NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 16th February 2022

PUBLIC FORUM

A representative from Bures St Mary explained their Quiet Lanes project for their Parish and their request for this PC to consider giving approval to extending the Bures St Mary scheme up to Wormingford Mill.

A resident thanked the PC for replacing some fencing panels which border his property and the Burial Ground; he believed further were in a similar state and offered access from his property for the next annual inspection and during future works.

Melanie Barrett was thanked regarding the street cleansing, however, a reminder was made of debris left on the A134 island. James Finch confirmed clearance is in hand.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

James Finch said that a proposed 400 kV pylon line from Norwich to Tilbury is not expected to be an additional 3rd line along the Bramford to Twinstead power line route.

DISRTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Melanie Barrett said the street cleansing vehicle has visited Nayland and Stoke and feedback on improvements has been good. A return visit was to be made to Nayland: it was hoped notification to owners of cars parked on the street would allow access to the kerb for cleaning. Regarding a planning application for the Waste Transfer Station on Harpers Hill, this will now be decided by Suffolk County Council.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at **Rushbanks House, Bures Road** [DC/21/06038] for extensions, chimney re-builds and replacement windows; and at **New Farm, Harpers Hill** [DC/21/06752] relating to DC/19/02881 for non material amendments to enable introduction of entrance canopies, revision to fenestrations, amendment to the roof of Plot 4 and minor internal arrangements.

Works to trees had been granted at **39 Fen Street** [DC/1/06435] for works to trees to fell 1 scots pine and replant 3 heritage fruit trees near southern fence and at **High Garth House**, **Cawley Road** [DC/21/06613] for works to trees to crown raise a beech

Listed building consent had been granted at **9 Bear Street** [DC/21/06577] to remove failing cement-based render and replace with traditional breathable hair chalk plaster; at **Bear House**, **Bear Street** [DC/21/04109 & 04077] for alterations to fenestration and lobby; and at **Mill House**, **12 Mill Street** [DC/21/06086 & 06087] for rear extension and internal alterations to existing house.

Permission was refused at **12 Stoke Road** [DC/21/06491 & 06621] for creation of parking space and associated; grounds for refusal included that the proposals would cause harm to the setting of grade II listed buildings 10 and 12 Stoke Road set within a conservation area.

The Parish Council had objected to an application at **Harpers Hill Farm**, **Harpers Hill** [DC/22/00129] for erection of 4m high concrete fire walls (part retrospective) as they have seen no evidence that this will minimise the noise and litter escaping from the site; the wall would look unsightly, even with extensive planting; the site is in a prominent and sensitive location in an AONB. The PC would like to see monitoring reports from the Environment Agency which so far have not been made available to them. Melanie Barrett confirmed that this application would go before the County Council Planning.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections to listed building applications at **Campions Farm**, **Campions Hill** [DC/22/00226] for insertion of soil and vent pipe in conjunction with formation of ensuite and creation of loft hatch to roof void; and at **10 Mill Street** [DC/22/00593 & 591] for installation of French doors and window and creation of downstairs WC.

An exhibition regarding the Pylons Consultation would be held at the Village Hall on Friday 25th February. Gerry Battye was concerned about the impact on the road network during

construction. It was noted that a major site compound will be sited near the border with Leavenheath Parish. Mary George agreed to work on a draft response for consideration at the March PC meeting: the deadline is 21st March.

It was agreed to log a response regarding the night flights Consultation for Stansted Airport; deadline is 3rd March. The PC are concerned with any detrimental noise impact on the AONB and will ask for notification of any planned changes to night flight manoeuvres over our Parish.

HIGHWAYS

James Finch explained about the forthcoming drainage works. These are due to start in April and continue until August; all those directly affected will get advance notice.

Mary George explained an opportunity to get involved in a speed detection project on Stoke Road. In view of the drainage works, this has been delayed until the Autumn. In relation to the Quiet Lanes request in the Public Forum, it was resolved to back their request in extending the scheme to Wormingford Mill

OPEN SPACES

There has been an application from our local branch of the Royal British Legion for permission to erect something to commemorate their Centenary. Caley Green was one of their preferred locations. The principle was agreed subject to further discussion between meetings.

CALEY GREEN

James Finch said talks are ongoing between SCC as landowners and the Environment Agency who need to give permission for any works to the river. Natural growth in the river is strongly encouraged, however, this does not necessarily allow for fishing rights.

STREET LIGHTING

Concern was expressed about the quality of new lighting on the Heights. A light out in Bear Street near Parkers Way will be reported.

ALLOTMENTS

It was agreed to ask the grazier to treat the Allotment Field for Ragwort. There is a proposal for a long low slope to replace the steps and to help with the boggy ground. It was agreed to set up a joint project team with representatives from the PC and the owner of Bell Meadow. The Footpath Warden and Suffolk Right of Way will be consulted.

