

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 11th October 2023

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or http://naylandwithwissington.suffolk.cloud/ after the next meeting)

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM

A member of the group organising a memorial for the Jane Walker Hospital residents, who were laid to rest in the Burial Ground, thanked the Parish Council for their support and said the project is coming to fruition. The campaign raised sufficient funds for the memorial stone which will list the residents buried there.

The issue of recent planning applications for a total of 77 dwellings in Leavenheath was raised; and the negative impact this could have on Nayland, including the school and doctors and the roads.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece said the Church Lane sign is back in place. She has been pursuing a resolution for the damage to the tree/hedge near the old bus shelter on Harpers Estate.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

James Finch said the weed control should have been carried out, but he has concerns that the product they are using may not be sufficient. The unlit bollards on the A134 junction are being chased and the Wiston Road ditch situation is being investigated.

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at **Timbers 22 Court Street** [DC/23/04030] for works to trees remove 3 lowest lateral limbs growing on the garage roof to allow 1m clearance to a Yew (T1) and fell dead stem of Hawthorn (T2) and at **Stour House, 23 Court Street** [DC/23/04008] for works to trees - apply bio char and microzo fungi to 1 Cherry (T1), fell 1 Cherry (T2), remove deadwood of 1 Ornamental Cherry (T3) and remove water shoots on main stem and spray woodwork mixture onto areas showing evidence of live wood worm; fell 1 Cherry Plum Tree (T4), raise canopy of 1 Oak (T5) to a height of 1.5 meters above ground level, fell 1 Ash (T6), prune back 500mm of 1 Lime (T7) maintaining natural shape.

Discharge of Conditions were refused at **82 Bear Street** [DC/23/03572] for condition 3 - timber frame, infill and brickwork repairs and condition 4 - insulation and render.

Between meetings councillors had no objections at Hillside, 14 Stoke Road [DC/23/04342] to listed building consent for construction of 7 Photovoltaic panels on the rear west facing roof; at Stour House, 23 Court Street [DC/23/04008] for work to trees (details as above), and at 9 Birch Street [DC/23/04577] for erection of outbuilding for use as a home office/summer house.

Discussing an application at Hill Farm Business Centre, Harpers Hill [DC/23/04190] for construction of 1 storage unit building comprising 6 separate storage spaces councillors objected to the proposals on the grounds: "the lack of detail as the application stands, site is located on former agricultural land in the AONB. It is a sensitive location and next to luxury holiday accommodation. Therefore, if compliance with the necessary Planning Policies was found, essential conditions must be incorporated. These should cover the maintenance of screening, restricting operating hours and minimising the environmental impact, all to the level expected in the AONB. Operating hour restrictions and light and noise pollution prevention should be in place both through the construction phase and thereafter. Conditions should be in place to protect the amenity of neighbours and the neighbouring holiday business. Should this development be approved with relevant conditions in place, a programme of robust monitoring is essential to ensure continued compliance in this sensitive location."

Gerry Battye said he had visited the new affordable housing built recently in Stoke by Nayland. Owen Brown said that Community Action Suffolk would be happy to come along to a PC meeting to discuss a future housing needs here.

Isabelle Reece advised that some parishes are considering a less complex Neighbourhood Plan - Neighbourhood Plan Lite - which is being piloted and agreed to provide details. This will remain as an agenda item.

20MPH

Further discussion took place on the Conservation Society's proposal for introduction of a 20mph zone or speed limit in the village. Mike Hunter explained the exceptional circumstances required to pursue a 20mph speed limit. There were mixed views on pursuing the 20 mph limit, however, consensus on the desire to make the village safer. It was agreed to request a site meeting with SCC Highways to discuss traffic calming options.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Councillors had been advised that the surveyor for the Diocese agreed that the Fairfield Drive needed attention and was in the process of obtaining quotes for repair work; as there has been no news Debbie Hattrell will ask for an update.

