NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Extract of Draft Minutes for Meeting: 9th October 2019

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PUBLIC FORUM

Details of a public exhibition was shared on proposals for the conservation meadows. Improvements to footpaths were being investigated together with the planting of trees at the back of Bear Street. An idea of a footbridge was not considered viable.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Melanie Barrett was questioned on developers putting in applications piecemeal to potentially get around the requirement for a proportion of affordable homes over a certain number. After prompting she agreed to make enquiries in respect of local applications. Documentation providing the financial costs and benefits of a potential name change for Babergh District Council was requested. Melanie Barrett agreed to investigate.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh DC have given permission at Little Bulmer Farm, Wiston Road [DC/19/04015] for dwarf wall greenhouse on a cement base following removal of chicken shed and run and at 41 Bear Street [DC/19/02425 & 6] listed building consent for change of use of ground floor from retail to form residential use (C3) and works to internal and external doors and windows in association with the change of use. It was agreed to contact Babergh DC seeking clarity over the interpretation of policies relating to the marketing of a commercial entity and also querying the lack of drawings in respect of the proposed parking. At 8 Mill Street [DC/19/03701] Condition 3 had been approved and Condition 4 (Contamination Report) had been partly approved.

Discussing recent applications, councillors had no objections at St George House, Wissington Uplands [DC/19/04523] for the proposed felling of protected lime tree due to the very poor condition of the tree in question.

The Minerals and Waste Consultation had been circulated. Gerry Battye agreed to review in respect of the impact to the Parish. It will form an Agenda item for the November Meeting. BRIEFING TO RE-NAME BABERGH DISTRICT COUNCIL

Members felt a cost/benefit analysis would help inform them of whether this idea had merit. Concerns at this stage would be the unnecessary cost and that no proper public consultation has been arranged.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

It was noted Bootcamp was closed for the winter. There was a meeting with our grounds maintenance contractors at the Bear Street Playing Field. Whilst there were no immediate hazards with the play park, some maintenance items were discussed and quotes were requested. The safety surface will need attention in the future. Gerry Battye agreed to liaise with the playground safety inspectors for the annual report. The driveway has still not been attended to and it was agreed to seek a progress report from the Diocesan Surveyor. It was agreed to arrange a meeting with our contractors at Pop's Piece to agree a specification for the necessary works and a quotation. We can then get two

further quotations for comparison. It was noted that our contractors cleared branches from Caley Green following the high winds. **HIGHWAYS**

James Finch explained the issues and investigation regarding the drainage. The Chairman stressed that regular clearance by SCC is essential to avoid the blocking by silt. This was evidenced as a clearance following one flood lessened the consequences of an equally serious rainfall the following week. James Finch explained that grit and silt continually washes down from Gravel Hill causing the on-going situation. A site meeting was planned. James Finch stressed that whilst the engineers are aware of these various issues, they were working to priorities. He was reminded that our litter contractors cannot clear the verges on the A134 due to them being overgrown. He was asked to investigate responsibilities to clear accident debris, our contractors cleared some recently as it was left following an accident on the A134. He agreed to investigate.

STREET LIGHTING

It was confirmed that James Finch was intervening to chase the remaining street lighting works. It was agreed to ask for a quote for a new standard in Mill Street. The Clerk is to seek a site meeting with the engineer for the Chairman and Gerry Battye to attend.

FOOTPATHS

The diversion at the Horkesley Lock bridge footpath was discussed and it was noted this has already been investigated by our Footpath Warden. It was agreed for the Chairman to seek a phone call with the owner to discuss his views regarding this permissive path.

ALLOTMENTS

The hay has been cut on the allotment field and the Chairman had discussed with the tenant farmer. It was suggested that we spot spray the ragwort in the Spring. This will be on the agenda for finance committee as will an introduction of a returnable deposit for new Allotment Holders.

VILLAGE HALL

The VAT office had finally replied to our request for clarification over the Roof project. A new cooker had been purchased with 50% of the cost being a grant from the Community Council. **BURIAL GROUND**

An oak tree had partially fallen in the old burial ground which had been reported to Babergh DC who maintain the old burial ground. Estimates were awaited from our contractors following the autumn review meeting.

IN BRIFF

No developments were reported in relation to the Housing Needs Survey/Neighbourhood Planning.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS ON HARPER'S HILL

Residents had objected to there being two separate phases of development - incompatible with Babergh's own Planning Policy as it is a means to avoiding including affordable dwellings. Parish councillors had also written expressing serious concerns regarding access onto the A134; pedestrian access to the village and had pointed out that there is no bus service or footway as stated in the application. Tricia Fuller commented that none of these points had been presented to the decision making Planning Committee by the case officer who had included 'lack of affordable housing' as a single objection.

District Councillor Melanie Barrett made it clear that she had supported the application because of the local need to downsize. Melanie Barrett confirmed she had visited the site and had considered the footpath access to be acceptable.

The Parish Council will invite Ian Isbell, Chief Planning Officer to attend a meeting to discuss. Councillors would also raise the contradictory decisions made in granting permission at 41 Bear Street while refusing at The White Hart; both were previously commercial premises.

