NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 8th December 2021

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

PUBLIC FORUM

A resident asked when feedback from the Caley Green Event will be published. The Chairman they were awaiting further response regarding the suggestion of including a jetty. A resident reported rusty traffic signs in the traffic island on the A134 and reeds were again blocking the culvert on Caley Green.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Melanie Barrett had reported that Babergh have changed their provision of road sweeping. In relation to Planning, Investigations are still ongoing into a suspected breach of planning - the storage of building materials in a field.

Enforcement officers have concluded that no planning breach has taken place at the site of the proposed workers dwelling at Harpers Hill Farm where planning had been refused. Enforcement is looking into a caravan on site with no conclusion as yet.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The summary of recommendations for consideration include:

- A Precept of £41758 for 2022/23 year (subject to final tax base figures)
- A further £2000 be allocated to the Capital Investment Fund from the 2022/23 year.
- This Council continues to adhere to the National Scale for Clerks Salaries for 2022/23 year
- This Council will award the Grass and Litter Contracts for 2022/23 year to our existing contractors.
- The Contribution towards Webbs Meadow grass cutting to remain at £350
- The allotment rent is to remain the same for next financial year
- The Burial Fees will have a small uplift to allow for inflation in a similar way to previous years.
- The current Internal Control Policy, Financial Regulations and Standing Orders have been reviewed and currently meet our needs.
- The fixed asset document has been updated for approval
- Parish CIL monies are to be used for the turning circle improvements which can now be authorised
- The full resurfacing of the playground should go ahead as soon as possible.

COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

James Finch said he has received a summary of the proposal for 'No HGVs' signs requested in Wiston. He will liaise with Mary George regarding a weight restriction request being included for Birch Street in the Lorry Route Review.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted consent at: **2 Larch Grove** [DC/21/05738] for erection of single storey rear extension and dormer extension to roof (following demolition of existing), at **Hammonds**, **Harpers Hill** [DC/21/05718] for variation of conditions to Approved Plans and Documents to allow design changes to new dwelling and at **31 Fen Street** [DC/21/05870] for works to trees shape and reduce crown of 1 self-seeded Walnut (T1) and fell 2 Ash (T2 and T3), 1 Conifer (T4) and remains of 1 Vibernum Opulus (T5) in rear garden.

Between meetings councillors had no objections at **Rushbanks House, Bures Road** [DC/21/06038] for single storey and two storey side/rear extensions (following removal of existing conservatory), re-build chimneys, replacement windows and extension to garden terraced area or at **Roziers, Wissington Uplands** [DC/21/06190] for erection of an open-sided outdoor kitchen canopy with associated hard and soft landscaping works. They had no objections at **Mill House, 12 Mill Street** [DC/21/06086/7] for erection of single storey rear extension and internal alterations to existing house as detailed in the design access and heritage statement and plans, subject to ensuring that all exterior doors and windows complement the existing rear facade in terms of finish and colour. Councillors had no objections at **Woodside, Wissington Uplands** [DC/21/06202] for works to protected trees TPO BT217/A1 to

remove lower epicormic growth and deadwood from 6 Oaks (T1, T4, T5, T6, T7 and T8), remove lower epicormic growth from 1 Oak (T2), raise crown by 50% and remove die back of 1 Oak (T3), and reduce overhang and thin crown by 15% of 5 additional Holm Oaks or at **39 Fen Street** [DC/21/06435] for works to trees to fell 1 Scots Pine and replant 3 heritage fruit trees near southern fence.

Objections to the variation of conditions application at Harpers Hill Farm were issued to the Planning Authority between meetings as agreed.

Further applications that had just come in will be considered between meetings.

HIGHWAYS

Mary George has completed the survey and bullet points for the Suffolk County Council Lorry Route Review; Councillors agreed to press for a weight restriction on Birch Street. Councillors will consider speeding black spots in the village and the need for vehicle activated signage. It will reported that the Church Lane Grit bin has not been filled. Councillors spent some time discussing traffic speeding.

FAIRFIELD RECREATION GROUND

Councillors will consider removal of vegetation, including Buddleia along the Fairfield Drive as it is forcing large vehicles to drive on the grass on the opposite side of the drive.

CALEY GREEN

There has been a range of responses so far from residents; a suggestion of other suitable plants, an offer of drone pictures and offer to assist with potential funding towards a jetty is useful. Representatives from Friends of Caley Green will be invited to join the working party. Mary George suggested when they have concrete proposals there would be an open forum to move the project forward.

ALLOTMENTS

A new tenant had taken on a plot that was in poor condition; it was agreed to waive the first years rent.

