NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes on the meeting : 13th October 2021

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PUBLIC FORUM

A resident raised issues regarding HGV activity in Wiston.

A resident queried, following recent PC activity at Caley Green, if any works proposed would affect disabled access or outlook for those in wheelchairs. Mary George said no plans regarding access or barriers were likely to impair wheelchair users.

PC MEETINGS

Gerry Battye felt there has been some disconnection between the Council and residents generally in the last few years.

There will be two changes to the usual second Wednesday of the month; the next meeting will be on <u>Tuesday</u> 9th November and the February 2022 meeting would be on the third Wednesday; the 16th.

An open meeting to discuss Caley Green would be held in the village hall at 7.30p.m. on Tuesday 2nd November. The analysis of the public engagement and details of proposals would be posted on the PC's Dropbox webpage a week before the meeting. **PLANNING**

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted consent at: **Roziers Cawley Road** [*DC*/21/04125] for erection of garden store and pump house following removal of existing garden store and pump house; at **Stour House 23 Court Street** [*DC*/21/03726] for discharge of conditions for DC/21/02798 regarding agreement of materials; at **Townlands Harpers Hill** [*DC*/21/05261] for discharge of conditions for DC/21/03931 regarding louvres/ batons; at **16 Birch Street Nayland** [*DC*/21/04965] for works to trees to fell a sycamore tree to replace it with an apple tree; at **100 Bear Street** [*DC*/21/03624] for discharge of conditions for DC/20/04533 regarding landscaping, facing & roofing materials, fenestration, roof lights, eaves & verges, rainwater goods and gate, piers & brickwork) but the condition regarding fenestration was not discharged.

Between meetings councillors had no objections at **Bear House**, **Bear Street** [DC/21/04109] for erection of single storey rear extension by way of infilling of a lobby area and alterations to fenestration on the ground floor west facing or at **97 Bear Street** [DC/21/04980] for erection of a two storey rear extension and single storey side extension.

Councillors made no recommendation for an application at **Lower Courtwood, 13A Court Street** [*DC/21/05250*] for works to trees the reduction of 1 field maple tree to high pollard. An application at **41 Bear Street** [*DC/21/05132*] for change use of ground floor to holiday let has been withdrawn.

Discussing recent applications councilors had no objections at **5** Birch Street [DC/21/05276] for listed building consent to replace cement render with lime mortar, insulating plaster, rainwater goods and flashing and repointing mortar to chimney; repointing mortar to fireplace and other internal works. Councillors made no recommendation for an application at **14** Church Lane [DC/21/05479] for works to trees to fell 1 crab tree (T1) and reduction of 1 arbitus (T2) by up to 3m.

The PC had not received paperwork for a SCC application relating to **Harpers Hill Farm** [SCC/0099/19B] for variation of conditions relating to compliance with approved plans; hours of operation; and disposal of surface water. James Finch emphasised the need for the submission of actual evidence by residents and businesses in commenting on this application. **FAIRFIELD RECREATION GROUND AND PLAYPARK**

Quotes for works required are being sought. The annual safety inspection report is awaited.

CALEY GREEN

Arrangements are being made for an open meeting. This will need to be publicised; reports and information will be available in advance of the meeting. Numbers attending would need to be restricted and Zoom facilities investigated.

Patricia Wilkie said it would explain the options and how we have looked at them and the information would be available on the webpage before the meeting. Gerry Battye felt the meeting should be to listen to residents and to provide information. **STREET LIGHTING**

Works to streetlights ordered some time ago have still not been carried out; the funds for this remains in our bank account. James Finch will be asked to chase this issue.

FOOTPATHS

Laura Erith raised the poor condition of Dead Lane in Wiston which is part of St Edmunds Way; Laura will prepare a report. **VILLAGE HALL**

Unfortunately the Wifi has not yet been installed due to the need of a telegraph pole. Hirers are setting their own Covid attendance limits.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The Bonfire & Fireworks event will be held on 5th November. The PC will require information regarding the proposed Platinum Jubilee commemorative mugs for discussion by the finance committee.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes on the meeting : 9th November 2021

PUBLIC FORUM

A resident asked when the PC would begin actioning the reinstatement of the Fishing Rights by reed reduction and could that be linked to the current proposals for Caley Green; perhaps that would be seen as giving something back bearing in mind the considerable number of people who are still upset by the proposals for planting along the bay.

Mary George said Fishing Rights are a status, not a location; Fishing Rights have not been lost.

A resident asked what was proposed, within the PC's plans, for the riverbank between the bench and the existing reed bed. Patricia Wilkie said there were no proposals for that area at the moment. The resident also asked if consideration could be given to moving the revetment proposed by the bench slightly so river-craft did not disturb those sitting on the bench. She was asked to email the suggestion to the Council.

HIGHWAYS

Suffolk CC are conducting a Lorry Route Survey. The questionnaire asks for statistics but doesn't provide adequate review of the problems we have in Nayland. James Finch suggested the PC create a bullet point list of issues that don't fit on the form and send to him.

A drain in Birch Street has been repaired but flooding is still occurring. Work has been carried out to encourage water running down Gravel Hill into the ditch. James Finch said until the problem is resolved when the weather forecast suggests a potential problem the drains will be cleaned ahead of the rainfall.

STREET LIGHTING

Works to streetlights ordered some time ago has been carried

out: the incorrect direction of a light in Church Lane has been rectified; a light in Birch Street has been relocated to the correct place but has yet to be painted; a lantern from elsewhere has been reused in Mill Street. That completes all outstanding authorised work.

CALEY GREEN

Following the open meeting where proposal were presented to residents, the deadline for comments will be 23rd November.

Patricia Wilkie mentioned the possibility of including a modest jetty (portage); this may extend the revetment by a metre. Mary George said some residents did not want a jetty. They will look at other portage points in the village and ask residents for comments.

Regarding the minutes of the open meeting on 2nd November Mary George said she had received requests to amend two points; 1. James Carr's response regarding the width of the planted area was "the coir roll may be one roll wide <u>or could be</u> <u>more</u>". 2. an omission at the end of the meeting "I appreciate the PC don't consider it part of this project and for discussion tonight, but in view of the strong feelings expressed this evening about the loss of fishing rights along the Green due to excessive reed growth will the PC now look towards rectifying that." And the response heard was, yes.

BANNERS ON CALEY GREEN

The PC had received a request from the Anchor Inn to display advertising banners for their ice rink by Horkesley Road and on Caley Green. There is a policy in place regarding application and conditions for displaying banners; this is available on the PC Dropbox webpages. Councillors were keen to support local businesses but wished to be fair to village organisations.

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INDUCTION OF REVD STÉPHANE JAVELLE



The stage was set. St Mary's church, Stoke by Nayland on 18th November 2021. The Bishop, Archdeacon local and visiting clergy joined a 160 strong congregation to welcome and to celebrate the institution, Induction and Installation of The Revd Stéphane Jean Michel Javelle as Rector of the Benefice of Stoke by Nayland, Polstead, Leavenheath and Nayland with Wissington.

