VANDALISM IN THE VILLAGE

Unfortunately Nayland has recently been suffering from a sustained period of vandalism. Last November a youth was caught causing damage to a facility on the playing field by a resident and was reported to the police. This year there have been many acts of vandalism, including theft and criminal damage, in the village and on the allotment field.

The identity of some of the youths has become known to a number of residents. On one occasion a resident was able to film one of the youths causing damage to his front garden. He has reported the incident to the police and it is to be hoped that firm action will be taken.

Sadly this anti-social conduct has spilled onto the public highway. There have been two reported occasions of youths riding small motorbikes or scooters, two abreast at slow speeds on the A134 from Harpers Hill up to Assington with the intention of causing traffic jams.

In all these cases, residents should take the opportunity to use the cameras on their mobile phones to record the activity and present the evidence to the police. In any event the police should be contacted no matter how small the value of the damage in the hope that in due course the offending youths will be dissuaded from such anti-social behaviour.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 13th April 2016

(Minutes available on PC notice board in High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PUBLIC FORUM

Mrs Carver thanked the Parish Council for sending a thank you letter in respect of the successful litter picking. Another community initiative is planned for the autumn and fly tipping has been reported.

PLANNING

Reviewing planning applications Mary George said permission had been granted at **34 Bear Street** for conversion and alteration of existing shed and pagoda to form additional living accommodation and **at 4 Fox Cottages**, **Bures Road** for a single storey detached annexe.

Discussing new applications councillors had no objections to listed building consent to replace single glazed glass with slimlite double glazing (existing wooden window frames to be repainted) at **5 Jane Walker Park** or at **Westwood**, **Harpers Hill** for a replacement two storey dwelling and cartlodge subject to a condition that ties the cartlodge to residential use ancillary to the main building. Councillors had no objections to the erection of ancillary outbuilding and boiler room including listed building consent at **The Manse**, **27 Bear Street** or tree works at **8 Jane Walker Park** including crown clean T1 Ash,T3 Plane,T4 Birch,T5 Poplar,T6 Cherry &T9 Sycamore trees; Crown lift to T2 Sycamore; Crown reduction to T7 Walnut & T8 Willow - covered by Tree Preservation Order BT 217.

Colchester Borough Council have been contacted to ensure Nayland PC is consulted on the application for Land adjoining Church of All Saints London Road, Great Horkesley (the glasshouse site) - CBC Application No 160906.

Gerry Battye had reviewed the SALC document on Planning Consultation and shared his findings. The response issued by Suffolk Association of Local Councils was praised. Mary George and Gerry Battye will be attending an informal meeting with neighbouring Parish Councils to discuss Planning.

HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

The Parish Council had notified Babergh District Council of the intention to go ahead with a Housing Needs Survey along with neighbouring parishes. Concern was been raised regarding the future of sheltered accommodation at Parkers Way when they become vacant. The Chairman had written for information.

ALLOTMENTS

During the recent allotment holders meeting Graham Walker outlined the glebe land initiative and positive responses were gained. Field gates, signage and no parking on the field were also discussed. All were pleased to see sheep had returned. Graham Walker had taken the opportunity to speak to the farmer about the proposals for the field.

Councillors discussed the glebe land initiative and adoption of the scheme out-lined in the report from the working group which was agreed.

Graham Walker will discuss creating a permissive path around the edge of the field with Sally Bartrum, Foothpath Warden. A grant from Tesco's was being pursued. The Allotment Field will be discussed at the Annual Parish Assembly.

STREET LIGHTING

The location of the new light was discussed. Prompted by a request for the homeowner to cut back their hedge to make way for the new light, residents in the vicinity have asked for the proposed light to be re-located. Those who had attended the original site meeting with lighting engineers felt the possibility of re-location was unlikely due to the availability of the power supply and also the spacing of the lighting units in the vicinity. It was agreed for the county councillor, James Finch, and Gerry Battye to visit the homeowner to understand their concerns with the suggested location. It was agreed to chase up the outstanding street-lighting upgrades.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The spate of vandalism in the village was discussed including to private property, trees, at the allotments and the recreation ground. The incidents have been reported to the Police. A date is being organised for the two yearly tree inspection.

The maintenance regime for Caley Green had been discussed informally between meetings and Mary George explained some of the history and explained where only thistles grew until the regime was changed some years ago. Mary George suggested that a councillor might like to consider what has been done in the past, out-line options available now and report to Council. Mrs Fuller asked if a yellow advertising sign could be removed by our contractors from the give way sign at the A134/Bear Street junction.

HIGHWAYS

Between meetings, potholes had been reported in Wiston and Bear Street. Concern was expressed that the roads are not sufficiently cleared of mud - the Chairman and Clerk would take this further.

Patricia Fuller updated councillors following her meeting with County Highways regarding the sign pointing towards the Village Hall at the Mill Street junction; councillors were happy for the Church and Village Hall to be included on the sign.

The location of a new noticeboard and a cycle rack was discussed. Gerry Battye agreed to investigate the idea of a new noticeboard on the back of the bus shelter at the entrance to Heycroft Way with contractors. The Clerk will contact Babergh DC regarding the possibility of obtaining permission to locate a cycle rack on their grass verge by the junction with Bear Street.

