NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 8th April 2009

HORKESLEY PARK

The controversial plan for Horkesley Park heritage and conservation centre provoked two hours of discussion at Nayland parish council's April meeting. About 60 villagers attended at the start with several giving their views during the public forum.

Councillors, who had already held a working party to study the application in detail, voted 6-3 to oppose it and then considered various aspects of the plan. Main concerns were its impact on the Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, increased traffic and the centre's retail element.

Bunting and Sons' proposed £20 million, 117-acre project would include a Suffolk Punch breeding centre, fine art gallery, garden centre, restaurants, trails, fishing lakes, adventure playground and an underground warren with wildlife displays.

Wendy Sparrow said people felt passionately about the AONB and the centre's scale and retail element made it totally inappropriate. Rosemary Knox objected to the John Constable connection because of the effect it would have on Nayland and neighbouring villages.

"I don't want to see what happens at Dedham in the summer months happening here," she said. With projected visitor numbers totalling 485,000 a year, most members felt the substantial increase in traffic would be detrimental to the Nayland area.

Ray Spencer said the project was completely alien to the AONB and did not stack up. Mrs Knox added: "The whole thing has a curious quality of fantasy about it which I find very worrying. We all love the AONB and the scale of this is too great."

Abbi Knight, who backed the plan along with Chris Hunt, commented: "Change happens and things have to move on" but with two exceptions the council agreed the plan would have an adverse impact on the Dedham Vale AONB.

Earlier, the chairman of Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society John Alexander told the meeting the society and more than 100 members had written to Colchester Council objecting to the plan along with 30 other residents. The society felt the scale of the development would increase traffic flow which could have a serious effect on Nayland.

However, supporter Fred Pawsey felt it was an excellent development for an unattractive site. He said: "The Bunting family are businessmen and if this fails they will put in another application. With the government's current wish for more housing there could be an application for houses on this site."

Estate agent Roy Chapman said one buyer had withdrawn from a house sale when the recent centre application was submitted so it was having an effect on the local property market.

Robert Dossor, who runs Gladwins Farm holiday complex, said his business could possibly benefit from the plan but on the whole he felt it would be detrimental to the area's tranquillity.

Chairman Gerry Battye said he and vice-chairman Tricia Fuller would put together a response for Colchester Council based on the evening's discussion and the working party meeting.

VILLAGE HALL

In her village hall report Mrs Knox said chairman lain Wright was resigning after this year and nobody on the committee wished to take it on so thought would have to be given to his successor.

PLANNING

Considering other planning applications, the council had no objection to work being carried out by the county council at the Nayland sewage treatment works.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Reporting on the proposed new affordable housing site in Wiston Road, Mr Battye said a display would be held at the village hall on Wednesday, April 22 from 3pm to 6.45pm giving villagers the chance to study the drawings and make comments.

The Flagship Housing Group had confirmed it was able to commit £10,000 towards improvement work for the footpath in Wiston Road.

HIGHWAYS

Clerk Debbie Hattrell said the county council was hoping to go ahead with double yellow lines in Bear Street on either side of Harpers Estate but there might be a budget constraint which was currently being looked into.

IN BRIEF:

It was reported a letter had gone to Selwyn Pryor after a heavy goods vehicle collided with a property in Birch Street.

Quotes of £595 for work in the cemetery and £655 for applying protective stain to 17 village seats were approved.

Following a report that dogs were fouling the village hall car park and Fairfield recreation ground, it was agreed to launch a poster campaign to ensure dogs stayed off the grass at both locations.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 13th May 2009

Chairman Gerry Battye and vice-chairman Tricia Fuller were re-elected at Nayland Parish Council's annual meeting on May 13.

Plans for double yellow lines at the junction of Harpers Estate and Bear Street have been delayed because of a lack of funding. Councillors heard police did not object to the waiting restrictions but funding for this type of project had been exhausted.

A letter from Andy Johnson of Suffolk highways department said the process had also changed and funds would be allocated by a Babergh locality panel due to meet in September or from the county council's locality budget. If funding became available the council would advertise a traffic regulation order and if there were no objections the process from receipt of funding to completion would be 14 to 20 weeks.

