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NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 13th October 2010

WHITE HART

Amended plans for alterations to the White Hart to form a public house and three residential flats have been rejected by Babergh Council, Nayland parish councillors heard at their October meeting.

Among the detailed reasons given, the district council said the application was contrary to local planning policies. A sustained marketing campaign had not been undertaken and the applicant had failed to show the facility was no longer needed by the local community or was commercially viable. Other reasons said the proposal would result in the subdivision of the building's 15th century element, a significant reduction in the employment unit and loss of the pub garden. The proposed pub's viability was also questionable given its size, lack of parking and garden space.

PLANNING

Reviewing planning applications chairman Gerry Battye said amended plans for a first-floor rear extension at 2 Fox Cottages, Wiston, had been approved. Applications for tree work at 23 Court Street and Hollies, Stoke Road were also granted.

GRIT BINS

Chris Hunt said he and Wendy Sparrow had toured the village looking at sites for grit bins rather than heaps and various locations were inspected including Newlands Lane and Gravel Hill. After lengthy discussion the council decided to buy two bins to be sited at the Harpers Estate/Nayland Heights junction and in Fen Street near the High Street exit. Grit heaps are to be requested for other areas with three named sites in Wiston - Pound House, Campions Hill and the Old Fox. Local businesses will be asked to sponsor the bins.

WISTON ROAD PAVEMENT

A letter from Wiston Road resident Leo Baker accused the council of wasting taxpayers' money on a pavement from the new affordable housing development to the A134. Despite a grant being awarded he said most of the cost would be paid by the taxpayer. Cars would park on the pavement making pedestrians walk in the road making it more dangerous. He added it was a disgrace, when everyone was cutting back, to expect taxpayers to pay more and asked the council to justify the expense.

Mary George pointed out the footpath was part of safety improvements to the A134 junction and once the development was complete more pedestrians would use Wiston Road. Safety of pedestrians had been discussed at length before the planning application for the site was submitted and a public exhibition had given people the chance to voice concerns.

BABERGH DEVELOPMENT WORKSHOP

Chairman Gerry Battye reported he and Mrs George had attended a Babergh development workshop to consider the council's core strategy for 2030/31. Nayland was identified as a 'key service centre' as it had public transport, shops, a primary school and a surgery. Questionnaires were handed round for councillors to complete.

SOLAR PANELS

A letter from Will Hitchcock of Transition Nayland said planning permission was no longer needed to install solar panels in non-listed houses in conservation areas and the council needed to be aware of this change. Members felt it was not the council's business to give advice on planning matters and urged all property owners to check with the district planning authority before investing in expensive solar equipment.

JUBILEE TREE

Mr Battye said no correspondence had been received about the felled Jubilee tree in Bear Street. Two slices of the trunk had been preserved and the council would decide next month what to do with its slice. Having taken advice, members agreed to replace the copper beech with a hornbeam tree.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Ray Spencer reported concern was being expressed over the allocation of the low cost houses in Wiston Road and it was necessary to ensure the right people had access to them. District councillor Richard Cave said they were allocated through the choice-based letting system introduced two years ago and he would ask a Babergh officer to attend a future meeting to explain how it worked.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Mr Cave said both Babergh and Mid-Suffolk councils had voted for a full constitutional merger in April 2013 and there would be a referendum in May 2011. This would trigger the Boundary Committee to look at enlarged wards resulting from the merger. He added the parish council would be asked for its ideas and opinions.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

County councillor James Finch said the council had agreed a new strategic direction focussing on becoming a strategic body with less service delivery. Its fundamental principle was to strengthen local democracy, changing the strategy of a providing council to an enabling one, transforming public services through collaboration and strengthening communities. The background was to get more delivery for less money driven by the current economic environment. Changes would evolve over a two-year period looking at 128 services provided alongside the district council but fundamentally the council would not let down the needy in the community. He said it was a two-way process and the parish council could also think about the concept presented.

POLICE REPORT

A report from PCSO Amanda Coleman said there had been three crimes since the last meeting - criminal damage in Fen Street on October 4 when plants were pulled from pots and an outside light damaged; a burglary with intent in Wiston Road on October 8 when business premises were entered but nothing stolen; theft of satnav equipment from a vehicle parked overnight in Stoke Road on October 11.

