NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Summer Meeting: 10th August 2016

(This is an extract from the draft minutes of the meeting)

DEVOLUTION BRIEFING

District Councillor Jennie Jenkins shared the background to devolution and that at the start of the process they were invited to Central Government to discuss the concept.

Suffolk prepared a bid which was well received and led to the suggestion of first joining with Norfolk and then Cambridge and Peterborough. Following a number of talks it was agreed for two separate deals to be available one for Suffolk and Norfolk and the other for Cambridge and Peterborough. In Suffolk the Councils were fully supportive. In Norfolk there was less support but overall it was still approved. We are now in the consultation period. Councillor Jenkins shared the financial information and confirmed the investment potential in the region if the deal goes ahead. Part of the process would involve generating other investment. Members expressed their reservations about an elected mayor and discussed the figures in relation to the current spend in the region.

PLANNING

 Harpers Hill Farm Waste Transfer SCC/0178/16 - Change of use of land for the storage of empty skips and skip lorry parking. The Parish Council unanimously agreed to object to these plans.

- Oak Cottage, Breach Grove, Kingslane Lane B/16/00852
 Application for a dwelling. There were no objections.
- 43 Bear Street B/16/00946 Application to reduce acacia tree by a third. There were no objections.
- Arger Fen Nature Reserve B/16/01018 Application for a Woodland Shelter - The Parish Council had no objections however wanted clarification of the access to Hullbecks.
- Horkesley Green application (Greenhouse site) The Chairman confirmed Cllrs Booth, Fuller and herself attended the meeting together with representatives from a number of surrounding Parishes in relation to these plans. Brief notes were taken at the meeting and circulated to members. Areas discussed included the status of the land, transport and travel, covenants and the maintenance of green areas.

IN BRIEF

Babergh Mid Suffolk Joint Local Plan: It was noted there has been a call for small development areas/sites.

Contact had been chased in relation to the timing of a Local Housing Needs Survey for the Village.

The Devolution Consultation form was completed with a consensus of members.

CANCER RESEARCH RACE NIGHT

A really enjoyable Race Night was held in the Village Hall on Friday 16th September. Well over 100 attended and a sum in excess of £3,000 was raised for Cancer Research UK

Do You Know Someone Eligible For The Walsh Trust Christmas Bonus?

Each Christmas the Walsh Trust, which has two parish council trustees and three others, gives out small cash bonuses to those over 80 who have lived in the village at least three years and who would welcome such a bonus. As the original charities were for providing food and fuel, the Trust gives a present to those who have previously had the bonus but are now in residential care. The income is very small and depending on how many are eligible the amount is normally around £20 for a single person and £25 for two people living in the same house. There is no official way we can find out who is over 80 so we rely on local knowledge and that means all of you.

So please let us know if you are going to be eighty or know someone who will be by Christmas. NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 14th September 2016

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PUBLIC FORUM

Nags Corner: Mr Stuart Davis is in talks with Travis Perkins regarding the possibility of their leaving. Mr Davis spoke of a potential housing development with a possible convenience store. Access (already granted under other plans by Babergh DC) would be onto the A134. Dwellings would be privately owned though shared ownership would be considered. While Mr Davis' instinct was that those in most need of were 'the squeezed middle' (30-somethings) and older people looking to downsize, he was looking for support and opinion from the community and the Parish Council. Councillors advised that Babergh has not yet set up the Housing Needs Survey; they were concerned that it might not be implemented in time to show local need.

Court Knoll: Andora Carver explained that three out of seven trenches have been opened. Volunteers had worked extremely hard in the hot and dusty conditions, greatly helped by the free bottled water donated by Blue Owl. Interesting features are emerging. Nick Carter and Joanne Robinson of Historic England visited the site and commented that it was of national importance. They praised the high standard of work and exemplary manner in which it was being carried out.

PARISH COUNCIL

No one has come forward to fill the position of Vice-Chair as yet. Mary George (Chair) raised the difficulties involved when the PC has a high volume of work or she is on holiday and asked councillors to consider whether they could come forward.

PLANNING

The following applications have been approved by Babergh DC: 14 The Westerings for a single-storey rear extension, 43 Bear Street for reducing an Acacia tree by a third, Jasmine Cottage, 32 Newlands Lane for a single storey side extension following demolition of existing garage and conservatory, Old Chapel Stoke Road for insertion of windows into the East and West elevations, and 4 Bures Road for a side extension subject to conditions including precise details of manufacturer, types and colours of external facing and roofing materials.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections to: **8 Jane Walker Park** for installation of a garden greenhouse, **Hollies Stoke Road** to remove Leylandii to ground level.

