### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

### Meeting: 8th December 2010

#### A134 JUNCTION

Concerns over the dangers of the Bear Street/A134 junction are to be forwarded to the county highways department, Nayland parish councillors decided at their December meeting. Last month Ben Sadler, a Leavenheath resident and parish councillor, suggested the council should press for double white lines and a 'stop' sign at the Bear Street exit because of vehicles speeding down Harpers Hill at 60 miles per hour. Chris Hunt said it was totally illogical there was no speed limit on the main road although plans to improve the Wiston Road/A134 junction would include an extra island which officers had said would slow traffic down. Chairman Gerry Battye suggested the council should reiterate its concern over the lack of a speed limit. Tricia Fuller said councillors had previously been told there were not enough houses to justify a 40mph limit but Mr Battye pointed out there was one on the main road at Leavenheath where there were very few houses.

#### **FINANCES**

Following finance meetings to formulate a precept bid the council voted 7-1 to request a lower precept, £32,175 for 2011/12, a one per cent decrease on last year. Mr Battye said members of the working party felt this was the right step to take in view of the wider financial situation. Mr Hunt disagreed saying he did not feel it was wise to cut the precept as the village deserved a "decent amount spent on services" but Tibby Mimpriss said it was a significant increase on three years ago and the village was kept to a high standard.

#### YOUTH CLUB

Mr Battye said the finance committee had recommended 50 per cent of the council's current charity budget should go towards supporting the village youth club and it was agreed to donate £187.50 to the club.

#### PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning matters, Mr Battye said proposed tree work at Alston Court had been approved.

A letter had gone to Babergh's head of planning control expressing concern about the application and other conservation area notifications that trees were not being clearly identified in diagrams supplied.

There were no objections to an application to retain timber decking and a pontoon at Swan Harbour, 102 Bear Street, alternations and extensions to The Old Maltings, Birch Street, and a plan for an all weather horse exercise area at Old Maltings Farmhouse, Bures Road, provided there was no floodlighting. An application for change of use of buildings from Class B to Classes B1, B2 and B8 at Harpers Hill Farm, Harpers Hill with associated parking and servicing areas was also accepted subject to conditions regarding access, lighting, noise, smell and hours of work.

#### JUBILEE TREE

Mr Hunt reported the council had a 38in wide slice of the felled Jubilee tree which he was keen to have treated and polished. He said the original commemorative brass plaque could be placed in the centre and he would like to see each ring marking a significant village event over the years.

The copper beech will eventually be replaced by a hornbeam and Hector Bunting said he would draw up a specification for treating the ground which it was agreed should be left for a while.

#### **HEYCROFT WAY BUS SHELTER**

Members heard two quotations had been received for repairs to the wooden bus shelter in Heycroft Way and decided to accept one for £455 provided councillor Ray Spencer was satisfied with the materials to be used.

#### **GRIT BINS**

Mr Hunt reported two new green grit bins had been delivered and these would be installed by the garages at the bottom of Harpers Estate and a few yards down Fen Street. They were portable so could be moved if necessary. Mr Battye said the village was grateful to the highways authority for its prompt action gritting roads and clearing pavements during the recent snowfalls. He added he had joined the list of named volunteers prepared to clear snow and spread grit in their local areas.

#### POLICE REPORT

A crime report from PCSO Amanda Coleman said between November 10 and December 8 there was one theft on November 23 when a brown wheelie bin was stolen from behind the garage of a detached house in Bear Street.

### **Babergh Achievement Award 2011 - Hazel Gardiner**

It was with grateful admiration that the Parish Council successfully nominated Hazel Gardiner for this special Award. Indeed, hers was not the only name discussed - how lucky we are in our village! However, residents will recognise that her contribution is very special.

Hazel will receive her award at a ceremony on March 9th. At this event, the citation accompanying the nomination will be delivered so it would be premature to include it here. The Parish Council believes that the special ingredient for making this such a vibrant, inclusive and welcoming village, are those 'special people' that make things happen. She has been a key engineer in our village 'engine room'. Her own selfless, compassionate and intelligent promotion of a sense of 'community' over 40 years is an exemplar, although Hazel would be the last to recognise this. It is, though, something that will be recognised by fellow committee members, colleagues in societies, her many friends and neighbours.

