The Community Council is grateful to everyone who has been involved over the years.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Extract of Minutes for Summer Meeting: 14th August 2019

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PUBLIC FORUM

The river levels in the village were raised as a concern which was being investigated by the Environment Agency. On another matter the vegetation around the gutters hasn't been cleared for some time. The Chairman explained about the on-going dialog with Suffolk County Council on the matter.

PLANNING

An application at **Wissington Grove Farm, Bures Road** [DC/19/03042] for the erection of conservatory was considered between meetings; the Parish Council had no objections.

Councillors had no objections at **1 Fen Street** [DC/19/03590] regarding notification of works to trees in a Conservation Area.

Whilst councillors had no objections to an application at **2 Gravel Hill** [DC/19/03700/03572] for planning and listed building consent for dormer extension, re-build chimney stack, re-roof and widen access including entrance gates, they requested that the Planning Authority takes into account the following points: 1 To widen the access, a small section of the ancient wall is to be demolished in the Conservation Area, and 2 There

is a hydrant post in the section of wall to be demolished.

It was agreed to seek further information and respond by 4th September on an application at **Newtons Farm, Wiston Hall Lane** [DC/19/03801] for the erection of a grain store.

Gerry Battye expressed in strong terms his concern about the decision at **Chandlers 100 Bear Street** [DC/18/05593] for listed building consent for the erection of side extension, rear extension, detached cartlodge and detached workshop. Demolition of rear extension, side extension and chimney stacks and alterations. He made it clear it was not personal in relation to the residents. His concern was the clarity for loss of amenity to neighbours. He felt this application set a new benchmark in judging the effects of residential amenity.

LOCAL PLAN CONSULTATION

The Parish Council have until the end of September to submit their views. A working party has been formed to examine the Plan and draft a potential response for consideration at the September Parish Council meeting

CHRISTMAS FAYRE RAFFLE

NO WASTE ON THE VILLAGE BONFIRE

It is with regret that we must insist that no garden waste or any other material is put on the bonfire.

THERE ARE TO BE NO EXCEPTIONS.

This is due to non combustible and potentially dangerous items being put on in previous years. We are obliged, by our insurance company, to take appropriate action if anyone ignores this notice. Mr Bugg has again kindly offered to construct the bonfire for us and only materials supplied by him will be used.

Do You Know Someone Eligible For The Walsh Trust Christmas Bonus?

Each Christmas the Walsh Trust, which has two parish council trustees and four others, gives out small cash bonuses to those over 80 who have lived in the village at least three years and who would welcome such a bonus. As the original charities were for providing food and fuel, the Trust gives a present to those who have previously had the bonus but are now in residential care. The income is very small and depending on how many are eligible the amount is normally around £20 for a single person and £25 for two people living in the same house. There is no official way we can find out who is over 80 so we rely on local knowledge and that means all of you.

So please let us know if you are going to be eighty or know someone who will be by Christmas. Contact Mr Battye, Mrs Fuller, Mrs Rolfe, Mrs Mig Knight, Miss Kath Hunt or me, Mrs Knox. My number is 262224. If you already have the bonus and are still living in Nayland you will of course continue to get it and don't need to inform us. But because our income is so small once we have paid out for the year we simply do not have any money left to give late-comers so PLEASE let us know by the **1st of December**.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes on the meeting: 11th September 2019

PUBLIC FORUM

A resident enquired whether there were plans to build on a field adjacent to the location of six proposed dwellings at 'The Bungalow', Harper's Hill. Councillors explained that - while it isn't a guarantee that the land would never be built upon - the field is described as 'unsuitable' in the Local Development Plan.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Parish councillors commented that there was no mention of the current 'chaotic' situation regarding school transport in the most recent report from James Finch.

SCC'S SCHOOL TRANSPORT POLICY

Gerry Battye counted only 14 children arriving by bus at Nayland Primary School and Chair Mary George said that cars bringing children to school were parking by the Fire Station, potentially obstructing access. Gerry Battye said that the 11-16 yr old community was 'split' by the new transport policy introduced by Suffolk County Council (SCC). There is a campaign to challenge the new school transport policy and parish councillors can join this if they wish.

RECRUITING PARISH COUNCILLORS

Councillors discussed the need for more parish councillors; a new recruit had resigned due to pressure of other commitments. The PC plans to update the Parish Council pages on the village website, providing guidance as to what being a Parish Councillor entails and potentially showing relevant maps.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh DC have given listed building consent at **5 High Street** [DC/19/01492] for replacement first floor windows, ground floor doors and new boundary wall, permission at **1 Harper's Hill** [DC/19/03113] for a two storey side extension and single storey front porch and at **1 Fen Street** [DC/19/03590] for tree work: reduction of Mulberry, reduction by 25% of Cherry and crown lift and pruning of Acacia. An application at **Longwood House**, **Stoke Road** [DC/19/02761] for change of use from agricultural building to dwelling (Class C3) and creation of one dwelling has been withdrawn.

Discussing recent planning applications councillors had no objection to the proposal at **Little Bulmer Farm, Wiston Road** [DC/19/04015] for a dwarf wall greenhouse on a cement base following removal of chicken shed and run.

The Parish council will object to applications at:

- White Hart, 11 High Street [DC/19/04081] for change of use from former public house to one dwelling on the basis that there is no evidence of the marketing the premises as a commercial prospect. It has been closed for business since 2008 but there is potential for another business there. Councillors discussed the heritage aspect.
- The Bungalow, Harper's Hill [DC/19/03822] an outline planning application (some matters reserved access to be considered) for erection of 6 dwellings, with associate garages, parking, private drive and access (following demolition of existing dwelling). The PC's objections include that granting outline consent provides no opportunity to consider the visual impact; there are two separate applications (for five and six houses respectively) on this site which would avoid the need to provide affordable housing under the Council's policy. Councillors also had serious concerns regarding access onto the A134 for vehicles and access to the village for pedestrians. There is no bus service and no footway.

