

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 21st September 2022

PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMANSHIP

Gerry Battye confirmed he was resigning as Chairman; Laura Erith was unanimously voted to take the position.

PUBLIC FORUM

A resident raised a planning application 16 Birch Street. They explained the heritage credentials of the building and understood the family's need to extend but did not understand how this could be achieved whilst preserving the heritage status and was concerned regarding the width of the proposal in relation to her property.

Another resident asked the Parish Council to consider a physical memorial such as a village sign, water fountain or light on the church tower to commemorate the coronation of our King. He said this would be a momentous occasion and felt the conversation should be started.

Mike Hunter (Conservation Society) said that to take forward a proposal for a 20mph zone and the need to demonstrate a low mean speed was required. He said there would be a weeding party on 1st October at St James Church and Socket Alley and the litterpick was on 15th October.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Melanie Barrett advised of two planning enforcement matters in Nayland include a landowner being told to discontinue using a field for parked vehicles and materials and further complaints were being followed up regarding the impact of dust, mud and waste from the waste transfer station.

FINANCIAL MATTERS

It was agreed to accept a quote for the proposed new bins; they will be ordered once the working party confirm the specification and delivered to the contractors for installation. A quote to restore and clean the war memorial and other monuments was approved.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at **Stridings Campion Lane** [DC/22/03211] for erection of new garage and workshop with solar PV panels on roof or for discharge on conditions at **Mill House 12 Mill Street** [DC/22/02988] relating to rainwater goods, materials, eaves and verges, hard surface materials and rooflights details.

Listed building consent was granted at **18 Court Street** [DC/22/03143] for repairs and repointing to chimney and internal replastering, installation of chimney flashings, replacement of external rainwater goods and re-rendering of an external wall and at the **White Hart, 11 High Street** [DC/22/02926 & 03048] for alterations and additions to fenestration from previously approved proposals.

Babergh raised no objection to works to trees at **Woodside Wissington Uplands** [DC/22/03608] to fell 1 Grey Poplar and re-balance canopy of 1 Pine; at **16 Bear Street** [DC/22/03858] to fell 1 Ash and reduce crown volume of 1 Oak by 30%; at **Candy Lane Cottage Fen Street** [DC/22/03996] to fell 3 Sycamore and pollard 1 Sycamore; and at **Nayland Village Hall Church Lane** [DC/22/03719] to fell 1 Elder and reduce 3 Prunus by 25% and shape crowns.

Discharge of conditions was refused at **10 Mill Street** [DC/22/02814] relating to proposed fenestration details and bricks and mortar mix.

Between meetings councillors had no objections to works to trees at Woodside Wissington Uplands [DC/22/03608] or at Candy Lane Cottage Fen Street [DC/22/03996]. Councillors had no objections to essential works to trees at 16 Bear Street [DC/22/03858] but a Tree Preservation Order exists and this should be noted. They had no objections to tree works at Haysel, 36 Stoke Road [DC/22/03645] but were under the impression the work had previously been authorised by Babergh.

Councillors had no objections to a listed building application at 8 Mill Street [DC/22/03692/93] for reconstruction of part of boundary wall including installation of door, construction of two reverse buttresses on the south side of the wall providing there is no loss of amenity to the neighbouring residents as a result

and also that the Heritage Officer is agreeable to the work and materials proposed.

Discussing a recent listed building application at **16 Birch Street** [DC/22/03839] for erection of single storey rear extension the Council has concerns and will recommend that it is essential the Heritage Officer inspect the property in view of the width of the proposal in relation to neighbouring property and to maintain the building's heritage credentials.

HIGHWAYS

It was agreed to ask our contractors to tidy the weeds/lower tree branches/hollyhocks in Star Alley and at the same time chase SCC regarding the surfacing. The slope adjacent to the steps is particularly poor.

Discussion on a suggested 20 mph Zone was deferred to the next meeting.

OPEN SPACES

A survey to establish what additional play equipment was wanted/needed on Fairfield Playpark was conducted. It was agreed for the family providing significant funds in memory of Margaret Underwood would be engaged in the planning of the new equipment. It was suggested that a small plaque could be incorporated with reference to the kind donation. A survey through the school was conducted and further ideas from residents had been received. HORSESHOE WEIR, SLUICE GATES

Gerrye Battye recapped on concerns regarding the Sluice Gates and the River. He read the response to the PC's letter from Environment Agency Area Director - Simon Hawkins.

CALEY GREEN

In relation to the long reed bed, Gerry Battye attended a positive meeting with Matthew Lee, SCC Properties and Sally Dalton, one of the Caley Green working group. During the meeting, Mr Lee was asked about the Risk Assessment of Trees, which is the responsibility of SCC (as owners of Caley Green) to undertake.

Laura Erith pointed out that the condition at the mouth of the culvert has worsened.

Regarding the Caley Green erosion project it was reported that 4 local contractors who have expressed an interest in the project will attend site meeting with Working Party members to discuss the project. Matthew Lee will also be invited.

FOOTPATHS

Laura Erith updated the meeting on concerns in the vicinity of Dead Lane including agreement from SCC to require the replacement of the unsuitable surface material.

It was agreed to review Socket Alley after the weeding session by volunteers to see if more work is needed by our contractors.

ALLOTMENTS

The proposed tree planting in the north west corner of the allotment field was approved subject to volunteers.

Gerry Battye attended the Flower Show and gave the Best Kept Allotment Prizes.

Allotment tenants had requested reinstatement of the annual Allotment meeting; the clerk will check suitable dates for the Church Hall booking.

VILLAGE HALL

Funding continues to be sought for the replacement roof; a CIL application was to be made for funding. Iain Wright, VHMC Chairman will be invited to the next PC meeting. A new front door was installed and keys were being issued.

