NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Extract of Draft Minutes for Meeting: 11th October 2017 (Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PUBLIC FORUM

A resident had observed notices displayed at various places including Caley Green. The Chairman confirmed permission was not sought.

Representatives from The Anchor attended to discuss their application. Members took the opportunity to ask questions. These focused on the car park proposal including lighting and access. Access would include walking along land managed by the Parish Council. There was also reference to any flood risk.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Councillor Melanie Barrett attended and spoke about her report covering a potential merger with Mid Suffolk and it was for Cabinet to decide the next step. The move to Endeavour House is underway. The Boundary Commission were recommending District Councillors are reduced from 43 to 32 and that Nayland with Wissington is linked with Stoke by Nayland and Bures. Concern was expressed that a merger is being considered against the wishes of residents.

PARISH COUNCIL

The Chairman shared with the meeting the resignation of Russell Badrick due to his personal circumstances, work commitments and lack of time to commit to the role.

PLANNING

Babergh has confirmed permission had been granted for a summerhouse at **100 Bear Street** [*DC*/17/03996] and a single storey rear extension and other alterations including Listed Building Consent at **Star Cottage**, **81 Bear Street** [*DC*/1703196/97].

Regarding recent applications councillors had no objections to works to trees at **5 Gravel Hill** [DC/17/04668]. Councillors had no objections for Listed Building Consent at **Victoria Cottage**, **18 Court Street** [DC/17/04886] to re-render front and side of building, remove old brackets and repaint the four front windows and exterior of property to match existing subject to the appropriate render mix as the one proposed is a very strong cement based mix.

Anchor Inn, 26 Court Street [*DC*/17/0361]_ This application for extensions, timber decked seating area and walkway and land north of Horkesley Road as a car park was discussed during the meeting. Concerns were expressed that the application is still not detailed enough for this Council consider the impact at the location. The Parish Council fully understood the need to improve the facilities on the site. At this stage it was agreed to object to the plans as presented and seek further detail.

New Farm, Harpers Hill [*DC*/17/04206] This re-consultation for outline permission for 9 new dwellings was discussed during the meeting. Members agreed to maintain this Parish Council's response dated 15th September and to state that we believe the critical highways report reinforces the concerns of this Parish Council.

JOINT LOCAL PLAN CONSULTATION

It was agreed for the working party of Gerry Battye, Kathleen Cannings and Martyn Booth to produce a draft response by 7 days before the November meeting to enable the final wording to be agreed at that meeting.

POTENTIAL MERGER OF THE DISTRICT COUNCILS

The Chairman referred to the forthcoming cabinet meeting on a potential merger of the District Councils. She confirmed there was no opportunity for us to comment at this stage. **HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY**

This Council and Stoke by Nayland Parish Council were waiting for confirmation from the District Council that the grant will be allocated. This will be required in writing. It is recommended that publicity is arranged 3 months before the Survey is conducted. The importance of alerting residents around the time of the survey was stressed by members from previous experience.

ALLOTMENTS AND GLEBE FIELD

lan Harris reported on developments including the fixing of the gate and that he had mowed the permissive path. The tenant farmer intends to continue topping the field and grazing. **FOOTPATHS**

The eroding permissive path has been reported to the landowner as agreed at last meeting. The Stour Valley Group had helped clear the nature reserve and Footpath 9. **HIGHWAYS**

Reports had been received from County Highways that they had investigated matters and were not taking action. One of concern is the edges of Wiston Road that are eroding. Martyn Booth explained the rutting is very deep and full of water. The length is 10 to 15 yards. It was agreed to dispute their decision by contacting the Area Highways Manager. It was agreed to leave the petition supporting the Sudbury by-pass in the Post Office. A report of a car driver sounding his horn at early times on a regular basis was mentioned; full details will be passed to the Police to investigate.

During a site meeting earlier in the year, the County Engineer was looking into the electrical supply for a potential new light in the vicinity of the one to be turned off . It was agreed to chase this information . The work to the light outside Forget me Not has been chased. A decision needs to be made about a trial period of switching the light off as above.

VILLAGE HALL

Mrs Fuller gave a report and it was agreed the Parish Council should coordinate hedge cutting. A barn dance is being planned to raise funds for the hall roof.