NEW ROAD NAME: THE BUNGALOW, HARPER'S HILL

Discussing the road name for this new development of five houses, councillors heard the developer had suggested '1 – 5 Nayland Place'. Councillors felt this was unimaginative and would suggest 'Walsh Rise'. Violet Walsh carried out much good work in the parish and donated funds for charitable purposes in the village following her death from which Parishioners continue to benefit.

DRAFT RESPONSE TO JOINT LOCAL PLAN

Gerry Battye has thoroughly examined the plan which looks

ahead as far as 2036. While the Consultation was welcomed, Gerry Battye raised several issues such as how the Joint Local Plan would be implemented and how it could be judged. He suggested that greater emphasis is given to matters at parish rather than district level especially where a survey has been undertaken regarding housing needs, for example. There was no mention of primary schools and there should be greater detail on what infrastructure provision should be expected with planning applications. While the section on tourism and environment were 'good', the Local Development Plan required more detail on river flow and water quality and on the Climate Change Policy itself.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The Parish Clerk has requested an update on the Boot Camp trial. Councillors noted that no complaints had been received.

The lock had been broken and the gate post knocked down to the basketball area.

Councillors were very concerned about the state of the river; there is barely a trickle in places.

HIGHWAYS

There have been near misses of buildings by lorries in Bear Street; a bollard had been knocked down.

Three or four cars are parking on the pavement at the bottom of Heycroft Way during building works. They are obscuring drivers' view round a bend. The Chair advised reporting this online.

ALLOTMENTS

All allotments are allocated with two waiting to be 'handed over'. Councillors were concerned that though the farmer renting the land had advised he would graze sheep there, the hay in the field isn't being used.

VILLAGE HALL

Tricia Fuller explained that there are ongoing issues with the replacement roof project including whether the lease affects claiming back VAT on works. The Community Council has contributed 50% of the cost of a replacement cooker. The VHMC hope to hold a fund raising event on Sunday 26th January.

IN BRIEF

SCC has still not fitted outstanding street lights.

The PC was concerned about the overgrown hedging alongside the steps leading down to the river from the Anchor Bridge.

Tree work is being carried out in Star Alley, off Bear Street; councillors discussed its surface.

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COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 4th September 2019 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

MATTERS ARISING:

Executive Committee: Rachel Hitchcock reminded the meeting of the urgent need for more members on the Exec. We meet just six times a year. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee and an ideal way for those new to the village to become involved and meet new friends. Contact Rachel on 263169 or rachel hitchcock@hotmail.com if you would like to know more.

Members expressed their best wishes to Colin Ramsell, who is currently poorly in hospital, for a speedy recovery and for his forthcoming birthday. Rachel also expressed our grateful thanks to Colin, for his good humour and support as a stalwart member of the Exec for many years. He stepped into the breach as acting Chairman, a valuable role at the time, and supported the Community Times as distribution leader for a decade. Colin is moving to Capel St Mary but will still be involved with the Art Group and HortSoc.

Rachel advised that Luke Rumbelow has moved house to Stratford St Mary but wishes to remain involved with the CC. Rachel confirmed this is not contrary to our Constitution and unlikely to be an issue with the Charity Commission.

Fundraising Activities & Events: Ideas for fund raising projects to benefit the CC are always welcome

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station.

Rachel Hitchcock felt there should be another training session at some point. The community defibrillators are designed to be used with no training but as well as teaching basic first aid and resuscitation techniques the awareness sessions serve to increase community confidence in using the defibrillator should the need arise .

Nayland 10k Fun Run: The meeting was pleased to hear that the 2020 Nayland 10k will be able to go ahead as car parking provision will be available on Nayland Meadow for one more year, by kind permission of the Nayland Land Company.

Village Hall Store: Claire Buller said the second session to tidy the CC store at the village hall was really successful. With the help of the footballers it is a great improvement. Thank you to all who helped. The Village Hall Committee are going to put some storage shelving up. Please would those using the store replace things tidily.

Village Hall Garden: The next gardening morning is on 12th October from 9am. Please come along to help if you can to tidy the CC garden, or your own society gardens.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Maggie Ryan gave her report. Breakdown of profits: Quiz £210, Community Times £1,057.50, Village Calendar (£292), Nayland 10k £1,414.40, Bonfire (£1,035.22)

Grants paid: Lizzie's Fund Endurance Walk £170, Nayland & Wiston website £94.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £23,243.64, represented by Deposit a/c monies £10,667.91, Current a/c monies £12,502.95, Cash in hand £72.78. We hold £368.50 for the Services Fund and £10,000 VH roof grant is pending. This evening's grant to the Village Hall is £779.99. **Therefore, unencumbered assets are £12,095.15**.

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Village Hall Cooker: A grant application had been received by the VHMC. They need to replace a cooker at a cost of £1,559.98. The grant requested was for £779.99. Members considered our own finances and felt they would able to support this grant, but hoped for favourable weather for Bonfire Night to boost our funds. The grant was agreed.

Concerns were expressed that grant policy must be adhered to and grant applications should be submitted at least two weeks prior to our meetings.

The meeting was reminded that the CC can consider grants to other village organisations that are run for the benefit of our community.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks said this issue celebrates 30 years of the Community Times, which was founded by Keith Worricker in 1989. To celebrate this landmark this issue will have a colour centre insert with photographs celebrating village events and activities that have taken place during 2019. The cost of £129 was agreed.

The Nayland & Wiston website is 2 years old and remains well used. Justin Dowding said this year had seen 5,000 new unique viewers and 40,000 page views. Surprisingly perhaps the demographic of viewers is people age 65 and over!! There is a spike of viewers (around 200) on the afternoon of Bonfire Night Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks was pleased to say that Sally Dalton is home from hospital and recuperating; the meeting wished her a speedy recovery

The 2020 calendar is available to buy in the Post Office and at Forget Me Not. Forty calendars have been sold. They will be available at various village events. Iris Sebba and Wendy Sparrow will be distributing and selling calendars but we need to widen the net so would be grateful for help with selling at other venues/events. Claire Buller said she would make enquiries about selling them at Boxted Vineyard.

