guarantee these funds would be available next year.

Sustainability for villagers and employees – for rental properties there is currently no priority for key workers. When the system is reviewed this will be considered. They are considered for buying or shared ownership of properties.

STREET CLEANING

Progress on the street cleaning trial was discussed. The specification of street cleaning/litter picking will be drawn up at the November meeting.

OPEN SPACES

It was noted that the Environment Agency will be removing silt from the river.

A request has been received from the Diocese for permission to lay new water pipes to the vicarage along the side of the driveway which is Parish Council land.

It was agreed that a risk assessment of the Jubilee tree would be carried out at the same time that all village trees were assessed.

VILLAGE HALL

The provision for marking out a pedestrian lane in the Village Hall driveway will be discussed at the November meeting.

Rosemary Knox agreed to ask the Village Hall Management Committee for copies of their minutes.

CORRESPONDENCE

National Grid has advised of their briefings and exhibitions to view their proposals for a new line of power pylons from Bramford to Twinstead. *Details of the public exhibitions are available on page 31 of the Community Times.*

Suffolk Constabulary advised that a PC will be available to attend Parish Council meetings every six months.

The Fire Service would like to attend a meeting and it was agreed to invite them to a meeting following November.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Mr Battye said change of use from agricultural land to domestic garden and erection of garden shed at Perry Farmhouse had been refused. Babergh's decision outlined that the site in question is surrounded to three sides by existing agricultural land, which is rural in character. If approved, the proposal would result in an unacceptable urban intrusion into this wider agricultural land. They add the development would have an adverse impact upon the quality of the AONB characteristics of the locality, and set an undesirable precedent for similar developments. The proposed garden shed is unacceptable due to its proposed size, siting, scale, choice of materials and the adverse impact on the visual appearance of the countryside locality and the AONB.

Discussing an application at the Willows, Wiston Road for Certificate of Lawfulness, existing use of outbuilding for Class B1, councillors said they were aware that the site had been used as a landscape business.

Planning consent had been granted for the erection of a two -storey rear extension and single-storey garden room at Rose Cottage, 5 Fen Street and the Recreation Ground being used to temporary parking during work at the Fire Station.

Councillors have no objections to a single-storey front extension at Wissington Grove, Bures Road or to the training tower for the fire station.

ALLOTMENTS

Following a request by Transition Nayland for the provision of additional allotments the waiting list rose to $2\frac{1}{2}$ plots. Since promotion in the Community Times this figure has risen to 4 plots. Further discussion will take place at the next meeting.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 11th November 2009

WHITE HART INN

Plans to re-open the White Hart as a pub with three residential flats were backed by Nayland Parish Council at its November meeting. Members agreed they wanted the pub and flats to stay under one ownership and the design of one flat changed so it was not in both the old and new parts of the building. Two councillors felt the proposed pub was too small to be viable and regretted the loss of the letting rooms. Wendy Sparrow said if someone went in with a completely different style of running a pub it could be successful. She pointed out the White Hart had been an inn for 500 years and was a focal point of the High Street.

BOTTLE BANK

The council heard a letter from Michael and Suzanne Cullen of Bridge House objecting strongly to the idea of a bottle bank close to their property in Horkesley Road. Being on the edge of the village they said it would encourage users from outlying areas with cars turning in and out as well as the hazard of broken glass. Chairman Gerry Battye said concern was expressed last month about the site and a sub committee had been asked to report back.

Its report said 32 possible sites were looked at but there was always a problem. The issue had been considered many times over the years and the latest initiative resulted from an offer of private land. It was clear there would be problems with road safety, noise and overflowing glass. A private door-to-door glass collection was mentioned at a recent Transition Nayland meeting and the group was investigating to see if it could be feasible for Nayland. Tibby Mimpriss said she was concerned the carbon footprint of another bottle bank was far greater than people taking their glass to a supermarket or other local collection points. It was agreed to go along with the committee's recommendation to do nothing until the door-to-door collection had been researched.