Dawn Harris gave an update on the lasting memorial project on Caley Green. The design of the railing around the tree needs to be modified to allow for maintenance. Work to re-profile the culvert and remove debris and reeds from its mouth are being carried out by SCC contractors. Installation of revetment is still outstanding, is not yet scheduled and the work to the long reed bed is still to be completed by SCC.

BURIAL GROUND

The Jane Walker Memorial project to provide a memorial for patients that once resided at the hospital is progressing. Councillors approved the location and design of the memorial; the wording included and the names of those being remembered was yet to be approved.

It was noted that parking in the new bays at the turning circle is often at full capacity.

IN BRIEF:

Progress of the Village Hall roof project is dependent on pending grant applications. The autumn VH gardening morning will be on 28th October.

The Allotment rent renewals have been requested. There are currently two people on the waiting list; one from a neighbouring parish.

WINTER SOLSTICE PICNIC ON CALEY GREEN

Just a reminder that this event, which is a tradition going back as far as - last year, will take place on Caley Green on Thursday 21st December at 1pm. The summer event was a great success and it is so important to keep these old customs alive. All welcome, bring nibbles and a hot drink!

Robin Thorogood chaired the meeting.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

James Finch advised that some funding has become available from central Government to help the provision of buses and bus routes. It is necessary to bid for what is required. James has been liaising with bus companies to see what may be achievable towards a better service for the next few years.

20MPH

Further discussion took place on the Conservation Society's proposal for introduction of a 20mph zone of speed limit in the village. Councillors were reminded that there needs to be evidence backing up a need for this; there have been no significant accidents. Debbie Hattrell pointed out that councillors had requested a site meeting with SCC Highways to see what other traffic calming measures could be put in place; it is hoped a meeting would provide guidance on options and what evidence is needed.

PARISH COUNCIL FINANCE

Discussing quotations and priority for works it was felt that immediate maintenance and works which extend the life of equipment should take priority. This includes: hedgework along Candy Lane; hedgework on the allotment field, repair/replacement benches; pressure washing/staining of wooden play equipment. Other items should be put forward for the finance committee to consider, for example the wooden fence replacement at Fairfield.

Some complexities around reserves of CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) were explained. There is a timescale of 5 years to spend, or allocate, these funds which can be used on new projects (not maintenance), such as used recently towards new play equipment at Fairfield and new refuse and dog bins.

The finance committee need to consider the timescale and what's allocated when considering how the CIL money is spent. In connection with the possibility of CIL money being allocated towards provision of a community defibrillator in Wiston; further details would be needed prior to consideration.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at **16 Bear Street** [DC/23/03841] for erection of cart lodge (following removal of a summer house); at **9 Birch Street** [DC/23/04577] for erection of outbuilding for use as a home office/summer house; at **The Coach House 86 Bear Street** [DC/23/04127] for erection of first floor rear extension, extended raised patio, insertion of new French doors and Juliet balcony.

They granted at **82 Bear Street** [DC/23/04999] a discharge of conditions application for DC/23/02387 - condition 3 timber frame, infill and brickwork repairs and condition 4 insulation, render backing and render.

Babergh raised no objection at **Bridge House 27 Court Street** [DC/23/04723] for works to trees to remove to ground level a small Sycamore Tree (T2) and cut back overhanging branches between 1 - 3 meters 2 Cherry Plum trees.

An application at **Hill Farm Business Centre Harpers Hill** [DC/23/04190] for construction of one storage unit building comprising 6 separate storage spaces has been withdrawn.

Between meetings councillors had no objections to a Lawful Development Certificate at **Sandpits Farm Campions Hill** [DC/23/04596] for continued use of agricultural land as garden land associated with the residential dwelling; or to listed building consent at **Hill House 11 Gravel Hill** [DC/23/04871] to replace / Continued on page 6

repair roof tiles and insertion of 3 windows within roofslope as long as the heritage team are content with these proposals.

Discussing an application at 5 Elm Grove [DC/23/04998] for erection of single storey side extension (following removal of attached garage), erection of one and a half storey rear extension and front dormer window extension, including widening driveway councillors had no objections.