FORTHCOMING ACTIVITIES

Bonfire Night on Tuesday 5th November, 6.30 for 7pm display. The fireworks have been ordered, Julie and Kristian Clark will be attending pyrotechnic training. Anyone handling fireworks must have been trained to comply with our insurance. Iain will liaise with the firework team.

Solutions to reduce queues at sales points were successful last year and will be repeated.

The Anchor Inn have kindly agreed that their overflow car park can be used, the village hall car park will be used only for disabled parking. This will be promoted on posters, signage will be needed and marshalls will be situated at the High Street/Church Lane junction.

As well as volunteers on the gate and sales points from 6pm, help is needed for setting out tables etc from 3pm and litterpick the following morning. If you can help or have encouraged others to help please contact Claire Buller 263344 for sales, Rachel Hitchcock 263169 or lain Wright 263646 for gate, setting up, etc. Christmas Fayre on Saturday 7th December: Rachel Hitchcock confirmed the School will provide entertainment, Father Christmas will be in attendance, and she has begun contacting potential stallholders. Some children's activities will be organised.

Nayland Village Quiz: will be on Friday 7th February 2020. SOCIETY REPORTS

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said the Annual Flower Show went well. They have some spaces for the coach outing to Audley End House and Gardens on 8th September. On 15th October Pip Wright will be talking on *'Lucky is the Name'* the intriguing story and scandals of a Suffolk farming family between 1858-1969.

Women's Institute: They enjoyed their annual afternoon Tea Party during August in the President's garden. A boat trip on the River Orwell is being planned for 12th September and on 16th Chris Hunt will enlighten them on 'War Memorials'. On 21st October the subject of a talk will be 'Knickers: the history of Underwear'.

Book Club: They are currently reading 'The Sun Rise' by Victoria Hislop. They meet tomorrow to discuss this book and choose their next book title.

First Responders: Tracy Le Grys said they have had a lower number of calls recently. The number of responders has dropped to two but will be increasing again to three and there has been more interest in joining the team.

Community Council report continued.....

HSA: Jo Metson said the Summer Concert revealing the children's dancing, singing and musical talents had been lovely. The Summer Ball was a great success. HSA were congratulated on their fundraising which had totalled £14,400 this year. Their AGM will be held on 23rd September to welcome new members and plan forthcoming activities.

Village Players: Justin Dowding said they have received ten nominations for the North Essex Theatre Guild awards on 13th September. Rehearsals have begun for their next production, *'Lion in Winter'* by James Goldman. Betrayal, treachery and family feuding: it's just another normal Christmas celebration for the royal Plantagenet family of King Henry II. It promises to be a hilarious family drama. Jim Bond will be directing with performances on 5th-7th December.

Royal British Legion: John Partridge said their meeting on 9th September would include a talk about a father's experiences of flying spitfires in the last War. They are looking at planning an event for 6th May to mark VE Day. The CC Exec would be pleased to assist but felt they lacked sufficient members to take the lead. It was noted that the Calendar Photo Competition is scheduled for that date and it is the traditional date for the Conservation Society's May Day Walk.

Conservation Society: John Partridge said the Bear Street telephone kiosk has been repainted and the magazines and books inside, which are available to take/deposit, have been tidied. With the help of an ornithologist, they have been identifying potential sites to locate Swift nest boxes in the village. The CS would purchase and install the boxes and are investigating whether planning permissions may be required. John revealed that fledging Swifts need to make a sweeping drop when leaving the nest and may not land again until they reach breeding age, at around 3 years old. Only breeding swifts need to land to build nests and lay eggs - they eat, drink, sleep, bath and even mate on the wing. The subject of the talk at their meeting on 7th October will be Suffolk Medieval Cloth Industry and at the joint meeting with HortSoc on 11th November will be about Barn Owls.

Nayland Cinema: Karen Freeman said there is no trend to attendance for the film screenings which were on the whole going well. She hoped people would complete and return the questionnaire in the next Community Times; it is important to receive feedback and ideas on what residents want. The next films are: 13th September 'Fisherman's Friends', 11th October 'Rocketman', 25th October 'Red Joan', 8th November 'Yesterday'. On 26th January they are organising a fundraiser and screening of 'The Affair' which was filmed partly in Nayland during the 90s and starred some of those at this meeting!

St James' Church: Chris Hunt gave a reminder of events: 8th September a Pet Service, 15th a concert by the Boxted Silver Band, 20th September Harvest Supper, 11th October '*Music for the Organ*', 27th October '*Pictures in Music*'. There has been some evidence of pilfering and damage in the church so the toilets will be locked.

Parish Council: They still need people to join them as co-opted members; without a full council it is difficult to manage council business efficiently. They recommend residents look at the Local Plan Consultation on Babergh's website to see the proposed changes to guidelines. There is planning application for a development of another 6 houses at The Bungalow, Harpers Hill. The PC has made regular complaints to SCC Highways about the lack of verge cutting, weed-killing and road/gutter sweeping. Insufficient volunteers came forward to form a lorry watch team but residents can report directly to SCC Highways online; the vehicle registration, haulier's name and address are required.

AOB:

Water Level in the River Stour: Members expressed their dismay that parts of the river have had low water levels this summer and on 13th August the horseshoe weir ran completely dry. The Environment Agency (EA) rescued and relocated about 4,000 fish and placed a siphon over the weir which has achieved little. The EA say this has happened due to lack of rainfall over a couple of years but some members raised concerns that Met

Office records do not confirm significant lack of rainfall and felt that abstraction for the newly enlarged Abberton Reservoir had an impact. It was pointed out that the last, and only other time in recent history, the horseshoe weir ran dry was in February 2015, which was the time the newly enlarged Abberton Reservoir reached full capacity. The EA have confirmed that abstraction took place right through to summer this year. Reservoirs are usually topped up during the winter months and during the summer levels are expected to go down until topping up again in winter. It was pointed out that Abberton has a Visitor Centre which is more attractive when water levels are kept high.

