NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting: 12th April 2017

(This is an extract from the draft minutes of the meeting)

PLANNING

Decisions advised by Babergh: Listed Building Consent had been granted at **11 Gravel Hill** *B/17/00087* for external boiler, consent was granted at **109 Bear Street** *B/17/00119* for rear extensions and at **Hilltop Farm, Harpers Hill** *B/17/00150* for replacement telecommunications apparatus.

An application had recently been received for erection of a two-storey rear extension over existing single-storey extension at **15 The Westerings** B/17/00421. Members had No Objections at this stage.

It was agreed to write to Babergh District Council Planning regarding 5 Year Land Supply to clarify specific aspects arising from the recent High Court ruling.

ALLOTMENTS

lan Harris gave a progress report on the work at the Allotment Field/Glebeland. Approval had been given to the contractor following last meeting. The seeding will now be done in the autumn. Graham Walker agreed to check details in relation to the permissive path with the Footpath Warden. It was agreed for the Clerk to write to the tenant farmer confirming he has permission to fertilize the field and spot spray controlled list of weeds.

The allotment annual meeting was held and a reminder was requested on the upkeep of Allotments. It was agreed for the Clerk to send a general reminder at the same time as notification of the Allotment Competition. A plan will be sent to all members of the PC showing full details of tenanted and vacant allotments. It needs to be confirmed that the vacant plots can now be allocated to those waiting on the list.

HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

Nearby Parish Councils including this Council, were still waiting for a meeting with the Officer concerned.

BURIAL GROUND

It was noted the wall damage was reported to Babergh DC. **HIGHWAYS**

Mary George outlined various drainage issues and reports made by Suffolk CC Highways of their clearance work. Standing water in Newlands Lane was inspected by Highways in 2013/14 and they had identified an issue with the installation of kerbing by the then owners of Jasmine Cottage. The Right of Way Officer is concerned about the drainage onto the footpath.

The community litter pick was a success and less bags of rubbish were collected showing a reducing problem. It was agreed for the Clerk to report the litter on Horkesley Hill A134.

STREET LIGHTING

The County Council has been reminded and a progress report is awaited. An enquiry from a householder was being acknowledged pending further details.

FOOTPATHS

Correspondence continues in relation to the faulty kissing gate on footpath 14 (Candy Lane/Newlands Lane area). Suffolk CC would be cutting at Nayland weir from May. Mary George agreed to check whether a leaning tree in the vicinity was the one already reported.

RECREATION & OPEN SPACES

Members expressed gratitude to Mrs Cannings for reviewing and summarising all the information concerning Caley Green. 'Caley Green' would be included as an Agenda item for May.

Mrs Fuller agreed to chase progress in respect of the driveway at the Fairfield. Some planting protectors had been vandalised nearby. This had been reported to the Police. The banner for the Open Gardens had been approved between meetings. Gerry Battye agreed to liaise with our grounds maintenance contractors regarding bird spikes. Temporary signage will be provided for the Fairfield. It was observed that our contractors are now mowing near the bank on Caley Green as agreed for this year's contract. A quotation for some extra routine maintenance was duly approved.

VILLAGE HALL

The Village Hall Committee had enquired about the boiler payment and it was noted that it was one of the payments for this meeting. A local person has been approached in regard to taking over the Community Website. The Village Hall bookings are also made from this site. The Chairman explained that we have made enquiries with our website providers to consider what service they would provide.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Report on Meeting: 10th May 2017

PUBLIC FORUM

A member of the public requested that the road surface at the start of Candy Lane should be filled as large puddles form there. Resolving now would prevent the area being churned up as many cars access the field for the Church Fete. Councillors agreed to pursue this.

The PC received confirmation that there is no Right To Buy on housing in Parkers Way.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

James Finch will pursue progress regarding A134 speed restrictions and outstanding street lighting in Court Street.

PARISH COUNCILLORS

Mary George was re-elected as Chair, confirming this would be her last year in the role. There were no nominations and no volunteers for Vice Chair and representatives; was deferred to the next meeting. Mary said it had been very difficult not to have had a vice chair recently.

PLANNING

Reviewing planning applications Mary George said no decisions by Babergh had been received.

Discussing new applications councillors had no objections to planning applications at **15 The Westerings** [B/17/00421] for erection of two-storey rear extension over existing single-storey extension or at **The Mill House, Wiston Hall Lane** [B/17/00532] for alterations and additions including the construction of pitched roofs, insertion/replacement of windows, small addition to rear, internal alterations and erection of extension to summer house including Listed Building Consent.

With the proviso that the extension cannot be sold separately to the house, councillors had no objection to an application at **Little Bulmer Farm, Wiston Road** [B/17/00537] for change of use of residential extension to part residential and part holiday let.

LOCAL HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

Parish Councillors, members of Stoke by Nayland's Lady Anne Charity, a Babergh Council officer and Cllr Melanie Barrett will attend a meeting at Stoke by Nayland on 18 May.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Pigeon deterrents are being sought as playground equipment at Fairfield is frequently covered with droppings. Temporary repairs only are carried out on the driveway. People visiting the burial ground are prevented from parking in the allocated spot by those collecting children from school. The school has asked parents not to park but the request is being ignored.

FOOTPATHS

Ian Harris commented that the footpath way-marking was inadequate near his home and people walked down his drive. He was advised to contact Sally Bartram (Footpath Warden).

CALEY GREEN

Gerry Battye inspected the revetement along the river. He reported that it is a hazard to kayakers and others. The Environment Agency installed the revetement; the PC will write to them to request a repair.

The maintenance contractors were praised for the work; they are cutting the grass and nettles down to the river edge as requested.

Councillors are considering how best to manage Caley Green and as part of that, Kathleen Cannings compiled a report on its history which was displayed at the Parish Assembly. The report explained that Caley Green was developed from a bank of earth that was at the side of the new road.

Members at the recent Community Council meeting raised concerns at the focus on Caley Green and asked that the PC should be open about any intended plans. Councillors welcome ideas and comments from residents and Mary George will write to the Community Council to clarify.

