NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Planning Meeting: 14th August 2013

PUBLIC FORUM

Chris Hunt raised concerns regarding the unsympathetic parking of building contractors' vehicles in the village and distributed photographs where access to pedestrians have been impaired. He added it made getting about particularly difficult and sometimes dangerous for the less mobile residents and those with buggies. He suggested that following the granting of planning permission the PC write to applicants regarding this.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Gerry Battye said permission has been granted at 30 Bear Street for removal of a conifer tree and 50% reduction of a Yew tree.

Following councillors objection to an application at 11 Stoke Road a letter had been received for Babergh explaining their decision to grant the application. It stated the Conservation Officer was satisfied with the proposed materials, there would be sufficient parking to the rear and the Heritage Team were

satisfied with the affect to the older part of the building.

Councillors discussed an application at Butchers, 5 Bear Street for erection of two-storey and single-storey rear extensions and construction of pitched roof over existing flat roof to rear. This is a grade 2 star listed property and concerns were expressed that Heritage Officers had not visited the property so were not able to see the effect the proposed extension would have in context to its setting or appreciate the effect it may have on the amenity of neighbours. Councillors agreed to object to this application in relation to its mass, height and the loss of amenity of neighbours.

Councillors agreed they would not make any comments in the consultation for variation of the AONB boundary.

Councillors would make a request to speak at the Public Inquiry for the Stour Valley Visitor Centre at Horkesley Park which was being held from 1st October at Langham Community Centre and Colchester Town Hall.

Volunteers to Spread Grit This Winter

In the past, people have been concerned that if they helped to clear snow, they may be exposed to third party claims. The County Council previously confirmed that a person clearing snow and spreading grit will only be liable for an accident, if their efforts actually made the situation worse. Where the Parish Council keeps a list of named volunteers, these people can be covered under the terms of the County Council's Public Liability Insurance.

So, if you would like to volunteer to assist with snow clearing and grit spreading this winter – please telephone the Clerk who will keep a list of named volunteers. By giving your name to the Clerk, you will be under no obligation to assist, but will be protected if you do, as stated by the County Council.

Do You Know Someone Eligible For The Walsh Trust Christmas Bonus?

Each Christmas the Walsh Trust, which has two parish council trustees and three others, gives out small cash bonuses to those over 80 who have lived in the village at least three years and who would welcome such a bonus. As the original charities were for providing food and fuel, the Trust gives a present to those who have previously had the bonus but are now in residential care. The income is very small and depending on how many are eligible the amount is normally around £20 for a single person and £25 for two people living in the same house. There is no official way we can find out who is over 80 so we rely on local knowledge and that means all of you.

So please let us know if you are going to be eighty or know someone who will be by Christmas. Contact Mr Battye, Mrs Rolfe, Mrs Mig Knight, Miss Kath Hunt or me, Mrs Knox, my number is 262224. If you already have the bonus and are still living in Nayland you will of course continue to get it and don't need to inform us. But because our income is so small once we have paid out for the year we simply do not have any money left to give late-comers so PLEASE let us know by the **1st of December**.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 11th September 2013

Jonathan Free, Head of Communities at Babergh, was welcomed to the meeting to give advice about the district asset register and creation of a Neighbourhood Plan.

He explained a district system was in place for communities to make an application to register a property on the asset list. Under the Community Right to Bid, community groups are able to nominate non-residential buildings or land that are of importance to the local community as 'assets of community value'. If adopted the property cannot be sold without the community group being given the opportunity to put together a bid to purchase the asset. A group must consist at least 21 residents. Nominations will be considered if the property fits the required criteria. The Right to Bid gives them 6 months to raise funds and prepare bids so they have a chance of purchasing the asset but the vendor has no obligation to sell to the registering party.

Jonathan Free then spoke about development of a Neighbourhood Plan. He said Lavenham is a comparable village to Nayland who are pressing ahead because they want more control of planning in their area. Nayland has some protection by being within a conservation area and an AONB. Some areas wish to develop a plan so they can shape development to meet their needs and increase facilities available when housing is increased. The process involves a lot of work including obtaining grants, researching needs and developing policies prior to the inspection process.

