NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes on the Summer meeting: 11th August 2021

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PUBLIC FORUM

A resident mentioned the suggestion of an extraordinary meeting had been omitted from the draft minutes and asked if there was any update on a meeting. Mary George confirmed the minutes had been amended and the subject would be included later in tonight's meeting.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted consent at **43 Fen Street** [DC/21/03727] for reduction of a large eucalyptus tree by 40% and at **2 Gravel Hill** [DC/21/03918] for discharge of conditions application for DC/21/00234 - condition 3 joinery, 4 rainwater goods, 5 eaves and verges and 6 materials.

Between meetings councillors had no objections at **Townlands Harpers Hill** [DC/21/03931] for erection of first floor gabled front extension and porch, two storey side and single storey rear extension or at **The White House 16 Church Lane** [DC/21/03934] for removal of branches from a Yew tree and reduction of height to 8m. Since this Babergh DC has raised no objection.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at Roziers Cawley Road Wissington Uplands [DC/21/04125] for erection of garden store and pump house following removal of existing garden store and pump house. For a listed building application at Bear House Bear Street [DC/21/04077] for alterations to the fenestration on the west facing elevation on the internal courtyard and infill of an internal facing lobby as detailed within the design and access statement councillors had no objections provided the Heritage Team is satisfied the double glazing meets listed building requirements.

Discussing applications at **Old Brewery House, 20 Church Lane** [DC/21/04181] for erection of a two-bay cart lodge with attached bike store/workshop and first floor home office, replacement of railings and erection of a greenhouse and shed (following demolition of existing carport and shed) councilors had no objections subject to a condition that the development must remain ancillary to the host residence and at **The White House 16 Church Lane** [DC/21/04188] for erection of singlestory cart lodge they had had no objections subject to a condition that the cart lodge must remain ancillary to the host residence.

Do You Know Someone Eligible For The Walsh Trust Christmas Bonus?

Each Christmas the Walsh Trust, which has two parish council trustees and four others, gives out small cash bonuses to those over 80 who have lived in the village at least three years and who would welcome such a bonus. As the original charities were for providing food and fuel, the Trust gives a present to those who have previously had the bonus but are now in residential care. There is no official way we can find out who is over 80 so we rely on local knowledge and that means all of you.

So please let us know if you are going to be eighty or know someone who will be by Christmas. Contact Mr Battye, Mrs Fuller, Mrs Rolfe, Mrs Mig Knight, Miss Kath Hunt or me, Mrs Knox. My number is 262224. If you already have the bonus and are still living in Nayland you will of course continue to get it and don't need to inform us. But because our income is so small once we have paid out for the year we simply do not have any money left to give late-comers so PLEASE let us know by the **1ST OF DECEMBER**.

Discussing a listed building application at 20 - 22 Birch Street for conversion of two semi detached cottages to form one dwelling and erection of single storey extension to existing single storey extension and associated works councillors agreed to express their concerns: "Whilst they were concerned at the loss of two cottages in favour of 1 larger dwelling, they are not aware of policy reasons to object. This Parish Council therefore has No Objections. (It can be noted from our Housing Needs Survey in 2018, smaller dwellings were identified as a Need). If the plans go ahead, please make a condition for the perimeter picket fence to remain as this arrangement has been there since the early 20th Century. We also do not have any details regarding parking and would point out that parking in the direct vicinity is limited."

Suffolk County Council planning and Environment Health are investigating following a complaint regarding bonfires in the vicinity of Harpers Hill. There have also been complaints of litter along the A134. Evidence of the cause of such issues should be sent to James Finch.

VILLAGE HALL

The planning consent for the village hall roof will lapse in September; it was agreed to pay the planning fee liaise with the VHMC regarding resubmitting the application.

Councillors agreed in principle to finance the cost of installation of Wifi at the Village hall as this was infrastructure. They agreed to finance the ongoing cost of Wifi for one year; after that it would be reviewed.

FUTURE MEETINGS

Once reliable Wifi is available in the Village Hall – hopefully during September – PC meetings will be held in the main hall.

Mary George said there will probably need to be an extraordinary PC meeting to discuss Caley Green proposals once the deadline for comments is passed and feedback has been assessed.



NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes on the meeting: 15th September 2021

PUBLIC FORUM

A resident asked about the current situation is regarding the proposals for the riverbank at Caley Green: Mary George said that will be discussed during the meeting. Another resident asked if there will be an extraordinary or public meeting about Caley Green; Mary George said this will also be discussed during the meeting. They also asked when the results of the public engagement regarding the PC's proposals for Caley Green will be made public; Mary George they are still being analysed by the working party and will need to be looked at carefully.

FUTURE MEETINGS

Installation of broadband at the village hall it taking longer than hoped; a new telegraph pole will be required so the timescale in not known. It was agreed:

- That from the October meeting onwards, with or without internet provision, PC meetings would be held in the main hall at Nayland Village Hall.
- To have a separate open meeting to discuss Caley Green.
- In order to go back to the Village Hall a risk assessment is needed

It was felt the open meeting to discuss Caley Green should be held as soon as practicably possible.

ALLOTMENTS

Debbie Hattrell said two allotments had been vacated and reallocated; 2 plots have been uncultivated and letters had been sent to the tenants; provision of raising the allotment provision is being looked into.

Discussion took place regarding a resident's offer to provide a bench seat on the allotment field, near the allotments. Previously councillors had considered and agreed to research possible provision of a rustic bench on the other side of the field, but the resident had intended the bench to be near the allotments to enable the pubic to rest and enjoy the surroundings. In discussion with an allotment holder the possibility of such a bench being located of his allotment was proposed. Mary George said this would create access and public liability issues unless it was a private arrangement with one person. Some councillors felt a bench seat near the allotments may be popular with walkers but issues may arise if it was located within an allotment.

It was agreed in principal that a bench seat for use by the public could be positioned by the gap in the hedge and that the resident's contractors could install the seat once the position and finer details are agreed.

