## Extract of Draft Minutes for Meeting: 13th December 2017

#### **DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT**

Cllr Melanie Barrett provided a report on the proposed merger of the District Councils and the Boundary Commission Review. She is interested to hear views about the process.

#### **PLANNING**

The Planning Authority confirmed consent had been granted to re-pollard protected lime tree at **104 Bear Street** [DC/17/05405] and to crown reduce protected yew tree at **43 Bear Street** [DC/17/05199]. Outline planning permission had been granted for 9 dwellings at **New Farm, Harpers Hill** [DC/17/04206]. Permission had been granted to vary condition 2 for dwelling and cartlodge application at **Westwood, Harpers Hill** [DC/17/04908] and Listed Building consent had been granted to re-render **Victoria Cottage, 18 Court Street** [DC/17/04886]. Discharge of conditions were approved in respect of materials at **Westwood**, but the landscaping scheme was not considered acceptable [DC/16/01580]. Permission and Listed Building had been refused for a carport at **2 High Street** [DC/17/05005].

Regarding recent applications the PC had no objections to a proposed extension and outbuilding conversion at **25 Stoke Road** [DC/17/05485] or at **The Malt House, 16 Stoke Road** [DC/17/05741] for a conservation area application to remove a walnut tree. There were no objections to the change of use from office to residential at **4 Church Mews** [DC/17/05322] and the planning and listed building application at **Mill House, Wiston Hall Lane** [DC/17/05888/9] for alterations and additions including construction of pitched roofs, insertion/replacement of windows, small addition to rear, internal alterations and erection of first floor extension. Erection of extension and alterations to summer house. (Amendment to Planning Permission B/17/00532).

It was confirmed by the Planning Authority that Permission was not required at **Hilltop Farm, Harpers Hill** [DC/17/05639] to clear the access track of vegetation, clear the aerial area of vegetation and clear trees from around the pole.

In view of the declared interests, there were insufficient members to consider **11 Elm Grove** *DC/17/05940]* for erection of single storey side extension.

**Anchor Inn, 26 Court Street** [DC/17/03612/3] A response of objections was agreed as follows:

- The consensus was that for the sustainability of the business, there does need to be improved parking. However, the proposed large scale, surfacing, lighting, signage, the narrow pavement and crossing place for pedestrians on a blind bend does not appear to be adequately addressed in this particular plan. It is essential Babergh undertakes a site meeting with Highways to assess issues. We have concerns that noise would be generated from the gravel surface late at night and would affect the amenity of neighbours.
- We also support the Heritage Teams view regarding the inappropriate decking.
- We would remind Babergh of our earlier comments regarding these applications. For these reasons and our earlier submissions Nayland with Wissington Parish Council objects to

#### POTENTIAL MERGER OF THE DISTRICT COUNCILS

The proposed combined District Council for Babergh and Mid Suffolk was discussed and a response agreed as follows: The Parish Council would like to register its objections to the proposal. Reasons given included:

1. We object to the way this has been handled and the lack of consultation. 2. This would represent a fundamental change to the democratic process very soon after the Referendum on the subject. It would result in a Council and its Officers more remote from residents who are already experiencing deteriorations in service. 3. Any financial savings would be soaked up by the cost of re-organisation. 4. We cannot see any evidence to support a case for this change and are concerned it would be yet another distraction from running services efficiently.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

Mary George shared how a HGV report prompted a follow up with the Haulage Company. She urged everyone to continue to report incidents when lorries are wrongly directed through the village. Progress is starting to be made in relation to the drainage issues which have been subject to various reports. A bus hit guttering in Birch Street and full details were exchanged. It was agreed for the Chairman to respond to a resident concerned about the speed detection pole in Stoke Road. Whilst the PC agreed the original communication about the introduction of the pole was poor, the height has since been lowered and on balance members supported the case for it to remain.

#### STREET LIGHTING

It was agreed lights should stay on all night on Christmas Eve and New Years Eve. It was agreed to chase the remaining upgrades and request unit 45 in Bear Street is switched off at midnight along with the other village lights,

## **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

Gerry Battye reported nothing major was raised in the annual playground inspection report; he will produce an action plan for the next meeting. The playground gate issue has been raised again. It was agreed to cut back the overgrown vegetation to the access on the left hand side of Pop's Piece hedge. Litter and fly tipping was noted on the A134 and near the sluice gates. **FINANCE** 

Following discussion the recommendations made by Finance Committee were unanimously carried. These included: A Precept of £34,120 for 2018/19 year which is an increase of 1.5% to residents. A minimum of £8190 to be allocated towards the Village Hall Roof. The PC supports a payment from the Locality Budget towards the Village Hall Roof. This PC adheres to the National Scale for Clerks Salaries for 2018/19 year. The current contractors be awarded the Grass and Litter Contracts for 2018/19 year. The Contribution towards Webbs Meadow grass cutting be increased to £300. The Burial and Allotment fees be increased in accordance with the usual arrangements

It was agreed to adopt the Suffolk Local Code of Conduct. The principle of having documents available online was favoured. **IN BRIEF** 

Mary George confirmed that funds have now been made available to conduct a Housing Needs Survey; an application will be needed from the working party to Community Action Suffolk in the New Year.

It was agreed to reimburse Ian Harris for expenses for the cutting of the Glebe Field. The thoughts of the sub-committee is that allotment number markers are not necessary.

