#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 10th December 2014

#### **DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT**

A more joined up approach to the delivery of services is expected to flow from the appointment of a joint chief executive, a single management team and a single workforce for Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Councils.

Richard Cave also reported that eligible local community projects needing additional funding may apply to the relevant District Council.

#### **COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT**

James Finch reported that Leavenheath residents in the vicinity of the Hare and Hounds public house are the first Stour Valley Division residents to access the new superfast Broadband connection. Nayland is forecast to be connected during the first quarter of 2015. A Broadband box is already in place in Bear Street.

#### FINANCE REPORT

Allocated cash at bank was reported as £51,497.96. Expenditure and financial management proposals were approved for 2015-2016. The precept would not be increased.

#### **PLANNING**

Reviewing planning applications Mary George said Babergh had granted permission at *Old Stables, Bear Street* for erection of a single-storey rear extension with conditions relating to materials used and at *13 Harpers Estate* for erection of a side extension and porch, loft conversion and rear conservatory.

Councillors had no objections to applications at *Travis Perkins site, Nags Corner* for advertisement consent: erection of four flat logo signs subject to any AONB guidelines or at *Wissington Grove Farm, Bures Road* for erection of a single-storey extension but recommended use of matching wooden frames was attached to any permission granted. They had no objections to an application at *Townlands Farm, Harpers Hill* for erection of an agricultural building provided it is designated for agricultural use only and used in conjunction with the holding property.

#### **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

Quotes were approved for the installation of wooden and removable metal bollards to prevent unauthorised parking on Fairfield recreation ground; for surfacing the muddy area near the entrance; for the replacement of a litter bin; for the strimming and clearing of hedges; and for the removal of old signage. Replacement signage was discussed. A business sponsor may contribute to costs. Discussions with Diocese re poor state of vicarage driveway through Fairfield are ongoing.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

In the continuing absence of a detailed response from County Council to previous Parish Council requests for clarification on specific Highways issues, PC Chair Mary George has compiled a

comprehensive list of issues for which a County Council response is needed. It will be shared with key individuals at County Council level. County Councillor James Finch affirmed his continuing support for this initiative.

#### STREET LIGHTING

The owner of 18 Court Street has been asked to obtain quotes for the repair of a defective street light fitting attached to this property. Work to implement the next phase of the street lighting upgrade project will commence in January 2015.

#### **FOOTPATHS**

Defective signage on footpaths by Wiston Hall were reported. The landowners will be notified. Action to remedy reported defects in the footbridge over the River Stour by the Anchor public house (missing anti-slip treads) has not yet been taken; this will be followed up.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

A broken latch and loose post on the gate in the fence into to allotment field was reported and will be remedied. Vehicular access to the allotments will be improved by the removal of roots and vegetation.

#### VILLAGE HALL

The felling of diseased chestnut trees in this area will go ahead. It was agreed that quotes should be sought for the implementation of a more permanent solution to the ongoing surface water drainage problems.

#### **BURIAL GROUND**

A quote for routine maintenance and an application for a memorial were approved.

#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 15th January 2015

The Parish Council Chair, Mary George, opened the meeting referring to members of the public having the right to film the public parts of meetings. No one present wished to do so.

#### **PUBLIC FORUM**

There was a request from members of the public that the Council ask Suffolk CC to paint double yellow lines on Horkesley Road across the Anchor Bridge. They strongly expressed their view that there is a serious road safety problem with the current parking arrangements and 20 and 30mph signs in close proximity. Mary George explained that the PC had discussed the issue with Suffolk CC who did not think it was needed; that no consultation had taken place and no planning application submitted for alternative parking. It was agreed to add the request for double yellow lines at a meeting arranged for the end of February with Suffolk CC.

#### **POLICE REPORT**

Three crimes were reported in December: jewellery stolen from a house and keys stolen in Bear Street. A car's wing mirror was damaged in Mill Street.

#### **DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT**

Richard Cave advised that Babergh DC is looking at all its services to ensure they are more effective and to generate income via six projects: the single planning policy framework; community infrastructure levy; supporting skills; tourism (including heritage); environment; housing and communities. The Council's funding from the Regional Support Grant expires by 2019.

#### COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

James Finch reported that Suffolk County Council's Education Services and the Police are in ongoing operations to detect truancy from school. Suffolk Highways has invested in new gritters and upgraded older machines ready to keep the county moving in freezing weather.

