NAYLAND VILLAGE HALL NEEDS YOU

The Village Hall Management committee is losing it Booking Secretary and two of its Trustees and is desperate for replacements to be in place by its AGM in March.

The committee is planning to develop it's own web site for booking the hall which is intended to reduce the booking secretary's load. The Hall would be willing to provide a computer and a broadband connection to anybody willing to take on this important role. The system will never be as fully automatic as the airline booking systems but it should make life easier and could enable the job to be shared between two people.

We are also looking for a trustee who would take on the role of energy conservation in the hall. The hall offers an ideal 'test bed' for energy saving and generation for which grants are available. It would enable people in the village to see some these systems working before they consider such ideas themselves. This could be an exciting interest for a more technically aware member of the Village.

We are also looking for somebody to take on the role of fundraising for the hall. As time goes by the maintenance costs on the hall will increase and it is unlikely that we shall ever raise sufficient from hiring charges to cover the full cost of running the hall.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 9th December 2009

ALLOTMENTS

Nayland Parish Council will decide in January whether to create four more full-size allotments alongside the present ones, a 50 per cent increase. The council currently receives an allowance from Defra for the rest of its allotment field and is waiting to hear how much money it would lose. Whatever the outcome, councillors agreed at their December meeting to make a decision next month. Chairman Gerry Battye said Will Hitchcock of Transition Nayland had offered to provide machinery and labour to create and harrow the new full-size plots. Members heard there were now seven people on the waiting list.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his report, county councillor James Finch said the first consultation period for the school re-organisation review was closing on December 18. The main issue locally was Stoke by Nayland Middle School and a pressure group was trying to retain it as an educational building in some form or another.

Another issue was the new corridor of pylons proposed by National Grid to run from Bramford, near Ipswich, to Twinstead. He said he had attended several consultation meetings and was in close contact with the Groton Pylon Alliance which involved about 13 parishes. One special concern was keeping the pylons away from the northern part of Boxford. Mr Finch said he was gathering views all the time and urged people to write to National Grid with a copy to him.

In Nayland, building work had started on the new fire station which was ahead of schedule and Court Street had been properly resurfaced.

POLICING

PCSO Amanda Coleman reported one crime on November 25 when thieves broke into a car in Bear Street and stole a handbag and laptop. She added a new local police constable would be starting in January.

PRECEPT BUDGET

Following a discussion on the details of a precept working party meeting it was agreed unanimously to ask for a £32,500 precept for the financial year 2010/11, a 1.9 per cent increase. Chris Hunt said the council provided services to "keep the village as we want it but it is a delicate balance making sure we get the services people expect."

TREES

Members heard the council had received an independent report from John Moore Tree Services with a list of work that needed doing and levels of risk. The council will decide in January on getting quotes for tree work, initially on Caley Green and Webb's Meadow.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Mr Battye said there had been some delay on the proposed affordable housing project in Wiston Road. A noise impact assessment had to be made following a request from Nayland Flying Club and it would be February or March before there was any progress.

VILLAGE HALL

Reporting on the village hall, Rosemary Knox said only six people had attended the last village hall cinema showing but the new projection equipment was very superior. She added organiser Christine Thompson was always happy to receive suggestions for films and the next one would be *Notes on a Scandal* starring Judi Dench on January 29. She said the hall committee had had to buy a new oil tank and would be grateful for financial help. The council agreed to pay the total £1,983 cost from its capital investment fund.

PARISH COUNCIL VACANCY

Abbi Knight tendered her resignation from the council after ten-and-a-half years, saying she found it difficult to keep up with council business combined with a new full-time job and was moving away from Nayland in the future. She was thanked by Mr Battye on the council's behalf. The vacancy means a new member may be co-opted or a by-election held if ten or more people want one.

HIGHWAYS


Mr Battye reported the temporary closure of Cawley Road from January 25 to March 14 with an alternative route via Campions Lane and Bures Road. Rosemary Knox said a pothole was being created by a land drain at the Cawley Road/Bures Road junction.