Councillors are considering applications at: The Manse, Bear Street for a single storey rear extension and Ricklands Bungalow for a new annexe and garage.

Councillors noted that a footpath at the **Great Horkesley** greenhouse site had been connected to a public right of way.

HIGHWAYS

A letter from Mr and Mrs Atkins of Hattens Stores raised concerns that no daytime parking spaces for passing trade are available near their shop.

Councillors felt strongly that local businesses should be supported and requested James Finch to explore the potential for a short stay parking restriction area via Suffolk CC.

Kathleen Cannings reported that the Hollyhocks decimated by weedkiller near St James Church earlier in the summer are showing signs of regeneration.

The PC is to write to SCC re the overgrown verges on the A134; they prevent thorough litter picking and reduce drivers' visibility.

James Finch said that implementation of a 40 mph limit on A 134 was in process.

The drain survey appears to have taken place. Councillors discussed how debris and gravel pours into the drains as the gutters are not cleared.

Martyn Booth explained that traffic on designated 'Quiet Lanes' has a 20mph voluntary limit with priority for non-vehicular traffic. Villages can have 'Quiet Lanes'; a sign showing the Quiet Lane status is installed at the start and end of the lane. Dedham AONB and Stour Valley Project support the scheme. James Finch advised that only 'U' roads can be considered for Quiet Lane status.

FOOTPATHS

SCC cleared the footpath and renewed wooden edging along the river by Anchor Bridge. Rotten planks at the north end of the flood channel bridge on Footpath 1 have been reported to Essex CC. Graham Walker confirmed that a proposed access near to Hullbacks in Wiston was a footpath only. Babergh and Mid Suffolk are promoting 'Suffolk Year of Walking'. The Parish already has Walk Leaders .

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Fairfield Playground: Gerry Battye reported that resurfacing is taking place. The balance beam needs installing, fake green matting in the boat needs replacing along with a wooden traffic bollard which had been shorn off by vandals.

Caley Green: The Environment Agency contacted Mary George as there were two instances of unauthorised cutting of reed beds affecting moorhens, invertebrates and fish beds. Councillors stated that under the Wildlife and Countryside Act, no work could be carried out without permission.

Councillors decided that nettles bordering the river should be cut when the grass is cut. The nettles obscure the view of the river, the swans and other wildlife.

IN BRIEF

Damage to plants, fruit cages and other vandalism at the allotments has been reported to the Police.

Graham Walker is seeking funding to help develop/implement plans for the Allotment field.

There had been a request for a dog waste bin near Wiston church. The PC will investigate whether Babergh would collect as bins have to be sited at a 'serviceable location'.

Attendance at the Village Cinema has been poor. 'A Walk in the Woods' on 30 September is going ahead but it will be the last film shown if numbers are not considerably improved!

The PC has approved the Community Council's request for permission for a banner for Fireworks Night on Caley Green.

A resident had reported to the Police that a large tub and tree had been pushed into the middle of the road in Bear Street late one night, clearly presenting a danger to traffic. When the resident followed up the call, the response from the Police was that 'no one had reported a missing tub and tree' with no comment on the potential danger. Mary added that not every instance of vandalism reported at the Allotments was recorded by the Police. The PC would write to Tim Passmore (Police Commissioner) and the Chief Constable to express concerns.

The response has been overwhelmingly positive and very heartening for all those involved in the campaign. We are now in a position to launch a Community Company and apply to the Post Office to run the business. We have met once again with the Post Office

authorities who are fully supportive. We will have to submit a business plan to the Post Office by March 2017 with a view to trading by March 2018 at the latest, under the terms of the current Post Office Network Transformation initiative. The community post office will run from the same premises and we expect the sorting office to remain in situ.

We are pleased to have the advice of the Plunkett Foundation, a charity with expertise in community-owned enterprises, who are able to assist in the formalities of setting up the Company.






Post Office Questionnaire Responses




What are you most likely to buy?




How often do you use the Post Office?




Future products/services you would like to see

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 7th September 2016 Vice Chairman: Colin Ramsell 264006 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Colin Ramsell welcomed members to the meeting.

MATTERS ARISING:

Executive Committee: Colin Ramsell reminded the meeting that the CC urgently requires more members who are members of village groups.

The Community Council was originally made up of a representative from every village group, which provided wide representation of residents. This 'bringing together' also enabled good cohesion between the groups and benefited all.

