#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 10th February 2010

#### **CHAMBERS BUS SERVICE**

The council is to write to Chambers Bus Company in Bures thanking drivers and staff for the skill, care and good humour shown during the recent bad weather in December and January. Chris Hunt, who made the suggestion, said people were quick to criticise but he felt it was important to show residents' appreciation that the 84 bus route had continued as normal despite the snow and icy conditions.

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

County councillor James Finch reported the recommended council tax increase to be considered at a full council meeting on February 18 was for a 2.4 per cent increase, the lowest in the last five years.

Referring to the council's pylon response, he said it wanted National Grid to heed local views on its proposals for a line of high voltage pylons from Bramford to Twinstead, near Sudbury. It was pushing hard for the National Grid to take a more strategic long-term view and to investigate alternative solutions. The council felt all four proposed corridors would cause severe environmental damage in south Suffolk. It felt option 2 along the existing corridor would cause least damage but wanted cables in the AONB and Stour Valley undergrounded.

On schools re-organisation he said he had spoken at Cabinet on behalf of the Stoke by Nayland group campaigning to save the middle school as a high school.

#### **DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

District councillor Richard Cave said the Secretary of State had decided not to make a statutory decision on any unitary proposal for Suffolk in the local government review. Councils were being asked to come to a consensus over unitary status and all the discussion and consultation appeared to have been a waste of time. He said Babergh was totally preoccupied with its budget at present and had to find £1.6 million in the way of savings.

#### PARISH COUNCIL VACANCY

Clerk Debbie Hattrell said only one person had requested a by-election to fill the current vacancy for a parish councillor so the council was free to co-opt and the vacancy would be advertised on noticeboards and the village website. Anyone who wishes to be co-opted should apply to her before the next council meeting on March 10.

#### **PARKING**

A letter was received from Suffolk County Council's legal services department saying it proposed to make an order restricting parking and improving safety at the Bear Street, Harpers Estate junction by installing yellow lines on both sides. Any objections to the order should be made to Heather Miller of legal services no later than March 9.

Following a letter from a resident about the dangers of cars parking on the Anchor Bridge and reducing the road width, Mrs Hattrell said Karen Smith of the county highways department had declined to move a sign from the village centre as it was inappropriate for the location. Mr Finch suggested raising the issue with Ms Smith when she visits the area in March.

#### TREE WORK

Mr Hunt said he had met two contractors to discuss the tree work needed in the village. One had pointed out a hole in one side of the jubilee tree in Bear Street and recommended an electronic test to see the extent of the damage. It was agreed to consider the estimates received and have the test done as soon as possible.

#### WHITE HART INN

Reporting the council's response to Babergh development control over the revised White Hart application, vice-chairman Patricia Fuller said in principle it had no objections but wanted certain conditions set up, with the whole building under single ownership. It felt car parking remained inadequate for three residents and the needs of a public house. The car park had been reduced to only five spaces and the pub relying on pedestrian custom was unviable and unrealistic. Adequate parking for

three residences and the pub was essential. Mrs Fuller said the council had pointed out the proposed size of the licensed premises was dissimilar to when the building was sold. Formerly the whole of the ground floor was used for the public house. In its previous response in November the council stipulated it wanted the design amended to prevent any adapted residential use encroaching on the original part of both bars and the dining area, ensuring the integrity of the listed property.

#### DREDGING OF THE RIVER

Wendy Sparrow reported the Environment Agency would be dredging the river just above the weir and along the mill lade starting on March 1 and the work would take two or three weeks. The footpath would not be obstructed and there should not be too much disruption.

#### AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECT

A letter was received from the Flagship Housing Group saying a noise impact assessment report for the Wiston Road development had been submitted to Babergh. The land had now been registered and work could progress on purchasing the land.

#### VILLAGE HALL

Reporting on the village hall, Rosemary Knox said fees would have to go up owing to increased rates. Bookings were good but the committee was still urgently looking for a bookings clerk. Many people had been approached but no-one wanted to take on the job and it might be necessary to pay someone to do it.

#### **BURIAL GROUND**

Mr Hunt said the burial ground sub committee had met and burial fees would have to be reviewed in March. Unsafe memorials in the old burial ground had been identified and three or four families in the area had been contacted. He would report back in April.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

Councillors heard the four new allotment plots had been ploughed and were due to be harrowed. Councillors are to inspect the timber fence which will have to be moved. Mrs Hattrell reported a half-allotment was being given up so there would be a spare one.