IN BRIEF

It was reported the name Nags Cottages for the new houses in Wiston Road had been rejected by Babergh after consultation with Royal Mail so Meadow Cottages was suggested instead.

Mr Spencer said following the removal of a metal structure from a poorly kept allotment it would be ploughed and offered to the next person on the waiting list.

A new sign is to be bought for the recreation ground and two SLOW signs painted on the driveway.

The council is to hold three meetings in preparation for next year's budget and precept.

Clerk Debbie Hattrell presented the half-year budget review and was congratulated on her successful external audit.

Meeting: 10th November 2010

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Nayland parish councillors heard a detailed explanation of the choice-based lettings system used to allocate five new affordable homes being built in Wiston Road at their November meeting.

Babergh's housing support manager David Clarke, who attended with colleague Sue Jackman, said all potential tenants would have to have definite local connections. It did not matter if people were existing council tenants or new applicants. Anyone wanting a council property should register with Babergh and the choice-based lettings system for the new houses due to be completed in March would open online for a week in December.

Ray Spencer said a letter had been received from a woman with Nayland family connections who was told she would not be considered because she was already living in a local authority property elsewhere which he felt was hard on her. Mr Clarke said council housing had always been allocated to those in greatest need so there had to be a policy but anyone could apply.

Suffolk Heritage Housing Association would check the local connections and the type of household would have to fit the houses offered - four with two bedrooms and one with three. He agreed to supply posters to put up round the village informing people when to apply on the choice-based letting system.

District councillor Richard Cave said anyone with queries should channel them through him so they could be clarified by Babergh.

A134 JUNCTION

Leavenheath resident and parish councillor Ben Sadler, who said he was a member of the Institute of Advanced Motorists and a qualified HGV driver, expressed his concern about the dangers of the Bear Street/A134 junction. He said vehicles were coming down Harpers Hill at 60 miles per hour and it was difficult for motorists turning out of Bear Street to judge their speed. He suggested the council should press for double white lines and a 'stop' sign at the end of Bear Street. It was agreed to discuss the issue next month.

GRIT BINS

The council heard grit heaps had been proposed for Gravel Hill and Harpers Hill at the lower end access to the Studios. New bins will be provided at the High Street end of Fen Street and the Harpers Estate/Nayland Heights junction.

Clerk Debbie Hattrell said she had tried to clarify the gritting regime. Priority one roads were Bear Street, Birch Street and Stoke Road while Horkesley Road, Court Street, High Street, Wiston Road and Bures Road were second priority, the same as last year.

HIGHWAYS

Mary George said a village sign at the junction of Mill Street, Bear Street and Birch Street had been knocked over by a lorry in June 2009. The highways department had taken until June this year to repair it but it was still missing.

STREET LIGHTING

Mrs Hattrell reported repairs to street lights, where there was a safety risk because they were too near overhead cables, could now be done by workmen with a paid EDF supervisor who could go round an area repairing several at a time.

2012 CELEBRATIONS

Hector Bunting suggested the village should start thinking about holding a special event in 2012 to celebrate the Olympic Games and Chris Hunt pointed out the community council had just agreed to hold an annual village festival. Chairman Gerry Battye added it was also Jubilee year and it was agreed to write to the community council chairman saying the subject had been raised at the parish council.

PLANNING

Reviewing planning matters, Mr Battye said listed building consent had been granted for internal alterations to 50 Bear Street to form first floor living accommodation. Other applications approved were the reduction of a mulberry tree at 4 High Street, reduction of an alder, four ash trees and a yew at 106 Bear Street. Evidence was submitted concerning a certificate of lawfulness of an existing use at Townlands Farm, Harpers Hill. There were no objections to proposed tree work at Alston Court though members agreed clear diagrams were essential to identify the trees concerned. The council accepted the continued use of land as a private croquet lawn at Perry Farmhouse, Bear Street, with a proviso that no buildings should be erected. Members also backed an application for listed building consent for internal and external alterations to 7 Fen Street.