Following a letter from a resident concerned about the danger caused by cars parking on the bend of the Anchor Bridge, it was agreed to ask Mr Johnson for his views on displaying a sign on the Horkesley Road side warning drivers of possible oncoming traffic in the middle of the road.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Reporting on progress of the Wiston Road affordable housing plan, Mrs Fuller said she and Chris Hunt had held a productive meeting with John Goodyear of Suffolk County Council to discuss the proposed new footpath. The path would run for 170 metres from the new development to the start of Nags Corner and the parish council contribution should be about £20,000. Mrs Fuller said Mr Goodyear had suggested approaching Babergh for a grant and going back to the Flagship Housing Group to see if it would increase the £10,000 already promised. District councillor Richard Cave recommended contacting Babergh pointing out the council had recently helped fund the re-surfacing of a car park at Stoke by Nayland.

Following the recent public display of the proposed Wiston Road houses which attracted a reasonable response Mrs Fuller said she had been told the next step would be a planning application. Nobody had raised any serious objections although concern was expressed by one resident who did not like the scheme or the colour of the boarding.

Chris Hunt stressed that people interested in the houses had to bid for them by registering online as there was no longer a housing waiting list. People previously on the list had been informed but it was agreed to write to housing manager lan Tippett voicing concern that others would not be aware of the change. Mr Tippett will also be asked to provide the council with information on the new choice based letting system so an article can be inserted in the Community Times.

VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox said the recent French film showing at the village hall cinema was attended by about 30 people and made £90 profit. The committee was applying for a grant to buy its own projector and sound system.

RECREATION GRANT

Members agreed to look at the state of litter bins and playground equipment before deciding on how to spend the £1,906 recreation grant from Babergh.

FOOTPATHS

Clerk Debbie Hattrell reported a couple of amendments had been made to the Wiston Mill footpath diversion and Mrs Knox agreed to look at the paperwork before going back to Babergh. A drainage problem on the footpath behind the scout hut is being reported.

PLANNING

Mr Cave said Babergh's development control manager Christine Thurlow had analysed planning applications over the last six months and apologised because in two cases the parish council had not been advised why the planning committee had gone against its recommendations.

Ray Spencer claimed building work was going on in the village which did not appear to have planning permission. Mr Cave said more work could be done without permission now and Mr Hunt suggested asking the chief planning officer for a guide to the changes plus information on the easement of planning regulations.

Mr Battye said permission had been granted to Rushbanks Caravan Site at Wiston for a timber landing strip and a toilet block with certain conditions.

An application for change of use by the doctors' surgery linking to 28 Harpers Estate and extending the car park had been withdrawn.

STREET LIGHTING

Mrs Hattrell reported street lights in Court Street, High Street and Newlands Lane were still not working. She said SALC had met EDF and Suffolk County Council and was producing a fact sheet on street light repairs. All reasonable alternatives would be explored before high-cost options were used. She said permission from the householders in Court Street and High Street was needed before the light repairs could progress. Mr Spencer suggested asking EDF if there was any possibility of undergrounding cables in the village as had been done in part of Bear Street. Members were asked to look through previous council minutes to gain a bigger picture on lighting.

IN BRIEF:

Mr Hunt, in his council advice to walkers, said dogs should be kept on a short lead on the fen between March 1 and July 31. They should also be controlled so wildlife and farm animals were not disturbed.

A notice is to be put up beside the river on Caley Green pointing out the fishing season does not open until June 16.

The council is to re-iterate its preferred local government review option for a one-Suffolk authority to the Boundary Committee as stated in September 2008.

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
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
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NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Assembly: 27th April 2009

SAFER NEIGHBOURHOOD TEAM

Overall crime in Nayland decreased over the last year, the annual parish assembly heard recently. PC Mathew Paisley, from the Safer Neighbourhood Team said 26 crimes were committed including thefts, burglaries, criminal damage and assault, compared with 28 the previous year, and of these eight were detected. He confirmed police were no longer driven by detection rates alone but listened to the public and made judgements based on wider factors.

PC Paisley added police were reacting to public concern over traffic, speeding and parking offences and would be taking a more active role. He said it was an offence to park on double yellow lines but bridges and bends were a grey area.

Asked whether double yellow lines could be installed on the Anchor Bridge, parish council chairman Gerry Battye said the issue had been looked into and sensible parking should not cause an obstruction. Two villagers complained they had narrowly avoided accidents there due to parked vehicles but Hector Bunting, partner in Bunting and Sons, the Anchor's owners, said the issue was traffic speed and if double yellow lines were introduced the pub could be made unsustainable.

