NAYLAND POST OFFICE

Representatives of Nayland with Wissington Parish Council and community groups met with a representative of Post Office Ltd. on Monday 17th February to discuss the current situation with Nayland Post Office. Most of you will be aware that our current Sub Post-mistress, Mrs. Ford, has made a decision to retire after 33 years' service. Post Office Ltd is now actively involved in seeking an alternative operator to take over the responsibility for Nayland Post Office.

Post Office Ltd gave assurances at this meeting that there was no intention to close the Post Office branch at Nayland. However, they also stressed that to allow Mrs Ford to retire, Post Office Ltd would have to find a new operator willing to provide suitable retail premises to accommodate both the Post Office and the Mailwork operation within Nayland. Any definite proposal for change, for example relocation within Nayland, would be followed by a public consultation period.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Planning Meeting: 12th February 2014

It was agreed Mary George will carry out administrative tasks and Gerry Battye will take minutes while the clerk is recuperating following her illness. The contact for the PC will be Mary George on 262712 or pc@naylandwithwissington.suffolk.gov.uk

NAYLAND POST OFFICE

Post Office Limited have responded to the PC's request for more information about their proposals for the future of Nayland Post Office. Kevin Shepherd, their Programme Area Manager, will meet with the chair on 17th February. James Finch SCC, Richard Cave BDC and representatives of the Community Council, Conservation Society and Transition Nayland are invited to attend.

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Georgi Hawkes reported there had been six incidents in the last month; theft of a motor vehicle in Cawley Road, criminal damage to a fence in Campion Hill, locks damaged to a motor vehicle in Parkers Way, theft of a catalytic convertor from motor vehicle in Heycroft Way, theft of cast iron garden bench in High Street.

PUBLIC FORUM

Chris Hunt said that the RBL will be commemorating the 100th anniversary of WW1 with a service at the War Memorial on 4th August and an event in church. He asked councillors whether the cleaning of the war memorial could be done before August.

Lorraine Brooks asked if the PC would consider alerting CBC to the construction and activity at Thrift Farm, adding that previous planning permission had required visual amenity to be maintained.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

James Finch reported that: SCC is urging people interested in adopting a child to come forward, the cabinet gave its approval to the budget proposals for savings and a council tax freeze for 2014/15, SCC organised conference to discuss the rail needs of people and businesses across Suffolk, and he urged residents to check chimney flues as incidents of chimney fires are increasing.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Mary George said listed building consent had been granted at 11 Stoke Road for removal of existing cement based render, repairs to decayed timber frame, re-instatement of render in lime based render and introduction of new soleplate with conditions including; no works to the existing timber frame shall be undertaken until the Conservation/Heritage Officer has inspected the exposed timber frame, until specification for the render and colour finish has been agreed.

Councillors had no objections to a listed building application at 14 Stoke Road to replace existing windows in the east elevation with French doors.

Discussing the Statement of Community Involvement consultation councillors raised some concern that the wording regarding the process for planning amendments is not specific. Councillors felt a paper copy of local planning applications should be made available in Nayland for use on site visits and to enable residents without internet or ability to access the council offices at Hadleigh the opportunity to view plans. Gerry Battye agreed to draft a response for submission.

STREET LIGHTING

Mary George said there had been a saving of £432.75 on energy for street lighting following installation of LED units and implementation of the new lighting regime. Councillors will report back on any lights which are being masked by trees.

HIGHWAYS

James Finch said Suffolk Highways had acknowledged Mill Lade wall near Candy Lane, which has collapsed, is their responsibility.

It was agreed in principle to extend the litter pick in Wiston. The cost for Wiston Road, Bures Road and Cawley Road will be £108. Campion Hill is not included.

Highways have confirmed that trimming trees along the south (flood channel) side of Horkesley Road is their responsibility. Responsibility for the northern side is not established. The PC contractors carry out grass cutting on both sides of Horkesley Road but branches laying on the ground on the south side are preventing cutting.

Querying responsibility for fence panels alongside Socket Alley Will Hitchcock was informed it lies with the neighbouring landowners.

Rosemary Knox said the new online facility for reporting pot holes worked well for the two holes in Wiston Hall Lane.

OPEN SPACES

Mary George reported: SCC have been clearing fallen trees on Caley Green, tree work ordered is being done as weather permits, the biennial tree inspection is due.

