NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 12th December 2012

PUBLIC FORUM

Mike Almond thanked councilors for their support regarding the 9-11 Mill Street planning application and asked if a grit bin could be provided in the Church Lane area.

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Mandy Coleman's report stated there had been one incident reported in the last month: a possible burglary of an ipad from a property on Campions Hill.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

Richard Cave said progress following Babergh's community engagement questionnaire would be available for the next meeting.

COUNTY COUNCILLORS REPORT

James Finch reported that a consultation is underway asking Suffolk residents for their views about the county's Fire and Rescue Service working more closely with its Cambridgeshire & Peterborough counterpart. This could potentially mean a full merger.

The consultation runs until the middle of January. An online questionnaire is available on: http://www.suffolk.gov.uk/your-council/decision-making/consultations/delivering-the-best-fire-service-to-you/.

This follows the successful merger of the fire control centres for the two authorities last year. He added there would be no reduction in fire stations and a merger would not affect response times.

STREET LIGHTING

Gerry Battye said the council is committed to upgrading its street lighting to European standard over the next 5-6 years and cutting back on energy levels by turning lights off during the night, from 12 midnight until 5.30am.

James Finch confirmed that £1,000 would be available from the locality budget towards the next phase of upgrading.

HIGHWAYS

Following a SCC Highways review meeting on vehicle speeds on rural roads, development of a mechanism to report non-injury traffic incidents was being considered. Councillors felt this would be a positive step which could help build a case for speed reduction on the A134. James Finch said he had requested provision of a temporary speed activated sign.

The Dental and Cosmetic Surgery have requested the cobbles to the front of their property are cleaned. The council intends that this is done to coincide with installation of the new Christmas tree fixing by the Community Council.

Maintenance checks would be carried out to the war memorial and milestone.

Councillors agreed to provide a grit bin in Church Lane subject to finding a suitable location. The meeting was reminded that volunteers spreading grit from bins and piles would be covered by council insurance if they submitted their names to the clerk.

Rosemary Knox reported she had received complaints about vehicles parking on Anchor Bridge. Gerry Battye said previously it was felt the parked cars helped slow traffic down and yellow lines could spread the problem to Court Street and Horkesley Road. It was felt parking on the bridge should be monitored.

DOG FOULING

A letter from a resident complaining about ongoing incidents of dog fouling in Mill Street, High Street and Court Street suggested more notices should be displayed. A supply of notices had been ordered from Babergh.

It was suggested that free bags be available in this area as they are at Caley Green.

Councillors were reminded fines could be implemented if incidents are spotted and a statement made.

It was suggested that school children may be able help the council with his problem by educating their elders about dog fouling. The council would approach the Primary School.

ALLOTMENTS

There are five people on the waiting list. Councillors will check on the condition of current allotments.

The drainage of rainwater on Candy Lane near the sub-station will be monitored.

Following the archeology test pit dig in October a public meeting will be held on 29 April to reveal the results.

The council will consider installing a barrier at the entrance to the allotment field to prevent access of unauthorised vehicles.

MEMORIAL BENCH

Suggestions for the siting of a memorial bench for John Kent included Popp's Piece, the allotment field and by the horseshoe weir but it was felt a location opposite 30 Bear Street which had been the home of the Kent family may be appropriate and would provide a welcome resting place for less mobile residents on their journey through the village. Patricia Fuller agreed to look at the site and report back.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Gerry Batty said permission had been granted; at 5 High Street to reduce and shape a Beech tree by 30-35%.

Councillors had no objections to an application at 5 Mill Street for erection of single storey rear extension, increase in size of existing ground floor window in rear elevation and internal alterations.

Documents were being circulated on an application at 28 Fen Street for erection of front porch, side porch, and single-storey rear extensions (following demolition of existing porch/rear extension and conservatory), rendering of exterior of existing building and fenestration alterations. Councillors had concerns regarding the shared access bridge but would make a recommendation on the application when all councillors had seen the paperwork.

Decisions on applications for erection of a flue pipe at Campions Farm, Campions Hill and at 19 Fen Street for erection of rear garden room extension (following demolition of existing single-storey rear extension) would also be made between meetings.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The license agreement from SCC for the management of Caley Green was formally signed. They would take on the responsibility of a yearly assessment and major tree work. The Parish Council would continue to manage the grass, fishing, bins, benches, access, signage and minor tree work.