Over the past six months PC Paisley said getting round to villages had been difficult but with the anticipated return of PCSO Amanda Coleman to full duties a more visible police presence in the area should be possible. Mr Battye suggested police should visit local businesses to gain intelligence and to raise their profile in the area.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

In his final report after 31 years as county councillor Selwyn Pryor said the main issue was to ease traffic and he believed the county council was assisting. He still did not know whether Stoke by Nayland Middle School would close which would lead to a problem with primary schools too small to expand to the age of 11. Residents felt road surfacing in the village was a problem and were advised the matter was in hand and repair work would start when the weather was suitable.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Babergh councillor Richard Cave gave an update on the local government review saying a decision was expected by the end of the year. He confirmed the district council was in favour of two unitary councils. In the meantime it had been business as usual with Babergh setting the council tax rate at 2.9 per cent. The council was leading the way regarding the percentage of affordable housing built, was working towards an additional leisure facility in Hadleigh and continued to fulfil its environmental responsibilities with recycling up to 40 per cent. Mr Cave told a questioner he would investigate why the council no longer provided an automatic explanation when it did not follow parish council planning recommendations.

PARISH COUNCIL

In his annual report Mr Battye said the council had had an increasingly frustrating time dealing with street lighting with new safety regulations leading to delays and costly repairs. The council remained committed to the village hall's future and was placing public money in a capital investment fund to ensure its long-term future. He thanked the committee for its work, particularly retiring chairman lain Wright for all he had achieved. New volunteers and fresh people were always needed on the committee and without them, he warned, the hall would have to close.

Parking and speeding continued to occupy the parish council. He said Nayland was fortunate in having a successful GP practice, an outstanding primary school, Woodland Corner and plans to redevelop the fire station, all of which added to traffic problems. The council had pursued safety measures and double yellow lines were to be provided at the Bear Street/Harpers Estate junction.


Mr Battye said the council remained disgusted at the resurfacing of Court Street, Gravel Hill and Horkesley Road which was incompetent work, incompetently monitored and awaited a further visit. After many hours looking at sites for affordable housing the council, with Babergh and Flagship Housing Group had chosen one in Wiston Road which would be a rental scheme managed by Flagship. He confirmed Flagship had offered £10,000 towards a footpath for Wiston Road from the telephone exchange to the A134.

Considering planning issues, he said the council took the view that an application should be approved unless it went against local, regional or national legislation and out of 34 applications last year the council had objected to 12. In the latest, the Horkesley Park heritage and conservation centre, which involved many hours of discussion he said the proposal and its evidence had failed to convince members legisation was being met.

Village achievements during the year included the village hall digital cinema, the youth club still working for the young, the creation of Woodland Corner, local businesses, the successful Community Times which had taken on the competition, Olive Noakes on receiving a Babergh community achievement award and the First Response team.

Reports on the community council and village hall finances were given by Bryan Smith and Iain Wright. Rosemary Knox outlined the financial position of the Love, Caley and Walsh Trust, saying £610 was distributed in bonuses to people over 80 and 56 gifts to those in residential care.

Among electors' questions the problem of roadside litter was raised and it was confirmed contractors were instructed to carry out litter picks at Wiston three times a year. Ray Spencer reported the regular street cleaner had not attended so often in Nayland and an overall specification was being drawn up with the object of enhancing the current arrangements with a commercial provider.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 11th May 2009 Chairman: Alan Hodges 263982

Concern was expressed over poor attendance at Community Council meetings by village societies at recent meetings, except when grants were being requested, and Mr Hodges said he would mention this in the Community Times. A new secretary was still needed as well as a new chairman because he would be moving away. The duties were not onerous as he had a fantastic committee.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith reported unencumbered assets currently stood at £13.947.

COMMUNITY TIMES

Lorraine Brooks said a few free small ads had come in but more would be welcome. She reported the loss of two annual advertisers. Andrew Gowen offered to co-ordinate the August issue.

VILLAGE CALENDAR

As the first mock-ups of the calender were passed round, Mr Hodges said it was a tremendous piece of work and congratulated Lorraine Brooks and Hazel Gardiner who put it together. Lorraine said there were 89 entries for the photographic competition from 37 entrants and 13 images were chosen.