Rosemary Knox said the playground equipment committee are working on obtaining grants and the selection and costing of the equipment required for the different age groups. Councillors expressed thanks to Rachel Hitchcock for her commitment to the project.

Gerry Battye raised concerns regarding parking on Fairfield recreation ground, damage by vehicles to the grassed area and potholes caused by increased traffic on the driveway which is the joint responsibility of the PC, the diocese and Nayland House. The school had agreed to ask parents not to use the area for parking but the problem is persisting and it is being used for long term parking. The area by the burial ground needs to be available for funerals and those visiting graves. Councillors will consider wording for signage to deter parking.

VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox reported: the PC's contractors are unable to dispose of the old Christmas tree barrel but she can arrange for it to be removed, there is still some debris from the fireworks bonfire but ground conditions are very wet, due to increased refuse collection costs hirers will be asked to take their rubbish away with them, the treasurer is recommending the cost of hire is increased.

Will Hitchcock suggested CCTV, which is much cheaper than it used to be, may be useful to deter vandalism, etc.

A metal barrier leaning against the gap into the playing field is a hazard under health and safety. Discussions are to take place with the landowner of the field about planting a hedge to fill this gap.

Mulch for the PC's section of the village hall garden will be ordered to coincide with the spring work party on 15th March.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

A volunteer is needed to become designated PC representative on the CC executive committee, which meets six times a year.

The PC's Babergh Achievement Award nomination for the Community Council has been successful.

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

Councillors discussed the format for the Parish Assembly, which will take place on 12th May, and how to encourage residents to attend. It is a legal requirement that a Parish Assembly is held but attendance has dropped. Suggestions for topics included; the responsibilities of local councils and Nayland Post Office. **IN BRIEF:**

The footpath warden has contacted Suffolk CC and Essex CC regarding the poor state of the non-slip strips and railings on the footbridge at Popp's Piece.

Will Hitchcock said the bales of hay are still on the allotment field; the farmer will be reminded to remove them.

Councillors granted a request for additional wording to an existing headstone.

It was agreed that Mary George and Tricia Fuller will attend seminars on Emergency Planning and Suffolk County Transport.

GOURMET COFFEE MORNING

A gourmets' coffee morning held at the church hall on February 22 raised about £460, an increase on last year.

The event was organised by the Friends of St James' Church and proceeds go to the building's enhancement. Chairman Alan Edwards expressed his thanks to everyone who helped.

ENVIRONMENT AGENCY - MILL STREAM

Dr Rob Dryden attended the meeting to discuss the Mill Stream in Fen Street. He confirmed that the EA will not be cutting back reeds along this stretch of Mill Stream; they are not reducing the flow of water and they encourage diversity of habitat for wildlife. He said they do not create a flood risk.

Bryan Smith pointed out that the reeds extended two-thirds on the width of the stream in places and is getting wider each year. Will Hitchcock said reeds would had extended further without clearing being undertaken in recent years by the Community Council for duck races. Rob Dryden said the EA has no objection to residents or the CC clearing reeds if they are sensitive to habitats of wildlife. He particularly mentioned May and June as being bad time for residents to cut vegetation because of fish spawning. A management programme is in place with residents for the Bear Street section of Mill Stream.

POLICE REPORT

PCSO Mandy Coleman reported one incident in the last month; burglary with intent to a metal shed containing sports equipment in Bear Street, nothing was stolen but damage was caused to the doors.

Mandy said a campaign to improve parking in Bear Street was taking place with the help of pupils from the school. The children were issuing tickets; red for inconsiderate parking, amber for 'could do better', or green for considerate parking. Registration numbers of vehicles issued red tickets were recorded on the database so repeat offenders will be noticed. Mandy felt this was working well and parents were learning from their children.

A public meeting with the Chief Constable and Crime Commissioner will be held on 9 April at East Bergholt to gain views on policing in your area.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Richard Cave said that Babergh's budget would remain the same, for the fourth year running, and there would be no Council Tax rise.

PARISH COUNCIL

Mary George said the clerk, Debbie Hattrell, is slowly getting better. The doctor has permitted her to undertake some work at home so she has resumed managing the council's accounts.

The co-option process need to be put in place with a view to filling a vacancy on the parish council.

PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications councillors had no

objections to the pollarding of a Willow tree at 78 Bear Street or at 20 Court Street to reduce the crown volume by up to 25 per cent on an Oak tree with a TPO.

During discussions on an application for erection of a twostorey extension, internal alterations and a loft conversion at 33 Bear Street councillors heard the concerns of neighbours and the Conservation Society. Councillors agreed to object to the application on various grounds including; the extension is too dominant, the effect on neighbours' amenity, the roofline and inappropriateness of solar panels.

Discussing three applications at Thrift Farm it was felt clarification of status should be sought regarding those relating to the farmhouse; 1. for lawful development certificate for an existing use - area used for garden/drive/car parking area and 2. to erect a barn for livestock purposes to support current activity on rural land.

Following discussion on the third application councillors agreed, 4:3 abstentions, they would not object to the application by Motts Body Repair for a new workshop with temporary polytunnel and retrospective application for a temporary office but they would suggest to CBC that this is a very sensitive site in the AONB, clearly visible from the A134 which needs clarified conditions if planning is granted.

. The council's response to the Statement of Community Involvement consultation had been submitted.

HIGHWAYS

Richard Cave said road sweeping has recently been carried out following the concerns raised by the PC. He asked councillors to advise him of any future problems.

Cawley Road has been added to the litter pick schedule.

OPEN SPACES

Mary George reported: SCC have almost completed work on Caley Green, the annual tree inspection is due, the new hedge on the rear boundary of Fairfeld playing field has been planted.

Rosemary Knox said the playground equipment project committee is making positive progress in obtaining grants which may be available from Babergh and the Lottery fund.

The council would investigate whether the children's considerate parking ticket scheme could be extended to deter parking on Fairfield recreation ground

EMERGENCY PLANNING SEMINAR

Mary George and Tricia Fuller said the seminar had been very interesting. A number of local villages have plans in place or in light of recent storms are creating plans. It was agreed the possibility of setting up a community group led by the PC to create an Emergency Plan should be discussed at the Parish Assembly.

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

Topics for discussion at the Parish Assembly on 12th May will include; the responsibilities of local councils and creating an Emergency Plan. Reports by councillors should be very brief and should focus only on immediately local issues.

IN BRIEF

The survey of street lights being masked by trees revealed only one; on Heycroft Way.

A missing waymark sign on the footpath by Birch Fall will be reported to the Footpath Warden.

Councillors granted a request for additional wording to an existing headstone.

Rosemary Knox agreed to be nominally designated PC representative on the Community Council and would attend the next meeting on 7th May.

Rosemary Knox said holding their AGM on the same evening as the Community Council AGM proved to be very successful.

APRIL MEETING

The Parish Council meeting on 9th April will be relocated to the Church Hall.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL: RECIPIENT OF A BABERGH 2014 COMMUNITY ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Nayland-with-Wissington is a rural parish of only 1200 residents yet it has a vibrant spirit. Twenty five different societies and voluntary groups with a wide programme of activities involving young and old alike are testament to that. The Community Council, innovative at the time, was constituted in 1966 as a voluntary umbrella organisation for those groups whose representatives, together with a few co-opted individuals, make up its membership and elect an executive committee each year. It has encouraged the whole community to get involved and has enriched village life for residents of all ages. Nayland with Wissington would be a less vibrant place without this wide diversity of societies, churches and schools continuing to co-operate today in the spirit of mutual support. Over the years hundreds of residents have worked with the Community Council and have never failed to pull the parish together in a wide variety of community events.

Since 1966, these hardworking volunteers have raised money for a central community fund while enabling all groups and organisations to improve their own fundraising potential and reach a wider audience for their activities. In the first few years money was raised to acquire land to build Nayland Village Hall which has become a focal point for community life and continues to receive support from the Community Council for refurbishment and equipment.

The Community Council also makes grants from its own fundraising to a wide variety of local organisations or individuals as needed. Over the years these have included Mother and Toddler Group, Nayland Playgroup and Woodland Corner, Scouts and Youth Club, the Over 60s Club and the British Legion. Nayland Primary School has received grants towards such diverse purposes as a community renewable energy project and the publication of three local history books. The Nayland Players drama group and the Emergency First Response Team have received grants for equipment. Individual students from our parish working as volunteers on projects in Tibet and South America have been sponsored.