The Warm Homes, Healthy People scheme helps families and vulnerable people to stay warm in winter. To check your eligibility, ring 0845037 686. GPs and other professionals can refer to.

Most of Nayland is due to go live with high speed broadband by March 2015. Residents and businesses should contact their provider and change their contract to enjoy the faster speed.

Reviewing recent planning applications Mary George said consent had been granted by Babergh at Wissington Grove Farm for a single storey extension, at Townlands Farm for a new agricultural building and at Travis Perkins for a commercial building and four flat logo signs with conditions that they do not impair the visual amenity of the site and do not endanger users of the highway. The PC has requested details of the building's illumination, position and height.

Discussing new applications councillors had no objections to an application at 12 Stoke Road for a rear extension but requested that the colour of the extension is sympathetic to its surroundings; at Grove House, Bures Road for a single storey side/ front extension, a games and utility room, a two-bay cart-lodge, two dormer windows and an oil tank room and at 2a Birch Street for Internal alterations to include a shower room and stair lift.

Councillors has no objections in principle to an application at 1 Birch Street for a single storey bathroom extension with a 30 degree roof angle for peg tiles but Ian Harris raised concerns about the suitability of the roof angle for peg tiles and the council asked that this is addressed before approval.

With three abstentions and one vote against, Councillors opposed an application from Little Firmins, Cawley Road for the removal of an agricultural restriction on a dwelling for rent. Concerns were that the applicant had not advertised the agricultural restriction widely enough; the land could change in ownership and in use and it would set a precedent in a rural area.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

The missing bollards in Birch Street were replaced in December but the work was not completed. The PC has chased this up.

Winter grit has not arrived at Gravel Hill and elsewhere.

James Finch has called a Parish Councils' Highways meeting for the end of February with Paul Gant, Engineer in the Highways department.

#### **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

Tom Gardiner reported that the installers of the new playground equipment were investigating the safety of one of the A-frame

Councillors agreed to insure the new equipment. Strimming is complete, bins have been ordered, matting tiles (to combat mud) plus bollards to prevent parking are installed. Councillors plan to install a graphics-based sign to publicise conditions of use.

The PC and the Diocese are considering a sign at the entrance to the drive regarding access and parking. The drive is a private road and liaison is ongoing between the PC and the Diocese regarding maintenance.

#### STREET LIGHTING

The first two-year phase of work of the five-year plan is on course to be completed. Councillors agreed to submit an order now for the next year's work.

#### **FOOTPATHS**

The PC and Sally Bartram (Footpath Warden) are campaigning for the missing tread on Merles Bridge (at Horkesley Lock) to be fixed.

Funding is available towards the cost of installing kissing gates to the footpath north of Bear Street but Suffolk CC is in discussion with a landowner regarding one stile.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

Almost all the allotment rental fees have been received. VILLAGE HALL

One quotation for clearing the drains in the village hall car park has been obtained by the VHMC and another is being arranged.

#### **COMMUNITY COUNCIL**

Rosemary Knox said that grants had been made for a computer at Woodland Corner and a machine to wind up mats at the Bowling Club. The Community Council invites applications for grants as supporting village societies is one of its functions.

#### **RAIL CONSULTATION**

Suffolk CC has alerted Parish Councils to respond to a consultation by the new East Anglia Rail Franchise. The consultation includes a proposal to reduce the two-hourly train service running from Ipswich to Peterborough.

Both SCC and Suffolk Chamber of Commerce are strongly opposed to this and are in fact lobbying for an increase to an hourly service (regarded as critical) with infrastructure improvements at Ely. PC members were in support of the Council's view, pointing out that the route is used by students and the public and that access through Bury St Edmunds would be seriously affected by the proposed changes. The Clerk to the PC will write in support of Suffolk CC.

#### ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

The date will be Monday 27 April in the village hall and the format will be discussed at the February meeting.

#### CAROL SERVICE

Villagers of all ages packed St James's Church for the annual festival of nine lessons and carols on December

It had been agreed a record of assets would be useful to ensure the future committee knew what was available and where it was kept. We are already aware of display boards/Bryan, Father Christmas costume/School, Christmas bunting and tree decorations/Claire, film projector/Andrew and items in the VH outside store. Please let Lorraine know of other items.

It was necessary to replace Father Christmas' beard. Claire will collect and arrange safe storage of the costume.