BURIAL GROUND

The Chairman was carrying out the usual annual review with Contractors at the Burial Ground ahead of the Finance Committee Meeting. It was agreed for the Clerk to follow up quotes for the Burial Ground path

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Following the recent review by Gerry Battye, it was recommended to include the regular cleaning of the play equipment as part of the annual tenders. The Fairfield signage will need to be considered by Finance Committee in respect of budget for next Financial year.

The round seat on Caley Green needs maintenance. The Environment Agency have been reminded about the damaged wooden structure protecting the river bank on Caley Green.

The Friends of Caley Green have liaised with the various agencies and were carrying out work to remove some vegetation from the river. Due to reductions to funding, the Environment Agency no longer undertake this work to any great extent. Residents have therefore volunteered to step in with the appropriate guidance and permissions. Gerry Battye explained the work undertaken and residents were present at the Parish Council Meeting to answer any questions.

LITTERPICK

The Community Litter pick had been scheduled and the village now looks after the litter picking equipment.

PLANNING

Reviewing planning decisions from Babergh Mary George reported permission had been granted subject to conditions at **Dwelling behind Bear House** [DC/17/04048] for erection of detached dwelling and ancillary access arrangements from Gravel Hill. Conditions imposed relate to implementation of a programme of archaeological work, access and parking and external facing and roofing materials.

Two discharge of conditions had been granted; at **Jasmine Cottage, 32 Newlands Lane** [*DC*/17/03966] relating to condition 3 (materials) for application B/17/01146 for the erection of a garden store and at **100 Bear Street** [*DC*/17/04826] relating to condition 3 (materials) for application [*DC*/17/03996] for the erection of a summerhouse.

Regarding recent applications councillors had no objections to Listed Building Consent at **2 High Street** [*DC*/17/05006] for the erection of a carport, at **43 Bear Street** [*DC*/17/05199] to reduce the crown by 40% on a Yew tree protected under a Tree Preservation Order and at **104 Bear Street** [*DC*/17/05405] to pollard a Lime tree protected by a Tree Preservation Order. Councillors had no objections regarding an application at **Westwood, Harpers Hill** [*DC*/17/04908] for erection of replacement two-storey dwelling and two bay cartlodge and store with ancillary living accommodation over (demolition of existing dwelling and two outbuildings). (Amended siting to that approved under application B/16/00288).

The Council's response to the **Babergh and Mid Suffolk Joint** Local Plan consultation was agreed and will be submitted. HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

The Council has not received all the information it needs to launch the Housing Needs Survey. It is therefore necessary to postpone this to early 2018.

RECREATION & OPEN SPACES

The annual Safety inspection at Fairfield recreation ground will take place soon. The Environment Agency have been reminded about the damaged wooden structure protecting the river bank on Caley Green.

VILLAGE HALL

Trica Fuller attended a Community Action Suffolk conference which gave some useful advice about grants and fund raising. Iain Wright will attend the January PC meeting to discuss proposals for a replacement roof.

IN BRIEF

Confirmation is being sought of the electricity supply to establish where it would be feasible to install a replacement streetlight column in Court Street.

Mary George reported the annual review of maintenance for the Burial Ground has been discussed with contractors; trees overhanging the cremation area require cutting back.

Councillors said the Community Council should be congratulated for the success of Fireworks night and thanked for an effective litterpick afterwards.

Nayland Community Store Ltd "Save Our Post Office" Campaign update 30th October 2017

Our NCS Ltd directors have been in dialogue with Area Field Transformation team who have gained permission from the Post Office's central Finance unit to allow our Community Benefit Society submission to go to final stages. We expect PO Ltd to take two or three weeks to respond to our re-application. The delays from Post Office Ltd inefficiencies over the summer cost us around ten weeks, but once approval is given we will need to act quickly to meet the Network Transformation deadline of 31 March 2018. Our timeline has been recalibrated into early part 2018 when we can expect to take on the lease and undertake the refurbishment works. The draft lease is with our solicitor for final checks.

Meanwhile we are planning our next steps including the preparation of the share prospectus; resourcing and training volunteers; and thinking through our non-Post Office retail offering mindful of the recent closure of Hatten's Village Store.