HIGHWAYS

The council formally approved a road traffic regulation order banning parking from the Bear Street/Harpers Estate junction as far as the doctors' surgery. Mr Battye said the measure would improve safety enabling vehicles to manoevre more easily. Mrs Mimpriss said school changes meant steps should be taken to ensure there was a travel plan. Members agreed with her suggestion the county council should be made aware of an already difficult parking situation.

POLICING

PCSO Mandy Coleman reported two crimes in October - an assault by a motorist who was challenged when he removed signs closing Birch Street and a burglary at Wiston when thieves drove across a field and stole electrical equipment from two containers. She had spoken to Fen Street residents who said the problem with youngsters vandalising the village hall was not so bad but she was keeping an eye on it.

Ms Coleman asked if anyone was interested in joining a panel comprising people living in the Babergh East district and the Safer Neighbourhood Team when any issues of concern could be raised.

The question of parking at the Birch Street, Mill Street, Bear Street junction was discussed and the way drivers ignored the double yellow lines. Mrs Sparrow suggested it needed occasional policing.

STREET CLEANING

Mary George said the street cleaners had reported where they worked in September and October and the areas were looking better. It was agreed to temporarily increase the litter picking hours to enable leaves to be cleared.

Clerk Debbie Hattrell said sponsor Office Needs had agreed to pay for a post and dispenser for bags to be erected near the dog waste bin on Caley Green. It was agreed to replace a litter bin outside the school.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

The council heard from Tracey Brinkley, Babergh housing and development officer, the planning application for affordable housing in Wiston Road was being held up because an objection by Nayland Flying Club meant a noise impact assessment was necessary before the application could progress. Mrs Hattrell said she had advised development control of the urgency as the scheme had been awarded grant funding. There was no further news about the transfer of land. It was agreed to check the timescale with Babergh planning department. The council will also contact county councillor James Finch saying it might not be able to take up the grant offer towards a new pavement this financial year.

TREES

Mr Battye reported John Moore Tree Services had inspected trees all over the village with a sub-committee. Mr Moore had given a considerable amount of advice suggesting work should be arranged in some sort of order for a five-year rolling programme.

VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox reported the village hall needed a new oil tank and the council agreed to contribute towards the cost. Mr Hunt said people had asked for a pedestrian path on the side of the village hall driveway and he proposed a one-and-a-half metre wide path on the catholic church side.

NATIONAL GRID'S CONSULTATION

Members heard various meetings were being held to discuss National Grid's proposal to erect a line of pylons across Suffolk and the consultation period was until the end of February. Mr Battye said there was a huge amount of technical data and more information was needed. The council's response will be decided in January.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Mr Battye said those approved included tree work at Stourfields and Alston Court, a certificate of lawful use for a commercial business in outbuildings at The Willows and a single-storey front extension at Wissington Grove, Bures Road. There were no objections to an application for listed building consent for external redecoration at Butchers, Bear Street.

IN BRIEF:

Two councillors were delegated to sign a deed of easement for temporary parking access and laying a water pipe at the recreation ground.

The council was invited by British Telecom to adopt the Wiston telephone box but was not interested.

It was agreed to look into costings before creating three or four new allotments.

A meeting is to be held in January to discuss the council's general efficiency and the way it is run.

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

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 9th November 2009 Chairman: Alan Hodges 263982

VILLAGE FESTIVAL

The meeting started earlier than usual to discuss the festival weekend for summer 2010.

It was felt that although a Barn Dance provided a chance for all age groups to attend last time the event had not been well attended. It was also suggested that the weekend had been rather long — perhaps this time it should open with an event on Friday evening and run all day and evening on Saturday. The Duck Race had been popular and should be repeated. Jill Badman said the Conservation Society would like to organise a fun quiz.

Mandy Cook suggested an afternoon/evening of Nayland talent, involving local performers / bands, the Village Players, Choir, etc centred around the Village Hall. There could be a picnic, refreshments, and other activities, etc.

Although this event had previously been scheduled for July it was questioned whether this was the best time and perhaps early September would be better. It was pointed out that the Church was having a Constable Celebration in September 2010 and there might be some merit in tying the two together.