Tricia Fuller raised the issue that the Council was not receiving information from Babergh relating to some amendments and re-applications – despite being assured by chief planning officers at a meeting in May they would in future be advised. In relation to such an issue regarding 82 Bear Street District Councillor Isabelle Reece had agreed to look into the matter.

On the subject of affordable housing Owen Brown said he continues to look into inviting Community Action Suffolk to come along to advise the PC on procedures and other necessary factors involved when considering community affordable housing.

Councillors heard that currently SALC (Suffolk Association of Local Councils) are not offering any training sessions relating to planning; as soon as sessions are available councillors will take advantage of them. In view of the changing situation regarding planning this would be particularly useful for councillors.

HIGHWAYS

Tricia Fuller raised the issue of potholes along the lower stretch of Harpers Estate; these will be reported.

The PC are tenants of the land on Harpers Estate where the old bus shelter sits. Debris following damage and remedial work has been left on site despite requests for removal. The site was used for the children's attraction with Nayland Bear at Halloween, and will be again over Christmas. Isabelle Reece agreed to chase this up with Babergh but the problem has not been resolved; Debbie Hattrell will check if there is any progress.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Councillors were advised in September that the surveyor for the Diocese agreed that Fairfield Drive needed attention and was in the process of obtaining quotes for repair work. Debbie Hattrell will continue chasing this.

Dawn Harris gave an update on the lasting memorial project on Caley Green. The Copper Beech tree to celebrate King Charles III has been planted and a railing surround will be installed by the end of November. The concrete base has been installed for a bench to commemorate Queen Elizabeth II and the bench will be installed soon. A grant towards the costs of this project had been received from the Community Council.

Sally Dalton was asked for an update on Caley Green. The SCC appointed contractor had completed re-profiling the culvert and clearing debris and reeds from the mouth of the culvert and was pleased at the clear flow achieved during the recent torrential rain. During the work bottles and old revetment had been removed. An 8 feet depth of silt has built up considerably reducing the capacity of the river. Adjacent reeds have now been removed by the neighbouring property owner. SCC's Matthew Lee does not anticipate any work this year in connection with the installation of new revetment at Caley Green but is hopeful of some management of the reeds.

Gerry Battye pointed out that repair to the rotten railing on Bear Street above the culvert has not been carried out; it was expected this was part of the work at the culvert. Debbie Hattrell will chase this work. It was noted that Pop's Piece took a battering during the recent storms and flooding; the bench needs fixing back in its location. Debbie Hattrell will order this work.

BURIAL GROUND

The Jane Walker Memorial project to facilitate the creation of a fitting memorial to be erected for patients that resided at the hospital during the 1970s and 80s is coming to fruition. Councillors approved the location and design of the memorial; 48 names have been gathered and submitted to the stonemason. Once finalised Debbie Hatrell will give the go ahead for installation.

Dawn Harris said the only streetlight in Wiston Road was reported but still not working. Debbie Hattrell will check progress.

Dawn Harris said the recent village hall gardening morning had been productive. The National Lottery grant application for the roof replacement is 'being processed'.

Councillors felt the Community Council's Bonfire Night had been a great show well done. A councillor mentioned that it does not have music; it was suggested that idea could be put forward to the CC.

Dawn Harris advised that the allotment inspections had been carried out. PAGE 6

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 30th October 2023 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169

Claire Buller welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: As always we welcome new members to join the team. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee that provides positive events and facilities for the community. Contact Rachel on 07788 954309 or rachel_hitchcock@hotmail.com if you would like to know more.

Fundraising Activities/Events: We have a good deal of activities being planned currently but as always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall is managed by the CC.

Regarding the possibility a defibrillator in Wiston: Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) confirmed a defibrillator could operate without a power supply; the cost would be in the region £2,300; a location by the Parish Council noticeboard in Wiston has been mooted. The possibility of this being eligible for a CIL grant from Babergh was discussed at the last PC meeting; Sam Treharne said this is being looked into further by the Clerk.