We are delighted to say that combined with our funding from the Community Council and Transition Navland has now reached £53.166.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 30th October 2017 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting. **MATTERS ARISING:**

Executive Committee:

Legal Representative: Rachel Hitchcock advised that no-one with a legal background had come forward to offer advice or point us in the right direction if the need occurred for 2018. This position is stipulated in our Constitution but does not require any regular commitment. Please contact Rachel if you know of anyone who may be willing to help.

The Community Council Executive would welcome more members of village groups to join them as members of the CC. Fundraising Activities & Events: The CC are focused on events for 2018 but ideas for fund raising projects to benefit the CC are always welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Rachel Hitchcock has been liaising with the Community Heartbeat Trust for advice on the provision of a community defibrillator to be sited at the Fire Station. The cost of a complete package (defibrillator, installation, maintenance, training, ongoing support, etc) would be £2,200. She is in the process of applying for Awards For All Lottery Funding. Although it is not conditional that applicants raise funds themselves it may be advantageous to do so. Rachel has leaflets and two collection boxes to promote the project which will be located in the Post Office and another venue. Information will be included in the CT. The CC will consider whether to commit funds to this. Maggie Ryan agreed to be the organisational contact on the Awards for All application as Rachel is the application contact.

It has been recommended that two community defibrillators would be better to serve the village as the recommend time for attendance is 5 minutes. The idea of a second defibrillator, perhaps located at the Village Hall, will be considered further. Rachel will circulate further information including ongoing costs to the Exec.

Community Post Office: Maggie Ryan reported on the current situation.

Our Nayland Community Store Ltd directors have been in dialogue with the Post Office's Area Field Transformation team who have gained permission from their central Finance team to allow our CBS submission to go to final stage approval. We believe that there is now a genuine willingness from Post Office Ltd to make this community project happen. We expect Post Office Ltd to take two or three weeks to respond to our re-application. Since delays from Post Office inefficiencies over the summer have cost us around two months, we will need to act quickly if approval is given. Our timeline has been recalibrated into early 2018 when we can expect to take on the lease and undertake the refurbishment works. The draft lease is with our solicitor for final checks.

Meanwhile we are planning our next steps including the preparation of the share prospectus; resourcing and training volunteers; and thinking through our non-Post Office retail offering mindful of the recent closure of Hatten's Village Store. See page 7 for a full update.

Christmas Tree: Claire Buller confirmed the tree will arrive for erection on Sunday 10th December at 9am. Luke Rumbelow, Karen Tranter and Colin Moule agreed to assist - further volunteers are welcome to come along. Bryan Smith will liaise with Nayland Dental Clinic. The tree will be taken down on Sunday 7th January at 9am.

Village Hall Garden Working Party: A small but dedicated group of volunteers attended including Will Hitchcock and Bryan Smith.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Maggie Ryan gave her report.

Current Position: Community Times profit so far is running at £1,298.50; the Calendar has moved into profit. Expenditure in this period includes a share towards the community website of £526.35. All but £50 of the April cheques lost in clearing has been recovered.

The accounts show reserves of £16,598.37 represented by: Deposit a/c monies £15,584.65, Current a/c monies £987.72, Cash in hand £26. From these reserves, we hold £188.50 for the Services Fund, and an outstanding grant of up to £196 for Baby & Toddler Group. Unencumbered assets are therefore £16,213.87.

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Nayland Baby & Toddler Group: In July the CC agreed to fund the arrears on their hire of the village hall and future costs to a maximum of £646; £450 of this has been paid. Karen Tranter was delighted to report that this term they have been very busy with 15-16 families attending so they are pleased to say they will not require further grant monies. The CC congratulated the group on their hard work and success.

Nayland & Wiston Community Website: The CC previously agreed to a quarter of the costs of the website (shared with the Village Hall, Church Hall and Parish Council).

The new community website - naylandandwiston.net - is now completed. Justin Dowding has done an excellent job designing the site for viewing on all mobile devices and incorporating useful and user friendly features. He liaised with hall booking secretaries and others who can add information regarding their organisations. If you haven't visited the website please do so.