Hazel loves our village. Her citation describes her, amongst other things, as a proud and very successful allotment holder, gardener, Horticultural Society committee member, flower arranger, Nayland Choir member, church and hand bells ringer, Community Council member and secretary, a Village Calendar group member ... the list goes on. She is always positive and takes tasks seriously whilst still displaying great energy, intelligence and efficiency. Many villagers will know of Hazel in other capacities. The citation also identifies Hazel as one of a number of village recipients that could also hold a Guiness record involving the wielding of a tea-towel. The Council offers her its sincere congratulations and hopes that she and Tom enjoy her special evening as she receives her award from Mark Murphy at the Golf Club together with a more fulsome tribute. ### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 12th January 2011

#### CALEY GREEN

Suffolk County Council is to be consulted over possible changes to the way Nayland parish council manages Caley Green. Discussion at the January meeting was prompted by Wendy Sparrow who suggested the open space, owned by the county, had a dated look and should be a more natural area than it is at present. Changing the grassland management could result in savings for the parish council. She said she knew many people liked the area as it was while others thought it was too urban. Years ago a former resident and eminent botanist had envisaged a wildflower meadow and cowslips were planted in one section. She added the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project had prepared a report on the area in 1998 and felt it was worth contacting them again for an up-to-date view. Reviewing the matter would not commit the council to anything. Chris Hunt, however, was opposed to any change saying Caley Green was a pleasant entry to the village and should be left alone.

#### COMPASS

Rachel Hitchcock gave the council details of COMPASS, a new group of parents, teachers and members of the community formed to promote discussion about the possible negative impact a new free school in Stoke by Nayland could have on education in the area. She said there had been a lot of publicity from a group hoping to establish a high school at Stoke when the middle school closes and COMPASS had been formed to provide a voice for the alternative viewpoint. Members wanted to inform parish councils and were keen to hear from people concerned about how the free school proposal could affect the education of local children.

#### DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

In his district council report Richard Cave said the wheelie bin collection service during December's bad weather had gone extremely well. The integration of Babergh and Mid-Suffolk Councils was moving forward and an advisory poll would be held in April. If the public approved, the Boundary Committee would re-draw boundaries in both districts. The matter would then go to the Secretary of State and if the merger went ahead there would be a new single council by 2013.

#### HIGHWAYS

Various potholes were reported in Bear Street, Mill Street and Wiston and details passed on to the western area highways department. Mr Hunt said two new grit bins had been installed and used. Chairman Gerry Battye asked members to check areas near them and inform the clerk Debbie Hattrell if grit heaps needed replenishing. Hector Bunting suggested finding a sponsor for a third bin to be placed on Popps Piece beside the Horkesley Road lay-by and it was agreed Mrs Hattrell should purchase one through public donation.

#### STREET LIGHTING

Mrs Hattrell said bad weather had delayed repairs to two street lights opposite the Anchor Inn and on Gravel Hill and said she would chase them up. The council agreed the 2010/11 locality budget should be used for a street lighting capital purpose.

#### PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications, Mr Battye said those approved were the retention of timber decking and a pontoon at Swan Harbour,102 Bear Street, a certificate of lawfulness of an existing use for the occupation of a house at Townlands Farm, Harpers Hill, listed building consent for the insertion of windows and internal alterations at 7 Fen Street and listed building consent and permission for alterations and extensions at The Old Maltings, Birch Street.

Councillors had no objections to an application to fell a protected lime tree at St George House, Wissington Uplands, and listed building consent for an extension and alterations at Forge House, Bear Street.

#### VILLAGE HALL

In her report on the village hall Rosemary Knox said charges were going up to offset the increased price of oil. The community council had provided the hall kitchen with a commercial dishwasher. Various ideas had been received from SALC on ways the hall could save energy. She said the bonfire site in the corner of the playing field remained a mess. Trees had been dumped on it and the site had not been properly cleared for over a year. Mr Hunt said the community council was aware of the problem and intended to bring in a contractor to clear it.

#### **BABERGH ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS**

Mr Battye announced the parish council had successfully nominated Hazel Gardiner to receive a Babergh personal community achievement award. In addition, he said Mrs Hattrell was the recipient of a group award for voluntary work she had carried out in Leavenheath.

#### IN BRIEF

Six meetings are being held for councils interested in taking on additional services as part of Suffolk County Council's divestment policy and it was agreed Mr Battye should attend one in February.

