# NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

### **Report on Meeting: 11th February 2015**

(Minutes available on PC notice board in High Street or www,naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

#### PUBLIC FORUM

Chris Hunt reminded councillors of the poor state of the grass track leading from the end of Candy Lane to the end of the allotments.

#### POLICE REPORT

One crime was reported since the last meeting: the theft of a garden ornament in Bear Street between 19 and 20 January. **COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT** 

James Finch reported that the search for a successful resolution of two Nayland issues, parking problems around the Anchor and the threatened closure of the post office, continues.

#### PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Mary George said consent had been granted by Babergh at Grove House, Bures Road for the erection of a single storey extension; 12 Stoke Road for the erection of single storey extension; 2a Birch Street to install stair-lift, shower room and internal alterations; 1 Birch Street to replace felt roofing with tiles.

Discussing new applications councillors had no objections to an application at 30 Newlands Lane for a single storey extension between the house and garage or at. Mallards 88 Bear Street for the crown reduction of four ash trees protected by a tree preservation order. They had no objections for listed building consent at The Old Chapel Stoke Road to install 3 new windows, internal screen, acoustic upgrade to Nave floor and internal alterations but would like conditions regarding musical events included in any approval to remove any doubt as to the status of the use of the building in the future.

It was agreed to generate a collective response to Babergh's planning consultation document. The document proposes, for example, a significant reduction in the number of written policies and greater policy harmony between Barbergh and Mid-Suffolk. HIGHWAYS

Following recent complaints regarding parking by the Anchor Inn, a number of councillors voiced their opposition to any double yellow lines appearing on the bridge. They reaffirmed that the issue could be addressed with County Councillor James Finch who is aware of the issue and is working for a resolution.

Correspondence has been received concerning the poor state of the road surface near Hullbacks Farm. There are rights of way issues in the area and the situation is exacerbated by the passage of heavy goods vehicles. The PC also have concerns about SCC's poor or non-existent standard of hedge and verge cutting. James Finch is aware of all these issues and is keen to resolve them.

Mary George reported that bollards recently erected in Birch Street without reflectors now have them. Potholes and flytipping should be reported via relevant online reporting system.

Rosemary Knox reported leaning or collapsed road signs. Some street nameplates on the Heights are faded and need replacing.

#### **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

Andora Carver drew the Council's attention to the problem of litter between Candy Lane and the playing field and filled dog poo bags thrown into hedges near the allotment field. Councillors accepted her offer to alleviate the problem with a team of volunteers who will support the existing arrangements. Babergh's guidelines for volunteer litter-picking will apply.

Signage discouraging littering and the random discarding of filled dog poo bags will be considered.

#### FOOTPATHS

Councillors are concerned that Essex CC have still not carried out repairs to footbridges for which they are responsible, specifically Merles Bridge at Horkesley Lock, which is currently subject to a closure notice. This affects the route of two footpaths.

Negotiations with the landlord on the maintenance of stiles and installation of kissing gates on footpaths north of Bear Street cemetery are ongoing.

#### ALLOTMENTS

The poor state of the grass from the end of Candy Lane to the end of the allotments is caused by unauthorised vehicular traffic and exacerbated wet weather conditions and by a narrowing of the track. Driving on this area should be discouraged. Approved plans to widen the grassed area, at the bottleneck point by hedge-clearing has not yet been carried out.

Notification of a Natural England entry level stewardship agreement has been received. A small grant will be received.

A date for the annual meeting with allotment holders will be fixed. NAYLAND POST OFFICE

The Post Office remains under threat of closure but it was noted that a tentative enquiry have been received in response to a recent appeal.

#### **IN BRIEF**

An update on timings for the agreed LED street-light upgrade programme for 2015/16 has not been received.

The Village Hall Management Committee advised they will tackle drainage issues around the hall by rodding out the relevant part of the drainage system. If that does not have prove effective, they will liaise with the PC.

It was agreed that membership of the Walsh, Love, Caley Trust management committee should be extended to included another local resident who is not a Parish Councillor.

Approval was granted for two memorial erection applications on the burial ground.

Arrangements for the Annual Parish Assembly on Monday 27 April at 8pm were discussed.