Abberton Reservoir is a pumped storage reservoir, owned and operated by Northumbrian Water Limited (NWL). Essex and Suffolk Water, which is part of NWL, is a water supply company. Abberton Reservoir was expanded between 2011-15, new pipelines were laid, including one from the Stour at Wormingford to Abberton. This project included expansion of the Ely-Ouse to Essex transfer scheme (EOETS) to enable increased transfer of water from Norfolk to Abberton Reservoir. The EOETS prevents spare water from entering the Wash by taking it to the Essex reservoirs via rivers and pipelines. By varying the EA's abstraction licenses the additional water needed to fill the enlarged Abberton Reservoir was provided.

The general neglect of the river was also discussed as in parts it has become overgrown and barely navigable, not accessible for local anglers, difficult to see and enjoy for walkers. The River is considered an amenity for the benefit of our community; therefore the Community Council would support actions to protect it.

School Bus Transport: Rachel Hitchcock and Justin Dowding updated members on the concerning changes by Suffolk County Council to school transport; these are ongoing and will affect future generations of children. Appeals are underway for many of those affected but there is still great concern for many families with children who have just started secondary school and who are still unsure of travel arrangements. There is also concern that more parents will need to drive children to Nayland Primary resulting in more congestion on Bear Street during school drop off/collection times. The new school transport policy is no longer based on school catchments, instead eligibility for bus passes is based on walking routes to the nearest school (this may involve across fields, footpaths and tracks). For secondary school age children communities are being split. For example, children from one half of Nayland continue to be eligible for free transport to Thomas Gainsborough School (TGS) (for which Nayland Primary is a feeder school), the other half would be required to travel to Hadleigh (for which there is no bus service) or parents must pay the cost (£800 per child) for a 'spare seat' (if one is available) in order their children can attend TGS with their friends/ siblings. Following the article in the last edition of the Community Times the Nayland with Wissington Land Company received a wide range of responses to the tree planting proposal from the residents in Bear Street who back on to the river. Responses both for and against the proposals were received, but of those residents that replied the majority were in favour of tree planting.

Some residents were uncertain about the precise locations of the proposed trees. In order to clarify this the Environment Agency are willing to erect stakes on the river bank to demonstrate the possible location of the trees which will face the Bear Street rear gardens. Thereafter the local residents and the wider village will be consulted on this and the related proposal for a small number of trees to be planted within the meadow. The Company is concerned with improving the state of our river and the creation of some shade is deemed to be beneficial.

This is in addition to the general benefit to the local ecology and landscape arising from tree planting.

Positive discussions are continuing with the Anchor concerning the possible creation of a permissive footpath running along the south side of the double hedgerow separating the main Conservation Field from the small field and Anchor Car Park. It is hoped that agreement might be reached in the near future which will permit the creation of the path by the spring of next year.

Once these matters are resolved the Company hopes to arrange a consultation day in the Church Hall around October so that residents will have a chance to view all current proposals and give their opinion.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES



14th August 2019 was a sad day in Nayland; it was the day the horseshoe weir ran dry. Walkers and villagers were dismayed, canoeists were left carrying their vessels, fish were stranded in isolated pools or lay dead and other wildlife left confused.

The Environment Agency were alerted and arrived to rescue the fish and on 15th set up a pump to siphon water to generate a little flow. The effect was short lived and the weir remained dry as the Community Times went to print on 20th September.

The only other time the weir has run dry, in February 2015, it was resolved almost immediately.

The incident featured on BBC Look East on 16th August. Their environment reporter Richard Daniel said: "The stretch of the River Stour at Nayland has become unnavigable, canoeists get out and walk. At the moment there's nothing fast or particularly watery about it; dry yes, stony, stagnant too."

Normally water would thunder over the weir; now pipes are being used to siphon a trickle.

Local resident, Ray Spencer was interviewed and said: "I've never seen it like this before and that's in 40 years. They are waters that the children in the village normally play in, they're down there in the summer holidays; it's running very fast normally, it's fairly shallow but it's safe. At the moment, there's nothing there, nothing."

Ben Norrington from the Environment Agency said: "Over



The flood channel and a section of the river beyond the Anchor had lost flow in July. On 18th July the EA issued an Emergency Navigation Notice giving the reason as a blockage under Bures Mill gate due to debris. They were hopeful that a combination of boreholes being switched on upstream and additional water being pimped into the river will increase flows and push out the blockage.


Historically the watercourse through Nayland was vital to the village. It provided transport and the benefits that brought, work (at the mills), energy (at the electric company), hunting, fishing,

the last few days we've had to rescue fish from these pools where the fish have all congregated and were at maximum risk of exposure and the oxygen crashing."


Using an electric current the rescue saved around 4,000 fish, Dace, Roach and Chubb. They were released downstream where there is more water.

Will Akast from the EA said: "The water supply seen here supplies around a million people with their domestic supply, farmers need water to produce the high quality crops we all want to see, it is a system under pressure. That's true all across East Anglia."

Normally at time of high flow the EA can increase the river level by pumping in water from the River Ouse in the Fens but the Ouse has been too low to even do this.







CLIMATOLOGICAL SUMMARY

The Community Times is very pleased to be able to include local weather records again. Records were previously kindly contributed by the late John Werner and his wife, Pinkle of Bear Street.

David Lowe, who has a weather station in Stoke Road, has very kindly offered to share his records with us.

David reports: Rainfall figures for 2019 reveal that rainfall in Jan, Feb and April was below average but March and June were well above average.

July temperatures - showing my highest temperature since my record keeping started on 25th July of 35.8 °C! The reasons this is

short of the new Cambridge national record on that date are probably that this is a nonurban location and closer to the coast. Wind direction was SE, coming across the southern North Sea, which it often is at the peak of a heat wave. The temperature of that is normally about 16 °C in summer, so has a cooling effect, though this was not major!

The yearly rainfall figures for the past decade do not show a great deal of variation with the exception of 2012 and 2014 which were considerably wetter years.