It was pointed out there have been several clashes of activities - most recently four society outings within 10 days - which it would be beneficial to all to avoid. Solutions which could help prevent this were discussed, including the discontinued village diary in the Post Office, the existing diary on naylandandwiston.net, the possibility of a diary on the Community Council website and a magnetic year planner in the Post Office. Maggie Ryan agreed to see whether there is scope to put a year planner up at the PO

FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES:

Spring/Summer Event: During discussions on future fundraising events it was agreed to move the CC's Fun Village Quiz to February. A decision would be made whether this takes effect in February 2017 or 2018 following the currently planned Quiz on 7th October.

Selling advance raffle tickets at Farmers' Market: The Farmers' Market organiser has agreed that the CC can sell raffle tickets and calendars ahead of the Quiz and Christmas Fayre from the Village Hall foyer during the Markets on 10th September, 8th October and 12th November.

It was noted that the Farmers' Markets have not been well supported recently and they will be reviewing whether they continue after December. They have asked for ideas which could help attract more visitors - if anyone has any ideas please contact justine@suffolkmarketevents.co.uk

Community Council History & Website: It was agreed to give the CC's history display another outing at the Christmas Favre

Lorraine said www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk is up-todate. A photo archive album of the Street Fayre is almost complete and will be added to the website, as will much of the CC's history in due course.

Community Defibrillator: This was a proposal for a community defibrillator sited at the Fire Station (not to be confused with the First Responders), which had been given approval by the Fire Service.

Neil Barbrook is keen to pursue this and grants may still be available from the British Heart Foundation and/or the Big Community Fund run by District Councils.

Questions were asked whether there was a need for a community defibrillator in Nayland and if people would actually use it? It was agreed Karen Elliott on behalf of First Response should be asked for their opinion in relation to these queries and response times. Once their views are confirmed Rachel Hitchcock agreed to research/seek advice from other villages who have a community defibrillator.

Save Our Post Office Campaign: Maggie Ryan reported on the current situation.

Over the summer period, 87 questionnaires have been returned, with sufficient volunteers coming forward to launch a community enterprise. An analysis of the feedback received will be included within the Community Times. There is an informal meeting scheduled in September for members of the current SOPO committee to welcome those who have offered to help on the executive team, which will in due course form the basis of a Board of Directors of a community company. Meetings have been arranged with the Post Office and others

during September to take things forward. The project is still in its early days, but all the signs so far are positive.

RECENT ACTIVITIES:

Street Fayre - Sunday 17th July: Colin Ramsell said a huge thanks and well done are due to Claire Buller and the team - that was followed by an enthusiastic round of applause. It had been a fantastic community event and had received many compliments... including would there be a Christmas Street Fayre!

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Village Hall Endowment Fund: The VHMC asked for £1,000 towards this fund; at the May meeting the decision was deferred, at the July meeting it was agreed to write formally to the VHMC treasurer stating that: "Prior to consideration of further grants being awarded to the Village Hall Endowment Fund the Community Council requests official written confirmation, sent to both the CC and Parish Council, regarding their involvement in the Endowment Fund.

Conservation Society: Reserve fund for Court Knoll exploration
The CC recently awarded a grant of £500 to the Conservation
Society towards archaeological exploration at Court Knoll.
They feel they have a great opportunity to discover as much as
they can about this piece of Nayland history.

The archaeologist has advised that they ought to have in place some further contingency funds to be used for post excavation analysis of objects found during the dig. They are aiming to have access to a further £5,000. So far the Conservation Society has agreed to contribute up to £3,000, and they have had assurances totalling another £1,000. They are asking if the Community Council would consider putting a further £500 on one side for use if it is required. This was agreed

TREASURER'S REPORT: Maggie Ryan gave her report.

The grant for the Nayland History Exhibition has been paid, the Church Hall hire amounting to £110 rather than the £150 anticipated; which offset against donations of £135 received in March, means that the event was self-funding.

The Street Fayre drew in £1108 of income and £1776 of expenditure, generating a net loss of only £667 against an anticipated expense budget of £1000 due to careful management by Claire Buller and her team. It should be noted that this year's accounts show only £776 of expenses for the Fayre, the 2015 accounts having taken the expense accrual of £1000.