CALEY GREEN

Mary George said the comments submitted regarding Caley Green (deadline 31st August) are not ready to report on. Gerry Battye asked if details of the results will be circulated; Mary said they will be available to everyone ahead of the proposed open meeting. It was agreed to hold a meeting for the public and relevant authorities, such as Suffolk County Council and the Environment Agency. Patricia Wilkie suggested the format of the meeting needs to be decided and the meeting needs to be published in advance. Mary George said they would need to check on availability of venue and those asked to attend.

Stour Boating Group who had awarded a grant of £750 towards replacement of the existing wooden revetment have extended their deadline for the work to be carried out to 2022. Gerry Battye enquired whether there had ever been offers of donations from the public; Mary George said there hadn't.

Some residents along Bear Street with riverside gardens are engaging a recognised contractor to clear reeds from their river banks.

RECREATION & OPEN SPACES

Reporting on Fairfield Recreation Ground Gerry Battye said the annual inspection will be carried out. A number of minor repairs and maintenance were agreed.

Gerry Battye said a fence along the flood channel is leaning over; this will be monitored.

PI ANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted listed building consent at **White Hart 11 High Street** [DC/21/03616] for erection of single storey extension (following demolition of modern kitchen extension and former dining hall structure), repairs and alterations as detailed in the design and access statement, heritage asset assessment and schedule of repairs. There were numerous conditions including regarding the existing Inn sign and its support bracket and the internal wall paintings.

Consent was refused at **Harpers Hill Farm Harpers Hill** [*DC/21/03776*] for erection of a worker's dwelling, construction of screening bunds and ancillary access arrangements (part retrospective) on grounds including it fails to accord with developments permitted within the countryside, insufficient justification and evidence that a worker is required on-site round the clock, that the site is situated on land outside of any settlement boundary.

Between meetings councillors had no objections at **9 Heycroft Way** [DC/21/04740] for erection of 1.5 storey rear extension, internal alterations and front velux but suggested a condition requiring the en-suite window to have obscure glass.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at **St James Church, Church Lane** [DC/21/04569] to reduce a Yew tree by 30%, or at **16 Birch Street Nayland** [DC/21/04965] to fell a sycamore tree to replace it with an Apple tree. It was noted an application at **Woodside Wissington Uplands** [DC/21/04875] for works to Oak Trees with TPO to raise canopy, remove side growth and remove dead wood had been withdrawn.

Councillors had no objections at **20 Harpers Estate** [DC/21/04816] for erection of two storey side extension and single storey front extension, however they would point out that their neighbour was not consulted by Babergh.

Councillors had been unable to discuss an application at **97 Bear Street** [DC/21/04980] for erection of a two storey rear extension and single storey side extension as details had not been available on Babergh's website; this would be discussed between meetings.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The PC will be involved with the CC for supply of commemorative mugs for the Platinum Jubilee. For the Diamond Jubilee in 2012 the PC contributed £500. More information on cost and a guesstimate of the number of qualifying children will be needed before an amount can be agreed.

IN BRIEF

The Village Hall is now open; the WiFi ordered has not yet been installed.

The annual maintenance review of the Burial Ground will be arranged for the autumn; this will involve the inspection of fences including the boundary fence bordering the paddock.

NO Waste On The VILLAGE BONFIRE

It is with regret that we must insist that no garden waste or any other material is put on the bonfire.

THERE ARE TO BE NO EXCEPTIONS.

This is due to non combustible and potentially dangerous items being put on in previous years. We are obliged, by our insurance company, to take appropriate action if anyone ignores this notice. Mr Bugg has again kindly offered to construct the bonfire for us and only materials supplied by him will be used.

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NAYLAND OWLETS



At 4 weeks old with their fluffy white down these two owlets were disturbed temporarily from their cosy owl box on 22nd July for official monitoring and to be ringed. Hopefully they continued to grow healthily, went on to fledge successfully and become beautiful adult barn owls.

SUFFOLK HEALTH CHIEFS ALARM AS COVID-19 CASES RISE

The number of Covid cases in Suffolk have risen by 22% in the last week (as at 16 September) and this increase is set to continue, prompting Suffolk's Director of Public Health to issue an urgent warning ahead of the Bank Holiday weekend. Stuart Keeble made the warning after Suffolk's weekly case hit 231.1 cases per 100,000 population.

COVID-19 INFECTION RATES OVER AUGUST / SEPTEMBER

There is now a start of an upturn again of infection rates in South Suffolk. In the 7 days up to 7th September there were 306 new cases of COVID-19 throughout Suffolk. Locally in the area of my Division, there were 32 cases in the same period in our MSOA area of 18 villages This is now one of the highest in the county.

I continue to urge all those of you who are travelling locally and mixing with more people for work and / or pleasure to take a Rapid Flow Test twice per week.





COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Virtual Meeting: 1st September 2021 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the Zoom meeting. **Executive Committee:** Rachel Hitchcock said we have a good team on the Exec and it is lovely to meet in person for the first time since Covid-19. However, as always we welcome new members to join our enjoyable friendly committee.

Fundraising Activities/Events: We have a good deal of activities being planned currently but as always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. Now that Covid-19 restrictions are easing Rachel Hitchcock will liaise with Tracy Le Grys about organising a further training session. It had been suggested that this could introduce other aspects of First Aid.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel said that Dale Leeks has the information needed to finalise the gauge and this will be ordered soon.

Nayland 10k Fun Run: <u>nayland10k.co.uk</u> Rachel said that the event had been very well received by all. A percentage of funds raised went to SESAW and the Community Council. The CC was extremely grateful for £1,000 received.

Online Ticketing Facility: NaylandEvents.org – Justin Dowding said tickets are currently being sold for Nayland Cinema and a Friends of St James live music event. It will be used for Bonfire Night. Get in touch with Justin if you are interested in selling tickets using this system.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: The autumn tidy will take place on 9th October from 9am. All are welcome to come along to help; refreshments will be provided.

Fun, Food & Festivities: This event originally planned for 28th -29th August was postponed. Iain Wright suggested elements of the event could be held over the Platinum Jubilee weekend. After discussion it was felt this was a larger scale fund raising event so would need to be separate from the Street Fayre being held on the Friday which was planned as a free event for the village. However, it was suggested the FFF could begin in the evening after the Jubilee event. Iain agreed to discuss this idea with the committee.

Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee (during Thursday 2nd-Sunday 5th June)

Rachel Hitchcock advised that the annual Fete is going to be held on the early May bank holiday, on 2nd May. The CC had previously agreed to hold a village celebration on Friday 3rd June in the form of a Street Party/Fayre. The village hall has been booked as a back-up in case of bad weather (and for use of the toilets, borrowing tables, etc) but it is thought holding it in the High Street would be more atmospheric. Claire Buller will apply for a road closure permit.

The Parish Council have been asked if they wish to contribute towards a commemorative mug/ gift for children as they have done previously. Laura Erith has kindly agreed to be the PC rep on the Jubilee planning committee. Lorraine said Impact China (www.impactchina.co.uk), who supplied mugs for our 2012 celebration are expecting details to be available by early October.

Most of the Executive agreed to be on the Jubilee planning committee; others would be welcome. Rachel will organise a meeting to begin planning for the Jubilee celebrations.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Lesley Jameson gave her report on finances to 1st September.

Breakdown of profits: Community Times £1,282.00, Nayland 10K £1,000. **Grants paid:** none to date.

Expenses since our last meeting: £216 to Spingold for the August Community Times print run, £636 to Spingold for 2022 Calendar printing, £94 to Fen Street Designs for our 25% share of website management and £198 to Community Heart for the annual support costs for the defibrillator. The invoice

from Dynamic Fireworks Ltd for 150 sparklers (£177.08) and their invoice (dated 05.10.2021) for £1,875.00 is still to be paid. **Current Position:** The accounts show reserves of £27,747.12 represented by Deposit a/c monies £10,728.68, Current a/c monies £16,762.86, Cash in Hand £255.58. We hold £268.50 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, Lizzie's Fund Walk £201. Creditors are £2,052.08. **Therefore, unencumbered assets are £15,225.54.**

GRANTS & DONATIONS: There had been no grant applications or donations.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all involved for contributing to recent issues. Village is resuming gradually and the village diary is gradually expanding.

Three long term advertisers have been lost totalling £200 per year. Income peaked in 2015/16 and there has been a decline since then. However, the CT continues to run at a profit.

The Nayland & Wiston website continues to be useful for and now includes the online ticketing facility.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said the 2022 calendar is now available to purchase at the Post Office, Forget Me Not, Melissa's Hair Salon, 17 Court Street. Also online using PayPal or there is a payment by cheque option.

We have needed to increase floats and to refresh our knowledge of the 7 times tables since the price increase! Wendy has been selling them at events; the Flower Show and Treasures Sale. If anyone else can help sell at an event or venue they are involved with please let us know.

FORTHCOMING COMMUNITY COUNCIL ACTIVITIES:

Bonfire Night on 5th November: Rachel updated the meeting on progress. Elements regarding promotion, ticketing and parking were discussed. It was confirmed that entry would be by advanced ticket only; the cost will be £6 for adults and £2 for children. Tickets will be available online at naylandevents.org, from the Post Office and Forget Me Not and from a stall in the High Street on date tbc (calendars would also be on sale). The Anchor have kindly agreed that part of their Horkesley Road car park can be used. On promotion the time for entry/goods available with be brought forward to 6.15pm. It was agreed a bonfire was still required for the event. Claire Buller will organise the sales teams. Several marshalls will be required in Horkesley Road and the High Street and volunteers for the gate. Dynamic Fireworks have visited the site; Rachel will confirm details with them regarding the field layout, erection of barriers and the bonfire.

Christmas Fayre & Christmas Trail: The format of the Christmas Fayre was discussed. It was agreed to change the usual format; there would be no external stallholders; village societies would be asked if they wished to participate; there would be more emphasis on it being a social occasion with refreshments and entertainment. Some elements of the Christmas Trail would be included. Father Christmas would be in attendance; the possibility of him travelling by pony and trap is being looked into. The village hall booking has been changed from 4th to 11th December. If you can help on the day please let Rachel know.

Fun Village Quiz on 4th February 2022: The date was set and the village hall booked.

SOCIETY REPORTS

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said it was good to be back in action and for the Flower Show which had been successful and saw an increase in entries for the children's section which was lovely. Generally the number of exhibits and those attending

were down but the atmosphere was cheerful and it was great to see everyone. They have just a few seats remaining for the coach outing to Kew Gardens on 8th September. The autumn talk on19th October is on the subject 'Funny Garden Features'. Women's Institute: Wendy Sparrow reported that sadly the annual garden party in August did not take place and members will be looking forward to meeting up at last on the 9th September for the first time since March 2020. This will be in the Village Hall at the new time of 2.30 - 4.30pm and the speaker will be Chris Farndell, a crime officer, who will be talking about 'Photography from Forensic Art'.

Book Club: Wendy Sparrow reported that the group have just read and discussed 'In Love and War' by Liz Trenow, a local author. The next book is 'Where the Crawdads Sing' by Delia Owens.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton reported that considerable time has been spent researching and campaigning to save Caley Green from additional riverside vegetation being planted and asking for other erosion prevention solutions to be used. A petition by 160 local people has been submitted and a substantial number of people have submitted personal comments to support the campaign.

Lorraine said the Friends have over recent years been very active on the Green; as well as litter-picking they empty the bins and take the rubbish away. They keep an eye on the Green in general and the wildlife, contacting rescue services, etc when needed. They also put out the temporary signage for the Parish Council. Without their commitment scenes of over spilling waste bins and litter strewn about during the height of lockdown may have occurred here as it did in other villages.

Village Cinema: Lorraine Brooks pointed out the cinema was back; on 17th September 'Dream Horse' will be screened, on 22nd October 'Love Sarah' and on 19th November '23 Walks'.

Village Players: Justin Dowding said they are putting on 'Absurd Person Singular', which is a play, not a panto, on 2nd-4th December. Tickets will be available in October.