Rainfall does not appear to have been exceptionally low, as some commentators have suggested.

sport and leisure. Until fairly recently the river was popular with anglers but many now say it is so overgrown and neglected it's neigh on impossible to fish. Parts of the river have been used by children to paddle and play and learn about wildlife; that's pretty much a thing of the past too.

At the Parish Assembly 2017, Will Akast of the Environment Agency responded to questions from the floor and confirmed

that the Environment Agency's efforts concentrated on maintaining navigation and flood prevention. The funding and manpower available did not stretch to keeping banks tidy; this was the responsibility of landowners. Answering concerns about excessive reeds and fallen trees he said this did not pose a flood risk. The EA have also cited conservation to encourage biodiversity as reasons to leave reeds, bankside growth and fallen trees. A number of residents have said they feel this is neglect dressed up as conservation.

Local people say they would like to be able see a more of the water and river wildlife as they use the footpaths and some would like to go out as a family in a rowing boat which is not currently possible. Only kayaks and canoes can get through, even then sometimes with effort. This prevents a cross section of ages enjoying the waterway together.

Historically the river was all things to all men. Nowadays we can send men to the moon so why can't waterways be managed as well as they were 100 years ago?

It is hoped the EA may eventually react to the pressure of requests by residents and take some action towards better maintenance of the river. BACKGROUND

For much of its 45 mile length, the River Stour marks the county boundary between Essex and Suffolk; it has 7 major tributaries including the rivers Stour Brook (Haverhill), Glem (Glemsford), Chad Brook (Long Melford), Box (Thorington Street), Brett (Higham). Water from Norfolk is pumped into the Stour at Wixoe (near Haverhill) and water is abstracted at Wormingford and goes by pipeline to Abberton Reservoir.

Abberton Reservoir was constructed between 1936 and 1939. It is a pumped storage reservoir, owned and operated by Northumbrian Water Limited (NWL). Essex and Suffolk Water, which is part of NWL, is a water supply company serving a population of 1.8 million to an area of 1,105 square miles southeast Norfolk, east Suffolk, Essex and London boroughs. To meet the demand for water a £150 million project to extend Abberton Reservoir in Essex has seen its capacity expanded by 58% from 26 billion litres to 41 billion litres.


The programme of work included an expansion of the Ely-Ouse to Essex transfer scheme. The Ely Ouse to Essex Transfer Scheme (EOETS), created following the 1968 Ely Ouse Essex Water Act and operational from 1972, prevented spare water from entering the Wash by taking it to the Essex

reservoirs. Enhancement of the existing water transfer system enabled increased transfer of water from Denver in Norfolk to Abberton Reservoir. By varying the Environment Agency's (EA) abstraction licences the additional water needed to fill the enlarged Abberton Reservoir was provided.

This upgrade involved the construction of two new underground pipelines – Kirtling Green to Wixoe and Wormingford to Abberton. Work commenced in January 2011 to build a new pumping station on the River Stour near Wormingford and a pipeline to Abberton. The reservoir reached its new top water level in March 2015.... coincidentally the first time Nayland's horseshoe weir ran dry was February 2015!

The Stour Augmentation Groundwater Scheme (SAGS) is another factor of water levels according to the EA. The SAGS consists of boreholes, sunk into the chalk in the Stour Catchment and used to support the river at times of low flows. EA say that they are tightly constrained by their abstraction licence and can now only use these to provide water for the reservoirs. These are located at Cavendish, Long Melford, Baythorne End and Langham.

Many Nayland residents have been asking: "Don't we just need them to abstract a little less water?"

short topical talk before the meeting. You are all invited.



Planning issues have occupied the Society over the past few months. An application for the construction of a further 6 houses on the site known as The Bungalow, Harpers Hill has been lodged. Permission has already been granted to the same applicant for the construction of five houses immediately to the south of the new application site. By splitting the application in this way, it may be possible to avoid the obligation to provide much needed affordable housing (this normally applies to sites comprising ten or more units). Furthermore, the site is outside the village envelope for both the existing and the draft local plan. Accordingly, an objection has been lodged by the Society.

An application has also been made to change the use of the White Hart to residential accommodation. Although the Society has not objected to the application it has expressed the view that such applications are normally only granted where there has been an attempt to sell the property for its existing use as a public house and restaurant. The village would be most fortunate if it could be returned to its former glory.

The Society's project to introduce swift nesting boxes to the village is continuing and at the moment around 15 residents have agreed to host the boxes in addition to the possible location of nest boxes at the school and St James'. As many of the host properties are listed buildings, Babergh District Council have agreed in principle to consider granting a general consent for the installation of the boxes, provided their style, nature and location are acceptable.

The Society noted with regret the recent passing of Richard Wiles, who had played such a significant role in the planting of woodland at the western end of the Conservation Meadow and in the area known as Horkesley Lock. Richard's efforts are commemorated by the plaque at the entrance to Richard's wood (see photo).

Readers may remember that in 2012 the Society rescued and re-instated in Bear Street the phone box which had been peremptorily removed by BT. The years had begun to take their toll so the Society arranged for local resident Gary Napper to redecorate the box which is now looking as good as new.

The Court Knoll Project continues, and in August a further geophysical survey of part of the area was undertaken by Dr

Tim Dennis and some residents. In the meantime, the experts are continuing to analyse the finds recovered from the excavations in 2016 and it is hoped that lead archaeologist Jo Caruth will have some more news for us when she addresses the village at our open meeting at the Village Hall on the 9th of December. We are pleased to report that the Court Knoll Masonic Lodge of Boxford have most kindly donated £250 towards the ongoing cost of the Project.

On the 13th of September a number of members attended a tour of Hoses Hall and the surrounding gardens (see photo). The property had previously been owned by Lord Sainsbury, Lord Plummer and Lord Beaverbrook. The tour was rounded off with a delightful lunch.

For those readers who are Facebook fans please be aware that the Society has created a Facebook page which enables us to keep members and quests aware of developments at short notice.