PCSO Amanda Coleman reported two crimes since the last meeting - both thefts from cars in Stoke Road and Harpers Estate.

Mary George and Chris Hunt are to draw up a management plan for the burial ground.

The Parish Council meeting in March will be on **<u>Thursday</u> <u>10th</u>** instead of Wednesday 9th March.

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

#### CHRISTMAS FAYRE

Jenny Smith, chairing the meeting, said the Fayre had been a great success, even better than last year. The format and timing had been just right; the refreshments, Father Christmas and his Elf and a performance by the School Choir had all complemented the occasion.

#### CHRISTMAS TREE

Jenny Smith thanked Claire for organising the fantastic village Christmas tree. Claire said someone had offered to donate a tree for next year but this would need to be felled and transported. The viability of the offer would be investigated. The cost of this year's tree was £65 including delivery. Claire thanked all the helpers who made erecting and taking the tree down go so smoothly.

#### **DISHWASHER FOR THE VILLAGE HALL**

lain Wright confirmed that the dishwasher had been installed and thanked the Community Council for its purchase. The dishwasher is almost ready for use - chemicals have been ordered and Jo Murrison was preparing instructions for use.

#### **TREASURER'S REPORT**

Bryan Smith reported on finances for the year. Unencumbered assets currently stood at £14,365.17. The year had seen a loss made by the Village Festival, reduced profit from the Village Calendar and the Community Times, and slight increases by Bonfire Night and the Christmas Fayre. The Quiz had not been held. Grants made this year totalled £5,818.10.

The Treasurer was thanked for his efficiency with the accounts.

#### **COMMUNITY TIMES**

Bryan Smith agreed to be co-ordinator for the next issue. VILLAGE CALENDAR PHOTOGRAPHY COMPETITION

Lorraine Brooks said the Calendar Competition would be held on Bank Holiday Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> May. In addition to seasonal scenes, streetscapes, landscapes and village activities photographs of architectural and natural features would be welcome. However, it was necessary that images must be recognisable as being located within Nayland or Wissington.

The calendar team, which has welcomed Trevor Smy on board, are investigating the costs and format for the 2012 calendar.

#### VILLAGE FESTIVAL – 1 & 2 JULY

lain Wright said the sub-committee have been progressing with plans and hoped to have an outline for the event to report by the AGM. The theme would once again be Fun, Food and Music. An additional games area was planned for children and adults, perhaps to include games such as quoits, boules and skittles. Stage events featuring schoolchildren and local groups would take place in the afternoon followed by musical entertainment in the evening. They were considering the possibility of an all-inclusive ticket price. There had been some commitment on commercial aspects.

The meeting agreed additional expenditure of up to  $\pounds4,000$  could be made.

The Women's Institute asked for clarification to be given on what percentage of stall takings are kept by the Community Council.

#### FORTHCOMING DATES

**Bonfire Night:** This would be held on Saturday 5<sup>th</sup> November. Claire said volunteers had come forward to do the barbeque for this year.

lain Wright agreed to look into getting the debris from last year's bonfire cleared.

**Village Fun Quiz:** It was agreed an annual Fun Quiz was an asset to the Council's calendar of events and the last one had been greatly enjoyed. Volunteers were needed to lead on this. **Christmas Fayre:** Due to problems booking the village hall on the traditional first Saturday of December, the date will be  $\underline{19^{th}}$ <u>November</u>. A volunteer will be needed to lead on this event.

**Royal Wedding, 29<sup>th</sup> April:** The possibility of doing something to mark the event was floated. It was noted the Choir are holding a quiz in the evening.

**Queen's Diamond Jubilee 2012:** It was noted the Church Fete would be held on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> June. The suggestion of a Street Party on the 5<sup>th</sup> June was floated.

#### CHAIRMANSHIP

Jenny Smith stressed a new chairman was urgently needed. While she is willing to continue as Vice Chairman a volunteer who has an idea of how the Community Council works is needed to come forward.

Additional volunteers would also be welcome to serve on the Executive Committee.

#### SOCIETY REPORTS

**Conservation Society**: Jill Badman said Hector Wykes-Sneyd would be talking about *'The Tendring Estate'* at their AGM on 8<sup>th</sup> March. Open Gardens would be on 12<sup>th</sup> June and in 2012 the Jubilee Open Gardens would be on 10<sup>th</sup> June. They will be producing a limited edition set of tea towels.