A working party - consisting Tricia Fuller, Russell Badrick, Kathleen Cannings, and Ian Harris - would produce a report of recommendations for the future management of the green. **HIGHWAYS**

The PC will report to SCC Highways that verges along the A134 have not been cut back enough and construction debris remains on the central reservation at the junction with Wiston Road. An illegible street sign at Mill Street, Bear Street and Birch Street junction will be reported.

An enquiry regarding the road surface in Fen Street will be passed on to County Councillor, James Finch.

Proposals for a proposed cycle rack are making progress.

A replacement notice board has been fixed to the Heights bus shelter.

VILLAGE HALL

With Graham Griffiths deciding to retire from managing the naylandandwiston.net website, Will Hitchcock is leading on establishing a replacement to enable village hall bookings to be made online and inclusion of pages for online church hall bookings, PC documents and links to the websites of other village societies .

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Martyn Booth reported that as a requirement of their Constitution, the CC needed to appoint someone with legal background. Parish Councillor Russell Badrick expressed an interest in doing this and would follow up.

Martyn Booth advised on the update report by the Community Post Office team.

Report from Nayland Community Store Limited 3 May 2017

Following the Public Meeting on 6th March we are delighted have received 133 pledges from residents totalling £34,725. More arrive each week, for which our huge thanks to each and everyone. We welcome late pledges – a simple email or text will suffice and will help our financial planning.

Our grant application through Suffolk County Council was initially rejected but has been resubmitted in a reduced form. With the lower-than-planned investment pledges, obtaining that grant is now critical to our ability to take on the Post Office. Fortunately, we received notification last week that the Local Action Group have reconsidered our revised application and that they are recommending that we proceed to make the full application for grant to the Rural Development Agency. This means we can move forward to submit our business plan to Post Office Ltd.

The actual grant decision will be made late in July and if successful, the monies awarded available in September.

If we get the full grant, we move much closer to our funding target. If we fail we may have a significant funding gap that will need to be closed by a greater take up of the share issue, or perhaps other fund-raising activities. We are still in discussion with HMRC to establish if our share offer will qualify for tax relief, and are making an application under Social Investment Tax Relief (SITR). SITR is the government's tax relief for social investment which encourages individuals to support charities and social enterprises. Individuals receive a 30% tax break when investing into an eligible organisation.

Meanwhile, the survey and specification for the premises has been completed and tenders for the refurbishment work have been narrowed to two possibilities. These are being examined closely in conjunction with Fenn Wright to select our preferred contractor if we do raise enough funds to proceed.

We must note that the Postmistress received an approach and a verbal offer via her agent after a prospective buyer visited during April. The NCS team temporarily suspended work on drafting the lease agreement and business plans during this brief period of uncertainty but were yesterday assured by solicitors that NCS Ltd. is her preferred partner in the transfer of the business. We take comfort that we can resume our activities as planned. Post Office Limited have had no formal application for the business from a third party.

We are looking to the Post Office to conclude the transfer of business in October or November under current timescales.

Our next Public Meeting will be held at Nayland Village Hall on 15thJune.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 3rd May 2017 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

MATTERS ARISING:

Executive Committee: Members welcomed Rachel Hitchcock as Chair.

Rachel pointed out we need to seek another person who would be willing to be our named legal representative for 2018. The need for a legal representative is stipulated in our Constitution but does not require any regular commitment. It requires someone with a legal background who can offer advice or point us in the right direction if needed. Martyn Booth and Rachel Hitchcock would make enquires among their contacts.

The Community Council still requires more members of village groups to join them as members of the Executive Committee.

Fundraising Activities & Events: The CC are focused on events for 2018 but future ideas and/or support with running events to benefit the CC funds would be welcome.

Community Defibrillator: This was a proposal for a community defibrillator sited at the Fire Station.

Rachel Hitchcock updated the meeting on progress. She has been following up on advice given and will ask the Community Heartbeat Trust to quote for a complete package (the defibrillator, installation, maintenance, training, etc). Members felt a whole package from this local charity organisation may be the best route to take for the community, rather than seeking slightly cheaper separate elements that may not have ongoing support. Rachel is awaiting a response from Babergh DC regarding possible grants and she will revisit the possibility of Lottery Funding.

Community Post Office: Maggie Ryan reported on the current situation. See page 7 for a full update

The next Public Meeting will be held at Nayland Village Hall on 15^{th} June at $7.30 \, \text{pm}$

Nayland 10k Fun Run Fundraiser: Rachel Hitchcock reported on progress as Luke Rumbelow who is co-ordinating the event was unable to attend this meeting.

The event will take place on 2nd July and CoHoC and the CC will be beneficiaries of the profits. Setting up commences at 8.30am with the run starting at 10am. There will be 10k, 5k and 3k options. Luke has already done a great deal of the organisation and has 240 applications from runners out of the 400 hoped for. Parking will be in the Anchor Inn/Conservation Society field off Horkesley Road.

Volunteers needed include: 3 to register runners the start and hand out medals at the end, 2 stewards and 15-20 marshalls on route. The CC will consider - subject to sufficient volunteers coming forward - organising the BBQ and Pimms Stall. It was suggested sourcing an ice cream stall if Luke is looking for external suppliers. The WI will be approached to see if they would organise refreshments and cakes. Rachel Hitchcock agreed to email a plea for volunteers to come forward and confirm availability.

Other aspects will be discussed at a meeting with Luke and lain Wright will advise on facilities at the Village Hall.

Village Hall Garden: Will Hitchcock and Colin Ramsell kindly attended the last VH gardening morning on 18th March on behalf of the CC; our section of the garden is looking tidy.

Recent Activities:

Annual General Meeting: This had taken place on 6th March with the VHMC AGM and the rescheduled Community Post Office meeting which was well attended.