Landscaping work at the Horse Watering will take place when weather conditions allow.

VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox reported that hire charges were as low as they could be in maintaining a hall of this scale. She added that they lose some custom to the church hall. Volunteers are still needed to join the committee.

Gerry Battye said the finance committee had requested a copy of the VHMC's updated five-year plan.

IN BRIEF

It was noted that when brown bin collections had been cancelled due to bad weather a notice had been displayed in the Post Office and on Babergh's website.

Mr Jones of Heycroft Way has requested that branches overhanging his property to the northern and western boundaries of the burial ground are pruned.

Rosemary Knox reported that the footbridge at Popp's Piece has been very slippery during recent frosts.

The finance committee was thanked for their work and it was agreed to accept their proposals of a £33,000 precept, a 2-3% inflationary increase.

It was agreed to formally adopt the internal control statement, which is formalization of current practices.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 9th January 2013

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Mandy Coleman's report stated there had been five incidents reported in the last month: theft of heating oil at Nags Corner, criminal damage to a padlock at Campions Hill, theft of a non-working motor vehicle in Cawley Road, burglary from a shed in Fen Street and burglary from a garage in Harpers Estate.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS REPORT

Richard Cave reported on the emerging strategic priorities from Babergh's community engagement questionnaire.

ALLOTMENTS

There are five people on the waiting list (2 requiring plots adjoining existing). Allotment holders who are not keeping their plots in good order will be contacted. Councillors discussed installation of a barrier at the entrance to the allotment field to prevent access of unauthorised vehicles yet allowing future expansion of the allotments. Proposals will be discussed at the next meeting.

STREET LIGHTING

Confirmation had been received from SCC that £1,000 would be available from the locality budget towards the next phase of upgrading in Bear Street as far as Parkers Way. Debbie Hattrell agreed to investigate options and costs for the next phase to progress further along Bear Street. This may include options for heritage lanterns.

Gerry Battye reported units 18 and 25 in Elm Grove were not working and the light unit 15 on Laburnum Way was still missing. **MEMORIAL BENCH**

Further consideration was given to the siting of a memorial bench for John Kent at a location opposite 30 Bear Street. Highways and adjacent neighbours to the site would be contacted about the proposal.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Gerry Batty said permission had been granted; at 5 Jane Walker Park for the erection of 2 porches and internal alterations, and for erection of a flue pipe at Campions Farm, Campions Hill. An application for the erection of single storey rear extension, increase in size of existing ground floor window in rear elevation, and internal alterations at 5 Mill Street has been withdrawn.

Between meetings councillors had no objections to an application at 19 Fen Street for erection of rear garden room extension (following demolition of existing single-storey rear extension) or for erection of a flue pipe at Campions Farm.

They had no objections to a application for erection of front porch, side porch, and single-storey rear extensions (following demolition of existing porch/rear extension and conservatory), rendering of exterior of existing building and fenestration alterations at 28 Fen Street but raised concerns regarding the shared access bridge.

Councillors objected to an application at Creems, Bures Road for change of use from agricultural land to residential to allow for new driveway, parking area and erection of garage for use with existing dwelling on various points including the visible impact it would have on the site which is on a steep valley side within the AONB and that it contravenes planning policies.

HORKESLEY PARK

Councillors heard that the application for The Stour Valley Visitor Centre at Horkesley Park will go before the planning committee on 28th February. CBC have obtained consultant reports, some of which are available on their website, but councillors expressed concern over the lack of publicly available information particularly concerning the viability of the proposed Visitor Centre.

The council will request an opportunity to speak at the planning meeting; their points of objection would be confirmed at the next meeting.

HIGHWAYS

Following consideration of providing a grit bin in Church Lane/ Newlands Lane a bin will be ordered to be positioned in Church Lane, between the gates to Loretto and Sacred Heart Church.

Rosemary Knox confirmed Highways are still to provide markers for ditches in Wiston Road.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The finalised license agreement from SCC for the management of Caley Green has been received.

The owner of Lock Cottage has requested that following landscaping work at the Horse Watering provisions for long term maintenance are considered.

Quotes will be obtained for cutting back overgrown hedging on the west boundary of Fairfield Playing Field, backing on to the Heights. The Primary School would be asked to cut back shrubs on their boundary with the playing field. Repair to a post on the log trail has been authorised.

