#### THE POST OFFICE

Residents may have heard whispers recently regarding the possible closure or relocation of the Post Office. At the time of going to print there is little information available regarding Post Office Limited's proposals.

The Parish Council, backed up by the District and County Councillors, Community Council, Conservation Society and Transition Nayland have requested further information and called for a public meeting with their representatives.

Meanwhile, Post Office Limited have indicated they are committed to maintaining a Post Office service in Nayland and should that involve relocation to another premises it would be subject to a full public consultation.

A public meeting will give residents the opportunity to demonstrate the immense value of the Post Office to our community and to neighbouring parishes. It has provided a service far beyond the sale of stamps and vehicle tax discs; it is invaluable in its support of village groups and activities, it collects and distributes information and provides a meeting place for a chat... it is a hub of our community!

Keep any eye out for further news and do attend the public meeting to have your say!

#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

#### Planning Meeting: 11th December 2013

#### **PUBLIC FORUM**

Councillors were made aware of recent incidents of articulated lorries being directed by sat nav to Gravel Hill.

#### POLICE REPORT

The police report stated there had been one incident in the last month; an attempted dwelling burglary in Wiston Road.

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

James Finch reported the A14 improvements should start is 2016 and the Government confirmed the route would not be tolled; National Grid announced a significant delay in the proposed new power line between Bramford and Twinstead; Norfolk and Suffolk Councils have committed to working more closely together; additional funding has been secured to extend the Better Broadband for Suffolk programme.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

Councillors agreed in principle with the committees recommendations to: increase the allocation of grass cutting for Webb's meadow; 'in principal' to extend the Wiston litter pick to Bures Road and Cawley Road; increase allotment rent by £2 per full plot and £1 per half plot; beneficiaries of the charity payments would be Homestart and Suffolk Citizens Advice Bureau; to put aside £1,000 towards the new playground equipment project and £1,000 for the Village Hall.

It was agreed that the Parish Council would retain control of the Capital Investment money for the Village Hall and not transfer residue to the VH Endowment Fund.

The Precept will be finalised at the January meeting once further information had been received, but a minor inflationary increase of 2% was agreed in principle.

#### **PLANNING**

Reviewing recent planning applications Mary George said permission had been granted at 36 Stoke Road for the reduction of 2 oak trees; at 24 Stoke Road for reduction of a holly/hew hedge and felling and reductions to 14 trees and listed building consent at 4 Birch street for replacement of patio doors with bi-folding doors and installation of 2 conservation roof-lights, installation of new gas boiler including external cabinet.

Councillors had no objections to listed building consent: at 2 High Street for erection of ground floor rear extension to create enlarged garden room with internal alterations to relocate kitchen, WC and utility room and internal alterations at first floor level to create new en suite shower with new window, following removal of existing WC, utility room and conservatory; at Alston Court for installation of partitioning to form party wall between the main dwelling and annex; at 11 Stoke Road for removal of existing cement based render, repairs to decayed timber frame, re-instatement of render in lime based render (north and west elevations) and introduction of new soleplate subject to the involvement of the Conservation officer.

Councillors had no objection to alterations and part re-building of garden wall to create larger driveway, hard standing area and construction of new greenhouse at Longwood House, Stoke Road providing the Heritage Officer was involved and there were no changes to the access from the highway.

#### **OPEN SPACES**

Following the storm in October concerns was raised that children had been seen playing on the tree on Caley Green which had fallen across the river. SCC have confirmed that the work has been commissioned. The council will make an urgent request stating the tree is dangerous.

It was noted that the October storm resulted in a lot of damage and debris. James Finch confirmed that SCC are responsible for clearing the Highways, debris in gutters is cleared by Babergh, ditches and other areas are the responsibility of the landowners.

It was agreed to monitor the situation on Cawley Road regarding debris from fallen trees.

Mrs Knox reported on the great progress being made by the Playground equipment project committee. They have analysed

feedback by residents in the questionnaires and are applying for grants and meeting with playground contractors.

It was noted the existing playground surface has been repaired.

Councillors were concerned by parking near the school which had caused traffic problems in Bear Street, incidents on parking on grassed areas on the recreation ground and all day parking in the lay-by. It was agreed to include a notice in the school newsletter so it would reach all parents.

Following the council's queries about clearing reeds from the mill stream in Fen Street and the stream wall near Candy Lane which has collapsed into the stream the Environment Agency had replied stating the reeds are a haven for wildlife and they have no plans to remove them but they will clear obstructions from the water course. They further stated Fen Street has a low risk of flooding and they have no evidence that they own or are responsible for the wall. Councillors would look for paperwork to find evidence of ownership.

#### STREET LIGHTING

Councillors will look at the effectiveness of the streetlight in Newlands Lane for discussion next meeting.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

James Finch advised councillors of a new website for reporting potholes and highways maintenance issues.