A CC working group would take this project forward led by Barry Wakefield, with Andrew Gowen, Mandy Cook, Hazel Gardiner, Will Hitchcock and Steve Maguire and others yet to come forward. The first meeting would be on Wednesday 6 January.

GRANTS

The Youth Club had submitted a request for continued funding for hire of the Village Hall.

Teresa Moriarty said she was now involved with the Youth Club. A new youth worker was also involved and it was hoped to offer the group more structured activities and that they would become more involved with the community.

Several members said they had felt reluctant to support this grant application but in view of news of Teresa's involvement and aspirations it was agreed to continue the same level of financial support.

The Village Hall Management Committee had requested £1,000 for their endowment fund. This was a long term fund for the future of the Village Hall and funds could only be accessed with agreement of the VHMC, Community Council and Parish Council. Members agreed to the request but requested that as the Parish Council does not contribute to the Endowment Fund they should be removed from the equation.

FUN QUIZ

It was agreed that the quiz was great fun – to compile and take part in. The format had been excellent and it was a lighthearted quiz with moments of hilarity. It was agreed to cancel the quiz usually held in March and hold another fun quiz in October.

FIREWORK NIGHT

It was agreed the fireworks and bonfire had been the best yet and it had been a superb evening. Thanks were due to everyone who pitched in to make this a well presented event.

Bryan said although the gate was marginally down and more had been spent on fireworks overall profit was much the same as last year.

It was noted that the members of the Parish Council had expressed concerns over organisation of this event. Alan Hodges suggested this may be due to poor communication and felt there was a need for more cohesion between the VHMC, CC and PC.

CHRISTMAS FAYRE

Steve Maguire reported on progress of the Fayre to be held on 5th December 12 noon to 3pm. Nayland Choir will be performing for half an hour, either side of this background music will help create a seasonal atmosphere. The Guides and Brownies will be organising children's games, there will be

'Christmas-on-a-plate' competition, Carl Shillingford will be serving soup, and there will be an Energy Clinic. Ken Willingale and Roy Evans agreed to run the main raffle. Help with setting up the hall and decorations will be required from 9am.

Not as many village societies as expected had submitted requests for tables. As the deadline has been reached availability will be opened up to outsiders (subject to suitability).

VILLAGE CHRISTMAS TREE

Claire said the tree would be erected at 9am on Sunday 13 December and taken down at 9am on Sunday 3 January.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith gave his full financial report concluding that unencumbered assets currently stood at £18,174.88p.

NAYLAND CALENDAR

Bryan Smith reported sales currently stood at almost 400 and there were less than 100 remaining for sale. It was likely we would soon sell out but it was agreed not to have another print run. Thanks were due to the village sales points and volunteers and societies for selling the calendars. A meeting to discuss next year's calendar is taking place on 10 November.

COMMUNITY TIMES

Ken Willingale kindly agreed to proof-read the February issue. Following a request for copies to be available in Stoke by Nayland it was agreed to approach the Post Office to see if they would be willing to keep a few for their customers.

Roy Evans announced at the last meeting that after over 20 years as distribution leader of the Community Times he would no longer be able to continue. Roy gave details of what the role entailed and suggestions on finding a replacement or alternative were discussed. In the meantime Roy kindly agreed to distribute the December issue.

NAYLAND AND WISTON WEBSITE

Lorraine Brooks pointed out that village groups are not using this valuable facility. It was suggested that this was mainly just due to apathy. It was also suggested that while people from outside the area could learn about the Village from the website those living here used the Community Times so perhaps the need for advertising village events on the website didn't seem as important.

It was agreed that the website needs further publicising in the Community Times.

SOCIETY REPORTS:

RBL: David George said the war memorial had been cleaned and the Remembrance Parade had gone very well. Andrew Gowen added it was a shame so many cars remained parked round the memorial on this occasion.

Conservation Society: Jill Badman said at the Joint meeting with HortSoc on 10 November Simon Cousins, Essex Beekeeper Association would be talking about Bees.