CALEY GREEN

Mr Battye reported a change of status for Caley Green. He said over the years the open space had been managed by the parish council but the county council had now confirmed the area was part of its land bank so it was responsible for health and safety issues there.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his district council report Mr Cave said Babergh and Mid-Suffolk had agreed to a constitutional merger by 2013. The annual 'state of the district' debate was held in October and members felt the council should continue to focus on five key priorities - supporting the development of affordable housing, promoting the effective use of information management and ICT, effective partnership working, ensuring vulnerable people in the community were considered when reviewing services and continuing to support small businesses.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

County councillor James Finch distributed an explanation of the council's New Strategic Direction and an open letter to the public responding to a series of questions. He said the document explaining changes to council services was an opportunity for the council to get some feedback. A number of roadshows were also being held.

IN BRIEF

No crimes were reported from October 13 to November 7. New Hadleigh police station opening hours are 1pm to 3pm, Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Members heard Nayland Community Council had agreed to provide the village hall with a commercial dishwasher.

Mr Battye agreed to pursue his campaign urging dog owners to clear up after their pets.

BONFIRE NIGHT

Every year we report another successful Bonfire Night. We are assured by those who attend how much they enjoyed the display. This would not be possible unless we had the support of a dedicated team of helpers from the Community Council. Each year they work hard to make it a happy and safe occasion. They deserve and get our sincere thanks.

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
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



COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT Meeting: 8th November 2010 Chairman: Barry Wakefield 263116

VILLAGE FESTIVAL

The Chairman felt the event had been a grand occasion, however, some constructive criticism had been received and taken on board. The Festival committee recommended holding the event annually.

The Treasurer said that although the event made a loss of \pounds 1,804, assets in the form of electrical equipment, unsold T-shirts, glasses and stage banner where held which amounted to \pounds 2,180.

After discussion it was decided to hold another festival in July 2011 and build on the impetus gained this year. Iain Wright agreed to lead the sub-committee with the first project meeting being held before Christmas.

BONFIRE NIGHT

The Treasurer said income had been just above last year and hot dogs, sparklers, etc all sold well. He said there had been a lack of helpers and expressed thanks to Wayne for his support with manning the barbecue. He added that the barbecue equipment had been left in a filthy state by the previous organisation who used it and reminded the meeting that is should be cleaned after use.

David George pointed out more lighting was needed along the passageway for next year.

Thanks were expressed to Fred Bugg for his help once again with the bonfire.

CHRISTMAS FAMILY FAYRE

The Fayre will be held on 4 December from 12 noon to 2pm. There will be a Christmas Cracker Competition, the Primary School Choir will be performing, and Father Christmas will be in attendance.

The W.I. and HortSoc requested their usual tables. It was felt the Community Council's raffle table needed decorating to attract more customers.

Applications for tables should be submitted as soon as possible to Steve Maguire at 6 Heycroft Way (263472).

Helpers are needed from 9.30am to help set up and decorate the hall.

VILLAGE CHRISTMAS TREE

The Christmas tree will be put up on Sunday 12 December at 9.30am. Carols will be sung round the Christmas tree with Boxted Silver Band on Wednesday 22 December at 7.30pm.

GRANTS

Display Boards: A card of thanks had been received from the Art Group for funding the display boards. They will be kept in the Church Hall.

Dishwasher for the Village Hall: Iain Wright said the Village Hall Management Committee supported the provision of a dishwasher in the Village Hall and would fund installation. He had a quote of £2,620 plus VAT for an industrial dishwasher with a three minute cycle. The Community Council agreed to cover the capital cost including VAT, based on this figure but two further quotes will be obtained.

Village Hall Endowment: Andrew Gowen said their annual grant application would be withdrawn this year in view of the purchase of the dishwasher but would be requested next year. TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith reported on finances including that the Festival made a loss of £1,804.37p, Bonfire Night made a profit of £782.57p and profits from the Community Times and the calendar currently stood at £1,855.00 and £369.50p. Total unencumbered assets stood at £16,745.83p.

lain Wright felt the photographs of the Festival had been disappointing due to the quality of reproduction of the Community Times although the website version in colour had been fine.

VILLAGE CALENDAR

Lorraine Brooks said calendar sales are slower than last year, not helped by missing the opportunity of selling them at the Flower Show. The calendars are now in profit with another 170 available to sell.

It was agreed to produce a calendar for 2012.