The Society has been active in voicing its disquiet over the disgraceful state of the River Stour from the weir and the course downstream therefrom. The Society has been in touch with the Environment Agency to express its concerns and it is to be hoped that this sad state of affairs can be avoided in the future.

There are two open meetings approaching; the first will take place on the 7th of October and features Nick Amor who will be talking to us on the topic of *Suffolk's Medieval Cloth Industry*, with special reference to the part which Nayland played. The joint meeting with the Horticultural Society which takes place on the 11th of November, will be on the topic of *Barn Owls*. The speaker Steve Piotrowski is a published author (The Birds of Suffolk) and a very well-respected lecturer in the birdwatching community.





There was no meeting in August.

MATTERS ARISING & HOUSEKEEPING BOOK

- The Comments Book was checked. The front door lock is very stiff. This will be looked into
- The Calendar (monthly tasks) was not available at the meeting.
 It will be checked and any actions emailed to the committee.
- The monthly fire check was carried out. No problems were found.

HALL MATTERS AND MAINTENANCE

- Marks Tey Radio had supplied a more secure cabinet for the cinema equipment.
- A grant application form has been submitted to the Community Council for assistance with funding the cost of a replacement cooker.
- The sample of paint sent to Dulux by was initially lost by them but when found and analysed the report did not correlate with the conditions from where the sample had been taken (i.e. filler present) A sample will be resent. Iain Wright will contact Kent Blaxill for expert opinion on the flaking paint.
- The bar shutter and the problems with the accelerator bar which have caused the bar to come down involuntarily was discussed. The conclusion was to have the shutter serviced and review the outcome of this service.

ROOF REPLACEMENT & FUNDRAISING

- A letter was distributed from Finbow Bishop containing a report on the condition of the VH roof following a recent inspection.

Therefore Tricia Fuller contacted SALC and ascertained that VAT is refundable on the VH roof replacement project as long as the PC are leading the project.
- lain Wright asked whether the VAT would be refundable on other VH expenses as the VH is a charity. Tricia Fuller will review the paperwork received following initial contact with SALC and if unsure will contact SALC directly and report back at next meeting.
- At a meeting with Babergh Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) team in early August they requested that we give them more details on the scheme. Babergh requires further justification for the costs especially for the slate roof. Chris Exley will be approached to document the argument for using Welsh slate.
- Babergh CIL will not agree to funding for professional fees or contingencies.
- Babergh CIL have put both grant requests on hold and have given us until 31 October 2019 to supply this further information.
 Iain Wright take the lead in obtaining the further information necessary to satisfy Babergh.
- Their answer will not be received until February 2020.
- The VH roof replacement does not qualify for lottery funding this had previously been investigated.
- lain Wright will discuss additional fundraising events on the playing field with the Community Council.
- Additional fundraising ideas, something different, are needed.
- Race nights at the VH are very successful and lain Wright will contact Robert and Roy Chapman to discuss this idea.
- Some villagers who had previously pledged funds for the Post Office are willing to divert these funds to the VH roof replacement fund.

CINEMA

- A questionnaire will be included in next issue of Community Times for feedback on the cinema following a year since the relaunch. The frequency of films will be considered but we will wait for response from the questionnaire.

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

When we last met in August we wondered if the Calceolaria Integrifolia would still be in flower now. The answer is just about but the last remaining blooms will soon be gone. Nevertheless is has had a good season, and is well worth its keep.

What about sowing some hardy annuals now. Unless we get a severe winter (and they seem to be things of the past) they will get away next spring and produce an earlier crop. Among the various choices are Larkspur and Marigolds. If they don't survive you can start again as normal next year.

Now incidentally, is a good time to collect seed from favourite perennials, not all live forever, and young replacements may well come in handy or if not can go into the Church Fete Plant Stall.

In the middle of the garden here there was, until last week, a huge bush of Eleagnus Ebbingei. This is a useful quick growing evergreen shrub but here it had got well above itself, despite being timed two or three times a year, and had developed into a monster bush about 15 feet across and almost as high. Breaking his own rules, for it would soon be coming into flower (small ones but scented) the OM/S attacked with loppers and a saw and reduced it by almost half, and the result looks awful with bare branches all around. It will, of course, recover but probably not until next spring. The harvest from this operation was an enormous pile of foliage which being slightly aromatic is wonderful bonfire material. When the wind is a south-easterly, which is the prevailing quarter one can have a bonfire secure in the knowledge that the nearest habitation is about two miles away; and it is one of the OM/S favourite occupations. The Eleagnus material is now a heap of ash.

Worthy of mention is another Eleagnus, E. Angustifolia which looks very different, with narrow silvery leaves, as the name implies, and flowers that are not easy to spot among the foliage; it also has a very strong scent that will extend to quite a distance.

Among the few plants that are still in flower here is the small blue Convolvulus Sabatius. Unlike most members of this family it does not climb but forms a small clump. They were going strong here, until discovered and attacked by a passing rabbit.

Any moment now the Michaelmas Daisies, members of the Aster family will be in flower. Here they haven't enjoyed the dry summer, and are about half of their normal height and spread but will soon be providing nectar for any remaining members of the Vanessa family of butterflies, Red Admirals, Peacocks and Small Tortoiseshells and this year a lot of Painted Ladies which have migrated from North Africa in large numbers. To attract this family the best way is to plant several Buddleias. Our largest one died in early summer, and the more posh varieties such as Black Knight don't seem to be as attractive as the bog standard ones.

The OM/S has heard that butterflies seem to prefer the white buddleias, which gardeners probably find less attractive.

Next time we meet it will be the end of another year and the OM/S will have started on his twentieth.

STOUR HOUSE, NAYLAND

During the period of the woollen cloth industry in Suffolk Nayland was a prosperous town and by the 16th century it was third in importance in the Hundred of Babergh. Many of Nayland's houses were built in this period including Stour House in Court Street which has recently been sold. This historic house has a deceptive 19th century brick facade but part of it was a 16th century hall house which has been much altered and extended over the centuries.