Main income includes: Community Times £2,462.50, Street Fayre £1,108.68, Calendar £965, Donation £135. Main expenditure includes: Community Times £841, Street Fayre £776.24, Calendar £70, Grants £3760 (Village Hall Kitchen £3,500, Mother & Toddler Group £150, Nayland History Exhibition £110). We hold £444 for First Response, £270 for the Services Fund and the following grant; £1,000 for the Conservation Society Court Knoll. **Therefore unencumbered assets are £18,469.53.**

Introduction of online banking: The mandate for online banking has been returned by NatWest pending an additional signatory and will be resubmitted.

Bank Signatories: The CCLA Deposit Account still requires a change of signatory.

CC Insurance: A new insurance policy has been taken out covering the Bonfire and Fireworks event, but requiring formal risk assessments for all CC events. The premium has increased this year from £141 to £392 because we are no longer buying an umbrella policy from Community Action Suffolk.

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks was very grateful to everyone who sent in photos of the Street Fayre, especially Julie Wilkinson who had provided a fantastic selection. This has resulted in a pretty comprehensive record of this memorable event



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Lorraine would be grateful to receive photos of the Quiz, Fireworks Night and the Christmas Fayre for the CT and website .

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said calendars are on sale at village shops. £300 was been raised on sponsorship, sales on the 2017 calendar so far amount to £295. Please let Lorraine know if you could sell calendars at an event you are organising.

Forthcoming Activities:

Task Lists for Events: It had been suggested having a task list for each event would be a good idea and would help new coordinators to pick up the reins. Firework Night and Christmas Fayre task lists are underway, Lorraine will liaise with Rachel on a list for the Quiz.

Risk Assessments for Events: Our new insurers require a risk assessment is developed for each event organised. Iain Wright kindly agreed to produce a risk assessment for Firework Night. Claire Buller would make enquiries about a template for a risk assessment for the Quiz.

Fun Quiz - *Friday 7th October*: Rachel Hitchcock is leading the quiz and plans are in hand. Please encourage people to participate. Table application forms are available at Forget Me Not or *www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk/Events*.

Claire kindly agreed to run the raffle. There will be a first prize of £50. Donations of other prizes would be very welcome and can be dropped off to Claire at 107 Bear Street (left in the side porch if out) or to Colin Ramsell 9 Birch Street (left by back door if out).

Bonfire & Fireworks - Saturday 5th November: Iain Wright is coordinating the event.

After last year's bad weather it was felt more promotion is needed to build visitors confidence: permission from the PC for a banner on Caley Green banner has been confirmed, the banner has been purchased.

<u>Volunteers are still needed</u> for setting up in the afternoon, on the gate from 6pm-7pm, and selling drinks, glo-necklaces, etc and litter picking the next morning for 9am.

Christmas Fayre - Saturday 3rd December: The role of coordinator is to be split: Rachel Hitchcock kindly agreed to manage the table bookings and advance tasks, Claire Buller and Julie Clark will kindly coordinate on the day.

Father Christmas will be in attendance and Jayne Kennedy has confirmed Nayland School will perform again. Volunteers are needed to help with refreshments and manning the raffle.

SOCIETY REPORTS

Conservation Society: Andora Carver thanked the CC for supporting the archaeological exploration of Court Knoll. This is day 5 and they have 3 trenches open. They have had 70 volunteers participating - if anyone else would like to help contact Sally Bartrum 262978 or Andora 262970. Visitors are welcome on Fridays and Sundays at 3pm. The archaeologist, Tim Dennis and the survey team will be speaking at their open meeting on 10th October and will be able to give some news on the exploration.

Parish Council: Martyn Booth said their Summer meeting included a briefing on the devolution consultation. They discussed the Quiet Lanes Scheme, they are concerned by the amount of litter by Nags Corner, there is no news on the Allotment Field project. He has no information on future proposals for Caley Green or the likely date of implementation of a speed limit on the A134.

Royal British Legion: Alex Murrison said integration proposals with the Women's Section are on course for finalisation by 1st October and developments for branch participation are awaited.




new LED lights have been installed in the toilets, the bar has been redecorated and framed Nayland calendar photos hung. The meeting room has been refurbished.

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


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
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A PLATINUM **CELEBRATION**



Flower Show – as reported on page 34. Once again HortSoc has been very lucky with the weather; the sun beamed down on us for a very enjoyable coach outing to Wrest Park in Bedfordshire and Hopleys Plants & Garden at Much Hadham.