HortSoc: Lorraine Brooks added that instead of a speaker's fee Simon Cousins had requested a donation be given to Woodland Corner Playgroup.

HortSoc would as usual have a stall at the Christmas Fayre. Two new ventures for 200 include a small Spring Show on 27 March in the Church Hall and on 10 June a coach outing to RHS Wisley which would be open to all.

Nayland Fundraising Committee: Jill Badman reported the NSPCC Toy Coffee morning had raised £500 and five enormous boxes of toys and gifts.

Nayland Choir: Teresa Moriarty said the Come and Sing had been well attended and raised a substantial amount. At their next concert, 'Handel Celebration' on 5 December in St James Church, they will be accompanied by an orchestra.

Youth Club: Teresa Moriarty said she hopes the club would become more involved and have more to report in the future.

Woodland Corner: Their last cake stall raised £218. They would be having a stall at the Christmas Fayre.

Village Players: Mandy Cook said rehearsals for Oliver are going well. Deborah Hodges said their spring production would be *'Harvey'* with performances on 22, 23 and 24 April *(provisional)*. Auditions would be held on 6 and 8.December.

Bowls: Sylvia Bond said they were currently lying third in the First Division of the Winter League.

W.I.: Wendy Sparrow said there next meeting would include Country Dancing with mulled wine.

Village Hall Management Committee: Alan Hodges reported that they are concerned about the future. In addition to the usual concerns regarding maintenance they are losing 3 members on the committee – one being the Booking Secretary who plays a vital role.

First Response: Andrew Gowen said they are desperately short of volunteers. He emphasised it is a really worthwhile and rewarding job. Training is given.

Transition Nayland: Will Hitchcock said about 40 people attended the Age of Stupid film evening, which was less than for their previous event. They will be conducting a survey, with funding for printing from Suffolk County Council, to gauge the opinions and habits of the community.

Next Meeting

The next meeting will be held on Monday 11 January at 8pm (Exec at 7.30) in the Church Hall.

Ken Willingale, as President of the Community Council, expressed gratitude to Alan for his excellent Chairmanship and all the work he has done in the community. He said he had brought humour, control and decisiveness to the role. He thanked Deborah, for allowing Alan to do the job and wished them both happiness in their new home. Ken went on to thank Barry Wakefield for stepping into the breach to fill the role as acting Chairman.

Alan Hodges said his 10 years living in this tremendous village had been fantastically enjoyable.

BONFIRE & FIREWORK NIGHT

The biggest bonfire and best firework display so far ensured Nayland Community Council's annual event on November 5 was a success

The bonfire was built by Fred Bugg with family members and fireworks were let off by Mr Bugg, Iain Wright and Andrew Gowen.

Treasurer Bryan Smith said: "Although spectator numbers seemed marginally down on previous years we sold 300 hot dogs and ran out yet again!" The evening made £736 profit for council funds.

After the spectacular display the event ended on a negative note when the organisers found someone had dumped builder's rubble on the bonfire.

Mr Smith explained: "As the fire burnt down we found some builder used the opportunity to dump rubble and re-inforcing steel. Obviously this sort of material doesn't burn and we shall have to pay for its disposal.

"We trust the individual responsible is suitably ashamed of his thoughtlessness and invite him to remove it."

NAYLAND FUN QUIZ

A fun quiz with plenty of light-hearted questions held at Nayland village hall on October 2 raised about £400 for Community Council funds.

Twenty tables of four and five contestants took part and the winning table was a team from Great Horkesley.


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

Competition for Calendar 2011





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
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ENERGY CLINIC AT CHRISTMAS FAYRE

Fun Quiz organised by the Community Council on 2nd October. It was very amusing evening with novel themes within the quiz.