Historic photographs would now be matched and copy added by Wendy Sparrow. She urged societies to send in details of next year's events so dates could be inserted each month. The calendar will be priced at around £5 and the initial print-run will probably be 200. Mr Hodges thanked everyone involved and a letter of thanks will be sent to the sponsors.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL DATES FOR THE CALENDAR

Hazel Gardiner agreed to establish meeting dates for 2010 for inclusion. Other dates include: 5th March Village Quiz, 9th/10th/11th July Village Festival, 5th November Bonfire Night, 4th December Christmas Bazaar.

AUTUMN QUIZ

It was agreed that the autumn quiz on Friday 2nd October should be a themed fun event and that questions should be easier than those in recent quizzes. It was suggested that as the winners have compiled recent quizzes the standard of questions has become too high and the event has lost some if its 'fun'. Andrew Gowen and Bryan Smith kindly agreed to compile a general knowledge quiz. Further details and preparations would be discussed at the next meeting.

BONFIRE NIGHT

Andrew confirmed he would soon be ordering the fireworks. It was agreed more helpers were required, particularly for cooking the sausages.

CHRISTMAS BAZAAR

Steve Maguire, who is leading on this, sent a report that progress had been made with planning the revamped event for 5th December. He would have more news by the next meeting once he had liaised with village societies.

Lorraine added that the School Christmas Fayre is scheduled 11th December.

VILLAGE FESTIVAL

It was agreed that a Village Festival should be held in 2010 and it was hoped societies would participate in the event. A repeat of the successful Duck Race and a Barn Dance were suggested. The date was set for the weekend of 9th, 10th and 11th July.

SOCIETY REPORTS

Royal British Legion: David George said they continued hospital runs; to Colchester, Ipwish, Bury St Edmunds, Chelmsford and Harley Street.

Andrew Gowen said Stoke by Nayland branch was closing. Their members were welcome to attend the Nayland Branch but if an amalgamation took place it would mean taking on their jobs.

Playgroup: Tricia Hall said the playgroup was still trying to sort out the outside play area and money was available from the county. The area needed skimming and relaying and she hoped work would start as soon as possible.

The new chairman of Woodland Corner was Amanda Simpson. Their next fundraiser, on 5th June was a wine tasting and barbecue.

Conservation Society: Jill Badman said over 20 people had taken part in the May Day footpath walk. Open Gardens will be on 14th June and Darren Tansley will be talking about 'Wildlife on the River Stour' on 23rd June.

Horticultural Society: Sylvia Bond said that they had gained a new secretary, Lorraine Brooks, but were now looking for a volunteer to be Treasurer. The task is not onerous as record keeping was only required for three events per year and receipt of membership subscriptions.

The Morning Market would be on 16th May, the members Garden Party on 17th July would be at 43 Bear Street and the Flower Show in 1st August.

Bowls Club: Sylvia Bond reported the bowls club was fifth in its division in the winter league and won its first match in the summer league 10-0. Their Charity Bowls Tournament on 7th June will be in aid of SEESAW.

First Response: Andrew Gowen reported two more recruits to train as First Responders. He added there were now only five or six call-outs a month but the present team could not achieve 24-hour cover and more volunteers were needed.

Nayland Fundraising Committee: Jill Badman said the Coffee Morning had been very successful raising £600 for the Parkinson's Disease Society.

Village Players: Alan Hodges reported on the success of 'Party Piece'. Their new chairman was John McCarroll. Their next production would be 'Oliver' with auditions on 8th and 19th July.

Village Hall: The gardening morning had been very successful. The lottery fundraising scheme had raised £200. The next fundraising event was 'Class Acts' on 18th July.

Choir: Their next concert would be Mikado on 27th June.

Women's Institute: They have a few spare seats for their trip to Leeds Castle in Kent on 3rd July, anyone interested in going should contact Jeanette Finch.

Transition Nayland: Their film night and talk with Professor Jules Pretty would be on Friday 15th May.

MEETING DATES

The next Community Council meeting will be held on 15 July. Other meeting dates are: 14 September, 9 November, 11 January 2010 and the AGM on 8 March. They will be held in the Church Hall at 8pm, with the Executive Committee meeting at 7.30pm.





ENJOY WALKING?