Calendar Competition - 1st May: Lorraine Brooks thanked all those who entered the competition. One member of the CC Exec had been very successful. There was a good display of photographs and some impressive photos entered. It was a pleasant afternoon with visitors stopping to chat, have refreshments and look through the CC history display. Thanks to the calendar team and helpers for their commitment and Hazel Gardiner for supplying the refreshments.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Maggie Ryan gave her report.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £18,689.85 represented by: Deposit a/c monies £15,568.41, Current a/c monies £3,095.44, Cash in hand £26. From these reserves, Nayland Community Store Limited is able to draw on a further £397.20 of grant funding. The Services Fund has been reduced by £81.50 to £188.50. We are transferring First Response Team funds of £444 to their own Treasurer at their request. Unencumbered assets are therefore £18,104.15

Profit & Loss: The Community Times has made £790 and the Calendar £85 in profit so far this year. Grant monies distributed to Nayland Community Store Ltd. (NCSL) over the period amount to £1499.52 – made up of £870 to Fenn Wright and £629.52 to electrical contractors, both costs being associated with the survey and tender for works for the Post Office premises by NCSL.

Administrative matters: The Charities Commission annual return is due. We have renewed our membership to Community Action Suffolk free of charge.

Community Times: Lorraine Brooks mentioned the loss of four regular advertisers this year and one new yearly subscription. During the last few years there has been movement toward smaller sized adverts. There are currently 59 advertisers, mostly on annual subscription.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said some lovely photos had be selected for the calendar and the calendar is now coming together. It will be ready for first sales at the Flower Show on 5th August. The Exec authorised expenditure for print costs due in July. The calendar team are grateful to Pat Bray for gaining sponsorship and the local businesses who are sponsoring the calendar.

Forthcoming Activities:

Bonfire & Fireworks: Sunday 5th November. Iain Wright agreed to order fireworks in July in order to qualify for discount with Dynamic Fireworks. It was agreed to order the same quantity as last year, he would liaise with Claire on quantities of sparklers and glo-necklaces as the quantity of sparklers would need increasing. Iain did not feel new recruits for training would be required this year.

Christmas Fayre: Saturday 2nd December. Rachel Hitchcock said she would begin contacting potential stallholders in July. For the 2018 Village Hall booking Saturday 1st December was confirmed.

Village Quiz: *Friday 2nd February 2018.* Rachel kindly agreed to co-ordinate the event again.

SOCIETY REPORTS

Conservation Society: John Partridge said this will be the 40th year of Nayland Open Gardens; they would welcome more gardens to be included, please contact Mike Hunter. Darren Tansley will talk about *Otters and the River Stour* at the open meeting on 19th June.

Royal British Legion: Their next bi-monthly meeting will be on 8th May in the Church Hall and they have an outing to Newmarket Horseracing Museum on 10th May. An outing to Ganges Museum in Shotley with a cruise on the Orwell on 2nd August is being organised.

Women's Institute: Wendy Sparrow said the branch celebrated their 60th year with lunch and birthday cake at the Angel at Stoke by Nayland. On 15th May the Annual Meeting, Resolutions and a Beetle Drive take place and in June the subject of the talk by Jane Paley will be *The History of Tea*.

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said their Spring Show went very well. They have a Morning Market in the Church Hall on 20th May and an outing to Sandringham Flower Show on 26th July.

Village Players: Bryan Smith said their production of Terence Rattigan's *The Deep Blue Sea* had been a great success. Auditions for their next production take place in July.

PLEASE DO NOT CHANGE CALEY GREEN!

In a report by the Parish Council at the Parish Assembly it mentioned a surveyor saying, "The Green is a valuable amenity for local people and especially important as the main approach to the village". He was quite correct.

Suggestions of a planting a hedge would block the view, as would the planting of shrubs - that is the case at Pop's Piece. Areas planted with shrubs and wild flowers would restrict access not improve access as the report suggests! Leaving areas of grass uncut would likewise restrict access by residents. Nayland Meadow has a large area of wildflowers and long grasses why are more needed in the adjacent Green?

The suggestion of a footbridge linking Caley Green to Nayland Meadow would surely create an awful blot on Constable's landscape - people seem happy enough to walk a few yards to gain access near the tunnel.

There have been many good local projects for the conservation of wildlife, including Nayland Meadow and pond. Humans were guilty of endangering wildlife in the 70s; this has been addressed and the river and its wildlife has recovered but some quarters seem intent on going too far the other way. The countryside should be shared by humans and wildlife alike and Caley Green is now the only place in Nayland that all generations can enjoy whether quietly enjoying the scenery, feeding the ducks or something more active. Fairfield and Webb's Meadow provide areas for the youth of the village but are not scenic relaxing havens for older generations.

The only improvements needed are in the management: replacing any trees that have been lost to disease or storm and cutting back of nettles and reeds allowing a better view of the river especially for those less mobile and to allow greater access close to the river for all.

If the Parish Council are considering changes to Caley Green please do the democratic thing and consult with all residents for their views and don't sneak through "phased improvements" thinking we won't notice. We do notice.

Community Council meeting continued...

Parish Council: Martyn Booth said further work has been carried out on the Allotment Field but weather prevented sowing of wild flowers; this will take place in autumn. A meeting takes place with Babergh and other local parishes to discuss conducting a joint housing needs survey.

On a query regarding when introduction of a speed limit on the A134 will be imposed he said Suffolk CC have not confirmed details. Martyn was asked why, when there was a display regarding Caley Green at the Parish Assembly which asked for the opinions of residents, were those attending not asked for their comments and how are residents expected to make their views known. Martin said a discussion did not take place as Kathleen Cannings (author of the report) was not present and they will be discussing this further at the May PC meeting. He was also asked where the new interest in making changes to Caley Green came from and answered it was because of reed cutting by residents last year. Another member requested complete openness from the PC and that changes do not happen without full public knowledge. Martyn said he would pass this request on to the PC.

Book Club: Wendy Sparrow said they recently read and discussed *Skeletons of the Feast* by Chris Bohjailan, which was

about World War II, and they are now reading *The Comfort of Others* by Kay Langdale.