VILLAGE HALL

Patricia Fuller reported that the routine fire inspection at the hall led to some changes to the doors.

BURIAL GROUND

The maintenance priorities agreed with our grounds maintenance contractors had been finished. These included fencing repairs and clearance. The border fencing with the Nursing Home will need attention in the next couple of years.

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

It was agreed to ask Inspector Danny Cooper if he could attend the Parish Assembly on 17th May.

PUBLIC FORUM

Stuart Davis of John Davis and Partners, owners on the Nags Corner development, said although they gained planning permission for developing their site for offices and access from Harper's Hill in 2014 the project is not looking financially viable. Rather than exploring alternative uses he suggested the site may be of interest for affordable and social housing.

Mike Hunter raised the issue of recent vandalism around the village and advised of two incidents where a pair of mopeds riding abreast along the A134 very slowly from Nayland to Assington deliberately obstructing traffic. He asked if a representative of Suffolk Police would be at the AGM to discuss this.

Mary George said the police would not be sending a representative but a written report would be available. The police had been informed of incidents to council property and residents had reported incidents. The Parish Clerk has been advised that the police are investigating and the case is a priority.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Melanie Barrett said Babergh and Mid-Suffolk District Councils are looking at the possibility of operating under one roof as a cost cutting measure. Councillors were concerned this was progression to full amalgamation of both councils to become one district council and pointed out this was rejected on a democratic basis by residents as they were concerned about representation at a local level. Councillors expressed dismay that decision making is moving further away from local level.

ELECTION OF PARISH COUNCILLORS

Mary George was elected as chair, election of vice-chair was deferred. Village Hall and Community Council representatives are Tricia Fuller and Martyn Booth respectively.

PLANNING

Reviewing planning applications Mary George said permission had been granted by Babergh at **10 Heycroft Way** for erection of ground and first floor rear extensions and alterations with conditions regarding facing materials and that the double casement window in the bathroom at first floor level shall be glazed in obscured glass and at **8 Jane Walker Park** for tree work to crown clean T1 Ash,T3 Plane,T4 Birch,T5 Poplar,T6 Cherry & T9 Sycamore trees; Crown lift to T2 Sycamore; Crown reduction to T7 Walnut & T8 Willow covered by Tree Preservation Order BT 217.

Permission had been refused at **Park House**, **Wissington Uplands** to reduce 4 lime trees by up to 50% and 7 holm oak trees covered by Tree Preservation Order BT 217 on the grounds; The trees in question are large prominent specimens that have high amenity value contributing to the attractiveness and character of the locality. They considerably pre-date the adjacent residential development and are important natural features providing wildlife habitat and screening. The application to reduce the trees is not supported by any evidence identifying the necessity of the work. Such pruning would have a detrimental impact upon the character and appearance of the local area and is likely to compromise the health of the trees.

Discussing new applications councillors had no objections to a listed building consent for internal alterations and installation of French doors at **Pound House, Bures Road** or listed building consent at **8 Jane Walker Park** for installation of garage door to existing garage and installation of a wood burning stove and chimney pot to existing chimney or listed building consent at **Star Cottage, 81 Bear Street** for erection of single-storey rear extension with roof light and new flat roof covering.

Councillors had mixed views on listed building consent at **84 Bear Street** for erection of garden building but it was agreed to object on the grounds it was inappropriate in the setting in a conservation area close to the river and a public footpath.

Applications at Vine House, 1 Court Street for erection of a two-storey double garage with bedroom accommodation above, following demolition of existing single storey garage and listed building consent at Old Maltings, 17 Birch Street for replacement

of windows and the plastering of front and side elevations will be further discussed between meetings.

Councillors discussed the application for land adjoining Church of All Saints, London Road, Great Horkesley (site of formerly proposed Horkesley Park), CBC Application No 160906, for removal of the existing glasshouses and ancillary buildings; change of use and replacement with a new residential scheme comprising of 18 private dwellings and 4 affordable dwellings. Councillors noted it was no longer viable for the site to return to agricultural use. Their recommendation would be confined to how it affected Nayland with Wissington residents. It was agreed that concerns would be registered including footpaths, safety concerns relating to increased traffic in the narrow London Road, access at the junction with the A134, pedestrians crossing the A134 to the bus stop.

ALLOTMENTS

Graham Walker reported on progress. If the proposed permissive path around the edge of the field is to go ahead the advice of the Dedham Vale Project will be sought. It is necessary that a notice of ownership is displayed for one year. A possible grant from Tesco was being pursued; this entailed submitting a very comprehensive on-line form.

A plan for Glebe Lands will be displayed at the Parish Assembly and Graham will provide a presentation.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The spate of vandalism around the village is continuing. The PC, the Nayland Land Company and individuals have reported incidents to the Police. Any future incidents should also be reported.

A balance beam on the recently installed play equipment has been damaged. Gerry Battye agreed to make enquiries with contractors regarding repair. Kathleen Cannings advised of vandalism to a bench at Pop's Piece.