**Fundraising Committee:** Jill Badman said the Nayland Fundraising Committee would welcome suggestions for local charities that needed support.

**Bowls Club:** Sylvia Bond said they had risen three places since starting the season at the bottom of the Winter League.

**Royal British Legion:** David George said they had an enjoyable Christmas Party with the Women's Section. They organised a shuttle service for hospital visiting over the Christmas period and are now busy with medicine runs and transporting patients to the surgery.

**Women's Institute:** Jeannette Finch said that membership is growing. On 17<sup>th</sup> January Stuart Byers will be talking about Falconry, on 21<sup>st</sup> February Anne-Marie Mills will talk about Relaxation and well-being and on 21<sup>st</sup> March Nayland branch celebrate their 54<sup>th</sup> birthday with a party.

**HortSoc:** Lorraine Brooks said their stall at the Christmas Fayre had been successful.

On 15<sup>th</sup> March Geoff Meadowcroft will give a talk and questiontime on Photography. As judge for the Calendar Competition and the Flower Show his advice will be timely for the calendar competition. The Spring Flower Show will be held on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> March.

Their coach outing is to Great Dixter House & Gardens and Merriments Gardens on  $7^{th}$  June. These are fantastic and renowned gardens so book early to avoid disappointment. News and schedules can be found on naylandhortsoc.org.uk.

**Choir:** Teresa Moriarty said there would be a concert on 3 April with small pieces of music accompanied by an organist and trumpet and they were planning a quiz on 29<sup>th</sup> April.

**Youth Club:** Teresa Moriarty said Nayland youth club now had a new committee with youth leader Adam White and she hoped the new team would move the club forward.

**Parish Council:** Chris Hunt reminded the meeting that the affordable housing in Wiston Road is for local people. Anyone interested must put in for it now.

He added this is election year and urged people should consider joining the Council.

**Transition Nayland:** Will Hitchcock said their soup stall at the Christmas Fayre had been a success and 16 people braved the weather to join them on their winter walk.

They are currently working with Suffolk County Council on a project to install solar panels at Nayland Primary School and an opportunity for people to invest in solar panelling was being launched on 1 February.

**Woodland Corner:** Tricia Hall said numbers attending were very good this term. Their stall at the Christmas Fayre had been successful and their next fundraiser was a cake stall outside Kerridge's on 2 April.

Art Group: Colin Ramsell said they were looking forward to their post-Christmas dinner on Wednesday. They have a couple of visiting tutors booked this term.

Village Players: Jenny Smith said The Holly and The Ivy had good reviews and attracted good audiences.

Unfortunately productions are run at a loss.

Jim Bond is directing their next production *Trap For A Lonely Man* showing on 31<sup>st</sup> March, 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> April. On Friday 1<sup>st</sup> July they will be contributing to the Festival.

### NAYLAND HOUSE RESIDENTS

Hazel Gardener expressed concern that residents of Nayland House were not being integrated with the community as well as they might.

It was suggested that offers of transport to village events and activities may benefit some residents. Village societies or volunteers willing to entertain them with song, music or gentle exercise may offer them stimulation.

Hazel and Sara agreed to liaise on this and use the Community Times as a communication tool if required. NEXT MEETING


Membership for 2011 is now available and amazing value at just £2 for single or £3 for joint membership. Application forms are available on our website or at any of our events.





### NAYLAND VILLAGE HALL TREASURER'S REPORT FOR 2010 ACCOUNTS

The accounts have not yet been finalised and checked but at the time of going to press the Village Hall is showing a surplus of some £766.

This surplus gives a false impression of the Hall's finances because it does not take account of the £3000 Dish Washer purchased for the Hall by the Community Council which has been added to the Hall's assets. If we take this into account the Hall had a trading loss of £2234

I have calculated that our expenses for the year have gone up to £17760 compared with £15338 last year an increase of some £2400. It looks as if the cost of each hour let was £13.72 compared with £11.80 the year before.

The increased expenditure for the year was caused by:

Rates	£507	a new annual charge
Electrical Inspection	£700	once every 5 years
Water leak	£600	one off - hopefully!
Increased CH Oil costs	£400	
Increased depreciation	£900	a non cash charge

Some things have also gone down such as insurance.