Village Christmas Tree: Claire and her team were thanked for organising a fantastic tree, it had received many compliments. The Dental Surgery have been thanked for kindly supplying the electricity

**Correspondence:** A complaint had been received about parking by the Anchor in Court Street and on the bridge. It was suggested to the sender that they contact the Parish Council or Babergh.

#### **Grants & Donations:**

**Choir:** A thank you letter has been received for the £500 grant to assist them during their 20th anniversary year activities.

**Village Stiles:** Neil Barbrook reported that although the funding application to replace stiles with gates on the footpath northwards from Bear Street had been successful (for 50% of the cost) there are ongoing discussions to try and find a mutually acceptable solution to all parties.

**Luncheon Club for the Over 60s:** A thank you letter has been received from Olga Alexander for the £300 grant to support their Christmas Lunch.

**Woodland Corner:** A thank you letter has been received for the £500 grant towards the cost of a new computer system.

**Bowls Group:** An application has been received for a device that rolls the carpet onto a storage frame. The cost will be reduced by fitting it to their existing frame. It will fit in the hall storage cupboard. It was agreed to award a grant of £350.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

Bryan Smith gave his year end report as follows:

Total expenditure £11,538.76 (£13,000.33 in 2013), total income £11,409.55 (£10,727.00 in 2013), profit on the year was £129.21. Grants totalled £3,800 (£1791.99 in 2013).

#### Unencumbered assets are £19,428.

**COMMUNITY TIMES:** A volunteer is needed to share the task of attending Parish Council meetings and writing a report on the discussions for the CT. Bryan Smith kindly agreed to proof read this issue.

**VILLAGE CALENDAR:** Lorraine Brooks said there are a few calendars left, available at village shops.

The calendar team, now joined by Colin Ramsell, are willing to continue and the expenditure and print costs would remain the same for a 2016 calendar. It was agreed to go ahead.

#### **RECENT EVENTS**

Fred Bugg will clear the bonfire site when ground conditions permit.

Christmas Fayre - Sunday 7th December: The raffle did very well; those donating prizes have been thanked. The CC is grateful to Andrew and Sue Gowen for donating profits from the mulled wine. Father Christmas hadn't been as busy this year but it was agreed it was vital he attended! Claire suggested perhaps having refreshments and cakes in the bar area.

There had been mixed response on the success of the Fayre, mainly concerning the mix of stalls and performances. Not all stall holders were happy as sales could not be made during performances. It was also felt an MC is needed to announce performances, drawing of raffles and general information.

#### NAYLAND POST OFFICE

Unfortunately there has been no progress in finding a solution to concerns about the future of Nayland Post Office.

The Regional Manager informed the Parish Council on 22nd January that Post Office Ltd. 'currently have no interested parties who wish to take on the responsibility of running the post office at Nayland'.

Full details are not available about the possible provision of a mobile outreach service that could visit Naylanda couple of times a week in the event of closure of the existing post office. This will be considered if the current arrangements come to an end at a future date without another business taking over from Patsy Ford. As reported in the previous issue of the Community Times, the option of Community Use status for Nayland Post Office does not apply as this village does not meet the criteria for change of status.

If anyone has any new ideas that could be discussed with Post Office Ltd please contact the Parish Council.

We much enjoyed celebrating our 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary year in 2014 and there were numerous opportunities to extend our work in the community. These included the opening of a new footpath link to Stoke in April, with thanks to the Tendring Hall Estate. We are also very grateful to the Dedham Vale AONB & Stour Valley Project Sustainable Development Fund who co-funded the project with the Conservation Society. The recording of Nayland Reminiscences at the Anniversary Party in June was very successful as was the Test Pit Dig in September (again part funded by the Dedham Vale Project SDF) and the start of a new Geophysical Survey of Court Knoll in November/December.

The initiative for this survey came from the Conservation Society as a result of early medieval finds nearby during the Test Pit Dig. Very grateful thanks are due to Dr. Tim Dennis who volunteered to do the work and a hardy team of volunteers from Nayland and local archaeological groups. Tendring Hall Estate kindly gave their permission and a Licence from English Heritage was obtained. We hope to continue this project in the summer when conditions will be more suitable for a ground penetrating radar survey. The main feature so far identified is an inner ditch across the north east corner of Court Knoll linking in with the existing moat/ditch. This could have been where the principle buildings were located. Further information and reports will be on our website.