#### Report on Meeting: 11th March 2015

#### POLICE REPORT

There had been no reported crimes since the last meeting. DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Richard Cave referred to Babergh's 'End of Term Report' describing the last four years achievements and changes. Babergh and Mid Suffolk Councils are implementing cultural change and shifting to an 'entrepreneurial mindset'.

#### COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

James Finch advised that Council Tax will be frozen for a fifth year. PLANNING

Reviewing recent planning applications Mary George said consent had been granted by Babergh at 38 Bear Street for 30% crown reduction of four Ash trees with TPO; at 12 Stoke Road for a rear extension subject to finishes and colours of external materials; and at The Old Chapel, Stoke Road for installation of 3 windows, internal screen, acoustic upgrade to Nave floor and internal alterations subject to work being carried out in accordance with the approved drawings.

Babergh had refused an application at Little Firmins for removal of agricultural restriction on a dwelling for rent.

## **BABERGH & MID SUFFOLK LOCAL PLAN CONSULTATION**

Gerry Battye had scoured the whole document. Acknowledging the councils were aiming to reduce 100 policies down to 23, they were now so general as to create problems for Parish Councils: terms such as 'residential amenity' were not explained; when considering retail development, no mention was made of essential infrastructure. Acronyms proliferated with no definitions. Rosemary Knox commented on the restrictive wording regarding planting within the curtilege of houses. Gerry Battye will submit the PC's response.

#### **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

Mary George commented that the playground looks busy.

The PC will write to thank the Bugg family for their extremely

generous donation of £500 towards the playground. Ian Harris will liaise with Debbie Hattrell on village seat maintenance specification.

The PC will obtain a quotation for hoggin and hard core to remedy potholes in Candy Lane.

#### DOG FOULING

A request for a dog mess bin at the start of the north-bound walk from the Burial Ground had been received. Bins on private ground are not emptied but the PC will ask Babergh's opinion.

The PC will purchase fluorescent spray to apply to dog mess on

footpaths and open spaces. This should prick the consciences of owners who leave their dog's mess to someone else to sort out. Babergh will prosecute where there is evidence against an owner. **HIGHWAYS** 

Potholes in High Street, Fen Street and Birch Street had been reported via SCC's online site and Mary George encouraged others to use the facility. The knocked-down 'Nayland churches' sign at the corner of Mill Street and Birch Street has been reported.

Pavements on the Heights and Harper's Estate are to be resurfaced in the 2015/16 budget with Cawley Road and Radley Road the following year.

A complaint has been received about the state of Park Road (from the A134 up to Boxted). Colchester Borough Council's online system should be used to report the problem.

Both BDC and SCC are claiming the other is responsible for clearing mud and gravel from parish roads. There appears to be no monitoring of the quality of hedge cutting or gravel clearing. Richard Cave advised that sending photos of inadequate work to the Council would be effective.

Two residents in Bear Street had written to Cllr Richard Cave requesting a one-way system, expressing concern about the safety of children. They suggested a car park at the top of the recreation ground for easy access to Nayland Primary school. James Finch responded, explaining that the safety of the children is paramount; there already is a 'drop and go' and one-way policy for school arrivals and departures; it would not be straightforward to make a car park as the road and land up to the Burial Ground is private; also,

SCC have deferred making a decision regarding speed limits on the A134 at Nayland. The Parish Council will continue to exert pressure. Chris Hunt had written to the PC reiterating the need for a speed limit on the A134 outside Nayland, citing fatalities and near collisions.

Mr Hunt also asked the PC to consider the removal of certain street signs in Nayland. Councillors also referred to the 30mph sign, the duck crossing and 20mph signs near the Anchor Bridge. They agreed to view the street signs themselves and continue the discussion.

#### STREET LIGHTING

SCC have missed the expected start date for the completion of the two year plan to update street lighting. Payments haven't been made as work is incomplete, artificially inflating the PC's available capital. Debbie will chase up SCC.

#### FOOTPATHS

Merles Bridge (Horkesley Lock) is not repaired and the PC has written to complain. There are no notices advising walkers of the problem from either side of the river. The PC is working with Great Horkesley PC.

Repairing the flood channel footbridge has been put back to next year.

#### ALLÓTMENTS

A letter had been written regarding parking in winter months. The annual allotment holders meeting will be on Wednesday 15 April.