An issue with the gate on the Horkesley side of the footbridge will be reported to Sally Bartrum, Footpath Warden.

Mary George confirmed the maintenance plan at the Burial Ground is being updated for discussion at the next Meeting.

The Community Council were praised for the Christmas Tree which was put up in the snow.

Village Hall Chairman, Iain Wright, will attend the February meeting to discuss the Village Hall Roof Project. PAGE 2

#### **PLANNING**

Reviewing planning decisions from Babergh Mary George reported permission had been granted subject to conditions at **25 Stoke Road Nayland** [DC/17/05485] for single-storey link extension, conversion of outbuilding and two storey rear extension. No works shall commence above slab level until details of the style, colour and material of the proposed timber boarding to be used in construction have been approved.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections to a two-storey rear extension at **15 Stoke Road** *IDC/17/061491*.

#### **HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY**

The working party including Mary George, Gerry Battye and Graham Walker plans to meet to complete a funding application.

#### **DATA PROTECTION CHANGES**

The new Data Protection Act comes into place on 25 May this year. It requires PCs to appoint a Data Protection Officer who cannot be a Councillor or Parish Clerk.

#### **ALLOTMENTS AND GLEBE FIELD**

Councillors agreed that laminated A4 numbers would be provided to allotment holders to display during the Best Kept Allotment competition.

The organiser of the Nayland 10K fun run has requested that the route might include a circuit of the Allotment field in order to avoid 'bunching' in Socket Alley.

Councillors stated that runners should keep outside the markers and access for allotment holders and their vehicles should not be affected. The PC had been assured that there would be appropriate stewarding and the field would be cleared of any litter, etc. The PC would write to allotment holders to advise. Councillors remarked that the route could well contain rabbit holes which is not ideal for runners.

#### **FOOTPATHS INCLUDING BRIDGES**

Debbie Hattrell (Parish Clerk) has reminded the landowner that a permissive path has collapsed near the river.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

There is now a different online system at Suffolk County Council for notifications, via email alerts, about road closures and diversions. You can choose which area you would like to be notified about and whether you want weekly or monthly updates. The Parish Clerk will register for this.

Councillors commented on the amount of litter on the verges of the A134, on both the Essex and Suffolk sides.

Debbie Hattrell has received no response to her email concerning the verge-side mess left after Suffolk CC had completed Highways repairs near the Old Fox Inn, Wiston.

#### STREET LIGHTING

There has been no reply to the Clerk's messages to Suffolk CC regarding completing the street lighting programme.

Councillors commented that it may appear the PC has large amounts of funds when in reality, the funds are partly spoken for by the new street lighting.

#### **VILLAGE HALL**

Tricia Fuller reported that Iain Wright will be attending the February PC meeting to give a presentation on the need to replace the Village Hall roof.

Following incidents of drivers using the playing field and damaging its surface, the VHMC is considering installing CCTV to record future incidents.

## **COMMUNITY COUNCIL**

Mary George reported that while the CC has been working towards providing two community defibrillators for Nayland the Fire Service has been awarded funding to install a defibrillator at Nayland Fire Station. The CC's efforts will continue for a single defibrillator to be located at the Village Hall.

Councillors supported this decision; there are many public events held in and around the hall, some attracting thousands of visitors, and it would be sensible to have immediate access to a defibrillator.

#### **BURIAL GROUND**

Mary had shared an update to the five-year long term maintenance plan with Parish Councillors. Four fence panels are being monitored, repairs and an extension to the tarmac path are required and a tree-safety inspection is due. Action was required regarding the Jane Walker memorial plinth and a memorial seat.

#### **RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES**

Mary advised that there is a grants system potentially available from the War Memorial Trust to a maximum of £30,000. Both Wiston and Nayland War Memorials would benefit from some restoration and cleaning. This will be included on the February agenda.

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


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## **Nayland Community Store Ltd** "Save Our Post Office" Campaign update 9th January 2018

The Nayland Community Store Ltd (NCSL) is delighted to report that, after a successful interview with Mr Alan Lusher of the Post Office on 14 December, we have been offered a contract to take over Navland Post Office. Mr Lusher was very welcoming and grateful for our application. We are creating precedent with the Post Office and some legal decisions had to be taken by their most senior lawyer at Board level. This is a huge step forward in our

We have scoped out next steps but, crucially, timing is not in our control. For example, completion of due diligence on the existing Post Office business relies on timely replies from Mrs Ford and her solicitors; the Post Office has a ten week project preparation timeline as standard and we are as yet uncertain when that period will start. So please continue to be patient with us; we will keep everyone informed of our progress.