IN BRIEF

Following reminders to SCC regarding billing for street lighting works and power and maintenance charges one of the outstanding invoices has been received. Other work is yet to be invoiced, so the Chairman agreed to chase again.

PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMANSHIP

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

VILLAGE HALL ROOF REPLACEMENT

lain Wright, Chair of the Village Hall, and Chris Exley, Architect, gave a presentation of the proposed changes for the village hall roof replacement which includes incorporating solar panels. This would require an amendment to the planning application. They asked councillors for support for the application for CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funding. During the main meeting councillors agreed to support the application for CIL funding and the amendment to the plans.

PUBLIC FORUM

On the subject of the King's Coronation, a resident raised the suggestion of a specimen tree on Caley Green to commemorate Queen Elizabeth II and a bench beneath to celebrate King Charles III's coronation situated.

The Conservation Society have lodged an objection to the new telegraph poles on Bures Road and had followed up with the Enforcement Officer the spoil heap to the rear of Down to Earth.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Melanie Barrett advised that planning enforcement have told a landowner to discontinue using a field for parking and materials. Melanie had attended the Harpers Hill Farm Planning Committee Meeting with James Finch (SCC) at the extended working hours were passed. She said residents should raise any noise, dust, mud and waste issues from Bugg's Waste Transfer Station with planning enforcement at the County Council.

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted listed building

consent at 8 Mill Street [DC/22/03693] for reconstruction of part of boundary wall.

Councillors had no objections to works to tree applications at Shaddelows House Gravel Hill [DC/22/04976] to fell 1 Cherry tree; at 4 Birch Street [DC/22/04956] to fell 1 Holly tree; or at Mill House 12 Mill Street [DC/22/04941] to fell 1 Holly tree.

Councillors will liaise with the Tree Warden and submit a response ahead of deadline regarding a tree application at 43 Bear Street [DC/22/04942] to reduce crown of a Yew and fell 3 Lime trees.

Gerry Battye raised the issue of the telegraph poles erected along Bures Road in Wissington. It was agreed to ask the views of the County Councillor and the Dedham Vale AONB.

HIGHWAYS

It was agreed to ask our contractors to give Socket Alley a general tidy and to chase up our request to SCC to repair a damaged sign at Parkers Way.

The Conservation Society will provide details regarding the proposal to reduce the speed limit to 20 mph in the Village which the Clerk will circulate. It will be necessary to inform James Finch of the required locations for Speed Monitoring. Discussing potential monitoring locations it was suggested pinch points would produce a more favourable low mean speed result. Open stretches of highway would put the average up.

OPEN SPACES

The Playground sub-committee had made recommendations and these were agreed. The Underwood family would be contacted to provide an update on the Playground project and thank them for their very generous donation.



It was agreed to continue to monitor the driveway along Fairfield. Robin Thorogood will contact the school to discuss safety concerns along the driveway due to changes at the school and with parents' practices.

Our contractors will be reminded to cut Pop's Piece hedge. **CALEY GREEN**

Working party member, Sally Dalton, updated Councillors that site meetings with contractors were underway. Once all four meetings had taken place and information received notes were to be collated and discussed by the working group ahead of reporting to the PC.

The Parish Council have received a copy of the tree risk

assessment carried out by SCC (the landowners of Caley Green). **FOOTPATHS**

Laura Erith said SCC have apologised for the delay in rectifying the issue of unsuitable surface material being laid at Dead Lane. Suffolk Wildlife Trust will make good the surface in conjunction with the landowner.

ALLOTMENTS

PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMANSHIP

Robin Thorogood chaired the meeting **PUBLIC FORUM**

Sally Dalton said she had not had a response from the PC following her enquiries regarding the proposals for a 20mph zone in Nayland. She had asked what evidence and accidents or safety incidents there were to support the need for a 20mph restriction. She also asked if councillors had considered the extra signage and road painting that would be needed.

Lorraine Brooks said she was awaiting a reply from a SCC Properties Officer on whether they would potentially permit the planting a commemorative tree on Caley Green.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Melanie Barrett said she has £2,000 in her Locality Budget; she is considering awarding £1,000 to Nayland Village Hall roof project. She advised that the maximum award for Babergh CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funding was £100,000; applications can be made for this funding. Communities are not restricted on the number of grants applied for. Melanie is working with Iain Wright to secure CIL monies for the Village Hall roof project and is hopeful they will be successful.

Tricia Fuller suggested the grass path from St James' porch to the pedestrian gate installed to provide access to the Village Hall was not safe for less mobile residents; perhaps improving the path is a project that could benefit from this funding. Mary George pointed out the PC have several ongoing projects.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted listed building consent at **16 Birch Street** [DC/22/03839] for erection of single storey rear extension and for works to tree applications at **Shaddelows House Gravel Hill** [DC/22/04976] to fell 1 Cherry tree; at **4 Birch Street** [DC/22/04956] to fell 1 Holly tree; at **Mill House 12 Mill Street** [DC/22/04941] to fell 1 Holly tree; and at **43 Bear Street** [DC/22/04942] to reduce crown of yew and fell 3 lime trees

Between meetings to meet the deadline councillors had no objections to removal of conditions at **White Hart 11 High Street** [DC/22/05098] relating to DC/21/03616 to render over gable end rather than exposing timbers; or to a tree application at **43 Bear Street** [DC/22/04942] to reduce crown of yew and fell 3 lime trees.

Discussing recent applications, councillors had no objections to an application at **21 Stoke Road** [DC/22/05149] for construction of external staircase to existing double garage and installation of door.

