NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 9th February 2011

BEAR STREET TELEPHONE KIOSK

The removal of Nayland's telephone kiosk is still being investigated, parish councillors heard at their February meeting. Last month chairman Gerry Battye was contacted by a concerned resident and found the kiosk on the fire station forecourt being loaded onto a lorry. He said the number matched the contractor's worksheet and British Telecom had ordered its removal. Some time ago it was damaged and as it was hardly used BT obtained permission from Babergh Council to remove it. Mr Battye said the parish council was never contacted or consulted by Babergh. Members had only been asked about the Wiston phone box which was still in place. He added most people now used mobiles but the signal in the area was not always perfect. District councillor Richard Cave said he was continuing his investigation.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his report Mr Cave said locality proposals for district councils were still in the formative stage with many ideas being considered. Stronger links with localities would be needed when Babergh became a larger council.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

County councillor James Finch said one of the measures recommended by Cabinet, to be decided on February 17, was a 0% increase in council tax for 2011/12 so the Band D tax for county services would remain the same. Budget proposals including £42.5m savings led to a total budget requirement of £1,104m. To achieve a balanced budget there would be an estimated loss of 1,472 full and part-time jobs over a two-year period from April 1, 2010 to March 31, 2012.

A total review of library services was out to consultation this month, trying to reduce costs and retain as many as possible. Nayland had a mobile library and there were no plans to remove this service. Any ideas from the parish council on saving money or adding value with extra services would be welcome. Councillors agreed to send a statement of support for the mobile library, keeping to its current hours and pattern.

Mr Finch added work was due to start on improvements to the A134/Wiston Road junction this month. The carriageway width would be narrower with the intention of reducing traffic speed down Harpers Hill.

POLICE REPORT

A report from PCSO Amanda Coleman said four crimes had been committed since January 12; criminal damage to a car in The Westerings when two holes were smashed in the rear window, a burglary of tools at Travis Perkins builders' merchants, the theft of 500 litres of heating oil from a house in Fen Street and a motorist with excess alcohol in Harpers Estate. She pointed out burglars were currently targeting large isolated properties and oil tanks and urged people to be vigilant, reporting the numbers of any suspicious vehicles to the police.

GRIT BINS

Hector Bunting said he had approached one or two local businesses over sponsorship of grit bins and by next winter hoped to have some results. Clerk Debbie Hattrell said replenishment of grit heaps had been requested and asked members to email her when any needed topping up.

STREET LIGHTING

Mr Battye said he was trying to get an exact picture of the location of Nayland's street lights, particularly if there was to be a management plan. Mrs Hattrell said she was working on the figure of 18 units not being G39 compliant at the moment and suggested a working party should look into prioritising the units. It was agreed the council should apply for its £1,258 locality budget to spend on street lighting capital expenditure.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications, Mr Battye said those granted were: a certificate of lawfulness of existing use of a

house without compliance with agricultural worker's restriction at Stridings, Campions Lane, Wiston; an all-weather horse exercise area at Old Maltings Farmhouse, Bures Road, with conditions; the felling of a diseased lime tree with replacement at St George's House, Wissington Uplands; single-storey side and rear extensions and alterations at Forge House, Bear Street and two dormer windows at 13 Court Street.

There were no objections to the retention of a pair of semidetached houses in part side-gardens of 8/9 Wiston Road.

CALEY GREEN

Mr Battye reported nothing further had been heard from Suffolk County Council about its management of Caley Green. Wendy Sparrow volunteered to remove some of the willow branches overhanging the footway alongside the A134.

VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox said village hall bookings were good. There was going to be a 'taster' fencing session and any suggestions for someone to teach ballroom dancing would be welcome.

YOUTH CLUB

A letter was received from Teresa Moriarty of Nayland Youth Club thanking the council for its £187.50 cheque and support. She said the club was thriving with a new chairman, more members and sufficient funds to remain open for the rest of the academic year.

