NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting : 8th June 2022

PUBLIC FORUM

L Brooks suggested that there appeared to be some confusion over implementation of the Caley Green Banner Policy and asked the PC to clarify the policy and as village groups are experiencing poor attendance post Covid whether they would consider extending the current 7 day period; the Chairman confirmed this was already scheduled to be discussed under Open Spaces.

A representative from Friends of Caley Green asked about the planned bins to go on Caley Green in relation to the liner bag size; Mary George noted the concerns raised.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Melanie Barrett is taking special care to ensure the planned weed-killing does not affect the hollyhocks in the village. Mary George suggested that the latest sweep by Babergh operatives was not thorough; she was asked to take photos to demonstrate issues if this happens again.

Gerry Battye raised a fly-tipping incident between Nayland and Bures which had been reported between meetings.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at **New Farm, Harpers Hill** [*DC*/22/01565] for discharge of conditions for DC/17/04206- condition 5 (lighting design scheme); at **Bear House, Bear Street** [*DC*/22/01630] for discharge of conditions for DC/21/04077- condition 3 (fenestration); at **9 Bear Street** [*DC*/22/02088] for discharge of conditions for DC/21/06577 - condition 3 (timber and brickwork repairs) and at **New Farm, Harpers Hill** [*DC*/22/01538] for erection of new boundary fence and hedge facing A134 Harpers Hill.

A listed building application at **18 Court Street** [*DC*/22/01599] for injection DPC, replastering and repairs to external render has been withdrawn.

Between meetings councillors had no objections at **Farthing Hall Cawley Road** [*DC/22/02488*] for construction of horse arena (manège) with associated perimeter fencing.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at **Stour House 23 Court Street** [DC/22/02610] for works to trees subject to TPO WS328/T7: remove overhanging branches of 1 Whitebeam (T1) and prune higher branches; fell 1 Ash (T2); fell 1 Yew (T3); reduce Limb of 1 Maple back to fence line; remove overhanging branches of group of trees (G7)

Details of an appeal had been received against refusal of permission to extend **Rushbanks House**, **Bures Road** [*DC*/22/00804]; councillors agreed they stand by the original comments submitted to this application.

HIGHWAYS

Hazards of trees on Harpers Hill and the dangers of the overgrown verges to our grounds maintenance contractors have been reported to SCC. A dead tree on Horkesley Road has been reported.

A quote is expected soon in relation to the cleaning of the War Memorial.

The PC had raised H&S hazards relating to the bus stops on the A134 with SCC Transport Manager; the response was not considered to be satisfactory. It was agreed to ask for a site meeting via James Finch.

Emails and photographs relating to the damaged verges in Wiston will be forwarded to SCC.

OPEN SPACES

The investigations continue for play equipment in memory of Margaret Underwood. Suggestions have been made following a notice in Community Times. The School and Woodland Corner children will also be consulted. Gerry Battye confirmed the importance of minimising any disruption to neighbouring residents in relation to any changes proposed.

Some posts are being replaced in the playpark fencing. The Recreation working group will meet to consider the hedge cutting which is scheduled this year.

CALEY GREEN

Mary George reported that the Caley Green working party are redrafting a new letter to request information from contractors and are reviewing the list of potential contractors.

In relation to the long reed bed, the SCC land department will be attending in August to work on the long term management plan. This plan will be discussed with the Parish Council.

Correspondence had been received between meetings regarding the need to clear reeds round the weir. Members agreed with residents concerns and it was agreed to write to the Environment Agency supporting those points.

A resident had written regarding the Caley Green banner policy and the importance of supporting village organisations as they return following COVID. Members were supportive of the request. Tricia Fuller explained the original policy requirements was suggested by SCC Highways largely to avoid distraction to drivers. Councillors agreed that extending the period from 1 week to 2 weeks for village organisations would not increase these risks. The Chairman apologised for any inconsistencies or lack of monitoring by the Parish Council regarding banners. **ALLOTMENTS**

It was noted the sheep were still on the field. Councillors considered the proposed extension to the allotment would have no implications on the grazing of sheep. Babergh DC have confirmed that extending and fencing new allotments is an appropriate use of our CIL funds. Mary George suggested the hedging around the Allotment Field would need trimming back in the autumn.

FOOTPATHS

Laura Erith explained the issues identified in relation to white flints laid to cover pot-holes on the private road from Guinea Wiggs to Dead Lane. She still has been unable to establish who was responsible for this work. Reports had been made to Suffolk Right of Way and our Footpath Warden. It was agreed to send a letter to nearby residents to seek information.

VILLAGE HALL

A site meeting was being arranged to gain a quote for potential fencing of the South East corner of the village hall field.

Funding continues to be sought for the replacement roof; Babergh CIL monies are being applied for and it was suggested Community Action Suffolk may be able to assist. The new doors are still awaited and new keys will be allocated; the PC will request two sets of keys. A Race Night fundraising event is being planned for October.

IN BRIEF

Laura Erith will liaise with SCC regarding late billing for street lighting works and power and maintenance charges.

The Community Council were congratulated for organising the successful Jubilee Party.

PUBLIC FORUM

Lorraine Brooks asked if the date had been set for a site meeting with SCC on Caley Green to discuss a management plan for the wall of reeds, and whether SCC were likely to have funds available for their removal; she was advised this would be discussed during the meeting. Sally Dalton who represents the Friends of Caley Green asked if an update from the Working Party would be made public this evening so that she could update interested parties; she was advised an update would be given.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at Farthing Hall Cawley Road [DC/22/02488] for construction of horse arena (manége) with associated perimeter fencing with conditions relating to use solely by the occupier, lighting and landscaping; at Stour House 23 Court Street [DC/22/02610] for works to trees to remove overhanging branches of a Whitebeam, to fell an Ash and a Yew, to reduce a Maple and to remove overhanging branches of a group of trees; at 2 Ash Rise [DC/22/02374] a larger home extension for a single storey rear kitchen/diner extension did not require formal approval. Discharge of conditions applications were granted at Mill House 12 Mill Street [DC/22/02379] relating to rainwater goods, materials, eaves and verge, hard surface materials, fenestration and rooflights details and at White Hart 11 High Street [DC/22/02182] relating repointing and limewashing, materials, mechanical ventilation, rainwater goods, hard landscaping and boundary treatment scheme.