Nayland Land Co: David Slater said that the laid and coppiced hedges are both growing well, as are the riverside trees and the Sallow near the pond, and most of all the other recently planted trees. While the sheep are temporarily away from the main field the wild flower meadow will be cut. Cut material from the best bits will be spread on the main field by hand and the rest carted away. We hope to erect four new information boards about all the conservation work being carried out in the next few weeks.

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter expressed sadness at the news of Barry Wakefield's passing. Barry was a past chairman of the Society and subsequently became its Life President. He was a charming intelligent man whose advice was valued highly; he will be sadly missed.

On society activities he said a donation of £250 towards the

Suffolk Wildlife's Trust acquisition of Rowley Grove had been approved. On 4th October John Taylor will speak on the topic of 'How to live net zero in rural Suffolk' and on 8th November Simon Hooton will speak on the subject of 'Swifts'. They have a full calendar with four speakers booked for 2022. They are considering how best to show the film shot by Stuart Howells on the 'History of Nayland'. Along with others in the village they are pressing the Environment Agency to deal with the problems of the intermittent water flow over the horseshoe weir. They are maintaining pressure with National Grid over their proposals to erect massive pylons along the route of the existing pylons to the north of the AONB.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said the limit on numbers attending events in the hall had been raised from 40 to 80. Hirers should ensure that the body temperature of all visitors is checked; a temperature gun will be issued to hirers with the keys to the hall. Hannah Clark is the key holder; her details are in the Community Times.

Parish Council: Laura Erith said they have agreed to pay installation costs of mobile Wi-fi in village hall and half the running costs for the first year. If possible they are hoping to have their meeting on 8th September in the village hall, rather than at Cornard.


Planning permission for the village hall roof has been renewed, Babergh have granted permission for works at the White Hart with conditions including to the interior wall paintings and the retention of the sign and bracket. Weed control by SCC within the village has been very poor, flooding issues still need to be resolved. The wooden bollards at the Fairfield have been damaged by a vehicle; information about this would be helpful. The PC has approved extension of allotment plots to reduce the waiting list which is held by the Parish Clerk. Ragwort control on the allotment field has been carried out this year but needs to be addressed again next year. The working party will be examining and collating the responses to the Caley Green public engagement. An additional meeting will be held when some answers are back from the relevant agencies. No decisions have been made as not all the information has been received. They are still working towards a scheme which pleases people and is also environmentally suitable.

AOB: Barry Wakefield: Barry sadly passed away on 18th August; a memorial service was held in Colchester on the 1st September. Barry was an important part of the Community Council for many years and his contribution to so many village activities and events is remembered with great affection. In response to the news Ken Willingale, CC President said: "It is sad news about Barry. He was an excellent chairman and got things done. He served the Community Council well."



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

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

The Environment Agency (EA) state: any environmental incidents should be reported to their 24 hour hotline number: 0800 80 70 60.

LEVELS

There are several life-saving rings within the parish; they are generally situated by man-made structures. On 26th July it was notice one by the Horseshoe Weir had been removed from its station and was hanging from a tree. Presumably youngsters thought it was make a good swing! It was reported to the Parish Council and the EA: it was eventually removed by the EA just ahead of S2C's (Sudbury to the Sea) on 11th-12th September. It's also been noticed that the ring at Pop's Piece is missing; not all are the responsibility of the EA, some are down to the landowner.

WATER LEVELS

As mentioned last issue water levels on the river have been insufficient at times for proper flow over the Horseshoe Weir. It was first reported to the EA on 18th June and has continued intermittently all summer. During that time residents who reported a problem have heard a number of varied possible reasons for the problem.

The EA have issued an update - see page 17.

SWANS

Swan turf wars - this time with the Wiston pair and their six cygnets - have caused some alarm, especially when the chase has driven a swan near the A134. Sadly territorial disputes are part of nature and humans, cannot step in to interfere and have to look on helplessly most of the time.

At one point the Wiston Swans took over at Caley Green and Asbo and his famly retreated onto Nayland Meadow path.

GARDEN NOTES

In October, the number of 'weeds' in the garden begins to diminish to the relief of the gardener. However, look out for some indestructible weeds still going, such as Annual Mercury, Petty Spurge, Groundsel and Red Deadnettle. Daises are giving their last display of the year.

On quiet starry nights, if you venture out into the garden, one might be treated to the sound of migratory birds flying low overhead. Listen out for the sharp, high pitched 'tsee' of the Redwing and the 'shack-shack' of the Fieldfare, our 'winter thrushes'. Hearing this overhead can bring the thrill of wild bird migration literally to your doorstep.

Another, perhaps unexpected arrival in gardens is the Goldcrest. Thousands of these minute birds (our smallest) arrive as winter visitors from the continent to augment our resident population and many newcomers are seen in gardens.

The butterfly variety has dropped severely, but mild October nights can be fruitful for moth trappers. Several autumn moths are truly stunning, among he very best of them being the gorgeous Merveille du Jour. Other good ones include Red-green Carpet, Figure of Eight, Beautiful Gothic, Brindled Ochre, Black Rustic, Blair's and Grey Shoulder-knots, Greenbrindled Crescent, Red-line and Yellow-line Quakers, Brown-spot Pinion, Beaded Chestnut and Lunar Underwing.

Several common and widespread moths have the most perfect camouflage among brightly covered autumn leaves. These especially include the gorgeous sallows: Barred Sallow, Pink-barred Sallow, Sallow, Dusky-lemon Sallow and Palelemon Sallow.

If you have Ivy flowering in your garden in November, you can hardly have failed to notice that the pale, greenish yellow



flowers are a magnet for insects. At times dozens of wasps, hoverflies and butterflies may all be buzzing around at once. Nectar elsewhere is scarce.

The berries of Yew may still be obvious in gardens and churchyards. They are waxy, bright pink red and extremely poisonous to us. However, birds can remove the toxic seedcases and take the seeds, while some species simply swallow them whole without ill effects.