The ceremony, almost medieval in tone, was performed by The Rt Revd Dr Mike Harrison, Suffragan Bishop of Dunwich and The Ven Dr. David Jenkins, Archdeacon of Sudbury. Our choir from St James was joined by choristers from neighbouring churches, all resplendent in their blue and scarlet robes. Say what you like about the church of England, but they do know how to put on a colourful show!! The service started with that great hymn 'The Church's one foundation' wonderful, a tune everyone knows.

The service continued with the ritual of prayers and processions all very symbolic of church life. There were the presentations to Stéphane of a Bible, water, bread and wine and a set of church keys! It was a moving and significant ceremony as Stéphane pledged his oath of allegiance to her Majesty the Queen and the Bishop. Only then could he "...receive the Cure of Souls in this benefice" The choir sang Psalm 31 to a hushed congregation and this sounded beautiful - well done to all. A final recessional hymn - 'Glorious things of thee are spoken Zion city of our God', and then it was a case of digging into the buffet and having a chat with people you haven't seen for a while.

It was a good evening and an important event in our village life, and after all, if you want village life, you have to put life into the village and our churches are to the front of that. My thanks to Stoke and all who arranged the service.

We welcome Stéphane and wish him well during his Ministry in this place. He is a family man with two stepsons back in France. He is currently living at Acton but will move to Nayland in January. When not being a vicar he loves cooking, studying languages, sport and travel. He has already joined a gym!! Stéphane hopes to bring to our communities his love of people, the countryside, his experience of work with schools, his love for the study of the Scriptures, his gregarious French side - and the self control of his British side !. I couldn't help noticing some words from the Psalm "Have mercy on me, Lord, for I am in trouble".



COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 27th October 2021 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: Rachel Hitchcock said we have a good team on the Exec but as always we welcome new members to join our enjoyable friendly committee.

Fundraising Activities/Events: We have a good deal of activities being planned currently but as always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. Rachel Hitchcock will liaise with Tracy Le Grys about organising a further training session. It had been suggested that this could introduce other aspects of First Aid.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel said that she has received the proof from Shelley Signs and will check it with Dale Leeks before circulating for approval.

Nayland 10k Fun Run: <u>nayland10k.co.uk</u> Luke Rumbelow said the 2022 10K will be on the second Sunday in July and hopefully held at Littlegarth School again.

Online Ticketing Facility: *NaylandEvents.org* – Justin Dowding said tickets for several village events are currently being sold. If you are interested in selling tickets using this system get in touch with him. Rachel said the facility is excellent and thanked Justin for providing it.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: Attendance was good for the autumn garden tidy on **9th October.** Bryan Smith and Lesley Jameson were there on behalf of the CC.

Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee (during Thursday 2nd-Sunday 5th June)

The CC had previously agreed to hold a village celebration on Friday 3rd June in the form of a Street Party/Fayre.

We need to liaise with Parish Council regarding their contribution towards a commemorative mug/ gift, which has been given out to children of the village previously. Lorraine Brooks will contact Impact China (www.impactchina.co.uk), who supplied mugs for our 2012 celebration for details of 2022 mugs and also research elsewhere.

Most of the Exec have agreed to be on the Jubilee planning committee and Laura Erith has kindly agreed to be the PC rep; Rachel Hitchcock will organise a meeting to begin planning for the Jubilee celebrations.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Lesley Jameson gave her report on finances to 27th October.

Breakdown of profits: Community Times £1,182.50, Nayland 10K £1,000, Calendar 2021 late sales 283.70, Calendar 2022 £170.90. **Grants paid:** none to date.

Expenses since our last meeting: Christmas Fayre toys £134.92; £222 to Spingold for the October Community Times print; Zurich Insurance premiums £650.52; Dynamic Fireworks balance £1,875 and £177.08 for sparklers. Supplies for Bonfire Night have been bought costing £217.48.

The accounts show reserves of £26,133.55 represented by Deposit a/c monies £10,729.03, Current a/c monies £13,422.23, Cash in Hand £167.58, Stripe a/c £1779.41 and PayPal ££35.30. We hold £268.50 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, Lizzie's Fund Walk £201. Therefore, unencumbered assets are £15,664.05.

GRANTS & DONATIONS: There had been no grant applications or donations.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues and those who have already sent copy for the coming issue; it's lovely to see so many community activities resuming. The December issue is considerably more time consuming so please let her know asap if you have items to promote so adequate space can be reserved.

The Nayland & Wiston website continues to be useful and now includes the online ticketing facility.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said with 75 calendars sold

the 2022 calendar has now broken into profit (of over £170). They are available to purchase at the Post Office, Forget Me Knot, Melissa's Hair Salon, 17 Court Street. Also online using PayPal or there is a payment by cheque option. Wendy is also selling them at various events and they will be available again at the High Street stall on Saturday with Bonfire Night tickets.

If you can help with sales at events/venues you are involved with please contact Lorraine .

FORTHCOMING COMMUNITY COUNCIL ACTIVITIES:

Bonfire Night on 5th November: Rachel updated the meeting on progress. Claire Buller is organising the sales teams; Rachel the gate and marshalls, etc and Lesley Jameson will manage the floats. Dynamic Fireworks will be providing the display and Fred Bugg will light the bonfire once the display is over (in line with Dynanic's safety procedures). The lighting of the bonfire will be announced and a Guy made by the School will be paraded down to the bonfire.

It was noted advance sales to date totalled £2,100 with a week to go; it was felt there would be considerably more sales sold right up to the event. The online ticket facility can cater for this. **Christmas Fayre & Christmas Trail:** The event will be a little quieter than the usual Christmas Fayre with no external stallholders but equally enjoyable; village societies will participate; there would be more emphasis on it being a social occasion with refreshments and entertainment and Father Christmas will be in attendance. It is hoped the Primary School will provide some musical entertainment. If you can help on the day please let Rachel know. The Christmas Trail will also be officially launched and ideas for an additional children's challenge or activity on the day would be welcome.

Christmas Trail: Rachel and Lorraine will promote and circulate details and invitations to participate in Advent Windows, the Christmas Tree Trail and the Christmas Wreath Competition.

Village Christmas Tree: It was put up a week earlier last year which was popular so it will be put up on Sunday 5th December at 9am; anyone wishing to help will be welcome. It will be taken down on 9th January but the lights will be turned off prior to that.

Fun Village Quiz on 4th February 2022: It was agreed to increase the cost of attending to £15 per table of four. Tickets will be sold using the online ticket facility as well as from Forget Me Not and the using the slip in the Community Times.

CC AGM: It was agreed to hold this on Wednesday 2nd March on the same evening as the VHMC AGM. Rachel reminded the meeting that she would be stepping back from Chair but will continue on the Exec and asked everyone to help seek a new Chair by then.

SOCIETY REPORTS

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said said the autumn talk *'Funny Garden Features'* was well supported and members were pleased to be out. They will be participating at the Jingle Bells Coffee Morning. After their usual hibernation period they are looking forward to a speaker meeting and the Spring Show in March.