Councillors will liaise with the landowner of Bell Meadow regarding improving access steps to the allotment field; the work may be eligible for a Dedham Vale Grant.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

Further information is awaited regarding Platinum Jubilee Mugs, however, it was agreed to contribute 'up to £600' as a contribution towards gifting mugs to children of the parish aged 16 and under.

IN BRIEF

Laura Erith is pursuing the poor condition of Dead Lane (part of St Edmunds Way path); it has been reported to SCC PROW.

The maintenance plan for the Burial Ground was agreed. Ten fence panels need replacing and the Jean Griggs memorial bench needs attention. The burial fees will be increased slightly.

The planning application renewal for the Village Hall roof has been submitted.

Ned Cartwright explained his research regarding infrastructure and equipment to improve hybrid PC meetings.

The Walsh Trust met in the build up to Christmas; it is always hard to identify recipients of the Christmas payments, however, all are being arranged again this year. After many years of service, Mrs Eva Rolfe is resigning from the Walsh Trust committee.

THE SHEEP ARE BACK!!

It is lovely to see the sheep grazing on the Glebe meadow beside the allotments. Dog walkers should remember that they must keep their dogs on a lead and under control while walking near livestock on footpaths and agricultural land.

They also need to be aware that the grazier uses a moveable electric fence within the meadow to protect the flock but this isn't always visible in poor light; please keep to the permissive path around the perimeter.

PUBLIC FORUM

Mike Hunter said the Conservation Society are hoping to progress a scheme for a 20 mph speed restriction though the village with assistance of the County Councillor. The Society has raised concerns with Babergh DC regarding two sites: a field at the rear of The Willows in Wiston Road, there appears to be a non-agricultural use involving the storage of materials and equipment and the New Farm residential development on Harpers Hill regarding a close boarded fence which has been erected which does not appear to have been authorised according to the planning records.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Melanie Barrett said that in connection with the New Farm development she was told there would be planting along the fence. With regard to road sweeping; councillors will be invited to attend a meeting, when the road sweeper is next available, to go round the village highlighting problem areas and develop possible solutions. Drivers are equipped with leaf blower type equipment to clean around parked cars.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted consent at: **97 Bear Street** [DC/21/04980] for erection of a two storey rear extension and single storey side extension, at **Roziers Wissington Uplands** [DC/21/06190] for erection of open-sided outdoor kitchen canopy with associated hard and soft land-scaping works. Consent has been granted for works to trees at **Woodside Wissington Uplands** [DC/21/06202] TPO BT217/ A1 to remove lower epicormic growth and deadwood from 6 Oaks (T1, T4, T5, T6, T7 and T8), remove lower epicormic growth from 1 Oak (T2), raise crown by 50% and remove die back of 1 Oak (T3), and reduce overhang and thin crown by 15% of 5 additional Holm Oaks and at **High Garth House Cawley Road** [DC/21/06613] TPO BT217/G5 to raise the crown of 1 Beech in driveway and reduce several smaller branches away from BT wires.

Listed building consent has been granted at **5 Birch Street** [DC/21/05276] to replace cement render with lime render, replace gypsum with lime plaster, replace rainwater goods with cast iron, repoint mortar to fireplace with lime and other internal works.

Babergh have refused permission at **The White House 16 Church Lane** [DC/21/04188] for erection of single-storey cart lodge and at **Old Brewery House, 20 Church Lane** [DC/21/04181] for erection of a two-bay cart lodge with attached bike store/workshop and first floor home office, replacement of railings and erection of a greenhouse and shed (following demolition of existing carport and shed). These are neighbouring properties and refusal for both was on grounds including: it is proposed to place the building on the boundary with the neighbouring property (The White House/Old Brewery House) which has a concurrent application for an outbuilding, also on the boundary, The net result of both proposals would be one very large outbuilding; their amassed scale and form would appear incongruous within the street-scene, to the detriment of the character of the conservation area.

Between meetings councillors had no objections for listed building applications at **16 Court Street** [DC/21/06872] for insertion of French doors (following removal of infill rear extension and existing window and door); at **12 Stoke Road** [DC/21/06621] for creation of parking space and new vehicular access following removal of front wall, piers, gate and gate posts with retention of east brick pier, and installation of external charging point for electric vehicle to the east elevation; and at **9 Bear Street** [DC/21/06577] to remove failing cement-based render from front and side elevations of the property and replace with a traditional breathable hair chalk plaster, subject to input from the Heritage Officer.

Councillors will write to Babergh asking for details of the amended application at New Farm and why they were not advised of changes. They will asked when the footpath to the development will be constructed.

Councilors will not submit comments regarding the proposed demolition of Boxted Bridge as they felt Nayland is not affected by the proposal.