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Julia Bignell reported there had been nine crimes reported since 10th July; theft of money in Parkers Way, criminal damage to a telephone cable in Harpers Estate, theft of a pedal cycle in Cawley Road, theft of tools from a container in Campions Lane, theft of money in Bear Street, two thefts of money and an iPad in Bear Street, theft of motor vehicle in Bures Road, and a burglary in Bear Street.

Witnesses to the burglary at the village shop in Bear Street reported two males leaving the scene in an old style/shape Volvo with the lights off.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Richard Cave drew councillors' attention to the Rural Fair Share Campaign, organised by SPARSE Rural and the Rural Services Network, seeking to redress the imbalance in Government funding for rural and urban areas. They are petitioning MPs to pursue the issue of rural funding.

Responding to Richard Cave's enquiry councillors confirmed they were generally satisfied with the content of the Town and Parish Council Newsletter issued by Babergh.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Gerry Battye said permission has been granted at Harpers Hill Farm, Harpers Hill for the erection of new Class B8 commercial storage building (two units) for local business use. Conditions include; the colour finish of the building, external lighting, access, the building shall be used for storage and for no other purpose, operational hours will be 8am-6pm Monday to Friday and 8am-1pm Saturday.

Listed building consent has been granted at Butchers, 5 Bear Street for erection of two-storey and single-storey rear extensions and construction of pitched roof over existing flat roof. Parish councillors' comments regarding the loss of amenity to neighbours were taken into consideration but Babergh felt the application would not result in significant loss of amenity or light.

Following a site visit to Mill House, 12 Mill Street, councillors had no objection to the felling of a Balsam Poplar tree and pruning of one third of a Bird Cherry tree.

Councillors outlined a number of concerns relating to an application at 10 Wiston Road, **for e**rection of a two-storey rear extension, regarding access and design.

Councillors discussed concerns raised by Chris Hunt at the

August meeting regarding parking of building contractors' vehicles in the village. It was noted building work may not take place for three years following the granting of planning permission. It was felt a simple letter reminding residents on being a good neighbour may be the best way forward. Gerry Battye agreed to draft a letter which would go to householders following planning permission being granted and an article which would appear in the Community Times.

OPEN SPACES

The playground equipment project committee were looking for grants to help fund improvements. A 'transforming Nayland playground' questionnaire would be included in the Community Times

It was agreed to seek advice and quotes from a gardener for replanting and maintenance at the Horse Watering area. It was felt planting should look natural and not obstruct the view of the horse watering.

Will Hitchcock asked who was responsible for keeping the reeds along the Mill Stream in Fen Street in check. The Environment Agency would be contacted requesting management of the reeds in Fen Street and by the Horse Watering.

Councillors would look at the rear boundary fence and planting on Fairfield playing field for discussion at the next meeting on whether further planting is required.

Quotes would be obtained for the pruning of an overgrown prunus tree on Webbs meadow. Quotes for cleaning and repointing the Milestone were being sought.

FOOTPATHS

Essex CC would be asked for their observations on the bridge by Horkesley Lock as councillors felt the gradient of the step was steep and the condition deteriorating and a rail is loose.

STREET LIGHTING

Following the burglary at the village stores it was agreed to ask SCC to set the streetlight opposite, by the Horse Watering, to be left on until 5am

A faulty light in Parkers Way has been reported to SCC.

BURIAL GROUND

Mary George reported the annual autumn cut would be carried out.

An application a new memorial was granted.

Councillors would check whether Babergh had removed the old metal bin by the lych gate and delivered a new wheelie bin as requested.

IN BRIEF:

Gerry Battye said this would be his last meeting as Chairman of the Parish Council but would continue as a parish councillor. He added, his first meeting as chairman was 19th May 1987.

The barrier and pedestrian access gate to prevent vehicles entering the meadow beyond the allotments will be erected on 21st October.

Councillors will enter the Community Times in the SALC Newsletter of the Year competition.