Nayland Choir: Rob Swan said they are well into rehearsals for its autumn/winter concert and we are delighted to be welcoming several new members this term and some previous members who have come back to enjoy making fantastic music. The good size of the choir and the quality of delivery means that a delightful sound will be produced at the concert. The centrepiece of the concert is the wonderful Vivaldi's Gloria and there will also be pieces by Albinoni, Bach and others. The concert will be on Sunday 21st November at 4pm in St James' Church, Nayland. We are choosing an earlier time as it may be easier for people to attend at this time on a November Sunday.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said the hall was alive and well with bookings returning to normal. The footballers no longer use the hall due to damage to the pitch by rabbits. Their annual main-PAGE 8

tenance programme continues. They are very grateful to the organisers and helpers of the Village Lunches which provided additional income for the hall.


St James' Church: Chris Hunt said they have continued to maintain regular services including a Family Service. St James' hosted a successful concert last month, another to be held in November and more will be held in future. Remembrance Sunday services are on 14th November. Please pick up after your dogs; there have been unpleasant incidents. The popular Wednesday Coffee Mornings will stop temporarily after 1st December until the February. Nayland has a new vicar; the licensing service of Reverend Stephane Jean Michel Javelle will take place on 18th November at 7.30pm at Stoke Church.

Royal British Legion: Chris Hunt said they are a thriving branch. Their Chairman, following the retirement of John Partridge is Robert Dossor; Andrew Gowen remains as Secretary. They will be resuming doorstep poppy sales, repeating the stall by the War Memorial and holding a Poppy Appeal Coffee Morning on 5th November.

Village Players: Justin Dowding said he is no longer on the committee but is aware they are putting on '*Absurd Person Singular*', which is a play, not a panto, on 2nd-4th December. **Nayland Land Co:** David Slater said they are offering the opportunity to learn about hedge laying with Neil Catchpole, with initial demonstration and training day on 13th November. There are four new information boards at areas around the meadow. They are appealing for financial donations towards maintenance and future initiatives and would be very grateful for volunteers to put their names forward to help with various maintenance tasks during the year. It was suggested that the CC may be able to assist with a grant; a formal application would be required.

Parish Council: Ned Cartwright said meetings have returned to the village hall with observers attending by Zoom using a 4G mobile router as there is a delay in installing Wifi in the hall; there have been a number of Highways issues including HGV access to Campions Hill/Cawley Road and flooding in Birch Street/Mill Street; several planning issues including a SCC application relating to Harpers Hill Farm. An open meeting will be held on 2nd November to discuss proposals at Caley Green; files relating to this are on the PC webpages at <u>naylandandwiston.net</u>

Ned was asked why in the analysis of responses received in



their public engagement on the issue that the column showing *'No Response'* had the words *"including in favour PC"* alongside it? He said he would check this query. It was pointed out the public engagement had been widely promoted; the analysis of responses revealed: those in favour of PC proposals were 7% of respondents, against planting 29%, wanting an alternative to planting 65%.

Nayland Primary School HSA: Jo Metson said their AGM took place on 23rd September via Zoom; a new Secretary and Treasurer were appointed and they are advertising for a new Chair. The current Chair is remaining until a new one is appointed. Covid has disrupted fundraising events, but they are hopeful that some events can now take place. On the last day of half term they organised a Halloween event where the children dressed up and had a playground party and a spooky trail around the woods. They are hoping to hold a Christmas event and are considering a Doughnut Sale and a School Pre-loved Uniform Sale.

Women's Institute: Wendy Sparrow reported that at the October meeting the speaker was a member of Suffolk Lowland Search and Rescue (SULSAR). He gave a very interesting talk about this voluntary organisation which specialises in helping the emergency services in finding missing children and vulnerable people. It is a registered charity and the volunteers are on call 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. At the November meeting the speaker will be talking about *Living on a Narrow Boat* and in December the Nayland Handbell Ringers will be entertaining members.

Book Club: Wendy Sparrow reported that the group recently met to discuss their latest book which was *'Where the Crawdads Sing'* by Delia Owens. They are now reading *'Wilding'* by Isabella Tree.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton reported that the Green is much quieter now but they continue to keep an eye on things including waterfowl; they do litter-picking and emptying the bins when necessary. They are now preparing for the PC's Open Meeting to discuss the riverbank on 2nd November

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter reported that the film of the *History of Nayland* will be shown before the speaker on 4th November; the talk by Simon Hooton will be on the subject of *Swifts*.


Wreath competition





Debbie Hattrell suggested as a compromise that the Anchor makes an application for one week with separate applications for each further week they require; this was agreed.


PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted consent at: **9 Heycroft Way** [*DC*/21/04740] for erection of 1.5 storey rear extension, internal alterations and front delux but suggested a condition requiring the en-suite window to have obscure glass; at **20** Harpers Estate [*DC*/21/04816] for erection of two storey side extension and single storey front extension; at **97** Bear Street [*DC*/21/04980] for erection of a two storey rear extension and single storey side extension; at 100 Bear Street [*DC*/21/05364] for discharge of conditions for Fenestration; at Lower Courtwood, **13a** Court Street [*DC*/21/05250] for works to trees to reduce 1 field maple to high pollard; at **14** Church Lane [*DC*/21/05479] for works to trees to fell of 1 crab (T1) and reduce 1 arbutus (T2) by up to 3m.

Between meetings councillors had no objections at **Hammonds Harpers Hill** [*DC/21/05718*] for variation of condition 2 (approved plans and documents) for DC/20/04079 change of use of land and erection of 1 dwelling and associated ancillary outbuilding, utilising existing vehicular access (following demolition of 2 outbuildings and existing dwelling); to allow design changes to dwelling.

Discussing recent applications councilors had no objections at **2 Larch Grove** [DC/21/05738] for erection of single storey rear extension and dormer extension to roof (following demolition of existing) or at **31 Fen Street** [DC/21/05870] for works to trees to shape and reduce crown of 1 self-seeded Walnut (T1) and fell 2 Ash (T2 and T3), 1 Conifer (T4) and remains of 1 Vibernum Opulus (T5), all in rear garden.

An application that arrived today will be discussed between meeting for **Rushbanks House Bures Road** [*DC*/21/06038] for erection of single storey and two storey side/rear extensions (following removal of existing conservatory); re-build chimneys;



replacement windows and extension to garden terraced area. HARPERS HILL FARM

The PC agreed to object to application [SCC/0099/19B/VOC] for variation of conditions

The site is in a prominent location in the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley AONB. This application does not enhance the quiet enjoyment of the countryside in the AONB by residents or visitors.

The site generates current noise levels that can be heard across the whole parish. The Noise Technical Report regarding measurement of noise does not include movement of skip lorries, stacking of skip containers. An extension to the working the hours during which unacceptable noise and dust already impacts on the daily lives of those living within at least half a mile of the site, particularly in Summer, should not be granted. This passes across the boundary between Nayland and the Parish of Stoke by Nayland and covers part of the Stour Valley Long Distance Footpath.

The information regarding surface water drainage is inadequate. The Parish Council notes that the Environment Agency has submitted a holding objection and raised questions. It is believed that muddy rainwater run-off from the site contributes to the constant flooding along this stretch of the A134.

The proposed increase to working hours will have an adverse impact on the neighbouring longstanding holiday business at Gladwins Farm on Harpers Hill.

The proposed increase to working hours will have an adverse impact on residents within the parish, not only in the Wiston area, but also in more densely populated residential areas of Nayland.

The history of monitoring and enforcement on this site indicates that this has been inadequate. It has not prevented breaches of conditions of previous or current planning conditions. Suffolk County Council has not been proactive in enforcing those conditions.