Councillors noted that deadline for the Stansted Night Flights Consultation is 3rd March and the Bramford to Twinstead Pylons Consultation is 21st March. A public meeting planned for 18th February regarding the Pylons has been postponed.

HIGHWAYS

Discussions took place on various Highways issues but no resolutions were made. Monitoring would be needed and data reviewed; it would not be able to do this in the next few months with various roadworks pending.

James Finch said that the drainage project to alleviate flooding in the Birch Street/Mill Street area is on schedule.

STREET LIGHTING

Gerry said some lanterns have been replaced with the new LED lights and it has resulted in dark patches.

FAIRFIELD RECREATION GROUND

Following communication with concerned neighbours regarding the hedge and invasion of privacy it was decided that the hedge will remain but it would be acceptable for the neighbours to erect their own fence or additional vegetation.

CALEY GREEN

Mary reported that the working party now appreciate there is a need for more specialist advice from river engineers or contractors and it was agreed to write seeking advice. It is likely inclusion of a small jetty will be deferred.

It is felt that the length on riverbank which has become overgrown with reeds should also be addressed; there have been complaints regarding access for Fishing Rights. The land was registered with the Land Registry in 2013 but the map does not show riparian responsibility. However, the Friends of Caley Green have a licence agreement with SCC, dated 2017, allowing them to control the reed growth. Mary also raised the question whether, in the future, maintenance could become a community project under the guidance of SCC.

FOOTPATHS

Dawn Harris raised an issue on the riverside footpath which goes round Nayland Meadow; there have been complaints that walkers have slipped on the rough ground. The footpath Warden and SCC PROW Officer will be advised.

VILLAGE HALL

Discussions took place regarding upgrading equipment to facilitate improved Zoom access to PC meetings; this involve considering whether the equipment would be fixed or mobile as PC meetings may move back to the committee room at some point. The Clerk will investigate cost of potential systems.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL

The PC confirmed they were happy for the Jubilee mugs to be ordered; the CC Treasurer and PC Clerk will liaise regarding financial matters. Laura Erith represents the PC on the Platinum Jubilee planning Committee.

SCC DRAINAGE PROJECT IN NAYLAND

For enlarging the capacity of the drainage in the vicinity of Mill Street, Bear Street, Birch Street and Gravel Hill, final operational plans of this major project are now being finalised with a view to commencing the project from the **end of March 2022**.

It is with regret that this will cause some inconvenience to a number of residents in the village for which Suffolk Highways will try very hard to keep to a minimum but do apologise in advance. The project will last in total about 12 weeks but will be carried out in phases and residents concerned will be kept informed of the timescales that will affect them specifically.




Calendar Photographic Competition

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: Rachel Hitchcock said we have a fabulous team on the Exec but reminded members that she would like to take a step back as Chair after four years in the role; it is time for change and new ideas. She felt it would be helpful going forward if different members could take the lead for some events, perhaps sharing the organisation of an event. They would be well supported by the rest of the Exec but it would share the responsibility and lighten the load on the Chair role. Rachel also said she would be prepared to share the role for a period of time if that encouraged someone to take it on. It was also discussed that two people could put themselves forward to share the role.

Lesley Jameson sadly advised she has to move home and this may be some distance away; although she will continue in the role until a new Treasurer can be found. We will be very sorry to see Lesley leave; she has done an outstanding job and brought us up-to-date in difficult times.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. Tracy Le Grys and Rachel Hitchcock will organise a training session. It will include general aspects of First Aid. Tracy will investigate possible first aid training providers.

Recent Activities:

Bonfire Night - 5th November. Rachel Hitchcock said Bonfire Night had been a huge success with lots of positive feedback. The display was amazing from Dynamic Fireworks. As expected it was quieter than normal but well worth doing as those who came really enjoyed it; there was a real festive atmosphere. The school choir and ukes performed beautifully and the societies did a great job with their stalls which were well supported. Santa was wonderful as usual. Thank you so much to those of you who were able to help on the day. Our efforts were well appreciated by all who came along and although we didn't make a profit - that is not really the purpose of this event.

Christmas Trail: Rachel said this was well received and thanked all those who participated with Advent Windows, the Christmas Tree Trail and the Christmas Wreath Competition.

They looked wonderful and brought much cheer to the village. **Father Christmas -** *24th December:* His tour of Nayland in Foster Jones' vintage car received many positive comments. 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



NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE ON CALEY GREEN

The Parish Council is continuing to explore all feasible options, in particular the proportion of planting to non-planting erosion prevention measures. However, there are statutory requirements that must be fulfilled when completing a Flood Risk Application permit, two of these being to conserve and enhance the environment and to consider biodiversity (please see our webpage for full presentation). We are now seeking further professional guidance and advice from several suppliers. Whilst we explore these avenues, it has been decided that it is prudent at this stage to delay any decision about including a jetty.