Wrest Park has over 90 acres of beautiful gardens, grand avenues, an impressive vista form the stately house across the long water to the baroque pavilion, colourful parterres, walled garden and fragrant roses. Lancelot 'Capability' Brown, was hired in 1758 to make the boundary canals more natural and soften the edges of the garden and remodel the park, while preserving the heart of the formal layout. The sweeping lawns and woodland play host to fascinating pavilions and follies with beautiful interiors. The gardens and Dairy Sculpture Gallery contain a remarkable collection of 18th- and 19th -century statues. The house was built in 1834 and is the third on this site; it is a rare example in England of the French chateau style. There was an interesting display about the history of the estate and the de Grey family who lived there for over 600 years.

In complete contrast Hopleys in Much Hadham has a fine four-acre garden with some impressive trees and conifers, sweeping lawns and beds planted with a variety of shrubs and perennials. The garden and nursery was established in 1968 and offers an extensive choice of hardy shrubs and perennials, with many half-hardy plants too. We enjoyed a guided tour of this tranquil garden before wandering around the plant centre and enjoying delicious home-made cakes. This was a delightful and interesting day out with something for everyone.

As autumn beckons our activities will retreat indoors; our autumn speaker, on18th October, will be Simon White who will give an illustrated talk entitled 'Highlights of Chelsea & Hampton Court'. This is open to non-




Those who came along on the trip to Pin Mill enjoyed a pleasant day; some doing sketches others exploring the surroundings and taking photos to work from later.



NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

UNAUTHORISED REED CUTTING ON CALEY GREEN

Many readers will be aware that a group of people carried out unauthorised work on the river banks and reed beds on Caley Green during August. This was done without the consent of either the landowner, Suffolk County Council, or the licensee, Nayland with Wissington Parish Council. It has been reported to the Environment Agency, Suffolk County Council and the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley AONB management team. The river and bankside reed beds provide valuable natural habitats. Before the Environment Agency does any work on the river and riverbank an ecological survey is always carried out. The Agency also undertakes work at a time when wildlife breeding habitats suffer the least damage. Obviously no survey was done when the unauthorised group cut down reeds, pulled out reed bed roots and dumped the debris on Caley Green. The Parish Council has now arranged for the debris to be cleared away by contractors, an unnecessary expense borne by all Nayland with Wissington residents via the annual precept. The Senior Property Manager at Suffolk County Council has requested that any information about suspicious behaviour should be reported to the SCC property maintenance helpdesk. The Parish Council hopes that there will be no re-occurence of the unauthorised and illegal removal of riverside vegetation on Caley Green.

No-one should undertake any works on any land or any riverbank without the consent of the owner of that land.

The destruction of wildlife habitats can be an offence contrary to the Wildlife and Countryside Act.



Garden Notes

Writing at a time when the drought appears to have broken, and some decent rain is falling the OM/S wonders how much permanent damage has resulted. He has already suffered two or three mysterious deaths of well established shrubs, but that was some months ago.

Recently he discovered something he found rather surprising, and is passing it on in case anyone else cares to try it out. About five weeks ago he picked a bunch of Moroccan Mint. This is a good strong form of the common Spearmint, Mentha Spicata, and despite its name it doesn't come from Morocco, though it's doubtless used there in tea and various dishes. He put it in a jar of water to keep fresh for a day before his daughter took it back to London. She left it behind, so it remained in the jar. About a week or so later he noticed that it was beginning to put out roots. Over the next three weeks they continued to grow so he has potted up several healthy-looking plants. which he will continue to keep fairly moist.

Taking cuttings in water is not a unique method of propagation; many years ago his parents were given this tip for Hebes by Mrs Lloyd, of Great Dixter, mother of Christopher Lloyd [how's that for a bit of horticultural name-dropping].

Mint will of course grow easily from root-cuttings but will take much longer to make plants.

While on the subject of Mints, there are a number of different species, not all of them edible, but all highly aromatic; Apple Mint, Ginger Mint, Peppermint, Water Mint, Pineapple Mint, and so on. An interesting one which readers may not have come across is Mentha Requienii, the Corsican Mint, a mat-forming perennial which has colonised part of a gravel path here. It has minute round leaves, probably about 2mm in diameter and tiny lilaccoloured flowers. It will tolerate being walked on, when it gives off its strong scent, and might well be a better bet than the much-hyped Chamomile Lawn. The OM/S has never seen a decent example of the latter.

A question often asked is when to trim Lavender. The short answer is from now on, and the sooner the better. It should never be cut back hard, so that the bare wood is exposed; that will probably kill it.

If the warm weather is going to continue it might be a good idea to sow some hardy annuals. Provided we don't get an exceptionally hard winter they should get off to a good start next year. The old fashioned flowers such as Marigold, Cornflower, Candytuft and such like are the best ones to try.