RENAMING BABERGH DISTRICT COUNCIL

Melanie Barrett advised that this was no longer on the immediate agenda. The proposed change was to 'South Suffolk' as 'Babergh' 'did not explain who we were nor where we are to inward investors'. While 'Babergh' has been used only since 1974, Councillors pointed out that the name was very old as we are in the 'Babergh hundred'. Cllrs had previously requested a cost analysis on making the name change.

(Note according to Wikipedia: Babergh was a hundred of Suffolk, consisting of 71,882 acres of land to the north, east and south east of Sudbury. It was listed as Baberga in the Domesday Book and the name is believed to mean "Mound of a man called Babba") **PLANNING**

Councillors heard that Babergh DC had granted permission at **St George House, Wissington Uplands** [DC/19/04523] for the proposed felling of protected lime tree due to the very poor condition of the tree in question, at **2 Gravel Hill** [DC/19/03700] listed building consent to re-roof dwelling, widen vehicular access and erect entrance gates, and at **The Bungalow Harpers Hill** [DC/19/03822] outine permission (some matters reserved – including access) for erection of 6 dwellings (2 semi-detached and 4 detached dwellings), with associate garages, parking, private drive and access (following demolition of existing dwelling).

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objection at **1 Fox Cottages Bures Road** [*DC*/19/04750] for erection of a two storey side extension, at **15 The Westerings** [*DC*/19/04960] for erection of a two storey rear extension, at **The Mill House Wiston Hall Lane** [*DC*/19/04751] to listed building consent for erection of a single storey side extension or at **The Malt House 16 Stoke Road** [*DC*/19/04929] for works to trees in a conservation area T1 Oak reduction by 0.5 - 1.5 metres.

Councillors had no objection at **Longwood House Stoke Road** [DC/19/05106] for conversion of barn/stables to annexed accommodation for relatives subject to it not being a separate dwelling. Discussing listed building consent at **4 Mill Street Nayland** [DC/19/05282 & 3] to replace render to south west and north west elevations; replace guttering and install rainwater pipe to north west and south east elevations and refurbish *Continued page 9*

Members were saddened to hear that Roy Evans had passed away recently. Roy was a member of the Exec for 20 years until retiring in 2010; he was Vice Chair from 1997 and Vice President 2003-2010. Roy and his wife Jean gave great dedication in leading distribution of the Community Times from its beginning in 1989 until 2010. Roy was a quiet but very effective man of Wales, incredibly helpful and willing to do anything to assist. Roy's funeral is on Tuesday 29th October, 1.15pm at St James' Church. The Exec send their condolences to his wife Jean .

Fundraising Activities & Events: Ideas for fund raising projects to benefit the CC are always welcome

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station.

Rachel Hitchcock felt there should be another training session at some point .

Nayland 10k Fun Run: The 2020 Nayland 10k will take place on Sunday 5th July

Village Hall Garden: The autumn session to maintain the gardens was held on 12th October. Rachel Hitchcock attended and said the weather had not been kind. The next session will be in spring, usually during April (date depending on Easter).

TREASURER'S REPORT: Maggie Ryan gave her report. **Breakdown of profits:** Quiz £210, Community Times £1,080, Village Calendar (£267), Nayland 10k £1,414.40, Bonfire (£1,035.22)

Grants paid: Lizzie's Fund Endurance Walk £170, Nayland & Wiston website £94.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £23,232.65, represented by Deposit a/c monies £10,684.42, Current a/c monies £12,475.45, Cash in hand £72.78. We hold £318.50 for the Services Fund and £10,000 VH roof grant is pending. The grant for the Village Hall cooker is £779.99. **Therefore, unencumbered assets are £12,114.16.**

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Village Hall Cooker: At the September meeting a grant of £779.99 was awarded to the VHMC as half the cost of a replacement. The cooker has been purchased and installed. **Community Times & Websites:** Lorraine Brooks gave the usual plea for contributions for the coming issue.

Justin Dowding said the Nayland & Wiston website continues to be well used.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said the 2020 calendar is available to buy in the Post Office and at Forget Me Not priced £5.

The calendar team need to widen the net so would be grateful for help with selling at other venues/events. Claire Buller advised that John Spooner would be willing to sell calendars at the Country Music Club monthly concerts.

FORTHCOMING ACTIVITIES

Bonfire Night on Tuesday 5th November, 6.30 for 7pm display: The fireworks have been delivered, Julie and Kristian Clark attended pyrotechnic training and will gain experience from observing this year. The Anchor Inn have kindly agreed that their overflow car park can be used; accessible parking only at the village hall. Solutions to reduce queues at sales points were successful last year and will be repeated – Claire will send out an email with all the details on sales. Rachel and Maggie will update the Risk Assessment. Rachel will send out an email with updated set up, gate, parking, etc details. Volunteers for a litterpick the following morning from 9am would be welcome.

