### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

#### Meeting: 9th June 2010

New member Hector Bunting was formally co-opted at Nayland Parish Council's June meeting. A vacancy was created by the resignation of Abbi Knight in December and as there was no call for a by-election the council agreed to co-opt Mr Bunting who is licensee of the Anchor Inn.

#### WISTON ROAD PAVEMENT

County councillor James Finch told members a site meeting with two engineers, John Goodyear and Karen Smith, was to be held the following week to discuss the proposed pavement from the new low-cost housing development in Wiston Road to the A134. He asked councillors to attend so the best solution could be found for a pathway as well as a new crossing over the main road. Mr Finch said money was tight and it was his job was to ensure the path was safe and improve the A134 crossing.

Two options had been put forward - a path with kerbing and drainage next to the road and a cheaper option to be set back against front gardens with the grass strip retained. Whatever happened, Mr Finch added, he wanted the new pavement and A134 crossing to be financed by resources currently available and hoped the engineers would come up with a solution so it could be implemented. He did not want to risk the project not going ahead. Councillors agreed to attend the meeting and report back as soon as possible. Clerk Debbie Hattrell said a £10,000 contribution had been received from Flagship Housing Group. DOG FOULING

Mrs Hattrell reported the bags for dog waste installed near the bin on Caley Green were being well used. Tibby Mimpress said it was important to monitor usage to ensure the expense was worthwhile. Ray Spencer said there were still half a dozen dog owners who persisted in allowing their pets to foul pavements and more drastic action by the council might be needed.

#### PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications, Mr Battye reported plans for listed building consent for work on 9 and 11 Mill Street and conservation area consent to demolish Norfolk's former bus garage and barns had been refused. A storage building at Rushbanks Farm had not needed planning permission unless it was used for livestock. A single-storey rear extension at 58 Bear Street, previously opposed by the parish council, had been approved including a condition that two garage/parking spaces should be provided within the site and used for no other purpose.

Members supported an application for listed building consent to rebuild the Anchor Inn smokehouse using materials as near as possible to the original.

#### **DEDHAM VALE PROJECT FORUM**

Chairman Gerry Battye, Tricia Fuller and Rosemary Knox described different aspects of the Dedham Vale Project forum they had attended, all saying it had been very worthwhile. Various workshops were held and Mr Battye recommended the forum to other councillors.

#### VILLAGE TREES

The council's tree committee with Mr Bunting and village tree warden Terry Bannister are to inspect various areas of the village to decide where new trees can be planted. Chris Hunt pointed out some willows on Caley Green were diseased and Mr Bunting suggested they should be pollarded rather than felled. The committee will report back next month.

#### PARISH COUNCIL ACCOUNTS

Mr Battye congratulated Mrs Hattrell on her attention to detail over the end-of-year accounts. It was agreed to spend £623 on three new litter bins to be installed on Caley Green, outside the primary school and at the beginning of Heycroft Way.

#### **BURIAL GROUND**

In his burial ground report Mr Hunt said seven memorials in the old cemetery had been deemed unsafe and several families contacted wanted to carry out repairs. It was agreed to ask Babergh Council to delay any work until September.

#### YOUTH CLUB

A request for financial support for Nayland Youth Club was

received from Teresa Moriarty who said the club, whose members are aged 10-15, could face closure unless more funding was found to keep it going beyond the end of July. She was currently investigating core funding and asked the council to consider a grant while she continued to apply for funding from other sources. Mr Battye said he would contact Mrs Moriarty and the matter will be re-considered next month.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

Mr Spencer said if any money was available two new standpipes on the allotments would be welcomed as dome people had to carry water supplies a long way. Mr Battye said the matter would be discussed next month and he was keen for allotment holders to be involved.

#### DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his report district councillor Richard Cave said Babergh continued to look hard at its budget and he was now a member of a strategic, planning and funding task group looking at all aspects. He advised small grant applications such as the one to install another tap on the allotments should be made in the autumn. **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT** 

# Mr Finch, in his county council report, said it was very important

to support the existing middle school at Stoke by Nayland right through and he had a role in representing any concerns people had. As far as the financial situation was concerned everyone was looking at budgets. The council was trying to finish off pothole repairs in the county costing £2million.