#### VILLAGE HALL

Tricia Fuller reported that bookings are doing very well. The showers need refurbishing, the car park drain problems are being resolved and a wood-pellet replacement boiler is being considered. The VHMC is asking residents what they want to see provided at the hall.

#### ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

Simon Amstutz, Dedham Vale AONB Stour Valley Project, will be the speaker at the Parish Assembly on Monday 27 April in the village hall from 7.30pm

#### IN BRIEF

Mary George advised that nominations for the PC had to be submitted by hand by 28 April.

## NAYLAND LITTER VOLUNTEERS

Did you know that dog poo bags come in at least 8 colours? Did you also know that when they are left in the hedge or beside footpaths, instead of being put in the bins provided or taken home, they can take many years to disintegrate. Indeed sometimes the poo inside the bag disappears before the bag!

Nayland Litter Volunteers have got together through mutual concern at the irresponsible behaviour of some dog owners and others who drop litter in and around the village and leave dog poo bags on paths and in hedges.

For instance, over 100 dog poo bags were picked up round the allotment field by one volunteer in February. These had obviously accumulated over time but it is still a depressing thought that so many people just do not care about the countryside.

The culprits know who they are. Sadly some of them may not live in Nayland, but drive here to walk their dogs.

With Parish Council and Babergh District Council support, the Candy Lane ditch has been completely cleared of litter accumulated over the last couple of years. This was done by Chris & Mike Hunter and Peter Drew assisted by Roy and Sandra Norfolk and Andora Carver. Very grateful thanks to them and everyone else who is inspired to contribute to the improvement of our local environment.

The Parish Council's official litter picker has recently removed bits of car from Caley Green and a vacuum cleaner and window blinds from Wiston Road which is more like fly-tipping and therefore illegal. Regular clearance is done but it is impossible to keep this up on a day to day basis. That is where the volunteers come in and numbers are growing steadily.

So please "take a bag for litter" when you go for a walk. You would be surprised how quickly it fills up and how satisfying it is to help keep the countryside from turning into a litter bin with the resulting harm to wildlife and damage to the environment. It is also a great use of supermarket plastic bags!

#### **COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT**

AGM: 4th March 2015 Chairman: Neil Barbrook www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Neil Barbrook welcomed 31 members to the meeting.

My first year as Chairman seems to have gone very quickly and during that time we've organised some good traditional village events and been able to help some of the village organisations and societies with grants.

At the Community Council we're lucky to have a dedicated group of people who make things work, and I would like to thank all those who have helped during the year and especially Lorraine and Bryan who have been on hand to provide me with useful advice and who do so much for the CC.

As Alex Murrison said at a recent meeting, Nayland is very fortunate to have so many thriving societies and organisations and I believe having an umbrella group like the CC enhances the sense of community and provides mutual support.

This year we have organised most of our usual events. The Village Quiz in October. A big thanks to Rachel Hitchcock for organising this again. There were 22 teams enjoying the popular evening and it was also a good fundraiser. The Bonfire Night was a great village event with about 650 attending. We had a team of 26 helpers on the day so thanks to all of them, especially to Claire Buller and her team who ran the barbeque and drinks. The 300 sausages went before the end and thanks to Kerridges for supplying them. Fred Bugg and his team once again came up trumps with the bonfire as did Iain Wright and team with the fireworks but special thanks to Tony Boon and Tom Gardiner for a very well structured display. The Christmas Fayre was another good community event and the Christmas Tree with its new baubles was another success. Big thanks to Claire Buller and the team for arranging the tree and Nayland Dental Surgery for use of their electricity.

The community Times continues to be a must read for the parish with its bi-monthly update on Nayland and Wiston news. Once again a massive thank you to Lorraine for producing this award winning publication. A big thank you also to the Calendar Team who organised the community photographic competition and produced another successful Village Calendar.

We were pleased to provide grants this year to help several village organisations and societies. We would like to see a few more groups coming along to our meetings so we can support each other.

Finally, returning to Lorraine, Bryan and Jenny. Firstly Lorraine who we all know does so much for the village, not only as secretary of the CC, editor of the Community Times, producer of the Village Calendar, but also her role with the Horticultural Society and her help with websites and publicity for other groups. It is only fitting that this year she has won a Babergh Achievement Award. Thanks should go to Rachel Hitchcock for putting together the nomination with letters of support from others. Lorraine was presented with a bouquet of flowers.