An application to place a banner for Open Gardens on Caley Green was approved. Kathleen Cannings has volunteered to research the maintenance history of Caley Green with a view to looking at options for its future maintenance regime.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Martyn Booth reported that following a grant application from the Village Hall Management Committee the Community Council would like confirmation that their grants are always paid into the Endowment Fund and that access to this fund requires the authority of the Parish Council and Community Council.

The Save Our Post Office Campaign are currently not proposing fund raising but want to increase awareness of the services the Post Office offers as all transactions generate income.

IN BRIEF:

Reporting on the burial ground Mary George said that fence panels have been replaced, the five year plan has been updated.

The Parish Council had registered our interest with Babergh District Council to go ahead with a Housing Needs Survey along with neighbouring parishes.

The outstanding upgrades to streetlights were discussed and site meetings are being arranged to resolve the issues.

Gravel Hill will be closed from 31 May to 10 June; UK Power Networks will work alongside BT to replace telegraph poles and associated overhead lines.

A large Oak tree at the end of Fen Street which is leaning will be reported to Highways and pot holes in Bear Street and Stoke Road will be reported. A Tree on Webb's Meadow has been damaged.

CANCER RESEARCH CAKE STALL

Many thanks to all who bought cakes outside Kerridge's on 30th April. We made £100 towards Cancer Research from the sale. Many thanks too to Mr Kerridge for allowing us to use his facilities.

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COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 4th May 2016 Chairman: Neil Barbrook 263619

Executive Committee: Neil Barbrook said we are very pleased to have Maggie Ryan as Treasurer. She has been kept extremely busy with CC business and Save Our Post Office campaign.

Fundraising Activities: The annual fundraisers of the CC are held in October to December. Ideas for a Spring/Summer fundraiser were briefly discussed. A Valentine's event or Barn Dance were mentioned, but further ideas are requested.

Community Council History & Website: Lorraine Brooks said a new page for 'Grants' has been added to the website. It also now hosts the Save Our Post Office Campaign website.

Progress continues on the CC's history which will be on display in St James' during the Street Fayre.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: Neil Barbrook said the majority of members were unable to attend on 19th March. This was the same morning as the Spring Flower Show. Neil added the CC's section of garden is in reasonable order.

Community Defibrillator: Neil Barbrook recapped on the proposal of having a community defibrillator sited at the Fire Station, which had been given approval by the Fire Service. Iain Wright had agreed to take this project forward in conjunction with the Parish Council. He is liaising with the British Heart Foundation to establish if there are likely to be any future grant opportunities.

Save Our Post Office Campaign: Neil Barbrook and Maggie Ryan reported on the situation since a public meeting on 22nd March to establish if there was support within the village to safeguard the future of our Post Office. A SOPO committee was formed; members include Roy Chapman, Neil Barbrook, Maggie Ryan and Bryan Smith.

Meetings have been held with the postmistress, Patsie Ford, and a Post Office Authorities representative. SOPO have been analysing the accounts and will prepare projections for any possible future scenarios that are identified. This may involve an opportunity for community franchise or PO Local status. PO Limited no longer appear to be promoting the franchise of this PO.

SOPO are currently not proposing to undertake any fund raising but want to increase awareness of the various over the counter services the Post Office offers in the hope that people will use these services more, as all transactions generate income. Promotion is displayed around the village and in the Community Times - please encourage others to support the PO.

Donation of '50' Sign: Iris Sebba has kindly offered a carved wooden 50 sign. Members were grateful; this would be useful for the CC anniversary celebrations.

New Scout Group: Sara Strover has advised of the possibility of a new Scout Group being established and that a grant application to help with setting up costs may be submitted.

GRANTS & DONATIONS

Village Hall Endowment Fund: The VHMC have asked for £1,000 towards this fund, which was set up: "to secure the future and to safeguard against unexpected emergencies".

It was pointed out that a grant of £3,500 has already been awarded to the VH this year; although a grant towards the Endowment Fund has been awarded every years since 2007, in 2010 when they received a large grant of £2,916 they waived an additional request for the Endowment Fund. Several members thought they should do so again.

Taking the grant request to the vote there were 5 for and 5 against. Rather than the chairman making a casting vote it was agreed to defer a decision to the next meeting when more members will have the opportunity to vote - either by attendance or in writing in accordance with the voting policy.

Conservation Society: The grant of £500 towards historical investigation work at Court Knoll is being held by the CC until

required for the project. Andora Carver thanked the CC for their generosity and said it is hoped work will take place in September. **Mother & Toddler Group:** A grant of £150 towards a shortfall in current running costs due to fluctuating attendance has been paid. The group have been promoting themselves to boost attendance. New leaders are being sought to take over from September.

Grant Application Guidelines: Since the last meeting the draft grant guidelines and application form had progressed taking on board previous feedback. The Grant Guidelines and application form was adopted. This is available to download on http://www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk/Grants.html or from the chairman or secretary. Copies will also be placed in the Post Office.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Maggie Ryan extended thanks to all the members who have helped in her new role as Treasurer.

Main income includes: Community Times £1582.50, Calendar £565, Donation £135. Main expenditure includes: Community Times £419, Grants £3650 (Village Hall Kitchen £3,500, Mother & Toddler Group £150). We hold £414 for First Response, £270 for the Services Fund and the following grants; £150 for the Local History Exhibition and £500 for the Conservation Society Court Knoll. Therefore unencumbered assets are £18,221.20.