Christmas Fayre on Saturday 7th December: Rachel Hitchcock confirmed the School will provide entertainment, Father Christmas will be in attendance, stallholders have booked tables. Messy Church will provide children's activities. Rachel will send out an email with all the updated planning details. Setting up starts at 8.30am, stallholders at 9am, open at 10.30am-1pm. Many thanks to Andrew and Sue for running the mulled wine stall for many years; Jo and Luke will run it this year. Julie will organise the sausage rolls, Rachel will organise the presents. Volunteers are needed to man the raffle.

Village Christmas Tree: Claire has arrangements in hand. The tree will go up on Sunday 8th December from 9am – help would be welcomed – and taken down on Sunday 5th January. Bryan will make arrangements for electricity supply.

Nayland Village Quiz: will be on Friday 7th February 2020. SOCIETY REPORTS

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said their coach outing to Audley End House and Gardens had been enjoyable but the coach had not been full, in October Pip Wright gave a very interesting talk on *'Lucky is the Name'* the intriguing story and scandals of a Suffolk farming family between 1858-1969. On 11th November the subject of the joint meeting with the Conservation Society will be *Barn Owls*. They will have a stall at the Christmas Fayre.

Women's Institute: Yvonne Swane said they enjoyed their annual afternoon Tea Party in the President's garden, a boat trip on the River Orwell, talks by Chris Hunt on *'War Memorials'* and by Lisa Jones on *'The history of Underwear'*. On 18th November there will be a talk on *'Jumbo: The History of Colchester's Water Tower'* and on 16th December *'Music & Poetry with guitar accompaniment'*.

Village Players: Justin Dowding said they are rehearsing for their next production, *'The Lion in Winter'* by James Goldman. Betrayal, treachery and family feuding: it's just another normal Christmas celebration for the royal Plantagenet family of King Henry II. Jim Bond will be directing with performances on 5th-7th December.

Royal British Legion: John Partridge said Bryan Smith gave a fascinating talk about his years living and working in Saudi Arabia at their AGM. The Poppy Appeal Coffee Morning takes place on 9th November and Remembrance Day Service on Sunday 10th, 10.45am at the War Memorial.

Conservation Society: John Partridge said on 3rd November the Nayland with Wissington Land Company will be holding an exhibition for proposals to the future management of the Nayland Meadows. On 11th November '*Barn Owls*' will be the subject of the talk at the joint meeting with HortSoc. The Conservation Society committee is considering the suggestion of making a collaborative request to the Environment Agency asking for a water level gauge/censor to be sited on the river at Nayland.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said a second grant application, with the extra detail required, has been submitted to Babergh Community Infrastructure Levy. The replacement cooker has been installed and general maintenance continues. They continue to look for a solution to the faulty front door closure.

Nayland Cinema: Iain Wright said there had been some interesting films screened with good attendances. The last film this year will be '*Yesterday*' on 8th November. On 26th January they are organising a fundraising Tea Party and screening of '*The Affair*' which was filmed partly in Nayland during the 90s and starred some of those at this meeting!

Parish Council: Ned Cartwright said they are still 4 members short and urgently need people to join them as co-opted members; without a full council it is difficult to manage council business PAGE 6

efficiently. They have contributed comments to Babergh on the proposed changes to guidelines for the Local Plan Consultation, they met with SSC highways regarding flooding on the A134, they are concerned about the number of inappropriately large lorries using Wiston Road. They have examined and objected to an application to build another 6 houses at The Bungalow, Harpers Hill. Asked about an application for change of use at the White Hart, no decision had been published (the following day Babergh published the application had been refused).

Messy Church: Rachel Hitchcock said the last two sessions were well attended. They are not church as you know it! October's 'Light Party' theme was lots of fun, noise, games, doughnut eating and pumpkins! .

AOB:

Water Level in the River Stour: Lorraine Brooks said a number of residents had now received responses to their letters of concern to the Environment Agency (EA) regarding the horseshoe weir and sections of the river running completely dry during August and September. An information and photographic record of events sent with her letter is available to view on <u>https://</u> www.naylandandwiston.net.

The EA say this has happened due to lack of rainfall over a couple of years and increased demand on the water supply. The problem of water levels being low in other rivers in the SE of England has featured in the press and on the BCC, where concerns have been raised that demands on water supply needs to be considered as infrastructure for building development.

Regarding maintenance, they confirm they have a statutory duty in relation to navigation but are restricted by financial constraints; the river is deemed navigable if it is passable in a canoe, even if this involves portaging sections of the river.

A resident has made a suggestion that having a water level gauge/censor sited on the river at Nayland (as there are at Bures and Langham) would be useful. Mike Hunter has agreed to discuss the possibility of following up the suggestion to ask the EA to install a gauge, as a collaborative project with the CC and the PC, at the next Conservation Society committee meeting. He will also raise the proposal at the next PC meeting. The CC agreed to support the proposal for a water level gauge and this will become an agenda item,

REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

Events marking Remembrance Sunday began with a wreath-laying ceremony.

Villagers gathered around the war memorial where wreaths were laid by Royal British Legion branch chairman John Partridge, parish council chairman Mary George, Nayland Primary School pupil Oliver Russell and a representative from Nayland Fire Station. Following the Last Post and two-minutes silence branch members moved into St James's Church accompanied by the rest of the congregation.