Contractors have been instructed to clear moss from the cobbles by the Milestone. Contractors reinstating the Jane Walker memorial plaque will commence work once councillors have confirmed specification of the bricks.

Volunteers are still needed to take forward a project using 106 Recreation grants for equipment for the village.

A5 dog fouling posters have been ordered from Babergh.

VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox reported that the Youth Club continue to use the hall every Tuesday. The club is doing well with a new volunteer leader who has replaced the paid youth worker and the committee are planning a Snail Race fundraiser in April.

Gerry Battye said a copy of the VHMC's updated five-year plan had been received.

IN BRIFF:

Rosemary Knox reported that the footpath warden is liaising with Essex regarding the footbridge at Popp's Piece which has been very slippery during recent frosts.

Gerry Barrye agreed to represent the Parish Council at the Community Council meeting on 14th January.

The Parish Assembly would be held on Monday 22nd April at 8pm and it is hoped Jonathan Free, Head of Communities at Babergh will talk about 'village futures'.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 14th January 2013 Chairman: Alex Badman 262994

Village Hall: Bryan Smith advised the executive that he had requested the VHMC to explain to the newer members of the CC how the accounts were set out for the Village Hall so that we could better understand the request for a grant. This information was provided by Andrew Gowen the Treasurer. Andrew was thanked for his assistance with this matter and was congratulated in the way he had kept such good control of the VH finances, which were fairly easy to understand. The Chair of the CC thanked Andrew for his assistance and reminded all village groups to tell their members and other contacts of the availability of this very valuable resource and to promote its use.

Village Christmas Tree: Grateful thanks are due to Colin and David Moss who kindly made up the new fixing. Alex has this for painting and installation will take place in the spring when the weather is more suitable.

Parish Council Representative: A letter will be sent to the PC to remind them of our constitutional requirement of having a designated PC representative on the CC executive committee.

Babergh Achievement Awards: Alex said the person suggested by the CC as a worthy candidate for an award had also been suggested by the PC and they put the nomination forward. This was successful and the recipient, will collect their award on 6th March. Their name and a reminder of their contribution to the village will appear in the Community Times (page 30).

Correspondence: A letter was received from Tom Gardiner regarding the Fireworks night; this matter was discussed and a vote was taken with regard to the content and actions of the CC. A letter will be sent to Mr Gardiner apologising for any misunderstanding by the Chairman.

Grants:

Village Hall: A grant request for £1,000 for their endowment fund had been received. During the executive meeting Andrew Gowen gave a detailed report on the purpose of the endowment fund, which is for long term development or disasters, and clarified queries. Andrew was thanked for his report. Payment of the grant was agreed.

Notice Board at The Forge: Alex was in communication with Bryn Hurren regarding the quote. Hazel pointed out the CC notice board needed attention; the left door was warped and the cork backing was coming off.

Freemasons Donation granted to the Luncheon Club & Over 60s Club: A letter of thanks had been received from Olga Alexander on behalf of the Luncheon Club for over 60s; they enjoyed a special Christmas luncheon with raffle prizes and presents.

The Over 60s Club would use their share of the donation for a coach outing in the spring/summer.

Recent Activities:

Christmas Fayre - Sunday 2nd December: It was felt this was one of the best Christmas Fayres we have run. Special thanks go to Santa Claus for dropping in and to the School Choir. Their later performance at after 1pm worked very well.

Village Christmas Tree: Alex said the tree looked very nice this year with new lights and new light fittings installed in the Dental Surgery. We are grateful to them for supplying the power for the lights. Thanks were also due to Fred Smith for the discounted price of the Christmas tree, to Claire and her band of helpers for erecting and taking down the tree and to Sean Norfolk for trimming the tree trunk to fit.

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks asked that any groups requiring space for promotion or large articles let her know as soon as possible as the decision on how many pages to have is made a week or so ahead of deadline.

Executive Committee: Alex said that due to retirements over the last couple of years numbers on the executive committee have decreased. He asked members to encourage people to come forward to join the Exec. The CC meet every two months and occasional help with events would be welcome.



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



Seventy years ago, Nayland supported butchers, a bakery, greengrocers and pubs. Local farms often provided the produce sold within them and the allotments covered the full extent of the field they currently occupy. Back gardens were bursting with home grown produce and most of the food eaten in Nayland was produced or grown locally.