BURIAL GROUND

Mary George and Chris Hunt presented a detailed report and action plan for the burial ground. Mr Hunt said the council had to prioritise or the burial ground would cost a lot of money with the path a major expenditure. Mrs George said work was urgently needed to clear ivy and buy two new fence panels and it was agreed to get a quote. Burial fees will increase in line with inflation from September 1.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 10th March 2011

VILLAGE TELEPHONE KIOSK

Members of Nayland Parish Council were undecided at their March meeting over whether they want the village telephone kiosk returned. The box was removed by BT in January with no prior consultation and district councillor Richard Cave is continuing his investigation with Babergh.

"Whether we want a phone box or not there should have been some consultation with the parish council," he said. "There should be a 90-day consultation process and if that's not going to be observed it will happen again."

The council felt it was worth complaining to find out why the planning department did not consult the council and residents over its removal. Chairman Gerry Battye said the kiosk's frame was cracked and BT had not wanted to spend money or repairing or replacing it. The Nayland kiosk was on the local list but not on the English Heritage list. It was agreed to hand the matter over to Mr Cave and re-consider it at a future meeting.

STREET LIGHTING

Mr Battye said he now had enough information to locate the exact position of all the village street lights and confirmed the £1,258 locality budget would be used on capital expenditure to bring a further two or three lights into G39 compliance.

ALLOTMENTS

Discussing the allotments, Mr Battye said plotholders had put forward a scheme to provide more water taps to be shared in pairs. Ray Spencer said there might be a slight increase in water use but he had seen people struggling with heavy watering cans. The new scheme, to be funded by the allotment holders, was approved with conditions. It was agreed any increase in charges for water would be reflected in future rents. Mr Battye said he had attended an allotment seminar run by Prettys in Ipswich and councillors agreed with his recommendation to join the National Society of Allotment and Leisure Gardens so as to get better information on forming an allotment association.

FIRE STATION LIGHTING

Patricia Fuller reported a meeting had been held with Suffolk fire service's area manager John Cook to discuss the brightness of the "urban" lights on the new fire station. They were brightly illuminated because of the number of burglaries at fire stations in the county. She added the officer had been very receptive to what was said and would see if the lights on the forecourt could be changed to be made movement-sensitive.

TREE PLANTING PROPOSAL

Mike Hunter of Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society told members the society was keen to plant 10-15 disease-

resistant elm tree saplings in the village and was looking for suitable locations. Mr Battye suggested councillors should walk round the village to consider sites, obtain more information from tree warden Terry Bannister and bring their ideas to the May meeting. Rosemary Knox said Mrs Bannister had reported the hedgerow survey was now complete which was a "fantastic effort."

WISTON ROAD AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Mr Battye said the council was not happy with the allocation system for the new partnership houses in Wiston Road and intended to raise a number of issues over their allocation with Flagship Housing and Babergh Council.

BURIAL GROUND

Reporting on the burial ground, Mary George said a lot of the area had been cleared and two fence panels replaced. More needed replacing but work was being held up by ivy growth on the nursing home side of the fence. It would be necessary to liaise with the home before work could progress. The matter will be discussed further next month.

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Julia Bagnell reported the burglary of a set of metal security gates from alongside the river on February 23. Members decided to write to Suffolk Police saying it was not necessary for someone to attend monthly council meetings unless they were asked and they would prefer to see a police presence around the village more often.

IN BRIEF

It was decided to look for a new noticeboard for the recreation ground and obtain prices for lockable boards at Wiston and the burial ground entrance.

Ray Spencer said David Taylor-Balls had offered to cut hedges on the recreation ground and Pops Piece and it was agreed he should go ahead.

Chris Hunt reminded dog owners walking on the Fen that dogs should be kept on the lead until August 1.

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

The Community Council look forward to your participation in the presentation of our 'Village' calendar. There is no age limit, the aim is to make it an enjoyable community project.