IN BRIEF

The council agreed to proposals by Farrans Ltd, as previously notifed, to supply fencing and gates for the play area of the recreation ground.

It was agreed Mr Battye should meet Stoke by Nayland Parish Council chairman Adam Sedgwick by to sure both councils were pulling in the same direction on HGVs.

There were no objections to an application for listed building consent for external and internal alternations at Dresden Cottage, Birch Street.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 13th January 2010

ALLOTMENTS

Nayland Parish Council has agreed to provide four new allotments which will complete its waiting list. A request for extra allotments was made last August by Transition Nayland and the council wanted to ensure it would not lose too much income, currently paid for the rest of the allotment field by two government grants. Chairman Gerry Battye told the January meeting about £138 would be lost annually but members felt that would be offset by the extra rental income.

The council voted unanimously to go ahead with digging and harrowing four new plots, subject to the contractor having the correct public liability insurance. Mr Battye said the allotments would be divided into one whole and six half plots, to be taken up by the seven people on the waiting list.

A statement from Transition Nayland said afterwards: "We're delighted that through working with the parish council we've been able to gain more allotments for the village.

"Local food production is at the heart of transition as well as being an issue which is increasingly relevant on a national scale. It's great more people are interested in growing their own and hopefully more will follow suit."

The council's allotment sub-committee will meet contractor Hector Bunting and Transition Nayland on site before the new plots are dug.

FIRE STATION

Two senior officers from Suffolk Fire and Rescue Service attended the meeting to update members on Nayland's part-time retained crew and progress on the new fire station. Deputy chief officer Gary Phillips said negative press reports last August about Nayland having insufficient fire cover had affected morale. Changing work patterns in villages meant it was not possible for retained stations to provide seven-day 24hour cover and 100 per cent cover by part-time crews could not be guaranteed during the day. He said Nayland dealt with about 50 incidents a year and since the negative publicity availability of its fire appliance had been good. He added the new building was progressing well and he wanted villagers to use its meeting room for the wellbeing of the community.

Local district manager Ken Williamson said the new station was due to be completed in October. It was being built on the site of the old caretaker's house and the old station would eventually be demolished to become a forecourt. The station now had its full complement of 11 crew, a good mix of people who worked well together and also did a lot in the community. The officers agreed morale had been restored and the new station would be fantastic. A consultation document with 27 recommendations is being circulated so councillors can add their comments.

POLICING

Nayland's new police officer, PC Chris Garrod, told members he covered various villages around Hadleigh and wanted to focus on the community side. In due course, he said, police response units would be moved to centralised hubs in Sudbury and Ipswich. There were two crimes in Nayland in December. A car left in a remote place was stolen and later found burnt out. The other incident was a domestic issue which turned out to be a non-crime. Responding to complaints about motorists parking on village pavements and on double yellow lines, PC Garrod said he would log offending cars and keep a record. Any calls to him should go through the main police switchboard in Ipswich (01473 613500).

HIGHWAYS

With road gritting fresh in councillors' minds, Mr Battye said the wintry conditions had been exceptional. Roads in the village centre were treated and Gravel Hill was cleared by the Bugg family. County councillor James Finch said most people were grateful for the way the council had dealt with keeping main roads open. It had spent £1million on salt and grit since December 17 and he had written to the western area manager to thank him. The council agreed unanimously to ask South Suffolk MP Tim Yeo to call for legislation to be changed so people can clear pavements outside their properties without being liable to litigation if someone slips. Mary George said pavements had been lethal and she could not remember them being so bad for so long. In years gone by householders did it automatically but were no longer inclined to do so.

Councillors are to check existing grit bins and will let the clerk know if any need filling.