The Community Council has installed the new sunken Christmas tree fixing by the milestone in High Street.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

MATTERS ARISING

Village Christmas Tree: Alex Badman said the contractors will be installing the new fixing in early September.

Notice Boards: Roy Norfolk has obtained the cork backing and will be fixing a replacement board on the Old Forge.

Executive Committee: Volunteers are needed to join the CC. An appeal would be made at the Quiz Night and included in the CT and the message would be passed by word of mouth.

Jenny Smith, the Vice Chairman, agreed to fill in temporarily as Chairman as Alex Badman would be leaving village.

RECENT ACTIVITIES: The Picnic in the Park on Bank Holiday Sunday had been a nice relaxing enjoyable afternoon; starting with a duck race, followed by fabulous music, barbecue and Pimms stall on the Village Hall playing field. The event made a loss of just over £200 but stock to about this value is held over for Bonfire Night. Thanks to lain Wright for leading and Chris Hunt for commentating for the duck race.

GRANTS & DONATIONS

Court Knoll Lodge: They have been thanked for their recent kind donation of £500 towards worthwhile causes in the Parish.

Firework Donation: Mrs Neighbour, a Fen Street resident, has very generously donated £50 towards the fireworks. She enjoys watching the display from her home.

St Mary's Church Gate: Rosemary Knox requested a grant towards replacement of an oak entrance gate costing £1000. It was agreed to grant the £500 donation from the Court Knoll Lodge for this purpose.

Nayland Test Pit Dig: The Conservation Society have applied for a grant towards the £8,000 cost of holding another two day dig involving 16 pits. It was agreed to award a grant of £500.

Community Display Boards: The Calendar Team requested new display boards for the photographic competition and for use by other village groups. It was agreed to buy a set of six heavy duty boards at a cost of £239.

TREÁSUŔER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith's said there had been little activity since his last report. Unencumbered assets stood at: £16,281.84 (prior to grants awarded at the meeting)

It has come to light that the amended Constitution adopted by the CC in 1992 was not lodged with the Charity Commission. The original Constitution, which was lodged with them, is dated 28th September 1966. However, year end accounts with details of grants have been registered with the Charity Commission, therefore approving our grants policy.

The 1966 version is fairly simplistic: "To provide adequate recreational facilities, playing fields, playgrounds, in the interests of social welfare. To encourage and develop all recreational activities in the interests of social welfare. Providing always that nothing in the foregoing shall authorise or empower the CC to participate directly or indirectly in activity which is not charitable according to the law". It is interesting to note it includes the neighbourhood to Nayland with Wissington and that the CC was originally created to raise funds for the building of the Village Hall and to obtain the lease on Webb's Meadow.

The amended version opened the Constitution up and also includes: "and with the objects of advancing education, furthering health, relieving poverty, distress or sickness or in pursuing any charitable activity to improve the condition of life for those persons the facilities are intended".

The Treasurer said this matter needs to be looked at with a view to adoption at the next AGM and submission to the Charity Commission.

COMMUNITY TIMES: Lorraine Brooks said the October issue was being assembled

FORTHCOMING ACTIVITIES:

Fundraising: Permission has been obtained for the CC to hold a raffle at the monthly Farmers' Market. It was agreed to take advantage of this on 14th September (draw to take place at the Quiz), on 12th October and 9th November (draw to take place at the Fayre). First prizes would be £50, donations of further prizes are needed. Calendars would be sold alongside the raffle tickets.

Village Quiz - Friday 4th October: Rachel Hitchcock is leading. An email reminder will go to village groups asking them to submit 10 questions in a similar way to last year. Woodland Corner helpers will be setting up the hall and doing the scoring. Prizes are required for the raffle.

Bonfire Night - Tuesday 5th November: A co-ordinator is needed. Iain Wright is leading the bonfire/fireworks. An appeal for volunteers for pyrotechnic training would go out for next year this involves a half day course at Mersea. The Youth Club will have a Guy to put on the bonfire. Guys must be brought to the bonfire before 6.30pm.