#### IN BRIEF:

Police reported two crimes in December - the theft of a car in Radleys Lane, Wiston, on December 9/10 and an assault in Court Street on Christmas Day.

Tibby Mimpriss reported dangerous pot holes outside Wiston Grove Farm and in Wiston Road on the Bures side of Fox Cottages. She added a Wiston litter-pick was not done in January and a reminder will be sent.

The council had no objection to the Wiston Road affordable housing scheme noise impact assessment or to an application for a detached summer house at 58 Bear Street.

Following a request for grit containers on Nayland Heights, it was pointed out the council would consider providing more bins when reviewing its budget later in the year.

#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 10th March 2010

#### **POLICE REPORT**

PC Chris Garrod reported two incidents; a make-off without payment, and an attempted burglary. He warned of increased incidents relating to thefts of metal and asked that any sightings of suspicious vehicles should be reported to the Police.

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

James Finch explained that contrary to recent press reports 100 new staff in adult and childcare and other front-line services will bring no extra cost to the Suffolk taxpayer. The County Council have recommended a 2.4% tax increase on Band D properties for 2010/11.

He wished to raise awareness of the Suffolk Young Carers Project which can help young people with care-giving responsibilities.

#### **DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

Richard Cave explained that despite making savings in cuts in staff, benefits and other areas, saving £1.6 million, it would be necessary to raise their proportion of the Council Tax by 3%.

#### PARISH COUNCIL VACANCY

The vacancy for a Parish Councillor would be advertised in the Community Times with an extended deadline of 30<sup>th</sup> April.

#### PARISH COUNCIL PROCEDURES

Procedures for Parish Council meetings were agreed. In future guest speakers will be included at 7pm, before the meeting commences. District Councillor, County Councillor and Police representatives would be asked for written reports to be received in advance of meetings.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

At a meeting with County Highways at Anchor Bridge they suggested a potential solution may be inclusion of a warning bend sign and a 20mph sign to the existing 'beware ducks' signpost. They did not mention adding double yellow lines. It was pointed out that the meeting took place out of licensing hours when no cars were parked on the bridge.

It was noted that pot holes in the village had been filled.

#### **GRITTING**

A request had been received form Mr Fullbrook for a grit box at the bottom of Gravel Hill. This would be considered along with other requests for grit boxes subject to budget in the next financial year.

The Editor of the Community Times had requested that an article be submitted to the magazine advising on issues related to residents clearing snow from paths and roads. Councillors said this would be discussed in June with a view to submitting an article in the autumn.

Councillors heard a reply from Tim Yeo MP in which he gave general advice on liability relating to snow clearing by individuals and businesses.

#### **PLANNING**

Reviewing planning applications, Mrs Fuller said permission had been granted for listed building consent for works to the rear and interior of 10 Birch Street and at 58 Bear Street for retention of a detached summer house.

Councillors had no objections to an application for erection of a summer house at Woodside, Wissington Uplands, or for an enclosed porch at 33 Heycroft Way.

#### **VILLAGE HALL**

Rosemary Knox reported no volunteer had been found for the post of Bookings Secretary despite a number of people being approached. Diana Whiting retires on 11<sup>th</sup> April.

Diana received her Babergh Achievement Award at the annual ceremony which was a great occasion.

Some repainting has been completed by offenders on the Community Payback scheme. Terry Bannister organised this with the Probation Service and it has enabled a saving of £5,000.

#### **BURIAL GROUND**

Mary George gave progress on the review of the burial fee structure. It was felt further consideration was required for discussion at the next meeting.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

Ray Spencer said the new allotments had been ploughed and harrowing was expected to be done very soon. Then once allotments had been marked out they would be ready for use. An electric fence is used to contain the grazing sheep so post and rail fencing of the site could be carried out later.

Ray and Chris Hunt would arrange allocation of the new allotments and liaise with Transition Nayland who would like to organise a press event.

#### **OPEN SPACES**

Following the risk assessment which identified some evidence of decay on the Jubilee tree a contractor has been instructed to carry out a Picus test to investigate the level of decay present. This has delayed pruning plans for the tree.

The diocese would be contacted concerning the pot holes on the recreation ground driveway which need to be repaired as soon as possible.

Farrans Construction, contractors at the Fire Station, would be approached to see if they still require use of an area at the far end of the recreation ground for temporary parking.

#### AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Flagship Housing Group have advised they are optimistic work would commence on the site during April.