Luncheon Club for Over 60s Christmas Party: Bryan Smith requested a grant to help cover costs of their Christmas Party. The Luncheon club is run by Olga Alexander: with a band of volunteers monthly lunches are held including a Summer Tea Party and a Christmas Party. It was agreed to grant £200 towards the costs of the Christmas Party

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks said two more annual advertisers have not renewed, there are three new advertisers starting. Please recommend the CT to potential advertisers - a selling point is that residents tend to retain the magazine to refer to useful information rather than other magazines which are soon assigned to the recycle bin. It is also available to view online.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said calendar sales to date have just taken the project into profit. It is hoped sales will pick up towards the year end as people start thinking about 2018. She pointed out Blue Owl decided not to assist in selling calendars after all and hoped potential sales lost following the closure of Hatten's would be picked up at Forget Me Not and the Post Office. The Team would appreciate help selling calendars at events - if you can help please let Lorraine know. .

Forthcoming Activities:

Bonfire & Fireworks: Sunday 5th November. Iain Wright is co -ordinating the event. Claire is leading on BBQ, hot chocolate, etc. Tricia Hall is organising mulled wine.

Christmas Fayre: Saturday 2nd December. Rachel Hitchcock is co-ordinating the event. Father Christmas and Nayland School will be attending. Several stallholders have confirmed; there is very limited availability now for tables at the Christmas Fayre. Table application forms are available on

YOU ONLY HAVE MINUTES TO SAVE A LIFE

Statistics suggest that, when someone suffers a sudden cardiac arrest, every minute matters and early defibrillation can increase their chances of survival by as much as 50%.

This is why the Community Council is raising the funds to install a Community Public Access Defibrillator in Nayland.

This is a portable defibrillator, which uses intelligent technology and a sequence of voice commands to enable someone with no medical background or training to administer defibrillation to shock the heart back into a natural rhythm. The defibrillator will be housed in a special cabinet and situated in a central public location. It will be accessible by anyone, 24/7, using an access code given by the emergency services via a 999 call. This equipment can save vital time whilst waiting for the emergency services to arrive and can dramatically improve a person's chances of survival when administered within a few minutes.

We are using a charity called the Community Heartbeat Trust to support the project. They have supplied over 3000 community defibrillators nationwide and work closely with the local ambulance service as well as providing community training seminars and ongoing support services.

Guidelines for erecting BANNERS & SIGNS ON CALEY GREEN

If you wish to advertise your event in the Village Hall by displaying a banner or sign along the A134 at either Caley Green or at the end of Horkesley Road then PRIOR PERMISSION must be obtained from Nayland with Wissington Parish Council. A risk assessment is required accompanied by proof of public liability insurance.

The signs must not be placed so that they obstruct visibility to users of the highway:

- Signs must be secure and erected at least 2 metres from the edge of the carriageway
- Signs are not to be erected more than 7 days before the event
- Signs are to be removed as soon as possible after the event (maximum 48 hours)

LOCAL HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY 2018

Unfortunately the survey that Nayland with Wissington Parish has been planning for past two years has had to be deferred until 2018 for a number of reasons including inconsistent information about funding grants and delays caused by Babergh District Council.

Every household will be asked to complete a confidential questionnaire with information about the future needs of themselves and their families. Young people may want to remain in or return to the parish but need access to affordable housing. Older residents may need to downsize to smaller accommodation more suitable to their long term needs.

When the survey takes place, we will encourage everyone to complete the questionnaires so that any future development can be influenced by the wishes of those who live in our community.

Thanks to the efforts of Chris Hunt, the Tower Clock of St. James' is now repaired to it's former glory. The Friends are very pleased to have contributed 50% of the cost, Chris having laboured long and hard to get a grant for the other half. We get there in the end!!

Sadly, though, delays to the LSS continue. Having gone out to tender to 3 local builders, it was the middle of October before we got any firm tenders. Even then, the 2 competitive ones were quite

heavily endorsed with "P.C" amounts - these can, of course, vary up and down. Worse, though, was that the quotes came in much higher than we had expected. So, we have had to go back and try and get the true costs confirmed. Allowing for some trimming, the Friends has just about enough cash to cover the cost of the work. None of the builders could complete the job before Christmas, so any start has now been delayed again. However, another problem has now arisen: Because of the cost of the Quinquennial Repairs to St. James', the PCC no longer has sufficient funds to cover the £8,000 VAT bill - which is due on completion of the LSS works, can be reclaimed more or less in total, but takes 8 or 12 weeks to get back. A problem of cash flow which we hope may be resolvable. If not, then the whole project must be further delayed until sufficient funds are available.