Such a rich food economy meant that many local people made a living from food. There was a strong relationship between people and the land they occupied. That relationship no longer exists.

Throughout the UK, farmers' knowledge of the land they work, their local environment, micro-climates and their historically accumulated experience is gradually being lost. Local money no longer circulates around communities building wealth and relationships as it goes. The natural capital of our landscape has now been diverted into the hands of a few multinational corporations as food has become a global commodity, the product of a highly industrialized system with intensive agricultural practices, the consequences of which have lead to several high profile food health scares involving salmonella, E-coli and CJD.

The process of farming is now squeezed between the profitable activities that enable it such as the production of antibiotics, fertilizers and growth hormones and the food processing and retailing activities associated with selling it – the homogenisation of produce, the rise in convenience products, own label branding etc. All of these activities are more profitable than farming and lay in the hands of a few multi-national companies. As a result, the price we pay for food in supermarkets is unequally distributed within the food chain with our farmers receiving just a small percentage.

In addition, there are massive paradoxes embedded in the current agri-food system. In a world where people are starving there is plenty of food that exists. Where half of the global population are obese and the other half are starved and suffering from malnutrition.

These epic failures demonstrate that cheap food production on a global scale is not only pushing out our farmers and local producers but has social and environmental consequences for us all.

But what can we do about it? The fact is that our shopping habits and lifestyle choices can make a difference. Individual decisions about what food to buy and where to buy it can accumulate and swell the effect of those decisions into a significant shift in shopping and eating patterns.

According to the British Retail Consortium, every £10 spent with a local food provider is worth £25 to the local economy. This drops to a mere £14 if the same £10 is spent in a national supermarket. It is known as the multiplier effect; spending money in local shops supports local jobs meaning money spent is often reinvested in the local community and re-spent many times over. Local shops will likely use local services – print companies, solicitors, shops and local producers/farmers to name a few. National supermarkets typically use national services contracted centrally and more money therefore leaves the local area.

You can support your local economy by using local butchers, bakers, dairies, greengrocers, farmers markets, farm shops and vegetable box schemes. As the saying goes, we need to 'use them or lose them!'

Nayland Village Hall Finances by the Treasurer, Andrew Gowen

At a recent meeting of the Community Council it became clear that there is a misunderstanding about the financial management of the Village Hall and I am keen to clarify the issues.

The Village Hall is insured for just under £900,000 and together with its Playing Field, the assets under management by the Village Hall Management Committee are worth well over £1m. It is one of the biggest halls in the area and provides many facilities, not least a large car park, which others do not. We attract numerous groups from outside the Village and during 2012, against considerable competition; the Hall was selected to host the National Samaritans Conference. Please remember we are fortunate in this Village to have the Church Hall to provide a very cheap venue for meetings and small parties but this is at the expense of Village Hall income.

One of the drawbacks of having such a large hall is the running and maintenance costs which increase year on year as the hall gets older. Theoretically we should be able to re-coup these costs from the hire charges. It costs us £12.83 for each hour the Hall is let which is probably more than some of our societies can afford. We charge our own residents between £9 and £11 depending on the time and time of year. We make up the difference by fundraising and during 2012 our committee raised some £3400 for this purpose. We are fortunate that the Parish Council occasionally does help us meet the larger bills such as the cost of refurbishing the floor but generally we are self financing. If the Village wants more facilities, such as a Dishwasher, we expect those interested to pay for it. We have no spare resources; not even enough to put away for a 'rainy day'.

It was for that reason in 2007; I set up a separate fund, which I have called the Endowment Fund, to hold money for the future development of the Hall. It is 'ring fenced' and controlled by the Chairmen of the Parish and Community Councils. It cannot be used for the day to day running of the Hall. I hope that in future this fund might receive bequests and donations from benefactors who can be confident that their contributions will be used for improvements and will not be frittered away by the Village Hall Management Committee. We are pleased to report that the Community Council has contributed £1000 each year to this fund since it was set up. This fund currently stands at £10363.