As well as co-ordinating fundraising for the benefit of all parish organisations, the Community Council also provides a social focus for the community through regular events such as the annual Fireworks Bonfire Night, Village Quiz, Christmas Family Fayre and the Millstream Duck Race. It provides the Christmas tree in the centre of the village where residents gather for carol singing accompanied by a silver band. Street Fairs, Summer Music and Food Festivals and this year's Picnic in the Park provided performance opportunities for local musicians, including many youngsters from local schools, and for local artists to exhibit their work. The superhuman effort put into special events such as the Jubilee celebrations in 2012, or the events staged throughout 2000 to celebrate the Millennium, brought the whole community together.

However, the Community Council is not just about fundraising and social events. Their excellent free newsletter "Community Times" has been published and distributed every two months for the past 25 years and this year was awarded Runner Up status in the Suffolk Newsletter of the Year Awards. This lively publication gives clubs and groups an opportunity to advertise or report on their own activities while informing newcomers about village life and inspiring voluntary involvement. Another Community Council initiative is the popular calendar of local views produced for sale every year using the winning photographs from the Annual Photographic Competition alongside old photographs, historical facts and anecdotes. The newsletter, previous calendars and photo albums, as well as Community Council information and minutes, can be seen on the community website www.naylandandwiston.net

None of this could have been achieved without the commitment, effort and time given freely by executive officers of committees and their teams of volunteers who have ensured the Community Council's success. The Parish Council believes that this long-









term achievement is worthy of a nomination under the Community Achievement Scheme and therefore commends Nayland with Wissington Community Council to you for an award in the Voluntary Group Category 3.

This year the Society is celebrating its 40th Anniversary and at our AGM John Alexander outlined the origins of the formation of the Society.

In 1974 a small group of people, led by Blair Lees, Nayland's Parish Recorder and editor of the Nayland Record, and including Wendy Sparrow, realised that Nayland was a special village, both scenically and historically and decided to ask residents if they were interested in forming a "preservation" society in Nayland. Now, 40 years on we can be justifiably proud of its achievements, particularly in protecting against adverse development. The Society has more than 250 members – a remarkable record considering the size of the village.

More than 70 members and friends attended the AGM on 10th March when Paul Gallifant, a member of the Dedham Vale Society Committee, showed a wonderful selection of beautiful photographs of Nayland and Wiston in the 1970s and the Dedham Vale through the seasons. It is most certainly worth fighting for as the title of his talk suggested.

The concert will begin in late afternoon/early evening and after it is finished a barbecue will be served to the audience on the playing field outside the Village Hall (weather permitting).



By the time you receive your copy of the Community Times the final bid for funding to transform Nayland Playground will have been submitted to the Big Lottery Fund.



Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

Despite one of the wettest months for years gardens are beginning to come to life, and since there have been hardly any real frosts some plants are still in growth and a few still in flower.

Since the last article we have lost another large tree. This was a Balsam Poplar planted as a small cutting with the help of our 10 year old son 37 years ago. On its fall it measured over 60 feet, which indicates a pretty fast rate of growth. Its twin came down about two years ago, and has now been consumed as firewood; it burnt well but was of low calorific value. Unfortunately the latest tree it its fall caused a bit of damage to a D'Arcy Spice, one of the OM/S' favourite apples.

Those gardeners whose operating year usually begins at Easter would be best to amend their schedule this year, for not only is the Festival very late in the calendar but the season is unusually early. By now they should have already have made the first cut on lawns, but subsequent cuts with a lowered blade. Another result of the mild wet winter is a lot of moss. Purists will insist that the lawn should be scarified, treated with moss killer and then raked over again. The OM/S is wary of moss killer - Iron Sulphate is the usual one - since the result of a trial application on a small area here several years ago was a black patch which persisted despite much raking out and top dressing with fertiliser. That particular lawn, admittedly, was in a poor state to start with, so perhaps it wasn't exactly a fair test.

Some years ago we wrote of the Dean, our semi-tame cock pheasant. He is long since dead, since they are a short-lived breed, but a successor (descendant?) shows signs of inheriting his title, having discovered that there are pickings to be had beneath the bird table. Sadly our only resident hen was found dead some weeks ago.