In any event, the current conditions were only agreed by Suffolk County Council a year ago. This Parish Council objects to these being varied after such a short time. PAGE 15 NAYLAND VILLAGE HALL CINEMA Friday 17th December




Film 'A History of Nayland'

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL CALEY GREEN UPDATE

At the recent Open Meeting NwW Parish Council gave a presentation on the erosion problems at Caley Green. This presentation included a number of options, together with a conclusion on each option's viability. One option presented is to build a modest jetty at the site, see below.

Option 5: To build a jetty at ditch side of new revetment area

Advantages: Will provide an easy launch area for watercraft, avoiding damage to Caley Green. Will encourage water users to use this point and lessen wear and tear on other stretches of the riverbank, particularly since numbers of water users has increased significantly. Fulfils criteria of encouraging water recreation.

Disadvantages: May attract increased number of people to the area. Extra funding would be required.

Conclusion: This may be a viable option although funding would need to be secured. Not clear how much demand there is for

this amongst residents.

We envisage such a jetty to be approximately 2m in length, and 1m in width, similar in appearance to the one positioned after the weir - see photo.

However, we are keen to represent the wishes of all residents regarding this as there are both advantages and disadvantages.

Comments made by residents during the survey and at the Open Meeting indicate that there are strong views for and against providing at jetty at Caley Green. We therefore invite residents to comment on this option via the email <u>caleygreenproject@gmail.com</u> or via the Post office. Please direct all comments to the Parish Council so we can collate accurately.

WATER LEVELS

Water levels seem to have returned to their seasonal norm and the flood channel doing its job when necessary of diverting high water levels away from the village and down the flood channel.

Swans

The Friends of Caley Green will have reported on the ongoing swan turf wars. For many years we had the same pair of swans in Nayland; this would change occasionally but it seems to have changed more frequently in recent years.

"Should swans be fed bread"?

This is a question that came up in conversation recently. Swans eat aquatic vegetation, small fish, frogs, worms, insects and graze on grassy banks. They can be fed grain, sweetcorn and vegetable matter, especially lettuce and potatoes but food should be thrown into the water for them so that they can swallow water with the food. Bread is no substitute for the natural diet that the birds themselves will seek out but feeding swans and other waterfowl is a great way to enjoy getting close to them, to introduce children to wild creatures, and for everyone to connect with nature.

The Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, the Wildfowl & Wetlands Trust and the Swan Sanctuary all take this view.

The Queen's Swan Marker has stated, "There has been a great deal of press coverage in recent months regarding the 'Ban the Bread' campaign which is confusing many members of the public. Supporters of the campaign claim that bread should not be fed to swans on the grounds that it is bad for them. This is not correct. Swans have been fed bread for many hundreds of years without causing any ill effects. While bread may not be the best dietary option for swans compared to their natural food such as river weed, it has become a very important source of energy for them, supplementing their natural diet. Malnutrition will increases their vulnerability to fatal diseases like avian-flu which has caused the deaths of many mute swans and other waterfowl. There is no good reason not to feed bread to swans, provided it is not mouldy. Swans are not greedy creatures and cannot be overfed. I therefore encourage members of the public to continue feeding swans to help improve their chances of survival, especially through the winter."

The views of these experts will hopefully answer that question. Some residents in Nayland provide floating swan and duck pellets; no wonder the village is a popular des res for swans.

CALEY GREEN OPEN MEETING on 2nd November

Mary George read a statement by James Finch, then the PC's rationale for action; the roles and responsibilities of the Environment Agency (EA), Suffolk County Council (SCC) and Parish Council (PC) at Caley Green; and the aims and objectives of the meeting.

Patricia Wilkie spoke about the analysis of residents views – little of this could be heard by those attending in the hall or by Zoom.

- Questions were invited.
- "Adrian Amos questioned how the Parish Council could claim that those who did not respond to the public engagement could be considered to be in favour of the proposals. He said that it was clear from the analysis figures that 94% of those responding were against the proposals or wanted an alternative to planting.
- "June Freeman asked what was urgent about resolving the suggested erosion and started to read a short letter submitted to the Parish Council by Professor Jules Pretty she was asked not to continue as there wasn't time.

OPTIONS

Patricia Wilkie went through the remedial options. This included 1. Aqualog; 2. planted coir rolls; 3. oak revetment; 4. two lengths of oak revetment (totalling 12 metres) with an area of planted coir roll in between and low growing reeds around the mouth of the culvert (ditch); 5. option 4 with the addition of a jetty near the culvert.

PROPOSALS

Patricia Wilkie said of these options their outline proposals were option 4 with the addition of pockets of lower growing reeds at the mouth of the culvert. Questions were invited.

- "Adrian Amos said reeds at the end of the ditch/culvert would eventually block the mouth and silt would back up causing a blockage; this has caused flooding in the past.
- "June Freeman said these two short lengths of revetment did not provide much room for launching river-craft and other riverside activities.
- "John Spooner said there are fishing rights to consider; fishing cannot be done from anywhere else on the Green as it is overgrown with reeds. Patricia Wilkie said the meeting is only to consider the proposal.

PLANT LIST

- Patricia Wilkie went through a proposed plant list:
- 1. Apium Nodiflorum Fool's Watercress (height to 60cm)
- 2. Veronica Beccabunga Brooklime (height 45cm)
- 3. Veronica catenata Water Speedwell (height 60cm)
- 4. Myosotis scorpioides Water Forget-me-not (plant and flowers 30cm)
- 5. Rorippa Nasturtium Aquaticum Watercress (height 60cm)
- 6. Stachys palustris Marsh Woundwort (plant and flowers
- 60-90cm)
- 7. Mentha Aquatica Water Mint (height to 90cm)
- 8. Butomus Umbellatus Flowering Rush (flower stem 1-1.2 metre is taller than the grassy leaves)
- Questions were invited.
- "How will they be maintained? Mary George said they do not know; the plans have not gone that far yet.
- "A resident complained at the overgrown nature of the river and fallen trees which were a hazard. James Carr said cuts in Government funding in the past decade prevented the EA from doing work such as tree removal and reed cutting and biodiversity policies have changed.
- "June Freeman said she challenged the urgency and seriousness of the erosion but the PC or James Carr did not respond.
- "How many species of plants will be included? James Carr said any number or all of them could be incorporated to provide diversity and see which did best the conditions at the location.
- "Would a fence be needed to protect the plants? Patricia Wilkie said a small barrier would be required while the plants were establishing with a notice explaining why.
- "What is the timescale? James Carr said it would need to be

be springtime now for planting.

"Chris Hunt asked why it was necessary to create more biodiversity on this small section of the river when the rest of the river had an abundance of reed beds and no control of them carried out for many years. Patricia Wilkie said again the meeting should concentrate on the proposal.

James Carr said the EA stopped cutting the reeds as they do not have sufficient funding; reed cutting is only done where there is risk of flooding and this isn't the situation in Nayland. He said the river has narrowed up with reed growth but it will find its own level; he said it is healthier now. Reeds do not thrive under trees. Silt removal in not the responsibility of the riparian owner. He said some work on the inner bend may help the outer bank at Caley Green but there are no plans to do so.