The well-attended church service was conducted by David Pryor who also preached the sermon. Branch president Ken Willingale listed the names of servicemen from Nayland and Wiston who lost their lives in both world wars.

Earlier, Mr Pryor led a service at St Mary's, Wiston, where wreaths were laid by David Slater for the legion and parish councillor Ned Cartwright.

Bugler Bill Slark sounded the Last Post and Reveille at both venues. A coffee morning held at the church hall on November 9 raised £291 for the Poppy Appeal.

window to north west elevation and erection of log store following removal of shed and coal bunker councillors had no objection subject to the Heritage Officer's advice regarding the mix of the render. Councillors had no objection at **39 Fen Street** to remove a conifer hedge - although not required to comment councillors will send a confirmatory email to the contractor.

Councillors object to the felling of the Handkerchief and Sycamore trees at **30 Bear Street** [*DC*/19/04014] for notification of proposed works to trees under Tree Preservation Order WS129/ A6 to fell 1 Handkerchief tree (T1), fell 1 Sycamore tree (T2) and reduce 1 Yew tree (T3).

RIVER STOUR

Mary George said that following the concerns about the drop in water levels in the river in the Summer, the Community Council and Conservation Society have agreed as a collaborative project to ask the Environment Agency to install a water level monitor censor (perhaps fitted to the Anchor Bridge or by the horseshoe weir). The PC will write to the Conservation Society in support and suggesting they ask the EA how they currently assess water levels here.

MILL STREET BRIDGE

When the Mill Lade grill was cleared recently bits of furniture and plastic were removed along with green debris. The Environment Agency has again asked that residents along the riverside refrain from dumping tree stumps, grass cuttings and so on into the river.

RECREATION & OPEN SPACES

Repairs are due to be carried out to the drive to the Vicarage. This is a private drive and councillors felt it would be timely for a 'no parking on the drive' reminder to go to parents at Nayland Primary School.

Mary George had met with a resident of a property neighbouring Fairfield playing field regarding the height of a section of the party hedge. Councillors agreed that it needed reducing and to investigate the ownership of the hedge.

HIGHWAYS

A drainage survey has been carried out by Suffolk CC over the past two years. They would like to include the drainage scheme in with the Mill Street bridge renovation works and are bidding for funding. Timing of works will be affected by bats under the mill.

Sheds and other structures had been built over culvert inspection chambers and some new owners did not know the chambers' locations. Suffolk CC are considering three potential solutions.

Problems of flooding on the A134 and Stoke Road is part of the drainage discussion.

Damage is being remedied to verges in Wiston, a pothole will be repaired in Church Lane, a new bollard will be provided in Bear Street.

IN BRIEF

A new backwater project has taken place on private land in Wiston and is designed to give young fish some protection. It would not affect the flow of the river.

The PC has received an application for a 6' x 4' shed at the allotments

The Village Cinema is doing well. It will break in December and show two films in January.



It seems some time ago now that (on 14th August 2019) flow to our beloved river became low and the horseshoe weir ran dry. For some time walkers and villagers were dismayed, canoeists were left carrying their vessels, fish were stranded in isolated pools or lay dead and other wildlife left confused. But when autumn rains came, and persisted, the levels rose and by 7th October the horseshoe weir was flowing strongly once again to the delight of many.

Like a number of other residents I wrote to the Environment Agency expressing my concerns that the river had no water and at the lack of maintenance generally. Many of the responses were similar; the précis of the response I received is below.

It remains odd to me that they have been using the word 'drought' since this occurred. Yet in the past when water was sparse bans on the use of sprinklers would be imposed, followed by hosepipe bans but not a murmur this summer. I believe though that those with abstraction licences - the farmers growing crops - did have abstraction restrictions placed on them!

Response from Environment Agency

The response I received from Simon Hawkins, East Anglia Area Director stated that groundwater levels in Suffolk have been impacted by the recent very low rainfall following a dry winter. They have declared an environmental drought in this part of the country and issued notices to irrigation licence holders to cut back their rate of abstraction.

The EA have also been actively monitoring flows and water quality in the river at Nayland throughout August and September 2019. This includes recording the impacts of low flows, taking measurements for example dissolved oxygen readings to assess any deterioration in water quality and to check for any signs of fish in distress. They state they will continue to review what actions can be taken in managing low river flows on the River Stour now and in the future.

During the summer months the rate of flow in the River Stour is determined by the groundwater level in the chalk aquifer. The chalk aquifer is recharged over winter, typically between November and April. The EA stated that since 2016 the amount of rain in Essex and Suffolk has been consistently below average and last winter recharge was extremely slow. As a result groundwater levels have fallen to extremely low levels.

The EA also state that the continuous flow record at Lamarsh and Langham also provides confirmation that the rate of flow between the two reaches has been maintained at a consistent rate throughout the summer. There is no disputing this rate of flow is extremely low, but is the result of low groundwater levels caused by a prolonged dry period over the last 36 months.