In the light of this I believe it would be prudent to increase the hall charges from 1 April 2011 by 50p an hour and proportional increase for the other charges. I shall be presenting this proposal to the Village Hall AGM in March.

### Garden Notes



### by The Old Muckspreader

After the battle with snow and ice, which may even now return, it's time to look around and count the casualties. It is perhaps early days, but on the whole the OM/S is pleasantly surprised at how few plants appear to have perished. The blanket of snow did provide some protection for their roots, but once that had melted the subsequent severe frosts might have penetrated to their roots; plants in pots were particularly vulnerable, and we should have been more farsighted, and removed more of them to cold frames or greenhouse.

He was recently asked for advice on pruning a Magnolia. His answer was not to, unless the owner had to reduce the spread of the plant; this brings us on to the subject of pruning in general.

Some people seem to think that they have some sort of moral obligation to prune shrubs and small trees; which leads to the question, what is the main object of pruning? There are really two:-

To keep the plant in good health, and improve the quality of their flowers, and 1)

2) To maintain the balance, and where necessary restrict the size of the plant.

An example of 1) is the common Buddleia, (B. Davidii). If left alone it will produce a mass of small flowered shoots in early summer. If pruned hard in early spring it will produce long shoots with sprays of large flowers a bit later in the year. In this case you can do both; leave a bit of the existing growth, and cut out the rest; a belt and braces result which produces a longer flowering season, and is good news for butterflies.

As a rough rule of thumb, spring flowering shrubs, which generally flower on old wood, should be pruned after flowering, giving them time to make growth for next year. Later flowering shrubs, which flower on new growth (e.g. the aforementioned Buddleia Davidii) are pruned in early spring.

Proceeding to 2), restriction of size, this is a bit more tricky. If a long shoot is growing into a pathway or the wall of a house, or getting too high and cutting out light, it is best taken back to the main truck of the plant; in this way the cut is more or less unnoticeable. What should never be done is to give the whole plant a haircut, unless it forms a hedge. Older readers will remember blocks of shrubs in local authority parks and gardens cut into geometric shapes; they hardly ever flowered, but presumably satisfied the bureaucratic mind. Fortunately, in these more horticulturally enlightened times these horrors are seldom seen.

There is an excellent small book in the Wisley Handbook Series - Pruning Hardy Shrubs - No. 12. The OM/S' copy, dated 1973 was priced @ 50 pence; now it probably costs £5 or so, good value nevertheless.

The botanists are at it again; they've started re-classifying plants by their DNA, rather than in old Linnaeus' method by their appearance. This means that a lot of name changes will be foisted on us, causing general annoyance to nurserymen and gardeners, but doubtless keeping the botanists happy for years to come.

### **THE CENSUS: 1801 TO 2011**

It is surprising that after the Domesday survey in 1086 there was no further official population count in England until 1801. As a result of concern about the growth of the population outstripping the supply of food and resources, Parliament passed the Census Act in 1800. Since then there has been a census every ten years, except for 1941, and the information gained enables the Government to plan for the future needs of the nation.

As well as providing vital information for the Government, early census returns are invaluable for people tracing the history of their families, houses, towns or villages. It has to be remembered, however, that the censuses cannot be relied upon to be completely accurate: the Enumerators, who collected the information, sometimes misspelt or misheard the answers to their questions and people were sometimes confused or were not entirely honest; until more recent times there were many people who could barely read or write; the Enumerators' numbers given to each household were not the house numbers – in Nayland, for instance, houses were not given numbers until the 1960s and a certain amount of detective work is required to pinpoint a particular house.

The first census in 1801 found that the population of Great Britain was 9 million. Ten years later it had increased to 11 million and in Nayland and Wiston the population was 933. These early censuses recorded only brief details and were simply lists of householders with the number of families employed in agriculture, trade, manufacturing etc. The 1821 census was the first to include the ages of a householder's family, in 5-10 year groups.


The 1841 census was the first to contain more personal information about people. The head of the household completed a form but Enumerators were often required to do this as there were many who could not read or write and signed with a cross. This census showed that the population of England and Wales was 16 million. The most common occupation in England at that time was domestic servant. In Nayland and Wiston the population was 1,110 and there were 24 agricultural workers and 10 bargeman at this time when the navigation of the river was at its peak. From these occupations and others such as silk workers, wheelwrights, leather breeches makers, soap boilers, straw hat makers and many others, it is possible to visualise Victorian life in Nayland.