#### POLICE REPORT

A report from PCSO Amanda Coleman said there were five crimes between April 1 and May 7 - theft of a handbag containing a mobile phone and keys from a house in Bures Road, aggravated taking of a 4 x 4 vehicle (later recovered) from a field off Radleys Lane, burglary of a petrol mower from a garage in Bures Road, theft of copper tubing and fence panels from a builders' merchants in Wiston Road and theft of a cement mixer, wheelbarrow and gate from a Wiston Road building site.

### **CHARITY BOWLS**

Twenty teams of four from Essex and Suffolk took part in Nayland Bowls Club's annual charity tournament in the village hall on June 6.

Winners were Stisted who repeated last year's success beating Walton on the Naze in the final. The event raised about £450 to be shared by the Treehouse Appeal and the Age Concern Dementia Centre in Sudbury.



#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

#### Annual Meeting: 14th July 2010

#### POLICE

PCSO Mandy Coleman reported on 5 crimes between 8 June and 14 July; two incidents of theft in Wiston Road and Bear Street, a burglary in Harpers Hill, criminal damage in Bear Street and a incidence of fraud by false representation.

#### TRAFFIC CALMING ANCHOR BRIDGE

Councillors discussed a traffic calming proposal from highways for the reduction of the speed limit to 20mph with provision of a speed sign, 'SLOW' painted on the road and rumble strips installed. Concerns were expressed on the effect rumble strips may have on nearby residents. It was agreed to raise further questions with Highways relating to them and the accuracy of the plan given but confirm the elements the council favoured.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

Rosemary Knox agreed to look into a report of overgrown hedges on Campions Lane.

Chris Hunt reported a broken drain cover on Harpers Hill. Debbie Hattrell would notify Suffolk County Council that weeds in Socket Alley need removing.

Chris Hunt agreed to compile an article on the issue around gritting and snow clearing for the Community Times in the autumn. He would also investigate possible locations for grit-bins if the money was available.

There were no suggestions for a name of the road for the affordable housing off Wiston Road.

#### PLANNING

Reviewing planning decisions, Mr Battye said an application to install solar panels at 22 Stoke Road had been withdrawn.

Listed Building Consent has been granted for the erection of a smoke house/store and garage, following demolition of existing smoke house, at the Anchor Inn.

Permission has been approved to reduce by 30% the crown of an oak tree covered by Tree Preservation Order at Old Maltings Farmhouse.

Application for a Certificate of Lawfulness for use of land to the rear of Perry Farmhouse, Bear Street as garden land has been refused.

Councillors did not object to change of use of buildings to Class B8 storage at the Former Pig Fattening Unit Harpers Hill Farm but had recommended conditions that more native screening was planted instead of conifers, that light pollution was monitored and hours of operation where the same as the existing Transfer Station.

Councillors had no objections to the erection of new cattle building at Wissington Grove Farm but they did object to the erection of first-floor rear extension and increase in height of chimney at 2 Fox Cottages on the grounds of loss of amenity to a neighbouring property.

Permission had been granted for the felling subject to replacement of the Jubilee Tree covered by a TPO in Bear Street. When a date was known, notice would be given to nearby residents.

After discussion councillors felt a slice of the tree should be retained as a memento.

Chris Hunt felt that planting a replacement tree was no longer appropriate and after further discussion it was agreed a replacement would not be planted. Suggestions on what to do with the site were discussed but no decision was made.

#### **OPEN SPACES**

Chris Hunt outlined a report compiled on the village trees. It identified two willows on the riverbank at Caley Green in need of pollarding and a willow overhanging the footpath and A134 which needed attention. In the Recreation Ground three Horse Chestnuts showed signs of disease but it was felt they may recover. The report suggested where trees were removed consideration be given to replacing them with trees bearing fruit and nuts, such as wild cherry and walnut.

#### DOG FOULING

Councillors were informed Poop Scoop Week begins on 26th July and in the Babergh District it is an offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 where Fixed Penalty Notices can be served for dog fouling on designated land.

Solutions to getting the message across to a minority of dog owners guilty of not removing dog faeces would be discussed further at the next meeting.