ELY OUSE TO ESSEX TRANSFER SCHEME

The EA states that no water has been abstracted by Northumbrian Water (NW) at Wormingford since 19th June. All the water NW abstracted during the early spring and summer was water transferred by the EOETS specifically for that purpose and even then only proportion of the transferred water was taken. There has been much ado recently about our rivers; on

television and in the press. And of course about the weather! There have been problems reported this summer with the slow flow of water in the River Colne at Colchester. An increase in

flow of water in the River Colne at Colchester. An increase in duckweed and water fern, Azolla filiculoides, has left the river covered in a film of green. *Noah's Clean the River Colne* campaign is highlighting this issue. Simon Hawkins, for the Environment Agency (EA) stated that the water fern is an invasive, non-native species and can be very difficult to control and grows where the river flows slower. He states that management of riverside and aquatic vegetation is generally the responsibility of the landowner. However, to minimise the environmental impact that this weed is having on our rivers in these drought conditions they have trialled different ways of removing the duckweed from the River Colne and other rivers this year.

The BBC have run several items too. One in *The One Show* about the low water levels in many rivers across Cambridgeshire, Hertfordshire, Suffolk and Essex. The reporter seemed

During the 2018-19 refill of Abberton Reservoir they transferred 21980 Megalitres of water into the River Stour specifically for NW to abstract to fill Abberton Reservoir. Permission was granted to NW to abstract up to 9172 Megalitres at Wormingford. The water company will preferentially take more water at the lower intakes at Stratford, Langham and Brantham. Actual abstraction returns from NW are confidential information.

EA's operational rules on transferring water to support abstraction at Wormingford require that they allow no more than 75% of the water discharged in the river from the EOETS to be taken at any one time. This does allow for transit losses en-route.

NAVIGATION & MAINTENANCE

The EA states it has a statutory duty in relation to navigation to take such steps as reasonably practicable, taking account of financial constraints, to maintain the main navigation channel for the purpose of navigation by pleasure boats.

They state navigation income from craft registration is minimal (around \pounds 3,000 pa) and ever reducing Government funds limits what they can do.

In terms of what is deemed navigable this varies according to its use and other physical constraints. For the powered craft section between Ballingdon Bridge in Sudbury and Henny Street they maintain a two-way navigation channel width. For unpowered sections they deem if the river is passable in a canoe, even if this involves portaging sections of the river then it is still navigable.

The EA state they will endeavour to assess reports of obstructions to navigation such as fallen trees and usually try and attend to undertake minor works to make the river passable until such time that a full removal can be arranged and funded. They also get in touch with the riparian or riverside landowner to impress on them their legal duties to undertake the obstruction removal. to conclude lack of maintenance by the Environment Agency along with intense building development in East Anglia and its increased demand for water was taking it's toll on the rivers.

An article and letters in the Essex County Standard suggested greater importance should be given to water being considered infrastructure by planning authorities.

Another BBC feature was on Focus On Farming about the National Farmers' Union campaign for a joined-up approach, both in the use of water and maintenance of waterways, particularly as more extreme weather events are occurring.

Following the terrible flooding a few years ago in Somerset Levels and other areas it came to light that neglect of the rivers left them at just 52% efficiency so when the rains came how could they possibly cope; their banks burst.

Our hearts currently have to go out to the people in Doncaster and other areas suffering from the devastating floods there. Will this turn out to be, in part at least, due to poor management of waterways?

Back to our own River Stour and its maintenance.... less than a decade ago it could cope very well with raised water levels; with reeds growing almost from bank to bank in places how does its efficiency compare now?

Following a suggestion from a resident that a water level sensor gauge would be useful to have on the river at Nayland, the Community Council and Conservation Society have agreed to collaborate to investigate that possibility.

WATER WATER

A picture in the Community Times seemed to suggest this was abnormal but there has always been a poor flow during dry summers as my photo, taken some 30 years ago shows (note the old bus garage).

The CT photo (p.20) shows a tree down across the weir. I thought that landowners on river banks (riparian owners) were responsible for keeping the waterway clear.

It will be interesting to see the rainfall figures for the autumn - it seems it hasn't stopped raining for two months.

Now the river is full excess water appears to find its way onto the A134 at Nags. Suppose we could moan about that!!

DEAD SHEEP'S CARCASS IN THE RIVER STOUR

On 12th September a Nayland resident contacted the EA to report a dead sheep caught in reeds in the main river downstream of Bures Lock. This was not only unsightly, smelly and a source of pollution, it was just before of the annual Sudbury to the Sea (S2C) event in which young children would be taking part who would no doubt find the dead animal very upsetting.

The EA's response was: "The Environment Agency will only consider dead animals in water courses as an incident if a dead animal is in a main river and is likely to cause flooding or pollution. A single carcass will not cause significant pollution and we will not remove it because it is unsightly."

The carcass was unmissable when approx 300 adults and youngsters paddled past during the S2C on 14th September.

The EA state: environmental incidents should be reported to their 24 hour hotline number: 0800 80 70 60.

KINGFISHERS

With the return of water to the river a walker on 23rd October reported that is was delightful to see so many Kingfishers back along the stretch of river beyond the Anchor Inn.