THE JANE WALKER HOSPITAL

October 1991, twenty-five years ago, was a sad time for the community as this was when the Jane Walker Hospital closed. The photograph of the farewell party shows some of the many staff, past and present, who worked there, including 100 year old Florence Nevard who ran the hospital laundry for many years. On her right is Joyce Dingwall, Assistant Administrator, and on her left the Chairman of the Regional Health Authority, Sir Colin Walker.

The hospital was founded in 1901 as the East Anglian Sanatorium by Dr Jane Walker, one of the first women in this country to qualify as a Doctor of Medicine. She pioneered the new open-air system for the treatment of tuberculosis in England and built her own sanatorium at Wiston. It became a fully self-supporting institution, caring for adults and children and then army personnel during the First World War. After Jane Walker's death in 1938 it became the British Legion Sanatorium and then in 1959 a NHS hospital for people with learning difficulties, called appropriately the Jane Walker Hospital. Over the years the number of patients fell and the health authority decided to close it in 1991. The remaining staff and residents were transferred to a purpose-built complex in Ipswich, the hospital was sold and the main building converted to several elegant homes. Most of the hospital buildings behind the main block were demolished and replaced by the new houses we see today.

From the beginning the Sanatorium employed many people in the area and local businesses benefitted, for example, Norfolks buses provided transport for the many visitors; the San was a good customer for Kerridges, the Nayland butcher, and Mary Richards' family at Smokey Farm supplied milk. The nearest pub, the Fox, was well used by the staff. The House at the Corner on Bures Road (now Pound House) was a cafe, library and social centre for the staff and Rushbanks Farmhouse and Maltings Farmhouse were used for staff accommodation. In later years the hospital built bungalows for staff in the grounds.

Shirley Scarlett was one of the last members of staff at the hospital and has many happy memories of her time working

there. She remembers everyone worked very hard but it was a very relaxed and happy environment for both staff and patients. There was a lively social club which Shirley said was open all hours and never seemed to close! The fetes in the hospital grounds were very popular events and people came from far and wide. In the 1950s the sanatorium was still run by the British Legion and Shirley has a film of fetes held at that time when there were grand processions of all the local branches of the British Legion. Her father, Dr John McMichael, as well as being Nayland's GP for 25 years, was President of the Nayland RBL, Vice President of the Suffolk RBL and Medical Superintendent at the hospital for 21 years. There is a memorial plaque in his name in the grounds.

Mini buses brought staff to work from Sudbury and Colchester, calling at local villages on the way. Shirley remembers the winter of 1990/91 when the hospital was snowed in for 3 days. Peter Collins, the bus driver, picked up the staff but got stuck on Harpers Hill and a tractor had to rescue them. Shirley slept on a camp bed as she couldn't get home, but she said the staff and patients all had a wonderful time!

Dr Walker was buried at Wiston Church but many of the Sanatorium patients were buried in Nayland's old burial ground. This was extended in 1968 and an area was set aside for the patients. When the hospital closed the Nayland blacksmith, Stuart Pickup, designed and made a special memorial which was dedicated at a service officiated by the Rev Stranack.



THE BENEFITS OF ROUGH GRASSLAND, RIVERSIDE **VEGETATION AND EVEN NETTLES**

We as humans have never had more ability to control our

environment. Sixty percent of our recorded wildlife is in decline. Could these two facts be linked? There has been a decline in rough grassland and riverside vegetation over many years. Some might think that the loss of rough grassland and riverside vegetation is a good thing and that the countryside looks a lot better for it. Some might argue that land in a nationally designated Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB)

should be neat and tidy and not 'spoiled' by unsightly rough

grassland.

As someone that works to conserve and enhance the AONB I would disagree. AONB's statutory purpose is to conserve and enhance its natural beauty and special qualities. The natural beauty of the Dedham Vale, according a recent study commissioned by the AONB, notes rough grassland contributes to its natural beauty and special qualities. The loss of such areas can lead to a loss of the AONBs special qualities.

What this rather technical assessment is saying is that rough grassland contributes to what is the essence of the Dedham Vale. Rough grassland is the home of countless insects and small mammals and hence animals further up the food chain

which so many people enjoy watching.

It can be argued that the conservation and enhancement of wildlife areas such as rough grassland and riverside vegetation contributes to our well-being. We are more likely to get out walking and cycling in areas that are home to wildlife, thus improving our mental and physical health. Visitors will be attracted to natural beauty which makes our shops and pubs viable. There are some steps in this argument but we must look after the foundations of our environment to ensure the

more obvious benefits are there for us to enjoy, don't forget that 60% of our recorded wildlife is in decline.