PARISH COUNCILLOR VACANCY

With the resignation of Abbi Knight there is a vacancy on the council and if fewer than ten people request a by-election in the 14 days after January 11 the council will be looking co-opt a new member.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his report district councillor Richard Cave said Babergh would be reviewing its communication links with its waste collection contractor after people were given different messages in recent weeks over when to leave bins out. After giving an update on the local government review he said there was talk of councils merging. Babergh and mid-Suffolk were considering merging services after seeing how well the joint waste contract was working. **TREES**

Chris Hunt gave a detailed report on the safety management plan for trees in the village covering the cemetery, the Jubilee tree, Caley Green, the playing field and Candy Lane. It was agree to obtain quotes from three contractors for the work.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his report Mr Finch said he had been gathering information from constituents over the National Grid proposals to erect a line of high voltage pylons from Bramford to Twinstead and passing it to the county council. After considering the plans parish councillors agreed they wanted the cables to go underground and failing that felt the pylon route should run along the line of the existing pylons.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications, Mr Battye said listed building consent for external redecoration at Butchers, Bear Street, had been granted. Following an application for a Certificate of Lawfulness for an existing use of land as garden to the rear of Perry Farmhouse, Bear Street, councillors submitted their response with evidence of how the land had been used. **IN BRIEF:**

Tribute was paid to former parish councillor David Hussey who died recently. Mr Battye said he was an urbane, charming man who was a great asset during his time on the council.

Former village hall bookings secretary Diana Whiting will receive a Babergh community achievement award at the presentation in March.

Two councillors will look into the cost of new playground equipment to be financed by a £1,900 grant from Babergh.

The Annual Parish Assembly will be held on Monday 26th April.

CHRISTMAS ACTIVITIES

Members felt the new format Christmas Fayre had been a success and thanks were expressed to Steve Maguire who led the organisation of the event. Suggestions for next year were having it over 2 hours and advertising the times that Father Christmas would be in his grotto.

The Village Christmas tree had once again been a very attractive feature.

AUTUMN EVENTS

Barry Wakefield recapped on the successful autumn village events, confirming that Nayland was a thriving community.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith gave his draft end of year financial report. Most notable was the success of the village calendar. He concluded the Community Council currently had unencumbered assets of £18,985.88p.

GRANTS

Following an application for a grant to replace the carpet on the stage of the Village Hall, it was agreed to fund this. The first quote had been $\pounds 1275$.

It was also agreed to grant £500 to Transition Nayland. This would be used as working capital to help get the group established and gain momentum.

CORRESPONDENCE

An open invitation had been received to a social evening on 27 January to raise awareness of the Youth Club.

COMMUNITY TIMES

Lorraine Brooks said the current issue was filling rapidly with lots of village activities. Barry Wakefield said he would follow up on a possible new distribution leader.

VILLAGE FESTIVAL WEEKEND

Barry Wakefield reported on the progress made by the sub-committee. The event would be held on Friday 17 and Saturday 18 September and would coincide with the Church's Constable Celebration and Harvest Festival on Sunday 19 September.

He outlined current suggestions for the event which include on Friday evening a opening event such as a film or dance. Saturday's events may include the duck race and a picture quiz by the Conservation Society. There could also be a main event in the Village Hall with an open air stage involving local music and dramatic talent and outside bands. Stalls, including food stalls would be included and hog roast organised by Transition Nayland. Over the weekend there would be an art display by the Art Group and a flower festival in the church organised by the Horticultural Society. The conclusion to the event may be the release of floating Chinese lanterns.

It was felt further discussion was needed on the financial aspect of including an open air stage and how the costs may be recovered. The Festival committee would meet again on 10 February at Parker's, Bear Street.

VILLAGE CALENDAR

Thanks were expressed to all those who helped in the production and sales of the calendar, including the Post Office, Hatten's Stores and Forget Me Not.

Plans are underway for the next calendar and the competition to generate the photographs will be held on 3 May. It was agreed to open the competition up this year to include residents of Nayland with Wissington and those who work in the parish or are active members of parish societies.

SOCIETY REPORTS

Bowls: Sylvia bond said they were currently in the middle of Division 1 of the Winter League.