Maggie suggested online banking would offer greater efficiency and this was agreed.

The meeting thanked Maggie for her hard work and achievements with the CC's financial matters.

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks she would be grateful to receive photos of the Street Fayre - the more the merrier - for the CT and the CC's website.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks expressed thanks to all who entered the competition; there were several new photographers and some very good photos entered. There were 138 photographs displayed and it was a pleasant afternoon with visitors stopping to chat and have refreshments. Thanks were due to the calendar team and helpers for their commitment and Hazel Gardiner for supplying the refreshments.

The calendar is now coming together and will be available in time for the Street Fayre. Authorisation of expenditure for printing was agreed; Spingold has provided an excellent service. The CC thanked the Calendar Team for their hard work

Royal British Legion: Alex Murrison said there has been a national consultation regarding the future of the Women's Section and it is proposed they fully integrate with the men - developments for branch participation are awaited.

Today 21 members and friends enjoyed a visit to the Imperial War Museum and Duxford Airfield. The next outing on 8th June is to Debach Airfield near Woodbridge - contact Andrew Gowen 262534 if interested. Further visits proposed are to Brightlingsea Museum and Sizewell Power Station. At the next meeting members will present reminiscences of the 1916 Battle of the Somme - at the Anchor, 7.30 for 8pm.

Parish Council: Martyn Booth reminded the meeting of the Parish Assembly on 17th May which would discuss future management of the Allotment Field. He added there is still a vacancy for a councillor on the PC. He advised that the PC has decided

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to conduct a Housing Needs Survey (the last being carried out about 10 years ago). They are still considering sites for a cycle rack and how the old bust shelter could be put to better use.

Conservation Society: Andora Carver thanked the CC for their grant. Open Gardens will be on 12th June and anyone willing to open their garden should contact Andora on 262970. At the open meeting on 27th June Chris Hunt will compere 'Further Reminiscences of Nayland and Wiston Village Life'.

Nayland Choir: Rob Swan said they are currently practising for a spring concert on 15th May. They are hoping to participate in a large event with Bury Choir at Bury Cathedral. They recently purchased an amplifier/speaker /microphone system with a grant from the County Councillor, James Finch. This is available for other groups to use.

HortSoc: Lorraine Brooks said the Church Hall was bursting at the seams for a very interesting talk by Andrew Sankey on *A Year in the Life of a Cottage Garden'*. The Spring Show was a very colourful, fragrant occasion with lots of visitors calling in for refreshments and a chat. The AGM and Fun Quiz went well.

Their main fundraiser, the Morning Market is on 21st May; plants including bedding and vegetables, cakes & preserves will be on sale, there will be refreshments and raffle.

The June outing to the Hindringham Hall Garden & Oxburgh Hall is fully booked. The summer Garden Party will be on 8th July, we will have a stall at the Street Fayre on 17th July and the Flower Show is on 6th August.

Since the Public Meeting on March 22nd we have been in discussions with the Postmistress regarding the current situation and the future, including her own plans.

We are not currently proposing any fund raising, although we may need to do some at some future point. Instead we are trying to increase awareness of the various services available over the counter at the Post Office as the income generated will help produce a more sustainable future.

The possible future scenarios are as follows:-

- Someone comes forward to take it on as a commercial venture.
- The Post Office remains as it is now and when the Postmistress retires it ceases trading.
- · It is taken on in some form by the Community.

We have met with the Post Office Authorities, and are currently in dialogue with them to ascertain what the future possibilities are regarding community involvement, and it appears there may be two options. Either of these would no doubt mean a lengthy and detailed application process where we would have to demonstrate that we have the financial capability and the ability to run it successfully, the level of community support, and being able to meet various criteria, including evidence that no other business is interested in taking it on, etc. etc. We would also need a Business Plan and the compilation of a fairly lengthy document as a Presentation Document.

If in the future the village decides on proceeding with a form of community Post Office, there are certain things to consider.

Primarily, we would need to have a strong team in place both during the application stage and also - if we were to be successful - for the running of it, where everyone would be expected to play a role.

We are investigating the financial implications of running a community branch under both available options. We are also gathering information from business stakeholders to see whether they wish to register an interest in running the Post Office business.

We need to speak to possible funding sources and are already in contact with an organisation who provide practical assistance in going down a 'Community Route'. We have also started speaking to other villages who have gone down a similar route.

In order to move forward, and to ensure we have all the facts and figures etc. we really need some more people to join us who would be prepared to get involved with the many aspects, including doing research, making contact with others, establishing the pros and cons of various scenarios, so that we can all make an informed decision about how we move forward.

At some point in the near future the community of Nayland will have a big decision to make regarding the Post Office, and which route, if any, we go down and we need to be happy that we not only have the support of the village but that we also have the team in place at all stages.

In the meantime flyers have been distributed to make everyone aware of the services available at the Post Office, so please use it whenever you can.