PC MEETINGS & PARISH ASSEMBLY

It was agreed to book the committee room for Parish Council meetings from April onwards. Ned Cartwright is confident about setting up the committee room for hybrid meetings. The Parish Assembly will be held on Monday 25th April in the main hall.

WALSH TRUST CHARITY

The charity gives out Christmas bonuses to those in the parish over 80; Gerry Battye said it is becoming increasingly difficult to fulfill their objectives and a special trust meeting was planned.

STORM DAMAGE

Councillors heard there had been considerable storm damage to trees; much of this has been dealt with and financial details will be included at the next meeting. Damage to several trees along Horkesley Road and a tree on private land have been reported. A large number of small twigs and branches were strewn over Caley Green; the contractors have removed some of these. A tree which came down on Candy Lane has been dealt with.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted listed building consent at **Campions Farm Campions Hill** [DC/22/00226] for insertion of soil and vent pipe in conjunction with formation of ensuite and creation of loft hatch to roof void; at **16 Court Street** [DC/21/06872] for insertion of French doors (following removal of infill rear extension and existing window and door); and at **Bear House, Bear Street** [DC/21/04077] for alterations to the fenestration on the west facing elevation on the internal courtyard and infill of an internal facing lobby as detailed within the design and access statement and [DC/21/04109] for erection of single storey rear extension by way of infilling of a lobby area and alterations to fenestration on the ground floor west facing.

The application at **Harpers Hill Farm Harpers Hill** [DC/22/00129] for erection of 4m high concrete fire walls (part retrospective) has been withdrawn.

Discussing recent applications councilors had no objections at **Rushbanks House Bures Road** [DC/22/00804] for erection of single storey side extension and two storey rear extension (following removal of existing conservatory) or at **Hillside 14 Stoke Road** [DC/22/00983] for works to trees in a Conservation Area to fell a chestnut tree and replace with a quercus fastigiata.

A draft response for the Pylons Consultation has been compiled; deadline for submission is 21st March.

HIGHWAYS

James Finch said details of road closures in Nayland from April to August due to the drainage works have been confirmed and can now be published. Mary George pointed out 200 households will be affected and will be notified by SCC Highways.

Mary George said it is hoped that inspection and cleaning of the War Memorial, Milestone and Trough can be completed this summer ahead of the Jubilee and Centenary of the Nayland branch of the RBL.

FAIRFIELD RECREATION GROUND

The family of the late Margaret Underwood, a popular former local teacher and parish councillor, are raising funds with a target of £3,000 for a memorial to her on Fairfield Recreation Ground. Councillors were very grateful to the family for this offer and will consider ideas for a suitable memorial.

As the nesting season has begun facing up of the hedge will be delayed until July.

CALEY GREEN

Mary George said the working party has not met and has no updates since the last PC meeting. There have been no positive responses from contractors or suppliers following the PC's request for information and advice; one did not respond and one declined to assist. It was suggested that the complexity of the project may have put them off. A reminder of the request will be sent.

PC MEETINGS & PARISH ASSEMBLY

PC meetings will return to being held in the committee room of the village hall from April; Zoom facilities will be available.

The Parish Assembly will be held on Monday 25th April in the main hall; Zoom facilities are not viable for this. Mary George suggested that this Parish Assembly will be concerned with 'catching up' on the last two years, therefore a speaker will not be arranged. Instead councillors will answer resident's questions on a wide range of issues. There will be information to convey regarding road closures, Caley Green, etc; it was suggested this will be available to view ahead of the meeting commencing.

VILLAGE HALL

A resident has offered to arrange and pay for crown reduction to a Prunus tree on the boundary of their property and the village hall. This was agreed in principle but will be delegated to the Tree Warden and committee for consideration between meetings.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Orders for Jubilee mugs, which are free for children of the parish, have been promoted. Patricia Wilkie represents the Parish Council on the Street Party planning committee.

IN MEMORY OF MARGARET UNDERWOOD:

a very special local teacher - 12 April 1931 to 10 February 2022

Margaret Underwood lived most of her adult life in Nayland. She loved the village, and along with her husband Brian, she raised her four boys there. Although since having moved away from the area, her children would often return throughout the years, later bringing their own children to play in the village, walk by the river, and enjoy the sites that were such a key part of their own childhood.

Margaret spent most of her adult life working at what was then Stoke-by-Nayland Middle School and to this day is fondly remembered by colleagues and former pupils alike. She became the Head of Special Educational Needs at the school and relished the opportunity to help those children who sometimes struggled with schoolwork. Nothing made her happier than to see children with special educational needs enjoying school and realising their own potential. She believed passionately that all children should be given equal opportunities in life. Margaret is survived by her four sons, and seven grandchildren.