Between meetings councillors had no objections to listed building applications at **13 Birch Street** [*DC*/22/01732] for erection of single storey rear extension (following demolition of conservatory), replacing a first floor rear window with a larger window and re-rendering rear wall provided the Heritage Team have no concerns; at **18 Court Street** [*DC*/22/03143] for repairs and repointing to chimney and internal replastering, installation of chimney flashings, replacement of external rainwater goods and re-rendering of an external wall provided the Heritage Team have no concerns; and at **White Hart 11 High Street** [*DC*/22/03048] for removal or variation or a condition for DC/21/03615 relating to changes to fenestration providing the Heritage Officer has no concerns.

Discussing recent application at **Stridings**, **Campion Lane** [*DC*/22/03211] for erection of new garage and workshop with solar PV panels on roof no objections provided the Heritage Team have no concerns.

The PC responded to a re-consultation application at **Harpers Hill Farm** [SCC/0099/19B/VOC] for variation of conditions: 1 (compliance with approved plans), 4 (hours of operation) and 8 (disposal of surface water). Councillors object to this application to vary hours of operation and disposal of surface water. **HIGHWAYS**

Mary George said SCC Highways were well ahead of schedule with the drainage improvement works .

Mary George said there had been no progress regarding replacement of a road sign for Parkers Way which had been requested. They will be reminded of the request.

Following the Council raising H&S hazards relating to the northern route bus stop on the A134 with SCC Transport a site meeting took place. However, councillors do not consider access along the narrow grass strip beside the road to be satisfactory, especially for pushchairs and those with mobility issues. SCC Transport with be contacted again asking why after 2 years are there still temporary bus stops instead of standard stops with a regulatory surface.

OPEN SPACES

The investigations continue for play equipment in memory of Margaret Underwood. A meeting was held to discuss suggestions for play equipment with parents, councillors met with possible suppliers for ball-park figures, and they have contacted the school. They will investigate further and by September hope to be in a position to move on and obtain a quotes for supply and installation.

HORSESHOE WEIR & SLUICE GATES

Following problems with the operation of the sluice gates during storms earlier this year the PC wrote to the Environment Agency (EA) to seek assurances for contingencies covering future power cuts; no response has been received.

Following correspondence by residents and the Council to the EA regarding overgrown reads round and across the head of the Horseshoe weir a response is still awaited. Gerry Battye will draft a letter asking the EA for communication.

The EA have issued a warning that flow over the weir is likely to cease due to lack of rainfall across the area which necessitates pausing operation of the Ely-Ouse to Essex Transfer Scheme (EOETS) bringing water to the Stour. Flows will be restored following rainfall in the area. The EA say they will monitor the environmental impacts of low flows at the weir. There is currently a trickle over the weir, if flow stops it is likely to affect fish. **CALEY GREEN**

Mary George reported that the working party have refined a new letter to request information from contractors for installing a wooden revetment and have reviewed their list of potential contractors. Dawn Harris said the letter has been kept simple to encourage response. Councillors approved the letter.

To progress with the project discussion with SCC will be required to approve the works and how it will be funded needs to be established.

Mary George said there has been no news from SCC regarding clearance of the ditch from Bear Street to the river.

In relation to the long reed bed, SCC have said they are looking into resources for this work and will look into a management plan sometime after 1st August.

ALLOTMENTS

The judges of the best kept allotment prizes will be presented as usual at Nayland Flower Show.

The triangle in the corner of the Allotment field was previously identified as a suitable location for planting trees available free from Babergh; Mary George will obtain an application form.

Regarding extension of the allotments with 4 half plots, details to move this project on, including fencing and water supply, will be gathered ahead of the September meeting.

Mary George identified some maintenance issues, including cutting back some grassed areas and the hedge round the field which need to be carried out in the autumn..

FOOTPATHS

Gerry Battye has reported the riverside safety fence at the bottom of Anchor Bridge steps which is laying in the river.

Dawn Harris said some cutting back of overgrown vegetation had been carried out on the path adjacent Little Bulmer Farm.

Following investigations to identify who has laid white flints to cover pot-holes on the private road from Guinea Wiggs to Dead Lane, SCC has responded that they will return to the site and remove the stone and will look into putting grit in the potholes. **VILLAGE HALL**

Melanie Barrett is looking into the VHMC's grant application for Babergh CIL monies for the replacement roof. A Race Night fundraising event is being planned for October.

It was agreed to order work to: fence the South East corner of the village hall field; for groundwork, fence replacement and clear up of vegetation by the Candy Lane gateway; and the crown reduction of the Prunus trees and removal of Elder at the front of the village hall car park.

IN BRIEF

Councillors will look at the Babergh Parking Strategy Consultation; the deadline for comments is 31st July.

The PC are still awaiting billing by SCC for Street Lighting works and power and maintenance charges.



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THE COVID-19 RATES IN SUFFOLK





COUNTY COUNCILS UNANIMOUSLY AGREE "NO" TO DAMAGING PYLONS PROPOSAL

Authorities in Essex and Suffolk have united to condemn the current proposals for a 180km network of 50m tall electricity pylons between Norwich, Bramford and Tilbury.

Essex County Council and Suffolk County Council have passed motions at their full council meetings in July, to oppose the East Anglia GREEN proposal put forward by National Grid.

Norfolk County Council is expected to consider the motion at its next full council meeting, following a planned debate yesterday (19 July 2022) being postponed.

The councils agree that the plan for pylons is destructive and out-dated, and will cause irreversible damage to the countryside, wildlife habitats and local communities.

A new electricity network is needed to transmit the ambitious 50 GW of offshore wind that the Government aims to be delivered by 2030, and to connect new projects like Sizewell C. So much of this ambition falls on East Anglia, to provide energy for much of the country.

The councils fully support the need to generate this renewable and low carbon electricity, to meet local and national Net Zero ambitions. However, they believe that more suitable, sustainable and modern alternatives for the network have not been properly investigated and presented, such as undersea cable routes around the coastline of East Anglia.