We are intending to hold an Open Meeting at the Anchor on Wednesday 20th July at 7.45 for 8pm where we will give an update of where we are.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE PARISH ASSEMBLY - MAY 2016

Five councillors were elected in May 2015 and three more were co-opted during the Summer. There is still one vacancy for a co-opted councillor. Please contact the Parish Clerk if you are interested in becoming a Parish Councillor.

FINANCE

Finance is increasingly challenging within the constraints of government capping of council tax, continuing phasing out of grants paid to parishes by the District and discontinuation of DEFRA stewardship income for the Allotment Field. The precept budget for 2016-1017 was increased by 1.5%. We are being expected to pick up the costs of services cut by Suffolk and Babergh.

We are working on a five year asset management plan so that we can forecast income and expenditure accurately. We continue to use our capital investment fund for long term projects and the village hall building. Council accounts are going through the annual independent audit process and will be available to the public as usual. The end of year balance includes sums for work planned or ordered before April but not yet invoiced.

Unfortunately the recent spate of vandalism on parish property will cost several hundred pounds for fence and seat repairs, removal of damaged trees and a replacement beam on play equipment installed two years ago. All incidents have been reported and we urge residents to give any information they have to the police.

POLICE COVER

Councillors were shocked to receive a letter from Police Commissioner Tim Passmore the week before Christmas telling us that in future there would be no PCSO covering our villages. Parish and Town Councils were asked to cover the cost of future PCSO provision - a charge of approx £33,000 per year per officer or we could choose to share the cost of one PCSO to cover several parishes. That figure is similar to our entire precept income for the year. Even half a day's PCSO time per week would have meant a ten per cent increase beyond the capped limit to be paid by each household, something that councils are not allowed to do without triggering a costly referendum. We were unable to take up this 'offer' and there was disbelief amongst parish and town councils that the request came after budgets for 2016 to 2017 had been approved at council meetings in public as required by law to meet the January deadline. We wrote a letter of complaint to the Police Commissioner and Chief Constable, who appear to have no understanding the restrictions on council budget timescales or the limited funds available to parishes.

STREETLIGHTING

This five year capital project will be completed by 2018. Most of the lights have been changed to energy efficient LED lanterns, with Gravel Hill, Fen Street and other lights in the next group. There are already savings on electricity costs and light pollution has decreased.

ALLOTMENTS

The Parish Council is in the process of creating a new management plan for the field and allotments to protect this agricultural land for the future use as grazing and hay crop or allotment extension. There are 4 people on the waiting list but tenancies can come up unexpectedly. Allotment provision can be increased if there is enough viable interest. Allotments are only available to residents of Nayland or Wiston.

CALEY GREEN

We will be reviewing plans that were tried about fifteen years ago regarding the maintenance regime for the green. Suffolk CC owns the land and is responsible for the trees, but they have no plans for any replanting in the event of ash dieback or storm damage. As you know, we lost a couple of willows and a mature ash from the Green over past couple of years.

LOCAL HOUSING SURVEY

In 2015 one of the few remaining council houses was sold on the open market in Wiston without it being made available to local people when it became vacant. The Parish Council protested at the sale, but we were advised that it is now government policy to sell council houses in 'high value' areas, and that the house itself was too costly to bring it up to modern standards. It was galling to see the house being marketed as in a desirable and convenient location, while Babergh decided that it was 'too remote', despite the fact that it is within a mile of school, shops and public transport. The proceeds of the sale will go into the general Babergh housing budget rather than directly benefiting residents of this parish. In Nayland, two bedroomed houses are being advertised for private rental of between £850 and £1,200 a month, and some smaller houses are now only available as holiday lettings. This does nothing to help young people, or lower income families or elderly people downsizing, who are unable to stay within the parish where they will have family support. It is now several years since nine local needs housing units were built in Harpers Way and Wiston Road so the Parish Council has registered the decision to undertake another full housing needs survey. We will combine forces with adjoining parishes that suffer from similar housing problems in an increasingly expensive area. Recent Government legislation years requires this to include private as well as social development needs.

PLANNING

Between May 2015 and April 2016 Parish Councillors discussed thirty planning applications mainly for alterations or small extensions or tree work.

FIRE SERVICE REVIEW AND CONSULTATION

The parish council objected to the proposed reduction of cover in Sudbury as this would have a knock-on effect for our station. Unfortunately, Sudbury campaigners called for the closure of Nayland instead. We made a successful case for supporting Sudbury but not at Nayland's expense and we now have a full crew at Nayland.

HIGHWAYS AND LITTER

The proposed speed limit on A134 was welcomed after thirty years of asking for this anomaly of an unlimited road with a high accident rate cutting through a residential area to be remedied.

The Parish Council has complained to Babergh and Suffolk about the quality of quarterly roadsweeping, delays in removing debris from roads and verges and blocked drains.

Volunteers of all ages took part in a community litterpick in April while our own contractors concentrated on A134 and Wiston verges which should be done regularly by Babergh. Together they collected almost forty sacks of rubbish but these volunteers had been working for months on footpaths and on the allotment field clearing rubbish and dog poo bags by less responsible walkers who seem to expect others to clear up after them.

I would like to thank all community volunteers, fellow councillors and our Parish Clerk for all their support and their hard work during the year. We were very pleased that both our nominations for Community Service Awards, Rosemary Knox and Wendy Sparrow, were successful.