The CC with the First Responders have been hoping to organise another first aid course. Tracy Le Grys, on behalf of the First Responders, said they have recently held successful CPR and defibrillator courses in Assington and asked if these courses would be welcomed in Nayland. It was felt this was an excellent idea.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel Hitchcock has spoken to the SCC Properties Officer; there would be no problem with the water gauge being installed on the Caley Green riverbank but exact location details (between the proposed wooden revetment and the long reed bed) should be confirmed with him.

The surveyor confirmed change of location to the south bank would not affect the datum mark for the above sea level gauge. Rachel has spoken to Danny Thurlow regarding installation; he will research what's involved and if he can help he will. As a reminder the cost for installation totalled £1,380 inc VAT (oak post £450 + VAT, Gauge Boards £450 + VAT, backing boards £250 + VAT).

Online Ticketing Facility: NaylandEvents.org — This has become increasingly useful for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility to sell tickets for their events contact Justin Dowding at jpdowding@gmail.com.

Queen Elizabeth II and King Charles III commemorative feature: This is a Parish Council project, however, they sought our suggestions for a feature to commemorate the late Queen and the coronation of the new King. The CC have awarded a grant towards the costs. Sam Treharne said work was due to commence installing the bench and planting the tree.

Village Hall Roof Project: Grant funding & fundraising events. Iain Wright said the 'Nayland Family Festival' incorporating Woodland Corner's 'Inflatable Day' was held in September; it was a cut down version of what was originally planned, due to the slow take up of ticket sales, but still successful. There was £1,500 profit for the roof project and £500 was raised by Woodland Corner. In total £7,000 was made from all the roof fundraiser events. They are still waiting to hear from the lottery regarding the submitted grant application.

Nayland Post Office: The Sorting Office closed at the end of August. The Post Office is still open. There is no further news regarding the PO premises and PO service being taken over. Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation of village groups and events are welcome. An item headed 'Volunteer Vacancies' has been added to the Community Times, listing the various volunteers needed by different groups; please let Lorraine know if you have vacancies to be included along with an idea of the level of commitment needed. It is thought this helped one society gain a committee member.

It would be helpful if everyone, when they see promotions for Nayland events on Facebook, could make a comment (however brief) and not just click on 'like' which is no help.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: The autumn garden tidy was held on 28th October. About a dozen volunteers attended.

St James' Flower Festival: 9th & 10th September. Kathy Hunt was thanked for organising this event with floral arrangements from village groups and individuals as well as a display of clergy vestments and old bibles. Rachel Hitchcock was thanked for creating a lovely flower arrangement representing the CC's firework display. Visitors enjoyed the displays, refreshments and relaxed atmosphere.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Matt Cable gave his report to 30th Oct. Breakdown of profits: Community Times £938.24, Calendar £114.89, Quiz £564.44, deposit interest £330.86. Grants paid: Nayland Bear £100, First Responders £2,165.60, PC Commemorative Bench & Tree £1,538. Expenses: Coronation Party £519.81, Bonfire night expenses £1,110.50, Hall hire charges £32, annual insurance premium £631.36.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £22,359 represented by Deposit a/c monies £11,164.92, Current a/c monies £10,009.40, Cash in Hand £1,184.68. We hold £88.51 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, VH coffee machine £280 and Lizzie's Fund £153.

Therefore, unencumbered assets are £11,837.49.

Rachel has submitted the required Charity Commission Annual Return in advance of the 31st October deadline.

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Parish Council: would like a contribution of £1,538 towards installation of a bench, commemorative tree and railing for the late Queen and King Charles. The total cost will be £4,158. This was agreed.

Nayland Choir: would like a contribution of £1,538 towards the cost of musicians for their 30th Anniversary concert performing 'Mozart's Requiem' in St James Church on 24th March.

Nayland First Responders: Following their offer to organise CPR and defibrillator courses in Nayland free of charge it was agreed to cover the cost of hall hire for the courses.