Among butterflies, the Merveille du Jour last Small and Green-



veined Whites hang on, while hibernating species such as Peacock, Small Tortoiseshell and Red Admiral are still widespread. It isn't a great month for moths, but among the dwindling supply of resident species some rare migrants turn up to brighten the moth shy gloom. Migrants include Vestal, Gem, Convolvulus Hawkmoth, Crimson Speckled, Dark Sword-grass and Scarce Bordered Straw.

Most bats now enter their hibernation. They will spend most of their time torpid. Many go to attics and cellars, others to caves.

Stour has been more than double the rate that caused drying over Horseshoe Weir in previous years.

Flows in the Stour were exceptionally high in January, and have been normal for the rest of the year to August with the exception of July when flows were notably high.

This hydrological pattern is likely to lead to the Nayland Autogate adjacent to the A134 being triggered more frequently.

When the gate is triggered some flow is quickly diverted down the flood relief channel (FRC) to protect properties in Nayland from flooding, leaving a temporarily lower level in the main river which can stop flows over the weir whilst levels rebuild. When flows are 'peaky' a significant, rapid input of water from upstream will trigger the sensor and open the gate, just as it would if sustained flood levels were starting to be detected. Under the sporadic and unseasonal rainfall conditions of this July the sluice gate is likely to have triggered as described. This is not something that would normally be experienced during a more typical summer flow scenario. It is important to note that this summer there have been a number of localised heavy thunderstorms in the upper catchment (notably Haverhill) which have caused localised flooding even though there was little or no rainfall at Nayland. This has resulted in pulses of water moving downstream, resulting in activation of the flood gates.

MORE FREQUENT CLEARING OF MILL STREET SCREEN

In the past few years our field team has more frequently cleared debris from the screen across the mill stream at Mill Street Bridge.

THE NATURE OF THE FLOOD CHANNEL GATE

The gate itself is a contributing factor to relatively high volumes being drawn down the flood relief channel when it activates.

The Nayland gate is an undershot sluice, meaning that water is released from below the gate as it lifts. This includes a hydraulic drawing effect which increases the rate at which water exits downstream. It is designed to remove water as quickly as possible in order to alleviate flood risk in Nayland. Adjustments can be made to the sensors that operate the sluice, but the gate is not able to precisely maintain a particular level of water when it is opened. It does hold a precise minimum level when it is closed.

In automatic mode the gate operates on retention level settings. The retention level is set at 12.3 metres above ordnance datum, or mAOD. (This is effectively the same as metres above mean sea level). The gate will open if the level increases to 12.35 mAOD and close if levels reduce to 12.25 mAOD. The 'river draining' alarm is currently set at 12.15 mAOD which is the level of the Horseshoe Weir crest. There have been no reports that this alarm has been activated in recent months.

Following detailed analysis by our specialist mechanical and electrical engineers we are satisfied that our assets in Nayland are working as they are designed to do.

There is a balance to be struck in flow management on the Stour. The fluvial system is influenced by a complex set of factors, including weather patterns and their influence on catchment hydrology. The operation of our auto-gate at Nayland ensures high river flows are diverted down the FRC and away from Nayland village in fulfilment of our duty to protect people and property from flooding.

There are a number of different reasons why river flow in the Stour is carefully managed, including to reduce of flood risk to people and property, to protect and enhance natural habitats, for public water supply and agricultural irrigation, navigation and angling. Any change in operational level will have an impact on at least one of these. Critically, we will not make any adjustments to influence flows if in doing so we would be reducing levels of flood protection to the local community. Our ecologists and fisheries officers are satisfied that there has been no adverse impact on the ecology of the river this summer during periods when flow has stopped passing over the Horseshoe Weir. This is because, with the exception of a very short lasting event during the low flow in early September, high flows have passed down the FRC and back into the river near the Anchor pub maintaining flow in the river. This is a very different situation to the low flow issues we experienced in the summers of 2020 and 2019.

know that a pair of owlets have been successfully raised by the allotments. There have been quite a few sightings of owls around the village so it is hoped they have had a successful breeding season. It is lovely to see and hear them.

ENVIRONMENT AGENCY: RIVER FLOWS, MANAGEMENT

Our lowest flows for the year were recorded in the week beginning 6 September, leading to increased water supply pressure. Localised reaches of the Stour were beginning to experience environmental stress. In addition, we were aware of the upcoming Sudbury to the Sea (S2C) event which would require river levels sufficient for water craft.

To ensure thar demands could be met, we operated the Ely Ouse to Essex Transfer Scheme (EOETS) in the first half of the week from 6 September.

It is important to note that this additional flow support cannot be guaranteed to be available every year. We are unable to commit to maintaining a minimum flow at current levels during periods when water is not required by the water supply company or if water is not available to pump from Denver.

UPDATE: SHORT-TERM FLUCTUATIONS IN RIVER LEVEL

In our previous update we explained that, despite the healthy flow situation, there have been several reports of short-term fluctuations in river levels. Our teams investigated the possible causes of these fluctuations and the most likely causes are as follows:

RELATIVELY HIGH AND SPORADIC RAINFALL INPUT







Very many thanks to everyone who submitted their views to the Parish Council's Caley Green Project during their public engagement exercise to gather resident's views regarding the erosion of the riverbank along part of the Green.

We were very grateful to all those who sent copies of your submissions to us. It was very pleasing that 160 names were submitted on the petition. Thank you all.

UPDATE

At the Parish Council's meeting on 15th September in the Public Forum we asked for an update on the proposals and on the results of the public engagement. We were informed that the working party had not yet completed their analysis of the results. There was no mention of the petition?

The Parish Council have agreed to hold a public open meeting to discuss Caley Green as soon as practicably possible. The relevant authorities, such as Suffolk County Council and the Environment Agency, would be invited to attend. The date was not set but it will be in the village hall; if Wifi is functioning there by then it may be possible for some residents to attend by Zoom. Mary George said the results of the public engagement will be made available ahead of this meeting.

So look out for publicity about this meeting - the Parish Council did not say how they are going to promote the event. Details were not available when the CT went to print.

DONATIONS

During the Parish Council meeting a councillor asked whether there had ever been any offers of donations. He was told "No".

However, this is not strictly the case. A few years ago an offer was made to supply the Green Oak needed to replace the existing wooden revetment and to install it.