The winter flowering Jasmine (J.Nudiflorum) has now finished its blooming and the ones here having grown beyond their bounds can be cut back quite hard, giving them time to make a decent amount of growth on which to bear next season's flowers.

While on the subject of pruning, if not already done the common Buddleia (B. Davidii and its various named cultivars) should be dealt with now, with the long rods cut back to within two healthy buds from their base, but leaving a few to produce some earlier flower for butterflies.

One result of the mild winter has been that evergreen shrubs have never really stopped growing, and even slightly tender subjects such as Fuchsias which are usually cut down to ground level are still green. This should result in earlier flowering, but we are still only in mid-March (at the time of writing) and there's still time for a severe frost to alter the situation.

This evening the OM/S is off to a HortSoc lecture from a Horticultural Photographer. He hopes he may be able to get better results after the lecturer's instructions.

WORDSEARCH: Spring Plants

THE NAYLAND DAD'S ARMY

On the 14th May 1940 the Secretary of State for War, Anthony Eden, broadcast a message to the nation calling for volunteers aged between 17 and 65 to join the Local Defence Volunteers (LDV). Most men who could fight were, of course, already in the forces and those left were either too young, too old or in 'reserved' occupations which were vital to the war effort. The announcement was met with a great deal of enthusiasm and in the first seven days 250,000 men enrolled at their local police stations. Two months later the number had reached 1.5 million.


The War Office's intention was that the LDV would act as an 'armed police constabulary' which, in the event of an invasion, was to observe German troop movement, convey information to the regular forces and guard places of strategic or tactical importance. However, LDV commanders and members believed the organisation should have a more active role, attacking and harassing German forces. They felt they would be left defenceless in a non combatant role. In response to public pressure, the role of the LDV was redefined to include delaying and obstructing German forces by any means possible to give the regular army time to form a front line from which the enemy invasion could be repelled. It was then suggested by the Prime Minister, Winston Churchill, that the LDV should be renamed the Home Guard.

Initially the volunteers only had a collection of old guns, air rifles, hunting rifles and pieces of gas pipe with bayonets and knives welded on the end, hardly suitable for fighting highly trained and well armed German troops! Later they were issued with more conventional weapons - mostly old WWI, or American or Canadian weapons but some were more dangerous to the operator than the enemy. However, the Home Guard were glad to have anything, even weapons which the regular army refused to use.

Over the UK more than 1200 separate Home Guard units were set up. Here in Navland local men answered the call and began to prepare themselves and the village for a possible invasion. One of the enthusiastic recruits was Bill Jackaman who has told me about his experiences. Bill joined the Home Guard in 1942 when he was 16, becoming a Lance Corporal a year later. He told me that the first captain was 'Basty' Salaman, a vet by profession who lived at the Vine House at that time, and he was followed by Herbie Taylor, the baker in Mill Street. Bob Finch was the Sergeant.

For young village lads it must have been an exciting time, firing rifles and throwing hand grenades. Bill remembers they also used a water cooled Browning machine gun. He said that army transport would take the men to practise at firing targets with other groups in the area. They crawled over the fields and had mock battles. He remembers that once when the captain who was instructing him took a gun off its tripod, the gun went off and a bullet narrowly missed one of his comrades! Sometimes the Home Guard gave demonstrations of their prowess to the village on the Fen at the bottom of Fen Street. They fired their weapons, including Molotov Cocktails which were fired from rifles. Bill had to agree there were similarities between the Nayland Home Guard and Captain Mainwaring and his men on the Dad's Army television programme!

The Home Guard used several buildings in Nayland, including what was then the Tradesmen's Club at the top of Fen Street, the old maltings in Stoke Road and outbuildings at the Anchor. Bill told me there was a 'spigot mortar emplacement' on Gravel Hill where a primitive sort of gun called a 'Blacker Bombard' was used. This gun was a portable antitank weapon which was fixed onto a stainless steel pivot set into the top of a circular concrete base and this base was surrounded by a circular trench where the gun crew crouched.