Some advice from the Parish Council

Nayland, Wissington and the surrounding district has some good easy walking countryside. During the summer many people will be out and about and it is perhaps the time just to refresh our memories with a few rules on responsible behaviour when walking.

Follow the countryside code:

- Keep safe follow any signs stay out of ponds and rivers
- · Leave gates and property as you find them
- · Protect plants and animals, take your litter home
- Consider other people who work and use the countryside

... and of course, dogs!

- Control your dog so that it does not scare or disturb farm animals and wildlife. Farmers can destroy a dog that injures or worries livestock.
- As a general rule, keep dogs on a lead if you cannot rely on their obedience, and always when near livestock.
- Between 1 March and 31 July you must keep your dog on a short lead if you are on the Fen at Nayland it's the Law!
- Always clean up after your dog and get rid of the mess responsibly.

Its repertoire is largely secular, but it also performs sacred pieces and sings in religious services. A typical concert contains music from Byrd to Britten and Tompkins to Thompson.

The choir performs regular concerts throughout the year, and most notably on the morning of 1st May when the university's students swim in the North Sea to celebrate the coming summer. Its focus for the year is, however, its annual summer tour of the United Kingdom which has taken the choir as far south as Truro, Kent in the past, and also to some excellent venues such as Paisley Abbey, Oundle School Chapel and Southwell Minster.

Throughout its history, the group has been entirely student-run and its membership is usually made up completely by students, many of whom do not live in the south east of England. Consequently, the group is particularly excited about re-visiting Nayland after an enthralling concert last year.





Transition film night – a great success!

I am pleased to report that Transition Nayland's first event was a great success. Thank you to all who attended – about sixty in total.

The evening started with a somewhat in your face!, but thought-provoking film — The Story of Stuff — about our throw-away consumer society and the impact it is having on people and the planet. We then showed Farm for the Future — part of the BBC natural world series — which looks at how our food production processes, from farm to plate, are utterly reliant on oil. Somewhat worrying when you consider that we are likely to have reached the peak of oil already! This film raised some really interesting points about alternative food production methods that require a bit of imagination but actually make a lot of sense — as demonstrated by the forest farmer (why farm on one level when you can use floor to sky with produce at all steps in between!) — and the gardener who showed that gardening done properly could actually be more productive per acre than our current methods of farming. Food for thought!!

Certainly the feedback we received showed that growing your own food is one of the aspects of transition that is of particular interest to people in Nayland. This is one area that we will develop with the transition team in the future. Obviously local food supply is a key part of developing a sustainable lifestyle and one that we can all think about more.

Professor Jules Pretty rounded up the evening with a really positive discussion on what we had seen – putting it in a global context. One key point that I'm sure stuck with most of us was that if the whole world consumed at the same rate as the US and increasingly Europe we would need around six planets to support us all. He acknowledged that it is easy to feel a bit overwhelmed in the face of such statistics and then be tempted not do anything – but he suggested that communities who acknowledged there was a problem whilst being realistic about what they could achieve are actually an important part of the solution. Enough of these communities really can make a difference!

A good point to end on is one raised by Patrick Whitefield, Britain's leading expert in permaculture, in Farm for the Future. He was asked if it was realistic that we could feed the world using permaculture (a food growing system based on natural ecology) but he turned it around and said that the first question to ask was could we carry on the way we are now? And his conclusion? No! so "...we haven't really got any choice other that to find something different."

THE VILLAGE LUNCH

At our Village Lunch Wednesday 29th. April a speaker from East Anglian Air Ambulance gave a very interesting talk on their work.

They are a life saving charity which receives no government funding and thus entirely dependant on fundraising and donations to operate two helicopters to provide a daily emergency medical service in support of the NHS Ambulance Service across the region of Norfolk, Suffolk, Cambridgeshire and Bedfordshire. In answer to a 999 call for an ambulance the control centre assesses the casualty requirement and if directed an Air Ambulance may be deployed for primary attention; and where necessary patient airborne transport to the nearest A&E in no more than 13 minutes.

The service requires some £3 million a year to keep 2 ambulances available and flying with medical staff and advanced equipment.

At our lunch we gave a speaker fee of £40 with voluntary collection of £76 plus the result of the sale of charity merchandise of £ 81 making a total of £197 contribution. For this we have received a grateful letter of thanks with the request that we continue collecting used stamps, empty computer ink cartridges and old mobile phones which, with kind permission, may be left in the marked box in the village Post Office.