When I took over the Hall Accounts in 2006, there was £6000 in the bank and it was making a surplus of some £800 a year. In fact it was making a loss of some £1000 a year because depreciation on furniture and equipment was not being taken into account. This was totally inadequate to support an asset worth over £1m and if it had continued, with increasing maintenance costs, the hall would have needed an annual bail out from the Parish Council and others. Today the Hall has over £23,600 in reserves and in 2012 we had a surplus of £2076.18 after depreciation. In my view we should be aiming to achieve an annual surplus of £5000 which would be a 0.5% return on our asset value; but we could not achieve this without putting up hire charges to an unacceptable level.

Assuming there are 12 hours letting time a day; there was a 30% usage of the Hall. In 2011 it was 31%.

JANUARY COMMITTEE MEETING

At the January meeting, the Chairman presented to the VHMC some maintenance projections up to 2050 showing what items will need to be replaced to maintain the Hall in the future. The projections will be presented to the Parish Council.

The youth club reported that they have a new volunteer leader who will implement a new structure and plans. At the end of April a Snail Race Night is planned to raise funds.

The Committee expressed concerns with the views expressed by the Community Council as reported in the Community Times December 2012 issue. In particular it was noted from a report received from the Treasurer that the hire charges are not high and indeed are very competitive in

comparison with halls of a similar size and standard. It was further noted that as the VHMC is a registered charity the accounts are available for public view. The treasurer was congratulated on his excellent work since his appointment.

In conclusion the Committee asked the treasurer to attend the next meeting of the Community Council to convey the Committee's disappointment with the comments reported in the Community Times and to further express the view that a more constructive working relationship may be achieved in the future.

The Village Hall garden clear up will take place on the 16th March at 9.00 am and all volunteers will be welcome.

The VHMC AGM will take place at the Village Hall on the 4th March at 8.00 am and everyone is invited to attend.

Garden Notes

At the time of writing the first snow of the year has arrived, and if the first forecasts are to be believed, it may be short lived. None the less, it has produced some very low temperatures and some damage must be expected.

We have, of course, already suffered the brief cold snap late last year, which killed or cut down tender plants. Snow itself, of course, is not usually the killer; it's the freezing north easterly winds that do the damage. Where shrubs, especially evergreens, are weighed down with snow it's a good idea to go round with a pole and gently tap the branches before any further falls cause them to break.

A new predator has appeared at M/S Hall. Previous sightings had been brief, but now we have suffered major damage. In recent weeks the OM/S had spotted that low growing ivy bushes had been cropped, followed by the bark on the trunk of a large holly. Last week however, it or they attacked the main trunks of several apple trees in the orchard. On one old tree, which blew down I a gale in the 1970s and had been lying on its side but producing good crops ever since, the main trunk which is about 10" in diameter has been completely stripped of bark for a distance of 5 feet or so, with several of the main branches also attacked. The culprits can only be deer, and we suspect muntjac. If the damage extends to the cambium layer the tree will die; a further bulletin will be issued in the spring.

The OM/S cannot resist his usual plug on Aconites; they were in full flower before the snowfall, and when it melts they will reappear unscathed.

The foliage of snowdrops is only just beginning to appear but flowers will soon follow. A word of warning here; don't plant them under evergreens. After one flowering season they will produce foliage only, and soon vanish altogether. An example of this was in the churchyard, where there are no longer any under the big yew, but plenty to the left of the path. Ideally they flourish in damp deciduous woodland, so if possible avoid the drier parts of the garden.

News From The Past

These days technology provides us with many ways of keeping up to date with current affairs and local news but hopefully newspapers will always be with us. I have a large collection of press cuttings accumulated over the years and below are a few interesting extracts concerning Nayland.

From The Spectator, 1851

HONESTY, AND MUNIFICENT REWARD. While Mr Stannard of Nayland Mill was driving in his chaise to Hadleigh he lost a bag containing eleven hundred sovereigns. After his return to Nayland he was delighted by a small farmer bringing him the treasure which he had found on the road. Mr Stannard presented the farmer with one hundred of the sovereigns.

[Note: Jeremiah Stannard owned both Wiston and Nayland Mills in the 19th century]



Stanley Hatten, 14, described as a hawker's assistant of Nayland, was brought before the Boxford magistrates for an offence created on the highway by discharging a firework at Nayland. The defendant pleaded guilty. PC Bailey, stationed at Nayland, deposed that at about 6.30 pm he was on duty in the High Street when he saw the defendant light and discharge a firework. It went off with a loud report. The bench severely cautioned the defendant and ordered his mother to pay the costs. The chairman Mr HLD Engleheart, said the bench was determined to put a stop to the practice and would deal more stringently with cases in the future.