BACKWATER HABITAT CREATION

During October canoeists and walkers along the stretch of river on the Wiston side of the A134 may have noticed some activity with diggers excavating along the riverbank. Two new backwaters have been created by the Water Management Alliance through Water Environment Grant funding that was secured by the Dedham Vale AONB and Stour Valley Project team. The creation of backwaters will provide sheltered conditions away from the main flow of water in the river and is important for many fish populations during flood conditions as they provide shelter from the full force of water. In summer, the shallow depth of backwaters allows the water to warm and provides ideal conditions for the rapid development of fish fry.

Given the great success of the recent Mamma Mia singalong I think musicals are certainly on the agenda, maybe as 'film extras'.

Seven out of the eight responses would like to see works from the National Theatre and this is something Ned is looking into regarding feasibility and costs.



NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON CONSERVATION SOCIETY

Since the last edition of the Community Times, members and guests of the Society have enjoyed two excellent speaker meetings. The October meeting featured Nick Amor who gave a fascinating talk on the Medieval Cloth Industry with special reference to the part that Nayland played during this period. The November meeting, co-hosted with the Horticultural Society, received a talk on the topic of Barn Owls from Steve Piotrowski. Steve's breadth of knowledge was extraordinary and it was of little surprise to learn that he is a published author and environmental consultant.

Our next meeting, which will take place at the Village Hall on the evening of the 9th of December at 7.30 pm, will consist of an up-date on the Court Knoll Project by leading archaeologist Jo Caruth. Jo has some significant news to impart arising from the continuing analysis of the finds recovered from the excavations but she has sworn me to secrecy so you will have to attend the meeting to obtain the latest information!

It will be remembered that in June we had a talk from Sarah Cook on the topic of Cedric Morris. Since then, the Society has become aware that Benton End, the historic house occupied by Morris and the place where he founded the East Anglian School of Art (Lucien Freud and Maggi Hambling were two of the students) has been acquired by the Pinchbeck Charitable Trust with the intention of creating a centre for educational excellence in the arts and in horticulture. The Society hopes to arrange a visit to Benton End at some future date but in the meantime if members wish to be kept informed of progress by the Trust you can email <u>sophie@bentonend.co.uk</u> and ask to be placed on the mailing list.

Fortunately, the River Stour has recovered from the alarming low levels of July and August and the pressure applied by the Society and others (especially your editor Lorraine Brooks) to the Environment Agency resulted in remedial action to boost the flow. A number of organisations within the village have resolved to request the installation of a river level gauge so that there is an earlier warning of low-level problems in the future.

The Society's Swift Box scheme is progressing satisfactorily with 21 residential properties involved and possibly St. James' Church. The next steps involve obtaining the approval of Babergh District Council to the location and style of the boxes and obtaining an estimate of the cost of installation. It is hoped that the boxes will be ready and waiting for our overseas visitors by next spring!



In October Cllr Mary Evans announced an independent review into the school transport policy, led by the chief fire officer Mark Hardingham. Having sought further information, it is now clear that the review is first looking only at the implementation of the policy - the process of applying for transport. The review will report on this, then the council will consider if the findings of the review mean that they should make changes to the actual policy. This second stage is fundamentally important but not yet guaranteed - after all

the problems parents experienced applying for transport (and the problems the council experienced dealing with their applications) stem from problems created by the policy itself. So our most significant concern about the review is that they should be considering the policy alongside implementation issues. Additionally we are very concerned about whether the review is actually independent (as stated publicly) or just an internal council review (as outlined in the review's terms of reference), and about how the review team are gathering evidence from parents.

However, the review is still a real opportunity to make clear the full impact of this disastrous policy and we in the campaign are doing all that is possible to ensure that the voices of parents, pupils and schools are heard. We asked for a public meeting for parents but this was declined, in favour of a small, closed, meeting to take place in the next four weeks. So in order to ensure that the review team have as much evidence from parents as possible we have set up a short survey. If you are affected by the school transport policy, please fill this in and share with others. Please also fill it in if you will be applying for transport in the next two years. 
All members of the family welcome for fun art and craft activities, games, stories and singing based around informal worship followed by afternoon tea.

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

A year ago we celebrated the successful colouring of the Scarlett Oaks; this year the colour has been even better. Now the leaves have all fallen and the branches are bare.

The English Oaks are only just beginning to fall, and will soon be safely gathered in (as the Harvest Hymn says).

At M/S Hall we operate a three year cycle for leafmould; the wire pen recently cleared out (mostly by a kind friend) is now being refilled with this year's fall. The leafmould removed from it will provide a useful soil conditioner, buy hasn't much nutritional value.

Although Nayland has already suffered several frosts and plants, such as Dahlias, destroyed (for the season), here on the higher ground they still survive if not longer actually in flower. But as one clan bows out, for the season another is ready to take its place. There are several shrubs which do their stuff in winter. The yellow Winter Jasmine is one, and its flowers have already started to appear. Next comes the Witch Hazel, Hamamelis Mollis, which produces both flower and scent. Unfortunately the OM/S made the mistake many years ago, of buying a red-flowered variety; this doesn't show up anything like as well as the ordinary yellow one. Finally, don't despise the so-called Christmas Box, the Sarcococcas. S. Digyna is probably the best as it's more free flowering. They are best planted near the house as one then gets the full value of its scent.