As usual the profit from the lunch of £228 was handed to the Village Hall Fund. Our thanks to all for continuing help and support at these lunches.

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

After two years of bad weather, the last one appalling, the OM/S, who has been involved with the Church Fete plant stall for nigh on forty years, is hoping for a return to our accustomed clement weather.

Recently he was asked by a friend what she should do with her Witch Hazel by way of pruning. Since the answers to his questions – 1) Is it in poor health? 2) Is it too large? and 3) Is it interfering with any other plant? were all negative his advice was to leave it alone. Witch Hazels are rather slow growing and don't flower readily on new wood. Pruning is not obligatory in most cases, and in general the advice "If in doubt, don't mess about" is valid. The OM/S has seen many examples of bad pruning, some performed by "experts" who should know better, one such was at the RHS garden at Hyde Hall! The main faults are:-

- 1) Shrubs pruned just before flowering, leading to the loss of most of the blossom.
- 2) Trees and shrubs cut back leaving lengths of bare stem. One should always cut back to a fork or obvious growth point, so that the plant shows no obvious signs of having been treated.

Older readers will doubtless recall seeing shrubs cut into the form of cubes in local authority parks and gardens; they rarely flowered. Fortunately in these more horticulturally enlightened days such sights are rare.

A recent visitor to the OM/S' garden asked "What on earth is that?" That was a Fuchsia Magellanica which was growing up inside a Tree Heather, itself often the subject of inquiry. The heather is now in full flower, releasing clouds of pollen when shaken; when it has finished the Fuchsia appears out of the foliage, sometimes up to 8 feet or so from ground level. This is an excellent example of serendipity; the Fuchsia established itself there, by a runner from a neighbour now dead. Had the OM/S tried to produce this effect on purpose, it probably wouldn't have succeeded. While talking about companion plants most Clematises are best grown thus rather than up walls; we have a C. Montana smothering a huge Bay, which is most effective.

The Daily Telegraph is producing two free booklets, an abridged version of what looks an excellent book "Gardening for Small Spaces" by John Cushnie, a landscape designer who is also a plantsman.

These two skills are by no means necessarily coincidental, and in recent years the authorities at the RHS Annual Show (Chelsea) in their wisdom (or lack of it) have encouraged designers to produce silly displays of glass electric light bulbs and so forth rather than plants; common sense, a rare characteristic in many aspects of life these days, seems to be returning and it seems that one of the main exponents of the Punk School of garden design has failed to find a sponsor for his latest effort.

In the subject of small spaces, an excellent candidate for the plant of the month is a Lilac. Most of the species are too large, and only flower on top shoots. Syringa Microphylla, however, with its small leaves, only grows to a height of 6 feet or so. We have one here which is covered with bloom from top to bottom and producing strong scent.

NAYLAND MILL: CHANGE OF USE

I have recently been given two sale catalogues for the old mill on the corner of Mill Street and Fen Street leading me to think about the long and chequered history of this building, especially since it ceased functioning as a corn mill at the end of the nineteenth century.

The late Bill Norfolk born in 1911 remembered the old mill standing empty for several years when he was a child. At this time it was still five storeys high but in the early 1920s he watched as the top three storeys and the gantry which crossed over the street to the millstream were taken down. It must have been a major change for the village when this huge building no longer dominated the street scene and the mill entered a new era in its history.

For some years after the end of the corn milling the mill had been owned by Carl Cette Bendixen, previously a leather manufacturer in London. He bought the mill in 1897 and lived at Mill House with his family. He died in 1915 and the following year the mill and its corn milling plant and machinery were put up for auction by the family. It seems the mill had not proved to be suitable for the leather trade and the business mainly took place in the factory in Fen Street . The auction sale was held on the premises and the entire contents of all five floors, the Engine House and Warehouse, listed in the catalogue, were sold for £383.

