NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Extract of Minutes for Meeting: 12th June 2019

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PARISH COUNCILLORS

Joan Robinson, a resident of Wiston, was co-opted onto the Parish Council.

PLANNING

Babergh DC have given consent at **3 Ash Rise** [*DC*/19/01796] for rear and porch extensions, at **11 Gravel Hill** [*DC*/19/01301] for insertion of electric gate following removal of existing wooden gate, at **88 Bear Street** [*DC*/19/01953] proceed to fell a Robinia tree in a conservation area and at **Wickham, 65 Bear Street** [*DC*/19/01571] to fell a tree in a conservation area (the Babergh tree officer commented that the Planning Authority would have no grounds to object or influence the manner of the work as the tree did not merit a Preservation Order)

Planning permission has been granted at **8 Mill Street** [*DC*/18/05465] for new dwelling and conversion of outbuilding into annex.

Councillors had no objections to applications at **25 Stoke Road** [*DC*/19/02118] for conversion of garage into bedroom, willow fencing and gravel drive, and at **17 Heycroft Way** [*DC*/19/02543] for installation of rear dormer window and loft conversion to additional living accommodation.

Following discussion regarding **Rushbank Farm, Bures Road** [DC/19/02631] for extension to agricultural building Tricia Fuller proposed the PC objects until the question of sub-letting is resolved. It was agreed for members to put their reasons for objection on the form between meetings for the Clerk to issue a response to Babergh ahead of the deadline. This was seconded by Laura Erith and unanimously carried.

Between meetings councillors reviewed a planning and listed building application at **41 Bear Street** [*DC*/19/02425/6] for change of use of ground floor from retail to form residential use (C3). It was noted that the earlier reasons for objection had not been addressed. Tricia Fuller proposed this PC issues the same objections as before. This was seconded by Joan Robinson and unanimously carried.

Any other planning item: An enquiry was made regarding the lack of a decision notice for the plans to 100 Bear Street. It was agreed for members to review the website first.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES:

It was agreed to seek an update from the organisers of the Boot camp. An urgent health and safety issue was reported regarding a large bough hanging from a tree on Caley Green and at the same time reminding them that we haven't received their routine Tree Risk Assessment in some time. A photograph was available and it was agreed for the Clerk to make an urgent report to the land owners - Suffolk County Council. The illegal advertising on Caley Green had been reported between meetings. Our grounds maintenance contractors were arranging to strim the horsewatering. All agreed to approve the drinks station on Pop's Piece again for the ultra run.

HOUSING NEEDS & NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING

No further work had been completed. A letter of support had been issued by the Conservation Society, however, there was still insufficient interest at this stage to form a committee to take this forward for the village. It was agreed to amend this agenda item as follows: "Housing Needs Survey/Neighbourhood Planning".

HIGHWAYS

A report has been circulated about the meeting in Wiston with a Highways engineer regarding the unsuitability of the roads for the size and volumes of vehicles. Proposals from SCC Highways were awaited and it was agreed reminders would be needed to secure the required response. The diversion at Bures during bridge works was feared to bring traffic disruption to Wiston. The pot hole in Church Lane was not deemed serious enough to be filled at this stage. Other pot holes had been reported. A leaking water main on the Burial Ground driveway had been reported to Anglian Water between meetings.

STREET LIGHTING

The Chairman had met the homeowners of the light to be switched off from the Court Street property. They are aware that they need to apply for listed building consent for the fitting to be removed. The Parish Council will arrange for the current light to be switched off as soon as the replacement light on the new column is working. It was agreed for the Clerk to chase all the outstanding street light orders.

FOOTPATHS

It was agreed to report to our Footpath Warden to investigate the condition of the path around Bell Meadow.

ALLOTMENTS

The Church Hall will be booked for 16th July for the annual allotment holders meeting for a 7.30pm start. The allotment judges have been contacted for a date for judging this year's Best Kept Allotment Competition.

VILLAGE HALL

Tricia Fuller reported on the condition of the hall including the cooker was in need of replacement and the failure of the recent decoration in the hallway. Both are in progress. Tricia Fuller continues to pursue funding for the Village Hall roof. The VAT query has been submitted in writing to Glasgow for a ruling.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The PC are rotating attendance at the CC meetings. Ned Cartwright to attend the July meeting and Laura Erith the September meeting.

CORRESPONDENCE

It was suggested that the Conservation Society publicise the need for locations for swift boxes in Community Times as they would go on houses.

BURIAL GROUND

The Chairman reported on the meeting at the burial ground driveway with the diocesan surveyor. They intend to fill the pot holes as a temporary measure and tenders will be sought. The surveyor will communicate with the PC and the nursing home but was happy to take the lead with this matter. Details of a memorial tree proposal is awaited.

PARISH COUNCIL

The PC will meet in August only if there are urgent planning matters to consider; there are still three vacancies on the PC; the PC plans to produce an introductory pack for new Councillors, the PC will promote the importance of encouraging parishioners to create a Neighbourhood Plan (this cannot be lead by the PC). **PLANNING**

Babergh DC have given consent at **11 Gravel Hill** [DC/19/01301] for insertion of electric gate following removal of existing wooden gate, subject to finish details of the electrical controls, at **17 Heycroft Way** [DC/19/02543] for installation of rear dormer window and loft conversion to additional living accommodation and at **25 Stoke Road** [DC/19/02118] for conversion of existing garage into a bedroom; construction of willow fencing; creation of new gravel drive.