The maintenance of the long reed bed would not form part of the application to prevent erosion, however, we are committed to establishing a long-term maintenance programme that controls the reeds. The Working Party has been looking at the various licences granted by Suffolk County Council. We are considering further negotiations with Suffolk County Council Asset Management Officers to establish a community wide group of volunteers to work on the reeds annually under the leadership of the Parish Council using the strict guidelines set out by Suffolk ecologists and the Environment Agency.

The minutes of the two working party meetings held since the Caley Green Open Meeting, along with previous Caley Green documents and minutes of 2021 meetings, on the Parish Council webpages of the Nayland and Wiston Community website.

The purpose of the Open Meeting in November was to present information and report progress with several opportunities for residents to ask questions or make comments. We have noted the negative comments made in the December Community Times, but councillors also received positive feedback and offers of assistance after the meeting. We do accept that there were problems for those wishing to access the Open Meeting via Zoom. The notice on our webpage at the time did warn about potential difficulties as the Village Hall had no wifi or IT equipment. That notice also included contact information for zoom link requests. Everyone who made a request was sent the link by email. We attempted to be as inclusive as possible in stressful times but without access to appropriate technology it proved to be too difficult.

We would like to thank everyone for their comments so far. Please rest assured that we, the Parish Council, have the best for Caley Green at heart and will do everything we can to enhance, protect and provide a safe communal area for the local community to enjoy for many years to come.

WATER LEVELS

Water levels seem to have returned to their seasonal norm and the flood channel doing its job when necessary of diverting high water levels away from the village and down the flood channel.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

There seem to be a number of ducks on the river which is pleasing to see; it has seemed quieter in recent years.

There are currently two pairs of swans; one pair on the river and one pair on the Meadow pond. The pair on the pond have a juvenile with them some of the time; it spreads it wings and goes off for spells showing some independence. The parents will put up with it hanging around for much longer as breeding the season approaches. We will soon see signs of the swans building their nests.

CALEY GREEN

It is good to see that the Parish Council (PC) now appreciate that it is advisable for them to seek further professional guidance. It is also helpful that the PC have invited representation of the Friends of Caley Green (Friends) to attend their Working Party meetings.

The Friends have considerable knowledge and have done extensive research on aspects relating to this project and have a wealth of local observations. The Friends were keen from the outset that the PC should seek the advice of professional river engineers and suppliers. Their previous 'experts' have practised in the field of ecology.

PERMIT FOR PROPOSALS AT THE BAY

As well as engineers and contractors being able to provide all the practical advice required for the PC to decide on a suitable and sustainable proposal for the riverbank any contractor they eventually engage to take on the work forward should also submit the Flood Risk Permit application to the Environment Agency (EA).

Contrary to Mary George's comment on page 20, "there are statutory requirements that must be fulfilled when completing a Flood Risk Application permit, two of these being to conserve and enhance the environment and to consider biodiversity" this is not the PC's responsibility. It is an 'objective' of the EA to "conserve and enhance the environment and

to consider biodiversity" but not stipulated on the permit application form.

As pointed out to the PC previously a new Environment Act became law during the

As pointed out to the PC previously a new Environment Act became law during the UK's hosting of the COP26. It states that "developments deliver at least 10% increase in biodiversity". 10% of the area involved along the bay is very little indeed, not forgetting part of this project is replacement, the rest is protecting the riverbank, can that really be classified as 'development'?

In any case, any contractor engaged to put the permit application forward to the EA will be experienced in this; they will have a good idea of what will be acceptable to the EA and will be able to negotiate any issues there may be to reach a conclusion.

A flood risk assessment is required when submitting an application and again any contractor engaged would do this.

THE LONG REED BED

Many residents have for considerable time been concerned by the 'wall of reeds' along the Green which are preventing access to Fishing Rights and enjoyment of the river and the view. They will be pleased to hear that the PC now acknowledge that this issue should be dealt with in tandem with any work being considered for the bay area.

However, at the last PC meeting there seemed to be some confusion over the riparian responsibility for this. Could this be a case of SCC doesn't want to take responsibility for the cost of clearing the reeds? The EA won't take responsibility and have stated reed growth is not a concern to them. Riverside landowners generally have riparian responsibility for halfway across the waterway, except in particular circumstances, such as an EA structure (weir, sluice gates) being present. The PC and James Finch are looking further into this.

In 2017 the Friends negotiated a licence agreement with SCC for management of the reeds. Surely the situation regarding riparian responsibility hasn't changed since SCC granted that?