Bear Street Christmas Lights: Having previously agreed to support this much loved seasonal feature, physically or financially, John Spooner has said he will not need our help with putting up the decorations. It was agreed to contribute £100 towards the electricity.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said the calendar is on sale at the Post Office, Studio B Hair Salon, Forget Me Not, Mill Street Store and online. Wendy Sparrow is as usual dealing with sales from some local shops and venues. Gladwins Farm shop the Church Coffee Morning, Choir rehearsals, Table Tennis sessions and Wiston Church are also assisting. Many thanks to all who are helping. Suggestions for maximising sales would be much appreciated. If you attend/ organise any events, venues where calendars could be sold please let Lorraine know.

Forthcoming Activities:

Bonfire & Fireworks: Sunday 5th November. Rachel Hitchcock, Claire Buller & Jo Metson leading.

All is in hand. Firework Crazy is doing the display and Fred Bugg doing the bonfire. However, currently there is a very large puddle on the field (the firework/bonfire end); Firework Crazy will be contacted regarding contingency plans and Fred Bugg regarding the bonfire.

Sale of tickets: Online at naylandevents.org, in Nayland shops and PO. Cut off for tickets sales needs to be 1400.

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said in October Jacqueline Aviolet was a very enthusiastic and amusing speaker on the subject of *'Spices: a super spicy story'*. They will be having a stall at the Christmas Fayre. They are planning for 2024; the first event will be the Spring Flower Show on 23rd March so bear this in mind when you are planting your bulbs this autumn.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton reported that SCC's contractors have cleared the culvert and the island of reeds at its mouth to enable proper flow into the river and prevent flooding. During recent heavy rain the flow down the culvert has been fast. The contractor said there had been no evidence of wildlife living in the culvert. He dug out a few old bottles and wooden planks; this confirms that previously wooden revetment had been in place all round the bay. He also said the silt deposit sitting on top of the gravel river bed is about 8 feet deep which considerably reduces the river's capacity for holding flood water.

First Responders: Tracy Le Grys said they are wondering if it would be possible to run a couple of CPR and defibrillator courses in the village. They held 4 in Assington during the last few weeks which were very well received; 37 people leaving a lot happier to be able to deal with an emergency of this kind. The course lasts approximately 2 hours and as well as a slide show presentation, there are demonstrations and role playing. The possibility of holding courses in Nayland was discussed; the CC felt this was a good idea.

Parish Council: Sam Treharne said that installation of the Coronation tree for King Charles and memorial bench for Queen Elizabeth is about to commence; the Clerk is looking into potential CIL funding in connection with a proposal for a community defibrillator in Wiston. There remains one vacancy on the PC.

St James Church: Chris Hunt said the Wednesday Coffee Mornings continue to be very popular and the Flower Festival had been enjoyed by visitors. There was to be a St James' Light Stop for Halloween with candlelight and refreshments for

trick or treaters. Keep your eyes open for details of Christmas services.

Royal British Legion: Chris Hunt said the annual Poppy Appeal Coffee Morning will be on 4th November at 10am – 12 noon in the Church Hall. On 11th November the Armistice Day gathering for 2 minutes silence takes place at 11am at the War Memorial in the High Street. On 12th November Remembrance Sunday services take place at the War Memorial Wiston (at 10am), Nayland (10.45am) followed a by service in St James'.

Art Group: Kathryn Niven said they have been doing some preparatory drawing with a view to printing cards and are going to Blue Owl to paint some baubles. We continue with our watercolour painting, recently thinking about composition and how the foreground can 'frame' the picture, but we also have an acrylic painting session planned so that we can explore a different media. Taster sessions for new members are free.

Choir: Kathryn Niven said they are currently practising for the 'Manchester Carols' concert - a series of songs and readings that interpret the Christmas story. This will be held on 10th December in the Village Hall. They are learning some additional pieces which will also feature in the church carol service. The Choir is planning a special 30th anniversary concert in St James Church on 24th March.

Christmas Tree Festival: Kathryn Niven said over 20 village organisations businesses and individuals are taking part or contributing to this event being held on 9th,10th and 16th December. Donations will benefit Nayland Primary School and St James' Church.

Village Hall: Iain Wright said the hall has seen increased use. A noise restrictor is being installed following complaints from neighbours; this has suffered delays due to supply issues. Routine maintenance continues.