At the Joint Meeting with Conservation Society in November Simon Cousins, Essex Beekeepers Association, enlightened us on the subject of 'Inhabitants of the

Hive: Uncovering the Mysteries of Beekeeping'. We learnt that the first beekeepers were the Egyptians who used honey as a sweetener but now in the US commercial migratory beekeeping, where the bees are used for pollination of crops, is very big business. Simon explained that bee hives area very complex social structures with three different cast of bees; the queen, workers and drones. While we are all familiar with some products of the bees we heard that honey may help reduce the effects of hayfever and that bee venom is used in Russia for treating arthritis. These gardeners' friends certainly are fascinating creatures. Simon very kindly requested a donation to Woodland Corner Playgroup instead of a speakers fee and a cheque for £50 was presented to him.

It is with great regret that we learn that Diana Whiting is giving up the post of Booking Secretary after 24 years and some 33 years on the Committee at the March AGM. Her service to the Hall over so many years has been enormous and it will be very difficult to find a replacement. The committee and many others in the Village are very grateful to her and her contribution will be sorely missed.

We are also losing another key member of our team when Alan Hodges departs for Yorkshire in December. He is another person who will be sorely missed. We have at least two vacancies on the committee – so please come forward soonest and pass your name to our chairman.

Battery recycling

Battery recycling is probably one of the less thought about aspects of recycling – but the facts below certainly got <u>us</u> thinking. Did you know that:

- batteries contain different hazardous and toxic substances such as mercury, lead and cadium which will contaminate landfill for many years;
- in the UK, according to a recent survey, we only recycle 4
 per cent of the batteries we use. The remaining 600 million,
 all of which could be recycled, go to landfill;

and did you know that:

 you can now recycle your batteries by putting them in the Transition Nayland battery recycling box in the Post Office.

REDUCE – do you really need all those battery driven gizmos and contraptions?

REUSE – rechargeable batteries come in all shapes and sizes – the best and most common ones are made from nickel metal hydride – they have excellent performance characteristics, contain no dangerous chemicals and can be recycled at the end of their life.

RECYCLE – drop your batteries at our recycling point in the post office and we will take them to the Household Waste Recycling Centre in Hadleigh (only when making the journey for other reasons too) where Suffolk County Council have arrangements to properly recycle batteries.

REMEMBER - old iPods, laptops and mobile phones contain batteries that can be recycled too.

Energy saving light bulbs - have you got yours?

Do you get confused by just how many different bulb fittings there are? Do you struggle to find low energy replacements in the shops? Why not order all the bulbs you need from the comfort of your own home by visiting www.energybulbs.co.uk or call 0800 0438978. They are competitive, fast and reliable.

Energy monitoring – your chance to check your home energy usage for free!

We have a great opportunity for you to check your electricity consumption as you use it – the perfect way to find out those energy hungry appliances that are costing you ££££s. Suffolk County Council are giving us four energy monitors to loan to local residents within the parish of Nayland. In our household

we have reduced our electricity consumption by about a third since we started to monitor how we use our appliances – so we would strongly recommend it!! First come first served. If

For other households cavity wall insulation will be £149, installed loft insulation (if you have none already) will be £149 and top up loft insulation (if you already have at least 60mm) will be £229. The payback for cavity wall insulation and virgin loft insulation at these prices is only 1 year so definitely worth considering, especially when you bear in mind that 25 per cent of the heat loss in your home could be escaping through the roof.



Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader



Here we have been digging out a wire pen filled with leaves, etc over two years ago, which have now become a rich dark mould. Before the arrival of horticultural peat on the market gardeners used to mix it with sharp sand to produce a good potting soil. Despite its appearance, however, it doesn't contain much nutrient and is really more of a soil conditioner.

Last year the squirrels ate most of our meagre crop of conkers; this year they haven't touched them, and they are now being used for the following purposes.

Some year ago the OM/S read somewhere a tip about using a small net bag of them to hang up with his suits to deter cloths moths. Madam Muckspreader was sceptical about this, and opined that if the clothes were clean they wouldn't be attacked anyhow. Notwithstanding the OM/S stuck to his guns and moreover reasoned that if conkers repelled clothes moths why should they not be affective against some horticultural insect pests.

For several years, therefore, he has kept conkers in net bags in his greenhouse, and there has been no sign of a single White Fly.