Our programme of speakers for 2015 is on the Society's noticeboard and the website.



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## Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

In 1976 the OM/S and his family moved into their present house. His mother-in-law, bless her, said she wished to give them a tree to mark the event, he chose what was then and still is his favourite, Prunus x Subhirtella Autumnalis, the Autumn Flowering Cherry; despite its name it flowers in early winter with no foliage and then again in spring. At the time of writing it is giving a fine display, though the forecast frosts will probably put a stop to that, there should, however, be a further flush in spring.

A tree is an excellent remembrance of persons and events, though sadly few of us live in the same house as our forbears, so the connection will probably only last for one generation.

The Victorians and Edwardians were great planters of trees, though they didn't always consider what would happen to them in years to come. Many houses had a Monkey Puzzle – strictly a Chilean Pine or Araucaria – planted in a small front garden, thereby cutting off a great deal of light from the front rooms of ground and upper floors; there are several examples of this along Stanway Road, out of Colchester. Since they are very slow growing the original planters probably didn't suffer the consequences of their errors; one planted here, a long way from the house, has only grown about 5 feet in 20 years.

On New Year's Day we still had Fuchsias in flower near the house, and at the same time the first Aconites had just appeared. Since then we have had one stiff frost, and normality has mostly returned. Talking of frost, it has its uses. If you have a bit of unoccupied vegetable garden, and a bit of heavy clay anywhere, if it is turned over now frosts will break it down, and make it far easier to work when spring comes. The OM/S was brought up in East Sussex, where the heavy Wealden clay reacted well to this treatment.

Now is a good time to get garden machinery serviced, or alternatively save money and do it yourself; probably all that is needed – for petrol engine mowers is a change of oil, a new spark plug and a general clean up and lubrication of the working parts. Tools should be given a thin coating of oil to prevent them from rusting, before being put away.

Seed and plant catalogues are of course a great temptation. Beware some of the advertisements in newspapers which dress up ordinary plants with fancy names in order to charge fancy prices.

#### MEMORIES OF MARY TAYLOR NEÉ WEBB (1931-1999)

Mary was born at 'Newlands' in Newlands Lane, Nayland. Her grandparents, Walter and Annie Webb, came to Nayland in 1899 and established the butchers, W Webb & Sons in Birch Street. The shop moved to the High Street in 1903 and Walter opened other butcher's shops in Stoke-by -Nayland and Boxford. One of his three sons also opened a shop in Needham Market.

After the deaths of her grandparents, Mary, her sister Janet and parents Frank and Amy, moved into the house behind the High Street shop. Frank Webb ran the shop until it closed on his retirement in 1974. Mary had left Nayland in 1963 on her marriage but in the 1980s she wrote down some memories of the shop and her early life.

"The house was quite large; ivy covered the front wall drooping over the shop windows creating lots of shade. Inside the ceilings were very high which made it a cold house. The shop had a small office in it and on the ground floor there were also several living rooms. Upstairs an annexe led off from one of the four bedrooms to a much older part where there was a passage and a maid's room. There was also a loft and another set of stairs that led into an old washhouse complete with a stone copper. Underneath the house was a large cellar where meat used to be salted. Hams and bacon were pickled and cured in large slate troughs.

Outside there was a small garden, a yard, garage, stables, pigsties, cowsheds, lofts to store hay and straw and a slaughter-house. I remember when my sister and I were children how we used to watch the animals being taken into the slaughterhouse and how we would put our hands over our ears so that we didn't



hear the shots. Pigs were the worst, they always squealed a lot. Although this sounds horrible, at the time I don't think we were particularly worried.

Nayland was a lot smaller then but it was self-sufficient. Most of the tradesmen were born in the village, as was my father, and their children all went to school with me. We had a baker, Mr Roberts, living opposite who also ran a dairy. I remember taking a jug over the road to get a pint of milk that was often warm and straight from the cow. The bread and cakes were delicious and my friends and I would often buy a loaf of bread, warm straight from the oven, break it up and eat it.

There were two more bakers in the village, one more butcher, three grocers

with drapery counters, one general store cum newsagent, six pubs and a hardware shop. For things that could not be obtained in the village there was a frequent bus service into Colchester, Sudbury and Bury St Edmunds on market days, run by another old village company, Norfolk & Sons.