Christmas Fayre - Sunday 1st December 12-2pm: Jenny Smith and Neil Barbrook will liaise on organising. The School will provide some musical entertainment at approx 1.20pm. Promotion and table booking slips must be submitted to Jenny by 4th November.

Valentines Night - Saturday 15th February: Karen Elliott will lead, Claire Buller agreed to help. Village Hall is provisionally booked 3pm-midnight. Iain will organise the bar, Karen has booked a band; The Rock and Roll Society. Please contact Karen if you can help with ideas for food/catering.

On Friday 27th September we will be showing Hyde Park on the Hudson. This film is about the visit King George V1 and Queen Elizabeth made to the USA in 1939.

On **Friday 25th October** we will be showing the film **Summer in February**; a 2013 British romantic drama film directed by Christopher Menaul. Novelist Jonathan Smith adapted the screenplay from his 1995 eponymous novel. Set in Cornwall in the early 20th century, in the approaching shadow of The Great War, the film focuses on a group of Bohemian artists called the Lamorna Group, which include Alfred Munnings (Dominic Cooper), Laura (Hattie Morahan) and Harold Knight (Shaun Dingwall). The incendiary anti-Modernist Munnings, now regarded as one of Britain's most sought-after artists, is at the centre of the complex love triangle, involving aspiring artist Florence Carter-Wood (Emily Browning) and Gilbert Evans (Dan Stevens), the land agent in charge of the Lamorna Valley estate.

On **Friday 29th November** we will be showing **Song for Marion**; a London-set comedic drama. Arthur Harris (Terrence Stamp) is the grumpy husband of Marion (Vanessa Redgrave), who is terminally ill yet continues to participate with enthusiasm at her local seniors' choir. As Marion's health deteriorates, Arthur is keen to please his dying wife and even agrees to take her place in the choir. The transition proves to be trying for Arthur thanks to the unconventional songbook. At odds with his son James (Christopher Eccleston), it is left to charismatic choir director Elizabeth (Gemma Arterton) to try and persuade Arthur that he can learn to embrace life without Marion. Arthur's experience in this new social environment will take him on a hilarious, life-affirming journey of musical self discovery.

British Food Fortnight is a national celebration of British food, and this year runs from 21st September – 4th October. It is an annual event celebrating quality, fresh, seasonal and regionally distinct produce from all over the UK.

But why should we buy British food?

Buying British food is a more sustainable option than buying food that has been produced outside of the UK. The transportation of food clutters up our roads and airways, using fuel, creating pollution and increasing CO2 emissions in the atmosphere. By sourcing your food locally you can help minimise the problems that food miles generate. Do we really need to be eating roast dinners with meat or vegetables that might have been flown up to 5000 miles just to be served on our plates?

Unlike many other countries, food from British farms is produced to very high standards of safety and wholesomeness. The process is checked from field to plate so you can be sure you are eating a safe, traceable product.

In addition, British farmers have some of the highest animal welfare standards in the world. There are more free range hens in the UK than anywhere else in Europe. UK pig farmers do not use tethers and stalls in contrast to their foreign competitors. Beef farmers do not use veal crates or beef lot systems.

Agricultural businesses are key parts of the local, rural economy. 80% of farms are run by family businesses. In the UK we have lost nearly half of these family farms in the last 40 years as they struggle to compete on the global market. Only 1.8% of the British workforce is involved in agriculture - lower than in the rest of Europe. This means more people end up living and working in cities and towns while rural areas slip into decline. By eating more local food, you'll be preserving the livelihood and liveliness of rural Britain.

Buying British ensures that you will also be eating seasonally, when the food tastes at its best. You can buy fresh fruit and vegetables all year round in the supermarkets but food that has been grown on the other side of the world for the UK market has to be kept fresh during its long journey. This means either spraying it with preservatives or harvesting products before they're ripe, and then artificially ripening them when they reach their destinations. All too often this process amounts to bland food, smothered in chemicals.

So please take a moment next time you are shopping, to think about where your food comes from and how far it may have travelled. Farmers markets and local shops, like ours in Nayland, need your support. They are more than just places to shop, they play an important part in our community, and they give our local producers a chance to show off their tasty produce.