An acknowledgement has been received from Highways following the council's letter regarding hazardous surface water laying at the bottom of Horkesley Hill when it rains.

A new grit bin for the top of Heycroft Way and a replacement litter bin at the bottom of Parkers Way will be ordered. Topping up of Grit bins and heaps will be requested.

The horse trough in High Street had been planted and Matthew Pescott-Frost agreed to keep it monitored.

#### **FOOTPATHS**

Rosemary Knox said two paths near Wiston Mill were marked closed as the railings are damaged although the path is clear.

The footpath warden will be advised that trees near Park Road are obstructing the footpath to Horkesley Lock.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

The owl box installed by Suffolk Wildlife Trust will be maintained by them and volunteers can assist. The box must be monitored by a licensed person and further workshops will be available to volunteers.

Rosemary Knox is in discussion with Tendring Estate regarding the status of their paths and the possibility of linking the allotment field path with their path to create a circular walk.

#### IN BRIEF:

Councillors had met to tidy their section of the village hall garden and agreed to purchase new bark mulch for the area.

The award received by Community Times has been displayed on the wall at the Village Hall.

#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 8th January 2014

Mark Burbidge is resigning from the Parish Council, effective from the end on January, but he would continue on the Playground Equipment Committee.

#### **NAYLAND POST OFFICE**

Councillors discussed possible closure of the current Post Office prior to the meeting. They agreed to write to Post Office Limited asking for a public meeting and requesting more information about their proposals. The letter would be co-signed by James Finch SCC, Richard Cave BDC, Community Council, Conservation Society and Transition Nayland.

#### **PUBLIC FORUM**

Lorraine Brooks said grit had not been supplied on Gravel Hill; by the passing place and Shaddelows Farm drive.

#### DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Richard Cave raised councillors awareness of the Town and Parish Council Newletter.

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

James Finch said he will support attempts to retain a Post Office in the village and applauds the proposal of having a public meeting with Royal Mail to enable us to understand the options they are considering for Nayland and for us to share our views with them.

He said the deadline for parents to apply for a full-time place at a preferred primary school for the next academic year was approaching. SCC are encouraging those who are eligible to claim for free school meals and they have approved an investment plan to encourage apprenticeships.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

Councillors agreed to keep the increase of the precept within 2% subject to an announcement from central Government.

#### **PLANNING**

Reviewing recent planning applications Mary George said permission had been granted at Longwood House, Stoke Road to fell 2 conifer trees and to alterations and part re-building of garden wall to create larger driveway, hard standing area and construction of new greenhouse. Permission had been granted at 2 High Street for erection of ground floor rear extension to create enlarged garden room with internal alterations to relocate kitchen, WC and utility room and internal alterations at first floor level to create new en suite shower with new window, following removal of existing WC, utility room and conservatory with conditions relating to external facing and roofing materials, replacement windows and colour finish to all external joinery.

#### STREET LIGHTING

James Finch said he would ask Richard Webster, Electrical Services Manager at SCC, for his recommendations on improving the effectiveness of the streetlight in Newlands Lane.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

The old litter bin at the bottom of Parkers Way has been replaced, a new grit bin at the top of Heycroft Way has been installed and a pot hole on Gravel Hill had been repaired.

Rosemary Knox reported two deep pot holes in Wiston Hall Lane (aka Church Lane).

Mary George said she had examined previous correspondence relating to the Mill Lade wall near Candy Lane and responsibility lay with Suffolk highways. Water levels are currently high and a six foot stretch of the wall has been eroded; highways will be informed that this needs urgent attention.

James Finch said a request for a vehicle speed activation sign had been submitted; they circulate the area usually staying in each location for 6 weeks.

#### **FOOTPATHS**

Rosemary Knox said following recent bad weather the condition of the two paths marked closed near Wiston Mill had deteriorated further.

The footpath warden will be asked to advise Essex CC that the non-slip strips on the bridge at Pops Piece need replacing.

#### **OPEN SPACES**

Mary George said SCC would commence clearing fallen trees on Caley Green; the work may take a couple of weeks to complete.

The annual tree inspection would be arranged. Rosemary Knox reminded councillors that the Lime trees by St Mary's church were to be included.

Rachel Hitchcock had submitted a detailed report on the progress of the playground equipment project committee.

The Environment Agency had responded to the council's query on why they no longer cut back reeds in the Fen Street section of Mill Lade. Councillors felt they had not taken into account that reeds had been cleared by residents and if no management was conducted the waterway would silt up. A site meeting will be requested with the Environment Agency.

Gerry Battye said verges in the Horkesley Road area needed attention; overgrown hedges were causing difficulty for drivers exiting onto theA34, broken branches on one side of Horkesley Road were preventing grass cutting and pruning was needed on the other side. James Finch said he would ask Roger Trenton, Corporate Property Advisor for SCC, to look at this with a view to establishing future management of the area.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**


The Suffolk Wildlife Trust will monitor the new owl box twice a year and expect it to be occupied very soon.

