# NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

## Meeting: 12th June 2013

#### POLICE REPORT

PCSO Mandy Coleman stated there had been two incidents reported in the last month; possession of class B drug and a dangerous dog in a public place.

#### COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

James Finch's report gave news on the new county council administration including their aim to freeze council tax for the next four years.

#### ALLOTMENTS

The annual meeting with allotment holders has taken place.

Rosemary Knox agreed to show the Allotment Association judge round for the best kept allotment competition.

Quotes were being obtained to erect a 1.2 metre wide gate pedestrian access gate to prevent vehicles entering the meadow. It was noted this would be wide enough to allow a disability buggy through.

Discussing future access rights councillors agreed to investigate how to provide continued access for walkers on the allotment field.

#### STREET LIGHTING

Debbie Hattrell said SCC had confirmed the cost of upgrading the parish council street lights in the 5 year plan will be frozen. Work has been authorised for the next phase; Bear Street from Parkers Way to the beginning of Birch Street, and one unit in Birch Street and Mill Street. The cost will be in the region of £4,000.

#### JOHN KENT MEMORIAL BENCH

Tricia Fuller agreed to attend when the bench is installed to ensure it is positioned in accordance with the license issued by SCC Highways.

#### PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Gerry Battye said permission has been granted at Sargents Farm, Wiston for erection of a first-floor extension and listed building consent granted at Vine House, Court Street for 2 new doors and 1 window in rear elevation, 2 new windows in side elevation, installation of flue and internal alterations.

Permission has been granted at York Cottage, 19 Stoke Road for erection of detached out-building, off street parking bay, new vehicular access and erection of 1.8 metre high woven willow fence, fronted by 1.2 metre high brick wall to highway frontage (following demolition of existing boundary wall) but various conditions have been imposed relating to the boundary wall and access. Councillors had objected to the original application and had not been given the opportunity to comment on the amended application. It was agreed to query the amendment.

Councillors had no objections to an application for the erection of single-storey side/rear extensions, erection of a front boundary wall, cladding of existing two-storey extension, replacement windows and internal alterations at 11 Stoke Road or for a two-storey welfare building at Down to Earth Landscapes, The Willows, Wiston Road. They had no objections to the part demolition of north-east Churchyard boundary wall at St James Church to create pedestrian and mobility access to Church Lane and erection of ironwork access gate but would mention the possible archaeological implications and safety concerns that the access would be opposite the entrance to the Village Hall.

A letter of objection relating to Appeal by Bunting and Sons for The Stour Valley Visitor Centre at Horkesley Park had been sent to the Planning Inspectorate.

Councillors noted a site visit at 9-11 Mill would take place by the Planning Inspectorate on 18 June in relation to the Appeal for the demolition of the bus shed, construction of a pair of semi-detached 2 storey houses and alterations to the side and front elevations of 11 Mill Street.

Councillors would examine and give feedback on the modifications to Babergh Core Strategy and the draft Affordable Housing Supplementary Planning Document to enable views to be submitted to the consultation.

#### **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

The committee taking forward the project for new play equipment on Fairfield Recreation Field are exploring available grants and fact-finding.

The six-monthly risk inspection on existing playground equipment will be requested. An risk assessment of the milestone and memorial in High Street was carried out this week.

#### FOOTPATHS

A deep pothole in path 18 in Dead Lane, from Wiston to Bures High Fen Road, will be reported to SCC.

#### HIGHWAYS

Mary George advised that pot holes in Wiston and Mill Street have been filled but added in Mill Street only a temporary fix had been made.

A complaint would be made to Babergh that in some areas of the village the road sweeping and weed killing was not being done adequately.

Following councillors request for a safety review of the A134 junction with Bear Street and Wiston Road and details on the rationale of the current right of way design James Finch has formally requested an appeal for a speed restriction to SCC Highways.

#### **BURIAL GROUND**

Mary George reported the lime trees on the burial ground boundary had been excellently pollarded.