Flu vaccination season is fast approaching. Our vaccination clinics this year will be held at West Bergholt Surgery on the 12th October, **Nayland Surgery on the 19th October** and North Hill Surgery on the 26th October. Letters have been sent out to all patients who are eligible for the vaccine. If you have any queries please contact your usual surgery and speak to a member of the reception team.

Children's Flu vaccinations – this year the Department of Health have introduced a routine vaccination for all children aged 2-3 years as of the 1st of September. This vaccine is called Fluenz and is administered in the form of a nasal spray. Additional clinics will be held for this vaccination and parents will receive an invite letter from the practice over the next few months. This vaccination campaign runs until December 2013.

Shingles vaccinations – a new vaccination is being offered to patients aged 70 and 79 years of age. This vaccination does not prevent shingles but does reduce the complications from the illness. We will be contacting eligible patients over the coming months to arrange appointments. This vaccination programme runs until the summer of 2014.

As a Practice we are constantly looking at ways of improving the way our patients can book appointments. We will shortly be offering online appointment booking. In order to access this service you will need to have a SystmOnline password and log in. Please speak to a member of the reception team for details about this. Information will be displayed in the surgeries advertising this service.

You may have noticed a few new faces around the Practice. Dr Claire Cooper and Dr Sana Sarwar are two new GP registrars who are studying to qualify as GPs. Dr Cooper is based at Nayland Surgery for 12 months and Dr Sarwar is based at West Bergholt Surgery for 6 months. During October we will also be hosting 2 medical students from Cambridge who are in the early years of the medical training. They will be working with Dr Polak and Dr Kalynuk over a 4 week period.



Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

The OM/S was asked recently what should be done with new shoots coming out of the trunk or main branches of apple trees.

The answer was that these Water Shoots, as they are called, should be cut out; otherwise they will deprive the fruit clusters of sap and energy. Ideally they should be rubbed out as soon as they appear.

It's been a good year for fruit of all kinds, and apple and pear trees here are weighed down with fruit, even after our drastic programme of thinning. Jim Curtis' Crab Apple tree in the churchyard had a record crop of fruit, most of which have now been picked and will appear in the form of jelly for sale at the JAMboree.

On a recent visit to Wisley (courtesy of Nayland HortSoc) the OM/S spotted a fine specimen of Catalpa, the Indian Bean Tree with a huge display of its seed pods, which look like giant runner beans. Our one here, grown from seed about 25 years ago, failed to fruit for the second year running, though it had a decent show of flower.

Plants which come into flower in late summer/autumn are always useful, and the following are a few examples.

Firstly, Schizostylis Coccinea, the Kaffir Lily; in its native South Africa they grow beside streams, but in cultivation they will grow more or less anywhere, though preferring a sunny moist position. There are several named varieties with pink and white flowers but S. Coccinea Grandiflora, with its dark red flowers on stems about 12" high is the best.

Among taller plants, the Michaelmas Daisies are old-fashioned standbys, now coming back and more available in nurseries and garden centres.

The Heleniums with their clusters of daisy-like flowers are another; Moerheim Beauty with deep reddish-orange flower heads is a good one.

A plant that always causes comment is Tricrytis, the Toad Lily, with its curious spotted petals.

Further suggestions are Sedums, Anemone Hupehensis (Japanese Anemone) and Kniphophia (Red Hot Poker); in the case of the latter not one of the varieties which flower in early summer.

There was talk of an Indian Summer, but at the time of writing it hasn't happened. Here's hoping.

TWO HOUSES: A FAMILY LINK

When researching the history of a house it soon becomes obvious that, apart from finding out when the house was built or altered, most of its history is about the people and families who owned and lived in it, their occupations and status in a community and when they lived and died. Bear House, formerly known as Stourbank, and Alston Court are two of the most important houses in Nayland with long histories and it is interesting that from the end of the 18th century until the early 20th century they were inextricably linked because the families who lived in them were related.