Formalising their long-standing positions on the East Anglia GREEN proposal, the two councils join a group of 13 MPs who recently signed a letter criticising the consultation, along with a growing public petition with thousands of signatures.##

National Grid completed the East Anglia GREEN non-statutory consultation in June and later this year, it is anticipated they will publish a report outlining the key themes from the feedback received and explain the next steps. They expect the first statutory consultation to take place in early 2023, with an application to the Planning Inspectorate in late 2024.

Meeting: 4th July 2022 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: Rachel Hitchcock said we have a fabulous team on the Exec. However, as always we welcome new members to join our enjoyable friendly committee.

Fundraising Activities/Events: We have a good deal of activities being planned currently but as always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station.

A training session was held 29th June; it went well with just over 15 people attending which was an ideal number. The CC will be giving a donation to the Gryphon First Aid Unit charity who ran the session for us; Martin Richards of Gryphon First Aid Unit, who trains First Responders, covered use of the defibrillator, CPR and basic first aid and answered questions. He was supported by Nayland First Responder Tracy Le Grys. It was agreed a training session should be held annually.

Rachel Hitchcock said the defibrillator at the Village Hall which is managed by the CC is regularly checked by those on the rota: Dawn Harris of the Parish Council has said that she is happy to share the task. Rachel will arrange access to the reporting website.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel said that she will get in touch with Dale Leeks; work on riverbanks is probably best carried out in autumn and this project will be picked up again. Other works may occur which could be tied into this.

Nayland 10k Fun Run: <u>nayland10k.co.uk</u> on **Sunday 10th July**. It will be starting again from Littlegarth School. Luke Rumbelow said about 450-500 runners are booked. They have sufficient volunteers from the Nayland community to help with marshalling, etc.

Luke stressed it is necessary to strim the footpaths on the route prior to the run as they become very overgrown. The CC felt we should consider if anything can be done to get strimming carried out in advance next year. This also benefits the community; there have been numerous complaints recently regarding the local paths being overgrown.

Online Ticketing Facility: *NaylandEvents.org* – This facility continues to be very useful to event organisers and is well used. If you are interested in selling tickets using this system get in touch with Justin Dowding.

Community Involvement: Several village groups have experienced disappointing support, both in attendance and support of their committees, post Covid. The CC included an appeal for residents to support them in the last Community Times and will do so again.

Recent Activities:

Calendar Photo Display on 14th May: Lorraine Brooks thanked those that helped. There was a display of 150 lovely photographs and the history of the CC was back on display. Thirty visitors voted for their favourite photos and another twenty voted online. The number of people calling in was less than pre-Covid but it was still a pleasant sociable afternoon.

Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee: Huge thanks were expressed to Claire Buller and the Jubilee team for planning the Jubilee Party, which due to the weather forecast required a mammoth plan B operation, and to Wendy Sparrow and her helpers for staging the 1950s Exhibition.

Claire thanked everyone who helped with planning, setting up, clearing away and participating during the afternoon. The party had been greatly enjoyed by all attending.

A photo collection of the event is being finalised and will be put on the website. Thank you to Lorraine for putting this together.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Matt Cable gave his report on finances.

Breakdown of profits: Community Times £1,222.00, Village Quiz £393.96, Calendar £158.88.

Grants paid: Nayland Choir £128, Village Hall replacement doors \pounds 10,000. We received \pounds 270.36 as a return of grant funds provided to the Post Office Project.

Expenses: £2,040.85 for the Jubilee Party, of which £1,047.44 was for mugs which will be for sale. Village Hall hire for Christmas Fair £54.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £23,236.06 represented by Deposit a/c monies £10, 732.94, Current a/c monies £11,796.08, Stripe a/c £117.12, Cash in Hand £589.92. We hold £268.50 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, Lizzie's Fund Walk £201. **Therefore, unencumbered assets are £12,550.62.**

Insurance Policy: Rachel raised the issue of renewing our insurance policy in the autumn; last year it was agreed we would explore other insurers. Rachel and Matt to follow up in September. **GRANTS & DONATIONS:** There had been no grant applications or donations.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues. Heading towards deadline; early submission of copy and/or reservation of space would be much appreciated.

Three new advertisers commenced yearly subscriptions in the June issue, valued £187.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said production of the calendar is almost completed - and is scheduled to go to print and be ready for sales to commence at the Flower Show on 6th August. Twelve sponsors are supporting the calendar again (income £300). As previously reported the cost of printing has increased to £579 +vat for 300 copies; it was felt we should keep the order at 300 copies and make efforts to increase sales.

They will be on sale at the Post Office, Forget Me Not and online as usual, also at the new Hairdressers. Lorraine agreed to circulate a list of events where calendars could be sold to the Exec so volunteers could step forward to attend and sell them. Matt Cable offered to approach Gladwins Farm and Pippins Shop at the Stoke By Nayland Club and to organise sales at Bonfire Night. Rachel Hitchcock would cover the School and Woodland Corner. The main recent projects have been: Caley Green for which they are awaiting various reports; and the provision of additional waste bins (litter and dog bins). Conservation Society: Mike Hunter reported Nayland Open Gardens was held on 12th June for the first time in three years. PLATINUM JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS



A big thank you to everyone involved in the Street Party on 5th June 2022 celebrating 70 years of the Queen's reign. It was a wonderful event with a fabulous atmosphere and reflected the spirit of the Community Council in true Nayland with Wissington style. Whether you moved your car from the High Street, put up the bunting, rang the Church bells, sang in the choir, entered the fancy-dress parade, joined in with the community singing, were a member of the set up/clear up committee or just attended the event you were part of a day to remember. The praise for the event has been coming in from far and wide and I can honestly say it would not have happened without everyone's cooperation and support.

The planning for this momentous event started in early January 2022. A small committee of 5 (Claire Buller, Julie Clark, Mandy Cook, Rachel Hitchcock and Patricia Wilkie) met regularly to organise the special Street Party. Invites were hand delivered to every household with the April issue of The Community Times with an rsvp date of 5th May. For the Diamond Jubilee Street Party in 2012 350 people booked to attend we therefore based our planning on similar numbers. At first the table bookings were slow, and I remember us commenting *"200 people will still be a nice number"* little were we to know as the deadline approached that numbers would escalate so colossally. On the closing date we had 420 people. Not wanting to exclude anybody we accepted some late table bookings for another 50 people until we had no more tables or chairs left!