A COMMUNITY GROUP?

The PC have also mentioned the possibility of bringing the community together to do the work along the reed bed. This could be an excellent idea for the future management of the Green, however, the Friends experienced with reed control have stressed that in the first instance clearing of the long reed bed must be done me-

chanically by contractors. This well established reed bed will be difficult and impractically time consuming to pull by hand, the debris then has to be left on the bank for a couple of days and finally it needs to be disposed of properly.

A number of people, who would be willing to participate are reluctant to do so until trust in the PC and their proposal for the Green is restored. The Friends have previously funded their work on the Green themselves. Further donations could be available and willingness for fundraising has been discussed, but again trust and belief in the PC needs to be restored.

It certainly would be good for the community to come together, without the interference of outsiders, and strive to ensure Caley Green is restored and maintained for the benefit of local residents and wildlife. Perhaps going forward establishing a group similar to the Friends of St James or the Friends of Wiston Church may be beneficial.

In the meantime the Friends and other residents eagerly await the next step taken and proposals put forward by the PC.

At the time of writing it is unclear whether we shall be able to hold our **AGM** in public at the Village Hall on the 7th March but a decision will be made towards the end of February and by email and on social media. In any event we shall be looking forward to a talk from Chris Hunt on the topic of 'Industry in Nayland'.

Our Treasurer for the past many years, David Heigham, has decided to retire from the position. David has performed an excellent job for the Society and he will be much missed. The Society's thanks are extended to him. Fortunately, Richard Evans of the White House in Church Lane has agreed to step into David's shoes and he will be formally appointed at our AGM.

Looking ahead, the committee is confident that after a gap of two years **Open Gardens** will once again take place on the 12th June. If you have not opened your garden before but are interested in doing so please contact me at any time if you would like further information. The residents who have previously opened their gardens will be contacted in early March with an invitation to participate.

At the Society's request and with the assistance of our County Councillor James Finch, initial steps are being considered for the introduction of a 20 mph speed limit in the centre of the village. This scheme is at a very early stage and is subject to a cost assessment followed by the installation of speed sensors as, somewhat surprisingly, the actual traffic speed has to be at or below 24 mph for one of the initial criteria to be met. We will comment further as and when there is any further news to report.

The committee have been in contact with Babergh District Council concerning two matters both affecting land adjoining the A134 where it passes through the Dedham Vale AONB. Firstly, on a field at the rear of The Willows in Wiston Road, there appears to be a non-agricultural use involving the storage of materials and equipment. Secondly, at the New Farm residential development, higher up Harpers Hill, a close boarded fence has been erected which does not appear to have been authorised according to the planning records revealed on the BDC website. It is to be hoped that both of these matters which, in the view of the committee, adversely impact upon the beauty of our AONB, can be satisfactorily resolved.

On Saturday the 23rd of April, in conjunction with the Parish Council, the Society will be organising the Spring Litter Pick. As usual we shall meet at the Village Hall car park at 1.30 pm where high viz jackets, litter pickers and refuse bags will be handed out and street areas allocated. Everyone is welcome to participate.



Our current book is Richard Osman's 'The Thursday Murder Club'.



New members are very welcome.





ST JAMES' CHURCH NAYLAND

Services at St James over the Christmas period included the annual 'Friends of St James' carol concert, Family/Christingle Service and the Midnight mass on Christmas Eve, (it's now less than 50 weeks to Christmas!!). The Revd Javelle returns from his break in January and I know his objective will be to attend more services so times of regular services may change. Watch this space.

Interestingly, the Suffolk Free Press of 4th January 1945 reported: "The fine old 14th century church of St. James Nayland provided a striking setting for a special service on Christmas Eve. The

East Anglian Electric Supply Co. put temporary light in the chancel making possible the holding of midnight communion" I also found a reference to the Midnight mass of 1985 when 200 people were reported at the service. Bearing in mind churches at Stoke and Polstead also probably had services, people going to church on Christmas Eve in what is now the 'new' benefice would have been about 500! We had 50 at the one service.

It is clear that the church cannot survive on the offerings of a congregation alone and this is why we are keen to diversify the use of our church buildings. There have been a couple of concerts held and more are planned for 2022. I know these are difficult times for everyone but we still have to maintain a community spirit and support events and organisations that make up so much of village life, be it the church, village hall, W.I. Royal British Legion, Community Council, Conservation Society, HortSoc and so on. A lot of people put their (unpaid!), time and effort into ensuring there is 'something for everyone' and they should be supported.