Art Group: Colin Ramsell said they enjoyed a recent visit to Gainsborough's House in Sudbury, calling in nearby for refreshments and cakes. They continue to meet in the Church Hall on Wednesday afternoons.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said a new more energy efficient boiler has been installed, funded mainly by the Parish Council. Unfortunately a leaking water pipe has necessitated an insurance claim. They will begin considering specifications for the roof replacement, looking at where the new roof meets the old roof and will consider ways of maintaining uniform temperature within the hall. Installations of solar panels is not a viable option.

HSA: Rachel Hitchcock said the they will be holding the Ball on 19th May at Le Talbooth and their Summer Fete with much fun, games, stalls and joviality will be on 17th June.

Woodland Corner: Tricia Hall said Suffolk County Council has reduced their funding by 11% per child per term which will be very difficult. They have organised some successful fundraisers this year and will need to do more fundraising.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Report on Parish Assembly: 24th April 2017

Approaching sixty residents attended the Annual Parish Assembly on 24th April when Will Akast, Catchment Delivery Manager (Suffolk), for the Environment Agency gave a presentation on the Agency's work and management of the River Stour.

Residents' attention was drawn to the guide 'Living on the Edge' which explains the rights and responsibilities of riverside ownership. Copies were not available on the evening but the guide can be accessed at https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/riverside-ownership-rights-and-responsibilities

During the talk Mr Akast said that water quality and biodiversity had improved and the number of water voles was recovering in response to this. Answering questions from residents he said the number of otters in the area, which had also seen a revival, would not affect fish stocks substantially. A survey of fish had been undertaken in our area and he agreed to make this available. Their efforts continue with other agencies to keep the number of Mink to a minimum.

Responding to questions regarding growth of bankside reeds, shrubs and trees Mr Akast confirmed that the Environment Agency's efforts concentrated on maintaining navigation and the flow of water. The funding and manpower available did not stretch to keeping banks tidy; this was the responsibility of landowners.

In the case of Caley Green, which was raised by several residents who felt the growth of nettles and reeds was excessive and impaired the enjoyment of residents and fishermen, Mr Akast reiterated this should be taken up with the landowners. Mary George pointed out Caley Green is owned by Suffolk County Council and managed by Nayland with Wissington Parish Council.

Answering concerns about the reeds along Mill Stream in Fen Street and beyond Fen Street to the Fen regarding the excessive bankside growth and a fallen tree he said this area had been walked by the Agency and did not pose a flood risk.

SUFFOLK COUNTY COUNCILLOR

James Finch said County Council had again lived up to their pledge of not increasing council tax. Resurfacing has been carried out in Bear Street/Birch Street/Stoke Road and a reporting system for potholes has been successfully implemented at https://www.suffolk.gov.uk/roads-and-transport/roads-pavements-and-verges/potholes/report-a-pothole/.

Responding to questions; on when Fen Street may be resurfaced he said it is on the list but busy through-roads have priority, and regarding the new speed camera on Stoke Road he said the camera will not be permanently in situ, it is shared with other locations which increases effectiveness and reduces cost.

BABERGH DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Melanie Barratt said a small increase on council tax of 5%, amounting to 10 pence per week on a Band D property, has been necessary. There has been a review of sheltered housing with changes to some of the schemes in the area. Parkers Way in Nayland remains as a scheme with a manager visiting five

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days a week. It is now known as a Supported Living Scheme. Residents can still have an alarm.

PARISH COUNCIL CHAIR

Mary George reported on the activities of the Parish Council. During the last year they had been consulted by Babergh on 40 planning applications. The outstanding stages of the street lighting scheme should have been completed but unfortunately this is not the case. Energy savings have been made by installing the new LED lights. The council have expressed concern to the Police Commissioner and to the Chief Constable about the lack of communication with parishes; this is now only via a police forum meetings held every two months in different parts of the district. The council supported the proposals for the A134 speed limit. They complained about problems with weedkilling and road-sweeping and have concerns with drainage issues on the A134, Bear Street, Birch Street, Stoke Road and Court Street. On the Allotment Field (Glebe Land) the extensive hedge maintenance and access plan, waymarking posts for the permissive path, new gates and the planting of the headland with native wildflowers are in progress.

Looking ahead, councillors are working towards conducting a housing needs survey with adjoining parishes and investigating the possibility of cycle racks near Harpers Estate to link with bus transport. See full report on page 41

CALEY GREEN

With a view to revisiting the management of Caley Green a report by Kathleen Cannings on the history of 'The Green' was on display. There had been various suggestions over the years. A consultation with residents in 2000, which included planting hedging, shrubs, having areas of wildflowers, had divided opinion. This latest report suggests that some of the original proposals may be worth reconsidering and recent suggestions have included new tree planting to compensate for lost trees, additional bulb planting, a new footbridge across the river to link with the Meadow and the erection of a village sign.

The Parish Council would be interested to know the current views of residents. A resident suggested that the Community Times would be an ideal vehicle for the Parish Council to communicate with residents regarding their proposals or to conduct a consultation, as they had done in 1999 when change had been considered but not welcomed by residents. They added, Caley Green is an important and much loved village asset .

OTHER REPRESENTATIVES

The parish footpath and tree wardens and representatives from the Love, Caley Walsh Trust, the Village Hall Management Committee and the Community Council displayed their reports and were available at the meeting to take questions.

PARISH COUNCIL VACANCY

There remains a vacancy on the Parish Council - anyone interested in becoming a councillor please speak to a councillor or the Clerk.

Do let us know if you can enlighten readers more about this bird.










THE LAVATORY/SERVERY/STORAGE IN ST JAMES'

Your correspondent was delighted to write, in the last edition of the Community Times, that we could be optimistic that the project would soon be under way. Sadly, and yet again, his hopes have been dashed. Firstly, it transpired that the Diocesan Advisory Council would not actually consider

our Application until April 21st, not in March as we had been told. When they did consider it, they agreed to leave the matter over until May 12th: So, at the time of writing, we still have no permission to go ahead.