As a lasting legacy to her memory, her family have chosen to raise funds for the Nayland Recreation Ground, where Margaret's children and then grandchildren have spent so many happy hours. If you would like to donate to this fund,

CHAIR'S REPORT by Rachel Hitchcock.

2021 has been my fourth year as Chair and once again it has not been a 'normal' year as Covid continued to impact our community and our activities. I am therefore particularly proud of what we have been able to achieve under difficult circumstances.

This report is an opportunity to highlight the many and varied activities of the Community Council (CC) and to put in a plug for you to consider joining our enthusiastic and welcoming committee. New ideas and a few extra pairs of hands are always welcome. In return you can be assured that you will be giving something back to your local community.

Thanks, as always, to all members of the CC for their many contributions throughout the year and to the executive committee in particular - many of whom have been a part of the CC for many years - Ken Willingale, Bryan Smith, Julie Clark, Lorraine Brooks, Lesley Jameson, Claire Buller, Iain Wright, Tricia Hall, Vicki Sargent, Luke Rumbelow, Jo Metson, Maggie Ryan, Kate Bevan and Sophie Williams as well as our Parish Council representatives. Recognition goes to Lorraine Brooks for her exceptional organisational efforts which contribute greatly to the smooth running of committee affairs and also to Lesley Jameson, our Treasurer of nearly two years who is moving on to pastures new. Lesley joined the committee at a difficult time when our meetings were being held on Zoom and our activities were somewhat curtailed. Despite the challenges, she has thrown herself wholeheartedly into the work of the Community Council and quickly become an active and valued member of our committee. We will miss her and wish her well for the future, however, we are pleased to welcome Matt Cable as our new Treasurer at this AGM and thank him for stepping into the role.

What does the Community Council do?

- represents and brings together a membership of over 22 village societies in one organisation;
- fundraises in order to support many village activities and organisations;
- funds or co-ordinates projects that are of benefit to the community, such as the public access defibrillator;
- organises events throughout the year that are a focal point of the village calendar;
- provides valuable communication through the Community Times.
 Thank you to all of you who have contributed to these efforts over the past year. And thank you to all the village organisations and societies who ensure that Nayland and Wiston have such full social calendars!

Thank you to everybody who helps with all the CC events, especially the committee who organise them! This year is no exception and it is to the credit of everybody involved that we only had to cancel one of our regular, annual events – the Village Quiz - during 2021 despite the challenges posed by Covid.

Bonfire Night: 1400 people came to our community firework display which took place, as usual, on 5th November. This year, for the first time, we commissioned a professional display which was carried out by Dynamic Fireworks. We took this decision because the display has grown hugely in recent years so this enabled us to focus our efforts and resources on catering for and managing the increasing number of visitors. Huge thanks are due to Iain Wright who has managed the display for many years and has firmly established it as the main fundraiser in the Community Council calendar. We would also like to thank Fred Bugg for the bonfire, the Year 6 class at Nayland Primary School for the very impressive guy and everybody who helped on the gate, stalls and refreshments - Bonfire Night is a real team effort! We were also pleased, this year, to be able to use the new ticketing website, naylandevents.org (ably managed and set up by Justin Dowding) which made both ticket sales and managing the gate far more efficient. Village shops, Kerridge's and ForgetMe-Not, as well the Post Office were also invaluable in their support, selling tickets (which were in high demand!) on our behalf. Jingle Bells Coffee Morning: The Jingle Bells Coffee morning replaced our annual Christmas Fayre this year, being a slightly scaled down version of the event, allowing us to run it safely given the ongoing Covid restrictions. Village societies including Woodland Corner, the Women's Institute, the Horticultural Society, the Conservation Society, and Lizzie's Fund provided a fine array of stalls and we are very grateful to the children and staff of Nayland Primary School whose School Choir and Ukelele group provided some lovely festive entertainment. Thank you too to Father Christmas for paying us a visit again. Despite masks and slightly chilly ventilation everyone who came along agreed it was great start to the festive season.

Father Christmas, Christmas Eve Village Tour: Following the success of last year's tour around the village, Father Christmas once again put in an appearance kindly chauffeured by Foster Jones in his wonderful vintage Humber. Huge thanks to Father Christmas and his willing helpers for this very special visit.

Christmas Trail: A new event in 2020, we were delighted to bring back the Christmas Trail of Trees, Wreaths and Advent Windows this year. It certainly achieved the aim of, once again, bringing Christmas cheer to the village throughout December and we are incredibly grateful to everyone who participated and helped make this such a success

Village Christmas Tree: Once again, thanks to Fred Smith for supplying an excellent tree which provided a lovely, sparkly centrepiece for the village throughout December. Thank you too to Nayland Dental Surgery for supplying the electricity and of course to Claire Buller and the team who put it up. Being bigger and better than ever meant the tree did provide its challenges!