COMMITTEE

Barry said he would not be able to continue as acting Chairman beyond the AGM. A new Chairman was needed as a matter of urgency. He added that Steve Maguire would be resigning from the Executive.

JUBILEE TREE

Barry updated the meeting that the Copper Beech had been felled but the Parish Council would be replacing it with a Hornbeam tree. Chris Hunt said this would be done within 2 years and a replacement plaque commemorating the Silver Jubilee of George V and Queen Mary placed on the site.

SOCIETY REPORTS

RBL: David George said that James Carver would be leading the church parade.

Art Group: Colin Ramsell said they have had two visiting tutors this term with 10-12 members attending regularly. Their Christmas dinner will be celebrated in January at The Lion.

Bowls: Sylvia Bond said the club are currently middle of the second division. They have attracted 3-4 new members.

Transition Nayland: Will Hitchcock said they have some new members and Jules Pretty has become patron of the group.

They are in discussions with the Primary School about installation of a solar scheme on the school roof.

HortSoc: Lorraine Brooks said in September they had visited Place for Plants and organised a Flower Festival in St James Church. Donations from this raised £150 to benefit St Helena Hospice and East Anglian Children's Hospice.

In October a talk on *Vegetable Growing* proved popular and they planted native daffodils on Caley Green and Parker's Way entrance – these will put on a show to mark HortSoc's 30th anniversary in 2011.

On 11 November at the joint meeting with Conservation Society Colin Hawes will be talking about Stag Beetles and they will have a stall at the Christmas Fayre.

HortSoc now has a website: www.naylandhortsoc.org.uk.

Their coach outing in June 2011 would be to Great Dixter and Merriments Gardens in East Sussex.

Conservation Society: Jill Badman said they too will be at the Joint meeting – where they will be displaying their recent purchase of David May postcards. Some of these have been produced as greetings cards and will be available at the meeting or from the Post Office and Forget Me Not.

They now have a website: www.naylandconservation.org.uk.

Fundraising Committee: Jill said they had made about £600 at the NSPCC Coffee Morning on 30th October and had 2 big boxes of toys for the children.

They were organising a Frank Sinatra Evening with a supper on 20th November and there were a few tickets left.

Women's Institute: Elizabeth Wakefield was pleased to say that they had some new members. They had a very interesting and informative outing to the recycling centre at Great Blakenham.

Their AGM will be held on 15th November and they will be having a stall at the Christmas Fayre.

Woodland Corner: Tricia Hall said they had a very successful cake stall in September making £174. The Duck Race at the Festival sold out and they gave £46 to the Community Council.

They are having a sponsored Pedal, Push and Scoot this week and will have their usual tombola at the Christmas Fayre. **Parish Council:** Chris Hunt said there was nothing to report. Lorraine reminded him that readers of the Community Times had requested advice on clearing snow for an autumn issue.

Village Players: Bryan Smith said they were rehearsing for *The Holly and The Ivy*, which was a Christmas tale with a difference. Performances were on 9, 10 and 11 December at 8pm in the Village Hall. Tickets are available at the Post Office. **NEXT MEETINGS**

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

HortSoc now has a website at www.naylandhortsoc.org.uk that has all our up-to-date news, details of membership, events, show schedules and show results, photos and archives. The Society will be celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2011. To help mark this landmark year we held a **daffidil planting morning** on Saturday 9th October. A group of members, watched by a few supporters, planted 230 native daffodils on Caley Green and the triangular green adjacent Bear Street. A small amount of top-up planting was done on the green-space at the entrance to

Parkers Way. We will have to wait until spring to see the benefits but in the meantime the photograph here and those on the website show some of the bulb planters in action.

Our **autumn speaker**, **Peter Morris FNVS**, was greeted to the Church Hall on 19th October during a power cut! After initial concerns it was decided to go ahead with an intimate candlelit talk but luckily the power came back on and Peter was able to use his slide projector to illustrate his vast experience of growing vegetables.

During this very interesting talk Peter demonstrated the techniques of growing vegetables in deep beds as well as traditional methods. Many of us were amazed by the amount of produce that could be grown in a small space with planning and crop rotation, and by the lack of weeds – there just wasn't room for any! He also demonstrated how to reclaim an allotment and how to grow and show vegetables and revealed a few tips on presentation.