Parish councillors expressed a number of objections to an application at **Rushbank Farm, Bures Road** [*DC*/19/02631] for extension to agricultural building. Their objections included: site and visibility; the large scale of the development; that other agricultural buildings are being used for non-agricultural purposes; lack of demonstration that the building is necessary; and proximity to a private airfield. The PC had also requested a site meeting.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objection to an application at **1 Harper's Hill** [*DC/19/03113*] for a two storey side extension and single storey front porch or at **The Barn, land adjacent Longwood House, Stoke Road** [*DC/19/02761*] for change of use from agricultural building to dwelling (Class C3) subject to it being in perpetual linkage to the host property, that the development uses the original barn footprint and its height and mass doesn't intrude on the streetscape and other points.

Discussing an application at **41 Bear Street** [*DC*/19/02425/6] for change of use of ground floor from retail to form residential use (C3) councillors queried whether the proper procedure exploring continued use as a shop has been followed as policies are in place to ensure facilities are not lost to Villages; and the lack of information regarding parking. The PC will object on these points. They noted that no pre-application advice was sought.

Councillors discussed an application at **Rose Hill Farm**, **Honey Tye** [*DC*/19/02817] for an agricultural worker's dwelling; erection of cattle shed, hay barn, workshop and machinery store with new access from Cawley Road. While the property is not within the parish, access to the property would be from parish land. Objections would be raised as councillors' previous concerns had not been addressed. These included: the

Rachel Hitchcock 01206 263169 or 07788 954309 rachel_hitchcock@hotmail.com consultee list doesn't include individual property owners in the vicinity; large cattle trucks in a lane poorly equipped with eroding passing places; management of roadside vegetation; ancient trees in the hedgerow being removed should be identified and protected; slurry management should be clearly set out; the necessity and options to accommodate a stockman should be considered carefully before granting this application.

Councillors discussed submission of detailed planning regarding **New Farm, Harpers Hill** [*DC/19/02881*] (under outline planning permission DC/17/04206) concerning the appearance, the proposed access onto the very busy A134, layout and that occupants would share this with HGVs, scale and landscaping of 9 new dwellings. They have serious reservations regarding the junction onto the A134. Ned Cartwright commented that the area west of Harper's Hill is a virtual dark sky area where additional lighting has to be very carefully planned. Councillors noted that at the time of the original application, six residents on Wiston Road had explained that there is a problem with sewage back up. **BECREATION AND OREN CRACES**

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

No adverse comments had been received regarding the Bootcamp; it will be reviewed again in September.

The PC had been contacted regarding approx 40 cars being parked on Caley Green on the School Sports Day. Headteacher Ms Delaney made it clear that the school had had no part in this and that the school will ensure there is no parking there in future during school events.

HIGHWAYS

The drains in Stoke Road, Mill Street and Newlands Lane are due to be cleared in October. Ned Cartright will chase up SCC regarding remedial work to the road verges in Wiston. A 'Welcome to Suffolk' sign, which features Abell Bridge (Anchor Bridge) will shortly be installed.

Councillors thought a promotional display for Wormingford Fete, which has been attached to a road sign near the A134 Wiston Road junction should be removed. Ned Cartwright said that he would make this junction one of his projects.

ALLOTMENTS

The annual allotment holders meeting will be on 16 July in the Church Hall. Councillors noted that the allotment gates need repair; there was concern about the state of a minority of allotments; one person had recently vacated and their allotment had been offered onwards; a 'late payer' has been given a period of notice to pay; a third person has just given notice and others on the waiting list are to be contacted. **VILLAGE HALL INCLUDING REPLACEMENT ROOF**

Tricia Fuller and Clerk Debbie Hattrell are still waiting to hear from the VAT office regarding the legal position of the VH lease in connection with claiming back the VAT for the work on the roof.

A grant application to Community Infrastructure Levy has been accepted; as requested 3 estimates for the work and a business plan have now been sent to them.

The Cinema has made a profit of $\pounds1,306$ in the six months to the end of June. A request has been made for a more secure box for the projector. Following complaints from the footballers the VHMC is investigating the cost of installing a barrier or bollards to protect the field from damage by unauthorised vehicles. **IN BRIEF**

Councillors noted that streetlights are being turned off at 11.30pm on The Heights, and queried if this was the case elsewhere in the village. Footpaths lying between the allotments and Court Knoll need attention.

Julie Clark welcomed members to the meeting. **MATTERS ARISING:**

Executive Committee: Julie Clark reminded the meeting of the need for more members on the Exec. We meet just six times a year. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee and an ideal way for those new to the village to become involved and meet new friends. Contact Rachel rachel_hitchcock@hotmail.com or 263169 if you would like to know more.

Members were saddened to hear that John Parsonson had passed away on 31st May. Rachel Hitchcock said John will be very much missed as a valued member and friend of the Community Council. He was a lovely man and very supportive of our work through his role on the Executive Committee. He and Jill were regular fixtures at all our events including Bonfire Night and the Christmas Fayre – always joining in - from ensuring we had a lovely Christmas Tree in the foyer to helping sort out the raffle tickets when I had about 450 contact details to write on the back and only half an hour to the end of the Christmas Fayre!! I will miss his sense of humour and kindness and am sure I speak on behalf of the whole Community Council in sending our love and best wishes to Jill.