#### NAYLAND YOUTH CLUB

Considering a request for a contribution towards the running of the Youth Club councillors felt they needed more information on the running of the club including whether they fundraise themselves, attendance figures for the parishes involved and forecast figures. The substantial cost of paid volunteers was discussed compared to the unpaid volunteers of other youth groups.

ALLOTMENTS

Mr Batty said the winners of the allotment competition were 1st Sheila Wildish, 2nd Stephen Osborne, 3rd Trevor Smy and prizes would be presented at the Flower Show on 14<sup>th</sup> August.

Following an application for provision for an additional tap, Hector Bunting agreed to investigate possible solutions including the provision of a bore hole. Mr Battye felt it was important to canvas all allotmenteers on their views. The sub-committee would report back at the next meeting.

#### COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

James Finch emphasised that substantial cuts would be made to all budgets. He outlined concept ideas to improve the A134 crossing at Nags Corner which suggested dropped curbs and a central island to help pedestrians and help slow traffic. This will be part of the scheme for providing a pavement along Wiston Road.

#### **RETIREMENT OF REV KIT GRAY**

PRIEST-in-charge of Nayland and Wiston, the Rev Kit Gray, is retiring after 36 years working in different areas of full-time ministry.

Miss Gray, 63, who was one of 23 parish deacons in the diocese ordained priest in 1994, came to Nayland in November 2000.

After starting as a lay worker in 1974 she was made a deaconess in 1980 and later worked as assistant chaplain at Nottingham University. She was duly invited to become a deacon in 1987 eventually leading to her ordination as priest.

Her last Sunday at Nayland will be October 3 and she said she viewed the prospect of retirement with mixed feelings.

"There will be certain aspects one is relieved to leave behind but I'll be very sorry to leave Nayland and Wiston and its people.

"The best part about being a priest is that you don't fully retire and are able to pursue those aspects of ministry you find most meaningful and helpful to others."

Miss Gray's departure will coincide with changes to Nayland and Wiston parishes which in future will share their vicar with others yet to be decided.

#### COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT Meeting: 7th July 2010 Chairman: Barry Wakefield 263116

#### **FUTURE EVENTS**

Autumn Quiz: It was decided not to hold the quiz this year as no volunteer to organise it had come forward and it would be too close to the Festival.

**Bonfire Night:** This will go ahead as usual on Friday 5th November. Iain Wright agreed to arrange clearance of debris remaining on the bonfire site.

**Christmas Family Fayre:** The hall is booked for Saturday 4th December. Steve Maquire will be unable to lead on this but would help in a consultancy role.

#### TREASURERS REPORT

Bryan Smith reported on current finances. Expenses committed for the Festival currently stood at £4,885 with further costs yet to be identified. Unencumbered assets stood at £12,197.

#### GRANTS

**Village Hall Dishwasher:** The Village Hall Management Committee had agreed that a dishwasher would be an asset to the Village Hall. Iain Wright agreed to look further into the costs, including installation and provision of adequate plumbing and electrics to run the machine.

**Art Club Display Boards:** It was agreed to grant £380 for the purchase of display boards suitable for hanging paintings. These would be available for use by all societies.

**Nayland Youth Club:** They had previously asked for £2000 to fund them over a crisis period from July until they could secure more funding. Teresa Moriarty updated the meeting on their progress. There are still pursuing a grant with the Nayland with Wissington and Leavenheath Parish Councils and the Suffolk Foundation. Failure to secure funding might cause the club to close temporarily from July. It was noted that the Community Council already provided £700 a year to pay for Village Hall hire charges. It was felt that the Council should not pick up the tab and the Parish Councils should lead on this but it would look at the problem again if other measures failed.

#### **COMMUNITY TIMES**

Lorraine Brooks requested submission for the current issue.

#### VILLAGE CALENDAR

A proof copy was circulated and the calendar. Lorraine said a sales point at the Festival was needed. It was agreed to spend £450 on the first print run and the 2011 calendar would go on sale at the Flower Show on 14th August.

#### VILLAGE FESTIVAL

The meeting was updated on progress by the sub-committee. On Friday 17 September the Village Players supported by members of the Choir were planning an evening event called 'A Voyage Through the Musicals' with songs from the past up to the present, performed around a supper with a bar available.