Finally, we hope to see many Friends at the Carol Service at 6.30pm on Sunday, December 17th in St. James'.

Whatever kind of card you send this year, be sure to include a kind message with love for your friends. Our love is a tiny echo of God's love for all the world.


MAKE A SIMPLE 3D CHRISTMAS TREE CARD OR DECORATION

Fold a piece of card in half, then cut it in half. Put the two pieces together and fold them in half again.

Draw half a Christmas tree opposite the fold. Cut along the line and you will have 2 identical trees. Fold the trees in half, very lightly, hardly creasing the centre line to mark the centre of the tree. Cut a slit along the bottom half of the centre of one tree and along the top half of the centre of the other tree. Slip the two trees together along the slits. To help the tree to stand firmly, use sticky tape to fasten the parts together where they meet.

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

Some months ago the OM/S wrote about his hopes for a beech hedge in the churchyard, which had been further reduced in height. The result has been most satisfactory so he can now confidently recommend that procedure to anyone with a similar problem.

There is very little remaining in flower here, but there are still a few flowers left on our Kaffir Lilies. The scientific name is Schizostylis and it's a native of South Africa where it grows alongside streams. It's a useful plant since it starts flowering in autumn, and will continue until the first real frost. It lives a sunny and preferably slightly damp situation (though it hasn't really got the latter here). The flowers which resemble a miniature Gladioulus, are borne on stems about 18 inches high and in the type S. Coccinea are deep red. There are several named varieties, including a pink one which we also grow and, according to the reference books, a white one.

Now that growth has generally ceased the OM/S finds time to clear some of the dead growth from shrubs, hedges and one or two places which can only really be described as thickets. They all provide a fair quantity of dead wood of all kinds. The thicker bits are left to dry out and provide fuel for our open fires, but the remainder produce a large amount of leaf and stem, and the best way of disposing of them is with a bonfire. This can be somewhat controversial and probably not a practical proposition for anyone living in the middle of a village. Here, however, that is not a problem given the prevailing wind, the south-westerly carries the smoke into open country.

There are, broadly speaking, two types of bonfire. The first consists of a large pile of (preferably) dry material collected over a period of time. This is best lighted by inserting dry paper into the centre, and the best method of doing this is by forming it into a roll and lighting one end and gradually pushing it into the centre [somewhat in the manner of that 19th Century military weapon the Bangalore Torpedo]. Petrol should <u>never</u>, repeat <u>never</u> be used to light bonfires; it has been the cause of a number of fatal accidents.

The second type of bonfire, which we favour, is somewhat different. A heap of dry combustible material is made on one side; on the other a small fire is started and when the latter is well alight, the dry material is gradually transferred until a good blaze is established. Once that has been effected it sou; d be possible to burn almost anything vegetable, even if a bit damp, although in that case much smoke will be produced.

Herewith a few unwritten rules:

- <u>DON'T</u> put anything made of rubber or plastics on it, especially PVC which when burnt produces Hydrochloric Acid.
- DO keep well away from wooden buildings (radiated heat can combust)
- DO make certain the fire is out by lighting up time.
- That's probably enough of a lecture.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

Some Extracts From Early Parish Magazines

The Rev W T Farmiloe, Vicar of Nayland from 1909 to 1915, describes an event in the **February 1910** edition of the magazine. Could this be Nayland's first ever pantomime?

On January 11th a grand pantomime entitled "Blue-Beard" was performed by several ladies and gentlemen of the neighbourhood. This was the first time that anything of the sort had been attempted but we hope that it will by no means be the last; and if the actors go on as well as they have begun Drury Lane will certainly have to look to its laurels.

In one thing at any rate, these

amateur Thespians taught their London brethren a lesson, and that was in the matter of sticking to the plot. They steadily refused to distract our attention from the main outlines of the story by the addition of too many "gags" or too much "by-play". But when, with the most laudable intentions in the world, they tried to improve the original tale and make it end happily by bringing all Blue-Beard's wives to life again, they left the poor old gentleman in a very awkward predicament! Fortunately, the curtain descended before the problem presented to the minds of the audience became too acute.

A collection, which was taken at the conclusion of the entertainment, realised £2 10s. 6d. and was sent to swell the funds of the Hospital at Colchester.