The evening ended with a free raffle of the fantastic selection of produce Peter had brought along and he also gave out some shallot sets and seed potatoes, which could give the recipients an advantage at next year's Flower Show - if they heed his advice!

The joint meeting with the Conservation Society on 9th November was another enjoyable and enlightening evening. Colin Hawes gave a fascinating insight into the spectacular Stag Beetle, Lucanus cervus, which is a protected species in the UK.

As stag beetles prefer the areas of Britain which have the highest temperatures, lowest rainfall and areas near to a river Nayland is an ideal location to spot them during their short adult life between May and August. They prefer woodland edges, hedgerows and gardens with light soils as females have to dig down to bury their eggs and newly emerging adults have to find their way to the surface.

Astonishingly, their life cycle lasts 6 or 7 years with much of it spent underground.

We can help stag beetles by leaving old stumps and deadwood, building log piles and using untreated woodchip mulches. Further information and links can be found our website or *www.greatstaghunt.org.* Colin would be pleased to hear of your sightings via www.boxvalley.co.uk/nature/sns/ org/sns.asp.

This has been an exciting period for the Society with the visit of John Constable and his family on the occasion of the Bicentenary of the Nayland Altarpiece in September, as well as the exhibition and associated leaflet (which is now available in church).

The first set of cards from the recently acquired collection of old Nayland and Wiston postcards is now available price £3.50 (including envelopes) from the Post Office, Forget Me Not, Mill House and 17 Fen Street. They offer a unique view of bygone days and make ideal gifts and cards to send for that special occasion. We will also be selling them at the Christmas Fayre on December 4th.

He told us that Stag Beetle grubs prefer to hibernate in dead deciduous wood as well as the stumps of garden shrubs. It can take up to 6 years before the adult beetles emerge in mid to late May, to mate, lay their eggs and die. Log piles, untreated woodchips or vegetable compost containing sawdust make good habitats in the garden.

And finally, a huge debt of thanks is due to Loraine for all her help and expertise in setting up the Society's website. It was quite a challenge to fit in all the many and varied achievements and activities of the Society since 1974. We had no idea so much had been accomplished!

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

Plants that flower in late Autumn are always useful, and the OM/S grows a couple that are doing particularly well at the time of writing. Liriope Muscari is the first with its straplike evergreen leaves and spikes of blue flowers which resemble Grape Hyacinths, hence its scientific name. The second one is Saxifraga Fortunei. For those who think of Saxifrages as mossy alpines that flower in Spring, this is something entirely different. From clump-forming rootstock fleshy green leaves, which are shiny and red underneath appear in Spring. In late Autumn it produces panicles of small moth-like flowers which show up against a dark background. The first severe frost will reduce them to a mush, but the rootstock is perfectly hardy. It prefers a dampish situation, and protection from the midday sun.

Another useful late flowerer is Crocus Speciosus, the true Autumn Crocus. It flowers in October but the foliage doesn't appear until Spring. It doesn't open fully on dull days, but if picked and brought indoors will open in a warm room, is surprisingly large and lasts in water for several days.

Whilst trying to eradicate a patch of Ground Elder recently, the OM/S inadvertently used the wrong weedkiller and killed the surrounding grass. With this lesson in mind he thought it worthwhile to talk about the various types of weedkillers.

Firstly there are the brushwood killers which will dispose of brambles, nettles, and so forth, and if poured into holes drilled into tree stumps will destroy them. They are sold under various names, such as, Round Up, Root Out and Weedex.

Secondly, there are the systemic weedkillers which when applied to foliage are taken ip and passed down to the roots, which die. Examples are Glyphosate and Weedol.

Pathclear sold for gravel drives and paths, is a mixture of Weedol and Weedex.

Lastly, there are the selective weedkillers. This is what the OM/S meant to use on the Ground Elder. They settle on the flat leaves of weeds and kill them, leaving the fine leaved grasses unharmed.

All the above are poisonous, and deaths have resulted when gardeners have decanted a solution into a lemonade bottle and left it in a garden shed where someone has subsequently discovered and drunk it.