On Saturday the Duck Race will be at 12 noon. Steve Maguire will lead a working party to clear a pathway for the ducks through the reeds. On the playing field there will be various hot and cold food stalls including the Women's Institute. There will be a bar tent and a Pimms bar. There will be a ready, steady, cook competition. Mandy Cook is still finalising the afternoon and evening entertainment on the stage. Will will be organising the purchase of T-shirts which will be on sale.

It was hoped that the party at 8pm at Parkers on Saturday 10 July aimed at recruiting helpers would be well attended.

#### SOCIETY REPORTS:

**Royal British Legion:** David George said they were visiting the Aviation Museum at St Osyth leaving the doctors's surgery at 6pm on 12 July. Anyone wishing to come should contact Bill Martin on 262168. The Branch was keen to attract new members who no longer need to have military background.

Art Group: Colin Ramsell said they restart after the summer break on 8 September.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said they are keeping on top of maintenance and the painting by Community Payback is progressing. A Garden Working Morning is taking place on Saturday 4 September at 9am to tidy up before the Festival. It

is hoped volunteers will come along to help.

**Conservation Society:** Andora Carver reported a successful Open Gardens although numbers were down. Manufacturing in Ipswich was the subject of their meeting on 12 October. They were preparing a Constable bicentenary display for the 18/19 September in St James. The Society would welcome suggestions for future speakers.

**Women's Institute:** Lorna Rumsey said they were holding a Butterfly Coffee Morning on  $17^{th}$  July in aid of the Children's Hospice in Ipswich.

**Village Players:** Jenny Smith said the celebration of the life of John Swane had been a great success. Auditions for the December production were being held on 14 July at 7.30 and 18 July at 5pm in the Church Hall.

**Bowls Club:** Sylvia Bond reported they were currently second in the league but had some difficult matches in front of them. Their annual charity tournament had made £450 to be shared between the Treehouse Appeal and Age Concern Dementia Centre in Sudbury.

**HortSoc:** Lorraine Brooks reported the May Market was successful. The outing to RHS Wisley was full and feedback very positive and a visit to Kings Seeds had been popular. Their Garden Party was in 16 July at Parker's, the annual Flower Show was on 14 August at 2pm in the Village Hall, and the Flower Festival on 18/19 September in St James.

**Choir:** Teresa Moriarty said Pirates of Penzance and been a success and their annual Fun Quiz was on 15 July. They are planning a 'come and sing' Hadyn's Nelson Mass on 9 October.

Youth Club: Teresa said they hoped to support the Festival.

Parish Council: Chris Hunt had nothing to report.

**Transition Nayland:** Will Hitchcock reported the new allotments are going well despite lack of rain and the Summer Solstice walk led by Chris Hunt had continued at the Anchor. They would be receiving compost from the school eco team on 15 July.

**First Response:** Andrew Gowen said they are desperately in need of more responders. He added there had been a change in criteria and there were less call outs. Please contact him if you could help on 262534.

#### OFFICERS

It was highlighted that a new Secretary is needed before the next meeting. Barry Wakefield reminded the meeting that his position as Chairman also needed a volunteer to come forward. **NEXT MEETING**


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# HARVEST FESTIVALS

## Bicentenary of Constable's Picture in St. James Church 1810 – 2010

John Constable painted Christ Blessing the Elements of Bread and Wine during the summer of 1810 and the picture was installed in St. James Church that October.

It is still in situ two hundred years later, the only one of his three religious pictures to remain in the place for which it was painted.

We are celebrating this unique event to coincide with Harvest Festival and the Flower Festival as part of the Nayland Summer Festival weekend.

Find out more about how the picture came to be painted and Constable's family connections with Nayland from a display in church over the weekend.

The climax of our celebrations will be an evening event on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup>, starting at 6.30pm in church which will include readings about Constable by Ronald Blythe and a short recital of organ music written by the Revd. William Jones of Nayland, who came to the parish in 1776, the year of Constable's birth. Dr. John Constable, great great great grandson of the artist hopes to be present to support our celebrations.

The event will end with refreshments in church.