One of the sale catalogues recently acquired concerns a further auction which took place in 1919 in London. This sale was again by direction of the Bendixen family. As well as the mill Mr Bendixen owned several other properties in Nayland. The lots were:

- Lot 1, described as the "Valuable Freehold Water Mill known as Nayland Mill together with the Mill Lade situate in the centre of Nayland ... is well built with Five Floors and overhead stage across road to the River with Excellent Water Power" Also on the opposite side of the road "The Swan's Nest The purchase of this Lot will be entitled to a Right of way to the Lock-keeper's Cottage".
- Lot 2 "The Desirable Freehold Residence with Outbuildings and Large Garden and Grounds known as "Cedar House" [now Mill House] situate in Mill Street Nayland.... This lot is let till June 1921 to Dr Jane Walker."
- LOT 3 "The Valuable Modern Freehold Property used till recently as a Factory in Fen Street [site of the flats] together with a Foreman's Cottage detached brick offices and store sheds."
- Lot 4 "The Well-built Brick and Slated Freehold Property known as "The Warehouse" situate in Fen Street [The Steam Mill House]. This Property is let till June 1921 to Dr Jane Walker."
- Lot 5 "The Freehold Lock Cottage together with Garden and Outbuildings. Also The Valuable Meadow containing about Two Acres. With this Lot will be sold a Right of way to Court Street over the Meadow."

It was a few years after this sale that the mill was partly dismantled and in 1924 became the Electric Light and Power House set up by Mr William Hindes, an enterprising retired grocer. He had also provided gas for the village when he previously owned the Nayland gas works in Newlands Lane. At this time the mill also became a social centre for the village. Some residents still remember when whist drives and other social events were held there and they danced on a specially installed maple floor. Many happy times were spent in the mill.

When the Power House closed in 1938 and the East Anglian Electricity Supply Company took over the village supply, Mr Ivan Kerridge bought the mill for £180. A few years later Mr Kerridge sold it for £440 to Ernie Douglas, landlord of the Queen's Head who used it for storage.

During the second world war there was a Canteen in the mill, sponsored by the YMCA for locally based troops, which was manned by several lady volunteers in the village. I have an account book and old menu which shows that you could buy a portion of Rabbit or Sausage Pie for 4d.or perhaps a cup of tea or coffee for 1d. a cup. A rather cryptic note to the helpers says "Don't take the pencil off the book or lend to the troops"!

A handwritten note on a 1950 sale catalogue for "Warehouse Premises" notes that the mill was sold for £680. The premises are stated to be "eminently suitable for storage or light factory purposes" and the next use was by a Wivenhoe textile company, Gainsborough Products, who used it as a clothing factory providing local employment from the 1950s.

In 1978 the mill became home to an electrical business on the lower floor and a popular self-service grocery shop upstairs. Later a well-used café was incorporated into the shop but when the then owners retired major building works were carried out and the premises for a while became an antiques centre and flats but for the past few years it has been flats and offices.

As will be seen the mill has had many uses for the past hundred years or so and I can think of no other building which has served Nayland so well, providing employment, entertainment and essential services for the whole community. Its former long history of milling corn will also be worth remembering in a future issue.

Transition Nayland Launch by Pat Bray

With oil supplies due to run out by the end of the century, villagers attending the first meeting of Transition Nayland were warned lifestyles worldwide would have to change.

The transition group was formed by four men who want to make Nayland more self-reliant, focusing on reducing its carbon footprint, and was launched with a film night at the village hall on May 15.

Two films, *The Story of Stuff* and *A Farm for the Future*, were followed by a talk by group member Professor Jules Pretty from Essex University's department of Biological Sciences.

Professor Pretty said Transition Nayland was one of many similar groups formed across the country recently keen to change the way they lived. Although some people were sceptical others were concerned about the future of the planet.

Climate change was already a global problem and dwindling oil supplies would cause real trouble within two generations.

He gave an example of the Amish people in the United States who did not drive cars, only used solar-powered electricity and whose agriculture relied on local resources. "They live in a much more sustainable way than us on average," he added.

Small changes that could happen in Nayland described on the website should be what people wanted to do, said Professor Pretty.

Wind turbines, encouraging more allotments and thinking about energy conservation were big examples of transition which was about divergence with different communities doing different things.

"We can make changes to our lifestyles and talking about it will have a wider effect," he said. "I'd like to say to the government - what is it going to take to convert or change all 20 million vehicles in Britain and how quickly can you do it?"

The films were introduced by two of the group's founders, Will Hitchcock and Steve Maguire, who as fathers of young children, spoke of their concerns for the next generation.