Worse news followed, though. The Parochial Church Council, having agreed to start the repairs to St. James', discovered that the cost was going to be well over their available funds. They therefore applied to the Friends for a grant. Unfortunately, the sheer size of the amount involved meant that the Friends had a stark choice: Help the P.C.C. and cancel or delay the LSS for 3 - 4 years, or refuse to help the P.C.C. Clearly, we could not abandon the P.C.C., so a halt was called while discussions with the P.C.C. took place to resolve the problem. Fortunately, given a new spirit of goodwill, we were able to help by making a loan to the P.C.C. of up to £15k, while the PCC will raise the balance required by sales of assets. Our loan will cover the VAT element of the repair bill, which can be quickly reclaimed and repaid to us once the work is complete. So, we still have a big enough reserve to continue with the L.S.S. given only that there are no cost over-runs to the work. However, we cannot, for the moment, consider funding the Tower Clock repair: There is hope, however, that a grant can be got from other sources.

So, still, we wait.

We would love to see any guests who would like to come to our meetings; they are held in the village hall on the third Monday of the month at 7.30pm.









Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

At the time of writing we have had rain at last, and a really decent amount too. Looking back into his file (which started in 1999) the OM/S sees that in 2010 and 2011 we were suffering from a similar dry Spring. More rain seems to be forecast, enough one hopes to fill the water butts, turn the lawns green and give the plants a much-needed blood transfusion.

The swallows are back, in the Bakehouse, an old kitchen building with a bread oven opposite the back door of this house. Over the years they have been regular visitors for almost every year, except for one when we suspected they were put off by the newly lined roof.

Any moment now the media will be full of the annual Chelsea Flower Show. The TV programmes, which appear reluctant to present anything without making it into some form of competition, have homed in on the designer gardens - who gets a gold and so forth. Some years ago a Society to which the OM/S belonged decided to have a go and designed a garden, which purported to display the landscape of East Anglia; they did rather well being awarded a Silver Gilt medal, but at the last minute were downgraded to Silver when one of the judges spotted a plant which he (but not any of the contestants) considered to be incorrectly labelled.

While on the subject of Chelsea, don't forget the Chelsea Chop. Quite a few herbaceous perennials, such as Phlox, perennial Asters, Rudbeckias and others are already reaching a height where they will become top heavy when in flower. They should be cut back by about a third to a quarter they will branch out and become stocky; flowering is not affected.

This month's plant in Choisya Ternata, a single species shrub originating from Mexico. The basic form is an evergreen with dark green evergreen leaves which give off a pungent odour when crushed, and masses of white flowers, which are in full bloom at the moment, and sometimes continue spasmodically until the Autumn.

It's quick growing and will soon reach a height of about 8 feet if left alone, but will tolerate quite severe pruning throughout the season. There's a fine specimen along the West wall of Nayland Churchyard.

There is a form called Sundance with yellowish foliage; it is however liable to scorch in dry winds or frost, and lacks the contrast between flower and leaf of the basic form; the OM/S does not recommend it.

Another cultivar named Aztec Pearl has the proper dark green foliage, but the leaves are more divided; a bush here is literally covered in white flowers at the moment.

Choisya is incidentally very easy to propagate from cuttings of half-ripe wood, taken from non-flowering shoots in early Summer. To sum up, altogether an excellent garden plant. Good foliage, reliable flowering, not fussy about soil or position. Would that all plants were so amenable.

40 YEARS OF OPEN GARDENS

This year the Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society is celebrating 40 years of Open Gardens and now is a good time to look back and remember how this event started.

The Society was founded in 1974 and the first Chairman was Blair Lees who lived at Stour House in Court Street, where the original committee met. In the early days we discussed plans for the future which included restoring Horkesley Lock Pool, a sign for Court Knoll, the first exhibition, first history book, first outing, etc etc, and one very important matter was, of course, fundraising.

One spring evening in 1978 the committee were discussing ideas for fundraising and the late Fred Hammond came up with the idea of asking people to open their gardens. At that time Chelsworth was the only village in the area doing this and Fred thought there were gardens in Nayland just as lovely as Chelsworth (which this year is celebrating 50 years of opening its gardens). The committee agreed this was an excellent idea and immediately began approaching residents to see if they would like to take part in this innovative venture.

Fred was a keen gardener who won many prizes at horticultural shows and had lived in Nayland all his life at No 1 Gravel Hill. When he died in 1982 Blair Lees described him in the *Nayland Record* as a great stalwart whose knowledge of Nayland had been a great asset to the committee and said he would be sadly missed. Fred will be remembered by all who knew him as having a highly mischievous sense of humour - his party piece was standing on a table in the Anchor Saloon Bar singing "I am the Music Man" accompanying himself with the sounds of bag pipes and other instruments, to much laughter from us all!

It was decided to hold the first Open Gardens event on Sunday, 16th July. In that first year there were 11 gardens open: Mr & Mrs Randall at 18 Heycroft Way; Mr & Mrs Gordon Padget on Harpers Estate; Dr & Mrs Cloudesley-Smith at Sargeants, Bear Street; Mr & Mrs Findlay at 54 Bear Street; Mrs Southall at 38 Bear Street; Mr & Mrs Dryden at Woodpeckers, Stoke Road; Mr & Mrs Horlock at Stream House, Fen Street; Brigadier & Mrs Litton at the White House, Church Lane; Mr & Mrs Hines at the Post Office and Mr & Mrs Fowke at Knollgate, Court Street. The ticket to visit all the gardens cost an exorbitant 50p. The eleventh garden was Parkers in Bear Street where Mr and Mrs Milne-Redhead lived and, as well as opening their garden, which they did for the next seven years, they very kindly offered the use of their barn for the teas.

An important part of the day was, and still is of course, tea and cakes. We three lady members of the committee (Joan Moore, our first Secretary, Linda Clapham and I) remember with some amusement, baking for days before and the almost medieval conditions in which we worked - a far cry from the modern conveniences of the village hall.