Councillors granted permission for an inscription for Barbara Frizell to be added to Stanley Frizell's headstone.

Mary George is preparing the inspection report and proposals for the burial fee review.

#### IN BRIEF:

Jonathan Free, Head of Communities at Babergh, has agreed to attend the September meeting to give advice on developing a Neighbourhood plan.

Andrew Gowen, treasurer of the Village Hall Management Committee, will attend the next meeting to discuss the Village Hall Endowment Fund.

# **DOG WALKERS**

Leaving behind your dog's excrement or a small polythene bag containing your dog's excrement is an offence. Using the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996, Babergh Council has powers to issue 'on the spot' Fixed Penalty Notices of £50, or to prosecute in the criminal courts, with fines of up to £1,000. Popp's Piece adjacent to Anchor Bridge, Caley Green, adjacent to the By-Pass, Court Knoll, Bear Street Recreation Ground, the Village Hall grounds & pitch, Candy Lane and the Allotment Field have all been identified as hot sites where this offence is still being regularly committed by some village dog owners, despite many polite reminders and unpleasant confrontations. Parents and children are returning home with soiled shoes and shorts. Errant dog owners have been warned. Our many community minded dog owners, as well as the residents of the village, are exasperated with this thoughtlessness. What do perpetrators expect to happen to a bag filled with excrement left on a path, fence or tree branch? A health hazard is being created, with toxocariasis potentially causing blindness of a child. Village Council Tax payers have provided poop bags and bins as well as our own grey wheelie. What more can they do or afford? Residents are asked to be on the look-out for this offence being committed. Babergh Dog Control should be informed at:

# Meeting: 10th July 2013

#### POLICE REPORT

PCSO Mandy Coleman's report stated there had been four crimes reported in the last month; criminal damage to the gate and fencing at the recreation ground in Bear Street, criminal damage and theft to two vehicles on Harpers Estate, a daytime burglary in Wiston Road.

#### COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

A new website has been launched with information on Suffolk's project to deliver high-speed broadband across Suffolk: www. betterbroadbandsuffolk.com.

James Finch asked councillors if they felt local County Councillor surgeries would be useful to residents.

#### PUBLIC FORUM

Roy Norfolk said trees on Webb's Meadow, to the rear of 17 Fen Street, had grown very large and were restricting the view from Fen Street. Councillors advised a tree inspection had recently been undertaken and the correct time to prune is the autumn. They will look at the area again.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

Rosemary Knox will be showing the National Allotment Association judge round for the best kept allotment competition on 18th July. Tom Gardiner said numbers had not yet been fixed on the allotment gates.

Quotes have been obtained to erect a fence and 1.2 metre wide pedestrian access gate to prevent vehicles entering the meadow.

Rosemary Knox is investigating how to provide continued access for walkers on the allotment field and will be meeting the Footpath Warden on site.

Mary George will meet Suffolk Wildlife Trust on site when they install a barn owl box on the allotment field to agree its location.

#### PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Gerry Battye said permission has been granted at 11 Stoke Road for erection of single-storey extensions, erection of a front boundary wall, cladding of existing two-storey extension, replacement windows and internal alterations with conditions relating to external facing and roofing materials and at Down to Earth Landscapes, The Willows, Wiston Road for a two-storey welfare building with various conditions. Consent has been granted for the part demolition of north-east churchyard boundary wall at St James Church to create pedestrian and mobility access to Church Lane and erection of ironwork access gate.