No records exist of the earliest days of Stourbank but the late David Walsh whose family lived there for many years compiled a history of the house. He knew that the main part of the building had been dated as having been built in 1483 and that it was considerably enlarged over the centuries. In 1973 a large yew tree in the garden was estimated by Edgar Milne-Redhead, the distinguished botanist who lived at Parkers at that time, as being at least 400 years old. The house is said to


have been once an inn, known as the Bear Inn, from which Bear Street took its name, but no documentary evidence of this exists. The street was certainly called Bear Street as early as 1688 as the property is described at that time as being in Bear Street.

In 1688 Margaret Felton, widow, of Edgefield in Norfolk, sold a 1,000 year lease of the property to Abram Reynolds, weaver, for £50 at a peppercorn rent if demanded. During the 18th century the house changed hands many times and had many tenants, such as Charles Norris, a cordwainer [shoemaker] and Robert Leaver, a woolcomber. There were owners with well known Nayland names such as George Holton, a Nayland butcher and farmer at Wiston, who bought the remainder of the term of the lease for £28 in 1735. The property stayed with the Holton family until 1805 when the lease was sold to Robert Swan, a basket maker of Nayland, for £45 and it was he who in 1816 sold his interest in the property to Thomas Swan and converted the lease into a freehold under the Statute of Uses.

In 1832 Robert Ransom, gentleman, of Sudbury purchased the property and in 1835 sold it to William Sinnott, described as a "scavenger", of Clerkenwell, London, who then sold it to Edward Liveing, who was already residing as a tenant in the house.

The links with the Alston family began in a period when Stourbank was owned or rented by members of the medical profession without a break until 1901. Thomas Churchman Harrold, surgeon, was a tenant of Stourbank from 1793 to 1811, before his nephew, Edward Liveing, also a surgeon, bought the house in 1835. Edward Liveing was married to Catherine Downing whose maternal grandfather was Samuel Alston of Alston Court, which at that time was called Grooms.

Edward Liveing died in 1843 and his nephew, Thomas Harrold Fenn, a GP who had also married into the Alston family, lived at Stourbank from 1844 to 1870. According to the 1851 census, he and his wife Maria had six children, including a son, Edward Liveing Fenn, born in 1843. After qualifying as a doctor Edward returned to Nayland and assisted his father in his practice, succeeding him after he died. He then left Nayland in 1872 and went to Surrey for 20 years, later returning to live at Greyfriars on East Hill in Colchester, and he became a physician at the Colchester Hospital.

In 1902 Edward Liveing Fenn inherited Alston Court from his aunt Margaret Alston and lived there until he died in 1907. He was responsible for major renovations of the house and for renaming it Alston Court. He was a direct link between Alston Court and Stourbank, having been born at Stourbank and dying at Alston Court. The house then passed to his son Charles Fenn. In 1947 the house passed to Charles's cousin, Colonel Arthur Alston Fenn, who lived there until he died in 1966. His wife continued living there until it was sold out of the family in 1968. So the long connection with these two important houses came to an end.

When Edward Liveing Fenn left Nayland in 1872 Stourbank had been sold to Henry Drake Palmer, yet another surgeon for £1,300. The property included the land to the south of Bear Street, Fir Cottage and Stourbank Cottage and the garden to the north was extended. Over the centuries the extent of the land and houses attached to the property was unclear until a mortgage of 1889 when the first plan was included. However, it is known that during his time at Stourbank Dr Palmer extended and altered the house considerably and it is of him that there is the legend that he had two resident mental patients, neither of whom was to be allowed to see the other and that his alterations to the house had regard to this consideration.

In 1901 Dr Palmer sold the property to William le Geyt Dudgeon, of South Kensington, thus ending the run of doctors who had lived there. Mr Dudgeon became a prominent figure in Nayland and was held in great esteem, being a churchwarden and benefactor in the village.

In 1912 Captain Bernard Walsh purchased Stourbank where he lived until he died in 1928. His wife Violet continued to live there after his death. Their significant contribution to Nayland was described in the March edition of the Community Times.

After his mother died in 1973, Bernard David Walsh sold Stourbank in 1976 when it became a popular restaurant called The Bear for a few years, later becoming a private house once again.