[Stanley Hatten, Susan's grandfather, later ran Hattens Stores (now the Village Stores) in Bear Street]

DEATH OF MR CARL BENDIXON. On Wednesday intelligence was received at Nayland – by cablegram from Archangel – of the death in Russia of Mr Carl Bendixon who some months ago went out with a number of English motor dispatch riders to Russia where they rendered invaluable aid to our Eastern Ally. Mr Bendixon, who was 26 years of age, was an accomplished linguist and was highly esteemed and beloved in Nayland and the district.

[The Bendixon family bought Nayland Mill when corn milling ended and were leather manufacturers]



WOOD SPIDERS SHUN. The paragraph in Saturday's Daily Mail on the apparent dislike of spiders to spin their webs on Spanish chestnut has brought letters from a number of readers. "There is a 15th century house in Nayland, Suffolk", writes CEF of Streatham Hill, "one of the bedrooms of which has a Spanish chestnut roof beautifully carved. No cobwebs ever appear on this roof. It was supposed that a resinous exudation was the cause of this and indeed the wood has, in spite of its great age, a shiny, almost moist appearance".

[ČEF was Charles Edward Fenn of Alston Court and the bedroom was the Solar room at Alston Court]

Suffolk & Essex Free Press, 1924

A LIVELY MEETING. The annual vestry meeting at Nayland on Thursday produced one of those gatherings for which in the past the village has secured some fame. Crowds flocked to the meeting which opened in an uproar, for the various partisans present could not be agreed as to who should be chairman. This point was discussed for 40 minutes amidst uproar and eventually a comparative stranger was agreed upon to take the count on a show of hands for Major Hornsby or Captain Walsh. Eventually the former was favoured. It was decided that the appointment of a vicar's warden could not be proceeded with. Objection was raised to the constitution of the meeting which

included residents from Wissington and a large number of sanatorium patients and staff and others who had been canvassed to attend in support of Captain Walsh whom they desired to elect in place of Mr William Deaves, churchwarden for many years. After heated discussion it was proposed and seconded that Captain Walsh be appointed. An amendment in favour of Mr Deaves was carried by a large majority. Mr Deaves, in returning thanks, expressed a hope that the parishioners would endeavour to live in unity again. [Let's hope they did! This was kindly given to me by Mrs Knox]

Suffolk & Essex Free Press 1937

A WATER SUPPLY scheme being prepared in the various parishes controlled by the Melford Rural District Council was expected to be up and running within a year. The Water Committee reported during a meeting that the scheme was ready to start subject to the approval of the Ministry of Health. The overall figure for the work was £29,400. A Mr Russell remarked that at a Nayland parish meeting there had been a lot of discussion about water and they did not want any. (!!) [Mains water came to Nayland just before the Second World War]

East Anglian Daily Times 1949

SCHOOL IS 101 YEARS OLD: CALL FOR NEW ONE.

Nayland School is 101 years old but no new one is in sight and this had led to much local feeling on the subject. At a recent meeting of the Parent Teacher Association it was decided to take some action to get things moving and a resolution was sent to the West Suffolk Education Committee at Bury St Edmunds: "In view of the fact that the school at Nayland, built in 1848, was condemned many years ago, the committee expresses great concern over the lack of a new building. It urges the Education Committee to do all in its power to hasten the building of a new school".

[The children eventually moved to their new school in Bear Street in 1958]

NAYLAND TO LOSE HALF ITS PUBS. These are the Queen's Head, the Butcher's Arms and the Victoria [in Court Street]. The three inns will probably be sold for private homes. The move means retirement for 75 year old Mrs Maud Boon, licensee of the Butcher's Arms with her husband for 46 years. Mr E Douglas, has been licensee of the Queen's Head for 5 years. His customers have been protesting to the brewers at the plan to close it. The old stables have been converted into a hall which is used for social functions and once a week it becomes a cinema.