On to Bryan and Jenny. Jenny is stepping down from the CC, which over the years has seen her as Chairperson twice. Although Bryan is stepping down as Treasurer we are delighted he will be continuing on the Executive. Apart from maintaining our accounts, Bryan has supported our events which needed a good deal of planning. I understand Bryan has held many other positions in the village including on the Parish Council and Village Hall Committee.

Ken Willingale thanked Bryan and Jenny for their commitment over the years to the CC and presented them with a garden centre voucher and wine. He reminisced about the formation of the Community Council and Village Hall Committee when he was made Treasurer and his first entry was the proceeds of a collection when a hat was passed round.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith gave highlights of the accounts. He reported a good year with income up for our main activities; Community Times, Bonfire Night, Quiz and Christmas Fayre. Income from

the Calendar was marginally down but still made a good profit. Expenses were slightly down so we can be content with our good house-keeping.

Grants, totalling £3,800, were made to Nayland Choir, Village Hall, Parish Council (Playground Project), Conservation Society, Luncheon Club for the over 60s and Woodland Corner. In addition it was agreed to write off the balance of a long-tern loan to the Parish Council which stood at £595. Despite these grants totalling £4,395 we still posted a profit of £137.68.

We thank Andrew Gowen for his due diligence in examining our accounts. Our annual returns were submitted to the Charity Commission on 19th January.

The position of our assets today is: Cash £31.79, Current A/c  $\pounds$ 5,54783, Deposit £15,421, totalling 21,001.06. This includes £794.67 that we hold for First Response and £355 held for the Services Fund. An outstanding grant of £500 is held for the Conservation Society. **Therefore, unencumbered assets stand at £19,351.39**

**Village Hall:** A grant request had been received for £1,000 towards their Endowment Fund for the long term future of the Hall. The grant was agreed.

**Table Tennis Group:** A grant request had been received for £250 for a new table tennis table. The grant was agreed. **COMMUNITY TIMES:** Lorraine Brooks thanked everyone who supports the CT; the proof readers, Colin and the distribution team, Pat Bray for village news, all those who contribute copy and the advertisers. She thanked Graham Griffiths for hosting the village website

**VILLAGE CALENDAR:** Lorraine Brooks thanked the calendar team and all who support the Calendar: sponsors, those entering their photographs or helping with calendar sales including our local shops.

Our horticultural year began on **17th** March with an interesting talk on **'An Incitement to Early Marriage: A Social History of the Allotment '**by Dr Twigs Way. An intriguing title to a fascinating and passionately conveyed talk. She began back in the 17th century with the 'Fight for the Right to Dig' campaigns and later the 'Enclosure Movement' which landowners were against. Employers were against allotments because they would tire their workforce and the church was

also against them; stringent rules were applied to prevent allotment holders misconduct, drunkenness, neglecting worship and claiming poor relief. However to prospective wives and fathers-in-law having an allotment was an advantage! The allotment was such a hot political topic that the 1887 election was known as the 'Allotment Election'. In later years, companies, such as Bournville provided gardens for employees; their thinking was it kept them out of the pub! During the wars productivity of crops was vital and everyone was encouraged to do their bit but following WW2 growing your own went out of fashion with the younger generations and governments sold off allotments as they were lucrative building land. The hippies in the 60s, the TV programme The Good Life and more recently an interest in organics, GM free and greater diversity and encouraging wildlife has led to a rise in growing your own.

The audience felt they learnt a great deal about the fight for the humble allotment and the political propaganda in its history !!

**AGM**: The current committee and officers of the Society were re-elected at our AGM on 9th March: Chairman: John Alexander, Vice chairman: Martin Wright, Hon. Treasurer: David Heigham, Hon. Secretary: Andora Carver. Committee members: Jennie Jenkins, Mike Hunter, Jill Slater and John Partridge. The accounts for both the Conservation Society and the Land Company were presented by the Hon. Treasurer, approved and signed.

The Chairman gave an update on recent events since the annual report for 2014 which included the issue of a further licence by English Heritage to **Survey Court Knoll**. This runs from mid-March to the end of June and should enable an extensive radar survey to be undertaken by Dr. Tim Dennis and volunteers.