THE PUFF BALL

Puff balls may be found in any grassy pasture or woodland area. There are many species that are good to eat and none in Britain that are poisonous. The Common Puff Ball, *Lycoperdon perlatum*, is a round or pear shaped fungi with a soft, stipled surface. This grows on a short cylindrical stem and the puff ball reaches about the size of a tennis ball.

The Giant Puff Ball, Lycoperdon giganteum, can grow to a much more impressive size, but is commonly about the size of a football. It does not have a stippled surface and grows straight from the ground with little of no stalk.

For culinary purposes, the important quality needed is that the flesh is still white. As it ages, puff ball flesh turns yellow and then pale brown, and during these stages becomes progressively less appettising and digestible. The final mass of greenish-brown dust consists of reproductive spores, which when fully ripe are expelled (or puffed out) from a hole on top of the dried out ball – hence the name 'puff-ball'. They have been used by bee keepers as natural aerosols to calm bees in a hive.



When using puff balls in the kitchen, there is no real need for peeling, simply clean them and slice into half inch thick steaks. They can then be fried, grilled or baked, or added to other recipes. The slices from near the top of the fungus are like sweetbreads, the more crumbly steaks from near the base are usually softer like marshmallow.

The Victorians practiced a 'cut-and-comeagain' style of harvesting, to prolong availability. They can be frozen, but like mushrooms will lose texture, or they can be dried.

CRUNCHY PUFF BALL STEAKS WITH BACON

A tasty breakfast recipe

- 1 cupful of toasted breadcrumbs
- 1 eaa
- 2oz seasoned flour
- 1 medium sized puff ball
- 8 rashers bacon
- Wipe and slice the puff ball into ½" thick steaks
- Beat the egg and flour together until smooth, then slowly add the water to make a batter the consistency of single cream.
- Dip the puff ball steaks into the batter, then coat with the breadcrumbs and put to one side while frying the bacon.
- Keep the bacon warm while frying the puff ball steaks.

HALLOWEEN AND BONFIRE NIGHT

Halloween is coming up at the end of the month as well as bonfire night at the beginning of November; please consider others on both of these nights and all can have a good time. Suffolk Police are urging you to consider the effect your actions may have on others this Halloween and Bonfire Night – and to respect those may not want to take part in the festivities.

Traditionally both Halloween and Bonfire nights are busy for police with a large number of calls during the end of October and beginning of November relating to anti-social behaviour by a minority who take trick or treating too far and firework-related incidents.

There is a need for everyone taking part to behave responsibly. We would ask parents to ensure they supervise their children, for their own safety and to ensure they do not call at addresses where the occupants do not want to take part, and that anyone trick or treating only visits homes where they know the residents. Most residents that do like to take part normally have some form of Halloween gimmick outside their property. Halloween and Bonfire night can be genuinely scary for many older residents - please don't cause them any unnecessary distress. There is a line between high spirits and anti- social behaviour and we are well aware there are small minorities who will ignore our appeals and we will be out trying to cause trouble.

A series of posters has been produced which address the issues surrounding Halloween. One is designed for those who do not want to take part while another asks parents if they would normally let their children call on a stranger's home unsupervised. These posters will be put up around the county and are being widely distributed to schools and businesses, (look out for these nearer the time in your local shops, also at Hadleigh police station).

HEATING OIL THEFT ADVICE

The theft of heating and diesel oil has been a problem for many years and the police have noticed an increase in this type of crime in rural areas. These tanks can contain many thousands of pounds worth of oil and it therefore makes very good sense to take a few precautions to protect such a valuable commodity.

The position of the tank can have a significant effect on how hard a target it is in the eyes of a thief. If the tank is within good view of the house, then the thief may consider the risk of being seen too high. If the tank is close to a road, path, drive or alleyway then it will be a far easier target. Hiding the tank behind the garage, shed or some other type of outbuilding is fairly commonplace but, on the other hand, it could help to conceal the thief.