Similarly riverside vegetation is home to a wide variety of wildlife, both on the ground and in the water. Perhaps not so obvious is the benefits created by river edge vegetation. This sort of vegetation can create a wildlife habitat, (for spawning and feeding areas) help keep water temperatures cooler to benefit wildlife; slow the flow of nutrients into the river that are costly to remove for water companies (and ultimately reflected in our water bills), help maintain bank stability (particularly important where there are riverside footpaths) and potentially alert the unwary to where the river edge is. Not bad for a free resource.

Both rough grassland and riverside areas may be home to nettles. Perhaps two of my first lessons in the countryside were that nettles sting and docks reduce the pain. It was only later I learned that nettles are vital to any healthy environment. Nettles support over 40 species of insects including some of butterflies, provide a vital source of food in late summer for seed eating birds and overwintering sites for aphids that provide food for the much loved ladybird and woodland birds in spring.

We all have it in our power to contribute in a small way to the natural beauty and special qualities of the Dedham Vale. Whether it's in your garden, or a community owned or managed space, leave space for wildlife and enjoy the benefits of rough grassland, riverside vegetation and even nettles, just remember not to get too close to the nettles.

River Stour 500 Trees

The Rivers Stour, Brett and Box are set to benefit from a wide range of

environmental improvements through the planting of 500 riverside trees. The Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and Stour Valley Project in partnership with the Environment Agency has been awarded £3,500 from Essex & Suffolk Water through their Branch Out Fund to enable the project to go ahead. The response from landowners has been terrific with over 40 coming forward to request trees. Tree planting will go ahead this winter after careful selection of the most appropriate sites.

The project will be focussing on a stretch of the River Stour from upstream of Stratford St. Mary to Sudbury, the River Brett downstream of Lavenham and the River Box downstream from Little Waldingfield. Four landowners from Nayland have requested trees so the landscape in the local area is set to benefit as well. A mix of native broadleaved tree species and large shrubs will be planted including Black Poplar, disease resistant Elms, Field Maple, Common Alder, Hazel amongst others.

"The planting of Riparian Trees will help to benefit the ecology of the River Stour and its tributaries in many ways and add to the quality of the nationally protected AONB" said River Stour Project Officer Alex Moore da Luz.

STATUTORY CONSULTATION FOR A PROPOSED NEW 40MPH SPEED LIMIT ON THE A134 BETWEEN NAYLAND - HARPERS HILL & NEWTON - SUDBURY ROAD

Suffolk County Council proposes to introduce a new 40mph speed limit along two sections of the A134. This is in response to the recommendations made after a Speed Limit Assessment was carried out along the A134 between Nayland and Sudbury.

In the first section: Where a National Speed Limit of 60mph currently applies, a speed reduction to 40mph, is proposed. Starting from the Suffolk County border in Nayland, following in a northerly direction to Harpers Hill, for an approximate length of 1.42 kilometres [to approximately Townland Barn], after which the National Speed Limit of 60mph would resume again.

In the second section: Where a National Speed Limit of 60mph currently applies, a speed reduction to 40mph is proposed. Starting on the Newton Parish boundary line, at a point where a current 30m ph speed limit terminates and the National Speed Limit of 60mph then applies in the Sudbury Road. From this point the proposed 40mph speed restriction will follow in a north-westerly direction for a length of approximately 1.2 kilometres [to approximately Wyvale Garden Centre], after which the current National Speed Limit of 60mph would resume again.

This is proposed because although the 60mph National Speed

Limit currently applies, the proposal to reduce the National Speed Limit of 60mph to 40mph along these 2 sections of the A134 is in order to greatly improve traffic and road safety. By introducing a new 40mph speed limit the route can be signed in accordance with the current legislation, which would enable '40' (mph) regulatory terminal and repeater signs to be erected.

Such signing would serve as a reminder to motorists that 40mph is not only the legal limit, but is also an appropriate speed for the nature of the road. This would also enhance pedestrian and cyclist safety in the absence of any dedicated facilities.

The extent of the proposed 40mph speed limit is outlined on the enclosed drawing No.130693/03 Statutory Consultation Plan. 

Martin, Bishop of St Edmundsbury and Ipswich, assisted by the Archdeacon of Sudbury David led the service as Mark was presented with the symbols of Christian ministry by young and not so young, representatives of the five parishes. Civic leaders and representatives of other churches were there to add their welcome to this lovely corner of the world. Our thanks to all who provided the refreshments for the reception afterwards.