Currently there are several residents willing to make donations and there are offers of substantial fund-raising - subject to what is intended along the riverbank. Unfortunately, the Parish Council do not really engage to discuss such possibilities.

UNANSWERED QUESTIONS

For some time the Parish Council have said that Andrew Murray-Wood, Senior Ecologist at Suffolk County Council, will produce a list of plants to be considered for use in the planted coir rolls. There seems to be yet another delay, as the end of August was the most recent date given for this and nothing had appeared.

A petition with 110 names was initially submitted - this was barely acknowledged by the Parish Council. Since then another 50 residents wished to add their names and the petition was resubmitted. This received no acknowledgement.

We are left wondering quite what the Parish Council mean by an 'analysis'? Is it not a case of assessing how many are in favour of their proposals and how many are against?

BARRY WAKEFIELD

Known as a kind, intelligent, good humoured gentleman, William Barry Wakefield, of Birch Street, passed away on 18th August 2021.

He was a beloved husband of 68 years to Elizabeth, devoted and loving father to Simon, Martin, Amanda and Timothy, a treasured grandfather and great grandfather

Barry was born on 6 June 1930 in Hockley, Essex but moved to Harrow during the war as it was deemed to be safer out of the German flight-path. This didn't stop the family nearly perishing when their house was struck by a bomb during a raid, but thankfully it didn't go off. After the war the family returned to Hockley and Barry became the first in the family to go to university, reading statistics at University College London. In support of his application to university a teacher wrote Barry had "for many years devoted his holidays to working on a farm and found an application for mathematical interests in a patient comparison of the form of race horses with their pedigrees". His teacher also commented that Barry would do exceptionally well in his career and praising his high moral character.

Barry had many interests and much enthusiasm for life; a love of farming and racehorses... and a lifelong passion for chocolate! For a man who thought that more than two gin and tonics was extravagant it was amazing to see how many Mars bar wrappers would tumble out of his brief case at the end of the working week.

It was while Barry was at university that he met Elizabeth when they attended a meeting to discuss the formation of a church youth club. Afterwards Elizabeth told her cousin she had met a real "wet blanket"; Barry told his mother he had met a "dreadful self-opinionated girl". Well, that apparently ill-matched boy and girl were together from then onwards and married in 1953. Family was probably the single greatest passion in Barry's life; his pride and commitment to their wellbeing, education and focus on their life chances was superb. His children did give him some challenges; spats with the police, punk rock rebellions, difficult teenage years and university failures were borne with clam, gentle advice always focussing on what had to be done to remedy these hiccups. When grandchildren came along a more relaxed and affectionate 'Baz' relished family parties.

Barry built a remarkable career. After National Service in the RAF as a Flying Officer, although he never flew due to his poor eyesight, teaching Maths was a better option for the safety of the realm. He was demobbed in 1953 and moved to the National Coal Board and became absorbed into the Civil Service. His career progressed through the Department of Education, the Ministry of Defence (with an office overlooking Horse Guards Parade, much to the delight of his mother), the Central Statistical Office, the

Cabinet Office and finally to the Department of Education where he finished his career. Upon his retirement he was appointed a Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath for services to education. His investiture by the Queen in Buckingham Palace was another great moment of pride for the whole family but Barry was characteristically modest about this honour.

In parallel with his demanding career Barry's life within the Hockley Church developed. In 1962 he became church secretary until he and Elizabeth moved to Nayland in 1987, when they joined the Lion Walk United Reformed Church in Colchester and both became lay preachers.

Barry's interest in blood lines and breeding of racehorses became an obsession and he developed an encyclopaedic knowledge of flat racing. He was focussed on breeding, and especially of the Queen's stable and the activities of the National Stud. He had no interest in betting and was indeed a useless tipster.

Farming was also a lifelong love. The long days of harvest, physical work and being in the natural world was such a contrast to his London based high pressure working life.

Barry lived a busy life, a good life, a life lived well by a truly good man, a kind and gentle man, a man who all said they all have good memories of him. No small achievement at all; he will be missed by many whose lives he touched.

Barry is remembered in Nayland:

"Barry was a leader of deep wisdom and patient intelligence during his time as Chairman of the Community Council. Unflinchingly direct and unfailingly good humoured he was the wise steward who played a key role in defining the CC approach and culture for the benefit of the village. He made exceptional contributions to the success of the Village Festival and Millennium celebrations. He has our sincere thanks" Bryan Smith, Vice President, Community Council.

"Barry was a very special man who always wore a smile on his face. He was so dignified, a true gentleman. He led CC meetings with calmness and respect for everyone present. I think that we were all surprised to learn that there have been over 6,000 servicemen and women killed in some 35 conflicts/interventions since 1945. 

An introduction to The friends of Caley Green

The Friends were created in 2017 by a group of Nayland residents who live close to, use regularly or have an interest in Caley Green. We work towards our aim of keeping the Green as a well managed open space for the mutual enjoyment of both humans and wildlife.

So far we have:

- Dealt with injured and deceased wildlife.
- Arranged for safe removal of bee swarms.
- Arranged with Colchester Borough Council for flytipping to be removed from the A134.
- Liaised with Babergh District Council for graffiti removal
- Conducted litter picks on the Green and surrounding area when required.
- Cleaned paths and the bus stop when necessary.
- We worked with Suffolk County Council ecologists and the Environment Agency to remove excess reed growth from a small section of the river on Caley Green over a two year period. NOTE: The friends have not conducted reed removal without the permission of the landowner or the Environment Agency.
- We have worked with the Parish Council to put out signage at busy times.
- We have an agreement with Babergh District Council to empty rubbish from the bin and dispose if it at an agreed location.
- Lately we have been busy with the Save Caley Green

campaign. The campaign is focused on alternative options to prevent erosion around the bay rather than more planting which would over time block views, and decrease access to the river.