In the 1851 census the exact age, marital status, relationship to the head of the household and birth place were requested. In Nayland, bargemen were still listed and the large number of young people lodging in the village, some as young as 9 or 10, were listed as silk workers at the Fen Street mill. There were about 10 elderly, widowed or afflicted paupers. Jeremiah Stannard was corn miller and coal merchant and, at the Wharf House next to the Anchor, James Hurrell was listed as the "Wharfinger" (owner or manager of a wharf).

From 1861 to 1901 there was little change in the contents of the censuses or the way in which they were carried out but the analysis became more detailed. In 1871 as well as listing blind, deaf and dumb people, lunatics and imbeciles were added but these and all infirmities were omitted in 1911.

In 1881 Nayland and Wiston had 87 agricultural workers, 46 in the clothing industry, 58 domestic servants, shop keepers and trades 30. There were still bargemen and paupers listed and by now a manager at the Gasworks in Newlands Lane and Samuel Cuddon, brewer, in Church Lane. At this time the population was 910.

The 1901 census showed that nationally 8 out of 10 men were working plus a third of females. In this year of Queen Victoria's death the population was 32 million. In Nayland and Wiston there were more domestic servants and agricultural workers than any other occupation but in the opening years NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

of the new century, except for the occasional bargeman, watchmaker or leatherdresser, it is noticeable that most of the old, quaintly named trades had disappeared. There were however still 9 pubs or beerhouses.

In the 1911 census Enumerators transcribed the information gathered into record books but it is now possible to see online the original forms completed by householders. It is fascinating to search and perhaps see your great grandparent's handwriting and signature.


Since 1921 there have been new questions about employment, children's education, dependency etc. In 1942 the 1931 census forms were destroyed by fire and there was no census in 1941 because of the war. The 1951 census therefore was significant in tracking changes for a period of 20 years and found that the population was 50 million.

In 1961 computers were used for the first time but it took 5.5 years to produce a full set of statistics! In the last census, in 2001, images of the forms we completed were stored on microfilm and the paper records were destroyed. Because of the personal nature of the information and the 100 year secrecy rule, we will not be able to view these images until 2101. The next census to be released will be that for 1921 for which we will have to be patient and wait until 2021.

With new technology family historians of the future should find it much easier to track down their ancestors but I think it will not require as much detective work or be so much fun. Of course not everyone is interested in searching out their families but it is in everyone's interest to cooperate with the census so don't forget to fill up that form when it arrives!


Business card for Dan Spooner, listed in the 1901 Census

### Five Properties for Local People





### Your community, Your future

Green Energy Nayland (GEN) presents you with an exciting opportunity to support your community and make an attractive return by investing in renewable energy systems for our community buildings.

#### What would I be investing in?

GEN is a newly formed Industrial and Provident Society whose objects are to generate renewable energy in and for the community of Nayland through funding renewable energy installations from community investment. Our first project is to install solar panels on Nayland Primary School to generate at least 30% of the school's electricity.

#### How much would I need to invest?

The minimum investment is £250 with an upper limit set by law at £20,000. We need £32,000 to complete the school project but, if successful, this could lead to other projects.

Green Energy Nayland will fund the installation of the solar array on the school roof and will collect the feed in tariff, which is guaranteed in law for 25 years. The school will buy electricity from GEN at about 1/3 of the cost of buying from a typical supplier and will get a valuable teaching aid. Investors will get interest on their investment and society will get a reduction in  $CO_2$  emissions.

#### What would I get back from my investment?

You will get a share of the profits of the Society through an annual interest payment. We estimate that this will be around 4% in the first year, rising over time with the feed in tariff such that we estimate the project will return approximately 8% pa over its 25 year life. In addition, we expect that GEN will qualify for the Enterprise Investment Scheme, under which qualifying investors will get 20% of their investment refunded by the Tax Man. This is a competitive return in today's market plus you will be investing in your community, improving the efficiency of our public buildings and reducing environmental impact.

#### Are there other community projects that have succeeded in this?

GEN is a group of local professionals with experience in the renewable energy sector who see this as a great opportunity to support the community whilst generating income for investors. They are all giving their time unpaid. GEN has the support of Suffolk County Council and is a pioneering project which is expected to be replicated with other communities across the country. The school headteacher and Governors are very excited about the opportunity to be at the forefront of this project – as are the school's eco team of young pupils!