It is surprising how many events went on in the village in the past. It is possible to research local newspaper archives. You have to be careful though. I put in 'St James Nayland' and was surprised when I got the headline THE NEW VULCANISED ZEPHYR HAT. Intrigued I looked further to find this was '...a chemical combination applied to the process of hat manufacturer enabling JAMES R HAYLAND to claim for the above the merit of being the most flexible and durable light hat ever produced. They are perfectly ventilated and invulnerable to perspiration. Seems just the thing for these troubled times! Just saying!!

For those of you who saw phase 1 of the meadow hedge laying last year I do hope you will recognise the relevance of that line. That hedge just gets better..... (They say it is stock-proof, but I reckon you would need a tank to get through it!)

We are very well advanced now - thanks very much to the charming, knowledgeable and highly skilled Neil Catchpole - on phase 2. That is more of the lovely same - just further along. January 2022 should see phase 2 completed.

I am delighted to report that many of us (myself included) have now been out there on a Saturday or a Tuesday wielding a billhook under the expert guidance of Neil. After a stretch of that hacking you can well imagine how the billhook - originally an agricultural tool - became used as a weapon for English soldiers during the late medieval period...... indeed at Agincourt when the battle became one of close combat the men at arms used their billhooks to great effect.... Try it and you will understand. Perhaps it is not for nothing that our very own current Prince of Wales is a dab hand with the billhook and a great fan of hedge laying – see www.billhooks.co.uk/royal-billhooks/

So as ever great thanks to Neil - and should anybody still wish to get involved in this please contact me. Thanks also of course to all hedge laying volunteers. A picture can be worth 1,000 words so here are a few.

And also an enormous thanks to (in particular) Emma Black of the Dedham Vale AONB and Stour Valley Project for all the support that she has given in relation to the hedge and more generally AND of course the Dedham Vale AONB Sustainable Development Fund - thank you!

Many thanks also to the Stour Valley Volunteers for helping to build the dead hedge. A dead hedge offers priceless habitats for conservation and restoration ecology.

There will be many other manual labouring tasks on the meadow during 2022 and again should any of you wish to get involved in that and light, medium or hard manual labour please just let us know. No prior knowledge is expected just some enthusiasm. Perhaps you will be connecting with your ancestors or even royalty but certainly doing something positive for Nayland and conservation and the environment. Labour will for sure be needed to build the 5 x stag beetle log piles.

Following on from that, thanks again to those who have contributed to the meadow by financial contribution – a **big** thank you.

But more is needed. The Land Co is a charity and we get gift-aid on contributions where the donor is a tax-payer. The grazing rent is nil so our income is donation from residents and grant money. Grant money is always precarious. If the running costs exceed income we have a big problem. What the Land Co can achieve for Nayland (new trees, hedging, bird boxes perhaps a new owl box or just everyday land and riverbank management) is utterly dependent upon funds – we can all play a part.

I have been asked about donations and as a flavour of costs; £15 pays for a nesting box suitable for blue and great tits – likewise a robin (but different style) or £30 for a starling box. Oak trees are £8 each (all in) to supplement the line of trees between the hedges. £20 pays for a bat roost box. I am happy to discuss what larger sums can pay for.

Please do help keep Nayland a very special place.





Garden Notes

by The Old Muckspreader

Firstly to answer the Editor's question about Nicandra; the OM/S regrets that he forgot to test it as a deterrent to flies. The OM/S, like all Old Men, forgets to do everything these days, but has made a note in his diary (which his daughter put in his Christmas stocking) for next season.

Looking back in his file he sees that he began these articles in 2000 when he wrote, unsurprisingly, about Winter flowers. One which flowers on and off, depending on the weather is Iris Unguiclaris, often known as Iris Stylosa.

The foliage tends to become rather scruffy and needs a complete haircut every couple of years or so, but the flowers are a delight and will last for several days if picked in bud and brought indoors. Something also of good value is Helleborus Foetidus – the Stinking Hellebore, a somewhat unfair name.

Winter Aconites (Eranthus Hiemalis) are just beginning to flower, and here we have a sort of stream winding between the Oaks in the Glade; by the time the trees are in leaf.

They are followed by Snowdrops, which extend the stream. If you want to increase your stock of them wait until they've finished flowering but are still in leaf; the clumps can then be lifted and split up into smaller clumps (no more than 6 at a time).

Nest come the Bluebells, which don't need any encouraging, and finally a few Narcissi and Primroses, by which time the Oaks and Limes are coming into leaf.

Soon Spring will have arrived and that part of the garden will have had its turn to be followed by the Spring flowering shrubs.

The Suffolk Record Office is a treasure trove of documents and records of every conceivable kind and sometimes when searching for something in particular little gems pop up to distract one from the reason for one's visit.