- "A resident said she found it strange that this small section of the river has to be isolated in an application when it is set within a river system full of biodiversity.
- "Asked why he wouldn't support revetment for the whole length of the bay, James Carr said the EA has specific criteria when looking at permit for works applications and wants to see a proportion of planting alongside any revetment.
- "Adrian Amos suggested that the landowner, in this case Suffolk County Council, was responsible for the riparian growth across half of the river. He said that when Caley Green was created in the 1960s following building the by-pass fishing rights were given to residents and a bench was presented by the Darts Club for residents to sit and enjoy the view. Fishing rights and enjoyment of the bench have now been lost due to excess reed growth. Patricia Wilkie said the meeting should focus only on the proposal.
- "Gerry Battye asked if the proposal would hinder access to the bank by the swans; James Carr said it wouldn't.

The presentation moved on to the subject of **funding**. Costings have not been carried out but the project could cost in the region of £5,000. A grant of £750 had be secured towards replacement of the existing revetment. A representative of the Dedham Vale & Stour Valley AONB said this may qualify for a Sustainable Development Grant through their organisation.

Questions were invited. These included;

- "How will planting be maintained? Mary George said they do not know yet as no solution has been agreed.
- The meeting was told that the next steps would be:
- The presentation would be available on the Parish Council's Dropbox web pages.
- Residents could make further comments deadline will the 23rd November.
- An application would be submitted to the EA for a works permit
- They hope to undertake the work in Spring 2022.

Towards the end of the meeting Lorraine Brooks said "I appreciate the PC don't consider it part of this project and for discussion tonight, but in view of the strong feelings expressed this evening about the loss of fishing rights along the Green due to excessive reed growth will the PC now look towards rectifying that." The PC indicated that they would.

LETTERS:

Dear members of the Parish Council,

I write in my capacity as a Nayland resident to express views on the proposed works at Caley Green.

- I see the question through these four lenses:
- 1. The social benefit of access to the river from Caley Green is important. It has been wonderful to see so many people use the river at this point, especially children. This is the only open access point to the river between Bures and Stratford. My University research over the past 20 years has shown the clear health benefits of activities in nature. In this sense, Caley Green and the river provide an important health service.
- River access is formally enshrined by the fact it is a Navigation by law – not all rivers have such access. It thus remains an important Common. I observe that this area is an important component of the village and its range of commons – the dense network of footpaths, the Fen, Caley Green, the horse-watering. And the river itself.
- 3. In my view, the erosion itself is not a significant problem. The outside bend of rivers always see faster water travel, so it appears as if there would be significant risk. But this energy in the river does not occur at this bend because of the presence of the overspill channel to take away high and fast water flows.
- 4. The river and its banks are already highly ecologically diverse, and there is no obvious need for more specific bankside habitat.

I remain unconvinced that new plantings are desirable. They could appear to restrict access to the river, and I can imagine conflict emerging if and when a part of the bank is fenced off.

What I would be in favour of, for example, would be a discussion on how some parts of Caley Green could be left unmown, so that wild flower habitats could flourish. A strip along the road, for example, could be left and improve plant and insect diversity greatly.

CALEY GREEN OPEN MEETING, A SHAMBLES?

There's been a public engagement and now an open meeting, the latter turning out to be rather frustrating. Confusion occurred from the outset with mixed messages over restrictions about who could attend in the hall; was it one person per household or not?

Would it even be worth attending by Zoom; if it was as suggested just to observe. Then the Zoom link which was advertised on their posters as being made publicly available was not and some requests to councillors for a Zoom link were not forthcoming.

In the event those attending the hall could not hear; speakers were not organised to stand facing the meeting, removing their masks at safe distance to speak and project their voices despite the well known problems with acoustics in the hall. It was worse for the Zoomers; they could not hear, they could not see the presentation screen, and very few of their questions were put forward to the meeting. Most people left the hall saying what a waste of time that was.

Analysis.... The results of the 'public engagement' carried out in late August were revealed. The PC's analysis revealed overall that 16 % of residents submitted responses; less than 1% (7 people out of a population of 1,199) supported the PC.

Looking at the results in terms of percentages of those who responded the PC's figures show:

AGAINST PLANTING - 29%

WANTING ALTERNATIVE TO PLANTING - 65% IN FAVOUR OF PC PROPOSALS - 7%

Who recalls Jackanory? The speech given accompanying the analysis results during the open meeting declared this was not a defeat of the proposals. Really? Can anyone make sense of that declaration? Has democracy disappeared in Nayland, is it now an authoritarian parish?

So what's new?

Not much; instead of replacing 10 metres of oak revetment near the bench they are now proposing 5m there and 7m 'somewhere' further round the bend. They are not disclosing measurements for the length and breadth of a peculiar shaped planting area

REFLECTIONS OF THE OPEN MEETING

As the meeting about Caley Green on 2 November closed, a spontaneous exchange of comments such as *Well, that was a waste of time'* and *'That's two hours of my life lost'* captured the strong sense of disappointment felt by many of the departing audience.

Described as an open meeting it had appeared to invite villagers to participate in an exploratory discussion regarding the management of the bay at Caley Green. When the meeting started, however, it became apparent that the PC had already decided that 1) the overwhelming problem at the bay was the imminent danger of erosion and 2) the meeting would concentrate on presenting a preprepared plan for addressing this.

Nayland resident, Jules Pretty, a Professor of Environment and Society at the University of Essex, had some weeks previously, submitted a letter to the PC stating that, in his judgement, the problem of erosion in the bay was 'slight'. Though this obviously had planning implications for the bay, the PC failed to make any response to this. An audience request that the issue of erosion be discussed early in the meeting was also summarily dismissed. Only after an extended presentation of the Council's pre-prepared plan was an opportunity granted to discuss erosion. But to discuss your problem after presenting your solution makes no sense.

By effectively imposing a closed agenda councillors dominated the meeting. The fact that the PC's new proposal scarcely varied from an earlier Council proposal which had gained the support of only 1% of villagers, also did little to stimulate constructive discussion.

It is therefore felt that, in the interests of transparency and good communications, a description of the possible options for managing the bay at Caley Green, including leaving the edge of the river in its current state i.e. as a natural bend, untainted by any 'development', however well meant, should be presented in the next issue of the Community Times, and readers invited to vote for the option they most favour. The assessment of these votes should then be placed in the hands of an agreed independent body.

Who is responsible for what?

Suffolk County Council

Are the landowners of Caley Green with riparian responsibilities. **Nayland with Wissington Parish Council**

Have a licence agreement with SCC to manage aspects of the Green; it lists:

- to manage the grass and growth of the area
- to manage the Fishing Rights on the bank
- to control necessary signage to manage the current use of Caley Green
- to manage the siting, maintenance, installation and emptying of waste bins, dog excrement bins, benches
- to manage the access to the river
- to organise minor tree work but only after advising the Licensor <u>The Environment Agency's</u> responsibilities are:
- managing the risk of flooding from rivers and waterways
- maintaining Navigation Rights: they sell river craft licences
- Fisheries; they sell rod licences
- water quality and resources
- · conservation and ecology
- regulating major industry and waste
- treatment of contaminated land

which appears to curve into the river bend. The dreadfully out of scale graphic included in their presentation is deceiving and makes it look like the revetment will be much longer than it will be. They have at least now revealed a list of proposed plants.