HortSoc: Lorraine Brooks reported that their schedule for the year had been finalised with some new ventures planned. The first being a Spring Show on 27 March. They were organising two outings, the first to RHS Wisley on 10 June

would be open to non members, and on 6 July members would visit Kings Seeds. They are extending circulation of the Summer Show schedule which they hope will generate more entries to the show which will be held on 14 August.

Village Players: Jenny Smith reported on the huge success of their last production, 'Oliver'. Their spring production will be 'Harvey' to be performed on 22-24 April.

Transition Nayland: Will Hitchcock reported a good number of completed surveys had been submitted, the energy monitors are all loaned out, and they have established a recycling box for batteries in the Post Office. They are still waiting for the result of their application to the Parish Council for more allotments. They are planning films on 19 Feb and 19 March.

Conservation Society: Jill Badman said the AGM will be on 9 March when Barry Garnham will be speaking on Stained Glass. New members would be welcome.

W.I.: Wendy Sparrow said that their stall at the Christmas Fayre had done well. Unfortunately due to the snow their December meeting with Country Dancing was cancelled. At their next meeting on 18 January John Partrige would be their speaker.

Choir: Teresa Moriarty said their spring concert would be on 20 March. Emma Bishton would be their guest conductor and music would include traditional and British songs and folk songs. New members are welcome.

Youth Club: Teresa Moriarty said the spring programme has been set up. They need more youth members and more committee members.

Woodland Corner: Tricia Hall said their Christmas activities went well and they had an interesting visit to the Nursing Home.

Hazel Gardiner suggested that funding a dishwasher in the Village Hall would be of great benefit to many societies.

Future meetings will be held on 12 May, 7 July, 23 August, 8 November and 10 January 2011.


Thank You


NAYLAND ST. JAMES CHURCH FETE Monday 31st May 2010

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

TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 2009 ACCOUNTS (PROVISIONAL)

I am delighted to report that the Village Hall has had a successful year showing a net surplus of some £3186 compared to a deficit of £2796 last year. This could not have been achieved without the support of members of the village hiring the hall, the Village Societies and grants from the Parish Council and the Community Council.

With the help of a National Lottery grant we have acquired a cinema system which is installed in the Meeting Room above the bar and projects onto a raised screen above the stage. This gives a perfect view to everybody seated in the hall. We hope to provide an interesting programme of films in the coming year which will help increase income.

We have also upgraded the water heating system by providing separate sink heaters in the kitchen which will reduce the cost of providing hot water. With the help of a Parish Council grant we have replaced the central heating Oil Tank.

Some Statistics from 2009 (2008 figures in brackets)

- Hired out for some 1294 (1217)hours
- Village users had it for 81.6%(85%) of the time; outsiders 18.4%(15%)
- Assuming the hall is available for 12 hours a day 365 days of the year; the usage average is 29% (27%). The percentage usage in the evenings is much higher.
- Normal everyday expenditure for the year excluding grounds and one off maintenance/projects is £15,338 (£12,483). So each hour of letting costs us £11.80(£10.26). This increase reflects the ageing of the hall and the increased cost of maintenance.
- This is considerably more than the hourly rate we charge our own societies and your Committee must consider raising the hiring charges from 1 April 2010.
- The Hall cannot survive without special fundraising such as the plant stall raising £1020, Village Lunches (£515), Parish Council and Community Council grants, Class Acts Revue (£587), Local Lottery and donations from other Societies like the Youth Club.
- From 1 April 2010 the Hall is required to pay rates of £507 a year; a new cost caused by Babergh's need to balance its budget.

Garden Notes

A few weeks ago the OM/S wrote a short article for the journal of a small society to which he belongs. In it he listed the plants still in flower here on that day; quite a few including some unexpected subjects, as well as the usual suspects.

Two days later the weather broke, and at the time of writing (mid January) none of them is still in flower. He wonders, moreover if some of the unexpected names will survive.