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


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
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MAY DAY WALK





Once the Fabric Committee had received the delayed but corrected plans for the LSS, it was decided within the PCC that, rather than pursue an informal meeting with the Diocesan Advisory Committee - the DAC - to check that all is well, the plans would be submitted, along with the

Statement of Need and Significance. The Fabric Committee has been unable to establish when this application will be considered. The DAC meets every other month, so, as the part plans were submitted in April, it is to be hoped that we will hear some news in the next few weeks.

We are now facing a dilemma: as the plans submitted were without the necessary supporting technical plans - covering both design and structural elements - there is no doubt that this information will be required by the DAC before work can commence. However, as we are, even informally, unsure what approach the DAC will take, it is a high risk strategy to get our architect working on detailed builder's plans before we have the benefit of the DAC opinion. The Friends do not believe that our funds should be risked in any way so, sadly, everything now goes on hold until we have some response from the Fabric Committee.

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

One result of the unusually mild winter has been the exceptional growth of everything, including or course weeds. Here the situation is more or less out of control, with Ground Elder spreading for yards (there are no such things as metres at M/S Hall) in every direction, including the centres of plants, whence it's almost impossible to remove it. Ground Elder was introduced into this country by the Romans who ate it in the mistaken belief that it would cure Gout; they would have done better by cutting their consumption of red wine.

Gravel paths are becoming grassy walks, and here is a cautionary tale.... We are heavily infected with the Lesser Celandine, a ferocious spreader at the best of times, and it had extended into a sort of grass walk that leads from the cultivated part of the garden into what remains of the orchard. The OM/S intended to use a selective weedkiller here, but picked up a Roundup packet by mistake, and killed the grass as well as the Celandines. Fortunately we have plenty of spare areas of turf and weed grass which can be used to patch up the mess, given some rain.

This month's plant, which has just finished flowering is Lathyrus Vernus, the Spring Pea. It's very easy to grow and self seeds freely. It comes with two kinds of foliage; with fine or larger leaved foliage; surprisingly it can produce offspring of either kind. The type is a good deep purple; the variety "Alboroseus" has pink and white flowers.

When young, the plant disappears during winter so needs to be marked. There will be (or will have been, by the time the NwWCT is distributed) a few small plants at the Church Fete plant stall; however being (a) very small and (b) without flowers they probably won't have sold. If anyone cares to phone they can come and collect some without charge -the phone number is 01787 210309.

It's a strange season in that some shrubs seem to be going to flower later than usual; and some have died for no obvious reason, among then a Kolkwitzia (Beauty Bush - well named) and a Trachelospermum which used to disquise the rotting timber facade of an outbuilding. Honey fungus, perhaps, may be the cause, but the toadstools don't appear until after it's done its dirty work. They will be sadly missed.

Any moment now our Tulipa Sprengeri will be a blaze of red all over the place. It has been described in these pages several times over the years, and is the OM/S' standard horticultural gift.

A final tip:- if you want to dig up a plant in dry weather, give it a good watering first; this will help to minimise root damage.

Aegopodium podagraria (Ground Elder, or Gout Weed) was mentioned several years ago by the Ed, as being cultivated throughout the middle ages and used as a spinach-like vegetable, pot-herb and medicinal plant. The plant spreads by its tough creeping roots and those who suffer from this pernicious weed in their gardens may get some comfort that this pest can be eaten! It is best to harvest when the shoots are young and about 6" high. Wash the young leaves and leaf stems well and cook in a teaspoon of butter and very little water. Season and cook very gently for 10 minutes, stirring frequently, drain well and toss in butter to serve.

THE FAIERS FAMILY

At the recent history exhibition in the Church Hall I was given a photograph of Mr Alec Faiers and his family which was probably taken in the late 1920s or early thirties. Long standing residents still fondly remember Alec and his sister Olive in their shop in Bear Street, one of several grocery shops still trading in Nayland in the 1960s. Sadly, when they both died in 1971, as well as bringing to an end another of Nayland's businesses, it was also the end of their family's connection with Nayland which began when their great grandparents, John and Elizabeth Faiers, arrived in the

John Faiers married Elizabeth at Hadleigh in 1755 and sometime after this they came to Nayland. The first known record of the family here was the baptism of their daughter

Harriet in 1789 and from then on there were Faiers in Nayland for over 180 years. John and Elizabeth had 10 children, the last being Henry baptised in 1802.

Pigotts Trade Directory of 1830 shows members of the Faiers family as Coopers (makers of casks for beer and wine) in several villages and towns in the area and when John came to Nayland he carried on the family trade. After John's death in 1833 his sons, Henry and Robert, carried on the business and in White's Suffolk 1844 were described as Coopers and also Basket Makers. Their shop was at what is now 7 Bear Street with the workshop in the yard behind.

Robert Faiers married the daughter of William Barker, Plumber and Glazier in Nayland in 1834. Their son George was orphaned by the deaths of his parents when he was only 10. He lived with his grandparents in Birch Street and by the 1861 census he was a Seedsman living with his wife and family in his parents-in-laws' house, now Butchers, next door to the Faiers' house and shop.