### SaferNeighbourhoods

Welcome to this month's Police news item. I have been asked recently how the cut in funding will be affecting Suffolk Police. I hope the following will give you some insight.

Suffolk is a low cost force, but in line with police forces across the county, we are facing an unprecedented financial situation. We are facing a cut in funding of an estimated £18 million over the next four years, (from October 2010). We are already an extremely efficient force with one of the lowest costs per head of population and 300 fewer people than the average of our most similar forces.

Suffolk Police Authority members and Constabulary Chief Officers will be attending District and Council meetings to share plans on how the force plans to meet the required efficiency savings whilst continuing to provide an excellent policing service. The Constabulary is operating a recruitment freeze for both officers and staff, and the Business Support Review is approaching the implementation phase of creating shared support units with Norfolk Constabulary. This will provide collaborative support to our frontline services, achieving savings of an estimated £9.8million over 4 years.

The Constabulary is working in partnership with Suffolk County Council to buy and share two properties in Ipswich to help reduce costs while improving service delivery. As a result of this, the Constabulary will be able to sell off premises including Ipswich Police Station, which face multi-million pound refurbishment bills in the future. The project will save £200,000 per year for the Constabulary and is being progressed now because both property costs and borrowing are low.

### Help is at hand to switch to digital TV

TV is changing. In 2011 the traditional TV signal will be switched off in the Anglia region and replaced with a digital TV signal. This is not a concern for most people but some may find it harder to make the switch than others.

The Switchover Help Scheme has been set up by the Government and is run by the BBC. Its purpose is to make digital TV easy for older and disabled people by converting one of their televisions to digital in the run-up to digital TV switchover in their region.

#### What does the Help Scheme do?

The Switchover Help Scheme aims to reach out to all eligible people, and ensure that those who need our help get it, so that no-one eligible need be left behind without access to television after switchover.

People are eligible for help if they are: aged 75 or over, have lived in a care home for six months or more, get or could get disability living allowance, attendance or constant attendance allowance, or mobility supplement, or if they are registered blind or partially sighted.

#### What's next?

Most people will be asked to contribute £40 towards the help. The service is free for people who are eligible and also get pension credit, income support, income-based jobseekers allowance or employment and support allowance.

In the run-up to switchover, every eligible person receives a Switchover Help Scheme information pack explaining the options for switching to digital.



### NEWS from ASSINGTON MILL

Happy new year! Last year was a good one for us, with 25% more students attending the courses than in 2009, and many days completely full, so we are looking forward to more of the same. Something else to look forward to is the arrival of Tim & Sophie's prize-winning English Longhorn cattle, now that the fields have all been fenced in for them. This is a move encouraged by the Higher Level Stewardship agreement and will be of benefit to local wildlife. We have also set up a small "landshare" scheme, so the area behind the tractor shed (the classroom) is fenced against rabbits and will provide four plots for local people.

So what's new in 2011? Well, on Sunday 6 February there is a one-day chainsaw course for amateurs. Neil Reekie, who examines the professionals, is going to show you how to maintain and especially how to sharpen the saw, tree-cutting techniques and how to use the chainsaw safely and what equipment you need. This type of course is usually aimed at professionals, is expensive and takes several days.

Then there is Loom Weaving and Fabric Design with Janet

Phillips, who has written books on the subject. This is a fiveday course, also in February, which includes a visit to Jason Collingwood's studio. The Working with Birds of Prey courses were filled very quickly, but you could go on the reserve list.

Jane Sen, a well-known cookery book writer and former advisor to the Penny Brohn Bristol Cancer Care Centre, is doing a one-day Cooking for Health course in March. And the same weekend Daniel Kenning will guide you through the maze of energy conservation, especially what is worth spending money on and what is not, i.e. photovoltaic panels, ground source heat pumps, wood chip boilers, wind-power etc. We have two ground source heat pumps here at the mill that you can see working, and are planning to install photovoltaic panels in the coming year.

In the autumn Robert Bucknell will be holding a one-day course on humane fox control (he has written two books on the subject) and Paul Keyland will explain and demonstrate rabbitcontrol in the form of ferrets and ferreting.

Our more popular courses will be held as usual in 2011. Please have a look at the website, www.assingtonmill.com, for full details and dates.