Writing in the Nayland Record in 1978 Blair Lees, whose family lived at Stour House from 1949 until 1982, said it was believed that the oldest part was a cloth maker's establishment. Sometime later an interceded floor was put in

to divide the present drawing room from the bedroom above. In this bedroom there are mural paintings which experts believe were executed by a Jacobean apprentice under the supervision of an Elizabethan master craftsman. There were also two weavers' lights, tiny little windows beneath which the looms were fixed. The fittings were discernible under the plasterwork and paint. A door at one end of the room disclosed the cubicles where the apprentices slept 'on the job'. The remains of mullioned windows in several places in the house were still visible in 1978.

Who first lived in Stour House is not known but early documents and deeds indicate that in 1746 the owner of the house was Solomon Peartree, a Master Carpenter. He was followed by Samuel Leah, a surgeon. In 1802 Thomas Marshall, a tailor, bought the house for £218, moving across the road to Stour House from where he had been living at Knollgate. He later moved to 17 Court Street where he died in 1842. However, a daughter and her husband, John Scott a local blacksmith, continued living at Stour House. Thomas Marshall owned five properties in Court Street which after his death were auctioned at the White Hart, Nayland, in 1842. An advertisement for the auction in the Ipswich Journal in 1842 described Stour House as a "substantially brick built and sash fronted messuage and shop late in the occupation of Mrs Malyn, with garden and orchard and cottage adjoining" (now Bridge House). The properties were described as all being in Court Street, "the preferable part of the town".

Next to live in Stour House was Thomas Ladkin, yeoman of Nayland, who bought the property for £330. In 1856 the house was sold to Peter Ryan, a silk mercer of Nayland, who paid £400 for the property, except the adjoining cottage. In 1870 Peter Ryan, then described as a Draper, sold the property to Thomas Stammers Blyth, gentleman, of Nayland, for £430.

In the 1881 census Stour House was described as being occupied by Thomas S Blyth, 51, retired grocer. He died in 1900 and after his widow Isabella died in 1908 there was a sale at the White Hart a year later when the property with adjoining cottage was sold to Carl Cetti Bendixon, leather manufacturer of Nayland, for £335. The Bendixon family lived at Mill House, having acquired Nayland mill in 1897 when corn milling had ended. Mr Bendixon died in 1915 and the following year Stour House was conveyed by Mary Bendixon, of Brockley to Julius Carl Bendixon, a leather factor, of the same address who in 1919 sold the property to Alfred Robert Sidney-Wilmot of Highgate, gentleman. A relative, Harold Sidney-Wilmot, was a local haulage contractor with depots in Nayland until the 1950s. The house was sold again in 1926 and, at an auction in the Red Lion, Colchester in 1949, Mr Henry Berry Lees of London, a civil engineer, bought the property. He lived there with his wife,

daughter and son, Blair Lees, who later became Nayland's Parish Recorder and was the first Chairman of the Conservation Society when it was formed in 1974. The property was sold to Dedham Vale Properties in 1982 but after an unsuccessful planning application it was sold a year later in 1983 to Professor and Mrs Grootenhuis.

As everyone knows Stour House today has a lovely garden and has been open on Open Gardens day for many years but until 1919, when Alfred Sidney-Wilmot purchased the house, it had a much smaller garden. Behind Stour House the 1839 Tithe Map shows the triangle of land between the main river above Anchor Bridge and on the south side of the millstream, the properties in Court Street forming the third side of the triangle. Some of this land was known as Lock Meadow, being close to Nayland Lock. Over the years parts of this land have changed hands many times. In 1839 some of Stour House's present orchard belonged to 17 Court Street and some to Benjamin Munnings. In 1919 conveyances describe pieces of land belonging to various people being purchased by Alfred Sidney-Wilmot including: "a piece of garden ground belonging to an inn called the Rose" (the present Post Office), "a piece of pasture ground in the occupation of William Sargeant Roberts" (the Guildhall), "a timber yard adjoining a messuage called Downings or the Shoulder of Mutton, belonging to William Littlebury with Chaise House, cowhouse, stable and other outbuildings" (Kerridges).

THE GHOST WITH LOVELY LEGS

Like many old houses Stour House has its own ghost. In the Nayland Record in 1978 Blair Lees wrote about the story of a ghost which had been passed on to his family by the former owner of the house. It seems this gentleman was alone in the house one day preparing his lunch when he heard light footsteps on the stairs and very clearly the swish of a woman's skirt. Much intrigued because he knew he was absolutely alone, he shot into the hall just in time to see a most lovely pair of legs flash round the post at the top of the staircase. The following chase and thorough search however proved to be quite fruitless. The story which had been handed down from owner to owner for many decades was that the ghost had once been a weaving wench who was brutally murdered in the loft upstairs. Needless to say, Blair was most disappointed that during the time he and his family lived in the house he never met the Stour House ghost.

Dear Friends,

Passion Plays and Pilgrimages

I am writing this on the 30th August, the day in the year when the Church of England remembers John Bunyan. Born at Elstow in Bedfordshire in 1628, John Bunyan was largely self-educated and used the Bible as his principal source of grammar. He read few other books, and those which he did would have all been piously Protestant in nature, and yet he produced *Pilgrim's Progress*, probably the most original text of spiritual genius that century produced, telling the story of the man, Christian, on his journey through life to God. Contrary to popular belief, it was not written than the produced and the produced during a confinement some years later. History tells us little of the man

while Bunyan was a prisoner in Bedford gaol, but instead during a confinement some years later. History tells us little of the man but what is clear from his writings is that the salvation of the soul was what mattered most to him.

Continuing the theme of Salvation, next year marks the return of the world renowned Oberammergau Passion Play. History tells of how, towards the end of the Thirty Years War in central Europe, there was an outbreak of the plague in Bavaria. The elders of the village of Oberammergau, in an effort to protect their village, decided to seal it off from outside contact. But an itinerant worker returned, bringing the plague with him, and it swept through the village. Whereupon the people solemnly vowed that, if God would show His compassion and lift the scourge, every ten years they would enact the Passion of our Lord. The plague eventually left the village in 1633 and, as a perpetual thanksgiving and re-affirmation of faith, the villagers of Oberammergau have performed the Passion Play at regular intervals ever since, keeping alive the 386 year old promise.