Mr Hitchcock who initiated the Transition idea backed by Nayland Community Council said: "The evening was a great success with more than 50 people coming along to find out more about transition. The films prompted an active and interesting discussion led by Professor Pretty and he left us all with a lot to think about.

"We were delighted 11 people signed up to become involved in the team and virtually everybody else who came asked to be kept informed with how things progress. We'll keep them up to date with ideas for bringing sustainable living to Nayland."

A NIGHT TO REMEMBER

Being a rough guide to the loss of Popps Bridge, 15 March 1969, by Chris Hunt

The anniversary of the collapse of Popps Bridge, (or is it Pop's or Popp's?) 'Community Times' - February, certainly is an event I shall remember. In 1969 I was a member of the Nayland Fire Station. It was about 3am on that Saturday when we were called to the incident. On arrival at Horkesley Road we trained our searchlight across the water to locate the car which had come to rest about 75 yards downstream (towards the 'Anchor'), and the driver was sitting on the roof. Attempts to get our ladder across to him failed and it was even considered for someone to swim over to the car with a rope - not, in the circumstances, a very good idea but we did not know if the driver had been injured.




A fire service Rescue Tender had arrived from Ipswich and they carried a selection of equipment for water rescues. A highway worker had managed to throw a line over to the driver, (Mr Howell from Polstaed). A substantial rescue line and a lifejacket was then attached to this and he pulled them across. With a lot of shouting and a few crossed fingers we then got him to jump into the water and pulled him to the bank cold wet but uninjured.


Some dramatic press headlines followed:- 'Nayland cut off when road collapsed into river', 'Flood sweeps bridge away', 'Villagers angry at collapse of bridge', and of course, 'Bailey Bridge was up in two days'.

Forty Sappers from 20 Field Squadron, Royal Engineers started work on the Monday erecting a steel and timber bailey bridge. By Wednesday afternoon they tested the new bridge by driving their lorries over it. A newspaper report stated that: "thanks for their quick work the village was cut off from

Colchester District for only four days". I have no further comment!! This bridge was to last until the by-pass was completed and open about six months later.

The events of the weekend of 15/16 March 1969 certainly put the village to the front of local news. It is interesting reading some of the comments made by villagers and officials at the time - some things never change, criticism of the local authority being one, and of course the expert view of locals - I've never known a night like it!

CHURCH AGM by Pat Bray

The importance of St James's Church, Nayland, as a centre for the whole community was stressed at the annual parochial church meeting. Members heard it was popular with visitors to the village who often commented on how well the building was cared for.

Priest-in-charge, the Rev Kit Gray, said the village was fortunate to have such a beautiful church and the PCC was especially grateful to the Friends of the St James for all the work they did to keep it going.

In 2008 Miss Gray said there were many times she was heartened by church attendances at special services and festivals. Although far too many members of the congregation had died in the past year the church continued in good heart. She said she was still very dependent on the Rev Brian Watling as assistant priest and welcomed his support in various ways. Other members of the ministry team continued to work hard.

Churches were being encouraged to cater for people outside the church and in Nayland ministry was provided for residents in Parkers Way and Nayland House and by visiting people unable to get to church themselves.

Thanking everyone who worked on the church's behalf, Miss Gray said she was grateful to the various teams - cleaners,

flower arrangers and others - for their help in different ways, backing her up and rising to every challenge.

John Baker, in the annual PCC report, thanked Miss Gray for her continued pastoral worship and especially for her work with children at the after-school club and children's workshops.

Treasurer James Carver said the church made a £10,000 loss last year due to heavy expenditure on restoration but he hoped the shortfall would be covered by various rebates and regular monthly donations from villagers who were not necessarily regular churchgoers but wanted to support the church. The diocesan parish share had been slightly reduced and he did not think it would go up again. Thanks to the Friends putting money into the organ fund over several years it now totalled £33,924. Mr Carver added the church hall was in good condition and was well used.

Organist and choirmaster James Finch said work had at last started on repairing the historic organ, a valuable instrument originally built in 1784. Current church members were lucky to be its custodians with a duty to pass it on to future generations. The end of July was the target for completion.

Reports were given on the church fabric and diocesan synod by Alex Murrison and various groups including the Friends and bellringers.

Kathy Hunt and James Carver were re-elected churchwardens.



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