Following a site meeting at 9-11 Mill Street, the Planning Inspectorate has dismissed an Appeal for the demolition of existing disused bus garage, clearance of the site and construction of two semi-detached domestic dwellings, alterations to external landscaping to the rear of the properties to provide external parking provision, alterations to side and street elevation of 9 Mill Street and minor alterations on land known as Swan's Nest to provide domestic gardens and pedestrian access. The seven page decision document can be viewed on http://www. pcs.planningportal.gov.uk/pcsportal/ViewCase.asp? caseid=2184331&coid=2162696. It mentions: the extensive volume of the new building, its massing and the unrelieved monotony of the facades would render it wholly out of keeping with the intimate scale of buildings intrinsic to this conservation area; the proposed access gives rise to hazardous highways conditions; the new building would mitigate the overshadowing concerns of neighbours and the noise generated by manoeuvring of vehicles would be disturbing; the proposal would seriously impact on the area's visual amenity and on the pleasant verdant contribution of Swan's Nest and raised concerns on the future implications of the protected Plane tree.

Councillors are still examining the documents on a planning Appeal relating to Creems, Bures Road for change of use from agricultural land to residential to allow for new driveway, parking area and erection of garage for use with existing dwelling. Those who have seen the documents found no reason to alter their opinion to object to the proposal.

Councillors will provide comments for submission to Babergh's pre-draft consultation on a new statement of community involvement. Comments will include that amendments to planning applications should be made available to parish councils.

#### **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

The six-monthly risk inspection conducted following recent vandalism at Fairfield Recreation Ground has identified work needed. Recent hot weather has affected the safety surfacing. It was agreed to order the safety work. It was agreed to obtain quotes to replace the wooden gate with a metal gate and posts.

A site meeting at the Horse Watering will be arranged with the contractor to discuss maintenance.

Gerry Battye said the village benches need a maintenance check.

The trough in High Street had been planted up with summer bedding but comments that it needed attention were noted. Matthew Pescott Frost agreed to follow this up.

A risk assessment of the milestone and memorial in High Street found no problems but recommended cleaning and repointing. It was agreed to obtain quotes for this work.

#### FOOTPATHS

Councillors were concerned that SCC have not been responding to their requests for maintenance work to be carried out. Councillor Finch said he would raise the issue with the Byways Manager.

#### HIGHWAYS

James Finch raised a request from a resident for road markings across the entrance to their property in Bear Street to prevent parking. Councillors said there were many cases where this could be consigned. They hoped common sense would deter drivers from obstructing driveways.

James Finch said he was fighting, with some vigour, the speeding issue on the A134 Nayland bypass.

#### **BURIAL GROUND**

Councillors agreed to Mary George's proposals for the burial fee review.

A letter would be sent to undertakers asking their gravediggers not to put soil on the burial ground boundary.

The burial ground rules will be displayed.

Babergh, who manage the old section of the burial ground, will be asked to remove the old metal bin by the lynch gate and provide an extra wheelie bin.

#### PARISH COUNCIL MEETINGS

Councillors agreed to have a break from meeting in August and the chairman and vice chairman were empowered to act on their behalf. If action was required prior to the September meeting on planning applications a meeting would be called to discuss them on 14 August. Routine matters would be dealt with by round robin.

Jonathan Free, Head of Communities at Babergh, will be attending the September meeting to give advice on developing a Neighbourhood plan.

#### IN BRIEF:

Tricia Fuller said John Spooner is awaiting delivery of the John Kent memorial bench, he will then stain it and position it by Bear House using a resin fixative.

Permission was granted for HortSoc to place a banner on Caley Green to promote the Flower Show.

Councillors felt Maria Mason's resignation as chairman of the Youth Club would be a loss to the group.

Following a request to erect a first aid gazebo for 100 runners in a marathon near the Stour Valley Path for Matthew Pescott Frost would contact the organisers to clarify details.



Meeting: 3rd July 2013

Chairman: Alex Badman 262994

#### MATTERS ARISING

**Village Christmas Tree:** Alex Badman said the contractors will be installing the new fixing during July.

**Notice Boards:** Roy Norfolk is constructing a replacement board to be put on the Old Forge, next to Forget Me not.

**Parish Council Rep:** Mark Burbidge was welcomed to the Executive Committee.

**Executive Committee:** Neil Barbrook was welcomed as a member of the Executive Committee. It was felt a stronger executive was needed and word of mouth was a good way to recruit new members. An appeal for volunteers to join the CC exec would be made at the Quiz Night.