NB: Photographs will be mounted by the committee and on display in the Church Hall between 1.30pm-4pm on Monday 2nd May.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

AGM: 9th March 2011 Vice Chairman: Jenny Smith 262430

Jenny Smith welcomed everyone to the meeting.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Jenny read out Barry Wakefield's report:

I am sorry that I do not yet feel strong enough to be with you tonight. My strange debilitating illness that struck me last November is being overcome, but still requires more warmth and sunshine to build up my strength.

You will recall that when Alan Hodges made it clear that his move from Nayland would take place in December 2009, I offered to chair the meeting of the Community Council, but emphasised any activities undertaken by the Council would have to fall to others, particularly the Executive.

I judge the Community Council has had a most successful 2010. That is thus due to others, and my congratulations and appreciation go to all those who worked so hard. I will mention here the production and sale of the 2011 Village Calendar, the yet again Bonfire Night and the Christmas Family Fayre, now so well timed.

Congratulations also to the village societies that form the backbone of the Council. All seem to have had a successful year, bringing enjoyment and entertainment to their members. It was good, in particular, that we were able to make a grant to the Art Group towards the purchase of a display board, so that we can more readily enjoy their artistic abilities.

The Community Times continues to be both our main form of outreach to the villages, and, through advertising income, our main source of revenue. The dedication to, and the management of the production of each edition by Lorraine Brooks are enormous, and without her, the Community Council would not be able to function so ably. Many thanks, Lorraine.

In my report last year I suggested that the needs and well-being of the Village Hall might be of increased importance to the Community Council. Possibly not as I had in mind then we have been able to address a matter of safety by covering the cost of new carpeting for the stage and by the purchase of a dishwasher to improve the Hall's facilities.

Lastly, but far from least, 2010 marked the Community Council's mounting of a Village Festival, based primarily on the playing field and in the Village Hall. It was an opportunity to provide, over a weekend, entertainment for everyone. In no way a money-making event, but an occasion funded by the Council to bring pleasure to the whole village. Congratulations to all who planned, laboured or contributed in any other way. The Festival was a grand success, and many forms of appreciation were received. But also, as might have been expected, many lessons were learnt, and constructive criticism was forth-coming. We now look forward to the Village Festival 2011.

Jenny added many thanks are due to Barry for being 'acting' chairman for longer than expected.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith distributed a copy of the accounts. He highlighted that the main income had come from the Community Times £2,004, the Village Calendar £1,129, Bonfire Night £798 and the Festival had made a loss of £2,400. Grants totalling £5,818 had been awarded to Transition Nayland, the Art Group, the Village Hall (carpet and dishwasher). Therefore, the Council's assets had reduced by £4,939.29 on last year.

Bryan thanked Richard Cave for his diligence in examining the accounts.

He added that assets totalling £16,527 were taken into 2011 but following grants of £700 to the youth club for hire of the village hall, a request from the hall committee for over £1,000 and £3,800 already committed to the village festival the council's current assets currently stood at £9,545.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS & COMMITTEE

The following Officers were re-elected: **President** Ken Willingale; **Vice-President** Bryan Smith; **Chairman** vacancy; **Vice-Chairman** Jenny Smith; **Treasurer** Bryan Smith;

Secretary Sara Strover; **Community Times** Lorraine Brooks; **Executive:** David George, Tricia Hall, Hazel Gardiner, Will Hitchcock, Colin Ramsell, Iain Wright, Chris Hunt **Individual:** Claire Buller, Mandy Cook.

Two new individual members were elected; Karen Elliott and Alex Badman. Jenny Smith agreed to be acting chairman for six months, or until a new chairman was found if before that, with David George stepping in as acting vice-chairman.

Chris Hunt expressed thanks to all officers of the Council.

GRANTS

A request had been received from Transition Nayland for investment in the Green Energy Project at the Primary School. Bryan was awaiting advice on whether the Council were permitted to use their funds in this way before the matter was discussed.

lain Wright gave an update on the Festival planned for July 2nd saying it would have the same Fun, Food and Music theme as last year with various extras including more sports and children's contributions throughout the day. Local schools were taking part and a full musical programme was planned for the afternoon and evening. The Village Players were also organising an evening concert on July 1st.