Further comments.... The PC said further comments could be made until 23rd November BUT how can comments be made on what is still vague information?

PC'S PROPOSAL VISUAL

These were the images presented to residents at the Open Meeting on 2nd November. They are <u>NOT</u> to scale. They include: • 5m revetment in front of the bench

- A new 7m revetment at the point of highest erosion where will this be?
- Planted coir rolls along the bank between the two revetments (the breadth from the bank into the river is not known)
- Plant low level reeds either side of the culvert/ditch (the position of the culvert is incorrect on the drawings and there are already tall reeds in part of this area)

• There was mention of a jetty to be approx. 2m in length x 1m width

The PC's images are totally inaccurate. The gully is close alongside the boundary hedge of the neighbouring property. The revetment shown is nowhere near the bench, etc, etc.

AERIAL PHOTO PLAN

This is a drone photograph of the area. The bench at Caley Green measures exactly two metres so this was used as the scale. It was therefore very simple to create a 5 metre and a 7 metre marker for the proposed revetments.

Because the PC's details are misleading the only element that can be located with any confidence is the 5m revetment by the bench.

The first image shows the 7m revetment allowing space for a 'pocket' of low reeds near the culvert. It also indicates where a portage platform (which they are calling a jetty) may be located.

The second image shows the 7m revetment further along where there may be higher erosion. <u>So would that then mean the 'pocket' of reeds</u> <u>became substantially more than a 'pocket'</u>?

It would be so easy for the PC to come up with a simple but more accurate plan/marked photo. Several residents have contacted the PC saying they cannot comment on their "impression of the options". But get a negative or no response. Why won't they reveal what their plans really are? STILL NO COMPROMISE

James Carr said the EA has specific criteria when considering permit for work applications and wants to see a proportion of planting alongside any revetment, but no details regarding their criteria will be disclosed. However, another EA officer states: "we have given pre-application advice based on the Council's proposed options".


While research finds that a new Environment Act become law during the UK's hosting of the COP26. It states that "developments deliver at least 10% increase in biodiversity".

The PC's proposal would deliver over 65% increase in biodiversity, however, most of the revetment is 'replacement' not 'development'. So is that really a valid argument for not compromising on the proposal?

STILL NOT LISTENING

Isn't it time the PC accepted the considerable opposition to their plans, worked out a compromise with the wishes and needs of residents and invited representation of residents onto the working party; especially those who have local knowledge of the Green.

The Society has recently become aware that the Department for Transport is reviewing the current restrictions on night flights at Stansted Airport. This could have a substantial impact on our village and the AONB in which we are located. We have been in correspondence with our MP and the Dedham Vale AONB Project seeking their support to oppose any increase in night flights.

Finally, the owners of the waste transfer station on Harpers Hill have applied to Suffolk County Council for an extension of the permitted hours for skip lorry movements. The existing hours are 9am to 5pm during the week. They are seeking a variation to permit movements from 7am to 7pm during the week and 7am to 1pm on Saturdays. The Society has lodged an objection to any such extension with the Suffolk County Council.



Our current book is "Wilding" by Isabella Tree.



On the whole the Green has been much quieter so bin emptying between collections by Babergh and putting out signage for the Parish Council is not required. We still do

some litter picking when needed and keep an eye on the wildlife.

Wildlife wise, after this year's breeding season the number of ducks has increased but it does not seem to be on par with previous years. Could this have anything to do with Avian Flu which it is believed claimed the life of Gordon, our much loved resident graylag goose? (The RSPCA said he was very sick and showing the symptoms of Avian Flu) Nevertheless it's good that the number of wildfowl have risen again.

Swan turf wars continue. The swan family from Wiston first visited in the summer, but they were seen off by Asbo and his family. The Wiston swans kept coming by and appeared eventually to win the territory in early September. Since then there has been a lot of toing and froing as the cygnets begin living independently; sometimes they leave their parents and come back. Currently another pair of swans has arrived on the Meadow pond; we are unsure whether this could be Asbo and his pen, the

pair that nested on the pond last year or a new pair.

First of all many thanks to those who have so generously donated financially to the Nayland Land Co since the last edition of the Community Times. Your support is critical to what we can do on the meadow.

For those of you who want to donate through your own labour please get in touch: there is never a shortage of jobs that need to be done on the meadow. Some heavy /many light.

I am truly delighted to report that Robin Thorogood has joined the Nayland Land Co we are very lucky to have him on board. The eagle-eyed of you may have seen him on the meadow recently helping out with his tractor and other machinery. Since the excellent Swifts talk on 8 November I thought a few words on birds.

Three of the four bird nest boxes placed this spring in Richard's Wood have been occupied by great and blue tits which successfully raised broods. The trees in the wood are quite young and so do not have the natural cavities that would be present in an area of mature woodland and so the nest boxes have provided alternative breeding sites and so helped boost the local bird population. Further nest boxes will be put in place before next year's bird breeding season. If you are interested in sponsoring one please let us know.

Birdlife on the meadow has been quite subdued over the past couple of months with a seasonal reduction in the numbers of jackdaws and rooks being particularly noticeable.

Birds recently recorded on the meadow include cormorant and Canada geese on the pond, kingfisher along the river (always a spectacular treat to see one of those) and red-legged partridge within the field. A pair of mute swans and one cygnet returned to the meadow pond in October.

In August a male stag beetle was seen along the entrance track to the meadow. Over the coming winter we will be building a number of log piles designed especially to benefit this endangered species. A great volunteering opportunity.

Four information boards have been erected beside the footpath and permissive path around the field, providing details about the wild flower meadow, hedgerow management and other management for wildlife.

Finally Neil Catchpole is now back at the meadow again this year carrying out phase 2 of the hedging works. Last year's work was frankly a joy to behold and so we are very excited to see him and Kim back. Again there is an opportunity to participate in this.





Garden Notes by The Old Muckspreader

Answering the Editor's query in October, our Nicandra has always been grown outside, so hasn't had much opportunity to discourage Whitefly, which would more likely inhabit a greenhouse. Had we grown it there it would have taken over the entire space.

There's quite a lot of well-berried holly around at the moment, but there are also a lot of hungry birds, so it's just as well to pick what you want for Christmas and store it now. If you put it into a plastic sack make sure it's well sealed; some years ago the OM/S omitted to take this precaution and when he opened it up in mid-December there were no berries left; field mice had taken the lot.

At the end of the drive here there used to be a fine Horse Chestnut, planted about 4 years ago which produced a good harvest of conkers. Two years ago it started to display the first signs of the dreaded disease that has attacked these fine trees, and now it has finally succumbed to it. We have just cut it down and its wood is now cut up and stacked in the barn to provide fuel for an open fire here. [Don't tell the Glasgow Conference]

That leaves only one Horse Chestnut from the three that graced the paddock; it failed to set seed this year. So is probably on the way out too.

While on the subject of trees one of the most beautiful is the Golden Rain Tree (Koelreuteria paniculata). When in bloom in early summer it's a lovely sight, justifying its name. Unfortunately it has grown rather tall here, and is mostly obscured by an evergreen Arbutus (Strawberry Tree). It grows reliably from seed, and we plan to move a self sown seedling to a better site.