Village Quiz: With the emphasis on fun, and an air of good-humoured competition, the quiz has become a regular fixture in the Nayland calendar - although cancelled in 2021 I am pleased to say it made a happy return in 2022 with a fantastic turnout.

Nayland 10k and Fun Run: We were again pleased to support this event – organised by Luke Rumbelow and Event Nation. It was fantastic that it was able to go ahead after the trials of lockdown. A proportion of the profits from the event – which included a 10k, 5k and 1k run – is donated to local charities including the CC. We were extremely grateful to receive a donation of over £1000 in 2021 which helps us in our efforts to support a wide range of community activities.

GRANTS: One of the roles of the CC is to provide grants to village organisations and individuals whose activities support our constitution. Community groups are reminded that funds are available to support village activities. GOING FORWARD: I remain committed to the work of the CC but am stepping back from my role as Chair once a new volunteer (or volunteers – we have agreed that the role can be shared) has come forward. Whilst I am keen to stay involved in the committee it would be great to have a new Chair to bring fresh eyes and renewed vigour! It really is a pleasure to be part of the CC and a new Chair would have the full support of a friendly, enthusiastic and active committee.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Lesley Jameson presented the year end accounts for the meeting - see income and expenditure statement and balance sheet opposite. There was a healthy balance of funds. Lesley thanked the CC for the gift and said she is heartbroken to have to leave Nayland; she was grateful for the friendship she found here and will miss us all. Rachel expressed a huge thank you to Lesley for her enthusiastic commitment, especially through the challenging period of Covid; we will miss Lesley but wish her well in Lincolnshire. Lesley was

Matt Cable was welcomed and gave his report on this year's finances to 28th February: Breakdown of profits: Community Times £398, Quiz £393.96, Village Calendar £6.88. Grants: Nayland Choir £128. We also received £270.36 as a return of grant funds provided to the Post Office project. Expenses: Village Hall hire £54 and mugs for the Jubilee celebration £1,047.44. Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £32,888.95 represented by Deposit a/c £10,729.36, Current a/c £21,749.55, Stripe a/c £117.12, Cash in Hand £292.92. We hold £268.50 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, Lizzie's Fund Walk £201. Therefore, unencumbered assets are £22,419.45



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

Community Council Chair, Rachel Hitchcock said: "It was a very successful evening and everyone had a great time."





The Environment Agency (EA) state: any environmental incidents should be reported to their 24 hour hotline number: 0800 80 70 60.

WATER LEVELS

On the whole water levels seem to have maintained their seasonal norm and the flood channel doing its job when necessary of diverting high water levels away from the village. However, this wasn't the case during the storms -Storm Eunice on 18 February and Storm Franklin on 20 - 21 February - when the village experienced power-cuts. This prevented the automated control of the sluice gates from working. When the EA were alerted to this residents were told that there was also a problem with the manual control. They eventually brought in a generator to solve the problem. This caused the fields along Water Lane to flood with water backed up from the sluice gates.

Once that problem was rectified, residents were shocked to see the water levels along Bear Street drop very low; so low that there was no flow over the Mill Street weir into Mill Stream along Fen Street. With the water levels so low it revealed just how silted up this stretch of the river is. The EA say this is not a problem and will not cause flooding, but residents point out: if you half fill a pint glass with sand, you will not get a pint of fluid in it.

The Parish Council said they would ask the EA to ensure the sluice gates are properly maintained to prevent this problem arising again.

AVIAN INFLUENZA (BIRD FLU)

During February residents will have received a warning from DEFRA regarding an outbreak of Avian Influenza locally. Continue to be aware of possible signs of Bird Flu. If you find dead wild waterfowl (swans, geese or ducks) or other dead wild birds you should report them to the DEFRA helpline on 03459 335577. There seem to be a number of ducks on the river which is pleasing to see; in this photograph there was a visit from a

As reported by the Friends of Caley Green on page 27, the two pairs of local swans have been toing and froing and changing territories. Currently the Wiston swans have left leaving the pair with a remaining cygnet on the river here. It is unusual for a cygnet to still be with its parents as they usually send their offspring packing before they start mating, which begs the question have this pair mated? The Wiston pair were seen mating in late January.

THE MYSTERY OF THE CYGNET'S RING

This brings me to ask if any residents can solve the mystery of how the cygnet that was bred in Nayland last year is suddenly wearing a red identification ring?

SWAN UPPING

Usually the ringing of swans is done only in certain locations and as part of a project or annual survey; this is known as Swan Upping.

Marked swans are generally fitted with two rings each, one is a metal ring (BTO ring) and the second is a large plastic ring (Darvic ring) with a unique series of letters/and or numbers are easy identified in the water.





An annual ceremony of Swan Upping is conducted on the River Thames during the third week of July.