[Later in 1984 the Star & Garter in Bear Street also closed. The White Hart has been closed since 2008, leaving only the Anchor]

ANDORA CARVER:

RECIPIENT OF A BABERGH 2013 COMMUNITY ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Yet again, the Parish is lucky to have a recipient of this prestigious award living here. Both the Parish Council and the Community Council are pleased to announce this accolade. Andora is due to receive the award at a ceremony to be held at Stoke by Nayland Hotel on March 6th. The citation for her award, will honour Andora's special contributions to our Community.

Since her arrival with her husband, James, 34 years ago, she has been a key ingredient in making ours an active community. They are very much a double act - each supporting the other in their community activities. Starting out in the late 1970s as a Playgroup Committee member and volunteer, Andora has become another tireless engineer in our village 'engine room'. Her energetic, thoughtful and articulate promotion of village causes has been special.

The award recognises her tireless work on behalf of St James' Church. Her superb coordination of the Annual Church Fete, which over the years has raised many thousands of pounds is duly cited. Her efforts with the annual autumn Jamboree sale are also recognised, as is her help with many Community Council events over the years. The role of 'Carvers' Barn' in community events is mentioned. Andora's role in masterminding the 2010 Constable Bi-Centenary Exhibition in the Church is also highlighted. Her legendary organisational skills are particularly commended. Everybody in the village knows that when she organises anything, it will be meticulously planned, with checks made and contingencies

Continuously, for 20 years, Andora has been the indefatigable Hon. Secretary of the Conservation Society, being at the heart of so many of its projects, campaigns and on-going work. In this, she has fostered resolute and knowledgeable stewarding of the heritage of our village. Her co-ordination of the Open Gardens event, since 1978 is described. She has also contributed hundreds of hours in co-ordinating different exhibitions, including the huge village Millennium Exhibition in 2001. Her work on the Nayland Local List of Heritage Features is also cited. Her tireless involvement with local historians in securing publication of local history books and photographic collections, is also to be commended, as is her role as Chairman of the Suffolk Preservation Society's Babergh District Committee.

Andora was a key instigator in securing and creating, for the village, the conservation meadow and wetland adjacent to the River Stour. She helped secure village participation and successfully took part in appealing for financial contributions from the village. An amazing sum of money was raised against the clock. Her tenacity is key to these achievements. Her role as a key member of the management team of the Nayland Land Company in securing support from a wide variety of organisations, is also mentioned. Her co-ordination of the "Managing a Masterpiece" village archaeology project, has been exemplary. The Carver's home, garden and barn became the HQ for the weekend event and she spent months arranging for 34 pit sites, meetings, organising over 100 volunteers and providing Saturday lunch and even Sunday Tea!

The judges were convinced that her incisive mind and driving spirit are not just set in the past. The award recognises her innovation and ideas. Residents know that she challenges

organisations and authorities, which isn't always an easy ride for any of us, but her quiet, infectious, enthusiasm and her ability to inspire others to take part in community events is second to none. Andora has wisdom and intelligent ideas that work. Her written correspondence to bodies concerning the conservation of our village fabric, display detail, knowledge and depth. She has the grit to challenge, as well as the wit to co-operate or persuade. It's the little touches that mark her out as a special person - such as her constant appreciation of everyone's contribution, however small. She would be aghast if anybody thought that she acts alone. Not only does she manage to enlist a huge number of helpers for events but also gets people to respond in droves to her appeal for cakes to feed the hundreds of visitors.

Her name may be known wider than some, but she has never sought nor craved attention for herself-it's always about the cause, event or community. She talks so often of 'team effort'. Andora will hate reading this, such is her personal humility. Where she has met opposition, she has displayed bravery in both selfless voice and deed. Initial lethargy or despondency are met by sparking enthusiasm and commitment. Tourists, visitors and residents appreciate and admire the architecture of the village, with its wide thread of history running through our special buildings with their past inhabitants. Both the Parish Council and the Community Council praise Andora's role in firing up the community to preserve this canvas and live as a community within it. We truly hope that Andora and James enjoy their special evening.

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


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2012: An Extraordinarily Wet Year in Bear Street, Nayland

There is around £5000 available from Babergh funding




as a starting point for this project and it may well be that there are other grants and match funding available to develop the playground for the community of Nayland and Wissington.

Dog Fouling

I have been approached by several residents to complain about the problem of dog fouling throughout the Village. I know that the Parish Council have also been actively campaigning for those few thoughtless people who refuse to clear up after their dogs to be 're-educated', but this is an issue that affects us all – it is the responsibility of the community; the Parish Council shouldn't have to deal with this on their own.