HIGHWAYS - 20mph ZONE

Councillors had discussed the proposed speed monitoring locations between meetings. James Finch said that he had requested speed monitoring in the village. He said monitoring would take place over 7 days and possibly take place during January. He pointed out the low mean speed result which determines SCC's support for 20mph proposals may not meet

the criteria and stressed there are financial restrictions. Councillors will consider the result; the speed monitoring does not commit them to taking the project forward.

Mary George pointed out that questions had been raised about whether signage and road markings had been considered; there was no further comment on this.#

OPEN SPACES

Gerry Battye said they are progressing the project to install a trampoline and a basket swing at Fairfield playpark. Councillors are also working towards an ongoing maintenance plan and budgeting for the future upkeep of the playpark. The annual inspection had taken place and the PC was congratulated on the condition of this facility.

CALEY GREEN

Working party member, Sally Dalton, updated Councillors that all four site meetings with contractors have taken place and reports from them received. Details will be collated and discussed by the working group ahead of reporting to the PC.

Mary George said part of the riverside sign 'Caution Weir ahead 300m' is missing; the Environment Agency will be informed

ROYAL MEMORIAL

There had been several suggestions for potential features to commemorate Queen Elizabeth and celebrate the coronation of King Charles including a village sign, a tree and a bench on Caley Green, renaming existing village features/spaces. It was agreed to look at Caley Green as being a potential site.

WALSH TRUST

Gerry Battye said the trustees of this village charity, which for many years has provided a Christmas Bonus to residents aged 80 and over, have been considering how the funds can better meet the current needs of local people.

They have approached the Charity Commission regarding potential amendments. No final decision has been made; if the Charity Commission is in agreement previous recipients will be contacted and details circulated in the community.

IN BRIEF

SCC have promised Laura Erith that they will send the outstanding street lighting invoices; the situation is affecting the PC financial balance.

The maintenance schedule review with our contractors for the Burial Ground will take place on 9th November.

The meeting with allotment tenants is on 14th November at 7.30 in the Church Hall. A date for planting trees in the corner of the allotment needs to be fixed.

There had been no response from James Finch regarding the telegraph poles erected along the Bures Road. Another pole has been erected by the burial ground at the top of Fairfield but the notice on it by County Broadband refers to St Mary's Wiston. Laura Erith will contact them to find out more information.

Claire Buller welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: Claire Buller said we have a fabulous team on the Exec. However, as always we welcome new members to join our enjoyable friendly committee.

Fundraising Activities/Events: We have a good deal of activities being planned currently but as always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall which is managed by the CC is regularly checked by Rachel Hitchcock and details uploaded via defibcheck.org - Rachel will add Dawn Harris to admin to share duties. The annual support costs for the defibrillator were paid to Community Heartbeat Trust. River Stour Water Level Gauge: There has been no update

Nayland 10k Fun Run: <u>nayland10k.co.uk</u> Luke Rumbelow had no news to report this meeting; planning will begin in the new year. Online Ticketing Facility: NaylandEvents.org — This facility continues to be very useful; currently 5 local events are using it. If you are interested in selling tickets using this system get in touch with Justin Dowding.

Village societies request for volunteers: There has been some response to the articles in the Community Times but we will stop these for now to avoid being too repetitive. Hopefully other societies will see an upturn in members and can continue to put their own appeals in the Community Times as required.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: A group of volunteers donned tools for the spring gardening session held on 8th October.

Village Hall Roof Project: The amount needed to complete the roof is £280,000 approx. There is a shortfall. A CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) application for £100k (maximum) went in last week. £10k has been promised by CC, £67k from elsewhere and other small grants. There may be a possibility of a grant from Green Nayland. A fund thermometer has been generated (see page 24); showing money we have, money promised, and the gap which is currently £100k. The Parish Council will be asked how they can help.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 26th October.

Breakdown of profits: Community Times £1,114.50, Village Quiz £393.96, Calendar £197.50, Nayland 10k £800 .

Grants paid: Nayland Choir £128, Village Hall replacement doors £10,000. We received £270.36 as a return of grant funds provided to the Post Office Project.

Expenses: £2,479.63 for the Jubilee Party. Village Hall hire for Christmas Fayre £54. £298 for defibrillator servicing and training. Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £23,548.41 represented by Deposit a/c monies £10,748.40, Current a/c monies £9,649.72, Stripe a/c £1,786.56, Cash in Hand £1,320.23. We hold £268.50 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, Lizzie's Fund Walk £201.

Therefore, unencumbered assets are £13,078.91.

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Emma Bishton on behalf of users of the Village Hall: £280 for a coffee machine at the Village Hall so that regular uses could have access to good quality readily available coffee was agreed. Potentially an honesty box will be used for purchasing the coffee sachets. Iain Wright to confirm availability details.

Covid-19 Autumn Vaccination Campaign: A grant previously agreed for £126 to cover hire of the village hall for an official vaccination campaign was not required as the event was cancelled.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues.

Village Calendar: Calendars are on sale at the Post Office, Forget Me Not, Studio B Hairdressers and 17 Court Street. The Anchor Inn, Gladwins Farm, the Choir, Nicola at Wiston, the

Country Music Club also have some. They will be available at a stall at the Heights bus shelter on 31st October. This year's calendar has just gone into profit.

The list of events where calendars could be sold will be circulated so volunteers could come forward to attend to sell them. Matt will organise sales at at Littlegarth School and Bonfire Night. John Spooner and Kathy Hunt will kindly sell them at the Country Music Concerts and Wednesday Coffee Mornings. Any other suggestions or help would be welcome.

FORTHCOMING COMMUNITY COUNCIL ACTIVITIES:

Sale of Firework Night Tickets: 31st October Harpers Estate Old Bus Shelter with Nayland Bear. Rachel and Claire will be selling tickets and Nayland calendars from 6pm-8pm.

Bonfire & Fireworks: Saturday 5th November.