#### **FOOTPATHS**

Chris Hunt reminded the meeting that dogs must be kept on a lead when on the Fen from now until 31<sup>st</sup> July.

#### **CHURCHYARD WORKING PARTY**

A huge thank you to everyone who came and spring cleaned the Churchyard. It looks wonderful after such a difficult winter!!!

#### **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**

A report prepared by the Acting Chairman, but in no way a report on activities undertaken under my guidance. It is only a couple of months since Alan left us and moved north. What weather to choose for such a move! We wished Alan well, and showed our appreciation of his leadership.

The Community Council is comprised of the village societies of Nayland and Wissington. And it is the activities of the societies that demonstrate whether 2009 was a good year. In my judgement, on such criteria, 2009 was a very good year: the vast majority of our societies were successful in what they set out to do. This is an opportunity to congratulate them all on a splendid years work and to acknowledge the hard work of their officers and members. This is also an opportunity to remind village organisations that grants are available to assist development and fill gaps.

A few activities of 2009 warrant particular mention. First the year's new initiative with the production of the village calendar. The pictures for March are of Birch Street; interestingly our upstairs window looks unchanged between the two photographs! Many thanks to those who developed the production from the initial idea.

For two activities, 2009 was a year of settling in: the Woodland Corner and Transition Nayland. It is a great credit to the village that these progressive 21<sup>st</sup> Century style activities are finding their feet so successfully. Again thanks to those who have, and continue to give time and energy to their development.

Another two activities were re-styled during 2009, and given slightly different names. I refer to the 'Christmas Family Fayre' and the now titled 'Fun Quiz'. The changed characters of both have been shown to come close to what is required.

There remains an on-going concern: the lasting well-being of the Village Hall. Many of us here can recall the dedication and hard work of the late Jean Jones to see that a grand re-design and refurbished hall was built. We rejoiced in its completion. I wonder whether more needs to be done to publicise the Village Hall's future needs and what part the Community Council might play in this.

Our publicity vehicle and public relations source is the Community Times – and the main provider. In 2009 it has been as good as ever. Our thanks to Lorraine as its manager as well as editor, and to Roy for its distribution over so many years, not forgetting Jean, his wife, such an able assistant. Very many thanks to all three of you and to those who distribute the Community Times to every house in the villages.

Finally, a word about me and the Chairmanship. It is not right for a nearly eighty-year-old to be the Chairman for other than a short period. I describe myself as Acting Chairman and see myself as bridging a gap. One of the tasks of the Community Council during 2010 is to replace me. Don't hesitate!

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith distributed a copy of the accounts. He highlighted that the Community Times was up slightly on the year despite the increased competition, the Calendar had been a huge success and Woodland Corner had repaid their loan. In his report Bryan expressed thanks for Richard Cave's diligence in examining the accounts. The Chairman thanked Bryan for his firm financial advice during the year and the accounts (as shown on page 8) were adopted by the meeting.

#### **ELECTION OF OFFICERS**

Members were saddened to hear that Roy Evans wished to resign from the Executive and as Vice Chairman. Barry Wakefield thanked Roy for his hard-labour over the past 20 years or so, and hoped there would be opportunity to mark the Community Council's gratitude.

Barry Wakefield said the programme for the two-day 'Fun, Food and Music' celebration was currently being put together and already included a flower festival and art display over the weekend, and the activities will open with entertainment and refreshments in the Village Hall of the Friday evening.

On Saturday there will be a duck race, a picture quiz and various outside food stalls on the playing field. A stage was to be erected on the playing field and afternoon entertainment will include 'turns' by local talent of all ages, individuals and groups. The Community Council would run a hog roast and other barbecue foods. The evening would see performances from older local performers and the headline band 'Salt Dog'.

Members heard the programme for the event would be quite expensive but voted unanimously to underwrite it to the extent of £4,000. The sub-committee aimed to present methods of recovering cost and a detailed programme to the May meeting.

Lorraine Brooks said that the target of 12 sponsors, one for each month, had been attained and plans were in hand for the competition. It is hoped there will be a good number of entries for the photographic competition to provide an interesting exhibition in the Church Hall on Bank Holiday Monday 4th May from 1.30pm-4pm.

Barry Wakefield introduced Colin Ramsell who had kindly agreed to step in as distribution leader of the Community Times.

Lorraine Brooks wished to thank the whole CT Team, particularly the distributors and advertisers, for their support over the past year.

Appreciation was expressed to Graham Griffiths for maintaining the Nayland and Wiston website and members were encouraged to add information relating to their societies.