As the weather is still very mild, it is an excellent opportunity for planting hardy subjects, especially trees, provided the latter are supported against winter winds. They will continue to make root growth, and get away to a flying start in spring.

This month's plant is Iris Unguicularis, once known as I. Stylosa. It comes from Algeria, where it flourishes in poor stony soil. If grown in rich soil it will make a lot of leafy growth but produce few flowers. If backed by a south

facing wall it should be starting to flower now, and should continue at intervals throughout the winter, defying frost and snow.

Picked in bud the flowers will last indoors for several days. You might find some on Christmas Day.

Which reminds the writer to wish his readers a Happy Christmas and a horticulturally productive New Year.



NAYLAND'S LONG LOST SILVER BAND



Christmas is approaching and once again there will be many festive events in the village for everyone to enjoy. For many people, however, a Nayland Christmas would not be complete without the annual evening visit of the Boxted Methodist Silver Band.

This excellent band has been coming to Nayland every Christmas without fail for almost fifty years. At the appointed time they take up their position in the High Street near St James' Gate, whatever the weather. As they start to play people gather round in the darkness with their torches, whole families well wrapped up, all coming to sing carols in the lights of the Christmas tree. Sometimes the snow is falling – how do the band keep playing when their fingers must be so cold!

The Boxted Band has a long and well documented history which can be traced back to around 1860 when a woodwind and brass music group was formed by members of the Boxted Methodist Church. In 1898 it became an all brass band and in 1936 became known as The Boxted Methodist Silver Band. Despite the threat of folding up through falling numbers in the 1930s and again in the 1960s the band steadfastly kept going.

The band plays regularly at the Methodist Church on the first Sunday of every month, known as "Band Sunday", and at community and charity events throughout the year. It has played at many major celebrations over the years and always has a very full programme. In the run up to Christmas it plays carols around Colchester and Boxted to raise money for band funds and for charity.

Did you know that Nayland once had its own silver band? Sadly it only existed for a few years but there are still a few people around who remember it well.

The Nayland & District British Legion Silver Band was formed under the auspices of the local branch of the British Legion in 1936 by Mr Herbert (known as Herbie) Taylor, an ex military bandsman (in the middle of the front row on the photograph). He had previously been bandmaster of the Boxted Silver Band but following a disagreement he and several other bandsmen left and started the Nayland Band. Herbie Taylor lived in Mill Street, Nayland, where he ran one

of the three bakeries which Nayland was fortunate to have at that time. These all eventually closed during the 1950s.

Ernie Hatten who ran Hattens' shop in Bear Street (now the Village Stores) for many years, became a member of the band (back row third from right). He joined when he was 16 and Herbie Taylor taught him to play the cornet. Some of Ernie's friends joined and soon they were all enthusiastically practising in the Mission Room (Church Hall) on instruments loaned by the British Legion. In no time at all the band was playing at local functions. One of the first was a United Service and Church Parade in Nayland in July 1936 when all ex-service men and women were invited to join the parade, the proceeds of the event going to the Nayland and Stoke Nursing Association.

The band became very successful and was in great demand for functions such as flower shows, fetes, British Legion rallies and carnivals. It played in the Colchester Carnival and procession and regularly entertained holiday-makers at Walton but, with the coming of the Second World War, some of the band members left Nayland to join the forces and the band folded up.

Unfortunately when peace returned the Nayland band was never reformed. It was probably not the only band to fall by the wayside at this time but the enduring Boxted Band had resolutely kept going and survived. In fact, when peace festivities were held all over the area and a big military parade was organised through Colchester town centre, the Boxted Methodist Silver Band was the only civilian band to take part.

Here in Nayland we look forward once again to the visit of the Boxted Band this Christmas with the hope that they will continue to accompany our carol singing for many years to come.

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YOUR COUNTY COUNCILLOR JOTTINGS

When you read this column I will have represented you all at the County Council for six months. As time goes by, I am continuing to learn more about its workings. May I thank those of you who have contacted me with input to pass onto them on your behalf. I do trust the outcome has been helpful to you.