The Street Party was now set ...well so we thought. A seating plan was made to accommodate everyone in the High Street on two rows of 230ft tables. Come rain or shine we intended for the Street Party to go ahead on the High Street but the weather forecasters had other ideas. The forecast for the Jubilee weekend was fine and sunny everyday but Sunday. To start with it didn't look too bad a little rain we could cope with BUT the forecast was for high winds and torrential rain, so a plan B had to be considered at the eleventh hour. 470 people could not all be accommodated in the Village Hall so a marquee needed to be found and erected just in case the bad weather hit Nayland.

lain Wright very kindly donated his 'tent' which he single handedly loaded onto his trailer so it could be erected on Saturday afternoon by a small gang of helpers. Six hours later the 70ft x 40ft marquee was up. Plan B was now in place if needed. Well nearly... we still had the small matter of the seating plan to re-write as we now had 8 rows of tables.

After a sleepless night checking the weather every half hour a few of us met in the High Street at 8am to make the very hard decision on what to do. Do we go ahead outside as planned or move it all inside? A few tears later we made the call to set it all up inside. With all hands-on deck miraculously in two and a half hours the hall and marquee were transformed into an indoor Street Party for Nayland and Wissington to be proud of.





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Once the children had settled back into their seats with their families James Finch officially opened the Street Party and presented the Platinum Jubilee medals to our long serving Nayland Firefighters.



It was following this we then heard the very special voice of Lucia Fortunato for the first time when she serenaded us with some 1950's classics before we made a toast to Her Majesty and singing God Save the Queen.

Everyone then settled down to eat their amazing picnics. Some of the cakes and

food platters really were a sight to see; a number of people had even made the Jubilee trifle. Once we had all filled ourselves with fine food and wine it was the turn of the Nayland Primary School Choir and Ukulele Band to entertain us and entertain us they did with some hits from the 1950s. The adult choir then joined in allowing us all to enjoy some excellent community singing led by Emma Bishton which culminated with Sweet Caroline chosen by the BBC as the song for nation to sing at their Street Parties. The Environment Agency (EA) state: any environmental incidents should be reported to their 24 hour hotline number: 0800 80 70 60.

WATER LEVELS & QUALITY

Water levels over the Horseshoes Weir began to fluctuate and flow virtually ceased on 3rd July when it was reported to the EA by a resident. They were also asked to investigate why flow was substantial along the flood relief channel and priority at the sluice gate control not given to the main river. To date (19th July) these questions have not been answered. The Parish Council have also written to the EA about this.

Since then the EA circulated the following notice:

"We are writing to provide you with an update that we expect flows at the Horseshoe Weir to cease within the next few days.

A lack of rainfall across the area has led to low flows on the River Stour and the Ely-Ouse transfer scheme (EOEST) discharges have been paused due to insufficient supply at Denver.

We will continue to monitor the environmental impacts of low flows at the weir. Flows will be restored following rainfall in the area."

This is quite understandable as we have experienced a long dry spell and heatwave but the residents queries are still valid about priority of flow.

The weir ran dry on 20th July after two days of record breaking (amber and red alert) temperatures in upper 30s°C.

For those who are not aware of the EOETS: The aim of the Ely Ouse to Essex Transfer Scheme (EOETS) was to prevent spare water in Norfolk from entering the Wash by taking it to Essex reservoirs; it was expanded to enable increased transfer of water from Denver in Norfolk to Abberton Reservoir.

Abberton Reservoir is a pumped storage reservoir, owned and operated by Northumbrian Water Limited, for consumption in our expanding towns and villages

The upgrade, completed in 2015, involved the construction of two new underground pipelines - Kirtling Green to Wixoe and Wormingford to Abberton - and a new pumping station on the River Stour near Wormingford to abstract water to Abberton.

Abstraction from the River Stour to Abberton usually ceases in June. Abstraction cannot take place when river levels are very high when there is silt and debris in the water.

REED GROWTH

For some years conversations in the village have expressed concern bout the excessive reed growth in the river through Nayland. This year with the reeds now stretching threequarters on the way across the head of the Horseshoe Weir a resident asked, whether the EA are intending to clear these reeds and perform any de-silting. This email was sent on 7th June and the queries remain unanswered (at 19th July).

Reed growth, on the whole is the responsibility of the riparian owners. That will be the EA all around the weir, Nayland Land Company around the Meadow, Suffolk County Council (SCC) on Caley Green and other homeowners and landowners.

However, the fact that the EA no longer does any de-silting means that the reeds can more easily spread as explained on page 21.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

We were all excited for see a variety of geese visit Caley Green in the spring and hoped perhaps they would make their homes here, sadly they didn't.

I hardly dare write this next sentence... that all seems well with our current residents swans. The pair have raised five cygnets, from the 7 hatched, and have not had to defend their territory. However, it is very unusual that one of last years cygnets is still with them. It was kept at a distance when this

years cygnets were young but is now part of the group.

There still seem to be far less ducks at Caley Green, and on the river, than there used to be. It has been suggested that the reasons may be the growing number of Herons in the area taking the ducklings, and/or Avian Flu.

CALEY GREEN

The Green has been well used during the summer, including by children, families, groups, anglers, river-craft users and almost daily by residents of Nayland House.

The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and helping to maintain it as a wonderful asset of the village. Many thanks to them.

RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

At the July Parish Council meeting it was pleasing to hear that their working party have moved on a little. The Parish Council have reviewed their list of potential contractors and agreed to sending a revised letter to contractors requesting information for installing a wooden revetment to protect the riverbank from erosion. Permission from SCC will need to be obtained and how it will be funded needs to be established.

THE LONG REED BED

There remains no further news on removing the wall of reeds to enable the use of fishing rights.

During a site meeting in April with SCC's Ecologist and Land Manager they said if they could divert workers from another job they would cut back some of the reeds, avoiding areas with any nesting birds. This has not happened. The wait continues regarding their promise that they will create a long term management plan for the reed bed ensuring maintenance in future years; the date given for them commencing this is now 'after the 1st August'.

THE CULVERT

Early spring storms had exposed just how much silt and vegetation has accumulated in the mouth of the culvert. SCC were asked to clear the debris; this has not been attended to yet.