You will all know the meadow (opposite side of the river from Caley Green, to the south of the rear of the houses on Bear Street and north of the Horkesley Road and east of the A134) around which snakes attractively the River Stour. <u>Context</u>:

To remind people - in 2005 the Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society raised money to acquire the main meadow. A like process was undertaken in 2012 to acquire the adjoining 2/3 of the adjoining field on the southern boundary from the Buntings. It is quite simply an extraordinary communal achievement that it was ever acquired. A testament to opportunity, vision and generosity. It is now held by a separate entity limited by guarantee that is a charity – the Nayland with Wissington Land Company now commonly known as the Nayland Land Company. Some £85,000 or so was raised and spent on acquisition. As this meadow is owned by a charity it is held for the benefit of all ie **you!** It is something which all residents and visitors to Nayland can enjoy forever and it is managed responsibly in accordance with the principles applicable to a charity (and its objects) and a Conservation Area and the Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

But nothing comes from nothing. NLC now needs your help again. It needs two things I'm afraid: money and volunteers. Please bear with me!

A plea...

NLC is dependent upon grants (which I fear are ever diminishing) <u>and</u> donations. To those who have given both on acquisition and subsequently there is a debt of gratitude as well as a huge sense of achievement in helping to secure a site that will never be developed and will be enjoyed forever. This amenity is there in perpetuity for you, your children and your children's children etc etc.....! But it needs funds <u>now</u> for both simple upkeep and further environmental, biodiversity and educational initiatives. You will already have seen the creation of a wildflower meadow, tree planting, a new permissive path, a new bench to admire the meadow and a revitalised double hedge (dividing the main meadow from the smaller fields) laid in a traditional manner – truly a work of art in itself [– see opportunity below!] plus 200 metres of dead hedge and an area set aside for re-wilding. NLC is engaging with the local schools to carry out an important educational role for local children.

What has been achieved could not have been achieved without people's generosity. But it is time for another showing of that generosity now. Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

At last some rain, after a dry period of several weeks. Despite the lack of moisture the lawns have remained green, and nothing else seems to have suffered.

In fact one plant has made the most amazing growth; this is the annual Nicandra Physaloides. Despite being sown rather late, this unusual plant has made the most amazing growth. They're not in full flower (pale blue) all over the plants and have grown to about 5 feet high, with the same spread.

They have set a good amount of seed, and we shall harvest this when it is ripe. The usual seed merchants don't appear to stock it but you could presumably obtain it from Thompson & Morgan. If anyone wants any, the OM/S, whose cover has surely been blown (as they say in James Bond circles) by now, would be happy to provide some.

Another plant making its appearance is the Colchium - also known as the Autumn Crocus, although botanically it isn't one. They provide their mauve flowers, without any accompanying foliage; that doesn't appear until the Spring.

Unlike most other bulbs and tubers they are very slow to increase in size or volume and as a result are quite expensive to buy, but are a worthwhile long term investment.

Lawns still need mowing, but now at longer intervals, and soon mowers can be put away until next season, but first shuld be given some oil on wheels and axles.

The Kaffir Lilies (Schizostylis) are having a good year here, and being late summer flowerers are useful plants to have around. In their native South Africa they grow beside streams, but don't seem to need a damp situation here, and the recent dry period doesn't seem to have set them back.

That's about it for the moment: next time we meet Christmas will be on the horizon.

Dear OM/S, I recall a member of HortSoc once telling me about her Nicandra which self seeded, from ornamental papery Chinese lanterns, each year and grew vigorously. Having had a quick Google, T&M don't sell seeds but they are available from Chiltern Seeds or Sarah Raven. It's interesting that it is also known as the apple-of-Peru and shoo-fly plant; the latter because some gardeners believe it to be a deterrent to white-fly if grown along with plants afflicted by this pest. Have you found this to be the case at M/S Hall?

A Brief History of Nayland Football Clubs

Football has its roots back in the mists of time but in England it became an organised sport in the 1880s when the Football Association was formed. It seems Nayland had a football club

from around that time at least as the photo right shows the Nayland Football Club circa 1885. This may be the oldest photo in existence of Nayland footballers. The only person I can identify on this early photo is a voung Harry Wilson. (front row, third from right) who was born in 1870 and whose family ran the Victoria pub in Court Street during the 19th century.

Like every other local football club Nayland FC has had its ups and downs, good times and bad. Unfortunately there seem to be no records existing of early clubs but there are quite a few

photographs of early 20th century teams. One source of information of those days is the late Eric Barton who was born in Navland in 1923. He was a keen footballer and wrote in his book "A Village Boy" that until the 1920s there was a Nayland football club organised by the British Legion. After this broke up a new club called the Nayland Rovers started up and played on Webb's Meadow, the entrance fee to watch was 1p for children, 3p for adults. When Eric left school in 1937, aged 14, there was no team and he helped to start the Nayland Juniors Football Club, becoming Secretary and Treasurer, with his father and shopkeeper Mr Walton as trustees because the boys were under age. At first they played friendly matches and a year later they joined the Brightlingsea & District League. "Most players were 14-16", Eric said "the going was tough and there were few wins but sportsmanship and spirit were good."

Eric served in the Royal Navy in World War II when organised sports stopped. After the war he was keen to get the football club going again and called a meeting for those interested. They called the team Nayland Rangers FC and changed the colour of their shirts to red and white. In their first season, 1946-47, Nayland reached the final of the Amos Cup at West Mersea on Christmas morning, losing 4-2

against Tollesbury.

During 1948-49 and 1951-52 Nayland Rangers won 2 league championships, enjoying a successful spell of about 5 years. Then they lost Webb's Meadow as their home ground, some players left the club which left the first team short of players and they had to fill it with 13 or 14 year olds. Eventually, however, another venue was found and play continued.

In 1956 John Curtis took over the Anchor Inn with his wife June and two daughters, Susan and Sally. June recorded in her memoirs that "On our arrival at the Anchor a Nayland Rangers Football Club meeting was in progress in the Public Bar and John was immediately made a member of the committee! He held the position until we left the Anchor in 1983, becoming over the years, Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, linesman and groundsman - mostly all at the same time!" He also later became President of the Nayland Eagles. In 1977, John was officially awarded a long service certificate from the Essex County Football Association.