#### **GRANTS & DONATIONS**

**Dental & Cosmetics Surgery:** A donation of £30 has been received from a raffle held at their Open Day. Alex has sent a letter of thanks. This will be spent on additional decorations for the Christmas Tree.

**Court Knoll Lodge:** A donation of £500 has been received towards worthwhile causes in the Parish. It was agreed to defer making a decision on who should benefit from this until the next meeting when the Treasurer was present.

**St Mary's Church Gate:** Rosemary Knox has requested a grant towards replacement of an oak entrance gate. It was suggested the CC's constitution would need checking in relation to this request and it was agreed to defer making a decision until the next meeting when the Treasurer could provide advice on this.

**Nayland Test Pit Dig:** The Conservation Society have applied for a grant of £1500 towards the £8,000 cost of holding another two day dig involving 16 pits. Concern was expressed that other annual grant applications for substantial amounts were expected and income was currently mainly from the Community Times, the Calendar and Firework Night. It was noted a grant of £500 for the Conservation Society's book had already been agreed and would reduce funds further. It was agreed to defer making a decision until the next meeting when this could be discussed with the Treasurer present.

#### **TREASURER'S REPORT**

Bryan Smith's report stated income totalled £2,695.00 which included the Community Times £1,860.00, Calendar £297.00 and a donation from the Freemsons £500.00. Expenditure totalled £2,031.50 which included Grants £1,000 and Community Times £804.00. Unencumbered assets stood at £17,829.10.

#### **COMMUNITY TIMES**

Lorraine Brooks said the response to the website celebration quiz had been disappointing with no entries from the 12 years and under age group. The winner was Anne Spencer, and the Hitchcock family were runners up.

An email enquiry regarding colour printing was raised. It had been decided that this may be considered for special occasions, such as a Jubilee Party or Festival. It was suggested some annual celebrations could be considered. It was added this may blur boundaries regarding which annual events should/ shouldn't be included in colour.

#### VILLAGE CALENDAR

Lorraine Brooks passed round a proof of the calendar and which had gone to print. Calendars would be on sale from 3rd August at the Flower Show, then at other village events and shops. If anyone can help selling them at their events/venues, please let Lorraine know.

**Fundraising:** Iain Wright will approach the organiser of the Farmers Markets regarding the CC holding a raffle each month.

### FORTHCOMING EVENTS

Bank Holiday Picnic on the Meadow - Sunday 25th August: Duck Race, Family Picnic & BBQ, a Music Set and 'Open Mike'. Iain Wright is leading. Reeds in Mill Stream will need cutting back for the Duck Race. Organisation will be done via email round robin due to the time restriction.

Village Quiz - Friday 4th October: Rachel Hitchcock is leading. An email has gone out to village groups asking them to submit 10 questions in a similar way to last year. Woodland Corner helpers will help setting up the hall and do the scoring.

**Bonfire Night - Tuesday 5th November:** Promotion for Guys to put on the bonfire will be needed in the October CT.

**Christmas Fayre - Sunday 1st December 12-2pm:** Alex Badman, Neil Barbrook and Jenny Smith will liaise on organising. Jayne Kennedy confirmed that Nayand School will provide some musical entertainment at approx 1.20pm. A decision on a children's competition will made after Jill Badman has liaised with the School.

Valentines Night - Saturday 15th February: Karen Elliott will lead, Claire Buller will help. Iain will organise the bar, Karen will book the music. We are looking for ideas for food/catering.