All in place with Firework Crazy for display. Insurance agreed with Zurich as per last year. Volunteers are in place for setting up, gate, refreshmants and marshalling. A few volunteers to help with the clearing up the following morning would be welcome. A skip from ATS has been donated so can clear some of the village hall garden waste and some items from cupboard.

We need to sell around 875 to break even on the display (more expensive this year because it is a Saturday).

Fred Bugg has started building bonfire and will light on day as per last year. The Guy will be paraded down at end of display and put on bonfire just before lighting. The outside catering Ice Cream Van and Fish & Chip Van will be there from 6.15pm.

Christmas Fayre/Coffee Morning: Saturday 3rd December, 10.30-1pm. Vicki Sargent & Kate Bevan leading. We are quite a small group so if anyone is interested in joining us - from complete beginners and up - we would be happy to hear from them .

Nayland Choir: Justin Dowding said they are rehearsing for a concert 'Tis the Season' with Christmas music to be held on 11th December in St James' Church at 4pm. Tickets are on sale at £10 adults, under 18 free. Car parking is available at The Anchor.

Village Players: Justin Dowding said the pantomime of high energy fun on 8th-10th December will be 'The Oz Factor'; evening performances on Thursday-Saturday and a matinee on Saturday. Buy the matinee tickets well in advance as they sell quickly. Volunteers for set building, back stage, teas on the night etc would be welcome; please get in touch.

St James' Church: Chris Hunt said the Wednesday Coffee Morning is proving popular as a weekly meeting venue. This will continue until mid December before a break for the Christmas period. Work has started on removing some pews from the rear of the nave to increase the circulation area which will allow the new server area to be more fully used. Concerts are becoming a feature in the use of the church. Regular services continue but are not very well attended, particularly the Family Service which it was hoped would bring more children and young families into the church. Remembrance Sunday will be commemorated with the usual Royal British Legion Service. There are carol services by local schools booked for early December and Christmas midnight mass will be held.

Royal British Legion: Chris Hunt said they hold regular meetings with guest speakers and organise visits; their next visit is to Fairfield Crisp factory in Wormingford. The RBL is an organisation for everyone, not just services. On Sunday 30th October at midday they are having a ceremony on Pops Piece to celebrate the 100 year anniversary of the Nayland branch. The County Chairman of the Suffolk British legion will be in attendance. Their Poppy Appeal Coffee morning is on 5th November from 10am in the Church Hall.

Parish Council: Laura Erith said the longer hours at Bugg's Transfer Station had been approved. Councillors are concerned by the new telegraph poles put in along the verge of Bures Road; the landowner appears to be SCC so we need to ask James Finch if we can object. The Caley Green update was good; various contractors have visited, this now needs to be discussed. The new playground equipment is being considered, possibly a sunken trampoline and basket swing. The Coronation and Queen's memorial is to be discussed; we would welcome suggestions, required.

Land Company (Nayland Meadow): David Slater said the AONB Dedham Vale project office recently sent a group of their volunteers to help us clear up some of the brush still lying on the field. This was used to top up some of the existing dead hedge. The hedge will be trimmed during the next month, and some oak trees planted between the ash trees In the gap between two hedges, in case Ash Die Back takes hold. We have received grant approval for the large information board about wildlife in the pond etc; this is work in progress.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton reported they are as usual keeping an eye on the green. The swans and ducks seem to be keeping healthy despite the outbreak of bird flu. They are proving popular this half term and are getting plenty of visits and food. An update is still awaited from SCC on a maintenance plan for the long reed bed. The new memorial bench is a welcome addition to the green and looks beautiful. The work to repair the erosion to the bay area is continuing; four contractors have now visited and given advice.

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter reported that 7 members attended a weeding party: cleared part of Socket Alley and the whole of the area to the south of the wall of St. James Church. Their October speaker Edward Martin made a very interesting presentation on the work carried out in Suffolk by the landscape designer Humpry Repton. The highlight of his talk was the fact that Repton was very rude to a number of land owners about the nature and design of the estates which were the subject matter of his commissions! A slightly disappointing number of only 9 volunteers attended the autumn litter pick but nevertheless the majority of the village was covered. Their next speaker meeting is on the 7th of November. Jules Pretty will be talking on 'Sea Sagas of the North: Travels & Tales at Warming Waters'.

The Society has objected to the erection of a large number of telegraph poles which have suddenly appeared along Bures Road. They are concerned by the appearance of a large mound of waste material which has built up next to the river a few hundred metres upstream from the A134. We are seeking confirmation that the enforcement team from Babergh District Council will take action to ensure it is removed. They are keeping pressure on Suffolk County Council to take steps to introduce a 20 mph speed limit in parts of the village.

AOB:

King Charles III Coronation: This will be discussed in January when more details are available. The coronation is announced as being on Saturday 6th May. It's likely this will affect the Fete which is scheduled Monday 1st May (May Day Bank Holiday may be moved to 8th). Suggestions included: Church Fete and Coronation being a joint event, showing the Coronation on the big screen and having a picnic on the field. Further ideas welcome

Queen Elizabeth and King Charles memorial: During PC meetings residents have suggested ideas for something physical to commemorate Queen Elizabeth and King Charles including: water fountain, village sign, lights on the church, a specimen tree on Caley Green for the Queen and a bench beneath for the King. Prior to the Queen's death the PC ordered fruit trees from Babergh's free tree project to plant in the far corner of the allotment field; Mary George has suggested ordering a few more for another corner and calling them the Queen's Canopy and King's Canopy. During this meeting a competition to generate a village sign and a second horse trough were suggested.

99 Bear Street Christmas Lights: Last year we agreed to support John Spooner, ensuring he had sufficient helpers to put up and take down his light display. This year, the soaring energy prices could be prohibitive. The cheer that the display brings, even more so in these difficult times, is felt to be very important. It was agreed to offer a donation of £100 towards the cost of lighting.