Nowadays the event is so well organised but that first time we had no idea what the response would be. However, the sun shone and the crowds came! Needless to say we ran out of cakes! These days the teas are always in the Village Hall but in the past James and Andora Carver, as well as opening their garden at Mill House, sometimes also kindly hosted the teas from the 1990s when Andora was secretary.

Many people will remember Edgar Milne-Redhead, a distinguished botanist and conservationist who worked at Kew for many years. He was made an MBE for his work and lived at Parkers for about 20 years. Conservation was a relatively new word in the 1970s and Mr Milne-Redhead was ahead of his time. He and his wife Olive were great supporters of the society from its inception and Edgar became its Life President.

At the committee meeting following the event it was agreed the occasion had been a huge success and that a date should be fixed for a similar function next year. A net profit of £90 after expenses had been made and this was used to pay for a spirit duplicator.

Based on the first year's experience, a year later, in 1979, we decided to move the event to June because most people thought roses were at their best then and we also realised that a map on the ticket was essential. This time there were 8 different owners of the 11 who opened their gardens, including the Knight and Cropper families at Alston Court and Mrs Bungey at The Butts. The Old Vicarage in the High Street, Rose Cottage in Fen Street and Clare Cottage in Bear Street also opened along with Rita Dibble in Laburnum Grove. Over subsequent years many other gardens have opened including Wiston Mill and Wissington Grange.

As the years went by the number of visitors and profits increased. People came from far and wide and many still return year after year. It was soon decided to donate some of the proceeds to various conservation related bodies and projects and these have


included the Suffolk Wildlife Trust, restoration projects for Nayland and Wiston Churches, Pakenham Mill, Colchester Castle, Hadleigh Deanery Tower and others. To celebrate the Millennium a record 30 gardens were open when about £2,000 was raised.

Once again the Open Gardens event will be taking place on the 11th June, for the 40th time.

Since 1978 the event has become a permanent feature of the Nayland calendar providing an enjoyable afternoon for residents and visitors. Most years we have been blessed with good weather but the odd shower or even a thunderstorm never seem to deter the visitors and long may this continue.

The Walsh Trust is an old village charity which gives small Christmas bonuses to the elderly. There are now 7 trustees who are Mrs Eva Rolfe, Miss Kath Hunt, Mrs Mig Knight and Mrs Rosemary Knox while Mr Gerald Battye and Mrs Patricia Fuller represent the Parish Council. Our income is too small to qualify for the Charity Aid Fund's bank account with its

slightly better interest rate and the present low interest rates is limiting our small income. We therefore can only give bonuses to those over 80 who have lived in the village for at least 3 years. As these bequests were originally given to provide extra food and coal we give a Christmas gift to those who used to receive the bonus but who now live in residential care.

As we have no official way of finding out who is 80 we rely on everyone to tell us of parishioners reaching this age by Christmas who would welcome the bonus. Please let one of the Trustees know by December 1st. As a charity we should use all our income as bonuses so once we have allotted the money it is very difficult to give to latecomers. This year we gave out 17 bonuses to single people of £30 and 3 couples of £45 with 2 $\,$ gifts to those in residential care at £5. Last year rather more money was carried over to this year but this time we have spent all the income (which we are meant to do) except 68 pence.



Your Antivirus May Be Letting You Down

The best way to avoid a computer virus is by using common sense, but that doesn't mean you'll be safe from attack. Even the most careful user can find themselves infected in an instant and spreading the virus faster than a sneeze in flu season. It's why antivirus software is still the first package we install on all systems - because you never know when you'll be attacked. But should you choose free or paid antivirus?

Advertising: Much like a free app making its fortune with in-app purchases, the free antivirus software will push for payment. Expect popup boxes pestering you to sign up to the paid version at least daily. Some free options will also try to change your browser home page and default search engine, an inconvenience you may be stuck with. Paid options are more respectful and largely invisible unless they've detected a problem.

Effectiveness: It's fair to expect your antivirus to detect malware, and testing showed that in a head-to-head battle free and paid are about equal at catching known infections. And therein lies the kicker: generally speaking, free antivirus needs to have recorded a virus to its library before it can detect it. Paid antivirus is more likely to identify and stop a new virus. It essentially bases the detection on suspicious behaviour, source and attributes, a far more effective method of detection.

Features: Free antivirus options are usually created from the paid version, taking out everything except the bare minimum. In your paid version, you can expect advanced features like spam filters, firewalls, parental controls and secure web browsing. Some paid antivirus will also update your other software packages, forming a more secure protection against attacks. For example, you might view a malicious image file that takes advantage of an exploit in your PDF software. Unfortunately, hackers have advanced beyond simple tactics and it's not just about avoiding email attachments anymore.

Support: Free antivirus options are the most popular choice because they're... free. Obviously. This also means there's generally no support available. If there's a problem or conflict with another program, you may find yourself without protection until it can be resolved. Paid antivirus usually includes telephone support. Ease of use: Depending on what you use your computer for, this may be an important concern. Free antivirus options are easy to install and use, but are very limited in their flexibility. They come as-is, meaning you can't pick and choose what it monitors or how it reacts. Paid versions are more likely to allow you to adapt the way it runs, switching features on and off as required.

Free antivirus is fine for very basic protection, those on a budget or those with an older PC. In these cases, something is always better than nothing. But we generally recommend you go with a paid antivirus to defend you from the new attacks that are released daily, and to ensure you've got solid protection that will make a real difference to your digital safety.

VILLAGE PLAYERS' THE DEEP BLUE SEA

What were the pressures of the 1950s? For some of us, too young to know of much more than tales of the end of rationing or Macmillan's 'never had it so good' speech, *The Deep Blue Sea* is a useful point of reference. Terence Rattigan's play, presented this spring by the Village Players, shows us how the pressures of the recent war, coupled with those of contemporary social mores, could lead to feelings of hopelessness and emotional suppression.

Set in 1952 west London, *The Deep Blue Sea* tells the story of Hester, whom we meet after a failed suicide attempt. We learn of the breakdown of her marriage, and her intense affair with an airman. We meet the significant men in her life and her friends and neighbours. We experience sadness, longing and despair. And we watch as Hester summons the strength to make painful, lasting decisions.