Last year the OM/S went out to his favourite Holly bush, usually covered with berries, at this time of year, to find that the birds had scoffed the lot. This year we took no chances and picked some early, but even if kept in a plastic sack (to protect from mice) it may not keep its berries until Christmas

ANOTHER SCHOOL TRANSPORT PROBLEM

The recent changes to Suffolk County Council's policy for school transport have caused a great deal of controversy and concern for some parents in Nayland and it is to be hoped that the promised review will bring a satisfactory conclusion for all concerned.

This is not the first time that parents in Nayland have been at loggerheads with the County Council about transport for their children. Almost 70 years ago a lack of transport was the cause of a similar problem for parents. A press cutting from the Essex County Standard newspaper dated 15th September 1950 was headlined: "**PARENTS STRIKE FOR PUPILS' SAFETY**".

The children involved, all over the age of 11, should have been attending the school at Stoke-by-Nayland to which they had been transferred from Nayland County Primary School. Up to this time Nayland children had completed their education at the old Victorian school behind the Church which in future would be for children under 11 only. It was not long after this change, however, that because of the deteriorating state of the building, the County Council decided to build a new Primary School in Bear Street which opened in 1957.

The parents of the 51 children who were transferring to the school at Stoke-by-Nayland in 1950 protested to the Council that their children would have to walk to school along a dangerous road. Mr William Pitts, speaking on behalf of the 38 parents, suggested that transport should be arranged for the safety of the children, describing the road as very dangerous with bad and blind corners and no footpaths. Parents were not saying the distance was too far for the children to walk and if there was a safe path no objections would be raised. He said he would seek the aid of the Road Safety Committee to help forward the parents' claim.

The Education Committee stated that the majority of the children lived within the statutory walking distance as laid down in the Education Act of 1944 and the few pupils who lived over this distance came within the regulations whereby bicycles were the means of transport. The committee could not make a special concession to Nayland children as it would be unfair to other pupils who were already attending school under similar conditions. The Sudbury & Woodbridge MP, the Hon. John Hare, became involved and the Chief Education Officer suggested to him that Nayland children using bicycles should walk their cycles through the churchyard to avoid the dangerous stretch of road. However, the parents insisted that the greater part of the road was too dangerous for the children to cycle over. When the Autumn Term started in September the parents kept their children away from the Stoke school and continued to send them to the old Nayland school behind the church but they were refused admission. The children all went home again and didn't mind at all as this meant they were having an extension to their summer holidays.

Mr Leslie Amos, who drove the bus which took under 11s from Leavenheath to Nayland School had one child attending Nayland School and another who should go to Stoke-by-Nayland. After referring to the dangers of the road he said "It's no good telling 50 children how to behave on the road because there will always be some who do the other thing". Looking at the falling rain Mr Amos added "There is no shelter at all on the road and look at the weather this morning".

It seems that one pupil, Maudie Hills who was 11 and lived in Wiston, was provided with a cycle by the Education Committee to make the journey to Stoke but her mother said "she can't ride a cycle. She has never been on one in her life. Even if she could I would not let her ride those five dangerous miles."

A later press cutting said the County Council could issue summonses against the Nayland parents who had been keeping their children away from Stoke-by-Nayland School. No decision had yet been reached because the Education Committee said the children were trickling back to school in two and threes but they wouldn't be given much longer. However, Mr Pitts revealed that the children had in fact returned to school in a private coach hired by Mr David Mitchell, one of the parents. They were still fighting the committee for transport but Mr Pitts said: "We have got the bus because we believe that the children's education is important and also because of their health. Only one child went back, without her mother's permission. Apart from that one case all the parents were still 100 per cent behind the strike. We shall be able to fight for transport better if the children are at school than if they are staying away."

How did this problem end? Sadly, despite this valiant attempt by the parents of the Nayland children the Education Committee would not give way and no transport was provided. The children did find their way to school, many of them cycling, but - I wonder what happened to Maudie in Wiston?

Known for his kindness, generosity, understanding, humour, and always looking for the good in people, Roy Evans of The Westerings passed away on 14th September. He was a beloved husband to Jean, doting father to Michael and Jane and was never happier than when he was among his six grandchildren.

Roy was born in the small village of Drefach Velindre in West Wales but after the tragic death of his mother in childbirth to his brother he went to live with his grandmother in the village of Rhandirmwyn. After teacher training college in Carmarthen he took up various teaching posts in the London area.

It was while he was teaching at Clockhouse School in Romford that he met Jean; love blossomed and they married in 1955 in Jean's home village of LLyswen in mid-Wales. They lived in Romford until Roy was appointed headmaster of St George's Junior School in Colchester and they moved to Nayland.

• Resist the excesses of consumerism, which cause many people to incur unpayable debts and cause such harm to creation.