DATE OF NEXT MEETING: will be on **Wednesday 4th January** at 8pm (Exec 7.30pm) in the Church Hall.



WATER LEVELS & QUALITY

While some are complaining about the very wet weather recently it is very much needed for our gardens, the countryside, rivers, reservoirs and to recharge groundwater chalk aquifier following this year's drought conditions.

River levels are back to a seasonal norm and Nayland's flood channel has been flowing when needed. If there is too much water at once and the river flows too fast with silt and debris then water cannot be abstracted to Abberton Reservoir to restore levels there.

In late September, just after the last issue of the CT went to print the water level plummeted unexpectedly. Peter Willett, EA Hydrologist, who has supplied interesting information previously explained:

"We were aware of the cessation in flow at Nayland, which is likely to continue until Friday/early Saturday. You are correct that we ceased abstraction from the SAGS augmentation scheme boreholes on the 14th September. At which time we were able to continue supporting the river with water transferred from Denver. These transfers, at a rate of 20 megalitres/day were sufficient to give a healthy flow of water through all the Nayland channels. Unfortunately from the 21st September the flow at Denver fell below our legal hands off flow. We were able to maintain some transfers into the Stour by draining the stores in the Ely-Ouse river and cut off channel, these act like big reservoirs giving us several days of additional storage. Nevertheless transfers from Denver could not be sustained this week. There was a possibility rainfall over the Stour catchment could have kept flow just above the critical levels. We also knew we would be able to restart Denver transfers from the 28th by building up storage in the two channels I have indicated. We therefore faced a decision whether to restart support from SAGS boreholes which would have taken 3 days to reach Nayland or to accept a small window of low flow knowing we would be able to increase flows significantly from the 28th and sustain them at that level for the rest of the year. The SAGS boreholes are not a river support scheme, any benefit the river gets is concomitant to their primary role in supporting the water treatment works at Langham. For much of the summer the two purposes have benefited each other. However With public demand now much reduced the water company did not accept our offer of support from SAGS. There is a very tight quantity limit on this licence which needs to be held for resilience purposes should we experience a further prolonged period of drought next summer.

To be honest with all the various forms of support and uncertain rainfall we were not completely sure whether natural recovery of flow would keep rates just above the Level at which the horseshoe weir ceases to flow. It's a fine balance and at this time of year there's a lot of variables in the mix.

I can assure you however that we should have the resources at Denver to ensure this is the last period of low flow this year. As I say we should start today transferring 80 Ml/day into the river at Wixoe. Some of this (35 Ml/day) will be diverted into the Pant at Wixoe so we should experience a 70% increase in

flow at Nayland by the weekend. Our legal hands off flow at Denver reduces for the Winter from 318 Ml/day to 114 Ml/day on the 1st October so this transfer if necessary can be guaranteed until next spring.

It is very likely we will be transferring at high rates throughout the autumn. The Essex reservoirs are heavily depleted but It will of course depend on local rainfall."

REED CONTROL AT THE WEIR

Despite the assurances to a local resident, and indications published on the internet that some reed management would take place at Nayland Weir this did not happen. They advised the resident that:

"Currently, there is insufficient flood risk to people and property for us to justify carrying out maintenance work around the Horsehoe Weir.

We have to prioritise our works where the flood risk is the highest. Therefore, we are increasingly reliant on the cooperation of landowners to undertake their riparian responsibilities. Due to the Nayland flood relief channel, a reed cutting regime is simply no longer needed in the area for flood risk.

We have considered carrying out a limited reed cut and weed removal exercise with regard to riparian owner responsibilities immediately around the Horseshoe Weir, and again we do not believe there is a need to carry out such work at this time as the reeds and in-channel weed growth are an integral part of a healthy river ecosystem. A fringe of reeds and marginal plants is vital to provide food and cover for wildlife including protected species and to shade and oxygenate the river. We only recommend removing them when they are becoming a hazard."

Many residents consider there is considerably more than a fringe of reeds and that they have become a hazard. River craft users say they are an obstacle to their right of navigation.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

As mentioned last issue the cygnets have departed; the river seems bare without them. On the other hand there have been a number of ducks at Caley Green, more than we have seen for some time. It's hoped they stay clear of Avian Flu.

Hopefully in a couple of months the swans and ducks will be mating again and the whole cycle will begin again.



Memorial Bench: At the beginning of October the replacement memorial bench dedicated to 'Michael John Fryer 1940-2000' was fitted around one on the trees on Caley Green. The circular bench was beautifully crafted by Dylan Pym of Polstead (www.dylanpym.co.uk), here sitting on the bench. It will be enjoyed by many. We are grateful to the Fryer family.

CALEY GREEN

The Green has been a little quieter as autumn now heading into winter and the shorter days. well used during the summer and the Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and helping to maintain it as a great asset of the village. Many thanks to them.

THE LONG REED BED

Although. following a site visit with SCC's Properties Officer, the news about management of the tall Norfolk reeds had been positive and it was hoped some of the reeds would be cut there is no progress yet. Unfortunately the Officer involved has been on sick leave. It is disappointing that the autumn window, when it is suitable to cut reeds, has been missed.

THE CULVERT

Again, there is no progress on this. Silt and vegetation continues to accumulate in the mouth of the culvert. SCC were asked to clear the debris; this has not been attended to yet. The reed bed by the culvert mouth has expanded considerably this year worsening the problem.

RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

There has been some progress with the project to protect the riverbank around the bay from erosion. Four contractors have now visited the site and given their advice on the best solution to the problem. This information has been collated and will be discussed by the working party and their recommendation put to the full Parish Council. Permission from SCC, as landowners, will need to be obtained and how it will be funded still needs to be established.