SLUICE GATES

Storms in February resulted in power cuts which caused problems with the sluice gates particularly affecting the Wiston side which flooded. The Parish Council wrote to the Environment Agency asking for assurances of contingencies covering future power cuts. A response has not yet been received.

RIVER MAINTENANCE

As mentioned on page 20, many residents have expressed concerns about the lack of maintenance of the river through Nayland. A letter will be sent to the EA raising issues of maintenance and asking them to inform readers of the CT of their intentions on future maintenance.

Usually they cite that their activities are restricted to preserving navigation and preventing flooding; sometimes they add encouraging biodiversity for allowing reeds to multiply. Do we believe or have any faith in their statements when we are aware that:

- In places navigation is difficult even in a kayak, gone are the days of families enjoying using a rowing boat on the river.
- If a river is full of silt and reeds surely it will not be able to contain as much water making flooding more likely?
- Reeds, reeds and more reeds is not biodiversity; where is the variety of flora to encourage more diverse fauna? Purple Loosestrife, Bisort, Stachys, Butomus, Marsh Marigold and others cannot compete for space among the brutish reeds.

A document published in 2015 by the EA entitled 'Aquatic and riparian plant management: controls for vegetation in watercourses' is an interesting read. And contains the following statements:

- Aquatic and riparian plants can cause problems when the rate of vegetation growth adversely affects biodiversity or human uses of the watercourse. (page 7)
- Aquatic and riparian plants need to be managed because they can: reduce channel capacity, raise water levels and impede flow resulting in waterlogging or flooding, impede navigation, prevent fishing and damage of fish spawning habitats, reduce amenity value, destroy wildlife habitats and lead to the domination of a single species. (page 9)

The River Stour through Nayland is slow flowing as its flow is divided, down the flood channel and Mill Stream in its figure of eight shape. Slow flow results in silt deposits building up and consequently greater reed growth. NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

Regarding vegetation, on page 83-85 the EA document refers to: **Emergent species** are those which are rooted in sediments at the bottom of watercourses and grow in water usually no more than 1 m deep. They can be very problematic, particularly in narrow and relatively shallow watercourses, where they can completely block channels.

Key problems caused:

- Dense networks of rhizomes can form large stands which impede flows.
- Once established, the roots and rhizomes trap silt and extend the area that they can colonise, which further impedes water flow in the long-term.
- Dense stands can also impair fishing and other recreational activities.
- Following die-back during the winter months, the robust stems can remain standing and continue to cause problems.

Control methods:

- Physical techniques are effective at achieving instant, shortterm control; however, many physical techniques do not remove the rhizomes and repeat management is necessary.
- The dead stems, which remain standing in winter, may also require cutting to prevent flows being impeded.
- Manipulating water levels to more than 1 m may help to control stands.
- Creating a deeper central channel of more than 1 m should help in preventing encroachment across a watercourse, allowing just a fringe to develop along the bank toe.

No substantial de-silting has been carried out for well over 15 years. There is a considerable amount of silt in the river between the A134 and the Horseshoe Weir as discovered by residents in waders who had found themselves in difficulty. This has clearly contributed to the excessive reed growth there now. It also means it is more difficult for riparian owners to combat the quickly expanding reeds along their stretches of riverbank.

The EA will be asked about these points and hopefully they may respond in time for the next issue of the Community Times.

The river is a great asset to the village, as it has always been, and loved by residents; it's a shame we feel we need to fight for its proper maintenance. PAGE 21




To date we have two bookings to play in December.

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

Suffolk County Council recently completed its cut of the Riverside footpath. Local contractor Chris Mortimer cut the permissive path. We hope to develop a permanent arrangement for him to cut the whole path on a regular basis in the future for the benefit of the local residents and visitors.

The sheep enjoyed excellent grazing before the present dry hot weather took hold. The small field has been cut for hay which can be fed to the sheep to supplement the limited grazing presently available on the big field.

Availability of shade for the sheep has been increased by the erection of a purpose built area close to part of the laid hedge.

All the trees and sallow planted in the field have been watered three times so far this year to try and ensure their survival and all other trees along the riverbank and behind the community seat have been cleared of growth competition in there immediate vicinity.

The laid and coppiced hedges will be trimmed in September and some Oak trees planted, at no cost, between the hedges in case the existing Ash trees succumb to Ash Die Back.

Our Grant Application for the making and erection of more information boards has been approved and we hope to have these in place by the autumn.

We are also in contact with Anglia Water about trying to get mains water supply to our land in order to avoid dependency on the pond (for drinking water for the sheep), which relies on increasingly variable river levels.

Garden Notes by The Old Muckspreader

The day on which the OM/S submits his article to the Editor will have broken all sorts of records. Temperature, period without rain, and so forth; none of them is good news for gardeners.

There is nothing really one can do about it; lawns will go brown, but eventually they will recover. Sprinklers, unless you are running a golf course, are a waste of money and scarce resources. Here we have five strategically placed water butts, their contents reserved for a few large pots, and some of the vegetables especially beans. They are now half empty (or half full if you are a real optimist), with little sign of any replenishment in the near future.

Next to a pond, now half empty and covered with ugly green scum, we grow a few Dieramas which have just finished flowering; this is an interesting perennial in that if flowers upside down as it were. It starts with the top of the flowering shoot, and then proceeds downward. In its native South Africa it grows by the side of streams, but in the UK it seems to be happy in herbaceous borders.

We are somewhat concerned about the welfare of an ancient Box hedge which effectively divides the main lawn from a less formal part of the garden. A recent visitor has just spotted some larvae of the moth which has devastated Box hedges in South East England. Presumably there is a spray of sorts which will deal with it but the OM/S is still making enquiries. If you have the answer please tell the Editor (who will tell me).

Dear OM/S, A little initial research online suggests that there may be help at hand for Box.... There are solutions, such as removing caterpillars by hand every day including from deep within the plant, pheromone traps to control adult moth activity.