#### The Summer Solstice Stroll

On the longest day of the year there were no signs of Druids, but there was a Viking brandishing a kazoo or a Nayland vuvuzela as it is now affectionately known! Yes - this was the Transition Nayland Summer Solstice Stroll. Around 15 people met at the village hall where we had a brief presentation about the Transition movement which was established in Totnes, Devon, back in 2008 and the success and growth of the movement which now consists of over a thousand Transition Towns worldwide! The two fundamental issues of climate change and peak oil (which is the point at which demand outstrips the production of oil) were addressed in detail during the presentation. Will Hitchcock stated: "Think of peak oil like the dashboard on your car, we are teetering on empty, yet we still have a long journey ahead without any means to fill our tanks on the route we are travelling unless we look at a different greener way to continue our journey". Following on from the thought provoking presentation it was time for the main event!

After donning his Viking helmet it was over to Chris Hunt, Nayland's resident tour guide who led us on a historical journey through the village. Chris's first historical 'factoid' was about the Viking helmet. Apparently, unlike Chris' version of the Vekso which was the upside down horned version, the traditional Norse helmet contained no horns. The horned model is an adaptation borne out of Hollywood blockbusters! Our route took us to the secret garden by the Mill stream, along Birch Street and to the Fens via Fen Street. Chris informed us that the Fens were the equivalent of our allotments for the residents of Nayland during the medieval period, where they would grow veg such as turnips, parsnips and beets. Next it was off to the allotments which, during the early part of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, filled nearly the whole of the field which surrounds today's plots. Finally, and with impeccable timing, the stroll finished quite aptly at Court Knoll where Nayland is believed to have originated. After a resounding round of applause and a blast on the Nayland vuvuzela to thank Chris for his enlightening and amusing historical tour of the village, it was off to the Anchor Inn for a couple of jugs of good old Pimms, just in time for last light!

# Garden Notes

## by The Old Muckspreader

The OM/S has decided to retire from weather-forecasting, after the spectacular failure of his prophecy in the last issue. His Ash tree got it wrong, and the Met. Office was right. However, in a bit of stable-door bolting, here are a few of the plants we should have been growing in a dry summer; most of them will also flourish in a wet season.

Firstly, there are the herbaceous Sedums, with their fleshy grey-green leaves and large heads of long-lasting pink and red flowers, attractive to all kinds of insects.

Achilleas, relatives of the wild Yarrow, produce flat heads of pink and gold flowers; some of the latter are spectacular, and last for ages when cut.

Eryngiums, the Sea Hollies, stand up well with their silvery blue spikey flowers. E. Giganteum is a biennial, but a prolific self-seeder that grows to six feet; it's often called Miss Wilmott's Ghost after that formidable Edwardian lady gardener who used to scatter its seeds in gardens she visited. It's also useful for dried flower arrangements.

Lychnis Coronaria with its furry grey foliage and magenta or white flowers, will bloom throughout the season. The Verbascums, Mullems, with their spikes of yellow and white flowers are another standby. All the Osteospermums have benefited from the heat, most are hardy but some of the more brightly coloured ones with lush foliage sold in garden centres are best treated as annuals.

Among annuals the Opium Poppies will flourish, and self-seed, without watering, though many popular annuals will need a reviving can or two of water. Among the shrubs are all the Lavenders, Cistuses and Senecios (now renamed something else) with their silver foliage and yellow flowers.

In the last issue the OM/S recommended a cheap but effective method of repairing bald patches on lawns. To show that he practises what he preaches he used this method on quite a large area of damaged lawn, and

can confirm that it does work. During the current extreme drought it has needed quite a bit of watering, and will take more than 3 weeks to blend in completely, but already there is a vast improvement.

On a recent visit to Wisley, organised by the Nayland and District Horticultural Society (HortSoc to most of us) one of the members potted one of the staff apparently cutting off all the flowering shoots of some herbaceous perennials. On enquiring, he was told that this was the 'Chelsea Chop' in action. In fact, despite recommending it in the last issue the OM/S has found that this year's drought has rendered it hardly necessary here.

Finally, don't forget the Summer Flower Show on August 14<sup>th</sup>.