One example was the beautiful Abutilon Vitifolium, and early summer bloomer which probably wouldn't have been seen out in the open in East Anglia fifty years ago. Recent mild winters may have enabled it to build up some resistance, but one wonders whether recent snow and ice will do for it.

It hasn't taken long for the Winter Aconite (Eranthis Hiemalis) to appear and the OM/S makes no apology for repeating himself on this beautiful little flower. This has no connection with Aconitum, or Monkshood, a blue flowered herbaceous perennial with poisonous leave and roots, but grows from soil coloured corms which are almost invisible once it has died down. It grows everywhere here, even in gravel paths, and increases by seed. It can also be dug up and moved even when in full flower.

Some years ago the OM/S was surprised when his (free) offer to readers produced precisely one reply; but perhaps this was just an indication of the extent of his readership! The offer is open again, and anyone who has blown his cover need only ring up and ask. He has already agreed to replace a large clump in a Colchester garden where they were dug up and destroyed by the gardener who said he thought they were Ground Elder.

Reverting to the recent bad weather, with possibly more to come, one wonders if there will be casualties; the OM/S was advised many years ago not to give up hope on trees and shrubs, but to wait until June before disposing of the corpse.

NAYLAND'S MILLS - PART TWO

Like much of Nayland's past the origins of its mills are shrouded in mystery. However, there is no doubt that milling was going on here before Domesday in 1086, centuries before the village we know today was built. The first known reference to a mill is in Little Domesday Book, the last part of the Domesday survey consisting of Essex, Suffolk and Norfolk, which was never incorporated into the final book. The record states:

"At Eiland [Nayland] the same Robert, father of Suane, held in King Edwards time two carrucates of land as a manor with Soche. Always six villans. Then twenty bordars now seventeen. Then six slaves now two. Always one plough team in demesne. Then four plough teams belonging to the men now three. Always one mill ..."


Whether the mill on the corner of Fen Street and Mill Street is that referred to in Domesday is not known. The next known reference to a Nayland mill is provided by Dr Slade in his history of Nayland where he mentions a record dated 1415 which says that "this Henry Scrope held Nayland Manor and a water mill parcel thereof ..." More than two centuries later a reference to the present site in a deed dated 1674 refers to "the corn mill next to the road to the fennages".

Following the decline in the wool trade Nayland's prosperity increased through its subsequent industrialisation. This largely came about as a result of the Stour Navigation Act in 1705 when may kinds of goods were transported by barge traffic on the river. Corn milling expanded and Charles Gowing [1846-1934] remembered his father saying that when he worked at Nayland mill he had sent 1000 sacks of flour to London in a week. Barges came up the millstream to the mill where a gantry had been built across the road to facilitate loading. This disappeared when the top storeys of the mill were taken down around 1920.

Sometime after 1415 a second mill must have been built as a deed of 1613 refers to the conveyance of a property "lying between the **two mills** at Nayland ... " This second mill which disappeared around 1850 was on the corner of Mill Street and Bear Street. In a conveyance of 1823 it was described as a corn mill formerly called the leather mill. On old maps of Nayland the stream running through this mill can be clearly seen to the north of the mill street mills the other stream. It appears to be as wide as the Fen Street stream, running behind the houses in Birch street and meeting the other stream at the bottom of Fen Street. It was eventually piped and covered in. It is possible that the mill on this site could have been Nayland's first mill and the Fen Street mill came later but unless we can locate any older maps we will probably never know.

At the end of the eighteenth century the two mills were taken over by the Stammers family who were prosperous millers owning mills all over Essex and Suffolk. In the early part of the nineteenth century the Fen Street mill was "re-edified" or more or less rebuilt by the Stammers. On the 1839 Tithe Map William Stammers was listed as owning both mills and also a Steam Flour Mill in Fen Street opposite the corn mill. This mill operating at least from 1821 was reputed to be one of the first in England but was not very successful.