Broadly our timeline is:

- 1. Sign Post Office contract conditional upon our ability to raise the necessary funds.
- 2. Complete due diligence and agree contract for acquisition of assets with Mrs Ford (Birkett Long [BL] engaged to undertake that work) by the end January/mid- February. We are very grateful to BL for a fixed fee accompanied by a good amount of pro bono work; and of course to the Community Council for a loan of £2,500 to enable this important legal step.
- 3. Exchange of contracts between NCSL & Mrs Ford by mid-end February with legal completion conditional upon a successful share issue (say 10 working days after receipt of target funds).
- 4. Distribute window stickers to Pledgees to thank them for their support and also to advertise the upcoming share issue. The current pledge total is £56,341. New pledges are still welcome! Our aim is for the broadest community ownership possible.
- 5. Issue Share Prospectus March with funds to be submitted within 15 days. A public meeting will be held for all to attend at the time of the share issue.
- 6. Following successful share issue proceed to completion of lease; transfer of business; stock valuation and payment for stock.
- 7. Formal meeting with LEADER to accept grant (subject to signed PO contract and completion of lease with Mrs Ford).
- 8. Building works commence. We will attempt to keep the Post Office open during the renovations if possible. Train volunteer

This has proven to be a longer journey than expected, but gaining the PO contract was a massive milestone achieved. Thank you to everyone for your ongoing support and encouragement.

## **COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT**

Meeting: 10th January 2018 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

#### **MATTERS ARISING:**

**Executive Committee:** Rachel Hitchcock advised that no-one had come forward to fill the position of legal representative. Since 1966 when the Constitution was established the CC activities have evolved away from the need for a legal representative. It was felt if the need for legal advice arose the CC would approach a suitable specialist. It was agreed that the proposal to amend the Constitution to eliminate this position from the list of Officers is included on the AGM agenda.

Maggie Ryan agreed to look into whether an amendment in the Constitution in 1992 had been/needed to be lodged with the Charity Commission.

Members of the Executive present agreed their names could be put forward to continue for another year at the AGM. The Community Council Executive would welcome more members of village groups to join them as members of the CC.

**Fundraising Activities & Events:** The CC are focused on events for 2018 but ideas for fund raising projects to benefit the CC are always welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Rachel Hitchcock said while the CC has been working towards providing two community defibrillators for Nayland the Fire Service has been awarded funding to install a defibrillator at Nayland Fire Station. Therefore our efforts will continue for a single defibrillator to be located at the Village Hall and Rachel will amend the Awards For All Lottery grant application accordingly. Once the CC has secured the second defibrillator we will proceed with the Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) for installation and ongoing support. A training session will also be held in liaison with CHT and the Fire Station. In the meantime we will raise awareness and details of access of the defibrillator at the Fire Station in the CT.

**Community Post Office:** Liz Mellon reported on the current situation - see page 7 for the full update.

**Village Hall Garden Working Party:** The next gardening morning will be on Saturday 17th March from 9am. Help with the CC's section would be particularly appreciated.

**Recent Activities:** Rachel Hitchcock expressed thanks to all who had helped with the very successful recent activities

**Bonfire & Fireworks:** Sunday 5th November. What a night! This saw Nayland besieged with a record attendance and profit was a record breaking £2,981. Everybody did a fabulous job and it is safe to say we definitely couldn't have done it without any one of our helpers. Everyone thoroughly enjoyed the evening so well done one and all.

**Christmas Fayre:** Saturday 2nd December. Rachel Hitchcock said there was a lovely atmosphere and she had received lots of positive feedback. The Fayre made a profit too but it as much about being a festive, social village event.

Christmas Tree: Claire Buller and her team were thanked for organising an excellent tree and overcoming the challenge of putting it up during a snow blizzard. There had been very positive comments on the tree and the new star. The tree was enjoyed at the Carol Singing; it was mooted that the CC organise mince pies and mulled wine for participants as a fundraiser next year. Chris Hunt agreed to liaise with the event organisers. Iain Wright could provide the licence required. We are grateful to the Dental Clinic who provide the electricity for the lights.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Maggie Ryan gave her report.

**Current Position:** The accounts show reserves at 31 December of £19, 411.07 represented by Deposit a/c monies £10,584.65, Current a/c monies £8,789.72, Cash in hand £36.70. We hold £121.50 for the Services Fund. **Unencumbered assets are therefore £19,289.57.** 

It has been a good year for the Community Council which has provided essential funding towards Nayland Community Store Ltd (£2,500 grant and £2,500 loan); Mother and Toddler Group (£450); the new Nayland website (£526.35); Over 60s Christmas luncheon (£200) and the Crib Festival (£50).

Our events have been very successfully supported with a record profit made on Bonfire Night of £2,980.91 on gate takings of £4,809.23. The Christmas Fayre made a profit again this year. The Community Times made £1678.37 towards our reserves, slightly down on last year due to the loss of some advertisers. Calendar profit currently stands at £691.24 but has yet to be finalised. We have benefited from some generous donations from the Nayland 10K run event (£479.52) and from a private individual towards the firework display (£200).

#### **GRANTS & DONATIONS:**

Nayland Community Store Ltd (Post Office): made an application for a 'loan' to cover legal fees to carry out the due diligence necessary to allow the share issue for the acquisition of the Post Office to proceed.

The CC has been involved with and fully supportive of the Post Office project since its inception. Total pledges now received total circa £55,000 and the group has also secured a grant of over £21,000. It was agreed that the Post office is vital to our community and the CC would support this loan.

**Community Times:** Lorraine Brooks said There have been some new yearly advertisers but the pattern is towards smaller size adverts. Last year saw the loss of 9 annual subscription advertisers; since November there have been 6 gains. The number of one-off advertisers has also been down.

**Village Calendar:** Lorraine Brooks said calendar sales have been level with the last few years with 212 copies sold. Profit was slightly down as the print cost had increased. Calendars are still available at the Post Office, Forget Me Not or from Wendy Sparrow.