NAYLAND MEADOW RIVERBANK: Reading a resident's letter and comment from the Land Company regarding the Nayland Meadow in the last CT it's disappointing that the riverside walk will not benefit from any field-edge management. It used to be cut annually as the wildflower belt still is; that benefits plant life.

The photo taken in October shows that while the wildflower strip is cut to encourage wildflowers and plant diversity, the strip along the top of the riverbank is not; so the nettles etc will thrive and smother other plant life from establishing. Cutting just the top of the riverbank would not disturb the riverside corridor for wildlife.

The Meadow was purchased with donations from residents and held in perpetuity, managed by Trustees. Have the Trustees asked residents their opinion regarding management of the riverbank? They seem more concerned with the opinions of outside bodies who feed them generalised conservation information. These bodies are happy to clutter the meadow with signage and a gimmicky photo post.

It's a shame that there are now far more pleasant walks - towards Wiston and towards Stoke - than that round the Nayland Meadow where very little of the river can be seen.... even in October as the photo shows. Fishing is another activity almost impossible to enjoy despite original promises 'Fishing would be exclusively available to residents'.

The Trustees appeal for financial donations and volunteers to provide labour. Yet they don't appear to respect residents (and users of the footpath) sufficiently to listen to their opinions or consider any compromise.

NAYLAND VILLAGE HALL - ROOF UPGRADE

THE DESIGN

The Village Hall requires a new roof. The Village Hall Management Committee (VHMC) commissioned Chris Exley, a local architect, to produce the necessary drawings and details.

Chris obtained both planning permission for the change of roof covering and building regulations approval. The Village Hall roof insulation must be upgraded to comply with the building regulations, resulting in a deeper roof construction. This part of the project represents a significant part of the costs.

There is a real benefit to the running costs of the Village Hall when the additional roof insulation is fully installed.

There is another benefit that is now possible. A system of photo-voltaic panels has been developed that does not damage the slates by using a preformed panel to support the P-V panel omitting the slates below but maintaining the integrity of the roof covering. Chris has prepared amended drawings and the Parish Council has submitted the drawings for consideration as an amendment to the existing planning consent.

The installation and use of the P-V panels will generate a significant amount of electricity.

The running costs of the Village Hall will be considerably reduced, together with an income generated by the PV panels, which will generate more electricity than the Village Hall currently uses. This will increase green credentials of the Village Hall and thereby reduce its carbon footprint.

FUNDING


The Village Hall Management Committee are applying for grants from Babergh and Mid Suffolk District Council, in respect of the Village Hall replacement Roof. The funds that will be requested are £100,000 from the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) and a further £25,000 from the Community Grant Fund. There are other applications in progress.

The VHMC in conjunction with the Community Council hope to run events next year, to aid with fund raising. Hopefully, the residents of Nayland and Wiston will enjoy. The target for these events is £20,000 raised and hopefully this will be achieved. There will be many other applications made for grants. These are shown in the centre of the thermometer.

The bottom part of the thermometer represents funds already secured which total £66,000 and included money from an individual, Parish Council, Community Council and the VHMC.

There is a serious short fall of £60,000 still to be raised for the re-roofing project, which may or may not be covered by additional grants and donations, Shown at the top of the thermometer.

The anticipated date for the start and complete the roof replacement is during the summer next year. The roof replacement works will be tendered during January 2023 and hopefully the contract awarded during April 2023.

100th Anniversary

Once this has been completed everyone will be able to read every page via a link on the Society's web site. The Company carrying out this work, Microform, based in London, have agreed to do it without charge and I would like to publicly thank them for their generosity. It is hoped in due course that the book will be on display in St. James.





The ringing of handbells is usually associated with tune ringing. Some years ago I was privileged to hear in concert the Chelmsford based 'Sound in Brass' who played marvellous music on over 100 handbells by something like 11 performers. Nayland hasn't achieved that standard yet!

But handbells serve a useful purpose for tower ringers learning the art of change ringing. They can be used to illustrate the movement of bells in the tower during method ringing when a 'Bob' or 'single' is called. This is a very English tradition.



Here is a brief summary of this year's use of the bird nest boxes on the meadow.

We had a total of 14 nest boxes in place for this breeding season. Of these, 7 were definitely used by nesting birds, 5 were definitely not used, 1 was possibly used (some nesting material brought in but doubtful that successful nesting occurred) and 1 could not be inspected.

The results are tabulated above. The aerial image below shows the location of each nest box.

The barn owl box was used for nesting by stock dove or possibly woodpigeon. When inspected there was one complete (unhatched) egg, and the remains of two further eggs (see image left). There was one dead chick in the nest, suggesting that there was one successfully fledged young. The other successful nesters are likely to have been blue tits and great tits.


The VHMC would like to remind villagers that when an event is held in the hall the hirers have the sole use of the car park.

Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

There is very little remaining in flower here, but there are still a few flowers left on our Kaffir Lilies. The scientific name is Schizostylis and it's a native of South Africa where it grows alongside streams. It's a useful plant since it starts flowering in autumn, and will continue until the first real frost. It lives a sunny and preferably slightly damp situation (though it hasn't really got the latter here). The flowers which resemble a miniature Gladioulus, are borne on stems about 18 inches high and in the type S. Coccinea are deep red. There are several named varieties, including a pink one which we also grow and, according to the reference books, a white one.

At the moment the little Cyclamen Hederifolium [the species name means "with leaves like Ivy", which is an accurate description] has finished flowering, but is in full leaf. No two plants have exactly the same marbling on the leaves and a large clump is an attractive sight throughout the winter. It will tolerate quite a bit of shade, and happily settle right up to the trunk of a tree. The sticky seeds in their pods at the end of twisted stems will be scattered some distance from the parent plant, probably with a bit of assistance from ants, and the seedlings after appear in lawns or thicker grass. Now is the time to dig these up before they get mown, and transfer to new quarters; in this way a decent sized colony can be established.