#### VILLAGE HALL

Rosemary Knox said Peter Mann has agreed to take over the role of treasurer when Andrew Gowen retires at the end of March. The outside light will be left on to deter vandalism. The old Christmas tree barrel had not yet been cleared by the PC's contractors.

#### IN BRIEF:

The April meeting of the Parish Council will be relocated to the Church Hall. The Parish Assembly will be held on Monday 12th April in the Village Hall.

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#### **COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT**

Jenny Smith welcomed members to the meeting.

#### **MATTERS ARISING**

#### **Executive Committee Vacancies/Responsibilities:**

All members present except Mark Burbidge, who could not commit at present, agreed to continue on the executive committee for 2014/15. Julie Wooding has kindly agreed to join the committee and Rachel Hitchcock said she would continue to help the CC with activities.

Jenny Smith said further volunteers to join the CC executive would be welcome and there is a vacancy for Chairman. Jenny said she would not be continuing as Vice Chairman but would remain on the executive and Bryan Smith said 2014/15 would be his last year as Treasurer.

**Fundraising Activities:** Selling raffle tickets at the monthly Farmers Markets in the autumn leading up to CC events had been successful. When to resume this fundraising would be discussed at the next meeting. Other ideas for fundraising would be welcome.

**Valentines Night:** The CC cancelled this event as costs could not be reduced to the level agreed at the last meeting.

#### **RECENT ACTIVITIES:**

**Bonfire Night - Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> November:** This had been a huge success and thanks were due to all involved.

Christmas Fayre - Sunday 1<sup>st</sup> December: This was very successful, again many thanks to all involved.

Village Christmas Tree: Claire Buller was thanked for organising the tree which looked lovely. There have been several complimentary comments received. Claire said the new fixing worked well and thanked all involved including Anna and Tony Boon.

#### **CORRESPONDENCE**

Nayland Post Office: The question of the possible relocation of the Post Office was raised. There were insufficient facts available to have a meaningful discussion but it was resolved that the Community Council would give their full support to the Parish Council in their efforts to have a public meeting with a senior representative of the Post Office. A meeting where the Post Office could explain their plans and the rationale behind them. It was agreed, by all, that every effort should be made to ensure that this vital amenity remains in the village.

#### **GRANTS & DONATIONS**

**Nayland Choir:** A grant request had been received for £2,000 towards the cost of holding three concerts this year to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the choir. After some discussion it was agreed to give a grant of £500.

Fairfield Playground Equipment: A grant request had been received from Rachel Hitchcock who gave a detailed account of the project which will update the 30 year old playground equipment on Fairfield recreation ground. The project is likely to cost £25,000. The Parish Council had pledged £10,000 towards the project and grant applications were being submitted to Babergh and the Lottery Fund.

It was agreed to award a grant of £1,000. Rachel thanked the CC and said their backing would demonstrate community support when they applied for further grants.

#### **FORTHCOMING ACTIVITIES:**

Annual General Meeting - Wednesday 5th March: This will be held in the Village Hall on the same evening as the Village Hall Management Committee AGM. The AGMs start at 7.30pm for Community Council and 8.30pm for the Village Hall Management Committee. The Executive committee will meet at 7pm.

Bryan Smith reminded the meeting that in 1992 the CC amended the Constitution but changes were not lodged with the Charity Commission. He proposes this should be done after the AGM.

**Women's Institute:** Wendy Sparrow said Paul George from the Mercury Theatre gave an interesting talk about *Theatre and Pantomime* in December and their festive goodies sold out at the Christmas Fayre. The speaker in January will talk about *The Donkey Sanctuary*.

**Art Group:** Colin Ramsell said there had been a full house for their first session of 2014. They have booked visiting tutors and they are hoping to organise some outings using community transport.

**Conservation Society:** John Partridge said they are planning a busy year for 2014, which is the Society's 40th Anniversary, including an interesting illustrated talk on the Dedham Vale at their AGM on 10th March, an anniversary reception on 27th June, another Test Pit Dig and the publication of Leigh Alston's book.

**Royal British Legion:** John Partridge said they will be commemorating the start of the First World War on 4th August and combining with the Village Players for an event. They have a few spaces on the coach for their outing to the Cutty Sark on 21st May.

**Woodland Corner:** Rachel Hitchcock said they had a busy lead up to Christmas. This is their 4th anniversary year and they will do something to celebrate. A Boden Party is being held on 27th February and a Cake Sale on 29th March.