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## THE CHURCH OF THE SACRED HEART

Most churches have long histories spanning many centuries and it is the cause of much sorrow for their congregations when they become redundant. Sadly, the final Mass on Sunday the 5<sup>th</sup> September 2010 will mark the closure of the Catholic Church of The Sacred Heart in Church Lane, Nayland. It will be a very sad day not just for the congregation but for the whole village. The roots of this little church are ancient and its benefactors played an important part in Nayland's history.

The church was built in 1902 and is one of three churches in the Catholic parish of Hadleigh. The others are the Church of Our Lady Immaculate and St Edmund, King and Martyr at Withermarsh Green which was built in 1827. Unfortunately this church closed in the 1980s, although it is still used occasionally for baptisms and weddings. The third church is the Catholic Church of St Joseph in Hadleigh, built in 1966. The Sacred Heart is closing

because the Hadleigh parish will be without a resident priest and is merging with the parish of Sudbury.

In 2003 the Sacred Heart joyfully celebrated its centenary with an exhibition telling the history of the parish and its three churches and, due to the large numbers attending, High Mass was held in St James's Church. The three current church buildings are relatively new in comparison with the history of the parish which has been traced back to the 13<sup>th</sup> century.

When the country was in a turmoil of civil and religious unrest a place of worship for Catholics in this area was provided at Withermarsh Green by Richard Constable, owner of the estate which later became known as Giffords Hall. In 1216 he built a chapel on his land dedicated to St Nicholas, the remains of which can still be seen today.

The Hall and estate changed hands a number of times until in the early 15th century the Mannock family arrived and lived there for nearly 500 years. The Mannocks were a Catholic landowning family, baronets from 1627, and Recusants who kept the Faith through Penal times. They gave seven priests to the church and because of the religious changes of the times were always in danger of persecution. They lost part of their estates for refusing to conform to the law and accept the teachings of the established Church in England.

A chapel had been built by the Mannocks within the Hall in the Tudor period. However, in 1827 a new church and accommodation for a resident priest were built on land given by the Mannock family, close to the Hall on its southern side. This church at Withermarsh Green served a wide area on both sides of the Suffolk border. In 1900 it was recorded that there were fifty-five members of the parish of whom twenty-nine lived in Nayland and Essex. There were eighteen members of the Cuddon family in Nayland at that time.

The Cuddon family in Nayland have an important place in Nayland's history for two reasons. They founded a brewery at what is now The Butts in Church Lane in the 19<sup>th</sup> century and built the Sacred Heart Church in 1902. They are an ancient family and can trace their descent back to Dunwich in the 13th century where they were prosperous merchants trading with Holland and Flanders. In the 16<sup>th</sup> century when Dunwich fell into decay they moved away and spread throughout East Anglia and London .

The first Cuddons, James and his wife Ann, arrived in this

area in the late 18<sup>th</sup> century. They came from Bungay to farm at Layham. They were devout Catholics and may have been drawn here by its proximity to Giffords Hall. They and their family were soon amongst the 'great and the good' with their own pews at St Edmunds for which they paid seat rent. When James and Ann died in 1828 they were the first lay people to be buried in the adjoining cemetery which had previously been reserved for priests.

From the baptismal registers of 1783-1855 at Withermarsh Green it can be seen that James and four of his brothers who also lived in the area had twenty-six children between them. It seems that the first Cuddons in Nayland were William, James's brother, and his wife Sarah who had four children. James and Ann had eleven children and their son James and his wife Elizabeth had nine. The younger James had moved to Nayland in the 1830s and founded the Cuddon Brewery which flourished in Nayland until 1918.

All five of James' sons followed their father's trade, in Hereford, Colchester and New Zealand. One son, William, had been sent to New Zealand in 1856 aged twenty-one because he wanted to marry a Protestant, Marianne Boggis from Stoke-by-Nayland, and was given £3,000 to set himself up. There he became a successful brewer and businessman. They had eleven children and some of their descendants came to Nayland to celebrate the centenary in 2003. James' sons, Samuel and Philip, stayed in Nayland to work with their father and eventually took over the business in 1870. Samuel and his wife Sarah had eleven children and with the exception of one daughter, the whole family are buried at Withermarsh Green with Samuel's parents and grandparents.