The following was one such item I came across some years ago. It was a simple sheet of handwritten notes written by an unknown Nayland resident in 1916 during the First World War period, just a few sentences which somehow or other found their way into the Record Office. Why this person decided to write these few notes down and who or what they were intended for is unknown but these few lines conjure up a picture of Nayland at the turn of the 20th century.

"Nayland Today

The great mill no longer produces flour and many industries connected with it have suffered.

Nayland Fair once so full of life and happiness was this year represented by one unfurnished stall!

The barges no longer carry goods from the sea and past Nayland as the river is no longer navigable, the locks are broken and out of repair.

The Feoffees no longer hold their meetings in the vestry as has been their immemorial custom.

We no longer hear the town crier who by virtue of his office is also Church Clerk, proclaiming his latest news in the streets.

We must look to the future and trust that after the war the agriculture will increase in importance.

The village Pound has been pulled down. It was not a beautiful pound nor very old but it was the village pound and it is gone.

Pillory and stocks which stood within the memory of the oldest inhabitant both the one in Fen Street beyond the "Workhouse" and the one by the North entrance to the churchyard, have disappeared.

Ghost. For who amongst the present generation has ever heard of the headless calf who roams between here and Stoke. Personally although alas I often travel this lonely road while others sleep, I have never met it. In olden days none but the bravest would pass along here except the old woman who augmented her scanty income by going to Nayland for the doctor after dark."

Notes:

The great mill. This was a period of great change in Nayland. In the 19th century there was a lot of industry and the most prominent building was the six storey mill on the corner of Fen Street and Mill Street. A few years after it ceased working the top four storeys were taken down and it became the Nayland Electric Light and Power House for about 12 years. Thereafter

it has housed many industries and businesses up to the present day.

The Fair. Nayland was granted the right to have an annual market and fair from at least the 13th century and so as not to lose this right it had to hold the fair every year even if there was only one stall.

The navigation on the river had been very important for more than two hundred years and by the First World War it had ended, partly because of the rise of railways in the 19th century.

The Nayland Feoffees were charity trustees, prominent members of the community who also carried out a lot of the duties now the responsibility of local government.

The village pound was in Bear Street near the site of the present fire station and the last written record of the stocks in the High Street being used was by a man called Plampin for causing a disturbance in Church in 1855.

It would be interesting to know more about the headless calf but perhaps we should all keep a watch out for it when travelling between here to Stoke, especially in the dark.

THE 1921 CENSUS FOR ENGLAND AND WALES

Did you know that the National Archives have just released the 1921 Census online? This is a wonderful opportunity to look up our parents, grandparents and others to see where they lived and what they were doing in 1921. You may be surprised at what you can find out.

Find out how to research your ancestors through the Findmypast website.

As soon as time permits I will eagerly be going to https://www.findmypast.co.uk/1921-census to search for my ancestors and extend their life stories. A copy of the original census will cost £3.50 each or a transcripts of the record will be £2.50 (there's a 10% discount for existing subscribers).

It isn't yet known when the 1921 census will eventually be released on Ancestry as the National Archives signed an exclusive deal with Findmypast (As they did with the 1911 cencus).

The findings of the 1921 Scottish census will be released via www.scotlandspeople.gov.uk, the Scottish government's official archive site, in the second half of this year.

WEATHER SUMMARY: November & December 2021 Weather Report by David Lowe

November seemed like a warm month compared to most, but the main statistics don't bear this out. The mean temperature was 7.6 $^{\circ}$ C (7.85) and the max 16 $^{\circ}$ C (16.21). There was one day over 15 $^{\circ}$ C (2.36) but 21 over 10 $^{\circ}$ C (18.57).

There were 3 air frosts (3.14) and 6 ground frosts (5.07). Grass frosts, in addition, were 6, so far as I was able to determine.

Bright sun hours were 99.7 (82.73) second highest over the 14 year record period. Solar energy was 2600 Ly (2202) the highest over the period. Perhaps this is where the perception of warmth comes from – sunny days - but often with a frost at night, reducing the mean temp. Having said that, the overall stats show that November is normally not a bad month.

Evapotranspiration was 2017.25 mm (17.64) third highest.

The month was dry – and would have been very dry, but for the last 5 days. Monthly rain was 32 mm (62.11) third lowest. Max daily rainfall was 18.8 mm (15.32) the only day over 10 mm (1.29). Highest rain rate 9.2 mm/hr (45.77).

Average wind speed was 4.9 mph (3.75) and the highest daily average, 10.3 mph (8.83). There were two days with a max over 30 mph (1.89) and none over 35 mph.

December was a cloudy, sunless and wet month, even though there was a lengthy anticyclonic period in the middle.