By prerogative right, the British Crown enjoys ownership of all unmarked mute swans in open water. Swan upping is the traditional means by which the swans on the Thames are apportioned among the three proprietors. Over five days, the Queen's, Vintners' and the Dyers' respective swan uppers row up the river in skiffs in recent centuries from Sunbury-on-Thames to Abingdon on Thames.

Swans caught by the Queen's swan uppers under the direction of the Swan Marker are left unmarked, except for a lightweight ring linked to the database of the British Trust for Ornithology (BTO). Those caught by the Dyers and Vintners receive a similar ring on the other leg.

CALEY GREEN

Thankfully the Green did not lose any trees during the storms at the end of February; it was littered with small branches and twigs which were soon cleared up. Since then the Green has been looking lovely in the spring sunshine. It has been well used, including by the children of Woodland Corner as seen in this photograph. Anglers have enjoyed fishing round the bay during recent months; it has been quieter so they remained undisturbed.

PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE

At the March Parish Council meeting Mary George reported that the Caley Green Working Party had not met since January and had no news to report.

They had contacted some contractors/suppliers for information and advice on the options available for the bay but had have received no positive responses; one did not respond and one declined to assist. A councillor suggested that the complexity of the project may have put them off.

THE LONG REED BED

At the February PC meeting James Finch said talks are ongoing between Suffolk County Council as landowners and the Environment Agency who need to give permission for any works to the river. There was no mention of the situation at the March meeting.

As this photograph reminds us the bed of Norfolk reeds, even in winter, remains a thick barrier; it will become ever thicker this summer.

THE CULVERT

During the storms in late February and problems with the sluice gates water levels along this part of the river became extremely low. This exposed just how much silt has accumulated in the river and at the mouth of the culvert - as pictured. The mouth of the culvert is also partially hampered by expanding reed beds. The Parish Council asked SCC to clear the mouth of the culvert; this has not been attended to yet.

In the meantime the Friends and other residents eagerly await the next step taken and further proposals by the Parish Council and Suffolk County Council.





The pressure of water flow from the culvert has redirected the water flow around the reed bed and carved out a channel through the silt. The black layer beneath the lighter coloured silt is vegetation that has broken down; this clogs up the river bed.



FISHING ROD LICENCES

A valid rod licence must be carried if you are aged 13 or over and fish for salmon, trout, freshwater fish, smelt or eel or you could be prosecuted and you can be fined up to £2,500.

A yearly 2-rod course fishing licence costs: £30 for adults, £20 for over 65 or the disabled and is free for 13-16 year olds. I-day or 8-day licences are also available. Licences can be purchased at Post Offices, online at https://www.gov.uk/fishinglicences/buy-a-fishing-licence or by telephone to the Environment Agency fishing licence service on 0344 800 5386



All craft must be registered to take to the water on any part of the Inland Waterway network of England. The Environment Agency takes enforcement action if it finds any boat moored or in use if it is not displaying a current, valid registration plate.

The River Stour Trust can issue craft registrations on behalf of the Environment Agency. Registered craft are permitted to travel the whole length of the Stour Navigation, from Brundon Mill to Cattawade. The annual fee (1 Apr-31 Mar) is £44.20 per private unpowered craft. Monthly and weekly licences are available.

Alternatively, membership of British Canoeing includes a licence for many waterways in England. They have a number of membership plans: individual adult costs £45. Membership covers the member and not the craft.

Wherever you obtain your licence you need to carry proof with you when you paddle; if you don't have proof when you're asked you could face a hefty fine.

Stag beetles require decaying wood to complete their lifecycle. Eggs are laid underground by dead wood, and the larva (or grub) will spend up to 4 - 7 years inside slowly growing in size.

The short lived adults emerge in summer and generally die after mating and laying their eggs.



ROADWORKS FOR MAJOR DRAINAGE IMPROVEMENTS

As many of our Nayland residents are aware, there has been a history of highway and property flooding within the village.

Suffolk Highways is soon to commence with a drainage improvement scheme, on behalf of Suffolk County Council to improve the problem. By the time you are reading this, you should have received a notification from Suffolk Highways detailing the works. For those of you who haven't received direct communication, we have issued the full details below. We will also provide regular updates in future magazine editions.

The works are due to commence on Monday 4 April 2022, continuing until 5 August 2022.

The project team have been planning this scheme months ahead of the start date and have considered the village fete and any Platinum Jubilee planned events. Whilst most of the works will take place Monday to Friday, except for bank holidays, works may continue into a Saturday.

There will be no road closure in place until after our annual village fete, and to allow residents to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee, the Mill Street closure will remain to allow a street party along the High Street, without any fees or application being required.

The first phase of the works will take place off the highway, within the gardens of two residential properties, followed by 4 additional phases: Mill Street, Bear Street, Birch Street and Gravel Hill/Stoke Road, Nayland.