In 1895 Samuel, now a widower, handed over the brewery to his sons Thomas and Raymond. He died in 1905. Small family breweries were gradually being taken over and the Cuddon Brewery closed in 1918 after it had been acquired by the Colchester Brewing Company, together with ten public houses, for only £7,000 the lot. The pubs included The Compasses in Bear Street (now the Village Stores), the Star (later the Star & Garter) and the Butcher's Arms in Bear Street, and pubs in Stoke and Leavenheath. The late Bill Norfolk remembered the brewery closing and that it was demolished soon afterwards. It was a sad day for the village when the local beer, affectionately known as "Cuddon Straight Through" was no more.

Thomas Cuddon was the last owner of the brewery, dying a year after it closed in 1918. He had lived at 14 Stoke Road and at Brewery House (The Butts). Raymond and his wife Kate lived at The Gables (The White House) in Church Lane. The two brothers had married two sisters, daughters of John and Mary Browne, brewers and hoteliers in Colchester. Raymond had worked at the brewery as a young man but later became a farmer at Wiston, dying at the early age of 38 in 1908. He was Captain of the Nayland Fire Brigade.

When Samuel and Sarah drove their large family the four miles to Withermarsh Green in their wagonette they probably dreamt of a Catholic church for Nayland but it was their daughter Elizabeth (Bessie) who brought this about. She started a building fund and in 1899 wrote to the Bishop of Northampton asking for permission to build a church in Nayland. She pointed out that the number of Catholics in Nayland was likely to increase with a new factory in the village and the forthcoming building of a sanatorium and also that several Nayland residents did not practise their religion owing to the long distance from the church. Her request was granted and the

Sacred Heart Church was eventually built in 1902 on a piece of land in Church Lane owned and donated by Samuel Cuddon.

The main Cuddon family home was at The Butts next to the brewery but when Samuel died in 1905 the family purchased Loretto, the house next to the newly built church, and Samuel's seven unmarried daughters moved there. They became custodians of the new church and Loretto was used as a presbytery. Their father left them well provided for and they inherited several properties in Nayland, including Webb's Meadow, and nine fennages on the common meadows of Nayland. Samuel's sons, Thomas and Raymond, were expected to make their living from the brewery.

The congregation of the Sacred Heart was growing, as predicted by Bessie, and the Cuddon ladies were in great

demand as godparents. The sisters remained unmarried and gradually either died or moved away. They had taken an active interest in village affairs and the last member of the family to die in Nayland was Bessie, Samuel and Sarah's first born. She died in 1958 aged ninety-three. At the centenary of the Sacred Heart Church in 2003 a tribute was paid to its Cuddan honofatter.

At the centenary of the Sacred Heart Church in 2003 a tribute was paid to its Cuddon benefactors, especially Samuel as head of the family and his daughter Bessie who played a major role in the founding of the church. Descendants of the Cuddon family still live on beyond the boundaries of Nayland but here, with the closing of the Sacred Heart, another chapter in Nayland's history will come to an end.

### Cutbacks – for good or ill ?

We know that as a result of the recession and national debt we are in for a hard time. We are warned that the necessary cutbacks will affect all of us in different ways. There is much to be gained from working more closely together with other church communities and sharing worship with them. As in a good marriage, being joined together involves some individual loss and compromise, but results in greater joys.

Change and challenge are opportunities for growth. The people of Israel discovered more about God each time they were in exile. Whenever their faith was tested it became stronger and their vision of God became larger.

As human beings we have been gifted with an amazing ability to adapt both physically and emotionally to each new situation. As Christians we believe that God will lead us wherever we go and give us the strength we need to meet each challenge.

I pray that we will all meet the coming changes with faith and love and a spirit of generosity.



## **Digital Difficulty!**

In 2011, the Analogue signal for Televisions will be switched off. You will then have the choice (possibly unwelcome but certainly forced) of either buying a new Television, Computer or a set top box to give you reception of the digital signal. If you already have digitally capable equipment, some re-tuning may be required, instructions for which should be in your Handbook.

According to Digital UK, all residents of Nayland are now receiving a signal strength of between 98 and 100% of perfection. As the Analogue signal is turned off, the transmission power of the digital signal will be increased and we will get a perfect signal all the time.