I believe there were at least three other emplacements in Nayland: one near Court Knoll, another near Anchor Bridge and one in Fen Street which is the only one now visible. This was partly uncovered last year and can be seen in the driveway of Candy Lane House. By the time these emplacements had been built and more up to date weapons were available to the Home Guard the threat of invasion by the Germans was over and the

My informant, Bill Jackaman, was born in Nayland in 1926. His grandfather, George Jackaman, was the Lock keeper at Nayland Lock around 1900 and his father, Walter, was also born in Nayland. Walter survived WWI but died of typhoid at the early age of 39, leaving his wife with three young boys to care for, the youngest only a few weeks old. They lived in the Fen Street almshouses and life was hard for the family. Money was very short and the boys all worked hard to help their mother. When Bill passed the entrance exam to Sudbury Grammar School his teacher, Mr Taylor, bought him a school cap as his mother couldn't afford it. He was also given a free bike by the Education Committee to get him to Newton Green to catch the school bus. Before joining the Home Guard Bill had been a junior Army Cadet, both at school and in the village, and in 1944

> he was called up for the regular army, leaving the Home Guard which was disbanded by the Government a few months later.

Bill has many fascinating memories of his childhood and early life in Nayland before he left to live in Salisbury in 1962, some of which I have already used in previous articles. He likes to keep in touch and is an avid reader of the Community Times! Thank you Bill for sharing your memories with us.



CONSERVATION SOCIETY AGM

Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society's 40th anniversary has been marked by the launch of a major project. Chairman John Alexander told the annual meeting on March 10 the society had acquired various collections of photographs dating from the 1860s to the present, forming a historic archive. Each document had been scanned and they could all be seen on the society's website.

He said it would not have been possible without the work of Lorraine Brooks who spent weeks scanning the photos and Tony Price who created the software for the search engine.

Mr Alexander said it was an auspicious occasion for the society, started in 1974 by a small group of people who formed the Nayland Preservation Society. Members felt it was important to maintain the character of the village and the fact that membership now totalled more than 250 proved that people who came to live in the village grew to love it. "We have achieved a great deal and intend to carry on doing so," he added.

In his report Mr Alexander said it had been a very full year. Although planning had been relatively quiet the society continued to study and comment on all applications. The deterioration of the White Hart and the loss of an employment site in the village centre was still causing concern. A decision on Horkesley Park

was expected from the Secretary of State on or before May 6. The proliferation of buildings and sheds at Thrift Farm was also a concern and the society was objecting.

Referring to the future of the post office he said a meeting had been held between representatives of village organisations and Post Office Ltd which resulted in a statement saying the present postmistress wished to retire and it was necessary to find a new operator. The Post Office was happy to leave it where it was provided someone was found to take over and the parish council was urging anyone interested to come forward. Any proposal for relocation would be followed by a public consultation period.

Future events include a footpath walk in May, open gardens on June 8 and a special anniversary event on June 27 involving a display in the village hall and three of Nayland's oldest residents talking about their lives in the village. A further test pit dig will take place in September.

Accounts for the society and the Nayland with Wissington Land Company were adopted.

Officers elected were: chairman John Alexander, deputy chairman Martin Wright, secretary Andora Carver and treasurer David Heigham; committee: Jennie Jenkins, Mike Hunter, John Partridge, Jill Slater and Bill Starling.

The business meeting was followed by an illustrated talk on the Dedham Vale by Paul Gallifant, a committee member of the Dedham Vale Society for 26 years.

On Thursday 6th March I made my annual pilgrimage to Eco Build at the Excel Centre in London. Each year the exhibition gets more impressive. The range of technologies and energy efficiency solutions continues to grow. The number of countries represented grows as do the number of companies exhibiting. This year there was another great line up of accomplished speakers including Edward Davey MP, Secretary of State for Energy & Climate Change, Professor Paul Ekins, Professor of Energy and Environmental Policy, University College London and Kevin McCloud Channel 4 Presenter, Writer, Designer and Founder of Hab Housing. In addition, there were many focused seminars covering subjects such as Building Performance and Refurbishment & Retrofit.

I had a few specific things to research this year for my own interest as well as following up requests from friends. The most notable developments for the energy efficiency retrofit sector (most relevant to Nayland and its old, period housing stock) were:

- retrofit 'wet' underfloor heating systems, which will really open up the possibilities of successfully using Heat Pump technologies in period properties;
- · split air-to-air heat pumps for easy install renewable heat space heating; and
- the fantastic advances in flexible ducting for heat recovery ventilation (MVHR) systems which massively reduce install complexity and open up this technology to period properties with their often quirky layout.