HortSoc: Lorraine Brooks said they had a successful stall at the Christmas Fayre. They will soon be emerging from their winter hibernation with a busy schedule for 2014, starting with a talk *Through the Year with a Horticultural Photographer* on 18th March and on 22nd March the Spring Show. Bookings will start being taken for a coach outing to Kew Gardens on 11th June.

Village Players: Jenny Smith said their last play Murdered To Death had been successful and they are appreciative of

audiences support. Auditions are being held for their the next production; The Miracle Worker by William Gibson. Performances will be on 10th, 11th and 12th April.

**Parish Council:** Mark Burbidge said he has resigned from the Parish Council.

**Choir:** Ian McKay said rehearsals have started on Thursday at 8pm in Nayland School and they would welcome new singers. They have three concerts planned this year; the first on 23rd March in St James *The Sacred in Song:* Enchanting choral music from nine European countries and five centuries which will have something for everyone's taste in classical music.

**Transition Nayland:** Julie Wooding said this is their fourth year. They had a successful winter solstice walk on 21st December and for their next project they are looking at having a pedal power cinema.

**Village Hall:** Iain Wright said expenditure on maintenance, heating and general running costs had increased and income had been slightly down. The committee's additional fundraising was not sufficient to meet the shortfall so it will be necessary to increase hire charges.

**First Response:** Karen Elliott said she had attended a recent training meeting. Responders had enjoyed a Christmas meal together. There are currently four responders and two more are awaiting training but more volunteers are needed.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

During 2013, the Church Hall had a deficit of well over £1000 compared with a surplus of £800 in 2012. This has been caused by a reduction in income, increased electricity charges and a one off charge for painting the inside of the hall.


The talk about The Mercury Theatre in December was fascinating, and we learnt a great deal about how it functions. It is a very busy theatre and should be supported.

#### Treasurer's Report by Andrew Gowen

During 2013 we made a small surplus of some £300 which was much lower than the £3000 surplus we had in 2012. Unfortunately income from Hall bookings was some £1000 lower and income from the Playing Field was some £300 lower. At the same time expenditure on Central Heating Oil, Electricity increased and Maintenance was up by £1000. In my view we need a surplus of at least £5000 a year to ensure we can maintain our magnificent Hall in a proper condition.

In the coming year we are likely to have higher electricity and CH Oil bills and there is a new charge for refuse collection of some £600 based on the number of dustbins. To limit this charge to £230 we shall be reducing the number of dustbins and hirers will be encouraged to take their rubbish away with them.

For the last few years the Village Hall Management Committee (VHMC) has been raising extra funds through a lottery, sale of plants, village lunches, cinema and other small activities and this has enabled it to keep the hall charges down. Unfortunately this extra income is no longer enough to cover costs and provide funds for future developments.

It is with some reluctance that I shall be recommending to the Village Hall Management Committee that the hire charges for the hall are increased by £1 an hour with similar increases for other elements of the Hall from 1 April 2014. This will increase our income by some £1500 which may be insufficient and we may need to review this again in 2015.

#### JANUARY COMMITTEE MEETING

At the January meeting some routine matters of maintenance were dealt with. Andrew Gowen has spoken to the Parish Council about the Endowment Fund for the Hall. The Parish Council have agreed to set aside money for the Hall but not to put it into the Fund. The Users' Manual is almost ready. The barge boards will be painted in the spring and the lock to the front door has been repaired. A Facebook page for the Hall has been set up and Maria Mason has agreed to be the administrator. The Youth Club have had to cancel their bookings until February 25<sup>th</sup> due to lack of volunteers.

The Treasurer reported that the hiring costs will need to increase at the AGM as the Hall's expenses for maintenance, oil and electricity have all increased.

It was agreed to look again at the sound system to improve the sound quality for the cinema. The question of light pollution caused by the external lights was raised but it was felt that they are a necessary and successful deterrent to prevent vandalism.

There is a varied programme of classes and organisations that use the Hall on a regular weekly basis. On Monday there is an Art Class; on Tuesdays a Botanical Illustration class takes place in the morning; on Wednesday morning Fundancing; Wednesday evening Carpet Bowls; Thursday evening Badminton; Friday morning Mother and Toddlers meet. Imagine our economy as a balloon. We really started blowing some serious air into it beginning with the Industrial Revolution. Since then we've continued to expand the balloon by applying a growing population to the workforce and by utilising a greater range and volume of resources. As new technologies developed we have exploited different resources and extracted them from increasingly remote parts of our planet.

As with a balloon that is reaching it's capacity, we are now finding it harder and harder to expand our economy. Indeed, over the last 15 years we've only managed real growth after we let a bit of air out of the balloon (otherwise known as a recession).

The population of the planet must necessarily be limited. All being well the population will peak around 10BN people in the next century and settle out somewhere slightly lower than that. Between now and then we have to deal with the issue of imbalanced populations with a large percentage retired from the workforce. Both globally and at a national level we have to work out how to operate a healthy economy with a shrinking labour pool.