We have been approached by a project group connected to the **American Air Museum in Britain** based at Duxford. They are seeking help with identifying over 15,000 photographs connected with American airmen stationed in Britain during WWII. These can be viewed via their website <u>www.americanairmuseum.com</u>

A Model of the west side of Nayland High Street was very generously presented to the Society by Christopher & James Warren at the AGM. They wish the residents of Nayland to be able to see and cherish it because it was specially commissioned by their late parents who owned Tandem shop in the 1970s and 80s. Christopher also ran Martha's Vineyard restaurant where the dental surgery is now located, so their village interest goes back a long way. #### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

lain Wright thanked the following for their contribution: John and Yvonne Spooner for the splendid job they do of caretaking and cleaning. Sara Strover for her help with the bookings and her success in obtaining new bookings. Chris Thompson and Nick Moriarty for their help with the cinema. Tony Price and Grahame Griffiths for their help with the website. Andrew Gowen for his auditing of the accounts and for his fund raising efforts with the plants stall. Gale Scott and Jo Murrison for organising the Village Lunches. The Parish Council, especially Rosemary Knox who also looks after fire matters. The Hall users for their help in maintaining the gardens and their support.

There are proposals for improved kitchen equipment which are being costed. Users of the Hall are invited to suggest any improvements in the facilities provided that they would like to see.

#### **TREASURER'S REPORT**

The result for 2014 shows a total income of £26,592 (£20,415 for 2013) and a total expenditure of £18,170 (£18,814 for 2013), giving a healthy surplus of £8422. This compares favourably with 2013, when the surplus was £1601.

The very substantial increase in income for 2014 is primarily due to the sterling efforts of the booking secretary in securing additional activity for the hall, allied with the increase in charges announced by the previous treasurer at the AGM last year.

Other sources of income such as Cinema, Plant Sales and the Village Lunch generated significant funds, and we are extremely grateful to all concerned for that. In addition we had

a £1000 grant from the Community Council and a £750 legacy, which were both very well received.

With regard to expenses, these were broadly in line with expectations, with the increase in the water rates and electricity being more than offset by the reduction in the consumption and price of oil. Maintenance of the hall in 2014 was £3364 (£5084 for 2013). Looking forward, we expect this cost to increase in 2015, as there are scheduled maintenance works that need to be done.

Total assets at the end of 2014 were £41,192. (£35,780 bank balances, £88 cash, £490 debtors and £4833 tangible assets). However, it is worth noting that the hall building and land are not included in these figures, as they are owned by the Parish Council, but managed on their behalf by the Nayland Village Hall Management Committee.

#### **ELECTION OF OFFICERS**

The committee were re-elected en-bloc with the exception of Maria Mason who is retiring: Chairman: Mr Iain Wright, Secretary Christine Thompson, Treasurer Peter Mann, Vice Chairman Mike Hunter, Bookings Secretary Sara Strover, Committee Rosemary Knox, Nick Moriarty AOB

An energy audit was carried out by Transition Nayland. Although the conclusions were that no actions could be carried out for the moment, there is the possibility of an alternative fuel boiler being installed when the present boiler needs replacing.

Chris Hunt asked about the insurance cover for hirers of the Hall. This issue is being investigated at the moment. When the insurance policy for the Hall is renewed, the VHMC will see if the hirers can be insured as well.

# Garden Notes

## by The Old Muckspreader

By the time this article appears Spring will really have arrived; as the American poet (was it Ogden Nash?) wrote "Spring is sprung, the grass is riz, I wonder where de boidies is"

The birds here are beginning to nest, and all sorts of plants are beginning to appear so are the garden catalogues, which seem to appear in great quantity through our letter box.

Many have 'half price' offers of packs of six of this and that. Many have fancy names but turn out to be old favourites. If you know your way about you can get good value if you buy plug plants and are prepared to grow them on, but better value may well be found from local garden centres or John Smith of Sudbury, often mentioned in these articles. And of course, there is then the 'post and packing' which often makes a small order totally uneconomic.

Back to proper gardening:-

Buddleias can be hard pruned now but leave a bit of the old growth to produce early flowers for butterflies. Don't hack into other shrubs now unless you really know what you're doing. You will merely be cutting away this year's flowers. Wait until flowering is over, and then you can get into shaping if required.