Perhaps a more practical solution is TOPBUXUS XenTari Raupen a biological insecticide containing a natural, potent strain of the microorganism Bacillus thuringiensis subspecies aizawai that controls caterpillar pest. Instructions state three treatments are necessary to keep the caterpillar pest under control; the Box tree caterpillar goes through 3 cycles each season, so apply XenTari once every cycle at the moment when the first caterpillars are spotted ensuring all leaves within the plant are sprayed. They claim that when a caterpillar eats the XenTari-treated leaves, its feeding stops within 1 hour; although affected caterpillars die in a couple of days, the damage to the boxwood stops after 1 hour. It's available online via Amazon and probably at garden centres but not at the producers website: topbuxus.com

Systemic chemical control options include **Bug Clear (pyrethrum)** or Bayer Provado Ultimate Fruit & Vegetable Bug Killer (deltamethrin).

Some Press Cuttings From The Late 1800s

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

Essex Standard & Essex County Advertiser, 11 November 1863

NAYLAND LITERARY INSTITUTION. The first public Reading for the present Session in connection with this Institution was given in the British School Room on Tuesday evening last, the 3rd inst., the Rev J T BROWN, Incumbent, in the chair. The Readers were Mr C Sulley, Mr J Stannard and Mr W Brown. Some excellent glee singing was introduced by Messrs Winny, and after a special vote of thanks to Mr Sulley the proceedings closed with the National Anthem.

Essex Standard, 18 May 1889

The road between Anchor Bridge and the bottom of Horkesley Hill filled with water which ran over the raised path

so that for a time it was impassable to pedestrians. Water poured through Mr Savill's house at the Lock so he was obliged to leave for a time. Some cottages in Fen Street were also inundated.

Suffolk & Essex Free Press3rd June 1869

FOUND DROWNED. Saturday last the body of a man named Walter Holmes, labourer, aged 22, who was commonly known by the cognomen Chippington, was found in the river much decomposed. It would appear the poor fellow was unable to get to work and when last seen he was in liquor but whether he fell into the river or met his death by any other cause no information can be obtained. The inquest was held at the White Hart Inn on Monday last before the Deputy Coroner. It seems that on the morning of 21 May the deceased was seen by a groom in the service of Mr William Stannard of Wiston water mill, sitting on a stile near the mill. Nothing more was seen of him until last Saturday morning when he was found in the river on the west side of the mill.

Suffolk & Essex Free Press 4th March 1869

PENNY READINGS. On Tuesday, the fourth for the season of popular entertainments was held in the National Schoolroom. Mr W H Priest occupied the chair. The programme included a pianoforte duet by the Misses Fenn; a reading by Mr G Faiers, 'How I lost my whiskers'; a song 'The Ship Boy's Letter' by Miss Kate Fenn. Glee: 'Awaken AeolianLyre' by the choir.

Suffolk & Essex Free Press 10th June 1869

SUFFOLK & ESSEX AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY. This excellent society has issued its usual capital bill of fare for its 11th annual meeting in October next. There will be ploughing matches and a show of roots and vegetables. A number of special prizes are offered by gentlemen for cottagers' produce.

Suffolk & Essex Free Press 1st July 1869

CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH ANNIVERSARY. Anniversary services were held on Wednesday last. In the afternoon an impressive sermon was preached by Rev Eliezer Jones of lpswich after which a tea meeting was held in the spacious schoolroom under the chapel which was completely filled with guests. In the evening a public meeting was held in the chapel under the presidence of Mr William Stannard of Wiston who stated that there remained a debt of £160 on the new chapel, due to the Chapel Building Society. The Rev Verdon, pastor, stated in his address that for 200 years a Christian church of the same faith and order had existed on that spot and had survived the ages of persecution, oppression and opposition.

Essex Standard 27th July 1889

JUBILEE SPORTS AT NAYLAND. An athletic meeting at Nayland was first started in the Jubilee year [Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee in 1897] and the success of the movement at that time justified a repetition of it in 1888 and a third even more



successful meeting was held on Thursday last. The day was very unfavourable for the sports but notwithstanding that, the grounds were crowded and the fun of which there was plenty was fully appreciated. The events came off in Mr Cuddon's meadow [now Webb's Meadow] where a capital course was marked out. Water Sports took place on the River Stour near Anchor Bridge An adjournment was then made to Goldsmith's meadow for horse, pony and donkey races. The Colchester Town Band was in attendance and played a good selection of music during the day. There was a display of fireworks at 8.30pm.

Essex Standard 16th September 1893 (from Chris Hunt)

NAYLAND, AN INTERESTING RELIC. When Professor Rupert Jones, an eminent geologist, visited the village some years ago he pointed out that among the flint pebbles used in paving the footpaths there were some fragments of stone which are not found in this neighbourhood and which he suggested had been used in some ecclesiastical building which had been pulled down and the materials used in repairing the road. These stones are now taken up in order to lay down a new path. Amongst them was found the upper part of a curved stone window-head which had been placed near the corner of a kerbstone. The relic is now in the care of Mr Deaves, builder. (*Chris wonders how much more of the Court Knoll buildings are under Nayland pavements, or where the stone mentioned is now!*)

Essex Standard 13th May 1899

PROPOSED CONSUMPTION HOSPITAL FOR NAYLAND. An estate has been purchased for the establishment of a sanatorium for the new treatment of consumption at Nayland. It is to be called the East Anglian Sanatorium. The property consists of what is known as the Sandpits and Malting Farm, containing about 94 acres of arable and pasture land. The Sanatorium will be built on the summit of a hill near the Sandpits house and premises. This is one of the range of hills on the Suffolk side of the river Stour. From the top of these there is a fine view of the Stour Valley, extending beyond Manningtree in one direction and Sudbury in the other. A better site could not have been selected. The soil is sandy. There are springs of pure water gushing from the hills, and a stream which never fails runs through the valley at the lower part of the estate.

WEATHER SUMMARY: May & June 2022 Weather Report by David Lowe

May experienced the normal eastward movement of low pressure systems from the Atlantic across the UK – this pattern broken for a few days, on several occasions, by high pressure systems over, or close by. The statistics thrown up are broadly close to average.

Mean temperature was 13.4° C (12.41) with a high of 23.2° C (23.79) and low of 1.8° C (1.3). Lowest max was 12.9° C (10.92). There were 4 days of less than 15° C max (8.5) and 21 of less than 20° C (23.64). 20° C was achieved on 10 days (7.36) but 25° C not at all (0.57). There were no days with air frost (0.21) and 1 day with ground frost.