- Amend object 2 c to a) secure the preservation, protection, development and improvement of features of historic or public interest in the area of benefit and
- b) acquire items of historic or public interest in the area of benefit.
- Also to insert a new clause 2.xii that the Society, through the Executive Committee, may acquire and hold any feature or object of historic or public interest relating to the area of benefit. Almost 90 members and friends then heard John Rix give a

very interesting talk about Farming in the Stour Valley. Having started on a 28 acre dairy farm in 1950 the business has grown to 5,300 acres employing 130 people, the majority of whom live

locally. Onions for Tescos, potatoes, lettuce, sugar beet, winter wheat and barley are among the varied crops grown on the valley sides. (Further details of John's talk can be found on the Society's website (address above) **Open Gardens:** The weather was good and more than 400 people came to enjoy the 16 gardens which were open. About £2,500 was raised for the Society and we are very grateful to all the openers, the tea helpers and cake makers. 

# Garden Notes

# by The Old Muckspreader

The wet Spring, a rarity in East Anglia, has produced unusually lush growth on all plants, especially trees and shrubs, and those which have flowered can now be trimmed or cut back, as the situation demands.

At the time of writing it is really hot, and if the weather forecasts are to be believed - which requires an act of faith - will remain so for some time; one pleasant result is the large number of Meadow Brown butterflies in the orchard, paddock and other areas of rough grass here.

This comes after a steady decline in numbers in recent years. It will be interesting to see whether the Vanessas, (Red Admirals, Peacocks and Painted Ladies) will do the same.

Many years ago the OM/S grew a few of that beautiful member of the Tobacco family, Nicotiana Sylvestris. It sends up a stem in late summer which carries clusters of highly scented white flowers, very attractive to moths.

In subsequent years he tried to repeat the process, but never managed to produce a flower, and last year the slugs ate the lot. This year he was again given some young plants by a generous fellow member of HortSoc, and now surrounded by gravel chippings, they look in good shape, beginning to send up their flower spikes.

After a week of record temperatures most lawns are now turning brown. Watering them is a waste of effort, and water; when rain finally comes they will recover. In the meantime it's best not to mow. Wholesale watering of plants is also impractical but if an individual rarity or recently planted specimen looks sick then it should be given a really good drink (at least a gallon) and then surrounded with a mulch such as leafmould.

Vegetables, of course, are a different matter; they need regular watering.

# THE VILLAGE CONSTABLE

The jurisdiction of medieval manorial courts was so wide that very few members of the adult male population could avoid being recorded in some way. Every Lord of the Manor had the right to hold a court for his tenants and the court was presided over by his Steward. Manorial juries consisted of 12 homagers or jurors and their main duty was to deal with the Lord's financial interests in his manor. One other duty was to appoint parish officers, including Constables and Aletasters . In Nayland two Constables and 2 Aletasters were appointed every year.

Constables were important figures in the community, a link between the Lord of the Manor and his tenants and the keepers of law and order. Later as manors decayed the appointments were made by the Parish Vestry Meeting. Constables served for one year and were usually elected on a rotation basis; they needed to be better off members

The White Hart where the Manorial Court sometimes met

of the community, such as farmers or craftsmen, as the office was unpaid and no expenses were given for loss of earnings. They had many duties as well as dealing with petty law and order and being responsible for the stocks, pillory and village lock-up. In Nayland the stocks stood in the High Street and the lock-up was in the Workhouse in Fen Street. They saw to the whipping of vagrants and escorted prisoners to Quarter Sessions or Assizes. They were also responsible to the Head Constable of the Hundred for certain duties and the Justices of the Peace for others.

Constables collected national taxes, such as the poll tax, hearth tax and land tax, and county rates which paid for such things as prisons, roads and bridges. Their military duties included the raising of the local militia and they were responsible for weights and measures and the supervision of ale houses. One of their most important responsibilities was the distribution of money to the poor of the Parish. Daniel Defoe remarked in his *Parochial Tyranny* (1714) that the office of constable was "one of insupportable hardship ... it takes up so much of a man's time that his own affairs are frequently totally neglected, too often to his ruin". However, many elected Constables regarded the position as an honour which gave them status in the community.