Lorraine passed round copies of the new page layout for 2012 which will be a wirobound style calendar.





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
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NAYLAND AND WISTON EMERGENCY FIRST RESPONSE TEAM

We are trained and equipped to administer oxygen, deal with cardiac arrest, respiratory problems and administer first aid. Since we formed in April 2007, we have been called out over 200 times. The reaction from people we have helped has been very positive and the

ambulance crews who we are supporting are very helpful and welcome our participation. Probably the most useful element of our role is to give support to distressed people while they wait for the ambulance. It is a very satisfying role and not too arduous.

Our main requirement is more volunteers if we are to continue to provide a 24 hour Service.

What being a First Responder Involves

You are initially trained over one weekend and you have a 20 minute assessment on the following weekend. We meet every 6 weeks or so for continuation training. It is also an opportunity to share experiences as every call out poses different challenges. We have an annual assessment.

The basic shift is 12 hours (8am-8pm; 8pm-8am) but this can be varied to fit in with your availability. You do not have to be on duty at night - the choice is yours. We would hope that a volunteer would give us 12 hours a week. Many of us do more.

We sign a confidentiality agreement and do not pass on personal details of the patients we help.

Being a First Responder is a very rewarding experience and we recommend it to all of you - so please come and join us.

Following a very successful launch of our first community investment project to install solar photovoltaic on Nayland Primary School, we are very pleased to announce that we have not just reached - but exceeded our challenging target of £32,000. With the support of 36 local investors, plus an additional grant of £9,500 from The Suffolk Foundation we have raised a fantastic £48,000. This amount will enable us to install a 15.5kWp system on the school which will generate annually the equivalent of 45% of the school's electricity needs.

This really is a great achievement and we are delighted that so many local people had the interest and confidence to get involved in the project.

The benefits for the local community are significant:

- a healthy return on their investment for community investors;
- reduced carbon footprint within the community;
- improved efficiency of our community buildings which can benefit all those who use them;
- creation of a sustainable energy supply for the community at a time of increasing costs of fossil fuels and volatility in energy supply.

Subject to planning consent and contract we hope to complete the installation by the end of April, thus benefiting from the long sunny summer ahead of us!

Green Energy Nayland is a not-for-profit initiative and is the first project of its kind in East Anglia so we are very proud to have achieved so much with our first venture. We are now really excited about future opportunities to maximise renewable energy options on our other community buildings. So if you missed the chance to invest this time - we hope that there will be the opportunity for you to get involved in future projects. Suffolk County Council are also hoping that other communities will follow our lead and set up similar projects in East Anglia - they will be using our model to promote how such schemes can be successful - a great accolade for our community.





Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

Following on his remarks in the last issue on pruning there is one further point which the OM/S feels he should make.

If possible cut back to a point where a side shoot is growing; this will then become the growing point, and furthermore the cut will be less obvious. What should not be done is to leave a stump of an inch or more sticking out, which will probably die back as well as looking ugly.

The OM/S has recently come across a Wisteria which has been neglected for several years, with the result that it's a mass of long shoots, some extending to 15 feet or so, which can cause trouble if they get into eaves or gutters. These will not produce any flowers, since the latter appear from the small woody side growths. The long growths should be cut right back to about two buds, ideally in February, but it's probably not too late now

This month's plant family are the Fritillaries, most of which flower in the Spring. The first is F. Melragris, The Snakeshead, a rare native plant. It was once quite common in damp meadows, but not many of these still exist.

There are a few in Suffolk, among them Mickfield and Framsden protected by the Suffolk Wildlife Trust. The flowers are purple, occasionally white, and subsequently produce attractive seed heads.

The OM/S planted about 50 bulbs several years ago, and they have spread well; unfortunately they seem to be attractive to pheasants, and some years ago they ate most of the flowers. After protecting them with wire and netting for a few years, which rather spoilt the effect, he now drives off any birds roosting nearby, and hopes for the best.