Similarly most of the resources we rely upon to drive our current economy are limited in some sense. Fossil fuels are probably the most limited since they can only ever be used once. Other resources such as iron can be recycled but are still limited until we can send spaceships to other planets. Since the Industrial Revolution it's been rare for a resource constraint to limit the economy, either new sources have been discovered or a better replacement has come along.

These factors go some way to explain why we are struggling to inflate our balloon any further.

The other main lever that can be brought to bear on an economy is our ingenuity. For the first time in our history we will need to find ways to sustain a healthy standard of living while using fewer resources.

A great example of how we might do this is the concept of a circular economy. This reverses the current design philosophy of "in built obsolescence". Instead of designing a product so that it will need to be replaced quickly, making it cheap and short lived or intentionally making it impossible to repair we can design goods in such a way that they have a long life, can be fixed and when they are finished with they can be broken down and all the raw materials recycled. In many ways such a design methodology takes its inspiration from the natural world where nothing is ever wasted.

Finally, in a week when banker's bonuses are in the news once again, we probably need to get better at sharing the rewards of our economy around more evenly and more fairly. The "squeezed middle" needs to become the "expanded middle" with fewer people at the extremes of poverty or wealth.

# Garden Notes

Like many of his age group the OM/S is inclined to spend quite a bit of time looking back into the past. As an example of this he went back to his first February article in the year 2000 and found that most of it was about winter flowers. In subsequent years he has banged on several times about the merits of Winter Aconites, Winter Jasmine and so forth.

One plant that is often overlooked is that component of Victorian shrubberies then known as Laurustinus but now listed as Viburnum Tinus. It is evergreen, tough as old boots, and well able to withstand severe cold and traffic fumes and as a result is often found in urban road schemes.

It will survive severe clipping, and providing this is done early in the year it still produces a decent display of its white flower clusters from November to April, followed by a few black berries, which will produce seedlings that appear in various unlikely places. After a slow start it will eventually attain a height of ten feet or so, if left to its own devices.

Another useful shrub, now in flower, is the evergreen Sarcococca, or Christmas Box. The OM/S was given his two species, S. Confusa and S. Digyna by that excellent plantsman, the late Christopher Lubbock about 20 years ago.

In those days they were something of a rarity but have now been discovered by garden centres and mail order firms and are widely available. S. Digyna is the better of the two, with its reddish stems and clusters of highly scented flowers. Planted up wind and near the house they are good value in these dark days.

Reverting to the Millennium article, in the final paragraph he attempted to lecture his readers on the care of garden tools and implements, and the views expressed therein could bear repetition. Having been bought up by his father, a regular soldier to keep his tools like weapons, in good order, he is appalled by the state in which most gardeners keep them; that is rusty and caked with dried mud, which makes any job much more difficult.

In this state they should first be rubbed down with sandpaper or better aluminium oxide paper and wire wool (the latter probably to be found in the kitchen cupboard as Brillo) and then stored with a thin coating of oil. This operation should of course be performed on every occasion that the tools are used, saving time in the long run.

Here endeth the lecture; now all good wishes for the new gardening season.

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### HISTORY OF THE NAYLAND BILLIARDS TABLE

Some residents may have heard of the Nayland Men's Social Club which met in Fen Street until the 1970s. There are probably a few members left who remember its demise but certainly none who remember its founding which was recorded in the Parish Magazine in April 1910:

"The Men's Social Club was opened by the Vicar [Rev William Farmiloe] on Monday, February 28<sup>th</sup>, about thirty people being present ....

"During the evening most of those present joined the Club as 'original members', the number of which has risen since to sixty five, a most satisfactory beginning and one which goes some way towards proving that a long felt want has now been supplied .... The clock which Mrs Fenn [of Alston Court] most generously presented has been hung in the Bagatelle room and forms a handsome and valuable addition to the Club furniture".

Writing in the Nayland Record in 1976, Blair Lees said he understood that when the Club was founded in 1910 special premises were built for it, where we do not know, but the membership increased so rapidly that by January 1912 a move had to be made and a property "known for many years as the Vine" was acquired on lease. It seems likely that this was part of the Vine Inn in Court Street which was sold about that time and became a private house. There was plenty of room for card players and the billiards table which the late Les Norfolk remembered had been purchased through the good offices of the Rev Farmiloe's brother. This table was the main source of attraction.

Not surprisingly, during World War I, the Club lapsed as many members went off to fight. After the war, in 1920, the Nayland Branch of the British Legion was formed, under the chairmanship of Dr Slade. The premises at the Vine were taken over, complete with billiards table and other equipment, and used for some time as the Legion's Headquarters.