This production, directed by Chrissie Kettle, captured the essence of Rattigan's writing. Susanne Harknett played Hester Collyer, whose conflict and passion provide the energy and momentum of the story. Harknett artfully portrayed the desperation of Collyer as she comes to terms with her circumstances. Mark Russell's performance as Freddie Page accurately depicted the broken war hero, and was a happy counterpart to Jim Bond's William Collyer, the heartbroken husband. Nick Moriarty's Miller was particularly compelling as he turned from symbolising moral ambiguity to showing real moral authority. And Sharon Pentney, Justin Dowding, Emma Wallis and Chris Hunt were fine confidantes, neighbours and friends, in the cultural norms of post-war England.

This was a welcome and thought-provoking addition to the Nayland repertoire, with the set, props, lighting and sound also all up to the Players' usual high standards. A real post-war classic which tackles timeless themes.

In his memory, it made sense therefore to complete my own European cycle tour, and at the same time to try and raise some money for the PSP Association.

From the week commencing 23 June I will attempt to cycle through eight different countries in just one week.

A lot of European countries look pretty close together on a map of the world; believe me, they don't seem quite so close on a bike! July 25th August, 15th. and September 21st. What is special about these 3 dates?

They are the Festival days for the three saints who form the dedications for our five Benefice churches. Three dates, five churches? Remember our four medieval churches are by origin Roman Catholic and thus Polstead, Stoke by Nayland and Wiston are all dedicated to St. Mary The Virgin, the Saint highly regarded by Catholics. Nayland of course is St. James (The Greater) and Leavenheath St. Matthew.

When you live locally, may be even have been born in the area, it is easy to take our fine churches for granted. However look up the guide books and they wax lyrical about the beauty of not only the churches but also the county. Four of our churches are medieval often built by great landowners funded by the wool trade. They were built to the glory of God, perhaps hoping to enhance the beauty God had already provided. We are the fortunate recipients of their efforts.

These days we are told by the media that church attendance is falling, and these great churches are almost empty, yet at our recent Benefice Easter Celebration over 200 attended Stoke. We also read of a shortage of priests and smaller failing village churches being closed or utilised as a community asset. What to do, falling numbers, fewer priests?

We in our Diocese are not alone in putting into practice what the Bible tells us, we are all a priestly people with many talents given to us to share as Christians with others. This leads us to utilise members in running their own non-Eucharistic services led by lay people. Such worship is in no way second best, often revealing to individuals a talent they didn't realise they had. We read in Acts of such events necessitated by growing a new church. The Bishops' drive in our time is entitled "Growing Deeper, growing Younger and growing in Number". This is what we are all tasked to do and it is beginning to bear fruit. Have you thought of contributing? Perhaps you too have an unused hidden talent to share, not just in a church service, you will be welcomed.

Fancy a walk on the footpath in Wiston past St Mary's Church? Do call into the church porch and browse through the selection of second-hand books - autobiographies, cookery, children's, fiction, and non-fiction.

DOG FOULING

What's the issue?

You'll find this hard to believe but some people who walk their dogs in and around Nayland don't bother to bag up their dog poo and bin it. Others dutifully bag up their dog poo but abandon the bag as litter. Some don't live in the village. Some do.

Why is that a problem?

It's irresponsible, it's anti-social, it creates avoidable health risks for humans and other animals including livestock ... and it's illegal.

Have you, your neighbours, your friends, your family, your children or your grandchildren ever stepped in dog poo and unknowingly carried into your car or your home? Have you ever cycled or pushed a buggy through dog poo? Not pleasant is it?

Did you know that dogs' digestive tracts harbour the eggs of all sorts of parasites including whipworm, hookworm, tapeworm and roundworm that can cause conditions such as parvovirus, corona, giardiasis, salmonellosis, cryptosporidium, toxicariasis and camphylobacteria that could lead to serious illness and even blindness?

Did you know that the eggs of these harmful parasites can remain active for many years?

Yes, we've heard all this before. Why bring it up again?

When we walk our dogs we regularly encounter abandoned filled dog poo bags and abandoned dog poo. Recently we found a substantial pile of dog poo unbagged and abandoned immediately under the dog poo bin in Newlands Lane. Later in the same week we found a pile of very similar dog poo on our drive. Witness evidence tells us that some of these brazenly irresponsible dog walkers are known repeat offenders. Some aren't local residents. Some are.

Who would do a thing like that and why?

We all have the right to enjoy our walks free of abandoned

dog poo bags and dog poo. Responsible dog walkers know what to do with their dog poo. They bag it and bin it.

Irresponsible dog walkers can't be bothered to bag and bin their dog poo. They believe the rules don't apply to them. Irresponsible dog walkers will sometimes tell you that abandoning dog poo doesn't matter because it's no worse than the poo of other animals including herbivores such as sheep and cattle which people don't complain about. But dogs are ominivores so their poo is closer to human poo in terms of its characteristics and environmental impact. That's the difference.

Irresponsible dog walkers feel that they have the right to abandon their dog poo or filled dog poo bags anywhere and any time they choose. They're not bothered. And they don't care.

Well, yes it matters of course, but it's not actually illegal is it?

You could be subject to an on the spot fine of £50. Or if you're reported and prosecuted through the criminal courts you could be fined up to £1,000. It's smarter to bag it and bin it.

OK, I understand the problem. But what should I do?

If you're an irresponsible dog walker you should change your attitudes and your habits ... starting from today. If you're not an irresponsible dog walker and you become aware of a problem, you should report it to Babergh District Council. Either way, you'll be doing your duty, you'll feel better ... and you'll be helping everyone enjoy a safer and healthier local environment. So listen to your conscience and:

- •Buy dog poo bags online or in shops. Bin dog poo in the dog poo bins provided in the village ... or in your black bin at home.
- Report dog fouling and dog litter to Babergh District Council on 01473 826622 or by email to baberghmidsuffolk.gov.uk
 So get bagging and binning. And get reporting. Today.



NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE PARISH ASSEMBLY - MAY 2017

FINANCE

Sources of income for Parish Council expenditure have diminished. Grants from central government were halved last year and ceased in 2017-18. The Parish Council Precept was increased by 1.9% from April 2017 but this is capped. The Parish Council has adopted a five year financial management plan. Other income is from the allotments and burial fees, which needs to cover the costs of administering and managing those areas. We received £1,000 grant from Tesco Groundworks scheme towards the updated Glebe Field and allotment management plan.

Criminal damage to Council property during 2016 put unexpected pressure on expenditure, as did the £4,600 required to repair and update the older section of the Fairfield play area which has delayed the replacement signage there.

Approx £5,500 was paid to the Village Hall for the replacement boiler system. This was taken from the PC Village Hall Capital Fund leaving a balance of just over £400 at end of year and the Council makes the payments for the longterm loan on the Village Hall. The Council allocates a sum every year to this capital fund and also to the general capital fund for other project works.

We had expected the outstanding stages of the street lighting scheme to have been completed and paid for by the end of March 2017, but unfortunately this is not the case so this carry forward commitment distorts the true balance at the end of the year by approximately £19,000.

STREETLIGHTING

We are still waiting for UK Power networks to connect the standard in Court Street. We are also investigating an alternative site near Vine House as residents want the existing light removed from their property. There will be a new standard at the Mill Street T junction because the fitting on the shop wall has been condemned as unsafe. We continue to save on energy bills because of the new LED lights which also cause less light pollution than the old orange lights.

HIGHWAYS

Councillors were pleased to see the resurfacing and relining in parts of Nayland, and supported the proposals for the A134 speed limit. However, there is still a drainage problem and flooding has occurred in Bear Street, Birch Street, Stoke Road and Court Street because of blocked or ineffective drains although a full survey with cameras was promised by SCC a year ago. There is also a problem in Newlands Lane.

We have made complained about ineffective weedkilling and the quarterly road sweeping equipment in some areas.

The permanent speed equipment point installed in Stoke Road will check traffic going in both directions several times of year.

We have been investigating the possibility of cycle racks on Babergh land to link with bus transport.

Unauthorised parking by school parents in the turning circle of the vicarage driveway is adding to damage to the surface.

LITTERPICKING

Our own contractors work in different sections of the parish each week for two hours. Most rubbish seems to come from passing vehicles, takeaway packaging, cans and bottles. We have written several times to Colchester Borough Council about the litter on the Essex side of A134. There have been three community litterpicks that include PROW footpaths and we are grateful to volunteers. We have reported several instances of flytipping which seems to have increased since charges were introduced at the amenity sites a year ago.

ALLOTMENTS AND GLEBE FIELD

Extensive hedge maintenance and access plan is ongoing. Waymarking posts for the permissive path, new gates and planting the headland with native wildflowers are in progress.

CALEY GREEN

Last year I mentioned that we would be revisiting the management of Caley Green. Cllr. Kathleen Cannings has spent months going through the archived records of the past 50 years and compiled a report which is on the display boards. Fifteen years ago there was a proposal for a more conservation related management scheme, but at the time this was welcomed by some residents but not by others. Suffolk CC owns the land and is responsible for trees, but they have no plans for replanting in the event of ash dieback or storm damage. The Parish is licensed to maintain Caley Green but anything more than grasscutting must have the consent of the landowner. This includes bankside reed management. Any reed management needs to be part of an agreed scheme with the Environment Agency, Suffolk County Council and the Parish Council and needs to be carried out at the correct time of year, i.e. not between March and October. It would be interesting to know the current views of residents regarding replanting or leaving some areas uncut for part of the year.

PLANNING SINCE APRIL 2016

Parish Council was consulted by Babergh on 40 applications for planning and listed building consent, including seven applications for tree work, most of the others were for alterations and extension work. Three Babergh applications were withdrawn. Council had objected to one. We would always recommend that applicants discuss their proposals with the planners before making an application, particularly for listed buildings or change of use, to minimise delays and reduce the risk of rejection.

Council objected to the Suffolk application for extending operations at the Harpers Hill Waste site. However, this was granted.

Councillors attended consultation meetings in 2016 regarding the greenhouse site at Horkesley. Although we had no objection in principle to limited development, we did raise concerns about pedestrian safety, access to footpaths and protection of AONB.

LOCAL HOUSING NEEDS

For the past sixteen months we have been trying to set up a local housing needs survey with adjoining parishes and Babergh DC. Unfortunately constant delays at Babergh have caused frustration. Planning legislation is constantly changing and has been complicated recently by the judicial review rejection of Babergh's permission for a controversial East Bergholt development which has had an impact on Babergh's five year housing strategy and the latest Local Plan is no longer viable. Stoke by Nayland and Nayland with Wiston, supported by District Cllr. Barrett, are still trying to move forward but as at 24th April we have no agreed discussion date.

SUFFOLK CONSTABULARY

Parish Council wrote to The Police Commissioner and to the Chief Constable expressing concern about the current lack of communication with district officers about local events. This was also a concern expressed by residents at last APA. Communication with parishes is now via the police forum meetings held every two months in different parts of the district. These are open to members of the public. Next forum meeting will be at 7.30 on 10th May at Hadleigh Swimming Pool. Unfortunately, our Parish Council meeting is that evening.

COUNCIL VACANCY

We still have a vacancy for co-opted membership until the next elections in 2019. If you are interested in joining the Parish Council, please talk to one of the Councillors or the Parish Clerk to find out what is involved. As well as attending monthly meetings, councillors take on specific delegated roles within the council to spread the workload fairly.

DEFENDING THE HARBOUR'



Landguard Fort is situated on a peninsular, opposite Harwich and where the Rivers Stour and Orwell Join to flow into the North Sea. It has a long rich history, but its major triumph is the preventing of the last full scale invasion of England by the Dutch on 2nd July 1667 - exactly 350 years ago this summer! By 1900 the Fort was obsolete, until the problem of reliability of targe bore breech loading artillery was resolved. 