The calendar team are willing to continue for one more year, making it the 10th Nayland calendar, but they ask the CC to support the calendar photo competition and help with sales particularly as Hattens and Blue Owl have been lost as sales points. With a profit of almost £700 the CC agreed the calendar should go ahead. Lorraine thanked the calendar team for their hard work.

Do keep taking photos and don't forget to enter them for the calendar competition. Deadline for entries will be 28th April, the judging and display will be on Bank Holiday 7th May.

This equipment can save vital time whilst waiting for the emergency services to arrive and can dramatically improve a person's chances of survival when administered within a few minutes.

Since then we have received good news!

We are pleased to be able to inform you that there IS now a Public Access Defibrillator in Nayland. It is located on the outside wall of Nayland Fire Station, Bear Street, Nayland CO6 4HY.

This is independent of the Community Council project and has been installed by the Fire Service. Please familiarise yourself with its location and let your friends, family and neighbours know too.

ALWAYS DIAL 999 IN AN EMERGENCY, THE CALL HANDLER WILL KNOW THERE IS A DEFIBRILLATOR NEARBY:

- The defibrillator is fully accessible, 24/7
- Training is not necessary as the device provides clear visual and audible instructions
- Get it to the patient whilst the 999 call is going on using it quickly can greatly help the outcome when someone is in cardiac arrest.





# MORE CRIMINAL DAMAGE AT NAYLAND ALLOTMENTS: Christmas 2017

Over the past couple of years there have been random acts of criminal damage to allotments and to tenants' property, all of which have been reported to the Police. There has also been trespass on the grazing pasture by vehicles and unauthorised parking in the tenants' parking area which caused damage and inconvenience. As a result, allotment tenants requested that a gate be installed at the entrance to the allotments while still providing an open access for pedestrians. The Parish Council arranged for this be to be done during Summer 2017.

On or about Christmas nght, the new wooden gate was removed from the metal posts at the entrance to the allotments and screwed to the old gate into the field. This was obviously pre-planned as itwould have involved considerable effort and use of tools by at least two people. It also rendered it very difficult for walkers to open and close the field gate.

Unfortunately, reinstatement and repair of these two gates will result in a cost to the Parish Council from the precept tax paid by all Nayland with Wissington residents. The Parish Council reported the damage to the Police immediately. The incident number for the police investigation is 37/82099/17. If anyone has any information about this incident, the car seen in the vicinity on Christmas Night, or any other criminal activity on Parish Council land, please contact the Parish Clerk or Suffolk Police.

On the 3<sup>rd</sup> February at 2 pm an exhibition will be taking place in Nayland Village Hall when Jo Caruth of Suffolk Archaeology will be bringing everyone up to date with the latest developments on the Court Knoll project. In addition visitors will have the opportunity to view the most significant finds revealed by the excavations that took place in the autumn of 2016. It has been a long haul to reach this stage but hopefully the end of this project is beginning to appear on the horizon and the village will have a far better idea of its distant history by the time it is complete.

Also in conjunction with the Land Company (being the organisation which holds ownership of the conservation meadow and the field adjacent to it) a working party was held on the 28<sup>th</sup> of January under the supervision of Emma Black of the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley Project clearing undergrowth in the area, which I mention in the next paragraph.

The AGM of the Society is due to take place on the 12<sup>th</sup> of March and it will give the Society the opportunity to reward the magnificent efforts of Richard Wiles who has spent many years planting and looking after the woodland adjoining the Conservation meadow and Horkesley Lock. Once the Society's annual business is complete we welcome our speaker Mark Bills, the director of Gainsborough's House in Sudbury, who will tell us about the history of the house and its very exciting future.

May I also invite you to take the occasional look at our web site, which can be found at <u>www.naylandconservation.org.uk/</u> and contains details of our annual programme and many other interesting facts about the history of the village? You will notice that in conjunction with the Parish Council we are arranging the Village Litter Pick on Saturday the 14<sup>th</sup> April.

Happy New Year to all of our patients.

As many of you will be aware from the media the instances of flu and coughs/colds has been higher this year than in previous years. If you are suffering from a cough or cold please consider

accessing your local Pharmacist for advice and treatment. NHS 111 also provide advice and treatment options for patients.

As a practice we have seen a significant increase in the number of patients we are dealing with each day, particularly over

the last month. As well as our current number of appointments available to book each day, our duty team dealt with an additional 1,072 patients during December. These would have been telephone calls with a number of these patients being seen as extra emergency appointments on the day.

We are aware that patients are finding it difficult to arrange an appointment with a GP at our surgeries. As a result of patient feedback Creffield Medical Group have recently appointed a new Advanced Nurse Practitioner to work primarily at Creffield Medical Centre. This appointment will release some of the Partners from Creffield Medical Centre so that they can provide additional appointments at Nayland and West Bergholt Surgeries. We are hopeful that patients will see an improvement in access to appointments in the near future. We thank you for your co-operation while these changes take place.

You may have heard in the national press about Care Navigators. These are members of staff who are provided additional training in order to signpost patients to the most appropriate service/person for their healthcare needs. The training and programme that the staff follow has been designed with clinical input to ensure patient safety at all times. Although North Hill Medical Group are not currently trained for this role, Creffield Medical Centre will be one of the first practices to have Care Navigators.