It has been decided to replace the recently felled Jubilee Beech with a Hornbeam. This is a good choice; hornbeams never reach a great height, produce good Autumn colour and when young retain their leaves in winter.

Finally Holly. If you want berries for Christmas, pick some now and keep it in a plastic sack. If you wait until then, the birds will get there first.

CHARLES GUMM –

HIS STORY LIVES ON

The young American fighter pilot who crashed his plane and died in Nayland in 1944 will never be forgotten by the few residents left who witnessed the tragedy and also by the whole village on each year's Remembrance Day. His story has recently been told once again in an article in an American newspaper, a copy of which was sent to me by a former Nayland resident:

In 1942, shortly after America entered World War II, Spokane's Charles F "Chuck" Gumm stepped away from his studies at Gonzaga University - and into history. Enlisting in the US Army Air Force, he joined the 355th Fighter Squadron's 354th Fighter Group, the famed Pioneer Mustang Group. Already married to his high school sweetheart Muriel "Toni" Wiley, he was stationed in England [at Boxted Airfield] where he became a pilot of the P-51 Mustang, the new long-range, single-engine fighter aircraft which would wreak havoc in the skies over Europe.

On 16th December 1943 Lt Gumm became the first P-51 pilot to down an enemy plane. Two months later he became the first ace of the 354^{th} Fighter Group – an ace being a pilot who has downed five or more enemy aircraft. On his plane he had written "My Toni", the name of both the wife and baby daughter waiting for him back in Spokane.

On lst March 1944, Gumm, the group's leading ace (with 7.5 kills to his credit) took a P-51 Mustang up for a test flight. The plane lost power just after takeoff, right over the town of Nayland, England. Newspaper accounts at the time quoted Nayland residents who observed what happened next. Clearly Gumm had time to eject but he remained with the aircraft, successfully steering it away from the populated town. As he struggled to keep the plane aloft until he cleared the town a wing clipped a tree in an open field just beyond the houses, the plane flipped over and Gumm was thrown from the cockpit and killed. He was 23 years old.

In his brief career Lt Gumm received the air medal with three oak leaf clusters and posthumous awards of the silver star, the soldier's medal and the distinguished flying cross for gallantry in action. He lies buried in Spokane's Greenwood Memorial Terrace under a government-issue military headstone.

So moved were the residents of Nayland for how this American flyer sacrificed himself to save many of them that a memorial plaque was commissioned and installed at a bench at St James' churchyard in the town and the town began sending a memorial red poppy to Gumm's widow each Christmas.

The townspeople lobbied for years to have his name added to the Village War Memorial there, finally succeeding in 2001, when a new memorial bench was erected in the centre of the village to replace the original one in the churchyard.

After her husband's death, Gumm's wife Toni and daughter remained in Spokane. She later married Duke Shearin who

had been in her husband's squadron. "When Duke and I married, it was Chuck's father who walked me down the aisle" said Toni Shearin, 88, who currently lives in Albuquerque, NM. Now widowed, she and her second husband went on to have two children and experienced a long and satisfying career in the military.

By phone recently she recalled her early years with her first love, who she pointed out was a distant cousin of the entertainer Judy Garland (whose real name was Frances Gumm). The two of them met as high schoolers and attended the same church and sang together in the choir. She recalled that he would often go to Felts Field, where he first learned to fly. She said he was actually a very gentle man who never looked for battles or trouble. "Still, his friends told me, that when he got into combat he became a real tiger."

After her husband died she, too, took flying lessons at Felts. "I wanted to know why he was so in love with flying. And I did understand. You can release completely. You are just free, the quiet, the peace and the control. It's just wonderful up there".

When she and her second husband were stationed in Europe, she was able to visit Nayland and met many wonderful people there. "I still receive a red poppy from them every Christmas", she said, "and I still have all the ones that have been sent to me over all these years."

The original bench still stands in the cemetery at Bear Street but the brass plagues were removed and attached to the new bench which stands beside the High Street war memorial. Lt Gumm's name does not appear on the war memorial as stated in the report but was added to the Roll of Honour in St James' church. Every year, on Remembrance Day, the Boxted Airfield Historical Group places a wreath on the seat in memory of Charles Gumm.

NAYLAND POST OFFICE

It may just have escaped many people's notice that this year marks the centenary of the Nayland Post Office in its current building in the High Street, an anniversary surely worth remembering.