Whilst there is no one left who can confirm this, it is likely that this pantomime took place in the Queen's Head where many other such events were held. The photograph shows a similar event there during the 1920s.

A year later, in the **November 1911** magazine, there was a description of the annual Nayland Fair:

This fixture in the social life of Nayland took place on Wednesday and Thursday the 4th and 5th October. It is held, so tradition declares, on the first Wednesday after the 2nd October. It must have had some trading if not historical importance, but its origins and ancient importance are lost in the dim mists of antiquity. It is always looked forward to as a time of mutual parochial enjoyment.

It was held in Mr Webb's meadow this year, where a large concourse of shows - all satellites of the great central attraction, a large steam circus - assembled. Electric light gave the whole



scene a very festive appearance. The Fair attracted, as usual, large numbers of people who seemed to enjoy themselves thoroughly with the many items of amusement and interest. Only one stall was erected in the street.

In the 13th century Nayland was one of a few places in Suffolk to be granted the privilege of holding a weekly Friday market which was still functioning towards the end of the 17th century. The right to hold an annual fair on the Wednesday after the 2nd October also dates from the same early period. The fair was very active in the 19th century and it seems at some time the two events combined.

In the **April 1914** magazine the vicar's enthusiasm for the Easter activities that year were obvious:

Paris can no longer arrogate to herself the title of "The Gay City" or claim a monopoly of pleasure, for Nayland threatens to run her very close; In proof of which we have only to point to the orgy of delights which Miss Mills is organising for Easter Tuesday. The proceedings begin with a whist drive, this will be followed by a grand variety entertainment, at the conclusion of which the hall will be cleared and the remainder of the night given over to dancing. Tickets (including breakfast) may be obtained for the purely nominal sum of 1/6d.

In May 1911 the magazine reported:

We see by the bills in the windows that the movement to arrange for a weekly half holiday has been successful and that from the 3rd of May Nayland will have its Early Closing Day. Nayland has been sadly behind other villages in this matter, but better late than never.

THE VILLAGE STORES, BEAR STREET

In 1911 Nayland was very busy with many shops and businesses including that of the Hatten family. Now, more than a hundred years later, this family business, the Village Stores in Bear Street, has gone. What a sad day it was for Nayland, when the oldest business in the village closed its doors on Monday, 16th October 2017.

William Hatten was the first of four generations of his family to set up his business with just a donkey and cart. Around 1890 he came to Nayland to what later became Beaumont's shop (now Forget-Me-Not) in Birch Street before moving to Fen Street. When William died in 1907 his sons George and Stanley took over the business, travelling round the area every day with their horses and vans selling paraffin, candles, soap and hardware. By the time Stanley's son Ernie was born in 1920 the family had acquired the Bear Street premises which had previously been the Compasses pub owned by Cuddons, the Nayland brewery. As a child Ernie went out with his father on his rounds in the horse and cart and later was the first in the family business to have a motor van. He carried on the shop and business until his daughter Susan and her husband Terry took over - the fourth generation.

Ernie Hatten sadly died in December 2016, aged 96. His early memories and more about the history of his family's business can be found in *Memories of Nayland in the Twentieth Century*, published by the Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society in 2006.

I'm sure that everyone would like to thank Sue and Terry for their contribution to the community over so many years and to wish them a long and happy retirement.

A VISIT TO VERSAILLES: THE WAR GRAVE OF ALFRED NORFOLK, 1915

From 2014 Colchester Royal Grammar School staff, pupils and Old Colcestrians have been creating a memorial garden and book to commemorate former pupils who were killed during the Great War. Two of those former pupils were young men named on Nayland war memorial, George Deane and Alfred Norfolk. CRGS Sixth Formers, Jack Ridge, Jack Edwards, Ellie Harkness and Pastora Little-Morgan 'adopted' Alfred Norfolk and visited the Versailles cemetery where Alfred Norfolk is buried. They also visited Mary George in Nayland who assisted with their research into Alfred's life before the war for a chapter to be included in the CRGS book. This is their report, written by Jack Ridge before they embarked on university life.