## Garden Notes

## by The Old Muckspreader

Writing at a time when many gardeners have retired indoors to sit in the warmth with their feet up the OM/S will try to encourage them to look outside for the first signs of new growth. This will almost certainly come from the Winter Aconite, Eranthus Hyemalis (Latin for Winter). We have written about them many times in the past 17 years so will only say that no garden should be without it.

It will soon be followed by Snowdrops. We have also digressed on them in the past, and it appears in 2004 we talked of £20 being charged for some rare variety or other. Last year the OM/S was taken by his son to Anglesey Abbey (well worth a visit incidentally) to see the display there. They had various plants for sale, and he mentioned to his daughter-in-law the silly prices for some rare snowdrops. She questioned his accuracy, so he suggested she go and take a closer look (he had had a quick look beforehand!) and there were several pots of something or other, not even in flower, @ £50 each! The OM/S grows about five varieties including S Arnott, a tall one with large flowers, all gifts from generous gardeners.

The plant on the month is that beautiful scented shrub Viburnum Bodnantense 'Dawn', just now coming into flower; ours is pink but there is also a white variety.

Next month the Hellebores will be in flower so since the next issue of the NCT will not be out until April we can discuss them now. H. Niger, the Christmas Rose (a misnomer) seldom flowers until well into January and is a difficult customer, after several shots the OM/S has given up on it. H. Orientalis, the Lenten Rose, however, is easy. It comes in a range of colours. Here we have a large patch entirely white and it looks good; elsewhere we have pinks and a good dark purple.

This weekend newspapers offer collections at fairly steep prices, but they self-seed freely, so ask from a friend.

A fairly recent hybrid between H. Niger and h Orientalis is H. Ericsmithii, which is unique in that it is named from both christian and surname; no other plant is thus nominated. This is a most attractive plant with many flowers and good foliage. The OM/S intends to treat himself to it at the next opportunity.

Now for something entirely different as they used to say on one of the old TV commercials. The OM/S is often horrified at the state of most gardeners' tools; dirty and rusty they cannot possibly perform with any degree of efficiency. Now is at least a good opportunity to start the season in good order. A fairly rough grade aluminium oxide paper should get them into decent shape, followed by a wipe with a really oily rag. If you are going to have your mower serviced, it's best not to wait until the week before Easter when the workshops are full but get it done now. But does your mower really need such expensive treatment? A change of oil, general lubrication of all bearings, perhaps adjustment of the cutting cylinder and bottom blade and a new spark plug may be all that is needed.

Saws are another problem; many are rather blunt and close inspection may reveal teeth are all more or less in line. The teeth need to be bent alternatively outwards and this can be done with a pair of pliers, so long as care is taken not to overdo it and break them. This is not feasible, of course, with small toothed saws. Chainsaws incidentally, best kept out of amateur hands should always be kept sharp, both for efficiency and safety; in order to achieve this one should always have at least one sharp spare chain available.

That's probably quite enough lecturing and the OM/s promises he will stick with horticulture for the rest of the year.

# DID JANE AUSTEN EVER VISIT NAYLAND?

Looking back to the eighteenth century it is interesting that during this period Nayland had connections with at least three distinguished people of national importance: the artist John Constable, the Reverend William Jones and Jane Austen.

John Constable was born not far away in East Bergholt in June 1776, one of six children, and died in 1837. His father Golding was born in Bures, one of ten children, and became a prosperous miller and businessman, owning Flatford and Dedham mills. The Constable family had owned and farmed land across the Stour Valley for generations, including Nayland. On a Parish Rate Roll for 1768 a Mr Constable is listed as an "Outsetter" owning a considerable amount of land on the outskirts of the village, and on the 1838 Nayland Tithe Map Abraham Constable is listed as owning the Perry site in Bear Street.

Bell Meadow in Newlands Lane, several fields to the north of the village and several more along Wiston Road. He also owned Perry Cottage, later The Manse, and another cottage in Bear Street. However, all this property was eventually sold by the family during the nineteenth century and the Constable connection ceased.

Much has been written about John Constable's painting for St James's Church, one of only three religious works completed by him and the only one still in its original position. It was painted in 1809 and had been commissioned by his aunt Martha Smith who lived in Longwood House in Stoke Road. At that time he also had another aunt in Nayland, Sarah Greenwood, who lived at The Manse. John must have known Nayland well as he and his family made frequent visits to the village and some of their correspondence describing their family gatherings here has been published.

A year after Constable's birth in 1776 the Reverend William Jones came to Nayland. Known as "Jones of Nayland" he was born in Northamptonshire in July 1726. He was educated at University College Oxford and held several curacies in Northamptonshire and Kent before being appointed perpetual curate of Nayland in 1777. He was a zealous student of music and of natural science as well as theology and became one of the most prominent churchmen of his day. Nayland vicarage in Fen Street became the centre of a little circle which afterwards expanded into the high church party of the early part of the nineteenth century. In 1775 he had been elected a Fellow of the Royal Society and his collected works published in 1801 comprise many philosophical and theological contributions to literature.

William Jones died in Nayland in January 1800 aged 73 and so never saw Constable's painting which was installed in 1810, replacing the former altarpiece of Moses and Aaron. He was buried in St James's vestry in a vault which he had built in 1788 for the use of his family. A mural tablet erected in the chancel by his son, the Reverend W B Jones, "in memory of his inestimable parents" records the death of "the Rev William Jones, A.M, late Rector of Paston, Northants, and Perpetual Curate of this Church, on the 6<sup>th</sup> January 1800."