Colin Ramsell added John had been a good friend, always offering sound advice and was the other gentleman in the Art Group which is dominated by ladies. John was an excellent artist and welcomed the group to visit his studio and garden to paint. **Fundraising Activities & Events:** Ideas for fund raising projects to benefit the CC are always welcome

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station.

The defibrillator training on 15th May was a relatively small gathering of 12 but those who attended were nonetheless enthusiastic! It was also good to have some children in attendance. Dot, the trainer from the Community Heartbeat Trust did a good job of communicating basic first aid and resuscitation techniques and demonstrating how to use the defibrillator. Although community defibrillators are designed to be used with no training, the awareness sessions serve to increase community confidence in using the defibrillator should the need arise. It would be good to hold further sessions in the future and to continue to raise awareness of the locations of the defibrillators at the fire station and the Village Hall. Thank you to Nayland Primary School for hosting on this occasion.

Nayland 10k Fun Run: Luke Rumbelow said the 3rd annual Fun Run had been a great success with 979 runners taking part. Feedback has been very positive and is welcomed to help suggest ideas for improvement. There was a real family vibe and the little ones encouraging runners to the finish line was lovely. SESAW are keen to be part of the event next year .

Approximately £4,000 was donated to local charities including SESAW which benefitted by £940 plus £600 sponsorship, the Community Council £1,414 (£1.70 per runner). Also benefitting were the Conservation Society and Charley Watkins Foundation. Nayland School ran the 1k event and benefited by £600.

Luke stressed that the event cannot be held without provision for car parking, for approx 500 cars. There is some doubt whether Nayland Meadow, owned by the Nayland Land Company, will be available next year. The farmer has been reluctant to allow use of the Fennages adjacent to Candy Lane in summer as they are used for grazing cattle. Court Knoll is now a heritage site and no longer available, access to the meadow beyond Pop's Piece footbridge would be difficult by the A134. It is vital to overcome this issue if the event is to be run next year; the Exec will put on thinking caps for potential car parking space we could use.

Julie thanked Luke for his hard work making this a very popular and successful event.

Village Hall Store: A second session to tidy the CC store at the village hall will take place on 23rd July and 3pm. More hands make light work so volunteers to help would be welcome.

Correspondence: The VHMC Chairman emailed recently requesting consideration be given to assisting towards the cost of a replacement cooker for the village hall which is likely to cost about £1,600. The CC felt they will be in a position to consider this at the next meeting, once a grant application form in line with our Grant Policy has been submitted by the VHMC. **TREASURER'S REPORT:** Maggie Ryan gave her report.

Breakdown of profits: Quiz £210, Community Times £882.50, Village Calendar (£477)

Grants paid: Lizzie's Fund Endurance Walk £170.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £23,386.49, represented by Deposit a/c monies £10,639.38, Current a/c monies £12,674.33, Cash in hand £72.78. We hold £418.50 for the Services Fund and £10,000 VH roof grant is pending. **Unencumbered assets are therefore £12,967.99**.

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Village Hall Roof: The CC has supported the replacement roof project with a grant of £10,000 which will be held until funds are required. Iain Wright said the committee continue to seek grant funding and have had some positive news but as things stand there is likely to be a shortfall of about £100,000 on the £270,000 which is now likely to be needed. They need help from village groups and donations from residents (payable to the Parish Council). 'Buy A Tile' was suggested as another way of fundraising.

Lizzie's Fund in association with The Brain Tumour Charity: A grant of £195 to cover hire of the village hall had been awarded but only £170 required.

Seventeen walkers were cheered off at 6.30am, and cheered back to the Village Hall at 7.30pm, by friends and family for the inaugural Nayland Endurance Walk. In between, the 17 walkers each covered 50k (31miles), a total of 850k (530 miles), from Nayland as far north as Monks Eleigh. A total of £11,750 was raised for Lizzie's Fund, on behalf of The Brain Tumour Charity, from the Nayland Endurance Walk. Lizzie's mum Sally is doing a second walking challenge this summer to turn her 50k into 100k.

Lizzie's Fund has been supported by several village organisations and has raised a total of over £190,000 in just a year. <u>www.thebraintumourcharity.org/get-involved/our-supportergroups/supporter-groups/groups/lizzies-fund/</u> The next event is a 10k, 5k and 1k Run at Prettyfields Vineyard, plus a Wine Walk (with tasting!) at Ardleigh on Saturday 31st August. <u>https://www.prettyfields.com/</u>

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks gave a reminder for submitting photos of village activities and things seen in the parish for See It Snap It, etc. The Nayland & Wiston website is coming up for 2 years old and is well used.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said the Government have changed the date of the early May Bank Holiday 2020 from Monday to Friday and this wasn't announced until after the calendar went to print. The date has moved to mark the 75th anniversary of VE Day. Luckily we learned of the problem before the printed pages were bound and Spingold quickly reprinted the May page. The additional cost incurred was £66. We did look at other options. We were not alone in being caught out; Roses Calendars of Colchester had major additional expense. The calendar was produced in time for the Nayland 10k event but unfortunately only 2 calendars were sold.

Iris Sebba and Sally Dalton joined the team this year to assist with distributing and selling calendars but we need to widen the net so would be grateful for help with selling at other venues/ events. Claire Buller said she would make enquiries about selling them at Boxted Vineyard.

Community Council report continued.....

Our best wishes for a speedy recovery go to Sally who is currently very poorly in hospital.