Another member of the family, totally different in appearance is that old Cottage Garden favourite the Crown Imperial, F. Imperialis, which grows to 5 feet or so. We have several clumps here with their red or yellow flowers, topped with a bunch of leaves, and a smell like a fox.

There are several other species, which run to two pages in the Plant Finder, probably only obtainable from specialist nurseries and bulb merchants. The best are F. Acmopetala, F. Pallidiflora, F. Michaelowski, and F. Pyrenaica, the last one of the OM/S' favourite plants.



THE NAYLAND FIRE SERVICE

By the time you read this Nayland's new fire station will have been officially opened. This will be the latest event in the long history of our Fire Service. Some residents may not be aware that Nayland has been fortunate to have had its own fire service continuously since the eighteenth century. Other village fire services have come and gone but Nayland just keeps going.

The first known record of a fire engine in Nayland dates back to 1752, to an entry in a Nayland Feoffee Book of an expenditure of £5 2s 6d being provided out of Nayland charity money for "lamps for the town and oil for lighting and towards the fire engine". A later entry in the charities' book of 1755 recorded that Mr Alston was paid the balance of his account for the fire engine and for many years afterwards there are entries that Henry Greane was paid for mending and cleaning the buckets and for oil and tallow for the engine. This engine was used until 1872. Unfortunately no photographs of this engine have ever come to light but it was described as being about 6 ft long with two pumps worked from either end by a see-saw handle. It ran on four solid wheels, the hose was made of leather and there were about 6 buckets and a long rake for pulling the burning thatch from roofs and stacks.

Protecting the village from fire became more organised in 1871 when a public meeting was held with the object of setting up a Volunteer Fire Brigade and obtaining a new fire engine to serve Nayland and the surrounding area. The brigade was appointed and after an appeal to neighbouring parishes a larger horse drawn manual engine was purchased in 1872 for £143 14s 4d. The first fire the new engine attended was at Mr Cook's farm at Stoke in 1877. The brigade took 35 minutes to arrive at the scene and were at the fire for 14 hours. Other recorded fires included a beam over the fireplace at the Coffee Tavern in Nayland High Street, a chimney fire at the Nayland gas works in Newlands Lane and in 1884 there were

two major fires when Mr Spooner's house and premises burnt down and a month later a cottage burned down at Fairfield Stile (does anyone know where these were?) Eye witness accounts describe how after the alarm had been given, with an army bugle, two harnessed horses would be brought round from Mr Norfolk's bus yard to draw the engine. Firemen came running from all parts of the village, buttoning up their uniforms as they ran, and perched themselves on the engine. Then off they went, followed by a crowd of running people. It was hard work pumping, there were six men on each of the pumping bars and at each half hour a fresh team took over. They were paid a small sum for each hour they worked and were refreshed with beer.

The original old engine had been sold by auction for £5 to Mr Jeremiah Stannard who owned the mill and wanted it kept there as a fire precaution. It was eventually disposed of when the mill was sold and partly dismantled about 1922. The newer engine was originally kept in a building behind the White Hart but this was damaged by fire in the 1920s and a lean-to timber and corrugated iron shed was erected in its place. This building was used until the new station was built in Bear Street in 1954.

In 1926 a second-hand steam fire engine was purchased from Colchester Garrison for £27 10s 0d and was drawn from Colchester by a team of four horses and placed in the shed at the White Hart. By all accounts this was an impressive machine of polished brass. Steam could be got to working pressure in about 10 minutes but it was still either drawn by W Norfolk & Sons' horses or later by one of their lorries. It was used for the first time at a fire at Chambers' premises at Bures in 1928. Some years later in 1935 it was put out of action due to grit and sand getting into the mechanism at a fire at Thrift Farm.