Sally remembers her Dad attended all the home matches as manager and to run the line (always in his wellies - he was eventually presented with a Wellington Boot sprayed gold!),

> catching the bus on Anchor Bridge to go to the Mile End pitches until Webb's Meadow was acquired by the village in 1969. Sally then used to help her Dad mark out the pitch on Fridays. As the Village Hall wasn't built until 1970 all the equipment was kept in an old caravan which also acted as a changing room for both teams.

One highlight Sally remembers in the 1950s was the time the Rangers played a friendly match on the meadow between the Anchor and Horkeslev Lock when the famed Ipswich Town striker

Ted Phillips, who happened to live in Court Street, turned out to play for Nayland!

The Anchor became the spiritual home of Nayland Rangers and on Saturday nights celebrations went on very late when the Rangers won their matches. John regularly arranged coach trips to watch international matches and in 1966 he took about 20 Rangers and regulars at the Anchor to the England matches played at Wembley and other London grounds for the last week of the World Cup. They had an amazing experience which many of them never forgot. They all wore blazers with an Anchor Inn badge on the breast pocket.

The Rangers played consistently with some success but in the 1970s several new experienced players were signed to strengthen the team. In 1977 the team was promoted to Division One and on Easter Monday 1978 they were winners of the League Knock-Out Cup. A press report said about 500 Nayland supporters travelled to Colchester to cheer on their team and after the game the victorious team were driven through the village in the back of a truck parading the trophy

Soon after this success they were finalists in the Bromley Cup, beaten by Dedham, 2 goals to 1, after extra time, in a very

close fought final. However, undeterred by this set back the team went back to the league programme, remaining undefeated and became Champions of Division One, scoring some 98 goals in 26 games and gaining promotion to the Premier Division. The season of 1977/78 was undoubtedly one of the finest in its history.

During this successful period three of the Nayland Rangers who all lived in the village - Player Manager Richard Sparrow, Richard Weldon and Malcolm Willingale (son of Ken and Olive) - started training sessions on Webb's Meadow with some enthusiastic young schoolboys of the village. The numbers quickly swelled and the sessions were so popular that Paul and Joyce Fullbrook called a meeting of parents who were interested in starting a football club for their sons. A committee was formed and the club was called the Nayland Eagles. Many events were organised to raise money for their kit and equipment. This included a sponsored walk in 1978 when the boys and their parents walked 6 miles from Rodbridge to Sudbury. In a press report praising the members of the club, Treasurer Jenny Tibbles said the club had been established for 5 months and there were then about 40 members.

Martin Axcell who lived in Heycroft Way as a schoolboy with his family was one of the original Eagles. He said that when the boys reached 16, fifteen of them moved up to the Rangers in 1983 and played together for 2-3 years before some of them went off to university. The bulk of the boys carried on playing for another 4-5 years. During the period 1983-90 they had 3 teams which played at the Jane Walker Hospital.

Martin later became Club Secretary for the Nayland Rangers for over 30 years and they continued to play on Webb's Meadow until about 10 years ago. After a few problems there, the team returned once more to the Mile End Recreation Ground .

Very sadly the Nayland Rangers Football Club folded up in 2019 through lack of players and management. The Colchester & East Essex League no longer exists and the remaining teams now play for the Essex & Suffolk Border League. Even Nayland's great rivals at Stoke- by-Nayland only have a veterans team nowadays but Martin and the Rangers meet up with the Stoke team each year for a reunion match, usually on Webb's Meadow.

Nayland's football clubs have come and gone for nearly a hundred and fifty years and now once again there is no team. However, as long as small boys (and girls of course) want to kick a football I'm sure that one day in the future there will be another Nayland Rangers Football Club.

WEATHER SUMMARY: July & August 2021 Weather Report by David Lowe

The beginning and end of **July** were dominated by low pressure and wet/cool conditions, while the mid-month period was influenced by high pressure and warmer/sunnier conditions.

Mean temperature was 17.5° C (17.75) with a high of 29.98° C (29.78). The lowest was 10° C (8.04). Lowest max was 18.5° C (17.89). A low dewpoint of 9.3° C was notably high (6.19). There were 4 days of less than 20° C max. (5.64) with only 5 days over 25° C (8.36) and none over 30° C (0.79).

Bright sun hours were 342.2 (341.23) and solar energy 12500 Ly (13018). Evapotranspiration was 98 mm (108.11).

Rainfall was 54 mm (55.75) with highest daily amount of 12.8 mm (15.49).there were two days with over 10 mm (1.64) and none over 20 mm. Highest rainfall rate was 118.8 mm/hr (110.3).

Average wind speed was 4.1 mph (2.84) with highest daily average of 7.4 mph (6.4). Highest gust was 27 mph (30.14). Predominant direction was SW.

All in all, a fairly average July, but probably disappointing for some. However, it did keep the grass green and the shrubs watered!

August was a disappointing month, particularly the last two weeks, when grey skies dominated. This period started full of


promise, with high pressure moving in from the west. However, it sat itself west of Scotland and turned the jet stream south round it. This was responsible for the cloudy skies in the east of the country, and it was often windy: also the high pressure was not positioned/strong enough to prevent periodic incursions of low pressure centres from the Atlantic. However, it was not a wet month.

Mean temperature was 16.3°C (17.36) the second lowest over the 14 year record period. High was 24.6°C (26.42) the lowest over the period – and it was the only August when 25°C was not achieved. Lowest temperature was 7.3°C (7.76) and lowest max 16.5°C (17.34). On 12 days the temperature failed to make 20°C (second lowest). Bright sun hours were 295.3 (303.84) third lowest, and solar energy 9250 Ly (10480). Environmental transpiration was 74 mm (88.11) lowest over the period.

Monthly rain was 49 mm (63.95) with 1 day over 10 mm - 17.2 mm (1.93). Highest rainfall rate was 225.8 mm/hr (117.59) albeit for a brief period, a record for August. This is approx. 7 x the Met. Office Downpour Rate.

Average wind strength was 4.6 mph (2.84) with highest day average of 7.9 (6.03). Highest gust was 29 mph (30.36).