- And if you want to enjoy a meaningful and perhaps even a little more Eco-Friendly Christmas this year, here are a few ideas: • Arrange with family and friends to give something that you each own to each other and give the money you would have spent on presents to charity.
- Purchase presents from charity shops buying second hand is as important as giving away your old things to the shop.

- If you do buy new, buy minimally-earth-damaging things like books or fair-trade items and whenever possible steer clear of plastic.
- Ask people what they want before you buy them something that they don't need.
- · Give gifts of charity or of your time

CLIMATALOGICAL & WEATHER REPORT: Nayland 2019 August to October

Introduction

By way of background, my weather data is sourced from a Davis VP2 System that I have had at Hollies for just over 12 years. The data from this allows a measure of annual comparison.

The data from the several instruments feeds through wirelessly to my PC, on which Weatherlink software records it. This also permits some basic analysis – but not on an overall monthly by year format that is needed for a monthly report. I have to extract this individually, in most cases.

I then assemble this data on Excel spreadsheets for each month. If anyone would like the full data for each month to supplement the commentary that follows, please contact me at the email address that I have added at the end.

AUGUST

Normally my reports will be for the preceding two months, but this time, I am going to begin with August, as I did not have time to do it justice when taking on my role for the last issue.

August also sets a useful background context as a summer month, before we move into autumn. It can also be the warmest month, though normally this falls to July. This was the case this year – with mean temperature for July being 18.7° C and August, 18.4° C. August was the warmest in the past 12 years, pipping 2009 by 0.2°C. It also had the highest max temperature of 31.9° C, pipping 2016 by 0.3° C. The lowest temperature recorded was 8.2° C, about average.

Unsurprisingly, there were no ground frosts in August (there have been none in this month over the 12 year period). The mercury failed to reach 20°C on only 2 days. 25°C was exceeded on a record 25 days and 30°C on an equal record, 3 days. Bright sun hours were 235 – marginally beaten only by 2013.

Rainfall was 40mm, below the monthly average of 63.66 mm and the second lowest over the period. August often combines warmth with some heavy deluges – but the latter were missing this year.

August 2019 had the second highest wind gust of 36mph and the highest average wind speed of the 12 years of 4.2mph. All that warm air was arriving fast!

August had a cloudier, wetter spell from the 9th to the 18th - but the improvement after that 'turned the month round'. The jet stream was unsurprisingly over the UK during the 9 -18 period – but was otherwise disrupted. Atlantic low pressure was prevalent in the wet period – otherwise high pressure was just to the south and south east.

SEPTEMBER

As to be expected, September saw a noticeable drop in mean temperature from August's 18.4° C to 14.9° C. This is a little over the monthly average of 14.57° C.Max temperature was 25.3° C

Monthly rain was up - to 52.6mm - over the average of 42.14. This fell at a rate of 153.6mm/hr on 27th for a time - that is nearly 5x the Met Office white downpour rate of 32mm/hr. Normally these downpours occur when Atlantic cold fronts advance into accumulated heatwave air in July and August, but this can occur in September and, occasionally, October. September actually holds the record for these downpours a massive 261.4mm/hour in

September 2014. That is over 8x the Met Office downpour rate! Normally when it rains, this is at less than 2mm/hr!

The September rain was sufficient to get water flowing over the Horseshoe Weir again, which has continued since.

Average wind speed was up from 4.2 in August to 4.7mph, the highest for September. Both the past two years have been considerably higher than previously, when the highest figure reached was 2.9. The highest gust was 32mph – a bit over average an short of the 2017 record of 37, and only 1mph over the highest August figure.

The jet stream was all over the place this month – sometimes to the south, sometimes to the north – and sometimes right over. So low pressure systems and their associated fronts were never far away. In the circumstances, we did as well to score with temperatures as well as we did!

OCTOBER

October took a turn for the colder, with a mean temperature of 11° C – second equal lowest over the period. The highest temp of 19.6° C was below the average and the lowest temp – 0.6° , equal lowest. The first ground frost occurred on the 28th. Only one ground frost in the month – average 1.25 – max 5 in 2008, 4 in 2011, and none 2012-2017. 14 days failed to reach 15° C and none reached 20°C, which is achieved more often than not. In 2011 and 2018 there were 7 days over 20°C. In 2011, remarkably, the first three days of the month scored 27.6, 28.8 and 27.3! These temps would have been a credit to September – and in some years, July and August!

Bright sunshine hours were 70.8, 9 less than average. It is 103 hours less than September – a good bit less than half!


Monthly rain was 89.8mm, well above the average of 52.61. We had one day of 25.4mm (only one over 10 and 20mm) on the 5th – and a rainfall rate of 117.6mm/hr on 17th - the highest ever in October, and when rainfall rates are on a significantly decreasing trend.

Average wind speed was 4.9mph, above average – and notice the increasing average wind strength as the year advances. Highest gust was 29mph, a little below average.

The jet stream was over the country for most of the month, steering copious low pressure systems and fronts our way. **CONTACT:**

Once again there is a rustling of shredded paper at SESAW as more hungry hedgehogs demand their dinner. They need to put on more weight before they are ready to fend for themselves.


Despite our best efforts, some of our rescue stories do not have a happy ending.