In the 1871 census George was described as a Farmer of 20 acres and also surprisingly as a Gas manufacturer. The Parish Council records include a Gas Account book dating from 1866 (now in the Bury Record Office) with the opening entry that the gas made at the newly opened works of the Ipswich Gas Company in Newlands Lane was used to light the streets and that "Mr Faiers", the lessee and manager, began the supply on 24th December in that year. This was George Faiers.

In the meantime George's uncle Henry carried on as a Cooper and Basket Maker in Bear Street, according to census returns and directories between 1851 and 1874. Charles Gowing recorded in his Recollections that Henry Faiers was a Cooper and maker of hampers, skeps and other types of baskets, assisted by workers Peck and Joseph Marsh, in Bear Street.

Henry Faiers died in 1877 aged 75. It seems he must have retired from cooping as the Post Office directory for 1875 shows him as a Furniture Dealer. His son, Henry, was shown as a Cooper aged 14 in the 1851 census but by the time of the next census he was an Ironmonger in the High Street. After his father's death Henry took over the furniture dealing.

Henry junior was non conformist like his parents. In 1860 he married Emily Green whose father was Thomas Green, a Maltster at "Walters Farm" (almost certainly the present Maltings Farm in Bures Road). On their marriage Henry and Emily were admitted to Nayland Congregational Church from Bures Baptist Church where Henry later became a deacon.

As well as his furniture and ironmongery shop Henry was one of Nayland's earliest professional photographers and many of his photographs still exist. Despite his photography, however, he was not too successful in business and died at 59 in a London hospital in 1895. His estate was insolvent and the family renounced in favour of a creditor, a Colchester ironmonger.

Henry's younger brother, Thomas, had taken on their father's cooping business and he and his wife Bertha continued to live in Bear Street. They had two children, Olive and Alec born in 1887 and 1888 respectively. Sometime after 1881 Thomas gave up cooping and became a grocer. After his death in 1926 at 79, his widow ran the business for a while and when she died, it was run by Alec and Olive. Alec had earlier worked in London for a watch and clockmaker and no doubt continued this work in Nayland as some of his tools are still in the village.

In May 1968 the Colchester Express published an article on Nayland which included a picture of Alec Faiers. He recalled that his father used to employ several women to do basketwork and the workshop where the baskets were made was still standing behind the shop when the article was written. Soon after, in 1971, both Alec and Olive died, thus ending the Faiers' connection with Nayland. The shop became an antiques shop for a while and later a private house.

VILLAGE PLAYERS' **BLITHE SPIRIT**

Nayland Village Players performed the ghost farce Blithe Spirit to healthy audiences on 12-14 May. Jim Bond's production was the first time the society had presented the Noel Coward classic since 1987.

Blithe Spirit is described as an improbable farce. When writer Charles Condomine arranges a séance as research for a forthcoming novel, he unwittingly unleashes forces that lead to the summoning of his late wife, Elvira, with disastrous effects on his present marriage. Coward's style is to make the main characters amuse us even as we gasp at their appalling natures. Cynical guips about the *Times*, or the vicar, or the stupidity of the servant classes depict a world with great wit but no heart.

Jackie Grant as Elvira had many of the best lines, taking delight in tormenting second wife Ruth, herself played to straight-faced perfection by Emma Wallis. Justin Dowding revelled in Charles' bad behaviour, openly playing wife and ex-wife against each other and relishing the 'freedom' that the situation provided. John McCarroll and Sharon Pentney were suitably urbane as the sophisticated Dr and Mrs Bradman: the worldly doctor happily divulging patient histories and overshadowing his wife who, in turn, would make awful remarks about servants.

The two characters from outside the spoiled social circle provide considerable contrast. Mary Moriarty's Madame Arcati was quirky and concerned, serious without being po-faced. And Jilly Fernandez was delightfully scatty as Edith, the maid. A special mention to Evie Hughes as the voice of the spirit conduit Daphne.

The actors were supported by a fine and well-appointed set which really came alive in the final moments as the unseen Elvira and Ruth destroyed the Condomine home, egged on by the liberated libertine Charles. In all, this was a confident production that straddled the serious, sublime and silly nature of Coward's classic.







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
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
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FIVE YEARS LATER

The children at Nayland Primary School celebrated five years of solar power at the school this week.

Green Energy Nayland was set up in 2011 to install 15.5 kW of solar PV on Nayland Primary School roof as part of a groundbreaking community energy project. The scheme raised £37,900 of community funding through a share issue open to local residents and was the first in the UK to set up a solar energy community enterprise of this type

The scheme uses revenue from the Government's Feed in Tariff programme to pay members an annual dividend. Any additional revenue is used to fund other related community projects linked to energy and sustainability.

Since its installation, the children learnt that the solar panels have:

- saved the school £8000 in electricity bills
- saved 56 tonnes of CO2 from being released into the atmosphere; and
 - raised £5600 for community projects.

Will Hitchcock, Director of Green Energy Nayland, marked the occasion by going into the Year 4 class at the school and demonstrating how the different renewable technologies – solar, wind and hydro – work through small scale experiments.