The Suffolk Record Office holds minute books for the Manor of Nayland with Downings from the 18<sup>th</sup> century, with a few gaps. They make fascinating reading; for instance, in the minutes of the Court Baron which dealt with the transfer of property, most of today's older properties are mentioned but many had different names and it can be difficult to pinpoint a particular one. It is sometimes possible to trace people's movements as I have done with a former occupier of my house, Thomas Marshall. He lived in three houses in Court Street and was a member of the Manor Court for several years. His son-in-law, a local blacksmith, was also a member and was a Constable and Aletaster in the 1830s.

Two members of the Alston family who lived at what is now called Alston Court were attorneys by profession and were Stewards in the 18<sup>th</sup> century. Sometimes the Court met in the White Hart in the High Street but in 1742 the minutes say the Court was held "in the chamber of the house called the Market House". About this time the Market Cross was also mentioned and "the Middle Row near the Market Place, formerly 2 butchers' stalls", which conjures up a quite different picture of the High

Street from what we see today. Unfortunately we can only use our imaginations as there is no pictorial evidence but I wonder if the Market House still exists. Perhaps the name is mentioned in someone's deeds.

The Home Secretary, Sir Robert Peel, founded his constabulary in London in 1829 but it took several years for police forces to spread from London into the provinces. Thus, in the reign of William IV (1830 - 1837) village Constables were still appointed by the manorial court in Nayland. In those days a Constable's truncheon was as much a staff of office as an instrument of law and order. I was fortunate to be given the Nayland truncheon from this time by the family of the late Blair Lees, former Parish Recorder, which had turned up in Ipswich in the 1970s. The truncheon shows the monogram of King William IV, followed by his Royal Arms surmounted by the Crown. The White Horse of Hanover stands out clearly and underneath it all is the single word "Nayland". As Thomas Marshall, who lived in our cottage until he died in 1842, was a member of the Manor Court and partly responsible for appointing village Constables, I am more than happy to see the truncheon hanging on its hook on our wall.

Last year I was surprised to be shown a similar truncheon with "Wiston Suffolk" painted on it by someone living in Hampshire whose ancestors were local millers. When Wiston had its own Constable I can't help feeling that being responsible for such a rural area he could have been particularly overworked.

In living memory Nayland still had its own resident Police Constables but their duties could not have been more different than those of the Constables of centuries ago. They worked from their own private houses until the 1950s when a designated house was built in Bear Street at about the same time as the new school and headmaster's house. By the 1980s Nayland no longer had its own resident constable and the police house was sold. Gradually our police presence has diminished to just a glimpse of a police car occasionally driving through the streets. How different from the days when the resident bobby knew everyone in the village and kept an eye on what the youngsters were up to, no doubt deterring some from a life of crime with a stern word or two when required.

# **CONSERVATION SOCIETY** by Pat Bray

This year's open gardens event was very successful and raised about £2,500, members of Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society heard at their meeting on June 24. Chairman John Alexander said 16 gardens were on show and he thanked everyone who took part by opening their gardens or selling cakes and ice creams.

He said the money raised this year and next would go towards financing a second test pit dig in the autumn of 2014. The society had also applied to the community council for a  $\pounds$ 1,500 grant to help pay the  $\pounds$ 8,000 cost of the dig organised by Cambridge University. It was a very worthwhile project which would reveal much of the village's ancient history, he added.

Reporting on the Horkesley Park application, Mr Alexander said Bunting and Sons' appeal against refusal would be heard by a planning inspector in October and would take 12 days ten at Langham village hall and the last two at the Moot Hall, Colchester. Whatever the outcome of the hearing Mr Alexander said it would be called in for the Secretary of State to make the final decision.

Jean Dryden, who has devised promotional material for the society for more than 30 years, was presented with a basket of flowers as a token of members' appreciation and thanked for helping to make society events so successful.

Following the acquisition of a postcard collection and Constable sketch members approved two changes to the society's constitution enabling it to acquire items of historic or public interest.