I remember my father delivering meat with a horse and cart, as did the baker over the road. We had four horses in the stables and as children we used to ride them. There was also a motor van. When I was old enough I sometimes drove the horse drawn delivery cart and the last time I saw one of our carts was at The East Anglian Museum of Rural Life at Stowmarket.

My father had some fields on which he grew grass for hay. We used a horse rake and then put the hay into cocks by hand. A horse and cart was used to gather up the dried hay and take it to be built into a stack. The thatcher, Mr Osborne, would then come to thatch it to make it weatherproof. Haymaking or "hayseling" used to be quite a part of village life. I remember

## VILLAGE PLAYERS: Jack and the Beanstalk

This December, Nayland saw a podcast of a different kind in the form of the Player's Pantomime performance of 'Jack and the Beanstalk', which delighted all ages with its superb stagecraft and traditional madcap antics. From the deft footwork of Clarabelle, the cow (Jenny Napper and Mandy Hall), to the committed performance of Jim Bond as Dame Trott, the audience were not disappointed. Director Nick Moriarty has a soft spot for this particular story: "for me it was my first visit to a theatre at the age of seven and therefore epitomised the genre".

Clever stagecraft meant the giant (ably brought to life in Act One by the disembodied voice of Chris Hunt and sound effects to thrill and terrify the smallest child) lost none of his presence when he finally appeared in Act Two as an impressive 10ft-high static puppet. Enter the villain, Fleshcreep, stage left-traditionally the entrance to Hell -and the boos and shrieks of small children became manifestly louder. Convinced he was to become giant fodder, my five-year-old took refuge behind his younger sister but later emerged still grimacing to catch more of John McCarroll's accomplished performance. Fairy Evergreen (Mary Moriarty) was the perfect foil to his malevolence. Morgan Moriarty's assured performance as Simple Simon belied his young age and led the chorus of children and animals who were energetic, endearing and humorous.



my mother taking tea or beer and sandwiches to the workers. I also liked to ride in the carts. I think I was growing up at the turn of the tide when horses were being phased out.

We did not keep animals just for slaughter. My father had two fields on which he kept cows, horses, sheep and goats. When I went to the Convent School in Colchester my best friend was Pat Whiting. We were both keen on animals and each of us kept dogs, cats, mice, guinea pigs, goats and sheep. We kept our goats and sheep on my father's fields. Our goats we obtained from an old dealer man next door who bought them at Colchester Market when they were only two weeks old. Our lambs we got from a local shepherd. Both goats and lambs had to be fed from a bottle.

When I was very young we had oil lamps but soon the village had its own generator at the water mill in the High Street and the whole village was all lit up. Not for long as with World War II came the blackout, no streetlights and all the windows had to be blacked out. I remember my father made shutters for the windows to block out the lights. It was not long before sweets went on the ration and shops used to keep them behind the counter, only selling to friends. Our Post Office cum shop used to keep some for us when they came in, usually about once a month. Ration Books came next but we always seemed to have enough to eat. We kept chickens so we never had to eat dried egg. Our ration of sugar was very small so my sister and I used to go without sugar in our tea and made sweets with it. A friend at the Convent School was able to get plenty of sugar but she wanted a cockerel of which we had plenty. So we decided on an exchange. I took the cockerel in a basket to school and put it in the cloakrooms. During the day it started to crow much to the amusement of all the girls but our teachers were not too pleased. Clothes and shoes were in short supply and rationed. When the word went round that Bata's were having sandals in off we went to gueue for them.

I was a wartime child but living in the country things were not as bad. I remember at school in Colchester going down to the air raid shelters when the siren went but one day we only had time to get under our desks when there was an incendiary

Comedy was supplied artfully by Lucy Bartlett as the gormless Welsh WPC, who somehow managed to make bloomers look like covetable ready-to-wear whilst dishing out some proper slapstick. Muppet Show-esque chickens paraded to the sound of the chorus and band led by Musical Directors Emma Bishton and Mandy Cook, with musical numbers written and scored for the show and intrinsic to its script, which was all written in verse.

Since panto traces its origins back to medieval plays involving the entire village, it is a fitting tribute to Nayland's vibrancy that such an ambitious production can be conceived of, staged, and enjoyed at sold-out performances. Congratulations to all the Players, production team and crew for keeping the tradition alive.