FORTHCOMING ACTIVITIES

Bonfire Night on Tuesday 5th November: It was agreed to order the same quantity fireworks as last year. We have sufficient sparklers and glo-necklaces. Iain would order them in July in order to qualify for discount with Dynamic Fireworks. Pyrotechnic training also needs to be booked for Julie and Kristian Clark. Anyone handling fireworks must have been trained to comply with our insurance.

It was pointed out that the batteries on the glo-toys will need checking. Solutions to reduce queues at sales points had been successful last year and will be repeated.

More volunteers will be needed on the gate and as marshalls. It was suggested that entry for those arriving by car should be paid at the entrance to prevent them slipping in without paying. **Christmas Fayre on Saturday 7th December:** Rachel Hitchcock will check whether the School Choir can provide entertainment and will begin contacting potential stallholders. **Nayland Village Quiz:** will be on *Friday 7th February 2020*.

SOCIETY REPORTS

Art Group: Colin Ramsell said best wishes go out to Val and Liz who have missed meetings recently due to ongoing medical problems. We currently have two vacancies in the group which meets on Wednesday afternoons. To end this term our visiting tutor Lesley will be coming along on 10th July followed by Vernon Lever on 17th July. On 24th July we are looking forward to going to Fillpots for a Cream Tea! Although moving house to Capel St Mary very soon I will remain a member of the Art Group.

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said their June outing to *Pashley Manor Garden* had been popular and enjoyable. Their Summer Garden Party for members will be on 19th July and the Annual Flower Show will be on 3rd August. They are taking bookings for a coach outing to Audley End House and Gardens on 8th September. HortSoc will be making a donation of £100 to Lizzie's Fund.

Women's Institute: Wendy Sparrow said in June Andy Malcomb from the Fishermen's Mission gave a talk on the subject *'The True Price of Fish and Chips'*. On 15th July Paula Baker will talk about *'Hedgehog Rescue'* and our annual afternoon Tea Party will take place on 19th August in the President's garden.

NAYLAND 10K FUN RUN



Back for its third year, the annual Nayland 10k didn't disappoint. It was another fantastic turnout with over 950 runners participating in the 10k, 5k and 1k events all of whom were able to enjoy the beautiful weather, a lovely route through the countryside of the Dedham Vale and a wonderful atmosphere brought about by the enthusiasm of all involved.

As well as being a great family event, the Nayland 10k raised over £4,000 for local charities. Also benefitting were the Conservation Society and Charley Watkins Foundation. This year Nayland Community Council were presented with a cheque for just over £1,400 and local charity SESAW Animal Welfare look set to raise over £1,600 including the donation from the event and money raised from sponsorship.

Rachel Hitchcock, Chair of Nayland with Wissington Community Council said:

"The Nayland 10k is fast becoming a firm feature in the local calendar and it is lovely to see so many people enjoying the village and surrounding countryside. The fact that it raises such a significant sum for the Community Council is a bonus and it is fantastic that this money will go back into supporting village organisations and activities. A big thank you to Luke and his team for their efforts in organising such a well-run event."

For the first time this year, Nayland Primary School organised the 1k event which was a huge success – over 150 runners took part and the children really embraced the spirit of the event both on the day itself and in the weeks leading up to it. In addition to holding a competition to design the medals (won by Year 3 pupil Adam Walker) the children have been making the







most of a cross country running route around the school grounds. The additional stalls and activites provided by the School's HSA and Woodland Corner definitely added to the fun family feel.

Luke Rumbelow, of Event Nation, who organised the event thanked the many volunteers and organisations who helped make the day a success and, of course, a massive thank you to everyone who entered.

THE NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON LAND COMPANY



The Land Company are continuing to make progress with proposed developments for the conservation field and the small field adjacent to the Horkesley Road.

Firstly, following discussions with the Environment Agency it has been agreed that the Agency will plant, at its own cost, a number of trees and shrubs along the bank of the river. Details of this planting will be available to the village in due course.

Secondly, a plan is well advanced for the planting of other trees in the main conservation field. In this respect the Woodland Trust are offering to supply some trees at no cost to the Company but all newly planted trees will require protection from the grazing sheep and rabbits, so there may be a significant expense unless grant aid can be obtained.

Thirdly the double hedge dividing the main conservation field from the small field needs some attention. Over a period of three years the Company shall arrange to lay in a traditional manner one third of the length of the hedge on the northern side each year whilst retaining some of the more significant trees within the hedgerow. Similarly, the adjacent hedge on the southern side will be coppiced at the same time. This work shall start at the eastern end in January 2020 and it is hoped that the excess material can be used to construct a "dead hedge" which will make an ideal habitat for wildlife.

Fourthly, the Company is contacting the County Council and

Borough Council to ascertain whether there might be any support for the creation of a new footbridge from Caley Green to the southern bank of the river, to be sited a short distance below the existing road bridge. Such an arrangement would mean that walkers could avoid the steep climb to the A134 and the unpleasant walk along the road before the steep descent.

Fifthly, consideration is being given to the creation of a new permissive path which would run from the south western corner of the main field (where the path leaves the area known as Richard's Wood) and thereafter along the northern side of the high hedgerow separating the main field from the small field (running parallel with Horkesley Road) before exiting onto the track running alongside the boundary of Bridge House and the Anchor car park. To progress matters however the consent of the owners of the Anchor car park will be necessary. In future editions of the Community Times we shall keep readers informed of progress of this project.