There are several other hardy Cyclamen which flower in Spring and Summer (e.g. C. Repandum, C. Cilicium, C. Graecum and others), but in the OM/S' experience these are either doubtfully hardy of difficult in other ways, and he has regretfully given up on them.

Just now shops and garden centres are full of florist's Cyclamen, hybrids of C. Persicum, which is a tender greenhouse or houseplant, and produces a wonderful display of blossom. After they have finished flowering they can be put outside in warmer weather to die down, and then revived next Autumn, but this seldom produces good results and since they're cheap to buy it's not really worth the trouble.

By now many gardeners have ceased operations for the year. It is a fact that spades and forks that are clean perform their functions better and with less effort on the part of their owners than those that are rusty and covered with dried mud. Those gardeners who served in the forces with remember that their rifles had to be clean, bright, and slightly oiled, or else some form of retribution was exacted; penalties apart, the principles are the same. The same applies to other garden machinery, such as mowers, where a bit of personal attention now can avoid the necessity of an expensive annual service; it's also a good idea to change the oil now, rather than in haste (or not at all) before the first mowing next spring.

Approaching December and thinking of seasonal decoration the OM/S had a look at his holly bushes, to find that the birds were getting at them already. It's a good idea to pick some now, and keep it in a plastic sack out of doors and away from mice.

Which leads by natural route for the OM/S to wish his readers a **Happy Christmas**, and successful gardening in 2023.

THE HIGH STREET TROUGH - A MYSTERY SOLVED

The iconic milestone in the High Street has been a focal point and a familiar part of the street scene since the eighteenth century but unfortunately there is no known record of its origins. However, much more is known about the trough standing beside it. This is now well over a hundred years old and most of its history is recorded in the Parish Council's archives although for a long time there had been an intriguing mystery concerning the trough which has now been solved.

The inscription on the stone trough tells us that it was erected to commemorate the coronation of George V on the 22nd June 1911. An old iron trough had previously stood next to the obelisk and the Parish Council minute book recorded that as part of the celebrations for the 1911 coronation they proposed replacing the old iron trough with one of stone. An alternative suggestion by Councillor Deaves was the possibility of Bathing Sheds but this was rejected as bathing had become impracticable through river pollution. The stone trough was agreed upon and the invoice from L J Watts of Colchester showed that the cost of providing and engraving the trough was £20 11s 0d.

Prior to the coronation in 1911 the iron trough had been in constant use by residents and was kept full of water which had been gifted to the village by Professor G D Liveing of Cambridge. The Professor was related to the Fenn family who lived at Alston Court for many years and also Bear House (formerly Stourbank) in Bear Street. In a letter to the Parish Council in 1900 the Professor, who owned land to the north of the village where there was a spring, wrote that he wished to provide "a supply of wholesome water for the benefit of the inhabitants of Nayland". The Council gratefully accepted this gift and Mr Deaves, the builder in High Street, laid the necessary pipes to convey the water from the spring down to the village, installing the first fountain in Bear Street opposite Parkers Way. Not long after this Mr Deaves received instructions from Professor Liveing to erect two



more fountains, one at the Perry Farm in Bear Street (next to Forget-me-not) and one against the milestone in the High Street.

At this time residents obtained their water from wells around the village and these fountains must have been a welcome supplement to their water supply. Mains water was eventually installed in 1939 although some Parish Councillors seemed not to want it, insisting that Nayland already had an ample supply of water! However, the Ministry of Health said that as Nayland was developing, more facilities, including water, would be needed.

In 1906,a few years after the fountains were installed, the Professor decided to convey to the Parish Council "the property in the well head, settling tank and pipes and also a right of way over my land at reasonable times and with the least possible injury to growing crops for the purpose of cleaning and repairing well head, tank



and pipes". Although occasional references to the conveyance appear in the minutes over subsequent years, this document, which included a map, seems to have been lost and what happened to the land and conveyance is unknown.

As well as providing the new stone trough in 1911 the Parish Council's Coronation Committee decided to add a brass plaque to it with the inscription: "The water which supplies this and other fountains in Nayland was the generous gift of Professor Liveing to commemorate the coronation of His Majesty Edward VII" (in 1902). No one had ever seen this plaque and it seemed that we would probably never know what had happened to it. It was a pity that the Professor's generous act seemed not to have been acknowledged in any other way and few people knew of it.

I can now report that the plaque has unexpectedly come to light and has been restored to its rightful place on the stone trough! Earlier this year contact was made by a family who had found what turned out to be the missing plaque. They found it in the shed of a relative who had worked for Deaves the builders for many years. He lived in Stoke-by-Nayland all his life and had recently died, aged 94. They have no idea how or why the plaque came to be in the shed but having read about the trough and the missing plaque they realised what it was. It seems likely that the plaque fell off the trough whilst their relative was still working for Deaves and he was going to put it back, but something happened and it was forgotten.

Now the mystery of the missing plaque has been solved, thanks to the family who found it. It has been put back on the trough during the recent cleaning and renovation of the trough, milestone and war memorial organised by the Parish Council. More than a hundred years of dirt was removed and it can be seen on the left hand side of the trough.

Though not very conspicuous it records an important event in the history of Nayland's water supply and it is fitting that Professor Liveing's generous gift is once more being acknowledged, as was intended in 1911.

WEATHER SUMMARY: September & October 2022 by David Lowe

In **September**, low pressure managed to 'get in' a few times but high pressure was still dominant, though not always in a location that gave unseasonably warm conditions. Thus, we finish up with a cocktail of statistics.