The next production will take another great British pantomime – the General Election – as its theme. 'Dead Ringer' will run from 16<sup>th</sup>-18<sup>th</sup> April 2015 and will be directed by Mike Poole.





attack on St Botolph's Station nearby. At home we had moved our beds downstairs for safety and our air raid shelter was a cupboard under the stairs. I don't think this worried us too much. I remember two girls [evacuees] came to stay with us. My sister and I were quite horrid to them and luckily for them they were moved on within the month.

After the war things carried on as usual for a while but towards the end of the 1950s things slowly started to change. The first casualties were two of the pubs. Then, due to age and the next generation not wishing to take over, plus increased competition, the little village stores gradually closed and by the early 1960s they were nearly all gone. Bread and milk were now brought into the village and a lot of the old shops became antique shops. Haymaking was no longer a part of village life. One of my father's fields was compulsorily purchased and is now the site of the Village Hall and Playing Field."

Sadly Mary died in 1999 and I would like to thank her family for sharing her memories with us. There are still people here who remember Mary and Webbs the butchers, who were an important part of Nayland's history during the twentieth century.

RECIPIENT FOR NAYLAND: LORRAINE BROOKS

Lorraine's contribution to the Parish of Nayland with Wissington is invaluable. She has lived in Nayland for many years and in that time has become an indispensable member of our community. NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Through the Community Council, of which she is Secretary, Lorraine supports the work of the many clubs and societies that make Nayland with Wissington such a vibrant community. She tirelessly organises and minutes the meetings of the Community Council which brings together all the different societies to fundraise and organise important village social events such as the annual Bonfire Night Firework Display and Christmas Family Fayre as well as community events such as the Jubilee celebrations. Without Lorraine's organisational skills on the Executive Committee and her attention to detail and planning these events would be much harder to put together and the significant funds raised by the Community Council, used in part to provide grants to support the work of community organisations, would be much harder to achieve

#### **NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES**

As Editor of the Community Times, a role she has held for the past ten years, Lorraine produces a bi-monthly newsletter which comprises 44 pages of 'all anyone needs to know' about what is happening in our community. It has a circulation of over 700 and is distributed free to the door of every home in the Nayland with Wissington Parish as well as being available at Nayland Post Office, village stores, pub, shops and the doctors surgery and a copy being provided to each child at Nayland Primary School. Regular reports from Parish Council meetings and the Community Council; the village diary and publicity for village events; society reports; historical articles; practical advice and bus timetables; church news and services; advertising from local businesses and all of the key contact details for the village - Lorraine co-ordinates it all, sets it out and basically does all the production until it goes to print (indeed Lorraine was the first editor to digitise production when she took over in 2004). She does all this virtually single handedly and with good humour, ensuring that all necessary information is included which often involves prompting and cajoling the various societies to meet the publication deadline! The Community Times won runner up in the Suffolk Association of Local Council's Newsletter of the Year Award 2013, a credit to Lorraine's hard work. In addition to her work as editor, Lorraine will always go the extra mile. Reports of Parish Council meetings are an important part of the newsletter and when the usual correspondent retired Lorraine filled the gap, attending every meeting for some considerable time and reporting for the Community Times and also sending reports to the press.

#### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON VILLAGE CALENDAR

As part of her work with the Community Council, Lorraine leads the team that has produced the village calendar for the past six years. It is very much a community project involving a photographic competition in which everyone has the opportunity to participate and every year has raised several hundred pounds for good causes in the village. Planning, co-ordinating the competition, and then producing the calendar and selling it takes a great deal of time and organisation but Lorraine contributes this willingly and the result is a project that both involves and benefits the community and builds a sense of pride in where we live.

#### **COMMUNITY WEBSITES**

Lorraine has a better grip on technology than many of the members of our local societies and has put her graphic design skills to good use by developing websites for a number of the village organisations. The Community Council, the Horticultural Society and the Conservation Society have all benefited from her skills and the products of her efforts can be seen if you follow the links below. In developing these sites Lorraine has voluntarily committed a lot of her own time to ensuring that village societies are able to communicate with the wider community and also provide an important historical document of their activities and achievements.

#### CONSERVATION SOCIETY, PHOTOGRAPHIC ARCHIVE

This commitment to retaining a historical record of our community is demonstrated by the months of voluntary work that Lorraine put in, recording and archiving a huge library of historical photos and documents of our Parish. This laborious and detailed task has produced an amazing resource of photographs of the village through the ages that is now available to everybody - local residents and those with links to the village around the world - through the Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society website.