Hellebores are now in flower and here we have a large display of the old single white; go carefully with the new doubles, (see 'offers' above) many of which aren't up to much.

The OM/S is a great fan of the hardy Geraniums and they give a good show later on; some will flower again if given the Chelsea Chop in May. This can also be applied to the taller growing perennials, causing them to bush out and avoid becoming straggly. Contrary to some people's fears, it doesn't really delay the flowering season.

Now that most danger of frost is over you can sow hardy and half-hardy annuals, useful for filling gaps in the border. The old favourites like Cornflowers (preferably the proper blue ones) look stunning in a large clump. Sadly most seeds these days are sold as 'mixed', which often include some really disgusting colours.

As usual there should be a good selection of hardy and half-hardy annuals on sale at the Church Fete plant stall in May, which will have taken place before the next issue of the Community Times.

# EARLY MOTOR TRANSPORT IN NAYLAND

Walking round the car choked streets of Nayland today it is difficult for us to imagine what the village was like when the only traffic to be seen was horsedrawn.

I suspect that probably one of the earliest motor cars in this area belonged to the Vicar of Stokeby-Nayland, the Rev Horace Wilkinson. Barbara Riebold, who was born in Nayland in 1889 and attended the school in Church Lane during the 1890s, wrote in her autobiography: "When the Vicar of Stoke-by-Nayland passed through Nayland on a strange contraption known as a motor car all the school children lined the streets to watch." This must have been soon after the first ever journey in a petroleum motor carriage was made in this country in 1895.

In the 1890s The Hon Evelyn Ellis, who lived at Datchet near Windsor, was interested in the motor industry which was developing in France and Germany at that time and became a pioneer in promoting it in this country. In 1895 he bought a left-hand drive motor car from the Paris firm of Panhard-Levassour. On the journey home after the car's arrival in this country, travelling at speeds varying from 3 to 20 miles per hour, he passed many horse-drawn vehicles of all kinds. He completed this first ever journey of 56 miles in 5 hours 32 minutes at an average speed of 9.84 mph. On the way this new marvel was the object of a great deal of curiosity and whole villages turned out to watch. The motor carriage was described as a neat and compact four wheeled dog cart with accommodation for four persons and two portmanteaus. The consumption of petroleum was a little over a halfpenny per mile. In another report Mr Ellis was described as "careering round the roads, uphill and down dale without danger to life and limb, in his new motor carriage." A car like Mr Ellis's would have cost £200. It was a splendid hill climber and climbed faster than a pedestrian. "The sensation of being whirled rapidly along was decidedly pleasing.

By the end of 1895 it was estimated that there were just 14 to 15 cars on Britain's roads. By 1900 there was a dramatic increase to about 7 or 800, by 1930 there were a million and by 1967 there were 10 million.

One very early car in Nayland was owned by Dr Ernest Syrett. He was Nayland's GP from the 1890s and was the first doctor to live at the Old Vicarage in the High Street, the Rev John Durbin Gray and his family having moved up to the new Vicarage off Bear Street [now Nayland House]. The car was a 1904 De Dion-Bouton from France and the photograph caption was "Father in his first car (Dr Syrett)". This new form of transport must have made his work much easier and it is possible that this could have been the first car in Nayland. Dr Slade took over as GP from Dr Syrett in 1911 and moved into the Old Vicarage. He was the owner of a Standard 2 seater car.

Gradually more motor vehicles were appearing on the roads and in 1910 the Parish Council sent a resolution to the Rural District Council saying that "considering the large numbers of motors and vehicles that pass through Nayland it is the opinion of the Council that the streets should be tarred in order to mitigate the evils of the dust in summer and the mud in winter." It was not until after the First World War, however, that this happened.

Captain Bernard Walsh and is wife moved into Stourbank [Bear House] after their marriage in 1912. Over the years they owned many different cars including the Daimler pictured. This was a Daimler Landaulette, probably 1922 but it could possibly have been pre First World War. There wasn't much development in the domestic car industry around that time as everything was geared to the war effort. Daimler enjoyed the patronage of the Royal Family at this time and to have seen this car chauffeur driven around the narrow streets of Nayland must have been an impressive sight. Another car owned by the Walshes was a 1933 Alvis Firefly. Mrs Walsh was very attached to her Alvis Silver Crest which she bought in 1938 and which was sold after she died in 1973. This car is still in existence and is owned by an enthusiast in Sussex.