Mean temperature was 14.9 °C (14.71) with a max of 25.6 °C (25.81). Lowest temperature was 3.2 °C (4.9) the second lowest over the 15 year record period. Lowest max was 13.8 °C (14.92).

No. of days over 20 °C was correspondingly 15, while over 25 °C, was 5 (1.87) first equal over the 15 year record period with no days of 30 or more. There was only one day with a max of less than 15 °C (1.33) and 15 less than 20 °C (18.27). There were no frosts of any sort, but it got close on the 29th.

Bright sun hours were 258.8 (244.23) second to 2018 with solar energy at 7750 Ly (7648.33).

Monthly rainfall was 40.4 mm (40.62) with highest rainfall in a day 9.2 mm on the 7th. Over Suffolk as a whole there were some remarkable falls that day as a front became slow moving over West Suffolk. We were on the eastern fringe of this – Long Melford had 25mm and Bury St Edmunds 100 mm!

Evapotranspiration in September was 62 mm, so still showing a moisture deficit. Highest rainfall rate was 145 mm/hr on the 7th – there were no days with 10mm of rain or more.

Average wind speed was 3.8 mph (2.88) with no days with a gust of 30 mph or more.

The warm trend continued in **October**, but with more rainfall, though still below average. The atmospheric set up often involved high pressure to the east of us, with low pressure well down into the Atlantic, drawing up very warm air between them from the Canary Islands, and sometimes, even further south. Cooler air encroaching on this gave us much of our rain.

The mean October temperature of 13.3°C (11.67) was a record for October over the 15 year record period but not by much. Both 2011 and 2014 managed 13.1°C.


The highest temperature recorded was 21.9°C (20.79) which was noteworthy for being right at the end of the month. The lowest maximum temp was 15.2°C (10.71) a substantial 2.3°C clear of any other October. The lowest (night) temperature was 2.4 °C (2.07). There were 4 days over 20°C (1.87).

Bright sun hours were 192.7 (165.57) beaten only by 2011 at 198.5. Solar Energy was 5500 Ly (4638.33) beaten only by 2018 at 5625 Ly.

Monthly rain was 48 mm (60.14) below average but exceeding evapotranspiration of 45 mm – just. You may have noticed that paths and other surfaces stayed wetter for longer, from about mid-month, as humidity levels remained high and evaporation, low. Highest rainfall rate was 96 mm/hr (75.62) and there was 1 day on which in excess of 10mm fell (1.53). No days of 20mm +.

Average wind speed was 3.8 mph (3.4) with highest daily average of 10.1 mph (7.26). There were 2 days (1.13) with a gust over 30 mph and none over 35 mph (0.13). Predominant wind direction was SSW.

2022 OCTOBER MEAN TEMPERATURE: The mean temperature horizontal line is 11.67°C



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




Nayland:

ST MARY'S WISTON: WHEELCHAIR RAMP

St Mary's Church at Wiston is pleased to announce the completion of our project to install a wheelchair ramp and new steps at the east end of the churchyard, providing improved access at the point where the existing footpath meets the church boundary

The old steps have been completely refashioned, and the new ramp constructed from recovered bricks and weathered block paving. The result is a very sympathetically designed and built access point.

Thank you to all involved with the management and execution of these works, and especially to those who have very generously sponsored this project.



COMMUNITY PANTRY & HARDSHIP FUND

First things first - from being in a financially shaky position a few months ago, thanks to the generosity of people who have set up standing orders or made donations, the Community Pantry/ Hardship Fund (CP/HF) is now in a position to support a greater number of people in our benefice who need help. Thank you so much, not least for enabling the fund to set up two pantries in addition to that already established in Nayland, one in Stoke the other in Polstead, all three being sited in their churchs' porches. The possibility of one being set up in Leavenheath is currently being explored.

Another initiative is the giving of grants to families with children in receipt of free school meals and it is hoped to do this again before Christmas. 'Warm spaces' are very much in the news at the moment - meeting places providing actual warmth as well as companionship: the CP/HF is supporting the setting up of one in Stoke and is ready to do so elsewhere.

Alongside the pantries, the Hardship Fund - administered in strict confidence by Rev Stéphane Javelle and Rev Valri Armstrong (telephone numbers 01206 263589 and 01206 272812) - exists to help in real financial emergency, and there is little doubt that the need for this is likely to increase over the next few months.

So as we stand, funds are holding up, but with the expansion of the project comes the need for reliable long-term funding. If

you would like either to donate or set up a standing order the details are as follows: Account name - Community Pantry/ Hardship Fund; Sort code 30-99-50 (Lloyds Bank); Account No 24195560. Any amount you can spare will be most gratefully received. Please would you contact Adam Sedgwick (adam.sedgwick@yahoo.co.uk) so that he can send you a Gift Aid form which, if you are a taxpayer, enables you to add 25% to your donation at no cost to you.

Some people, of course, prefer to take goods to the pantries and these are most welcome too. Might we ask, however, that these be restricted to food (though at the moment not tinned tomatoes, beans other than baked beans, or chickpeas, please!) cleaning products or toiletry items. If you have other items which you think might be useful, please could you contact Lucy Bartlett (lucyofleisure@hotmail.com), Jane Wilson (jaywilson6988@gmail.com) or Adam Sedgwick.

For a relatively small community - about 4,000 people across the four LSPN villages - this project, started in Nayland rectory by Rev Mark Woodrow, is a real success story. The Community Pantries have provided over £2,000-worth of goods in the last five months: in the same period the Hardship Fund has paid out over £500 and plans to provide over three times as much over the Christmas period. With the help of all who support it, it is hoped that the CP/HF will continue to develop in response to changing and increasing need. Thank you so much for your continuing generosity.



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