In 1935 the fire committee appealed to all property owners in the area for donations for a new fire engine. They wanted to provide the brigade with more up-to-date equipment as the old steam engine was difficult to transport, horses or motor lorry to tow it were not always available when needed and serious delays sometimes occurred in getting away from the fire station.

A second-hand Dennis 65 hp, solid tyred, motor engine was purchased for £135 with a turbine water pump which was able to deliver 500 gallons of water per minute. The Essex County Standard reported that on its arrival the Nayland Fire Brigade proudly toured the village with its newly acquired motor fire engine which replaced the former "steamer". It became the envy of neighbouring brigades.

With the threat of war the Government passed the Fire Brigades Act in 1938, making District Councils responsible for providing fire brigades in their areas, and in 1939 Nayland Parish Council accepted control of the Nayland Fire Brigade from the Melford Rural District Council. The minute book records that GWB Mills, A Norfolk and W Deaves were elected to the Fire Brigade Committee which was set up by the Parish Council.

During the war, in 1941, the Government decided to set up the National Fire Service which brought all the fire brigades under central control. After the war control was returned to local authorities and in 1947 Nayland Fire Service became part of the newly created Suffolk and Ipswich Fire Service. Then followed a programme of modernisation of equipment and buildings. This was when the new purpose built station was opened in Bear Street in 1954.

Following the Local Government Review in 1974 county boundaries and fire brigades were reorganised. All the fire brigades in Suffolk were taken over by Suffolk County Council and the Nayland fire brigade became part of the Suffolk Fire Service as it is today.

Nayland Fire Station has survived the threat of closure a few times but has managed to continue its long and proud history of service to the community. The opening of the impressive new station in 2011 is to be celebrated. However, there is currently concern throughout Suffolk that there are

not enough officers living and working locally in rural areas to be able to provide a twenty-four hour service. Nayland is a retained fire station where part-time firefighters are on call to respond to incidents as and when they happen. More recruits are urgently needed here, especially during the day, in order to provide a full service.

OLIVE WILLINGALE

A packed congregation attended the thanksgiving service at St James's Church for the life of highly-regarded Nayland resident Olive Willingale who died on February 19. She was 86 and had been in failing health for three years. The procession into the church was headed by the standards of Nayland Royal British Legion.

Nayland's former priest-in-charge, the Rev Kit Gray, who conducted the service, said it was a great tribute to Olive to see so many people there.

Since moving to the village with her husband Ken 45 years ago Olive had involved herself in numerous village activities, belonging to various societies, and was known for her organisational skills.

In a tribute, her elder son Andrew said his mother loved music and poetry and when she made a friend it was for life.

Essentially a people person, he said she had a great unbeatable faith, and liked nothing better than to chat. In 1975 she was delighted to have three poems published and in writing poetry found she could express her life, fears, faith and joy in a few lines of verse.

Olive was born and educated in South Woodford, Essex, and her first job after leaving school was working on a dairy counter. She had tried to join the Women's Land Army but was unable to do so because she was in a reserved occupation.

After meeting her husband at an evangelical church they were married in 1950 and moved to Nayland from Barkingside in 1966, living first in Willow Grove, then Fen Street and latterly in Church Mews.

One of her first ventures was helping to raise funds to build the new village hall which opened in 1972.

Over the years she was president of Nayland women's institute, a member of St James's Church, choir, Mothers' Union and Sunday school, one-time secretary of the local Conservative party and belonged to the Village Players.

In the 70s she took up golf and played at Stoke by Nayland where she made many friends.

She was also president of Nayland Royal British Legion women's section and Nayland and District Horticultural Society, whose members decorated the altar for the service.

After Ken took early retirement the couple bought a property in Spain and until Olive became ill enjoyed spending about six months of the year there.

Her younger son Malcolm read the lesson and grandchildren Chloe and Samuel read two of her poems.

A collection was taken in aid of the Royal British Legion. The service was followed by a reception in the village hall.

committee was grateful to the community council for providing a dishwasher, the parish council for its support and everyone involved in the village hall cinema shows.