• On-street parking directly outside properties will be restricted, however every effort will be made to allow on-street parking

nearby. Local parking is available, including some space in the village hall car park when there is no major event being

- 'Business open as usual' signs will be in place for the duration of the work. If you have any specific access requirements, including deliveries, please inform Suffolk Highways as early as possible to ensure disruption can be kept to a minimum.
- Vehicular access to businesses and properties will be maintained: however, maybe temporarily restricted during each road closure. Staff will be on site to advise of the restrictions and arrangements at the point you require access or egress.
- Temporary pedestrian walkways will be always provided around the work site.
- A storage compound and welfare facilities area will be operational from 4 April 2022. The site will be based on the Stoke Road public green, where machinery will be travelling to and from throughout the works. Prior to the start date, an area will be fenced off and a temporary surface will be installed using crushed materials. The area will be reinstated to its original state on completion.

The teams have advised that should there be changes to the work dates, the information signs on site and web page will be updated at www.suffolk.gov.uk/NaylandDrainageScheme or via Twitter @Suff_highways.





Our latest book is 'Piranesi' by Susanna Clarke, which we will be discussing in a few weeks time.



VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING: 2nd March CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

We come to the end of another year within the life of the Village Hall and I am pleased to note that the use of the hall is continuing apace with additional bookings, together with those regular village users.

Firstly, I must thank the whole of the Village Hall Management Committee for their diligent and excellent work throughout the year. The Management Committee now comprises of 5 people, with most of the committee tackling at least two jobs. It would benefit the village if we had some new members of the VHMC to assist with the work load and, in that respect, I am looking for volunteers.

It would be very wrong to single out any one person within the committee for the good work they have carried out but, on your behalf, I can assure you there are many inspections of the fire alarms, general condition of the hall, in addition to any other repairs that are drawn to our attention.

Our Treasurer, Peter Mann, has been truly magnificent in obtaining a substantial number of Covid related grants from the Government. This money has been used wisely to carry out maintenance on the village hall and to keep it ready for action during the pandemic.

I am pleased to report that your village hall is now fully open for all users without any of the Covid 19 restrictions.

We are also grateful to the Community Council for a grant of £10,000 towards the cost of external door maintenance and I am pleased to confirm that the external doors to the boiler house, Community Council store and general store are being replaced, together with new front doors. The new front doors will operate using a different lock and keys will be distributed in due course.

Peter will speak later about the years Accounts, has steered us through another difficult year and I hope, when you hear his presentation, you will understand a bit more about the hall's finances

Although I am no gardener myself, I am always very pleased to see the results of the Village Hall Gardening parties and huge thanks from the Committee to those who take part.

We also have the benefit of the Village Lunches which are

re-starting on Wednesday 6th April and which rely on several ladies, and some gentlemen, to assist with the production and delivery of the food and the setting out of tables and chairs. Our thanks go to them and their contribution to the well-being of the village hall finances is very important.

I am also pleased to report that the Village Hall Cinema will recommence with effect from 22nd April.

Our thanks go to Gary and Hannah Clarke for their contribution to the cleaning and well-being of the hall. The time spent keeping the village hall ship-shape is very important to the committee and the many users of the hall to enjoy clean and tidy premises. Unfortunately Gary and Hannah will be leaving their role as Caretakers at the end of the month.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The result for the year ending 31.12.21, show an income of £23,912 and expenditure of £19,505 (excluding depreciation of £1108), which gives a surplus of £4407 for the year.

Balance sheet items are as follows: Endowment Deposit £14,829, 'Own' Deposit £19,284, Bank £15,050, Cash £366, Debtors £0, Assets £13,745.

2021 was another strange year, with the hall effectively closed for 7 months. We were, however, able to hold a Village Lunch and open the Village Cinema, which gave a profit of £545 and £148 respectively (many thanks to all concerned). The Village Players were also able to put on a performance of 'Absurd Person Singular', which generated hire income of £845. Hall income does include Government Covid grants from Babergh District Council totalling £12,192, which were very well received.

With regard to expenditure, particular items include a total of £3909 to upgrade the electrical and lighting (LED) circuits of the hall.

Finally, it should be noted that the hall building and land (which are very significant village assets) do not feature in these accounts, as they are owned by the Parish Council, but leased and managed on their behalf by the VHMC.

ELECTION OF COMMITTEE

Members of the VHMC were re-elected: lain Wright (Chair), Chris Thompson (Secretary), Peter Mann (Treasurer), Nick Moriarty, Corinne Barr, Dawn Harris (Parish Council rep)

Rachel Hitchcock thanked members of the VHMC for their hard work and care of the hall.

The VHMC AGM was held in the Village Hall immediately after the Community Council AGM. You cannot begin to imagine the disappointment felt by the VHMC when the bulk of the previous audience walked out and left a few members of the Parish Council and the Community Council present.