He was extremely impressed by the children's insight and enthusiasm: "The children asked many challenging and thoughtful questions about renewable energy, its benefits and the technology behind it. They did not just accept the technologies but wanted to properly understand how they worked. I think there may well be a number of budding engineers in the class!"

Mrs Karen Symons, Year 4 teacher at Nayland Primary School said: "It has been great to recapture some of the excitement and enthusiasm we felt when the solar panels were first installed on the school roof. It is a fantastic way of teaching children about renewable technology and sustainability and feeds into many different areas of learning."

Feedback from James Finch - Your Stour Valley County Councillor

This is a summary of some of the key achievements of the County Council.

SCC FREEZES GENERAL COUNCIL TAX FOR SIXTH YEAR

The council has made savings in excess of £170million since the Government's deficit reduction programme began in 2011/2012 and faces the need to make further savings of over £80million during the next two years. The budget passed in April saw a ZERO% increase in base Council Tax. The Administration decided to implement the 2% National Adult Social Care Levy to support the implementation of the National Living Wage.

SUFFOLK SCHOOLS' ASCENT OF LEAGUE TABLES

Figures out last month confirmed the trend of improvement in Suffolk's relative position in educational attainment. In data released by the government in January, Suffolk has climbed 18 places in the national league table for GCSE results since the previous year; from 125th to 107th. This means we are now at the national average. Since then, 80% of Suffolk's schools have now been rated Good or Outstanding by Ofsted in April 2016.

SUFFOLK'S CHILDREN'S SERVICES

SCC's Children's Services have been inspected and rated GOOD by Ofsted following the publication of its inspection report on 15th February 2016. The report praises the work of the council in protecting and looking after children and young people, with some areas of outstanding practice highlighted in the report. The inspection was carried out between 23 November and17 December 2015.

Suffolk now sits in the top 22% of local authorities in the country. 78 councils have been inspected so far under Ofsted's new framework. No authority has been judged outstanding and of the last 17 inspections across the country, just one authority had been judged GOOD, until Suffolk's rating was given.

SUFFOLK'S BETTER BROADBAND BDUK PROGRAMME

Work had been completed on the 1st Contract of the Broadband rollout the 2nd contract of the Superfast Extension Programme (is progressing which is planned to enable 95% of properties in Suffolk

are connected. The first phase of this rollout will be shared onto a map on the SCC website, and the second phase will be added within the next couple of months. To date, we have enabled 35 cabinets, and reached over 3,000 premises under the Superfast Extension Programme.

£1BN DEVOLUTION DEAL ANNOUNCED FOR EAST ANGLIA

A deal worth over £1bn for East Anglia has been announced by the Chancellor of the Exchequer in his Budget Speech on 16 March. As part of the deal East Anglia would receive:

- £900m (£30m a year for the next 30 years) to invest in infrastructure
- £175m to invest in housing

The Deal was negotiated by Leaders from councils across Suffolk, Norfolk, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough and the New Anglia and Greater Cambridgeshire and Greater Peterborough LEPs.

If ratified the Deal would see decisions currently being made by Government on such things as infrastructure, growth, employment and skills being made locally in East Anglia in the future.

The Deal requires the creation of a Combined Authority and directly elected Mayor and it is proposed that the first mayoral elections would be in May 2017 alongside the county council elections.

The directly elected Mayor would act as Chairman to the East Anglia Combined Authority and would exercise the following powers and functions devolved from Government:

- Responsibility for a multi-year, consolidated and, devolved local transport budget.
- Responsibility for a new Key Route Network of local authority roads that will be managed and maintained by the Combined Authority on behalf of the Mayor.
- Powers over strategic planning and housing, including £175m ring-fenced funding to deliver an ambitious target of new homes.

Saints Alive?

This month on June 22nd we celebrate St Alban's Day, the first English martyr. He stood in the place of a priest condemned for professing Christianity and about to be beheaded by the Roman Emperor Diocletian's soldiers. Thus he became our first martyr and is buried at St Albans. What of our national saints?

Much of what we "know" is doubtful, manipulated through years of history. Taking them in calendar order, on March 1st we celebrate St David as patron saint of Wales. Born around 600AD the only one born in his "own" country! He was a Christian missionary and died in his bed aged 100 and is buried in St David's Cathedral. March 17th is St Patrick's Day. Born around 400AD he was a Roman Briton, taken to Ireland at 16 as a slave. Having been converted to Christianity by his master, after 6 years he escaped to his home. He had a vision telling him to return to Ireland where he spent the rest of his life as a missionary, (as well as expelling all snakes so we are told). April 23rd is St George's Day. Born around 280AD in Turkey he was a Roman soldier, he converted to Christianity, protected christians and so was beheaded under diocletian. The Crusaders took up his emblem a red cross on white and later Edward III made him England's patron saint. November 30th is St Andrew's Day. In AD 832 the Scots were fighting the Angles and the Scots' leader vowed to make apostle Andrew their Saint if he won. He did, and amazingly there also was a white X shaped cloud in a blue sky. Thus the Scots gained a patron saint and flag in one go!

These are all examples of exemplary Christian lives given for others, whose stories need to be better known. The other three countries enthusiastically celebrate their patron saints, the English seem reluctant, perhaps an opportunity to proclaim Christian commitment is being missed?





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