Most of the deciduous trees still have most of their leaves, and there seems no sign of frost, which will bring them down for collection and transfer to the pens.

Annual Cosmos is still flowering, and the garden looks as if it's still only early Autumn, when in reality it's not far off Christmas.

Which brings the OM/S to wish his readers a happy one, and good gardening in 2022.

NAYLAND CELEBRITIES

In a conversation last year with Leigh Sebba about some of Nayland and Wiston's famous past and present residents, Leigh suggested it might be a good idea to keep a record of them for the village archives. It is true that there have been quite a few well known people living in our parish, some of whom could be called Celebrities - a title much used these days to describe people in popular culture, although it is quite difficult to decide when someone becomes a Celebrity as opposed to being just a famous person.

As well as having famous residents the parish has throughout

history also been visited for various reasons by many other well known people from every walk of life. Perhaps the most famous was Queen Elizabeth, later known as the Queen Mother, who visited the East Anglian Sanatorium in Wiston in 1945. The Sanatorium was founded in 1901 by Dr Jane Walker who was already famous for being one of the first women in this country to qualify as a doctor. The hospital was renamed the Jane Walker Hospital in 1959 but closed in 1991.

John Constable's connection with Nayland through his painting in St James's is well known. He did not actually reside here but had two aunts who did, at Longwood House and The Manse. Family correspondence indicates he was a frequent visitor and often walked from his parents' home in East Bergholt to Nayland.

Another famous artist associated with Nayland was Alfred Munnings who lived at Dedham and died in 1959. Past residents remembered seeing him in Nayland in the 1920s when he brought his horses to the Nayland forge to have them shod, so he would have been a regular visitor.

Thomas Gainsborough was another Suffolk artist, born in Sudbury in the 18th century, and it is likely that he would have visited Nayland but there is no evidence of this. However, it is written into Nayland folklore that his brother Jack produced the paintings preserved on the first floor of the White Hart.

Other artists such as John Nash lived at Wiston in the 1930s and Bernard Cheese, artist and printmaker, lived in Nayland High Street and died in 2013. Emily Carr was a Canadian artist who spent her last months in the Sanatorium in the 1940s before returning to Canada to die. Many people remember the late Peter Collingwood, internationally known artist and weaver, who lived at the Old School House in Nayland until he died in 2008.

Back in 1974 Donald Swan of the comic duo, Flanders and Swan performed in the Village Hall in a Music Week event. Together they wrote and performed more than a hundred comic songs in their careers, including the *Hippopotamus Song* (Mud, Mud, glorious Mud) and *The Gnu*.

Internationally known musicians John Williams and John Etheridge, guitarists, performed in Nayland Village Hall in 2006 to raise funds for the Friends of St Mary's Church Wiston.

In the 1990s many people will remember when Nayland became a popular location for film makers. The actress Julie Walters appeared in a film made partly in Nayland in 1993 by Channel Four called *Getaway*. It also starred Alfred Molina and was produced by Alan Bleasdale. Paul Barnes, from Anglia

TV, presented a film about Nayland in 1994 in the *Village Show* series. *The Affair* film made for the BBC in 1995 featured Nayland and starred Courtney Vance and Kerry Fox.

The author and Times crossword compiler Adrian Bell lived at Wiston in the 1930s and the author Ronald Blythe, who lives in nearby Wormingford, has been a frequent visitor over the years attending various events, including the Court Knoll dig in 2016.

Dr Oliver Rackham was a Historical Ecologist whose prime interest was the history and management of British woodland. He was a prolific award winning author of books on trees, woodland and the countryside. In the 1970s whilst lecturing at Flatford on a vernacular architecture course he visited several of Nayland's medieval houses.

Michel Roux, famous chef and restaurateur was part of the syndicate which took over the White Hart Inn in 1995 and turned it into a restaurant with rooms for a few years. From the world of sport, Ted Phillips the well known Ipswich Town football player, lived in Court Street in the 1950s.

Going back to the 18th century, William Jones, known as Jones of Nayland, was a nationally known clergyman, a composer of hymns and writer of religious works, who lived in the old vicarage in Fen Street. He came in 1776, the year of Constable's birth and would probably have known Constable's aunts. It is possible that Jane Austen who was related to William Jones's wife may well may have visited Nayland but there is no evidence of this.

Who knows, perhaps Anne Boleyn rode through Nayland with her entourage in the 16th century on her way to visit her relatives, the powerful Howard family who were Dukes of Norfolk and owned Tendring Hall in Stoke- by- Nayland, but this is pure speculation! We could perhaps go even further back in history to include Edward I in the 13th century who was known to have visited Nayland to sign many letters Patent.

The idea is to keep a register of all these people who have lived in or had some connection with Nayland. It is hoped that the musicians, artists and writers currently or recently living here can also be included.

There are probably other celebrities who could be added and we would like your help. Do you know of any famous people who have either lived here or visited in an official capacity? If you do and can provide dates and information we would like to hear from you.



WEATHER SUMMARY: September & October 2021 Weather Report by David Lowe

September was a warm and fairly sunny month - welcome after the cloudy and cool latter two weeks of August. The mean temperature was 16.2° C - only 0.1° C less than August, which is unprecedented over the 14 year recording period. The average differential is 2.2° C and next nearest 0.7° C in 2011 - while this has been as high as 4.4° C. I thought that this year might have the highest September average, but the clear winner here was 2016 at 17.2. 2021 comes second to this. 2016 missed the cooler last week.

Highest temperature was 27.6° C (25.8° C and low, 5.4° C (5.02° C). Lowest max was 15.2° C (15.0° C). On no day did the temperature fail to reach 15° C (1.36) while there were 19 days over 20° C (11.36) equal highest with 2016. There were 3 days over 25° C (1.64).

Bright sunshine was 237.2 hrs (243.14) with solar energy at 7600 Ly (7641.07).

Rainfall was low at 23.4 mm (40.64) with evapotranspiration at 61.75 mm (61.34). There was only one day with 10mm plus of rain (1.14) with the highest rainfall rate at 40.6 mm/hr (83.08).

Winds were lighter than recently - average 3.8 mph (2.81). The highest daily average was 6.4 mph (7.41). Highest wind speed was 27 mph (31.07). The predominant direction was SW.

October had many dry days - but these were punctuated by the 2nd and 5th (both giving over 20 mm) 20th and 21st both giving over 14 mm, and the 31st at 9.4 mm. This is the only October in the past 14 years with two days over 20 mm - while

only two others have had 4 days over 10mm. The rainfall rate of 281 mm/hr on the 5th was more than double any previous rate for the month, and the highest I have recorded at Nayland over the 14 year record period (previous highest 261.4 in September 2014).

While Nayland is normally wetter than the Shotley Peninsula, to the east, record keeping has shown that precipitation is heavier there when arriving on a wind between northeast and south. This resulted in our October rainfall total of 95 mm, with the Shotley Peninsula a good 25 mm more.

The pressure pattern was generally one of high pressure to the southeast and low pressure to the northwest. However, the 2nd and 5th and 20th and 21st heavy rainfalls were delivered by depressions sweeping up from the southwest - and that of the 31st, a deep depression over the country that approached from the west.