May I start by apologising on behalf of the County Council, for the inconvenience caused in October and November by the road closures in Birch Street and Court Street. Much effort was made by your parish councillors and Council officers to minimise this impact on our daily lives. Birch Street closure seemed illogical to most of us but our officers do however have to keep in within the law!!

With particular reference to the damage to the house in Birch Street there is a silver lining to this cloud. After two years of lobbying, the National Highways agency are now recommending the closure of the Higham turning onto the B1068 from the A12 north to south carriageway. This is good news. We believe this will lead to less lorries coming though Nayland – the cause of the street closure in the first place because of the damage to the house by HGV vehicles on four different occasions over the last two years.

Some more good news! I hope that you will have noticed that the building work to our new Fire Station has been started in Bear Street. The contractors are making a great

effort to minimise their impact during the 12 month project. The site has now been cleared and before long you will see the building arising from the footings.

As I write, there are also two major consultations in progress in the county, namely The Schools Organisational Review and National Grid's Pylons proposals across South Suffolk from Bramford to Twinstead. Whatever your views on these two projects, may I urge you all to make your views known to me or through the requested channels. You are being consulted and your views are important!

Lastly as the festive season approached, may I wish you and all your families a very Happy Christmas.

REMEMBRANCE



Personal wartime experiences were recalled by members of a packed congregation at St James's, Nayland, Remembrance Service on Sunday. They included childhood evacuation, being bombed out in the East End of London, taking part in the D Day landings, providing a naval escort for an American destroyer to Omaha Beach in northern France and working down the mines.

Andrew Macbeth, a schoolboy at the time, remembered a doodlebug landing on the edge of Nayland and

the bravery of American pilot Lieut Charles Gumm of the USAAF who avoided crashing on houses when the controls of his Mustang failed.

In her address the Rev Kit Gray said she had asked people for their memories to help the congregation understand different aspects of war as there was a danger the next generation might not fully appreciate what it meant.

This year was significant, marking the deaths of the last remaining servicemen from World War I and the 70th anniversary of the outbreak of World War II. Currently, in Afghanistan 93 families had been bereaved this year and people did not realise how much was involved in their sacrifice.

She added: "In the last world war no-one was left uninvolved and it was understood there was one cause, shared by all for the sake of all. Today we live in a world community and we have to work for the good of the world because we depend on each other as nations."

The congregation included a large group of Brownies, Guides and Scouts who paraded their standard. The roll of honour was read by Royal British Legion chairman Bill Martin and president Geoffrey Lindop read the lesson. Legion standard-bearers were Jim Turner and Kathy Hunt.

After the service wreaths were laid at the village war memorial by Shirley Scarlett and Steve Maguire for the legion, parish council chairman Gerry Battye, Nayland fireman Kevin Tarrier, John Camp of Boxted Airfield Historical Society, Brownie Rebecca Carter and Guide Hannah Welch.

The Nayland service was preceded by one at St Mary's, Wiston, where wreaths were laid by Ken Bailey and Mr Battye. Bugler at both memorials was Bill Slark.



VILLAGE HALL CINEMA GRANT

Nayland village hall has scooped a £6,213 grant in the Big Lottery Fund's Awards for All programme and the money

will be used to buy new projection and sound equipment for its cinema.

The hall committee joined the Suffolk Digital Cinema Network in 2007 and after a slow start the cinema was re-launched in January showing films regularly but using borrowed equipment.

Committee chairman Iain Wright said: "We're delighted with the grant which will enable us to buy our own. It will be installed in time for our first James Bond film, *From Russia with Love*, on December 4.

"The committee is looking forward to bringing more films to Nayland and having a better quality cinema all round. We're especially grateful to Rosemary Knox who did all the spadework, filling in and submitting the grant application forms."

Mrs Knox added: "Having our own equipment will enable us to choose the days we want, hopefully prevent problems with badly performing equipment, remove the chore of having to collect and return the stuff each time and have a projection system that can be hired by other organisations."

The village hall committee was one of 25 groups across the east of England awarded grants totalling £199,176.

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

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