He was also presented with a large hamper of locally produced food and drink to help him settle into his new home at the Vicarage in Nayland. He

was then advised that when he was visited by the Rural Dean, Martin, there should be a can of Adnam's beer on the table. Whether this is official church policy or just wishful thinking, was not absolutely clear!

Many of the congregation had come from Lavenham, where Revd Mark served his curacy, and Mark's other parishes of Whitton and Great Cornard on his journey to ministry, to support him as he begins his new ministry and to show their respect, love and thanks for the time he had spent with them. They passed on the useful information that he makes a mean curry, and is in general, a more than competent cook. Mark is a Suffolk boy, from Ipswich and before entering the ministry worked for Aviva, in insurance. He is an Ipswich football supporter and thus by definition, an optimist.

Mark has a big heart, with a love for Christ and his people,



not just here but in less privileged parts of the world and is active in supporting co-operation and assistance to provide such basics as clean water and sanitation for the poorest of communities. Hence his choice of Tearfund's Toilet twinning project as one of the two beneficiaries of the evening's collection. The other was the Suffolk Historic Churches roof alarm fund. Lavenham, like many other Suffolk churches, including Polstead a few years ago, has been the victim of roof lead theft, so he knows that the high costs of replacement are far beyond most congregations.

We are delighted to have Revd Mark as our new parish priest. He is here not just for those who regularly attend church but for all who live or work in our communities. If you see him out and about, do feel free to stop and say hello as he gets to know us.

Feedback from James Finch - Your Stour Valley County Councillor

Government Devolution consultation closes but Suffolk residents can still give their views

Over the last seven weeks people across Norfolk and Suffolk have been offering their views and feedback on a proposed devolution deal and associated governance arrangements for the two counties. The consultation closed at the end of the day on Tuesday 23 August.

Devolution is about transferring certain decision-making powers and funding down from Central Government to a local area. It means that decisions are taken close to where they have an effect.

The majority of councils across Norfolk and all in Suffolk, along with the New Anglia Local Enterprise Partnership supported the deal and agreed to ask the public for their views.

Key elements of proposed Norfolk/Suffolk deal are:

- £25m funding each year for the next 30 years (£750m) to support economic growth, development of local infrastructure and jobs (this will increase the local economy to £43bn and create 95,000 jobs by 2026)
- £130m investment over five years to support the building of new homes across Norfolk and Suffolk
- Over the lifetime of the deal around 200,000 homes could be delivered
- Control of a £225m transport budget for the next four years

- Control of an existing c£20m annual adult skills fund to ensure the training offer matches the needs of local businesses and the local labour market
- Control of an existing c£2m annual Apprenticeship Grant for employers

As part of the consultation, people have been asked for their views on more decisions being taken locally, rather than at central government and whether they support the creation of a combined authority chaired by a directly elected Mayor for the two counties.

Over 2500 submissions were made as part of the consultation by people completing the online survey. Ipsos-Mori have also been carrying out more than 6000 phone surveys across the two counties to ensure decision makers have a representative sample of views.

Suffolk County Council plans to continue its own consultation until October when Councillors will be asked to give the proposals final approval. The consultation results will soon go live on www.suffolk.gov.uk

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A SEASON OF REMEMBERING: All Saints, All Souls and Remembrance Sunday

No Christian is solitary. Through baptism we become members one of another in Christ, members of a company of saints whose mutual belonging transcends death

All Saints' Day and the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed on All Souls' Day both celebrate this mutual belonging. All Saints' Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is an opportunity to give thanks for that grace, and for the wonderful ends to which it shapes a human life; it is a time to be encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that sanctity may grow in the ordinary circumstances, as well as the extraordinary crises, of human living. The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed celebrates the saints in a more local and intimate key. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life, or who nurtured us in faith.

Redemption is a work of God's grace; it is God who redeems us in Christ and there is nothing to be done beyond what Christ has done. But we still wait for the final consummation of God's new creation in Christ; those who are Christ's, whether or not they have passed through death, are joined in prayer that God's kingdom will be revealed finally and in all its fullness. We also sense that it is a fearful thing to come before the unutterable goodness and holiness of God, even for those who are redeemed in Christ; that it is searing as well as life-giving to experience God's mercy; and this instinct also is expressed in the service on All Souls' Day.

Remembrance Sunday goes on to explore the theme of memory, both corporate and individual, as we confront issues of war and peace, loss and self-gift, memory and forgetting.

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
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