There was also some exciting new technology for smart energy management which allows those who generate their own electricity with solar PV or wind to intelligently manage their generated power to maximise its usage on site. This technology is not only getting more advanced, but its cost is significantly reducing too. A system which will automatically divert surplus electricity to your immersion heater (Solar iBoost) now costs £220 and is very easy to install - making it a financial no- brainer to anyone with solar PV!

LED lighting has now become the staple incandescent bulb replacement. Slow start up and unreliable CFLs are now a thing of the past. The quality, colour of light and the light 'spread' of LEDs now makes them a straight replacement for any household bulb (including strip lights). A 50W halogen can now be replaced with 6W LED which, coupled with its longer life, makes a quick payback.

The abundant section of wood and biomass burning boilers from Scandinavia, Eastern Europe and North America was again of great interest. Systems which will efficiently burn (gasify) rough cut logs are a great option for rural properties - especially ones with good access to cheap logs! These systems are more intelligent, lower maintenance and more efficient than ever before, making them a viable alternative to the low maintenance oil or gas boiler we have become so accustomed to heating our homes with.

It was another inspiring and fascinating day highlighting that, with the right levels of investment, technology and innovation, we can dramatically reduce how much energy we need to live our lives. LOVE CALEY WALSH TRUST

The Walsh Trust is an old village charity which gives small Christmas bonuses to the elderly. There are 5 trustees who are Mrs Eva Rolfe, Miss Kath Hunt, Mrs Mig Knight while Mr Gerald Battye and I represent the Parish Council. Our income is too small to qualify for the Charity Aid Fund's bank account with its slightly better interest rate and the present low interest rates is limiting our small income. We therefore can only give bonuses to those over 80 who have lived in the village for at least 3 years. As these bequests were originally given to provide extra food and coal we give a Christmas gift to those who used to receive the bonus but who now live in residential care.

As we have no official way of finding out who is 80 we rely on everyone to tell us of parishioners reaching this age by Christmas who would welcome the bonus. Please let one of the Trustees know by December 1st. As a charity we should use all our income as bonuses so once we have allotted the money it is very difficult to to give to latecomers and thus this year we held a little in hand to cover the usual latecomer but this year for a change there were no latecomers but, sadly, one of the recipients died just before receiving her gift so we are carrying over more money to next year than usual which may help increase the bonuses next year.

This year we gave out 16 bonuses to single people of £25 and 4 couples of £30 with 4 gifts to those in residential care at £5.

Feedback from James Finch - Your Stour Valley County Councillor

This month I have two important messages focused on helping our youngsters. Thirdly a request for your help in determining the best opening hours for the Suffolk record Office.

SCC RESPONDS TO OFSTED FINDINGS

SCC (Suffolk County Council) has responded to a report, published by Ofsted this month, following an inspection into council's arrangements for supporting school improvement. The report recognised that the county council has a vision for improving education attainment, is ambitious and that head teachers value the support they receive from the authority in strengthening governance. However, overall, it rated our approach to helping schools improve as being ineffective. In doing so, it identified four areas of improvement for the council to focus on:

- Urgently finalise strategic plans which demonstrate how the Learning and Improvement Service can contribute to the realisation of the council's vision for improvement;
- Improve communication with school leaders so that they understand the local authority's role in school improvement;
- Ensure that the challenge to, and intervention in, maintained schools that are underperforming, lead to rapid improvements in progress and attainment; and
- Implement systematic and robust checks to evaluate the quality of work provided by the Learning Improvement Service.

All four areas had already been identified by SCC as needing focused work, and this was already underway when Ofsted visited. In my view and that of Lisa Chambers, SCC's cabinet member for education: "Ofsted's report makes sobering reading, and rightly so. There are few issues of greater significance than the education our young people receive and if advice needs to be given, it ought to be heard – loud and clear. We welcome the report and absolutely agree with the four areas of improvement they have identified. So much so that work to address them is already well underway. **Results are improving in Suffolk, but too slowly**. And although 70% of schools in Suffolk are rated good or outstanding, this isn't enough. We must all work to drive up standards. Key to solving a problem is recognising there is one in the first place. By launching the Raising the Bar inquiry, seeing the Schools organisation review through and

challenging under-performing schools to improve, we have demonstrated this recognition. Schools also know full well the scale of the challenge facing Suffolk. We're already working, together, to make improvements and will leave no stone unturned in our pursuit of a better future for our children."