Mean temperature for the month was $12^{\circ}C$ (11.55) with a high of 20.9°C (20.71) and low of $3.3^{\circ}C$ (2.04). Lowest max was 10.7°C (10.39). There were no air or ground frosts, no days when the temperature failed to reach $10^{\circ}C$, and 11 when the temperature failed to reach $15^{\circ}C$ (14). There was one day over 20 °C (1.71) and none over $25^{\circ}C$.

Bright sun hours were 165.7 (163.3) solar energy was 4375 Ly (4576) and evapotranspiration 36 mm (36.04).

As stated above, rainfall was 95 mm (61.01). This was the second highest over the 14 year record period, after last year.

EROSION AND REVETMENT AT CALEY GREEN – NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

The powerpoint presentation, analysis of responses to the August survey and Minutes from the Open Meeting held on 2nd November are now on the Parish Council webpage of the Nayland and Wiston Community website for the benefit of those residents that could not attend. These can be accessed via the link to documents files on the webpage. All other documents and minutes of meetings relating to Caley Green have been published there over several months. We thank all those residents who responded to our request for comments. Some of the responses were very detailed. A few suggested installing a jetty and this option is dealt with separately in this issue of the Community Times as the various authorities would like to know residents' views.

However, despite the fact that the aims and objectives were set out by the Parish and County Councils in the Community Times earlier this year, it is obvious from some of the comments that there are misconceptions about what the Parish Council, Suffolk County Council, the Environment Agency, the Dedham Vale and Stour Valley AONB Project Team and other official bodies have been considering.

There has never been any plan to block the view of the river

by tall, dense vegetation. There has never been any plan to prevent access to the river.

There has never been any plan to limit the quiet enjoyment. of the Green by visitors although there have been discussions about mitigating any negative impact on residents and wildlife

The aims of the authorities have always been to prevent further erosion of the Green, to protect wildlife habitat, to create safe access for licensed kayakers, paddle boarders and other river users. The River Stour Trust, Environment Agency Navigation Officer and Stour Boating have been involved on behalf of craft users. There was additional input from the Emergency Services. The minutes of those meetings are on the Parish Council webpage. Residents' questions raised at the Annual Parish Assembly in April were referred to the experts and their responses have been published. The Open Meeting in November reported the outcome of all the work that has been done for well over a year towards achieving those aims.

A formal application for a permit for any work on a riverbank must be made by all landowners to the Environment Agency. The pre-application process for Caley Green began in 2020. The Environment Agency is legally obliged to set out conditions for those applications to include enhancement of biodiversity, conservation of habitat and access to water-based activities. If an application does not conform to those conditions, it wlll be refused. All the official bodies involved in the decision-making process favour a hybrid scheme of low, mixed, native vegetation to protect the riverbank plus oak revetment to replace the previous revetment that has been destroyed. The next step is for the Parish Council and Suffolk County Council to make a final decision and to draw up a detailed scheme to present to the Environment Agency for consideration.

GARDEN NOTES

December should see an increase in the number and variety of birds visiting the garden and this increase will gather strength early next year or if there are particularly cold, frosty conditions. At such times the garden feeders can be busy all day long with visits from Blue and Great Tits and, if you're fortunate, Coal Tits.

Every few years, Waxwings turn up in unusually high numbers, both in gardens and, bizarrely, supermarket car parks. Usually confined to the Arctic and regions further north, these gorgeous birds rely almost entirely on berries and one individual may eat a thousand in a day.

Meanwhile, on supermarket roofs and sometimes even Christmas trees, Pied Wagtails gather to roost. Fairy lights on Christmas trees may be a fraction warmer than ambient temperature, so they're drawn to these.

A few flowers hang on. White Dead-nettle is still flowering (it never stops) and so is Groundsel.

lvy is beginning to produce berries, which will be critically important for birds in the late winter, as other food declines sharply. The odd Woodpigeon will already be having a go, even if the berries aren't fully ripe.

There are a few flying insects around by day, save for winter gnats and the occasional late hibernating butterfly such as a Red Admiral. There are, though, a few moths that you might catch in the garden using a light trap. They include December Moth, Red-green Carpet, Autumn Green Carpet, Tissue, Winter

Moth, Northern Winter Moth, Mottled Umber, Sprawler, Brindled Ochre, Tawny Pinion, Pale Pinion, Grey Shoulder-knot, Red Swordgrass, Sword-grass, Satellite, Chestnut, Dark Chestnut, Dotted Chestnut, Angles Shades, Oak Nycteoline, Silver Y, Herald, Bloxworth Snout and Buttoned Snout.

Most bats are hibernating, although the occasional individual might fly about on a mild winter's day. However, members of bat study groups often monitor hibernation sites and count the torpid animals at known sites, often attics and cellars.

Whatever the weather, nothing stops the gradual increase in the babble of birdsong during January. And, apart from the inevitable push of the shoots of snowdrops, crocuses and daffodils through the frosty soil, nothing is quite so subversive to the grip of winter, each wild voice defiant.

The Great Tit may sing even before

Christmas is over, but the main flush of song is towards January's end. The phrase is easy to identify, a cheerful repeating of two notes: 'Teach-er, teach-er, teach-er.' The chiming sound is slightly strained but invariably cheerful. One moment a Great Tit will be singing from a treetop, the next it will be down at the hanging feeders, bullying and harrying.

Blue Tits are equally tough characters, but they may not start singing until the very last days of the month. Coal Tits, which have a similar song to the Great Tit, but less rasping and sweeter, only get going in February.

Another song you're almost certain to hear is that of the Song Thrush. Much is made of this bird's decline in gardens over the last four decades and while this is undoubtedly real it doesn't mean that the bird is rare. Far from it – the village hosts several pairs. The thrush is perhaps overlooked because of its retiring habits and because it tends to sing both early in the year and early in the day, when fewer people are tuned in. But its voice can dominate a late winter morning. Listen for loud, strident phrases delivered at a relaxed pace with a perfect broadcaster's enunciation and above all recognise that each phrase is repeated several times.

In the words of Robert Browning's *Home Thoughts from Abroad*:

That's the wise thrush; he sings each phrase thrice over, Lest you should think he never could recapture The first fine careless rapture!

In more prosaic terms, if you hear a loud song you can't identify in early spring, it's most probably that of a Song Thrush.

Try to keep listening day after day, because you're certain to pick up other voices. The Dunnock, for example, isn't a well known singer, but it's a very common garden bird that tends to start up in mid January. At some time in your garden you will

almost certainly have heard it's sweet but limited, somewhat cyclical phrase, which sounds a little like the squeaky wheels of a moving supermarket trolley, but recognising it is never easy.

Quite naturally, January isn't a month when you're going to drool over the variety of flowers, but spare a thought for tough weeds that dare to creep into the untidy corners of your lawn or flowerbed. A few Daisies and Dandelions will be growing strong, as will Common Chickweed and Petty Spurge.

January isn't a great month for flying insects, either, but some of the species that hibernate might be tempted out on a mild day.

On mild nights, there is a small selection of macro moths that a dedicated trapper might catch. These include the same as December with the addition of Pale Brindled Beauty, Early Moth and Orange Upperwing.