The table was then given to the Tradesmen's Club which met in a room above what was Fred Biggs's garage and workshop in Fen Street. This building had been part of the original mill,

most of which had been demolished in the 1920s. Sometime later in the 1930s the Men's Club was re-formed and took over the mill premises on lease from Mr Biggs. The billiard table was given back to the Men's Club.

By the 1970s, though the membership had dwindled since World War II, the Men's Club was still meeting on two evenings a week for billiards, darts, cribbage and rummy. The remaining members, and some newer residents who had seen the sign on the door, still climbed the stairs to this male domain for an evening's entertainment.

In 1976 Mr Biggs applied to convert the mill building to a dwelling and there was strong opposition from the village. Nayland Councillor Mr David Mitchell, on behalf of the members of the Men's Club, asked members of Babergh planning committee to refuse the plan, saying that the building was not on the sewer and club members had to walk up the road to a public house to use the lavatory. If permission was granted the club had nowhere to go, the village hall was already full he said. As planning permission had

previously been given for the plan in 1969 and planning policy had not changed the council approved the application. The house we see today next to the garages, which faces down the millstream, was then built.

A problem for the Men's Club was where to store the billiards table and other equipment until a new home was found. While several possibilities of a new meeting place were explored, the table was stored by friends in the village until eventually a new Snooker Club was formed in the 1980s at the White Hart and the billiard table was installed. Members paid an annual subscription of £10 and Membership Card No 1 was issued to the late Bill Webb of Court Street who had been a lifelong member of the Men's Club, as was his father and grandfather who was almost certainly an original member of the Men's Club in 1910.

For some years the Snooker Club was very popular and Ivan Kerridge, who was Treasurer, remembers that at one time it had about 45 keen members. However, when the White

Hart was sold in 1993, subsequently opening as a restaurant, the members of the club were asked to move the table from the hall at the back of the pub. Once again the billiard table had to be dismantled, no easy task Ivan remembers, as it was very heavy and required several people to move it. But what was to happen to the table now? At that time the late Jack Norris, who recalled playing on it regularly when he came back from the war, was adamant that the table belonged to the village and should stay here.

The sad end to this tale is that there was nowhere in the village where the billiard table could be used again. Even the Village Hall which was enlarged in 2000 had no room for it. Eventually, to everyone's regret, especially those who had played on it many times, the table was sold to someone in the area and the money given to the Community Council. Although it had to leave Nayland, hopefully the table is still providing enjoyment to its current owner and is now in its final resting place after such a long and chequered history.

#### A Sanctuary for Wildlife....

Many of our churchyards have escaped the agricultural development that has caused the dramatic loss of valuable habitats.

For this reason churchyards are very important for wildlife, providing a refuge for a wide range of plant and animal species. With sensitive management this wildlife can be encouraged without detracting from the spiritual and contemplative role of the churchyard. Here at St. James, we have worked hard over the years to provide an environment suitable for both people and wildlife and this information leaflet has been developed to celebrate the efforts of the churchyard working party and the wildlife value of the space they manage.



Through their hard work and commitment some important features have been nurtured or created and the churchyard benefits people and wildlife in many ways.



As a direct result of their management the churchyard is a delight to visitors, who are swathed in colourful displays and enveloped by sweet scents in the spring and summer and the churchyard is a veritable retreat for nectar loving creatures with its flower rich beds, rose arches, bluebells, cowslip, beautiful apple and cherry blossom, lilac, buddleia and wildflower spaces.



Branches and logs can be used to create niche habitats. Underneath the protection of the stunning weeping ash sits a log / brash pile created simply by using materials cut during shrub and tree maintenance, which provides valuable habitat for a range of invertebrates, reptiles and amphibians.



To the east of the church an old tree stump has been left for the benefit, of stag beetles. Dead, dying and decaying wood is a vital habitat for flora and fauna including beetles and fungi.

In Victorian times tree stumps and their roots were used to fashion 'Stumpery Gardens'. As the stump rots down, the moist conditions encourage ferns, fungi and attract many invertebrates and amphibians.

The trees and hedges of churchyards are valuable for wildlife, providing food, shelter and nesting sites. The fruit borne by traditional orchard trees like apple provide food for birds and mammals in the winter months.



The sweet scented flowers of lilac, buddleia, apple and cherry blossom provide an essential source of nectar for bees and butterflies, attracting species such as the Red Admiral, Peacock and Tortoiseshell.

Other woody plants found in the churchyard include ash, field maple, beech, hazel, yew and barberry.

Barberry is a scarce thorny hedgerow plant with yellow flowers and yellow-orange fruits which, in some regions is being deliberately planted to support declining populations of the Barberry Carpet Moth which depends on the plant for its survival.

Varying lengths of grass are maintained in the churchyard, around gravestones, along walls and hedges and the around the base of trees. These areas provide a greater variety of habitat for a wider range of species than a regularly mown short lawn by making available seed heads for birds, a habitat for invertebrates and a valuable refuge for small mammals and reptiles.