During the 1920s Beaumont's shop in Birch Street [now Forgetme-not] was the first place in Nayland to sell petrol. At this time it was sold in cans which motorists strapped to their cars. Later on Norfolks' bus yard in Mill Street and Fred Biggs's shop on the corner of High Street and Fen Street had petrol pumps. As well as selling petrol Fred Biggs ran a garage and engineering business in Fen Street. He sold and repaired cars, as well as cycles which he also hired out for 2d a day.

There were still only a few cars in those days. Muriel Norfolk remembered her father, Sid Butler, had an open topped car and in the summer when the shop was shut the family drove off to the seaside. Down the road Walter Webb, the High Street butcher, drove a deep wine open topped Maxwell in the 1920s and Stan Clover had an Essex car.

Norfolks' first motor bus drove from Nayland to Colchester in 1915. The old nineteenth century horsedrawn fire engine was replaced by a steam engine in 1926 but this was still drawn by Norfolks' horses or later by one of their lorries until finally in 1935 a motor engine was purchased.

Although the number of motor vehicles increased in the 1920s there were some local tradesmen still using horse-drawn vans after the Second World War. One of these was Stan Hatten of Hattens Shop [the Village Stores]. Stan had a big open cart and then later a covered in van which he drove round all the local villages every day selling paraffin and hardware. He never wanted to own a motor van, he much preferred his horse and cart.

# FOOTPATH STILE REPLACEMENT PROJECT

We decided to see if it would be possible to replace some of the stiles on Footpath FP4 with gates. This is the path heading north from Fairfield, off Bear Street, and there were five stiles within a relatively short distance and some people were finding difficulty in getting over these stiles, particularly those with large dogs, but they were also quite a physical challenge for many people. This was preventing many people from using this walk which was a shame as there are great views over the Stour Valley.

After meeting on site with Suffolk County Council Rights Of Way team, we looked at five stiles and considered the various types of gates that are available and discovered there may be some funding available, through the Stour Valley Project, part of the Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

We made contact with the Stour Valley Project who appeared to think we had a good chance of attracting funding for 50% of the cost. So the funding application was put together highlighting the fact that if we provided gates instead of stiles this would enable a lot more people to enjoy this walk, both Nayland residents and visitors.

We were delighted when the funding came through and we were further encouraged when one of the landowners offered his contactors to fix two of the gates.

The type of gates were finally agreed in consultation with the landowners, with three quite large kissing gates and two self closing pedestrian gates, and the decision was made to go ahead and organise it.

The gates were ordered and duly arrived. The labour was provided by a contractor for two of the gates, The Stour Valley Project Volunteer Group who fixed two, and a Nayland volunteer team of Tony Mann, Tim Allen and myself for the last one, so a big vote of thanks to everyone involved.

If you haven't already done so give it a look and enjoy walking this northern route.

## **Feedback from James Finch - Your Stour Valley County Councillor**

#### SCC FREEZES COUNCIL TAX

SCC's share of council tax is to be frozen for a fifth year in a row. This means that Suffolk residents will not pay any more than they did in 2010/11. The council has successfully delivered savings in excess of £130m over the last four years. However, with the government's deficit reduction programme set to continue until at least 2018/19, there is a forecast of a further £120m budget shortfall that will need to be addressed over the next three years. The Council tax freeze was agreed as part of the budget proposals for 2015/16, which include savings of £38.2million. The bulk of these savings (£24.6m) will be delivered through wide-ranging transformation programmes which will result in the council becoming a leaner and more focused organisation. The remaining savings will be made by reducing previous contingency budgets, set aside for major projects and change management as well as making other budgetary savings from within service areas. Meanwhile, over the last five years, there has been a reduction of around 47% in workforce numbers across council services. THE LEADING LIVES BENEFIT FUND