I take this opportunity to remind everybody that the village hall is owned by the Parish Council and operated by the VHMC for the benefit of the residents of Nayland with Wissington. There is no point in striving to ensure the hall is ready and fit for purpose if the residents of the Parish do not at least turn up to the AGM.

The VHMC do require the support of all residents and this should be demonstrated by attendance at the AGM.

There is further cause for disappointment within the VHMC and that is, despite the Committee trying to organise a Village Festival for the August Bank Holiday weekend, there seems to be no appetite for this event which is disappointing simply because it was an attempt to fund raise for the replacement roof and also to have some fun at the same time.

For the record, there would have been no costs incurred for the set up of the field with tents, stage, cooking and a beer tent. There would have been entertainment from 1pm through to 11.30pm on one of the days. This lack of support for the event is a very significant disappointment to the Committee.

The Village Hall will require to be re-roofed in the near future to prevent future water leaks and ensure the village hall is available for all.

Garden Notes

Several years ago the OM/S made a resolution to submit his articles to the Editor in good time. Unfortunately like many good intentions it somehow doesn't always work out, and the present article, like many ot its predecessors, has been produced at the last minute.

We don't seem to get really cold winters here any longer, (although I gather there have been some frosts down in Nayland) and everything seems to be appearing early. The primroses (originally prime roses) are living up to their name by flowering profusely in the damp grass by the side of the house. In the orchard the Narcissi are having one of their best years; some time ago the OM/S counted about 15 different varieties.

Offering some to a local Church Warden the OM/S was suitably ashamed when told that it was the season of Lent, and therefore hardly suitable.

The first Cyclamen are already in flower, mostly the small C. Coum. The OM/S, who admittedly has a classical education, always wants to correct those who pronounce it COOM. It is a dissyllable Co-um, in other words pertaining to the island of Cos in the Mediterranean, although probably found more widely growing in Turkey. These little Cyclamen are good value, spreading themselves in two ways; firstly by the so coiled spring of seed heads, and secondly by their stickiness which enables them to attach to ants, and therefore travel some distance.

Among shrubs the Daphne Odora will soon be in flower; this is a useful subject, long lived, eventually becoming a woody old thing, but living up to its name and giving off a strong scent.

The OM/S is not a very enthusiastic vegetable grower, but he always grows a few early potatoes, and has just planted a few of the fairly old variety, Home Guard.

TWO SUFFOLK SURVEYS

Over the years there have been many reference books published about the history of Suffolk. The oldest one I have is a first edition of *The Suffolk Traveller* which was given to me by an old friend many years ago. This fascinating little leather bound book measures only 4" x 7" and was printed and published in 1735. It was written by John Kirby (1690 – 1753), a land surveyor and topographer who lived in Wickham Market, and is particularly interesting as it is believed to be the first road book published for Suffolk.

John Kirby undertook a survey of the whole county in the years 1732, 1733 and 1734. He measured the distance of roads from lpswich and Bury St Edmunds to every market town in Suffolk and also the distance of the roads from one village to another. In the book he included notes of interest for travellers about the many churches and historic houses along the routes and also a short historical account of antiquities such as castles, monasteries etc in every town. We have to remember that in the 1730s the survey would no doubt have been undertaken on horseback or perhaps by horse and carriage on poor rutted roads and it could not have been an easy task.

Large towns such as Ipswich, Bury St Edmunds and Woodbridge are described first and then the villages are listed in their old medieval Hundreds which the county was still divided up into at that time. These areas took their names from remote settlements and features such as river crossings or major highways and very few of these historic names still exist. However one name which survives today is the Hundred of Babergh in which Nayland is situated. Babergh District Council have tried to drop this historic name but after public opposition fortunately have not succeeded.

The Suffolk Traveller entry for Nayland reads:

NEYLAND, a Town situate on the Stour over which it has a fair Bridge leading into Essex; it is tolerably well built and inhabited. The Church and Spire Steeple standing near the middle of the Town are good Ornament to it. The Woolen Manufacture has flourished here, but now not so much as formerly yet the Inhabitants at present imploy themselves in making Bays and Says. Here is a mean Market weekly on Fridays, and one Fair Yearly on September the 2.


The eighteenth century when this book was published was an era of change in Suffolk. The woollen cloth trade which had made the community here so prosperous and when many of our timber-framed houses were built, was dying out and the Industrial Revolution was sweeping the country. Communication and transport were becoming more important and this road book must have been very useful for travellers. Mr Kirby included only one small map of the county but by 1764 when the second edition was published, with "Many alterations and large Additions by Several Hands", more maps of main roads were included.

SIR NIKOLAUS PEVSNER (1902 - 1983)

More than two hundred years later, in 1957, another ground-breaking survey took place in Suffolk, this time by motor car on much improved roads. This survey was undertaken by Nikolaus Pevsner who was born in 1902 in Leipzig, Germany, into a Russian-Jewish family. He pursued an academic career in Germany but when in 1933 Jews were no longer permitted to teach in German universities he came to England.