CRGS has been an important part of my life for seven years, so I thought that to visit one of the remaining five unvisited war graves would be one small way in which I could repay the school that has given me so much. With that in mind, I was joined by three fellow A-Level Historians who share my deep love of CRGS. Following our visit to Nayland we set off for Paris via Eurostar. Months of preparation and anticipation culminated on 31st September when we travelled to Versailles to visit the grave of our fallen war hero. Versailles is located in the Parisian suburbs some 10.6 miles from the centre of Paris. After a short metro journey we took the RER C to Versailles-Chateau station and were immediately struck by the more relaxed atmosphere of Versailles as opposed to the hustle and bustle of Paris – a more fitting environment for the resting place of a war hero.

Located in the shadow of the Palace of Versailles a few minutes' walk away, Les Gonards Cemetery is the resting place for 181 identified fallen British troops from both World Wars. Its gentle hills and contours give a different feel to the vast fields of graves in Belgium and northern France. As we entered Les Gonards we were instantly struck by the scale of the cemetery. We had the grave reference but managed to get lost. However, this did allow us to see the swathes of French dead, some of whom were likely to have been in the Base Hospital at the same time as Alfred Norfolk. There was also a large presence of North African troops and a monument to North African stands at the top of the hill in Les Gonards, watching out over the cemetery. This illustrates the sacrifice that they made for the allied powers which often goes forgotten. It was somewhat overwhelming to think that all of these men had their own lives, their own families, their own stories, in every case tragically cut short by the brutal realities of warfare - a truly sobering and sombre thought.

Eventually, we found the plot of Commonwealth War Graves. Most of the fallen soldiers buried in Les Gonards had succumbed to their injuries while in the base camp hospital in Versailles. Once we found Alfred Norfolk's grave, the 25th grave in the 3rd



row, there was a sense of connection with this man that none of us ever knew – the strong bond shared between all OCs and members of the CRGS family. The headstone reads, 'Always remembered in the old home Nayland, Colchester'. For me, this reinforced the strong sense of community and connection that we had felt when we visited Nayland. After a few minutes reflection, we cleaned the foot of the grave before laying two poppy crosses, one from the people of Nayland-with-Wissington supplied by Mary George on behalf of the Nayland RBL Branch and one from CRGS and OCs. Our journey was complete. Hopefully everybody that now comes to Les Gonards will see the symbol of our journey made on behalf of CRGS and the people of Nayland – the two crosses each representing very important parts of Alfred Norfolk's life – his home village and CRGS.

Dear All,

I wonder what Christmas means to you. Take a minute to stop and think about what makes Christmas special for you. Is it the food? The people you always spend it with? The rituals? The music?

Setting aside the religious for a moment (although you can be sure I'll get to that by the end of the page), many of my Christmas memories, perhaps unsurprisingly, concern food. I still try and do things the way that my mum would have done it, in fact, sometimes I think I try too hard to replicate my childhood Christmas dinner memories, especially as now that I am a vicar, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day are busy with the various church preparations and services, and I just don't have that much time to spend peeling sprouts - I never have liked them, but I have to have one a year as it's a "Christmas Tradition!"

If you ask most children what they are most excited about in the run-up to Christmas, they will probably tell you that it is their presents. Christmas presents are meant as a symbol of the greatest gift of all – the gift of Jesus, given to save the world. The idea of Christmas as a gift to make the world better has got me thinking.

The first Christmas was celebrated in unsuitable accommodation by a non-traditional family. They were joined by uninvited guests and were forced to flee for their lives as refugees shortly afterwards. You can imagine that any assistance they might have been offered would have made their lives significantly better.

So here's a challenge: what would it mean to you to give the gift of Christmas? Whatever it was that you thought of earlier when you were reading this article, can you figure out how to share it with someone else? Here are some ideas to start you off. It is so tempting to huddle down in our cosy family groups for Christmas, when we could give the gift of friendship to one of our neighbours who is alone. Is there someone you know who would usually be alone for Christmas: could you invite them into your family and include them?

There are always charity appeals at Christmas, particularly for those who are without a home of their own. Charities like Ipswich Winter Night Shelter (www.iwns.org.uk)strive to make a difference to the quality of life for those who are homeless, even if only for one or two nights. Can you give the gift of warmth and food? Our local food banks will also value some Christmas-themed donations in addition to your usual donations (but do make sure you do this before the day itself!)

Is there a different way you could give presents? Why not support the Salvation Army's Christmas Present Appeal (www.salvationarmy.org.uk/christmas-present-appeal) and help them to pass on gifts to children of families who are struggling? Or why not make a difference to a whole community in a developing country and give them the gift of life through better hygiene (www.toilettwinning.org)?