To the south of the church a small area of grassland is being managed for wildflowers. Although unsightly to some this area is being managed with a purpose.

Over time wildflower seed stored within the soil bank will germinate and species such as common knapweed, yarrow, herb robert, ragged robin, red clover, creeping buttercup and hopefully many other flowers will thrive providing a pretty display and opportunities for moths, grasshoppers, birds, ladybirds, bees and butterflies.

Tucked away in a sunny corner is a large stand of nettle. Nettle is an important habitat for insects such as lady-birds, damsel bugs, weevils, beetles, and spiders. Young nettle are the preferred food plant for many moth larvae and butterflies such as the Peacock and Comma. Adjacent to this area is a buddleia, more commonly known as the butterfly bush. Buddleia has long been revered for attracting butterflies to its sweet scented blooms.



Ancient buildings and stonework associated with the church and its churchyard provide a unique assemblage of mosses and lichens that would otherwise be unlikely to occur. Lichens can take over 100 years to grow only a few centimetres and so the antiquity of church buildings and gravestones provide an important haven for these species to thrive undisturbed.

A well managed churchyard is a beautiful place, which is not only a vital refuge for wildlife but is also a focal point of the parish and a valued asset to the community. The churchyard can be both a place for quiet reflection, and a place of interest where religion, architecture and wildlife can be enjoyed.



# VILLAGE PLAYERS: Murdered To Death

A hilarious spoof of a typical Agatha Christie whodunnit, Murdered to Death by Peter Gordon was the Village Players' winter production and certainly provided audiences in the village hall with plenty of laughs.

Set in a 1930s country manor house, the play featured an oddly assorted collection of characters including a sophisticated lady of the manor, a family retainer with a taste for the bottle, an amateur local sleuth and a thoroughly incompetent detective.

Directed by Jim Bond, the piece was played for laughs throughout despite a couple of murders along the way.

The bumbling police inspector with his constant misuse of words and occasional slapstick was a comedy gem by Justin Dowding and Samuel Pentney was his long-suffering constable. More laughter was generated by Chris Hunt as the bad-tempered butler over-keen on alcohol.

Prior to her early demise Jenny Smith was a spirited and charming lady of the manor while Rebecca Napper was convincing as her conniving niece. John McCarroll had a suitably stiff upper lip as a retired army colonel and Lucinda Bartlett came into her own playing his long-suffering wife.

#### ARE YOU INTERESTED IN ADOPTING A CHILD?

The Suffolk County Council (SCC) is urging people interested in adopting to come forward, with 30 children in Suffolk currently looking for a permanent adoptive family. This "New Year" push is aimed at addressing the desperate need for more people to come forward and provide 'forever families'. What a wonderful start to the new Year it could be for one of those 30 children if we could find a home in the Stour Valley. The council is especially on the look-out for families for sibling groups, older children and children with disabilities. Applications are welcomed from all sections of the community, to offer a child, or sibling group, a loving and supportive family for life. #### **SCC INVESTING IN APPRENTICESHIPS**

The Cabinet in their December 2013 meeting approved a three year investment plan to achieve accelerated and sustainable growth in apprenticeship numbers for the benefit of young people and businesses across the county. They also approved a capped budget of £1.5m to establish a local Apprenticeship Service and deliver a series of targeted marketing campaigns to promote the importance of apprenticeships and drive greater take up by businesses and young people.

## SCC LEADS THE WAY IN CHAMPIONING GOOD RAIL SERVICE FOR SUFFOLK

An SCC-organised conference brought together key figures last month to discuss the rail needs of people and businesses across Suffolk, and develop a clear, joined-up approach to achieving them. The 2013 Suffolk Rail conference was attended by Suffolk MPs, officials from the New Anglia Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), the Department for Transport, Network Rail and Greater Anglia. Business representatives and others who attended heard how rail improvements, such as greater frequency, could help connect businesses and make

a big difference to the local economy. A new rail prospectus is being developed for Suffolk, identifying the county's needs and the actions required to deliver them. This will be available for consultation in the spring.

Only by businesses, politicians, local authorities and other key partners coming together can we deliver real change for Suffolk's rail network, and make the county's rail service as good as it can be for all those using it.

## HAVE YOU CHECKED YOUR CHIMNEY FLUE? CHIMNEY FIRES ARE ON THE INCREASE.

SCC's Fire and Rescue Service is warning people across Suffolk to check their chimney flue, to ensure it's clear, before lighting a fire. The warning comes as figures show a 42% increase in chimney fires in Suffolk compared with the same period last year. In December 2013 alone, there were 37 reported chimney fires, compared with 26 in December 2012. It is recommended that all chimneys and flues are cleaned at least once a year, or quarterly for wood fires, and checked to make sure that they are free from debris. Anyone trying to find a suitable chimney sweep can visit www.checkatrade.com, which is the on-line directory of local tradesmen and women who have been checked by SCC Trading Standards.