And finally the Jane Austen connection. Whilst over the years much has been written about John Constable and

William Jones and their contributions to Nayland's history, our claim to a connection with Jane Austen is not, I believe, very well known. But nonetheless if we are to believe what I recently read in an old parish magazine of 1944 this interesting connection is fact. The piece was entitled "Jones of Nayland and Jane Austen". The vicar at that time was Canon W J Wright, and he drew parishioners' attention to the mural tablet in St James's, described above.

It seems that Elizabeth, the wife of William Jones, was the link with Jane Austen who was born in Steventon in Hampshire in 1775 the seventh child of the Rector and his wife, and died in 1817. Elizabeth Jones was by birth a Bridges, second cousin of Sir Brook Bridges, 2<sup>nd</sup> baronet of Goodneston, Kent, grandfather of another Elizabeth Bridges who in 1791 became the wife of Edward Austen, brother of Jane Austen. The novelist would have been aged about 16 when her brother's marriage took place and 23 when Mrs Jones died in Nayland in 1799, a few months before her husband.

Did Jane meet Mrs Jones at her brother's wedding, Canon Wright wondered, and did she ever perhaps visit her relatives in Nayland – will we ever know? It is interesting to speculate on the possibility but even this somewhat tenuous connection through marriage proves there was a link between Nayland and Jane Austen, one of this country's most celebrated novelists. It was an interesting snippet written by Canon Wright for the readers of the parish magazine in 1944.

## VILLAGE PLAYERS: THE GAME'S AFOOT



In his award-winning Broadway play 'The Game's Afoot' Ken Ludwig created a multi-layered confection and in their recent production of it at Nayland Village Hall the Village Players served up this extremely entertaining comedy thriller slice by fascinating slice.

Subtitled 'Holmes for the Holidays' the play centres on William Gillette, the actor famous for his stage portrayal of Sherlock Holmes in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century, and is set in his Connecticut castle.

It is Christmas Eve and he has invited the cast of his latest production – a production during which he was shot and wounded – with a view to finding out who it was who had conspired to kill him. But as puppetmaster all is not set to go according to his plans.

Here we have a classic drawing room drama with all kinds of theatrical ingredients thrown in.

We have Sir Authur Conan Doyle's Holmes metaphorically shaking hands with William Shakespeare as Ludwig neatly explains the Shakespearean origins of the play's title.

Its setting of the living room in a castle during a blizzard cut off by the snow with unexpected characters nonetheless turning up we have a time-honoured Agatha Christie style scenario.

Then again we have the concept of 'Midsomer Murders' meets 'Tomorrow's World' with a healthy batch of murders alluded to – not to mention the odd on-stage pistol shot, stabbings and attempted stranglings – and the central character being a gadget geek which in the 1936 setting sees him with all kinds of tech, such as CCTV and speaker phones.

Then, of course, there is the time-honoured hidden room with access via the swivelling fireplace backed by a Thirties-style bar.

Throw in more than a taste of the Whitehall farce and fun that reached almost pantomime proportions, plus multiple amours and infidelities, mix it all up and, as I said, the Village Players served up a really spicy confection.

The action starts with a 'play within a play' as we were treated to a typical Holmesian finale scene with Moriarty getting his comeuppance then that unexpected shooting. Subsequently the play's actors all appear as the guests at the dinner.

John McCarroll was a fine, aristocratic William Gillette, slipping seamlessly between the actor persona and that of Sherlock Holmes

As husband and wife Felix and Madge Geisel, Justin Dowding was typically theatrical as the older thespian (Moriarty in the introductory pastiche) and Susanne Harknett was very convincing as the domineering superior artiste who is in league with her host in his sleuthing efforts.

Samuel Pentney played the gauche and garralous Simon Bright with aplomb and I was particularly captivated by Charlotte Harknett's portrayal of Aggie Wheeler, his new wife.

All demure and decorous initially, evoking sympathy and admiration, she developed into a scheming gold-digger and

aggressive harridan as the action progressed.

And you had to admire Mary Moriarty's contribution. Not only did she direct the play with considerable insight, capturing both the dramatic impact at all levels as well as injecting an impish sense of fun into the proceedings but she took over the demanding role of Martha Gillette, William's mother, at a late stage in the preparation of the production.

But the outstanding performance of the night was that of Jackie Grant as Daria Chase, the waspish theatre critic, universally hated by the company of actors, who was the late unexpected guest at the party. Vivacious and vocal she commanded the stage whenever she was on it in the first act – acid tongued one minute, sexually predatory the next, a convincing medium as she sat everyone down to a séance and intriguingly vulnerable and angry when it was treated as a parlour game.

It was she who, not unexpectedly bearing in mind the loathing of the other characters, was stabbed in the back at the end of act one and she treated us to one of the longest and most hilarious 'death' scenes to bring the action to a close. It was a sequence so comic that you could almost have forgiven the packed and very appreciative audience if they had chorused 'Look behind her' in true panto tradition.

The stabbing, however, just led to further hilarity and ever increasing frantic action in the second act when Gillette and Geisel were faced with hiding the 'corpse' (it turned out she was not actually dead after all).