Bright sun hours were 337.3 (338.24) and solar energy was 12000 Ly (12914).

Monthly rain was 47.6 mm (48.49) with highest daily rainfall 10.8 mm (15.84) and highest rainfall rate, 58.8 mm/hr (31.59). Evapotranspiration was 89 mm (95.93).

Average wind strength was 3.8 mph (3.66) with highest gust 28 mph (32.36). Highest daily average was 7 mph (8.78). The dominant direction was SW.

June was a dry and sunny month, but not particularly warm. It also had a record-breaking day on the 17th when the temperature rose to 32.7°C, 0.9°C higher than the 14 year June record in 2011.


The overall weather system movements were somewhat slow and erratic. High pressure was on the scene more than normal, but not always delivering warm air, and allowing some cold nights.

Mean temperature for the month was 16° C (15.59) with max of 32.7°C (31.8) and low of 4.3°C (5.64). There were no days less than 10° C, 2 (1.5) less than 15°C and 7 (13.07) less than 20°C. Over 20°C there were 23 days (16.93) over 25°C, 3 days (3) and over 30°C, 1 day (0.21).

Bright sun hours were 358 (340.85) just a record. Solar Energy was 14250 Ly (13291).

Rainfall was 28.6 mm, well down on the 52.49 monthly average. Highest rainfall rate was 59 mm/hr (25.49), a whisker under the 60mm record. There was only one day over 10mm (1.36). Evapotranspiration was 117 mm (102.82).

Average wind speed was 4 mph (3.21) with a high of 28 mph and highest daily average of 9.4 mph (7.49). The prevailing direction was SSW.

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JOAN MOORE (November 1929 - July 2022)

Joan was born in November 1929, in Kensington to Len and Gertrude Marks, and had a brother, Peter.

Joan's early school was Lady Bankes in Ruislip Manor where she was the top student and well-liked by the headmistress. She then went to Pinner Grammar where she gained distinctions in all subjects needed to achieve matriculation; this also led to Joan being awarded a prestigious scholarship, which enabled her to attend college in London where she spoke in French and learnt Spanish and German from French.

She also did a stint in WRAF where she flew in planes on test flights. The Official Secrets Act prevented her from saying too much about this period of her life.

Joan married Peter Moore in 1951 - Peter first took her out on a Saturday and proposed the following Monday. Who said whirlwind courtships don't work? Joan staunchly supported her husband for more than seventy years as he progressed through the ranks in the army, and later as he moved into retirement, and she has left him with many joyous memories.

Not long after they married, they moved to Kenya, where Alan was born in 1952. Back to England, 1953 where Peter Jnr was born

in Latimer – a home delivery by Peter Snr as the midwives had decided that nothing was going to happen that night. Then to Germany where Colin was born (1955). Mum improved her German. Back to England for Bryan's birth (1959). Further postings to Germany (again), Belize, and Singapore (Joan picked up sufficient Malay to hold conversations with the amah) before Joan and Peter finally settled in Nayland (1969). Their house in Nayland was meant to be a temporary home, but they never moved again.

Joan's interest in the environment led her to work for the Nature Conservancy Council, eventually as CEO, while also embarking on an Open University degree, which she passed with honours.

However, this was Joan's history, not her character. Joan was a vivacious, intelligent, warm, and beautiful woman, and an all-round good egg. She viewed life as an opportunity to learn and enjoy new things.

Joan was a warm and welcoming hostess, famed for her Xmas dinners, which she would miraculously produce while looking after the grandchildren - the 'boys' were keeping out of the way (at the Anchor). Joan spent a lot of time with the grandchildren, teaching them to knit or make mint sauce, or forcing them to speak French when they went to Paris together. Joan instilled a love of nature in them, and there are good memories of birdwatching, fun holidays and visits to Colchester Zoo. She always took an interest in all they did at school and in their various hobbies, and later, their careers. She imbued them with her work ethic and her devotion to the family - a really strong female role model for her granddaughters, much as Peter was the male equivalent to his grandsons. She also enjoyed the odd Campari or two in the summer, and Crabbie's Ginger Wine in the winter, so it wasn't all work!

Joan had many hobbies: reading, golf, swimming, and arts and crafts, and she became an accomplished needlepointer. Wherever Joan went, she involved herself in the local communities, and Nayland was no exception. For many years she contributed towards the Annual Nayland Fete. One notable year she had pledged to provide a batch of her famous curry puffs for a stall. Imagine her surprise when on opening the tin there were only a few crumbs left. Unfortunately, two of her sons had taken her famous expression "It's there to be eaten, son" to heart, and had wolfed down the lot the previous evening.

Joan was a founder member and Secretary of Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society in 1974; initially organising exhibitions and Nayland Open Gardens. In the late 1990s Joan took the role of Secretary of Horticultural Society with her usual proactive flair, introducing new activities for members to enjoy. This involved the staging of the annual Nayland Flower Show, a Millennium Flower Festival in St James' Church and BBC Radio 4 Gardeners Question Time. Joan was also a supporter of the Harpers Hill Nature Reserve and member of the Community Council. In 2006 she initiated and was the driving force behind Nayland's Anglia in Bloom entry when the village won a silver award certificate in the event's best village category.

At home Joan was a devoted mother to her sons, so much so that she wrote a booklet covering their childhood, which she gave to the grandchildren so that they would know how their parents had grown up. It is clear from the booklet how proud she was of her boys, even when they were getting up to no good.

Dear All,

August is generally considered as a month of relaxation. Schools are closed. Major events at Church are usually weddings. Most of employees anywhere take their long expected days off. Some countries in Europe look completely empty around their business centres and overcrowded in their leisure/touristic resorts. We could say that people working are the one who make sure others can relax. This is a very rough depiction of the usual reality of Summer.

But can we say it is as usual? Besides the never ending saga of the pandemic and the unacceptable conflict still killing innocents in Ukraine, we have to face an unprecedented heatwave. The United-Kingdom, like other Northern countries is not suffering it at the same scale as countries on the continent, but still, it doesn't feel the same as we experienced in the past.