Jeremiah Stannard who owned Wissington Mill acquired the mill at the corner of Fen Street from William Stammers in



1846. During the 1870s several of the more enterprising millers were induced to adopt a new method of manufacture. They discarded their millstone plants and installed complete roller milling plants of Hungarian origin. However all these mills were disappointing in their results and proved commercial failures. The machinery was complicated and unsuitable for any but a particular class of wheat and the mills were unable to make a sufficient percentage of high grade flour.

It was during Jeremiah Stannard's ownership that corn milling ceased at the end of the nineteenth century and the mill was then adapted for various other uses, as described in the earlier article in June 2009.

Finishing on a tragic note (not for the squeamish) the following report in the Suffolk Chronicle in 1851 concerned the mill in Jeremiah Stannard's time. The report described a fatal accident in the mill. "On Wednesday last, as Walter Stannard the second son of Jeremiah Stannard was amusing himself with the millers in the large mill, he incautiously went too near the machinery when the upright shaft which was revolving rapidly caught his clothes and being thus drawn into the machinery he was instantly crushed to death.

Charles Appleby, miller, at the inquest deposed that the deceased was six years of age, that he had been in conversation with him on the fourth floor of the mill only a few seconds previously when on turning round he discovered the deceased lying dead upon the floor; he had been whirled round by the shaft and in passing through the machinery was mangled in a most dreadful manner, the two feet and one hand were severed from the body and were lying at a distance of two yards from the trunk the head was literally crushed and the brains were scattered upon the floor. The evidence of Appleby was corroborated by that of Charles Gowing and a verdict of Accidental Death was returned. The grief of the parents may better be conceived than described. This is the second child they have lost by untimely death, the first having been drowned in the mill pond a few years since."

The fourth floor where this tragedy took place was later demolished and any ghosts hopefully disappeared with it. However, there have been tales of ghosts in more recent years on the first floor!

Food production

In the news recently there have been many reports regarding politicians' concern about the fragility of the UK food system. With heavy reliance on imports, last minute ordering and long distribution chains we are much more exposed to shocks from global price rises, disruption to fuel supplies and the impact of climate change. Whereas once DEFRA stressed the importance of the global market, now the Government is talking about the need for the UK to increase its own food production.

Local food production is at the heart of Transition. And Chris Learmonth, a new recruit to Transition Nayland, is well placed to talk about the benefits of local, sustainable food production, being a local organic farmer. So we posed a few questions to Chris to get his take on the issue of food production.

So Chris... What is your business all about?

Stocks Farm it is based in Wissington but we also farm land at Gt Horkesley and Boxted. We organically grow apples, and farm sheep, pigs, cattle and chickens for table and also eggs. The slight downside of our business is that our customer base is currently mainly London.

What made you chose organic farming over alternatives?

We chose organic because our father became allergic to some pesticides and he started growing organic vegetables in the mid 1970s, then we started growing organic apples in the mid 90s because we have to make farming a lot more sustainable for the future.

What is your interest in Transition Nayland?

My interest in transition Nayland is to be involved with people who are aware that this world can not carry on as we know it today. We do not have an endless supply of energy. And so as energy and food become scarcer, people will have to grow food and create their own energy locally.

How do you see the future of our food?

I think that, long term, food will need to be produced on smaller mixed units as all crops will require a lot more man hours to produce them when there is less energy available. We have planted a new, very extensive, orchard with old varieties of trees which today are not commercially viable, but hopefully in 50 years or so they will be able to produce fruit for future generations.

Chris is not alone in supporting the principle of growing our own. 20 per cent of those who responded to our recent survey would consider having an allotment. Following Transition Nayland's discussions with the Parish Council, 4 more allotments will be cut in the next few weeks to meet greater demand. Interested in having an allotment? Time out

On February 16th lots of people will be feasting on pancakes. Some may not even know the significance of Shrove Tuesday, the eve of the longest traditional fast in the Christian calendar. Any relationship can benefit from such a process, and an increasing number of people and organisations are finding it useful.

Christians are specifically invited to use Lent to refresh our relationship with God. We may well also discover more about ourselves and the way ahead, just as Jesus did.

Enjoy.





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