She was unceremoniously hauled from one hiding place to another, left draped over the bar or with legs protruding from behind the sofa as a rare successful phone call on this stormy night produced Detective Inspector Goring – Emma Wallis as a zany and colourful character as much intent on getting a part in one of Gillette's plays as tracking down the wrongdoers.

The production admirably, though, brought us back to the murder mystery with a jolt as confessions were made and withdrawn, villains fell out and all kinds of mayhem were wrought culminating in unexpected crime solving in one quarter and a very effective denouement as the inspector finally did her job.

Congratulations are for an excellent set (you had to commend the production team on getting all the complicated gadgets to work seamlessly).

And I enjoyed the very impressive and novel effects (the lighting of the seance scene was particularly effective while for pure pantomime we had the antics of the cuddly stuffed dog bouncing outside in the kitchen then being cared for after drinking poisoned tea).

It all added to the enjoyment of a real festive feast of amateur theatre – as good a production as many a professional company I have reviewed.

#### FLYING THE FLAG

(by flag hoister designate, Chris Hunt)

Passers by may have noticed from time to time a flag flying from the church tower. Getting them up there, and getting them down, is a perilous enterprise and three flags are generally used:

<u>Union Flag</u>: The Union Flag, or Union Jack, is the national flag of the United Kingdom, Crown Dependencies and Overseas Territories. The present Union Flag dates from 1801 and combines the red cross of St George (the kingdom of England), the white saltire of St Andrew (Scotland) and the red saltire of St Patrick (Ireland). Wales is not represented separately as it was part of the kingdom of England (sorry Wales). Saltire = heraldic symbol in the form of a diagonal cross used on numerous flags. Also, out of interest, indicates the point at which a railway line crosses a road at a level crossing!

It is important to fly the Union Flag the correct way up. The widest diagonal white stripe must be above the red stripe on the half of the flag nearest the flagpole.

The Union Flag is hoisted on special days involving the Royal Family (birthdays, wedding, etc) and national days such as Remembrance Day.

St George's Flag: The St George's Cross is the flag of England. It seems to have been adopted during the Middle Ages - certainly red crosses were used as a distinguishing mark by English soldiers from the time of Edward 1 (1270s). St George had become a popular 'warrior saint' during the crusades. Until then St Edmund (bit more local) was favourite, but he doesn't have a flag. Interestingly a 'Suffolk' flag has been devised, so watch this space, or should that be flagpole?

St George rose to the position of the primary patron saint of England with the revised prayer book of 1552 when all religious flags, except his, were abolished. It is clear that the origins of St George and his flag are a bit religious. This flag can be flown on saints days and other festivals although strictly the arms of the diocese should be added to the top left hand corner of the flag (any donations welcome!).

The Red Ensign: (known as the Red Duster) This is the civil ensign of the United Kingdom. In 1854 the Merchant Shipping Act included a specific provision that the Red Ensign was the appropriate flag for British Merchantman. Limited opportunities exist for flying this flag but it can be hoisted on Sea Sunday and Merchant Navy Day (September 3rd). As an island nation that has depended so much on our merchant fleet it doesn't hurt to remember the gratitude owed to seamen, and although our merchant fleet is much depleted we still rely on world shipping to bring us the thousands of tons of goods we all need - plus of course the many more thousands of tons of old junk we don't need!







Generally flags should be flown from sunrise to sunset (if flown at night they should be illuminated), in practice they stay up until I get round to taking them down. No permission is needed to fly national flags, they are excluded from most planning regulations - but flagpoles may not be!

#### Dear Friends.

I rather like February as a month. It is an odd month, shorter than all the others; it seems to have been squeezed in between the depression of a post-Christmas January, and the promised spring of March. It is the 'Month of Love' with St Valentine featuring prominently for many.

For me February isn't about an (overpriced) romantic meal with someone special, particularly as I have yet to find that someone special myself; but February is a time when I do get to think quite a bit about love, as one of the most wonderful things I will get to do this year is officiate at more than a dozen weddings across the 5 churches in the benefice.

In fact after years of decline, more and more couples are once again choosing to get married in Church, and nationally an average of a 1,000 weddings a week take place in Church of England Churches – that's more than one in three of all weddings!

But what is so special about weddings and why does the Church believe that getting married in Church offers the very best way to start a life together as Husband and Wife?

Well first off, the coming together of a man and a woman can be traced back to Adam and Eve, who "were made for each other" (Genesis 2). Jesus' own teaching on marriage tells us that it is exclusive, unbreakable and forges a new family unit. Indeed Jesus' very first recorded miracle took place at a wedding reception: when he turned water into wine (John 2). The idea of marriage then is near on universal, with practically every country and culture on earth recognising the special bond that is created in the act of marriage.

Marriage then has always been part of our loving God's plan for us, and it should therefore be no surprise that increasingly there is academic research which demonstrates that marriage is actually good for you! It states that:

- Marriage makes people far less likely to suffer mental health problems
- Marriage makes people live much longer
- Marriage makes people healthier and happier
- Marriage may reduce stress
- Marriage may help couples develop healthier habits and suppress bad ones.
- A spouse also makes it more likely that there will be someone there to care in times of illness.