Although the Company is very active at the moment it should not be forgotten that it has undertaken a number of activities previously including the recent clearance of undergrowth in the area known as Richard's Wood (with the assistance of the Dedham Vale Project) and the creation of a number of stag beetle wood piles from the branches.





DEDHAM VALE SOCIETY

Your local Conservation Society keeps a close eye on developments within the parish boundary of Nayland and Wissington and on any issue which might have an impact upon it. However, its constitution prohibits it from involving itself in the wider ambit of the Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and this is where the Dedham Vale Society ("DVS") has much to offer. The DVS was formed back in 1938 when a proposal to demolish the coaching-arch at the Sun Inn in Dedham High Street led to a huge outcry. Fortunately, the proposal was withdrawn but it was recognised that an organisation was needed to defend the special qualities of the Vale.

Over the years, the DVS has fought many battles. It successfully opposed major "London overspill" housing schemes in the 1960s and in the process was instrumental in securing AONB status for the Vale. It has two officers who review planning applications affecting the AONB as a whole; one officer dealing with the Suffolk side and the other dealing with the Essex side. Recent activities include opposing both Konings planning applications and campaigns for dark skies and the enlargement of the AONB. It has just over 900 members.

Members receive a highly informative twice-yearly newsletter and social media is used in the guise of a Facebook page and Instagram to keep everyone informed of developments and of their summer party and winter lecture

Membership is only £10 per year for a single member and £15 per year for two people living at the same address, a membership application form is available on-line at <u>https://dedhamvalesociety.org.uk/uploaded_pdf/</u>membership_form.pdf

The DVS AGM will be held at Nayland Village Hall on the 23rd September, when committee member Paul Gallifant will be giving a talk on the Vale through the seasons.

THE SUFFOLK FLAG

The new 'Suffolk Flag' was seen (by a few!) flying from St James' church tower on 21st June. This date has been designated Suffolk Day and this year lasted over the weekend. The flag was designed after many Suffolk organisations petitioned for a county flag and this was registered with the Flag Institute on 9th October 2017.

The heraldic description is: "Azure two arrows in Saltire, points downwards, enfiled with an ancient crown Or." This means two arrows passing through a gold crown on a blue background. Heraldry is always described in Norman French.

Edmund, the last King of East Anglia, was reportedly murdered in 870 by the Danes who shot him with arrows when, at a meeting, he refused to share his kingdom with their Chief (what a way to end a meeting!!). The Arms of Edmund accordingly reflect his Kingship and the manner of his death. The emblem can be seen on many Coats of Arms, badges and logos across Suffolk.

Thank you to James Carver who found this male Stag Beetle (*Lucanus cervus*). The name is derived from the large and distinctive mandibles found on the males, which resemble the antlers of stags. Female stag beetles are usually smaller, with smaller mandibles, however, they are much more powerful than the males!

(*Tyto alba*). The owi box on the allotment field proved attractive to a pair of Barn Owls and they have raised four owlets all female which is unusual. The photo was taken on 3rd July when the owlets were weighed, measured and ringed by

a registered handler. The measurement of the wings establishes their age and in this case it was 41 days. They should fly at about 68 days.

Owls lay their eggs on alternate days and incubation, which takes about 30 days, begins as soon as the first egg is laid. This means hatching takes place over a prolonged period and the youngest chick may be considerably younger than its oldest sibling. Sometimes the youngest is weaker and unable to compete with its siblings for food and does not survive but all these owlets are in good health.

Hopefully as beautiful adult owls they will grace the skies around Nayland for years to come. In the meantime, they are very cute!



ST MARY'S VISITORS BOOK



We enjoyed a brilliant talk by David Pryor on his experiences as a Police Forensic Scientist at our July meeting. David specialised in ballistics and was involved in numerous high profile cases including the Jill Dando case and the shooting of President Allende in Chile as well as many others. We were very privileged to have his special insight into these cases.

Following that introduction the rest of the meeting was a 'damp squib'. At the time of writing Nayland Cinema has screened three films since the last edition of the Community Times: *Green Book, Loving Vincent* and *Vice.*

Both *Green Book* and *Loving Vincent* were well attended with the former exploring the racial inequalities still present in the early 60s in America. The story commences with a racist individual who, through the course of the film, develops a friendship with a black musician resulting in the two remaining lifelong friends.

The second film *Loving Vincent* was recommended by Nayland resident Mandy Cook and was an amazing film and a huge success. The clever animation created from individual copies of the artist's works was exceptional although one's eyes had to adapt to the rather swimming effect. The film explored the life of Van Gogh, primarily in the period before his death through the eyes of the local postmaster's son. It gave an interesting and thought provoking account of the circumstances leading up to the death of Van Gogh, but of course could not answer the question raised over the years. Did he commit suicide or was he murdered? We will never know.

The most recent film screened was *Vice* which unfortunately was not well attended but we were in competition with Nadal and Federer. That's the way it goes sometimes! The film takes us on Dick Cheney's journey from the time he lost control of his life to alcohol to becoming Vice President. Some people thought it was a good film although it was rather strange in places. It certainly gave an interesting account of developments from the terrorist attack on the Twin Towers to the invasion of Iraq.

Please don't forget we have an excellent bar at the cinema organised by Nayland resident Norman selling a variety of beverages from wine and beer to soft drinks. The bar is available before, during the interval and at the end of the film. Other refreshments and ice creams are available.