Whatever you chose to do may I wish you and your families every blessing for a peaceful advent, a joyful Christmas and a new year full of hope.

HOW TO SEARCH GOOGLE SAFELY

We all love our Google, guickly finding everything we need on the Internet. It's replaced dictionaries, encyclopedias, instruction manuals, newspapers and in many cases, even doctors. However, sometimes your search results aren't the real thing and can be downright malicious

Here's how to search safely:

PAY ATTENTION TO THE URL IN GOOGLE

Below every result title there's a URL in green. No matter what the title says, this URL is where your click will take you. Unfortunately, cyber-criminals will often list their site with a familiar and trusted title but link you to their scam/malware pages.

For example, the title could be your bank name (eg, Example Bank), which seems legitimate, but the URL could be www.baabpjhg.com which is obviously not your bank. Sometimes they'll attempt to trick you by putting the real site into the link too, eg www.baabpjhg.com/examplebank.com which makes it even more likely to catch you when skimming through results quickly.

When you visit the page, it might look exactly like your bank's site and ask for your login details, which are then harvested for attack. While jibberish in the link is pretty easy to spot, sometimes they'll take advantage of a small typo that you can easily miss. For example, www.exampebank.com (missing the letter L).

NOTICE GOOGLE SEARCH RESULTS VS PAID ADS:

Google does a pretty good job at making sure the most relevant and legitimate sites are at the top of the list. However paid ads will usually appear above them. Most of the time, these paid ads are also legitimate (and you can quickly check the URL to verify), but occasionally cyber criminals are able to promote their malicious site to the top and catch thousands of victims before being removed.

BELIEVE GOOGLE'S MALICIOUS SITE ALERTS

Sometimes Google knows when something is wrong with a site. It could be a legitimate site that was recently hacked, a security setting that's malfunctioned, or the site was reported to them as compromised. When this happens, Google stops you clicking through with a message saying "this website may be harmful" or "this site may harm your computer". Stop immediately, and trust that Google has detected something you don't want in your house.

TURN ON SAFE SEARCH

You can filter out explicit results by turning on Google Safe Search. While not strictly a cyber-security issue, it can still provide a safer Google experience. Safe Search is normally suggested as a way to protect browsing children, but it also helps adults who aren't interested in having their search results cluttered with inappropriate links, many of which lead to high-risk sites. Switch Safe Search on/off by clicking Settings > Safe Search.

SUFFOLK FOSTERING SERVICE LAUNCHES A SERIES OF FOSTERING RECRUITMENT CAMPAIGNS

At this period of preparation for Christmas, Suffolk County Council's Fostering Service will launch a series of campaigns over the coming months to encourage more Suffolk residents to become foster carers. 820 children currently live in care in Suffolk and there is an urgent need for more people to come forward to foster. The first campaign will focus on the need to recruit more foster carers for teenagers.

Suffolk Fostering Service is the longest established provider of fostering services in the county, offering competitive fees, 24 -hour support services and up to 21 days paid leave per year.

The first campaign focuses on the real-life experiences of two Suffolk Fostering Service foster carers, Ethel from Ipswich and Sammy from Lowestoft. Teenagers in care have often gone through a great deal in their lives and this campaign aims to give an honest reflection of what it takes to be a foster carer and the rewards that can come as a result.

The campaign is accompanied by a new promotional video which features both Ethel and Sammy, providing an insight into what it takes to be a foster carer for teenagers and the positive difference they make to a young person's life.

The video addresses why the application process can be timely and thorough, with Ethel and Sammy both describing how the vulnerability of the children in care makes the timeframe absolutely necessary. It also makes clear that the robustness and intensity of the process is equally there to benefit and protect the prospective foster carer, ensuring that they are fully prepared and certain of the commitment they are making.

It's really important to get more people talking about foster care and I would encourage South Suffolk residents to look at their own lives to consider whether they have the patience, compassion and the spare room required to provide a child with the secure home life they need."

The campaign addresses the fact that every year there are 40,000 accidental house fires in the UK. Having an escape plan will allow Suffolk residents to escape the fire quickly and safely.

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
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KENNY'S SESAW NEWS