Sadly, like so many things published by our leaders, this information is not actually quite right. The problem is that in giving the signal strength information, Digital UK only plot the distance from the nearest transmitter: In our case, this is the Sudbury Mast, which lies just 7 kms to the north of Nayland. Digital UK choose to ignore the inconvenient fact that Nayland lies in the lee of a range of hills - Harper's and Gravel - which are only 30 metres back from Bear / Birch Street and Stoke Road and are 30 metres high, roughly. These create a shadow which the new improved, modern and wonderful digital signal cannot fully penetrate. It is therefore guite possible that any house in these roads, or, possibly in Fen St and parts of Mill / High Street will only get satisfactory TV reception if you have a mast 20 metres high! It is almost certain that you will need a new aerial and, even then, you may not be able to get all your favourite stations - if you look, you will see that some people have already extended their aerial height in an attempt to get decent reception. Apart from the cost, the visual impact on the street scene will be awful!!!

There are two other ways of getting TV reception: One, using a computer and big screen, is through your supplier of Broadband who may offer a range of TV programs, free or chargeable, depending, or from a website offering TV programmes. The difficulty here is that the available line

### **CONSERVATION SOCIETY** by Pat Bray

The Nayland and Wiston postcard archive from the David May collection, purchased by Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society, was on display at the society's open meeting on June 22. The three albums which contain several hundred postcards dating mainly from the early 20th century created a great deal of interest.

speed of broadband in Nayland is once again, sadly, not what your provider sells you - he relies on weasel words (like "Up To") to enable him to sell you "Up to 20 meg" when, in the real world, you are unlikely to get much more than 6 meg. 6 meg only just gives you acceptable TV reception, depending to some extent on both your equipment and the distance from the exchange and which provider you use. Complex, ain't it!

That leaves the option of using a Satellite service: Provided either by FreeSat or Sky, the purchase of a new dish aerial and set top box (or a card for your computer) will give you reception which is very good, will continue to be so and even improve with the new HD services. A simple solution and probably the best option BUT there is a slight problem!!! The Satellite most people will use is Astra 28.2. Your new dish will therefore have to be placed so there is a clear line of sight to the horizon slightly West of South. Due to small gardens or difficult surroundings, this may mean that the installer suggests you put the dish on the front of south facing houses. This will put you in direct conflict with the planning regulations!

So, here we have a dilemma. And, to make matters worse, there is a distinct possibility that, if you go down the Digital route, when the power is turned up on Sudbury mast, the signal will swamp TV signals in Belgium and Holland, so it will have to be turned down again! Or, if you are near the top of the hills, the signal may be too strong and swamp your reception! Digital UK do not appear to be at all inclined to offer a solution, sadly.

Basically, the Digital switchover is going to be rather like the switch to FM Radio. We were told it was going to be wonderful, the reality proving to be different.

These conclusions, I must make clear, are based on my own experience and investigation. I hope there are plenty of residents who already have satisfactory Digital TV: I would be glad to have your comments or experiences of installing digital TV in Nayland. Please write to Alan@Edwards-online.net.

With the school holidays upon us and adults and children out enjoying the longer days and hot weather I like to bring to your attention some of the calls we get relating to Anti – Social Behaviour (ASB) and some of the offences people don't realise they are committing.

Shouting and swearing might not bother you and your mates but people walking past could become upset and scared, they have become your 'victims' and they might give police your name. Scratching someone's car or breaking off a wing mirror doesn't hurt anyone but will cost the owner to repair it and could land you in trouble with the police, (this could stop you from getting a job in the future and doing what you want to do).

**Scrawling graffiti** is classed as *criminal damage*. Police are good at identifying graffiti vandals so keep your artistic skills to yourself, or find out what local graffiti art projects may be happening in your area. If you're caught by police, you could get a criminal record for life.

**Sneaking into school** when it's meant to be shut and messing around inside could get you arrested on suspicion of burglary.

**FACT:** Anti-social behaviour is any action that upsets someone else or makes them feel frightened or worried. You don't have to cause damage to something or hurt someone to break the law.

**FACT:** If you're over ten years old you can be arrested by the police and taken to a police station if they suspect you're up to no good.