#### NAYLAND AND DISTRICT HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Not content with all of the achievements and commitments listed above, Lorraine is also Secretary of the Nayland and District Horticultural Society, a role which she has embraced wholeheartedly as she does all of her projects. Lorraine doesn't just join societies - she looks at what she can do to improve and develop them and how she can widen their appeal. As well as developing the website for the Horticultural Society, Lorraine has compiled an archive history of the organisation which is available on the site, organises interesting speakers and trips and takes a lead in organising the annual Village Flower Show which is a significant and popular event on the village calendar.

In summary, Lorraine is a hub of our community. Through the different 'hats' she wears she brings together many different individuals and organisations and through her websites and the Community Times she ensures that the Nayland with Wissington 'news network' is both highly effective and inclusive. Without Lorraine many of us would struggle to keep track of what is going on in the community, important community information would be missed and members of the community who are less able to get out and see people face to face would feel much more isolated from the 'goings on' in the village.

#### **BABERGH COMMUNITY ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS 2015**

RECIPIENT FOR NAYLAND: RACHEL HITCHCOCK

Nayland with Wissington is a rural parish with a thriving community including many young families. It has an outstanding Primary School and a purpose built centre at Woodland Corner where pre-school care and activities are offered by the Playgroup alongside Extended Schools breakfast, after school and holiday clubs and childcare. Nayland with Wissington Parish Council are trustees for the village recreation ground. Many volunteers are involved in the provision of these amenities, but for several years **Rachel Hitchcock** has been outstanding in her voluntary contribution to groups working with children using those facilities and to children within the wider community.

In particular, for the past two years Rachel has led the Nayland Playground Project Group in developing an updated play area at the recreation ground. The installation of new equipment has just been completed. The Parish Council had appealed for members of the community to assist with plans to upgrade the outdated play area for a number of years. Until Rachel offered her time and expertise to lead a project group, that assistance was not forthcoming. Under her leadership a small team representing parents, councillors and neighbours was set up and the long process of public consultation, fundraising and grant applications began. Rachel negotiated with playground designers and made successful bids for grants from Babergh District Council, the Lottery Fund and others to secure the total funding of £25,000 needed for new equipment chosen with the help of a survey completed by children and parents. The ideas put forward by the children were an important part of the process and the result has been praised by the families who enjoy the play area. During more than two years of considerable time and effort, Rachel faced any difficulties with cheerfulness, enthusiasm and a professional attitude.

Rachel has a young family and works as a classroom assistant at Nayland School but always finds time for community work. She is an excellent role model who encourages others to become actively involved. For several years she has been committed in many ways to voluntary work with pre-school and primary school age children and to community fundraising. When the Playgroup and Extended School childcare moved to Woodland Corner in 2008 she became a volunteer and member of the fundraising and management committee and is now Chairman of the Woodland Corner charity. She is also a member of

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

#### Heating Oil Thefts Warning.....

One of the many heating oil suppliers have recently sent out the below advice to its customers, so thought I would share it with you the reader, bear in mind that there are many other heating oil suppliers so it would be advised to be vigilant whoever your supplier is!

'Ukayfuels has been advised to warn all customers of current oil theft activity. Unknown to the delivery drivers, it is believed that they are being followed by oil thieves. Once oil has been delivered to the designated property, oil thieves then enter the property and siphon the oil, meaning customers have to pay again for their oil and to repair their tank.

Ukayfuels have made all of our drivers aware of this and will be doing their best to deter thieves. However we highly recommend that customers do their up most to prevent their tank from being attacked.

To assist you to reduce the risk of theft Ukayfuels have a wonderful new product called Smartguard. It's an antitheft and monitoring device that detects unusual large drops in levels activating an alarm & notifying yourself or your supplier by text or email.'

Most Heating Oil suppliers will have their own Smartguard device so contact them in the first instance should wish to purchase one for you home/tank.

Some helpful tips to help you protect you heating Oil....