Traditions, stories, and promises are all important expressions of faith. As part of the Jewish Passover Seder, the very last words are "next year in Jerusalem" and are for faithful Jews a reminder of the suffering of the past and hope for wholeness and freedom for all in the future.

For Christians too, Jerusalem is a city central to the life and passion of Jesus, and since the earliest times, men and women made the arduous journey as Pilgrims to walk in the footsteps of the Saviour. Thankfully the journey there is now far more comfortable, and rather than months of walking or riding, can be achieved in about 5 hours on a plane. However the impact on ancient and modern pilgrims are, I suspect very much the same – the scriptures come alive, places once just words in stories become real, faith is reinvigorated, God's promises are remembered, and it is why I return every few years to walk with groups around THE Holy Land.

Why not join me "next year in Jerusalem"? It's open to everyone and like Christian in Bunyan's *Pilgrims Progress* the journey may just change your life (and life eternal!)

RICHARD WILES

Known for his dedication to woodlands in Nayland Richard Wiles of Parkers Way passed away on 3rd August.

Richard was born on 11th July 1925 in East Sheen, London. The son of Frank Wiles artist and portrait painter. He was educated at Colet Court and St Pauls. He served in the Royal Navy from 1943 to 1946 in the Home Fleet and the Far East.

After being de-mobbed he travelled to India where he worked for a short time. He moved from there to Nyasaland where he was employed as an Estate Manager with the Colonial Development Company for a few years.

He met his wife, Elizabeth Logan who was an SRN in Blantyre and they were married in 1950. Richard and Beth purchased a piece of virgin land near Cholo in the south of Nyasaland where they set up a dairy farm which they named "Gaymead"- providing inhabitants of the major towns of Blantyre and Limbe with milk, cream, butter, chickens, eggs,

fruit and vegetables. They lived on Gaymead for 10 years. They had 3 children, Marilyn who was born in 1951, Bridget in 1952 and Martin in 1955.

With the breakup of the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland in 1963, they moved to Rhodesia (later to be known as Zimbabwe) where it was anticipated that their children would receive a better education and a more stable environment in which to live.

They purchased a farm called "Stockade" in the Mazowe district, not far from Salisbury (Harare) where they predominantly bred pigs but grew other crops such as Burley tobacco, maize, sova beans, grapes, granadillas and garlic, and kept chickens and bees.

Beth died in 1994 and is buried on the farm. Richard continued to work the farm as a Nature Reserve, planting thousands of trees over a period of many years. He was forced to leave under duress in 2003, having the farm forcibly taken from him.

Richard returned to England (Nayland) in 2004 where, he initially lived with his sister, Jane Halliday before being offered accommodation at Parkers Way. This was to be his home for

Richard spent countless hours clearing woodlands near Nayland, propagating, planting and tending to hundreds of trees and could often be seen working alone in these woodlands happy to be contributing to the wellbeing of the earth in general and Nayland in particular. As well as tending the Conservation Society's copse adjacent to the Meadow, which due to his dedication was named 'Richard's Wood', he also planted many replacements for trees planted originally in the 1990s during the restoration of Horkesley Lock Pool.

For many years Richard was one of the Community Times distribution team.

During his time in Nayland, Richard wrote a book "Foredoomed is my Forest - The Diary of a Zimbabwe Farmer" which described his legal fight to stop the confiscation of his farm and protected nature reserve while under intense harassment and intimidation.


This was the second book that he authored. The first being a light-hearted,

humerous story called "One Man and His Dog" told around the close relationship he had with his dog, Poppy.

He died peacefully in his sleep at the age of 94 at Nayland House, Bear Street, Nayland on the evening of Saturday 3rd August 2019. His daughter, Marilyn pre-deceased him, her ashes being scattered in his carefully tended woodland. He is survived by his daughter, Bridget and son, Martin who both still reside in Africa.

An oak tree was

planted by Martin and Bridget near the Lock in Richard's memory. 'God be with you 'til we meet again', lovingly, Bridgie and Marty


Please bear in mind fireworks can be frightening to others and especially to animals.

SUFFOLK SCHOOL BUS CAMPAIGN

Since the last edition of the Community Times there has been a flurry of articles in the press, along with local radio and TV coverage, about Suffolk County Council's new school transport policy. (see suffolkschoolbus.org/news for details). Across rural Suffolk countless pupils started the new term - many of them in a new school - without a bus pass. Typically this was because they were either still waiting for the outcome of their application for transport (submitted in the spring), or because they had been refused transport and were still waiting for appeals to be heard, or because they were waiting for a spare seat to be allocated to

them (for which they are paying £750 per child per year) - or simply because the school transport service, which has been completely overloaded, had not been able to issue bus passes in time. Many parents are still in one or other of these situations. The two Nayland families affected have had to put in appeals, one of which has been turned down and the other is yet to be heard.

Parents are now applying for secondary school places for next year, which will simply add to the numbers unable to access transport to their traditional catchment school.

Unfortunately, despite plenty of evidence of the distress, stress and confusion caused by this new policy, it remains as yet unchanged. This is despite the fact that people across political divides are united in their incredulity about the policy - quite an achievement in current times!

The response so far has simply been a reiteration of the policy, not an answer to the points raised.

During August the Suffolk School Bus Campaign used social media to request three changes to the policy: ending split villages (like Nayland) where transport routes already exist to the catchment school, allowing siblings free transport to the same school, and ensuring that those parents

who have to purchase a 'spare seat' can have some certainty that the seat will be available whilst their child is at secondary school. The response so far has simply been a reiteration of the policy, not an answer to the points raised. As a result, the Campaign has now formally written to Councillor Matthew Hicks, Leader of Suffolk County Council, requesting an urgent meeting to discuss the policy and its impact on families in villages like Nayland. No date has been set for this yet, but we will provide a further update in the next Community Times.