A thief will usually come equipped with a limited range of tools to attack your tank so it's worth spending a little more on good quality locks. Closed shackle padlocks are best as they offer most resistance to the most popular of burglar tools, namely the bolt cropper. Due to their design, closed shackle padlocks have very little of the metal hoop (shackle) exposed and bolt croppers cannot get a good grip. Another recent security measure available is a padlock with a built-in alarm, which activates, when tampered, at up to 110 decibels.

Remote electronic oil level gauges are now available, which will set off an audible alarm if the oil level in the tank suddenly falls in fuel level. These gauges are sited within the house to warn of any potential problem. Security lights can have a very positive effect and make any property a much harder target for thieves. It is not always necessary to floodlight the area with high power beams, as a more subtle level of lighting may be all that is needed. Low energy 'dusk 'til dawn' lights positioned close to the tank should, in most cases, provide sufficient light to illuminate any suspicious activity.

Thieves will not want to force their way through or over a prickly hedge. The smallest trace of blood or shred of ripped clothing could help the police identify the offender. Some effective natural planting includes: Berberis x Stenopylla Crataegus Monogvna (Hawthorn) Ilex Aquifolium (Holly) Pyracantha (Firethorn) Rosa Rugosa. A trellis can be decorated with defensive planting.

Suffolk Police are asking everybody to look out for any suspicious persons or vehicles in the area following a delivery of heating oil and to report this to Police as soon as possible. For further advice on heating & diesel oil thefts, or to obtain advice from your local Crime Reduction Officer please dial 101.

SUFFOLK STUDENTS CELEBRATE EXAM SUCCESS

Suffolk students had cause for celebration this month, after bucking national trends. New, tougher standards are now being applied to exam grading. In Suffolk though, the earliest indications are of an average 5% increase in the number of students achieving 5 A* - C grades in GCSEs. Meanwhile, A-level results appear to be above the national trend, with nearly 30% of students earning A* or A grades, compared to 26% nationally. Whilst this is excellent news, I can assure you neither SCC, the school Heads, Governors and teaching staff are complacent and further improvements in standards are being vigorously sought by all. As I write this column, some of our schools are being visited by Ofsted. I really hope that this can be used as another learning exercise for all our schools by giving focus on the areas for improvement leading to even better results for our pupils in the future.

SUFFOLK STUDENTS ENCOURAGED TO TAKE UP APPRENTICESHIPS

As students prepare for taking their next steps following August's exam results, SCC has been promoting the option of taking up an apprenticeship. Across Suffolk, there is now an exciting range of apprenticeships on offer, from accountancy to landscape gardening. Indeed, over the last two years, the number of Suffolk apprentices, in the 16 to 18 age group, has increased by 15%, while across the country the numbers have been in decline. As exam results came into Suffolk schools, SCC's apprenticeship team was in attendance at various locations, to raise awareness of the opportunities on offer, and help young people to register for the schemes.

FOCUS SCHOOL - STOKE BY NAYLAND CAMPUS

If you choose to have a bonfire please adhere to the guidelines:

- Check with your neighbours that it won't be a nuisance
- Avoid burning at weekends and on bank holidays when your neighbours have a right to enjoy their gardens
- Do not light a fire when weather conditions will cause problems. It is mistakenly thought that the evening is the best time for a bonfire; wrong, the atmospheric pressure keeps the smoke down. Also, don't light them while the weather is still and cold.

There is no law saying that bonfires are illegal. However, smoke and emissions from a bonfire (or any other process of burning) can be considered a Statutory Nuisance and as such can be dealt with under the Environmental Protection Act 1990. Environmental Health is responsible for investigating complaints.



And Don't Forget the Wildlife ...

To avoid barbecuing hibernating hedgehogs, or other animals, check your bonfires before lighting them.



While fireworks can be great fun for many they can cause distress to the elderly and to animals.

The biggest problem is not knowing when fireworks are going to be let off, and the loud noise from the fireworks. If a warning is given it allows opportunity to administer tranquillising drugs to minimise an animal's trauma – obviously once the fireworks have begun it is too late. So please consider buying the less noisy fireworks, and inform as many people as possible of your display.

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