I have walked around the Village in recent days and it is deeply unpleasant to have to avoid poo every few yards. This is not only a problem on the pavements – please do not clear the mess into the

road or gutters for us to step in when crossing the road or getting into/out of our cars. A guest to my home on New Year's Eve was very embarrassed to have trodden mess throughout the ground floor of our house. It certainly made the evening go with a swing to have to clear it up! We also had to clear up three messes from outside our house during the festive period – this is simply not acceptable. Imagine how unpleasant and unhealthy it is for children to play amongst the mess or for a pram or pushchair to pick up mess on their wheels and then spread it into houses and cars.

I would also like to point out that you should clear up after your dog on the public footpaths – it is also not acceptable to leave mess on the grass or on the paths. We all enjoy the beautiful walks around Nayland and don't want to have to keep our eyes downcast to spot hazards. We frequently see



people walking around the river and not clearing up after their pets – I don't want to have to report you to the Parish Council for them to deal with this officially.

If you have trouble bending down to clear up after your pet or dogs that you are walking, please let someone from the Community Council know and I will be happy to purchase, on your behalf, a long handled gadget with bag attachment, for solving the problem.

One other point made by several residents – if you have been good enough to clear up after your dog – PLEASE TAKE THE BAG HOME WITH YOU OR PUT IT IN ONE OF THE RED BINS, don't tuck it behind someone's hedge or into a bush as several people

seem to be keen on doing.

This problem seems to have become worse recently – we don't know if this is because there are new dogs in the village or we have uncaring visitors. The reason doesn't really matter; this is totally unacceptable. If you are a dog owner or dog walker please ensure that you have a supply of bags in your pocket to deal with the problem. I don't care if it's a big brown dog on the river bank or a little fluffy one on the pavement the actions of a few are spoiling the area for us all.

Please consider your neighbours and clear it up - if you know of anyone who is not doing this then please let either me or the Parish Council know (in confidence) and we will report it.

Welcome to this month's Police news item.

Suffolk Police have, on average, 20 calls a week from members of the public reporting loose horses on the carriageway. Sadly an incident on December 24th involved the loss of life of a 23-year-old man when horses were loose on the road. Although some cases involve a horse & rider parting company whilst out riding, most loose horses is a result of them escaping from fields with inadequate fencing. A lot of valuable police resources are used to make highways safe by capturing the escapees and trying to identify the horses' owners.

A landowner has a duty to ensure that animals kept on their land do not stray, and a claim for damages may lie against a landowner or tenant where it can be shown that the escape was caused by their negligence. Particularly as most fields are adjacent to public roads you could be held legally responsible for any accident injury or damages incurred by a third party, should your horse escape from his field and venture onto the road.

Prevention is better than cure. Fences and barriers should be regularly inspected, and a brief note of the dates and outcomes (such as appointments for fencing contractors or report to the landowner) should be kept. Electric fencing has practical benefits, but extreme caution should be exercised if used as the primary barrier in the event of power failure.

If you rent land, although the field is not technically your property, it is still your responsibility to ensure that the fencing is adequate for the purpose for which it is used - this means all reasonable efforts must be made to contain the horses - the fencing must be of adequate height and condition around

the whole boundary of the field and the gate and its fastenings must be secure.

For legal as well as safety reasons, check your fencing is safe for horses. It is an arrestable offence under The Highways Act 1980 to allow livestock to stray or lay on the public road and Suffolk Police will take action against horse owners who are negligent in keeping their horses securely contained.

Church Electoral Roll Revision

This year the electoral rolls of our five churches have to be revised. This happens every six years for all churches in the Church of England. What does this mean for you?

- Being on the roll entitles you to a say and a vote at the church's annual meetings.
- It qualifies you to sit on the PCC, or any of the synods of the Church of England (if duly elected.) If you Do Not wish to be on the roll you have to do nothing.
- If you DO wish to be on the roll you will need to complete a form.

If you have been on the previous electoral roll then over the coming weeks you should be contacted by the electoral roll officer who will supply the necessary form. You will not automatically be included in the new roll.

If you have not previously been on the church's electoral roll but wish to be, you will need to contact the electoral roll officer. Each of our five churches has a notice displayed giving more information.