When Lee is no longer able to get published because she has fallen out of step with current tastes, she turns her art form to deception, abetted by her loyal friend Jack (Richard E. Grant)
- Friday 13th September: 'Fisherman's Firends' (2019) is a biographical comedy-drama based on the unlikely but real-life story of a group of Cornish guard/lifeboat workers who, moonlighting as a sea shanty-singing a cappella group, got signed by Universal and made a debut album that reached the top ten. Looking ahead, provisional film titles are:
- Friday 11th October: 'Rocketman' (2019) is an epic musical drama follows the fantastical journey of transformation from shy piano prodigy Reginald Dwight into international superstar Elton John.
- Friday 11th October: 'Red Joan' (2018) is a biographocal drama. Joan Stanley (Judi Dench) is a widow living out a quiet retirement in the suburbs when, shockingly, the British Secret Service places her under arrest. Notwithstanding the threat of inclement weather, the Society enjoyed its second most profitable Open Gardens achieving a net profit of over £3,000 and attracting 439 visitors. See photos on page 37

Our thanks must go to the 22 garden openers and the myriad of helpers, especially the ladies who ran the teas, cakes and ices so efficiently and the cake makers.

2019 marks the last year that three of the garden openers will open their existing gardens for the Society. Firstly, Andrew and Sue Gowen (pictured top right) are saying farewell to Parkers in Bear Street but are moving to Peter and Anna Mann's house at 4 Newlands Lane so we hope they will continue their garden opening at their new garden. Peter and Anna Mann (pictured below right) are moving from Newlands Lane to their house in Fen Street. Also, Mr and Mrs Grootenhuis are selling Stour House in Court Street. We thank all of them for opening their gardens so often over the years.

Next year Open Gardens will be held on 14th June.

Over 60 members and guests were present at our June speaker meeting when Sarah Cook gave a fascinating lecture on the collection of Irises bred by internationally acclaimed local artist Cedric Morris. Sarah has been endeavouring to trace many of the varieties which over the years have disappeared from view. She also brought with her a number of rhizomes for sale so watch out for rare Irises in Nayland in next years' Open Gardens!

In the first week of July, following a recommendation from one of the Society's members, the committee met up with Edward Jackson of the Suffolk Ornithologists' Group. The purpose of the meeting was to enable Edward to identify locations where swift nesting boxes might be placed within the village. The swift has suffered a disastrous fall in numbers over the past 20 years, much of this reduction having been caused by the loss of appropriate nesting sites. The Society is proposing to spend £1,000 towards the cost of purchasing and installing the boxes. A number of sites

were identified and in due course the Society will contact the house owners to ascertain whether they would permit the installation of a nesting box. In this respect please note that unlike swallows and house martins, the swift is a very clean nester.

However, it is thought that if the location of the property is within the Nayland Conservation area or if it is a listed building, planning permission may be necessary before installation of the nest box can proceed and we are checking the situation with Babergh District Council before we progress further.

Our next historic house visit will take place on the 19th of September when we shall be visiting Hoses Hall near Halstead. Tickets are still available so please do not hesitate to contact Mike Hunter if you would like to join us.

Finally, our next speaker meeting will take place on the 7th of October when Nick Amor will talk to us on the Suffolk Medieval Cloth Industry with special reference to Nayland. Guests and members are welcome to join us.

DUCKS SWANS AND GORDON

Congratulations to the river swans who have raised their six cygnets which hatched in early May. They have grown very quickly.

FACT: After 35 days of incubation, the cygnets begin to hatch, emerging from the eggs over a 24 hour period. About one egg in ten is infertile.

The youngsters remain with their mother on the nest for a day or two. Then she leads them onto the water. Covered in down to protect them from the cold, the young cygnets are able to swim, vocalise and feed themselves immediately. The cob soon forms a bond with his family.

Parents don't offer food to the cygnets, but take them to locations where they learn to fend for themselves. Enough fat is stored in their body cavities to support them for up to a week should the weather prevent them from feeding.

About 35% of young swans die within three months of hatching. Predation, exposure to the elements and being swept over weirs and waterfalls, are the main threats. So our resident swans have done very well.



IMPERIAL WAR MUSEUM DIGITAL MEMORIAL

The Imperial War Museum Digital Memorial to those who served during WW1 is now up and running with free access to the public in perpetuity.

Go to the link, search 'communities' using NAYLAND-WITH-WISSINGTON, SUFFOLK and you will find all the research data for our parish in one place. Where there were no personal photos for an individual a photo of the relevant war memorial or of the Roll of Honour was used as the main picture for their entry, but if you click on 'more about' you will find additional photos and service stories under the various menu buttons, such as 'media' or 'evidence' Each individual has a timeline based on census records, BMD registration etc. The community pages were researched and created by Mary George on behalf of the 1914/ 1918 Remembered Group. Research costs were sponsored by Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society. The individuals listed include those named on our war memorials. most of those named on the Roll of Honour in St James' Church, those with war graves in Nayland Burial Ground and some local Red Cross nurses. It also includes some young men who lost their lives but do not appear on our memorials although they were born and grew up here. There are also communities for Leavenheath, Polstead and Stoke by Nayland for those named on those village war memorials. If you have any queries, please contact maryg1918ww1@gmail.com

There are nearly eight million names on the Digital Memorial. If anyone has a relative from elsewhere who served it is possible to search for them using name, place, regiment. Hundreds of IWM volunteers worked on this project so your relative could have been researched and added by one of them.