- Screen your tank with hedging or fences
- Close and secure perimeter gates
- Conceal any external pipe work
- Install dusk till dawn lighting
- \*\*\*\*Regularly check your fuel levels\*\*\*\*
- Install lockable caps or an alarm (consult your tank supplier)
- Join a neighbourhood watch scheme, keep an eye out and call 999 if you see anything suspicious

#### Daylight burglaries are occurring in the local area...

Many people don't pay as much attention to their home's security during the daylight hours. This is because people tend to feel safer when not surrounded by darkness. However, when looking at statistics burglaries are just as likely to occur during the day. A burglary at a property can occur at any time day or night, in fact many burglaries occur during the day, as offenders

tend to blend in better with the surroundings and are able to offer more plausible excuses should they be challenged, such as "I am lost", "I was looking for Mr X who lives somewhere around here", "I thought this property was for sale" and "I've lost my dog", along with various other excuses that can be more easily made during the normal daylight working hours. If your home is unoccupied during the day here are a few tips to help you to improve security:

- ALWAYS lock your doors and windows when you leave the house, even if it's only for a few minutes. Make sure your locks reach British Standards and are fit for purpose.
- Never assume that your home, garage, shed or studio will be safe while unlocked, even if you're currently at home. It only takes a minute for someone to enter and take what is not theirs.
- Remove ALL tools and objects from within your garden that could be used by an offender to break into your home with.
- ALWAYS set your intruder alarm if you have one, during the day AND night. And consider installing an alarm in any outbuildings too. Battery operated alarms can be purchased from Sudbury, Hadleigh and Capel Police Stations for £8 each.
- Use lights and, especially during the day, radios on timers inside your home.
- Property mark all electrical and valuable items with a UV & permanent marker pen, which can be purchased from the above stations for £1 each, or use a property marking solution like Smartwater or SelectaDNA.
- Register any items that have serial numbers on the UK property database <u>www.immobilise.com</u> for free, including any bicycles and power tools.
- Ensure your perimeters are secure with fencing or hedging and lock sidegates at all times with a padlock or mortice lock.
- IF YOU REMEMBER JUST ONE THING... Remember to store ALL important valuables including jewellery and cash out of sight and if possible in a hidden wall or floor safe. The first place an offender will look is in the top drawer of your dresser unit, or in the back of a wardrobe. DON'T MAKE IT EASY FOR THEM.

Finally we are asking for residents to help to be our eyes and ears in the community. If you see something suspicious, or out of the ordinary then please report it and whenever possible report it straight away by calling 101. Please do not leave it to someone else; we would sooner have a number of calls on the same suspicious person, than none at all.

Some of you will remember this Pete Seeger song from the sixties but the words come from the Bible, the Book of Ecclesiastes and were originally written at least 2500 years ago. Yet they still resonate today. For human nature hasn't changed. There is still greed, ambition, ruthlessness aplenty as every news bulletin reminds us. There is also still compassion, kindness and honesty as the extra generous donations to our local food bank over the Christmas season and the collections for the Red Cross and other charities from the Christmas services demonstrate. Whenever I visit people in our community, I hear stories of good neighbourliness and small acts of kindness and consideration that tell a different story to the world of the media. I see countless examples of people whose voluntary work continues to benefit our communities; the community shop helpers, those involved with the Scouts, Guides, youth club and sports, local councillors, the drivers for 'We'll help', the litter pickers, the tree and hedge tidiers.... The list is endless.

For life is more than survival, it has purpose and meaning.

Christians believe in a God of love, whose care for us should be reflected in our care for others. So I rejoice and give thanks for all the goodness that I see around me.

And whatever season it is in your life now, whether it is a time to laugh or a time to weep, a time to plant or a time to heal, in good times and bad, accept the support and care offered when you need it and with equal graciousness make your unique contribution to our common life in this green and pleasant land, where you can.

And know that the God of love will be with you. For He doesn't change, either.

## EAST ANGLIA RAIL PASSENGER FRANCHISE CONSULTATION

#### · Ipswich to Peterborough Passenger Service

The Rail Executive has issued the East Anglia Rail Franchise Consultation Document on the rail options that will be included within the franchise specification which will be issued to bidders in summer 2015.

Suffolk County Council and Suffolk Chamber of Commerce are extremely concerned about the options raised for the Ipswich to Peterborough passenger rail service. They are working together to develop a campaign to lobby for an hourly Ipswich to Peterborough passenger service and for infrastructure improvements at Ely. This is a more convenient and cheaper link with the East Coast line to the North of England and Edinburgh and is used by many people in South Suffolk area to avoid travelling via London.



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