#### THE FUTURE OF NAYLAND POST OFFICE

I am aware that there are concerns over the future of Nayland Post Office. I am prepared to do all I can to support others in retaining this important service in the village and I strongly applaud the proposal of having a public meeting with Royal Mail to enable us to understand the options they are considering for Nayland and for us to share our views with them

## FURTHER WARNINGS AFTER FIVE PEOPLE SCAMMED OUT OF £30,000

Police in Suffolk are urging friends, relatives, carers and neighbours to pass on advice to elderly people they care for after five people have been scammed out of almost £30,000.

The 'elaborate' scam which is being carried out by con men and women has now hit Suffolk after sweeping across the Metropolitan and Essex Police Force areas.

Since August, Suffolk Police has received five reports of virtually identical scams where a person calls their elderly victim, purporting that they are a Police Officer calling from The Met or Essex Police.

The 'Police Officer' calls the victim telling them they are from the police investigating fraud on their bank account. On occasions they claim to be working for the victim's bank and they ask for account information including their card number, security number and PIN. Should the resident become suspicious the offender suggests they call 999 or 101 to ask for confirmation the caller is a police officer.

The victim then calls the police, but does not realise that the offender has not hung up so goes straight through to them again. In some cases a female offender comes on the line and pretends to be working for the police control room and verifies the so called officer's details. The caller is then handed back to the original offender who obtains the victims details.

In other cases victims have been told a courier will be sent round to collect their bank card or have even been asked to go to their bank to withdraw large amounts of money which is again collected by courier. In a recent incident in Suffolk a 62 year old woman living in South Ipswich was duped into withdrawing nearly £4,000 from her bank account which was collected by a courier later that day.

Community Safety Manager for Suffolk Police Alan Osborne said: "Fraudsters will try every way possible to scam money out of people and this appears to be one of the latest con tactics they are using.

"The police or banks will never ask for people's bank account details over the phone and should anyone receive this type of call they should hang up immediately.

"We are working with banks, building societies and taxi or courier companies to raise awareness of this particular scam but we are keen to stress to those people who have elderly family members or neighbours to spread the word and talk to them about this type of crime.

Police are issuing the following advice:

- Your bank or the police will never ask for your PIN, bank card or bank account details over the phone – never give these details out.
- •The police will never call you and ask you to withdraw money from your account to give to a courier or taxi driver, regardless of how convincing they may seem.
- •If you receive such a call leave the landline for at least five minutes to make an outside call. Fraudsters will keep the line open and have been known to play ring tones, hold music and a recorded message down the phone so the victim believes they are making a call to a legitimate number.
- ·Use a friend's of neighbour's telephone instead.
- •Friends, family, carers and neighbours are asked to spread the word to ensure everyone is aware of this scam and what they should do.

If you have been a victim call police on 101 or 999 if you are vulnerable and need police assistance – and remember allow your landline to clear for at least five minutes before you call, or ideally use an alternative line.

Dear all,

Telling people I am a clergyman can have interesting results.

In a recent sermon I commented how I am sometimes mischievous about when I reveal this information to people I don't know. It can be quite fun a social situation when I am not in uniform to delay this revelation. Eventually the question is asked "What do you do for a living?". As I say, responding that I am a clergyman in the Church of England produces interesting results. The face sometime says something different to the mouth. The words express interest, even fascination, whilst the face is saying something like "Oh dear! Have I said anything I shouldn't say in front of the vicar?"

People assume certain things about the clergy. Immediately they know we are Christian and probably make all sorts of assumptions about what that means. They may, or may not be correct. Once the information is out, it is out!

Perhaps, especially in Britain, for others who are Christians, or indeed follow other faiths, it is different. Whole conversation can take place without anyone becoming aware that the person subscribes to a faith or religion, even when their employment is known. In this country we tend to be a little reserved about letting people know we have faith, let alone discuss it.

In other countries it is sometimes different. Christians of the Eastern Orthodox following are much more outgoing and demonstrative about their faith. Greek Orthodox Christians can be very obvious. Expressing their faith is part of their culture. They can often be seen making the sign of the cross. I recall being driven (at speed) on Crete and every time we passed a roadside shrine or church he made the sign of the cross three times! I also recall, whilst standing in a small seaside Greek Orthodox Christian Church, a couple of teenagers came in, reverenced an icon and then stood and prayed for a few moments before lighting a candle and leaving.

How are we at revealing what we believe, at living our faith? Well, we are British I suppose. Perhaps we could follow the example of our more overt brothers and sisters. Perhaps we should be less backward at coming forward. Let's stand up and be counted. Let's be joyous about it.