Applications are currently being encouraged for the Leading Lives Community Benefit Fund for 2015. Leading Lives provides support for a wide range of people. This year, they are awarding grants of between £1,000 and £5,000 to Suffolk-based charities and community groups who support people with learning disabilities, older people with dementia, people with autism, young people in transition and family carers. This year's fund has been doubled in value to £30,000 to enable larger grants to be awarded and more projects to be supported. The fund has been set up to further Leading Lives overall vision to enable vulnerable people to lead the life they choose. The fund will support projects that allow vulnerable people to live more independently, to gain new skills, to

stay safe and to participate in the life of their communities. Criteria for funding and an application can be found on our website www.leadinglives.org.uk. Please share this information with organisations and individuals who you believe may be interested. **CHANGES TO CHILDREN'S CENTRES GET GREEN LIGHT** 

Children's centre services in nine areas across Suffolk will be made more accessible for those most in need. A review of children's centres in Suffolk, including a wide-ranging public consultation, was concluded earlier this year. It recommended that services in nine children's centres be moved from their existing locations to different settings, either using other local community facilities or neighbouring children's centres. There would also be additional outreach work included. The decision, which was confirmed at the last meeting of SCC's cabinet on 24<sup>th</sup> February 2015, will save up to £265,000, thus putting the services on a more sustainable footing.

#### SCC SERVICE FOR CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

The Suffolk County Inclusive Resource has won a national award in recognition of its approach in supporting children and young people with autism within mainstream schools in the county.

The role of the County Inclusive Resource is to support children with autism attending mainstream schools in Suffolk, ensuring they are taught in an inclusive environment which helps them to reach their full potential. #### 'Don't make burglary child's play for criminals'

is the message of a new film that aims to get residents to think about the security of their homes. The film, that is being launched by police in Suffolk and Norfolk gives a unique take on an age old problem to warn residents in both counties of how easy it is for opportunist offenders to take advantage.

The video focuses on a generic house in a regular street with its windows open, doors unlocked, keys available, property easily accessible and not security marked. It then shows a 'burglar' taking the opportunity to steal items of value. However the fact that the burglar is a child underlines how easy it can be for offenders and how simple it is to put some steps in place to avoid being a burglary victim.

Detective Chief Inspector Bernie Morgan, of Suffolk Police, said; "Each week a good percentage of the burglaries reported to us are incidents where entry has been gained via an unlocked door or window, but equally there are also break-ins and there are a number of simple steps you can take to protect your home."

Police advise reviewing your home security by looking at it through a burglar's eyes. Are there places you could gain entry without being seen? How easy would it be to get in? How quickly would you find items of value?

There are some very basic – and inexpensive – steps you can take to make it much harder for criminals.

•Keep doors locked and windows secured at all times - even if you are home. Some offenders just walk into homes.

•If you're out during the hours of darkness take steps to make your home appear occupied. If you're out for the evening leave a light or two on. If it's for longer get a timer to switch a light on automatically at dusk - for about £5 you'll take another step towards making your home less likely to be targeted.



- •If you are going away ask a trusted relative, friend or neighbour to make regular checks - collecting mail, turning lights on and opening curtains.
- •Don't leave keys in locks. This can make a burglars job easier for example if a burglar can break a window or a pane of glass in the door and then use the key to unlock the whole door or window.
- •Don't store pieces of valuable jewellery or sentimental items in easy-to-find places such as a jewellery box on a dressing table or lying inside a drawer as these are the first places a burglar will look.
- •Get valuable items security marked and keep detailed records of them - take photographs of jewellery and list make, model and serial number for electrical items. Register them for free at <u>www.immoblise.com</u>
- •Use exterior lighting. Good outdoor lighting can put off a burglar. The most appropriate is high-efficiency low energy lighting on a dusk to dawn switch.
- •Maintain door and window frames to ensure they are strong and secure - and prevent intruders at the back and sides of your home by using strong, high, fencing with trellis or Prikkastrip on top. Secure gates with a mortice lock or padlock bolts. A thorny hedge can be good but make sure passersby can still see the front of your home so that a burglar can't work without being seen.
- •Garages and sheds often contain tools or ladders which can be used for breaking-in. Make sure these are secure too and consider installing a shed alarm (available for around £10 from many Suffolk Police stations or retailers).
- •There are Home Office recommended door and window locks and a whole host of measures including burglar alarms, etc that can be used. Your local Safer Neighbourhood Team or crime reduction officer can tell you more by dialing **101**.
- •If you see or hear anything suspicious please do call 999 .
- •If you hear breaking glass, loud bangs or see someone hanging around or climbing over fences please call police.