CAMPAIGN TO TACKLE UNDER-AGED SMOKING

SCC's Trading Standards and Public Health teams have joined forces this week to launch a campaign aimed at reducing the number of under-aged smokers. Starting on National No-Smoking Day, the "Don't get me Started" campaign aims to encourage parents, schools and retailers of tobacco to play their part in helping prevent under-aged people from smoking. The campaign reminds retailers of their legal duty to make sure that they do not sell tobacco products to anyone under the age of 18. If they break the law, they risk receiving a fine. Campaign messaging has also been sent to all high schools in Suffolk. To report underage tobacco sales, Suffolk residents are urged to call Suffolk Trading Standards, 9am - 5pm on 08454 040506, or alternatively email tradingstandards@suffolk.gov.uk. All calls will be treated in the strictest confidence.

CONSULTATION - SUFFOLK RECORDS OFFICE

The public are being encouraged to have their say on proposals for an improved Suffolk Records Office (SRO) service. The consultation takes place between Monday 10th March and Friday 4th April, and gives the public the chance to share their views on the proposals which detail the benefit in reducing the week-day opening hours, improving the service on Saturday, and developing a key on-line presence. SRO has listened to customer comments and explored a variety of options used by other services across the country to find the most effective way of increasing the amount of information available on-line about our county's heritage and history. Welcome to this month's Police news item.

WHAT IS NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH?

It's one of the most successful crime reduction initiatives ever. Neighbourhood Watch is one the biggest and most successful voluntary crime prevention initiatives. Sometimes known as Home Watch, it originated in the United States and in the early 1980s came to the UK, where it fast became very popular. Neighbourhood Watch is based around the idea of an active community working in partnership with the police, and a shared value focused on bringing local people together. At its most basic level, Neighbourhood Watch consists of a group of like-minded neighbours getting together to help reduce crime where they live and making their communities safer.

Unfortunately, the regulations governing Neighbourhood Watch Schemes require that any scheme without a coordinator must be discontinued, with the Neighbourhood Watch street signs being removed. While losing the benefit that such a scheme gives to residents in 'reassurance' terms, this action will also affect any discount you may receive on contents insurance as a Neighbourhood Watch member. The public liability insurance for the scheme will also lapse.

Being a coordinator need not involve long hours of work, the requirements can be tailored to an individual's circumstances and resident's requirements.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS?

- · You are far less likely to be a victim of crime
- · Membership can reduce your household insurance premium
- · Gives advice to improve personal safety and security of your home and property
- · Improved community spirit
- · Become part of an established communication network between the community and Police

WHAT DOES NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH INVOLVE?

Schemes vary widely. At its most basic level membership involves being aware of what happens in your neighbourhood, taking simple precautions to prevent and reduce the risk of crime and being alert to anything that is suspicious.

NHW is a community initiative owned and run by the community. The Police support this community initiative, they do not run it. Members have a key role in making it a success.

AIMS OF NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Neighbourhood Watch aims to develop a close liaison between householders in a neighbourhood and the local Police.

- Help people to protect themselves and their property
- To reduce the fear of crime by means of improved home security
- Greater vigilance
- Rapid and detailed reporting of crime and suspicious incidents to the Police
- Fostering an improved community spirit

HOW DOES NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH WORK?

Neighbourhood Watch works mainly by developing close liaisons between local households and the police. Each Neighbourhood Watch scheme has a different setup and characteristics, depending on the area in which it is situated and its objectives. In other words, Neighbourhood Watch schemes do not follow a set structure. However, most schemes have these important aspects in common:

- Schemes are run by their members, who all take steps to prevent crime, improve safety and reduce the fear of crime.
- Schemes are generally led by a resident volunteer co-ordinator, whose job it is to get people working together and make sure things get done. The co-ordinator liaises with the police and acts as a voice for the community. Some schemes also have a committee that meets regularly to plan which problems to target and what actions to take.
- Schemes are supported by the police, (but not run by them), the local authority and sometimes by local Neighbourhood Watch associations.

Members receive information and messages from the police, their local association or the local authority. This vital communication link helps to motivate members and keep schemes active.



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