The business meeting was followed by an entertaining talk by farmer John Rix on *Farming in the Stour Valley*.

#### **RAISING THE BAR IN EDUCATION**

A report, commissioned by SCC, has now been produced by the RSA with a series of recommendations aimed at driving up educational standards in Suffolk. The RSA (*Royal Society for the encouragement of Arts, Manufactures and Commerce*) is an enlightenment organisation committed to finding innovative practical solutions to today's social challenges.

The RSA's report, '**No School is an Island**', **contains 20 recommendations**. Among these is the idea that small rural schools with fewer than 100 pupils should enter a federation with others to maximise resources. Other suggestions include: for Suffolk to form a partnership with a London Borough with a record of improvement in educational standards, to learn from the huge progress they have made; for every school to establish a Parents' Council to ensure voices are heard, and also for all Suffolk schools to join together to form a new county-wide, school-led Suffolk Partnership for Excellence in Learning.

Action already taken is that a formal liaison has been created with the Hackney Borough who have certainly improved their standards over the last 10 years.

Driving up educational standards in Suffolk is our number one priority. A wide range of people play an important role in a young person's education, from parents through to head teachers and Governors. We are determined to leave no stone unturned in helping everyone play their part in giving young people in Suffolk the best possible start in life.

#### Failing to Stop and Report following a Road Traffic Accident

It is an offence for a person being the driver of a mechanically propelled vehicle and owing to the presence of that vehicle on the road or other such public place an accident having occurred whereby damage or injury was caused did fail to stop and give his name and address and identification marks of the vehicle. (Road Traffic Act 1988 s 170 (2) see below)

'Section 170(2) of the Road Traffic act 1988 provides that the driver of the motor vehicle must stop and, if required to do so by any person having reasonable grounds for so requiring, give his/her name and address, the name and address of the owner of the vehicle and the identification marks of the vehicle. The duty to stop means to stop sufficiently long enough to exchange the particulars above.

Section 170(3) places an obligation on the driver, if he/she does not give his name and address under subsection (2) above, to cost estimated at being close to £1.5billion. It is proposed that this will be funded in part by local authority contributions, together with tolling of the road when completed. SCC's Cabinet will be discussing the issue at its cabinet meeting on 9th July, with a view to confirming a commitment to provide around £1million to the project over a 25-year period.

A new website has been launched with information on Suffolk's project to deliver high-speed broadband across Suffolk. (www. betterbroadbandsuffolk.com). Leavenheath is now planned for upgrade in 12-18 months time. All efforts will be made to bring this date forward.

report the accident to a police constable or police station as soon as reasonably practicable and in any case within 24 hours. The duty to report means "as soon as reasonably practicable, it does not mean the driver has 24 hours within which to report the collision.

When the evidence reveals a failure to comply with both subsections (2) and (3), proceedings should be brought for both offences. The failure to stop is usually viewed as the more serious of the two. A person who fails to comply with subsection (2) or (3) above is guilty of an offence punishable with a maximum sentence of six months' imprisonment.'

#### What are my legal obligations?

If damage has been caused to another person or another person's property, you must stop and provide your full details to the injured party/the owner of the damaged property. You must supply your name and address and the name and address of the owner of the vehicle you were using, if it is not your vehicle. In the case of a person suffering injury you also have an obligation to report the matter to the Police "as soon as reasonably practicable" but in any event, within 24 hours.

# I was involved in an accident but did not stop or provide any details, what offences have I committed?

You could be prosecuted for failing to stop and failing to report, regardless of whether you are to blame for the accident. If the accident is wholly or partially your fault, you could also be prosecuted for driving without due care and attention or dangerous driving.

# What are the potential penalties for failing to stop and failing to report?

Each offence can result in an instant driving ban, but in normal circumstances, you should expect a means tested fine up to  $\pounds 2,500$  and between 5 and 10 penalty points. In extremely serious cases, punishment can include community service, a curfew order or a prison sentence.

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