#### Transition Nayland Survey - 'The Headlines'

What did people think? Well we received a very good response to the survey we carried out in the village and we thought the results might provoke room for further discussion. The topics included recycling, energy, food and transport.

Clearly recycling is at the forefront of people's thoughts and 89 % of the people who responded said they wanted to see glass recycling in the village. Battery recycling was also a strong point with nearly half the people asked keen for this facility and this has in fact been resolved with the Nayland Post Office battery recycling point.

Energy is another main topic and 95% of the people asked were concerned about climate change and the rising energy costs. Measuring your energy use is a good place to start and half the people asked were keen to do this along with a third wanting to know more about it. Transition Nayland do have a number of energy meters available for loan (and are easy to install) should anyone wish to borrow one. The harsh winter we have just had will no doubt have focused people's mind on ways of saving energy. Coupled with the prospect of rising energy costs in the future 80% of the responses were interested to know more ways of saving energy.

Food was another main topic surveyed and the increased allotment space in Nayland (which has been granted and is currently being prepared) will support the already 64% of people questioned who grow some of the food they eat. 36% of respondents felt that for food to be considered 'local' it would have to be produced within 10 miles of Nayland. There was also interest shown to know more about seasonal ingredients and growing your own.

Transportation was also covered, 27% of respondents using their car most frequently to go to work, 32% to go shopping and 24% for leisure. Some interest was shown in car sharing to Colchester station for those poor commuters!

Again many thanks for those who took the time to respond. This information will help Transition Nayland to develop future activities and events. Should you wish to become more involved in Transition Nayland please complete the membership form on page 32 and return to Steve Maguire.

# Garden Notes

## by The Old Muckspreader

Well spring has finally arrived, but the normal display of bulbs is very late, although the early Narcissi are just starting, and today the OM/S spotted a wild primrose flowering in a sheltered spot. Aconites are over, and Snowdrops past their best but crocuses are in full swing, especially the little Crocus Tommasmianus (Tommies for short); a few corms, which are cheap to buy, planted in the autumn will soon spread, since they are great self-seeders and come up in cracks in paving, gravel, and generally all over the place.

Several of our favourites have taken a hammering in the icy winter, and the Autumn Flowering Cherry mentioned often in this column will be very sparse in its spring flowering. However casualties on the whole seem to be light here, though we have fears for the white Solanum Jasminoides; all the top growth appears to be dead, but it may break again from ground level, and as recommended last month, we shall wait until June, before abandoning hope.

In gardens, as in many other aspects of life, there are fashions. The OM/S whose horticultural recollection goes back to the 1930s remembers when almost every garden was resplendent with Dahlias; by 1970 they were hard to find, though at least one member of the Nayland Horticultural Society kept the flag flying and recently they have started to reappear.

Take the Hosta. The Victorians knew it as the Funkia, or Plantain Lily, but it then more or less vanished for three quarters of a century; a few years ago the Americans, for reasons best known to themselves, transformed it into a cult plant and raised masses of hybrids and cultivars, many indistinguishable from each other. The 2005 R.H.S. Plant Finder entry runs to 10 pages!. We grow a few here, and they look quite effective near water, until the snails start shredding the leaves, but when all is said it's a pretty boring plant, and the flowers are not exactly spectacular; in fact some gardeners cut them off.

The Hemerocallis, or Day Lily, is another transatlantic favourite, but the flowers are quite impressive and range in colour from yellow through orange to a very dark red. (11 pages in the Plant Finder!)

Recent additions to the WORDSEARCH: Garden Venues fashion parade include the hellebores, and some nurseries are now charging fancy prices for doubles and other strange forms. Here we grow a large group of the old single white form, and it would be hard to beat it.

As for decking, purple fences and the like .... Forget them. Surely it's better to follow one's own instincts. not the dictates of fashion, and grow what you like.

After a spell of icy weather plants in pots or frames may well dry out, so it's a good idea to keep them watered.

#### "HE NEVER HAS A CASE - PC'S HAPPY LOT IN HONEST SUFFOLK"

These days Suffolk is known to be one of the safest counties in which to live and, as will be seen in the following extract from a local newspaper in 1927, in the days when Nayland had a resident policeman, there was even less crime to worry about than today.

Townspeople who wander over the Essex border into Suffolk are mystified by occasional references to "The Will-o'-the Wisp", but few who have not been to the little village of Nayland know the explanation.