Sun hours were 28.3 (47.29) the lowest over the 14 year record period and rainfall at 73.6 mm (62.52 mm) sixth wettest. 28.3 sun hours can be achieved in a couple of days in summer.


Average temperature was 6.8° C (5.59) with a high of 15° C (13.36) third highest to date, and low of -3.3° C (-3.57). Lowest max was 3.8° C (3.14). The max dewpoint of 14.4° C (11.36) was the highest recorded in Decembers to date. There were no days with a minimum of -5° C or less, only 2 air frosts (7.29) and 3 ground frosts only (10.79). Additionally, there was 1 grass frost. On no day did the temperature fail to rise above 0° C (0.43) and on no day was the mean temperature less than 0° C (1.71). On 2 days the temp failed to make 5° C (5.79) and on 21, 10° C (21.07).

Solar energy was 1200 Ly (1370) and evapotranspiration, 12.4 mm (12.51). Over the year as a whole, rainfall exceeded evapotranspiration by a few mm, only the third time this has happened over the 14 year record period.

Highest rainfall in a day was 12.4 mm (12.51) and highest rainfall rate, 14.4 mm/hr (35.81). There was only one day with 10 mm or more (1.14).

Average wind strength was 5.6 mph (4.14) third highest with a highest daily average of 11.6 mph (10.34). Highest gust was 34 mph (36) with 4 days over 30 mph (3.79).

BRAMFORD TO TWINSTEAD REINFORCEMENT – THE STATUTORY CONSULTATION

This statutory consultation will run now for eight weeks. It is expected to take place between 25thJanuary 2022 and 21stMarch 2022. All responses to the consultation must be received before 23:59 on the closing date. Postal responses will be accepted up to five working days after this date.

National Grid will be consulting on and seek views and feedback on the following elements of the project including the:

- proposed route of the new 400kV electricity line
- extent of undergrounding and overgrounding of the new 400kV electricity line
- location and form of cable sealing end compounds
- removal of the existing 132kV overhead electricity line
- location and form of a new Grid Supply Point Substation at Butlers Wood
- construction methodology
- likely environmental effects arising from the project
- potential environmental mitigation identified to reduce likely significant effects

 preliminary locations for biodiversity net gain and/or wider environmental gains.

Dear all,

We have so many things to wish when we come to a new year and resolutions to figure out. Some years look the same others are very different. It is right to say that we have been through a crescendo of unexpected events in the last years and we all have very different views on them according to our culture, personal stories and political opinions. This new year starts with its pack of unsettling events: just look at the Omicron variant and the tensions between West and East about Ukraine.

The task of a vicar is neither to take side nor to become a political commentator but to be the carer for all. So here are my wishes and advice for the new year. Unsurprisingly, I will take the attitude of Christ as a model. He changed the world by changing the every day. We can indeed feel completely powerless in regard of events like those I have just mentioned: a pandemic and the threat of a war. What can we do at our level? The truth is that changing the world starts actually at our level.

Take care of yourself, take care of your neighbour.

The first thing to do when you face such a health issue at such a scale is to start by taking good care of your health. I am going to state the obvious, start with doing some exercise more often, cooking for yourself even when you are on your own, adding variety to your diet, discovering new things for food, taking care of your skin, face, hair etc..., always paying attention to the way you dress. In one word, treat yourself. It goes further than just taking care physically of yourself. Do the things that make you happy, avoid what brings anxiety. Some of us stay away from media whether traditional or on-line, but some of us spend a lot of time with them. We do not realise how the excess of media can bring anxiety. Because media use what is spectacular to make you react, we often completely miss what is positive and hopeful. So here is an easy trick: do not read short news, spend time reading extended articles that explains you the context of the news.

In the same way, as much as you cannot prevent a war from happening at our own level, we can bring peace everyday. This is what I mean when I say 'take care of your neighbour'. The recent pandemic has revealed how much people could be good at solidarity and ready to help those in need in our communities. And this is something to celebrate and carry on. But at the same time, in the recent years, we have been the witnesses of a rise of aggressiveness in the public opinion. Whether behind their screens or face to face, some people are not able to agree to disagree anymore. This is something that is crucial to re-establish in our social life. This is a question of respect for each other, of care for our democracy and of keeping peaceful relationship in our communities. So use comprehensiveness and talk kindly to people you disagree with. Find where you can join them. You can vote for two different parties and be both experimented and passionate gardeners. There is always a place where you can agree.

Brothers and sisters in Christ, we all have in our hands the power to change everyday life. Just let us do it. Like we garden: quietly, everyday, faithfully.

Dear all.


It is with a great pleasure that I address you a letter for the first time.

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