Treasurer Andrew Gowen said increased costs meant the hall made a £2,234 trading loss last year. Expenditure which increased by £2,400 included higher electricity and heating oil charges, a year-long water leak costing £600, a five-yearly electrical inspection and rates introduced for the first time by Babergh District Council. He recommended increasing hall hire charges and it was agreed they should go up by 50p an hour from April 1. Mr Gowen urged villagers to have a flutter on the village hall lottery, another fundraiser with 55p from every £1 invested going to the hall.

The committee was re-elected en bloc.

CONSERVATION SOCIETY AGM by Pat Bray

Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society is calling for the return of the village's old telephone kiosk.

Chairman John Alexander told a well-attended annual meeting that the box was removed by BT from the fire station forecourt a few weeks ago and the society was carrying out an ongoing investigation together with the parish council. It appeared there was a 90-day period when the parish and other interested parties were supposed to be consulted but a fault had occurred between the district council and BT. The society felt the classic red kiosk was part of the Nayland street scene and should be reinstated.

Another issue was lighting at the new fire station which had been lit up at night when the station was not in use but this had since been resolved with the fire service.

Mr Alexander suggested members should visit the society's new website which was regularly updated and thanked Lorraine Brooks for setting it up so professionally.

In his report he said society membership now numbered about 250 and was growing steadily. One of last year's highlights was the Constable bicentenary celebration when the society welcomed three generations of the Constable family to St James's Church. Thanks were due to Andora Carver who put together an exhibition held over the village festival weekend.

On planning issues he said the proposed creation of three flats and a small pub at the White Hart and the redevelopment of Norfolk's old bus garage had caused concern and were still unresolved. The Horkesley Park scheme was expected to be decided shortly.

The committee continued to be concerned about the overdevelopment of listed buildings, use of inappropriate materials and the difficulty of introducing solar panels and satellite dishes in conservation areas and a special leaflet had been produced.

Among forthcoming events Mr Alexander said open gardens, the society's main fundraiser, would be on June 12 and anyone interested in being involved should contact the committee.

Treasurer Jennie Jenkins presented the accounts.

Officers elected were: Chairman John Alexander, deputy chairman Martin Wright, secretary Andora Carver, treasurer Jennie Jenkins; committee: Margaret Dowding, Pauline Heigham, Andrew Eldridge, Clemency Doxey, Jill Badman and Mike Hunter.

Following the business meeting an illustrated talk on the Tendring Hall Estate was given by Hector Wykes-Sneyd.

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
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Welcome to this months Police news item.

I was asked the question recently 'Does the number plate of trailer have to be the same as that of the vehicle towing it?' and 'What are the consequences of not having the correct number plate?' as there was nothing on the Internet that helped them, hopefully the answer given to me by one of our traffic officers will be of some use to you all and will prevent you from any fines.

- A trailer has to have the same number plate as the vehicle towing. This number plate has to be in the correct format i.e. made of reflective material with a yellow background (to rear of vehicle) and with black letters and numbers. To have a number plate made for your vehicle, you will need to go to a Registered Number Plate Supplier (RNPS). You can find details of your nearest RNPS at www.direct.gov.uk/numberplates (take along your V5 registration document for the vehicle).
- An on the spot fine of £60 is generally issued for non-compliance with these regulations. The reasons the regulations are in force is that ANPR ,(Automatic Number Plate Recognition) cannot read home made number plates and obviously members of the public can identify vehicles easily with the correct number plates if they should need to.
- Another issue to consider with trailers (which a lot of people do not realise) is that if you passed a UK driving test after 01/01/1997 you will not automatically have an entitlement to tow a trailer!

Also on my travels out and about in the villages and Town I am still amazed at how many people still leave valuables on display in their vehicles, such as handbags, Ipods, Phones, Laptops, Sat Navs (this includes holders as it lets opportunist thieves know you have one) Leaving these on display invites the opportunist thieves to break into your vehicle normally by smashing a window incurring you not only loss but expense of repairs.