The history of the postal service in Nayland goes back several hundred years but it was Alfred Littlebury who was responsible for moving the Post Office to its present site back in 1910. The premises had been used by many different shops and businesses but when Alfred bought it from the Roberts family it was a coffee tavern. His father. William. a shoemaker. was Postmaster before him when the Post Office was in Court Street, at what is now Kerridge's butcher's shop. The Littlebury family kept the Post Office in Nayland for almost a hundred years.

Before the Littleburys, at the beginning of the nineteenth century, the Postmaster was Thomas Marshall, a tailor by trade, who lived in what is now 17 Court Street and it was his sole duty to deal with the mail at his cottage home which was known as the "Receiving House". Thomas Marshall would have sold stamps to the public for the first time in 1840 when adhesive postage stamps were introduced.

In March 2011 Patsie Ford will be celebrating 30 years as our Postmistress. She took over from Mick Hines in 1981 and has expanded the Post Office and shop into the treasure trove it is today. As well as being a mine of information and providing postal services and delivery of mail and newspapers, the Post Office is a meeting place and a focal point of the whole community.

More than ever in the current financial climate, local shops and businesses need our support, and the old slogan of USE IT OR LOSE IT is even more appropriate today. Many villages have lost their Post Offices and we do not want to see this happen in Nayland, so let's now celebrate the long history of our Post Office with many congratulations to Patsie and her staff from us all!

This had by now grown to a considerable height and in order to enable an aging workforce to keep it cut, it has been decided to reduce its height by about 5 feet.


Fred Bugg generously agreed to do this work free of charge, and the brushwood went to augment the bonfire.

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JUBILEE TREE FELLING

A landmark copper beech tree which has stood in Bear Street, Nayland, for 75 years was felled on Tuesday, September 28.

Known as the Jubilee tree, it was planted on the old village cattle pound in 1935 to commemorate the silver jubilee of King George V and Queen Mary and was a familiar part of the street scene.

Signs of decay were first found several years ago and a recent electronic test revealed a large cavity in one part of the trunk with serious deterioration.

The parish council decided the 50ft beech, next door to the primary school, was a potential risk and would have to come down.

Chairman Gerry Battye, who watched with a few villagers as the first branches were felled, said: "It's very sad to see after 75 years. It's been a wonderful tree but it's past its prime and we couldn't afford for it to be a risk to the public. We plan to replace it and are taking advice from the contractors Suffolk Tree Services."

A slice of the trunk was requested by the council who will hand it over to Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society for safe keeping.



REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICE

Parishioners young and old filled St James's Church, Nayland, for the Remembrance Day service on November 14.

Royal British Legion standard-bearers Jim Turner and Kathy Hunt led the procession into the church followed by those carrying wreaths, Brownies and Guides.

The service was led by Rev Canon David Atkins who, in his address, stressed both the importance of personal memories and remembering all those who had died in past and more recent conflicts, irrespective of nationality.

Senior member of the ministry team Ken Willingale gave the exhortation and read the roll of honour listing all the local servicemen lost in World Wars I and II. James Carver, who was in charge of the parade, read the lesson.

After the service the congregation filed outside to the village war memorial where wreaths were laid by Shirley Scarlett and Steve Maguire for the legion, parish council chairman Gerry Battye, Nayland firefighter Shane Gladwell, Roger Brown of Boxted Airfield Historical Society, Isabel Brinkley for the Brownies and Hannah Burgin for the Guides.

Earlier, a brief service at St Mary's, Wiston, was conducted by David Pryor and wreaths were laid by Gerald Knox and Gerry Battye. Bugler Bill Slark sounded Last Post and Reveille at both locations.

On Armistice Day, November 11, a group of villagers led by Mr Willingale gathered at the Nayland war memorial to observe two minutes silence.

GRITTING THIS WINTER

The County Council has confirmed that this winter the A134, Bear Street, Birch Street and Stoke Road remain a primary gritting route and these will be treated on any occasion ice or snow is forecast to be a hazard. Horkesley Road, Court Street, High Street and Mill Street, Wiston Road and Bures Road, remain secondary gritting routes and will be treated if snow or ice is forecast to persist for much of the day or shorter term conditions will be severe. Full details can be found on ELGIN access via www.suffolk.gov.uk.