A risk assessment is required accompanied by proof of public liability insurance. The signs must not be placed so that they obstruct visibility to users of the highway:

- Signs must be secure and erected at least 2 metres from the edge of the carriageway
- Signs are not to be erected more than 7 days before the event
- Signs are to be removed as soon as possible after the event (maximum 48 hours)

Garden Notes by The Old Muckspreader

At the time of writing some rain at last; not much more than a heavy drizzle, but it did last for most of a morning and wetted the top half inch of the soil. Despite the lack of rain heretofore the shrubs continued to give their display of flower; most have now had their season and we now have to rely on the herbaceous border for colour.

An unusual but worthwhile plant to grow is Dierama (The Angel's Fishing Rod). They are often, as here, grown near water, perhaps to justify their common name, but are perfectly happy in a border. An unusual feature is that they flower, as it were, back to front; the first flowers appear at the end of the dangling spike, and they carry on downwards. Dead-heading fails to produce a second flush of flowers, so their season is rather a short one.

In contrast, here is a plant which really gives value for money, since it carries on flowering throughout the summer. Most hardy Geraniums have by now finished their display but the hybrid Rozanne is just starting its display, and will carry on producing its fine blue flowers until Autumn. Unfortunately it is a sterile hybrid, so will not seed itself around like many others of its family. Cuttings are the only practical method of propagation. While talking about this family our three plants of Geranium Palmatum all died this spring. They are short -lived, but do self-seed and three small seedlings appeared where they grew. The foliage of this Geranium is impressive and it makes a good pot plant. Incidentally, it is often confused with the more tender Geranium Maderense, a much more tricky customer, often monocarpic (i.e. it dies after flowering), but spectacular when in bloom.

Another of our favourites is now in full flower. This is Calceolaria Integrifolia. One tends to think of this family (The Fisherman's Baskets) as being small alpines, and many of them are, but this one is different. It's more of a sub-shrub, with the main stem becoming quite woody with age, and growing up to 2 feet or so in height. Here it's now in full flower, and should continue until the autumn with masses of brilliant golden-yellow blooms. Some reference books describe it as half-hardy but here it survived last winter (admittedly a mild one) grown on a reasonably protected border near the house. It's very easy to propagate from soft cuttings so a few spares can be overwintered in a greenhouse just in case. For some reason it never seems easy to come by, and two years ago the only local nursery to stock it was Langthorns Plantery, near Dunmow. It will be interesting to see if it's still in flower next time we meet, in October.

BETTY RUDGE'S MEMORIES OF WISTON Part Two

RUSHBANKS FARM. "When I was a child living in one of the Rushbank Farm Cottages in the 1920s the farm was run by the Batten family. Sometimes my sisters, brother and I went to the farm for a can of milk and watched the cows being milked by hand. When corn was harvested horse drawn threshers would spiral in towards the centre of a field and the children chased rabbits with big sticks as the frightened animals broke cover. I don't remember anyone catching one but it was fun. In 1961 when the San closed the farm was sold but the Farmhouse remained as a nurses' home for the Jane Walker Hospital".

THE FOX PUB. Betty remembers the Fox played a significant part in the lives of Wiston people including her family. "Outside the front door was a long bench where children sat and waited for their parents to emerge. The Tap Room was quite small but well used by regulars, while the Lounge was larger and had folding cinema seats all round. There was a piano at the far end which Mrs Hawes who lived at Rectory corner often played and everyone sang along. Norfolks' and Goggins' buses used to stop at the Fox, picking up and dropping off people outside their cottages. Occasionally there was a fox hunt and the horse riders met outside the Fox pub in their red coats".

SCHOOLDAYS. "We had to be up and dressed by 8 am and after a breakfast of porridge or toast made on the range we walked the two miles to school in Nayland. When I started the Infants class was taught by Miss Deaves in a big room with a round stove in the middle on which the children were allowed to toast their sandwiches with a toasting fork. The next class was taught by Miss Basham who I remember as a kind lady who gave me a needlework basket when I came top in exams, though I hated needlework. Class 3-4 was my favourite, taught by Miss Clover who gave me lots of encouragement. Classes 5, 6 and 7 were taken by the Headmaster, Mr Taylor. Once when he caught me and my friend Muriel Butler talking he told us to stay behind and write "impudence" 100 times. He told us to look up the spelling in the dictionary but we looked in the wrong place and he banged our heads together for that. He often caned the boys. I was glad to leave at 14 years old".

"When we left school Dad helped me and my sisters Maisie, Dot and Vi to get jobs at Rushbanks House where Dr Jane Walker stayed when she was at Wiston, but I only went for 2 weeks after being humiliated by Dr Walker. I ran home, refusing to return, and then found a job at Great Horkesley. My sisters later went on to work at Dr Walker's London residence in Harley Street.

"During the war, there were soldiers stationed at Stoke and Horkesley. The regiments each had their own dance bands and this opened up a new life for the younger generation. As teenagers my four sisters and I used to cycle to the dances. Dad insisted we were home by 10 pm and a cousin and neighbour were sent to keep an eye on us. If we were a few

minutes late Mum and Dad would be sitting on the stile by the cottages and we never got away with it. We later realised what a responsibility having five daughters could be, especially during the war years."