Christians believe that marriage really is a gift from God, it therefore follows that a church wedding is the most appropriate place to make such a public commitment to another individual, and we believe that the additional spiritual element that is an essential part of a church wedding, really does transform a relationship to a new and deeper level.

In the marriage ceremony, a couple makes a public declaration of lifelong commitment to love each other. A commitment, which by its very nature is a challenging one; Saying 'I will' to those vows obliges you to forgive and be forgiven. It will be tough at times! So marriage is a risk, but a risk worth taking. There's plenty of evidence to show married couples are more likely to be healthy, wealthy and wise!

God then has always intended marriage to be the right place to grow in love and support for each other, fulfil our sexuality, and, if a couple are so blessed, to provide a stable and secure environment for bringing up children.

Marriage can change couples for the better and as they change, so their marriage grows along with them. Now marriage isn't "a magic bullet", and most married couples will from time to time fall short of God's ideal for love, but a degree of conflict in a marriage can be healthy if dealt with appropriately. But as a Christian I believe that marriage is a gift from God and should mirror the love God has for all of us - love that remains true, faithful, protective and respectful.

So if you believe that you have found the person whom you believe that God is calling you to share the rest of your life with why not speak to me about getting married in your village church – a place where many couples have come together in love and faith for centuries!

# Feedback from James Finch - Your Stour Valley County Councillor

#### SUFFOLK SCHOOL TRAVEL CONSULTATION

Suffolk County Council is still for unity in efforts to find a long-term solution to providing affordable "home to school" transport from the major public consultation which is underway. People who give their views on the future of school travel in Suffolk will be listened to carefully and have the opportunity to influence the final outcome.

The two and half month consultation, which started in December invites people to help the council shape the future of school and post-16 travel policies. Suffolk County Council has already listened to headteachers and included additional options in the consultation document.

In Suffolk, £21 million of taxpayers' money is spent per year getting children to and from school. Suffolk County Council has already introduced a number of efficiency changes to the service saving around £2.6 million. Now, like many other councils across the country, the authority needs to consider making more significant changes. It is therefore consulting on changing its school and post-16 travel policies so the service can be affordable, sustainable, and capable of meeting growing demand in the future.

The council's current school and post-16 travel policies go above legal requirements, which means around 2400 children and young people receive free/subsided school or post-16 travel that Suffolk County Council is not legally required to provide and that they wouldn't get in many other parts of the country. In addition, around 2400 children receive free travel to schools further away than legally required to provide. The proposed consultation seeks views on changing these policies and includes three alternative options, pre-and post-16:-

**Option 1**: In September 2019, change the school travel policy so that it is in line with the legal requirements. This would mean implementing all the changes in one go, including ceasing free travel to the transport priority area schools where it is not the pupils' nearest.

**Option 2:** From September 2019, introduce the changes year by year as a child joins or moves school so that it is in line with legal requirements. This means that we would introduce all the changes on a phased basis. This option would cost Suffolk County Council an estimated £8.8 million to implement.

**Option 3:** Make no changes to the school travel policy but make savings from other services provided by Suffolk County Council. Suffolk County Council is also asking for feedback on several

other matters, including using Rights of Way as part of the way distance to a school is measured and a range of local solutions, such as Local collection hubs and opt-in to travel, which we have developed with a range of schools. #### **FULLY FUNDED FIRST-TIME CENTRAL HEATING SYSTEMS**

Suffolk's local authorities are now able to provide fully funded central heating systems (*subject to survey*) to 514 fuel poor house -holds across Suffolk over the next three years from a £150m fund established by National Grid from the proceeds of the sale of their distribution business. Around 4 million UK households nationally are in fuel poverty, unable to affordably heat their home to the temperature needed to stay warm and healthy. As well as being on low incomes many of these households are also faced with the additional burden of relying on heating systems that are inefficient and expensive to run.

The local authorities working together as the Suffolk Climate Change Partnership have been successful in securing funding from the first round of the Warm Homes Fund for a project worth £4.3 million. The Suffolk project is being managed by the County Council, administered by Suffolk Warm Homes Healthy People based at Suffolk Coastal District Council and supported with further funding from the District and Borough Councils. Alongside the first-time heating system, households will also be able to benefit from new insulation measures to make the homes more energy efficient as well as grants from the Suffolk Community Foundation's 'Surviving Winter Appeal' where eligible. Our journey will take us along the south west Malabar coastline, through the backwaters of Kerala to the very southern tip of the subcontinent, before travelling on to the Coromandel coast in the east, where, tradition tells us that St. Thomas met his end at the hands of an angry king on a hilltop just outside modern-day Chennai (Madras).

Along the way we will visit a modern-day legacy of St Thomas' Christian influence, as we visit the Donhavur Fellowship, a community founded by the late Anglican missionary and spiritual writer Amy Carmichael. As well as experiencing and participating in the Christian traditions; we will also take the opportunity to visit the magnificent Hindu temples in Madurai and the UNESCO World Heritage sites in Mahabalipuram – all with plenty of time to relax, shop for gifts or handmade clothes, eat well and to enjoy all that India has to offer.

This tour really does offer something for all, whether you have travelled to South India before, or are new to the region or country, this tour will enable you to meet the real people and explore those places overlooked by tourists — allowing you to become a pilgrim instead and to follow in paths once trodden by saints.

when their owner died. Pictured is Geordie, one of the four, who looks just like Ollie to me - but don't tell him I said so!