The mysterious "Will-o'-the Wisp" is real flesh and blood, weighs 14 stone, is over six feet tall and, moreover, is affectionately known to all local people as "Sergeant" and is often spoken of as "the policeman who never has a case."

Nayland is an old world village, many of the houses and cottages dating back to 1650. One house, indeed, overhanging the main street, still preserves its quaint lattice windows and centuries-old carved beams erected in the 17<sup>th</sup> century. A few yards away is the combined police station and house of the "Sergeant" – PC Pooley – and it was

here that I ran him to earth after a chase through three of the four villages that comprise his beat.

"No, we are not worried by criminals down here," he confided to me during the interview. "It is a very quiet life. The people of Suffolk are so honest that there is little for me to do, so little in fact that in three of my villages I have never had a case, while in the remaining one I have been troubled only by two people — one who stole some chickens and another who tried to run away with a cart!".

When I mentioned to him that he had been reported in three villages at the same time he laughed. "It is my job to keep in touch with all the villages," he said. "I travel on a bicycle." He does not envy the London policemen their lot.

As I left I congratulated him on living among such honest people. "Yes, they are very honest," he whispered, "but I am just off to watch some allotments. Brussels sprouts have been disappearing lately!"

#### CONSERVATION SOCIETY by Pat Bray

A busy and varied year was reported by the chairman of Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society at its annual meeting on March 9.

John Alexander said over the last 35 years the society could claim to have been a major force in preserving and advancing things residents enjoyed about living in Nayland and it was not just concerned with buildings but with history, arts and crafts. These interests were clearly attractive as membership had increased to more than 240.

He added last year's open gardens event made a record surplus and open meetings with a variety of speakers were well attended. The committee continued to monitor HGV movements through the village and those causing an obstruction were reported. A revised version of the society's leaflet *Living in a Conservation Area* would be given to new owners of listed buildings.

Mr Alexander said planning issues included the proposal to re-open the White Hart which the society welcomed and the Horkesley Park project, due to be considered by Colchester Borough Council's planning committee shortly.

The meadow continued to give pleasure to walkers and the wildflower belt made another spectacular show last summer. The Environment Agency had already started dredging silt at the junction of the river with the mill lade which would be beneficial.

Retiring treasurer Richard Cave, who presented financial reports for the society and the Nayland with Wissington land company, said another run of 300 copies of Wendy Sparrow's popular book *Memories of Nayland* had been printed with an index.

Officers elected were: Chairman, John Alexander; vice-chairman, Martin Wright; secretary, Andora Carver; treasurer, Jennie Jenkins. Committee: Clemency Doxey, Jill Badman, Margaret Dowding, Andrew Eldridge and Pauline Heigham.

The business meeting was followed by a demonstration by self-taught stained glass artist Barry Garnham who runs his own business in Colchester.

Mr Garnham, who brought along a colourful selection of machine and mouth-blown glass, photographs and examples of his work, showed how glass was cut to make up a design. He put together part of a decorative panel and promised to give it back to the society after finishing it in his workshop.

#### VILLAGE HALL AGM by Pat Bray

A successful year showing a £3,186 surplus compared to last year's £2,796 deficit was reported at Nayland village hall management committee's annual meeting on March 1. Treasurer Andrew Gowen said the endowment fund, intended for future hall improvements, had also increased by £2,000 over last year. Bookings were up with more outsiders using the building.

As the hall was now obliged to pay rates and everyday expenditure had increased, Mr Gowen said hire charges would rise from April 1.

Chairman lain Wright thanked all the organisations using the hall for their support and said the gardens were a "joy to behold". Thanking long-serving bookings clerk Diana Whiting, who is retiring, he said her skill and dedication were unsurpassed and he hoped she would be a committee member. Yvonne and John Spooner were also praised for their valuable contribution keeping the hall clean and shipshape.

Mr Wright said several fundraising events had been held including a fabulous 'class acts' revue, a profitable plant stall and regular village lunches.

He added: "This is a big building which costs a lot to maintain and we're fortunate to have had grants from the community council and the parish council who paid for a new oil tank."

The hall had also received a lottery grant enabling the committee to buy a new projection system for the village hall cinema. It was hoped to obtain further grants to improve energy efficiency. In addition, he said, Terry Bannister had organised labour through the probation service to decorate the hall inside and out.

Replying to a question from Chris Hunt, Mr Wright confirmed contractors had been brought in to clean the showers because they were left in such a disgusting state by footballers. "A simple wipe-down and a good clean after they use them would make a big difference," he commented.