Here, over a long and amazingly industrious career he became an authority on English art and architecture, so much so that his county-by-county series of 46 books on *The Buildings of England* is usually referred to simply as 'Pevsner'. These were all published between 1951 and 1974. After the war increasing numbers of people had begun to tour the countryside by car and several county guides had been published but before Pevsner there had never been any with serious architectural information.

Pevsner toured Suffolk with his wife in 1957, visiting every building of note, and the first edition of *Suffolk* was published in 1961. His opening words in the foreword to the first edition were: 'Work in Suffolk has been a pleasure throughout. The



weather was clement, the natives friendly, the scenery and buildings a delight'. The second edition was revised in 1974 and in 2015 the third edition was fully revised and expanded. Pevsner's *Suffolk* now consists of two volumes, *Suffolk West* and *Suffolk East*.

In the original version Nayland warranted only a short entry but in the 2015 edition 5 pages are given to it. This revision was produced long after Pevsner's death in 1983 and since then of course much further investigation has taken place by other experts. James Bettley was responsible for this latest edition but Pevsner remains the founding editor.

After a general historical paragraph about Nayland, including Court Knoll, there is a detailed description of St James' Church and then a perambulation around the village. There is a detailed plan and description of Alston Court and descriptions of many other buildings of architectural interest: houses and cottages in Court Street, High Street, Fen Street, Mill Street, Bear Street, Birch Street, the White Hart and Queen's Head.

In the 1970s I was fortunate to hear Nikolaus Pevsner give a lecture on architecture at the University of Essex. Soon afterwards I acquired his first *Suffolk* book and now have the latest edition. Pevsner's books continue to be of great interest to anyone with an interest in historic buildings.

WEATHER SUMMARY: January & February 2022 Weather Report by David Lowe

Four records were broken in **January**. 15.7 $^{\circ}$ C on the 1st was the highest by a significant margin – 0.9. $^{\circ}$ C . The average max is 12.9 $^{\circ}$ C. Secondly, rainfall was exceptionally low – almost half the previous minimum of 23.0 mm – at 12.0 mm. Thirdly, sun hours were 84.3 (64.73) and solar energy 2050 Ly (1798.46)

These records reflect the strong influence of high pressure during the month – sometimes feeding very warm air up from the tropics – and killing off rainfall. Mostly circulating cool air, but nothing cold. It was often cloudy, though.

Mean temperature for the month was 4.9° C (4.32) with a minimum of 3.5 $^{\circ}$ C. Lowest max was 3.8 $^{\circ}$ C (1.98).

There were 15 (14.61) ground frosts and, additionally, 6 grass frosts.

Bright sun hours were as above, 84.3 (64.73) and solar radiation 2050 Ly (1798.46). Evapotranspiration was 18.05 mm (15.18).

I have already commented on the low rainfall – there were no days with 10 or more mm (1.08). Highest rainfall rate was 52.8 (37.8) though there were two short bursts that probably exceeded that.

Wind average was 4.6 mph (4.25) with highest gust of 38 mph (37). Highest daily average was 10.9 mph (10.14). There was only one day over 30 mph (4.54). The prevailing direction was SW.

February's weather was dominated by a westerly flow between high pressure to the south and low pressure systems to the north. Sometimes the high was prevalent – sometimes the low - drier and calmer weather translating to windier and wetter. There was no cold weather at all.

The month threw up a number of interesting statistics – it was the warmest February over the 14 year record period with a mean of 7.2° C (average 5.13). The lowest daily max was 7.6° C (average 2.91) and it was very short on all forms of frost.

Monthly rain at 66 mm was the third highest, while the wind gust of 59 mph on the 18th broke the previous record of 48 mph in 2019 cleanly. Average day wind speed was also highest at 15.8 mph (11.59) with 2020 reaching 15.4 mph. Evapotranspiration at 42.6 mm was a record (by 0.1mm).


Looking at the statistics more generally, the highest temp was 15.9° C (14.24) and the lowest -1.1°C (-3.2). There was only 1 air frost, (6.5) 3 ground (11.14) and 2 additional grass frosts. On no day did the temperature fail to make 5° C (0.36) and on 12, it failed to make 10° C (17.71).

Bright sun hours were 133.8 (118.29) and Solar Energy 3750 Ly (3225.36).

Highest rainfall in a day was 9mm (10.87) and highest rainfall rate 75.2 mm (30.91).

Average wind strength was 8.1 mph (5.19) and behind 2020 at 8.9 mph. While 2022 had the windiest day by far, other 2022/2020 statistics were - days over 30 mph 11/15, days over 35 mph 7/12 and days over 40 mph 5 each. Averages for over 30/35/40 are 4.43/2.29/1.07.