The Parish Council is purchasing two new grit bins. One will be for the entrance to Fen Street and the other near the garages on Harpers Estate for use also by Heights residents. Other grit heaps will also be supplied and replenished by the County Council in existing locations.

The County Council have responded to public concerns about liability for clearing snow and spreading grit as follows: -

Last winter the public were concerned that if they helped to clear snow they may have been liable for third party claims. The County Council has confirmed that a person clearing snow and spreading grit will only be liable for an accident, if their efforts actually make the situation worse. Where the Parish Council keeps a list of named volunteers, these people can be covered under the terms of the County Council's Public Liability Insurance.

So, if you would like to volunteer to assist with snow clearing and grit spreading this winter – please telephone the Clerk who will keep a list of named volunteers. By giving your name to the Clerk, you will be under no obligation to assist, but will be covered if you do, as stated by the County Council.

Kit's Farewell Service

There were warm tributes plus a few tears at St James' Church. Nayland, when the priest-in-charge, the Rev Kit Gray, conducted her last morning service on Sunday, October 3.

The parish's first woman priest, Miss Gray retired on October 31 after 10 years at Nayland and Wiston.

After the service she was presented with a cheque and a wrought-iron bird bath on behalf of Nayland parishioners.

Senior member of the ministry team Ken Willingale recalled he was the first person to meet her when she came to be interviewed and he had not been disappointed.

The Constable bi-centenary exhibition staged in St James' Church during the Nayland village festival was much appreciated, members of Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society heard at its October meeting. Chairman John Alexander said the entire display, sponsored by the society, was put together by its secretary Andora Carver and he thanked her and everyone involved in setting it up.

A special presentation on the Sunday evening had included two of the artist's male descendants - his great great great grandson and his son, both called John, and it was marvellous they should both have been there.

Arising from that celebration the society had prepared a leaflet on the history of the Constable painting which was on sale in the church and funds generated would go to St James.

DIGITAL TV SWITCHOVER

Minimising the potential for negative environmental effects

What will happen?

The switchover from analogue to digital TV in the Anglia TV region takes place in July 2011 (for south Suffolk) and November 2011 (for north Suffolk).

To keep your TV service, you will need to convert your existing TVs to digital before the switchover date, if you haven't done so already. Cable and satellite services are not affected by the switchover.

This does not mean that you will have to get rid of your old set as almost any TV can be converted simply by adding a digital box, even a black and white one, so there is no need to buy a new TV unless you want to. As well as avoiding the unnecessary waste created by replacing a perfectly good TV, converting your existing TV can be a far cheaper way of adapting to the switchover, as digital boxes are available from around £20 though as with actual TVs, prices vary depending on the product.

What if my TV cannot be upgraded?

If however you are planning to replace your TV, for instance because it no longer works and cannot be repaired, or it is not possible to convert your existing TV to receive the digital signal by the addition of a digital box, try to buy one that is energy efficient - look out for the Energy Saving Trust's 'Recommended' logo.



If you still do decide to get rid of an old TV that is in good working order, you could offer it to a friend, or offer it via a reuse network such as Freecycle (http://www.freecycle.org) or Freegle (http://www.ilovefreegle.org)

Alternatively, you can take your old set for recycling, free of charge, to the Household Waste Recycling Centres at Bramford, Brome, Chelmondiston, Hadleigh, Stowmarket and Sudbury. You could also ask the supplier delivering your new TV if they have a service for taking the old one away, or you can arrange for Mid Suffolk and Babergh Waste Services to collect it at a cost of £22 (0845 606 6045)

Do not dump your old TV - flytipping is a criminal offence.

On 27 March 2011 all residential households in the United Kingdom will be taking part in a census. Since 1801 (apart from in 1941 during the war) a



The census statistics feed into resource allocation for local authorities and play a major part in their ability to provide local services, so it is crucial the population estimate is as accurate as possible. When the questionnaire envelope comes through the door you'll easily recognise it by the purple 2011 Census logo. Take care of it. If, like many people, you want to complete the questionnaire online, your individual internet code is on the front of the questionnaire.