You would think that global warming is a no-brainer. It was long forecasted by the experts. Figures are showing us some concerning curves. Satellite images are stating the obvious. We feel the heat. However, there are still people denying it. So many reasons behind this denial, varying according to countries, political/religious opinions, financial interests, etc....

I often quote the Scriptures as they are my reference but I invite you to reflect on a Latin proverb. Sometimes people know it, but only half of it: *Errare hvmanvm est.* 'making mistake is human'. The second half is namely like this *Sed perseverare diabolicvm.* 'what is evil is to persevere'. How many people have we seen confronted to the truth but still denying it because they were so ashamed of their mistake or too proud to admit failure.

What can we do for that? Of course, educating is something essential. Unfortunately it is never enough. Depending on the culture,

humankind has a tendency to learn more happily by experience or relation than by listening to lectures. Someone in my family used to deny global warming. In that case, it was because they were reading media of a certain political opinion that was favouring economics, employment, national interest over environmental issues. Something happening in so many different countries. But now, having experienced the heat for several years in a row in the South of France, they agree that global warming is a thing. But they can't admit that it is due to human activity yet.

The lesson is that change is possible, but it takes patience. My job as a vicar, my duty as a Christian is to change minds and make people's life better. That doesn't happen with a snap of fingers or waving a magic wand. Change is as slow and silent as love. It takes patience, empathy, will to understand, forgiveness. So my brothers and sisters, in any circumstances, if you see people closing their eyes in front of an obvious truth, don't be outraged. Be patient, relate to the person, try to understand why it is so hard for them to be exposed to the truth. Shouting, violence never change hearts and minds, love does.##

JOHN BAKER (8th May 1930 - 16th May 2022)

John's family moved from Wanstead to Norwich at the outbreak of war, when he was 9 years old. They joined St Peter Mancroft Church, in the centre of Norwich. He was a choirboy and server in his teenage years. It was here on VE day (also incidentally his birthday) he climbed the church tower to watch the celebrations from on high.

Pamela and John met when Pamela visited Norwich at age 16. She was living in Wallington Surrey and John on more than one occasion jumped on his bicycle and cycled from Norwich to Wallington to visit her. An impressive 300 mile round trip. She was obviously impressed as they married in 1954 at St Peter Mancroft in a double wedding - John's brother married Pamela's sister. There was a mounted policeman for crowd control it was such an event.

Upon attaining his high school certificate, prizes for high jump and developing a love of cricket John moved to Leeds in Yorkshire. The war had ended but there was still National service and he went down the coal mines. He worked as a miner for 15 years, hardly missing a day's work all his life; in the pits if you turned up for work 5 days in the week you got paid for 6 - this inspired his reliability.

Fitting classes around his work John completed a degree in Mining Engineering at Leeds University. He stayed working underground as a Ventilation and Safety engineer inspecting mines.

Much to Pamela's relief in 1963 he left the pits and started teaching mining - a few years later in 1965 they moved south closer to family and settled in Nayland. John worked at Colchester Technical college lecturing in mechanical engineering and construction.

John and Pamela embraced Nayland village life. He was the longest serving member on the Parochial Church Council which he joined in 1966 retiring just a few years ago. He was part Churchwarden for 9 years, unlocking and locking St James' Church daily for so many years it became his second home. He made the board on the wall at the back of the church listing all the vicars and made the wooden candlesticks sometimes used on the altar. He served on the church

and village hall committees, the community council, and thoroughly enjoyed participating in the village fetes.

John did not like fuss, he neither needed nor sought any focus on himself. From the kind reflections in condolence cards he was known to be upstanding, honest, kind, calm, quiet, a lovely man, relaxed, genuine, most helpful. He was well respected and remembered for his work in the village as well as baking a very good fruit cake which won prizes at many village events. John's ashes have been interred in St James' churchyard, he will rest close to his home in a place he knew and loved so well.

LOCAL FIRE SERVICE DRILL

On 1st June Suffolk Fire and Rescue and Essex Fire Service carried out a training exercise together in the grounds of Assington Autos, in Assington, Suffolk.

The aim for the event was threefold; to provide serving firefighters and fire officers the opportunity to demonstrate their operational skills in a realistic and challenging environment, to create a scenario that will raise awareness in our prevention (road safety) initiatives designed to reduce the numbers injured on our roads, and finally to provide an insight and generate an interest in the varied role of the firefighter to support On Call and Wholetime recruitment within the Fire Service. This simulation was one of the larger controlled training exercises held within this area of the County over recent years, with Sudbury, Hadleigh, Nayland and Colchester Fire Stations all taking part.

The training incident was an idea created and developed by Watch Manager James Vernon and his team at Nayland Fire Station. "We set about planning a story board consisting of a multi vehicle road traffic collision and, with the help of Fred at Assington Autos, we set the scene for a 5-car incident, with local volunteers acting as live casualties. This scenario included placing some cars upside down and in different positions, representing some of the scenes we face on our roads and providing a sense of realism. We planned for the casualties to have different scripted injuries, to present our teams with a whole host of challenges to flex their knowledge as well as test the Incident Commander's ability to take charge at such a complex incident."

The event was attended by John Ward from Babergh District Council and Assington Councillor Jeff Stacey, as well as Group Commander Carolyn Crabb from Suffolk Fire and Rescue. Watching the scene unfold, they expressed their admiration of what the crews were able to achieve over the duration of the exercise and pride in Fire and the emergency services in general in keeping both Counties and our communities safe from harm.

SCC OBJECTS TO NORWICH TO TILBURY PYLON PROPOSALS

SCC have confirmed its intention to object to the proposals for **National Grid's East Anglia GREEN pylon run**. A new network is needed to deliver electricity between Norwich, Bramford and Tilbury, to cope with the increasing amounts of renewable and low carbon electricity being generated around East Anglia.

The council does not support this proposal as it stands. It believes that there are better ways to manage the project, for example involving an undersea network which has not been fully investigated.

The council has been campaigning for government ministers and officials to introduce a more co-ordinated off-shore approach to meet the demands of all the energy projects in the region.

FAMILY CARERS MUST BE RECOGNISED

During Carers Week the week 7-12 June SCC highlighted the challenges faced by unpaid carers and recognising the contribution they are making to families and communities across Suffolk and the UK.