Mr Gowen requested a garden day to tidy up the hall gardens and it was agreed to hold one on Saturday, April 10 starting at 9am

The committee was re-elected en bloc and it was pointed out more members would be welcome.





# AFFORDABLE HOUSING SCHEME FIVE PROPERTIES FOR LOCAL PEOPLE – WISTON ROAD, NAYLAND

The above development of 2 and 3 bedroomed houses, is a result of a partnership between Nayland-with-Wissington Parish Council, Babergh District Council, Flagship Housing Group (Suffolk Heritage Housing Association) and Suffolk ACRE.

The partners involved in the project are pleased to confirm the scheme is now progressing well and a start-on-site should be made during April.

Some delays were incurred during the planning application process as additional information was required by Babergh's Development Control section.

Following receipt of this, the scheme's planning application went before the Development Committee on 17 February 2010 where it was approved, subject to a legal agreement being finalised which will secure the properties as affordable housing for local people.

Flagship Housing Group has secured the necessary grant

funding for the scheme, so a start-on-site will be made as soon as the Decision Notice is issued.

Anyone who has a local connection to Nayland, or Wissington is advised to ensure they have registered an application on the Gateway to Homechoice system.

This is the Choice Based Lettings (CBL) system the council and housing associations now use to allocate all their properties. More information and an application can be made online, at the following website. www.gatewaytohomechoice.org.uk

CBL requires applicants to bid for vacant properties which will be advertised on the system. We will keep the local community informed about when the properties at Wiston Road will be advertised via the Community News, and by posting a notice on the Site Board at the site.

The survivors were returned to their loved ones, who had never given up hope that they would be found.

In Afghanistan the troops continue to fight, and to work in every possible way, to bring to the people true freedoms and a better life. The ordinary people of Afghanistan, amidst all the fighting and bombing, dare to hope, as they see the first signs of a return to normal life.

Rogation Sunday and Christian Aid Week fall together in May. We are reminded of the hope with which farmers and gardeners alike plant seeds and then wait to see if they will germinate and grow. In many countries their hopes are dashed again and again when longed for rains do not materialise, and yet they will hope again for next year. [Many such farmers are helped by Christian Aid to learn new techniques and try different crops.]

Hope inspires us to work and to pray, and we need to do both. Someone has said 'Work as if it all depends on you, and pray as if it all depends on God'. The Christian hope is an Easter hope, that life will always overcome death, right will overcome wrong and love and goodness prevail over evil. Many times costly sacrifices are made, but never in vain. We have seen tyrannies overthrown and walls come tumbling down. Hope springs eternal because it is a gift of God, who inspires us never to give up what we know to be right.



#### WELCOME TO THIS MONTH'S POLICE NEWS ITEM

For those of you who do not know me yet, I am PC1220 Chris Garrod and am your local Police Constable. I am open and approachable, therefore, prefer to be called 'Chris'. I feel the more informal approach makes for a better working relationship with local residents and businesses. I work jointly with Community Support Officer PCSO 3108 Mandy Coleman and we try to alternate our shifts to give you the best service you deserve. I am no stranger to community policing and have been a Police Constable for 14 years.

Since starting this role in January this year, I have become very aware of the local issues that affect you and your communities. This has been achieved through liaison with local schools, parish councils, local residents and businesses. By working together we can make a difference for us all and the communities that we live in.

May I bring to your attention some areas of concern that I would like to focus on? Hopefully with your assistance we can alleviate these concerns in the future. There appears to have been a slight increase in churches being broken into in the area. I would ask that you keep an eye on your local church for any suspicious activity. Rural churches are often targets for lead thieves as they can be seen as easy targets, due to their remote locations. Alongside this, I would ask you to note down any registration numbers and descriptions of people that you do not recognise or are acting suspiciously in your area, especially people asking local businesses for scrap metal or used batteries. Please pass any information on to the police as soon as possible, as this helps us build up an intelligence base, that in turn assists us in the prevention and detection of crime.

#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

Hopefully we have seen the last of the inclement weather. I would however, ask that you take particular care when driving through water of any depth. If you do have to drive through water keep in a low gear, low revs and drive through slowly which should prevent water being sucked into and causing costly damage to your engine. Wet country roads often have silt and mud on them due to the very nature of activities in the countryside and natural run off from the fields. We have been to a number of incidents in recent months due to drivers driving too fast for the road conditions. Please take care and Remember it is better to Arrive Late than be Dead Early!

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