NAYLAND. Betty remembers Ernie Hatten travelling around the villages in his old van selling paraffin for cooking, heating and lighting. Along from his shop in Bear Street was Beaumont's, another hardware shop, where her friend Muriel lived. Opposite was Ramplin the shoe mender who also swept chimneys. On the other side of the junction was Nixon's which sold odds and ends and farther along Mill Street was Walton's grocery shop. Taylor's in Mill Street was one of 3 bakers, the others being Butler's in Birch Street and Roberts' at the Guildhall. Past Walton's was Biggs' bicycle shop which also sold petrol. Next door was Dr Slade's house then Smy's sweet shop, Webb's the butcher and a big draper's shop. Opposite was William Deaves, builder and undertaker, and the Post Office. In Fen Street lorries delivered bales of straw to Annings. In the High Street there was Church's, a seed merchant, and in Court Street Kerridge's the butcher. There were 6 pubs: The Star & Garter and the Butcher's Arms in Bear Street, the Queen's Head in Mill Street, the White Hart in High Street and the Victoria and the Anchor in Court Street.

Betty first met her husband Sam when she was 9. He was in the army stationed at Colchester and often cycled to Wiston to see his relations who were friends of Betty's family. After his army service Sam and Betty married in 1943 in Wembley where they lived for 12 years. They often came back to Wiston and their two sons were born there.

Most of the six siblings were married at Wiston Church and seven of their children were born at Rushbanks Cottage

> helped by their mother. However, Betty wrote: "After Dad died in 1950 Wiston never seemed quite the same. Mum carried on until she remarried in 1953 and went to live in London where she died in 1961. My sister Maisie continued to live at the cottage with her family".

> In later life Betty and Sam returned to live in this area but Sam died in 2002. Their son Jim had bought Fox Cottage in Wiston in 1979 and Betty's sister Maisie lived there for a time. Revisiting Wiston a few years ago Betty said "I enjoyed travelling again through the country lanes that I knew so well from my childhood but when I saw the two new houses which replaced the old Rushbank Cottages I wondered what Mum and Dad would have thought of them".

> Betty now lives in Ruislip and I'd like to thank her for sharing her memories with us and also her niece Jean Stribling for telling me about her.



SUFFOLK SCHOOL BUS CAMPAIGN



For many years most children in Nayland have gone to school first at Nayland Primary school, and then to Thomas Gainsborough School (TGS) in Great Cornard (previously called Great Cornard Upper School). Whilst some children in Nayland do go to schools in Colchester and elsewhere, the majority opt for our local schools, Nayland Primary and Thomas Gainsborough. Nayland Primary works hard to ensure that children moving up to TGS are well-prepared and make a smooth transition to secondary school - which matters to children's wellbeing and their learning.

Residents of Nayland will be used to seeing groups of pupils waiting for the Chambers number 84 bus at the surgery, and by Forget Me Not. This is a public bus that goes from Nayland to Stoke by Nayland and on to Sudbury, and for decades, Suffolk have used it to transport children to TGS. Bear Street residents are also used to seeing a single decker bus that brings Leavenheath children to Nayland Primary at the beginning and end of the school day. These buses have been in place for decades because

Suffolk County Council, as our local education authority, is responsible for providing free travel for children who live either a few miles (or a shorter distance that is not safe to walk) from their local catchment school. Across the country, children in rural areas go to school by bus as this is the most efficient, environmentally sustainable, and safest way of ensuring that children can get to school.

However, as you may have read in the local papers, Suffolk County Council have changed their school transport policy with effect from this September. From September, the council have ditched school catchments. Instead they are calculating eligibility for bus passes based on walking routes to the nearest school. There is no good reason

why eligibility for school transport should be based on walking routes of more than several miles each way – we no longer live in the nineteenth century!

How does this affect Nayland residents? In two ways:

1. It splits the village

Some Nayland children are being denied a bus pass when they move up to TGS. Children

The new policy has deliberately split families living in the village

to the west of the primary school will still get a bus pass for free. Children who live to the east of the school won't get one unless they pay more than $\pounds 800$ per year per child. (There is no discount for siblings.)

Weirdly, according to the new policy, the council would provide them with free travel to Hadleigh High, a school Nayland Primary has no links with and to which there is no public bus service! This is despite the fact that even though the walking distance across footpaths might be very slightly

shorter, the actual driving distance to Hadleigh (on a route accessible to buses) is 1 mile longer than the actual driving distance to TGS! The map above shows which households in Nayland would qualify for transport to Hadleigh and which would qualify for the bus to TGS.

The new policy has deliberately split families living the village - as it has families in many other villages in Suffolk. It's discriminatory, unfair, and unnecessary. There is no reason why a family on Birch Street should have to pay an additional tax for the bus that already stops

on their street when they are using the same designated local school as children living at the A134 end of Bear Street, who don't have to pay. This policy targets children and families for no reason other than living the wrong side of an arbitrary line.

2. It forces more parents to drive their children to school

Many Leavenheath children are losing their right to the school bus because children aged below 8 are now expected to walk 2 miles each way to school, and children aged 8 and above are now expected to walk 3 miles

each way to school. This is the case even when the route involves crossing the A134, as it does for children living on Leavenheath High Road. The second map shows households in Leavenheath which are deemed to be within walking distance to Nayland Primary School.

The council is offering Leavenheath parents the opportunity to pay for a bus pass at £750 per year per child (rising to £930 per child in 2021). But that's a ridiculous price to pay for a bus PAGE 40

travelling two miles from the High Road or three miles from the Hare and Hounds. So the result is that parents are expecting to drive their children to school, increasing