Village Players: The meeting was reminded that the *'Kidnapped at Christmas'* production dates are 23rd-25th November with a matinee on 25th.

AOB: Chris Hunt thanked the Community Council for what they do and wished them a Merry Christmas.

Land Company (Nayland Meadow): David Slater said it's been pleasing to see how well the length of improved footpath stood up to the recent torrential rain. They are hoping to improve more of the permissive path this winter. They have been trying to come up with a suitable name for the piece of land we manage — currently known as 'Nayland Meadow'; they would welcome any suggestions from local people for a popular and suitable name. Some suggested changing the name of areas can lead to confusion and often the new names are not used.

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter reported they will have a table at the Christmas Fayre selling tea towels, books, etc. On 6th November Dr Sian Dawson will present a talk entitled 'Petals & Paint Sir Cedric Morris Florilegium'.

The speaker for our October meeting had to be changed at the last minute; Terry Bannister kindly stepped in and did an excellent job talking about the war time experiences of her Polish born father. The autumn litter pick was reasonably well supported which enabled a good clean up. On 12th October volunteers planted a further few hundred naturalised narcissi at the junction of Horkesley Road and the A134. Roll on spring! A wonderful display case made by Mike Roffe housing two volumes by the Reverend William Jones, perpetual curate of our church in the 18th century has been installed in St James' Church. A QR code is displayed so the whole documents can be viewed online via devices.

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

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

WATER LEVELS

As we have not been able to miss, and as reported in David Lowe's weather report on page 34 the rainfall has been very high. Consequently so have the river levels.

A number of residents have been arguing for some time about the overgrown and silted state of the river, and that in that condition the capacity of the river is reduced; that it will hold less flood water. In fact, the Suffolk CC contractor who carried out work in October found that there was 8 feet of silt above the gravel river bed... that could add up to a huge loss of capacity in the river. Although the EA insist this isn't the case! So before just blaming climate change there are other factors involved.

A number of residents who have lived in the village for many years have noticed how the areas that flood have changed somewhat. Nayland Meadow, for example seldom flooded, now it does quite regularly and quite severely. The Wiston side of the A134 frequently flooded in the past, but does so infrequently now. Why are these changes happening?

REED GROWTH AT THE WEIR

This time last year the CT reported that "Despite the assurances to a local resident, and indications published on the internet that some reed management would take place at Nayland Weir this did not happen." Still there has been no management.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

It seems at times that reporting positive news about the swans tempts fate. Happily it was said in the last issue that our resident swans had done well raising their cygnets. During October the cygnets departed to seek new lives for themselves.

Unfortunately in late October there were reports of one of our swans being ill or injured and looking in distress near the weir. And it was last seen heading in the direction of Anchor Bridge. Searches for the swan to identify the problem were unsuccessful. It is not known what happened to the swan; it did not return. The remaining swan has remained on its own, but at the time of writing has not been seen for a couple of days. It may be back, or it may have departed to look for the company of other swans.

A new pair of swans have just arrived on the Meadow pond; they may remain, and perhaps take up residence on the river or perhaps are just stopping by temporarily. Time will tell.

About 20 ducks have also taken to the Meadow pond from the river. Perhaps the still and shallow water there is warmer than the flowing river or there is a better food source?

Who said Kingfishers are very shy? Roy Clarke managed to capture photographs of a lovely Kingfisher near Caley Green on several occasions. It does not seem to be put off by vehicles or people passing by.

RSPB BIRDWATCH

CALEY GREEN

The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and the wildfowl. It is a much loved open space and lovely to see it being used and enjoyed even in the autumn months.

THE CULVERT

SCC's contractor commenced work on 9th October to clear and re-profile the culvert alongside Caley Green that runs from Bear Street to the River Stour and remove the island of reeds at its mouth to enable proper flow into the river and prevent flooding. The delay in removing the debris from the site was due to testing the silt to determine where it is removed to.

During recent heavy rain the flow down the culvert was efficient and fast. The contractor confirmed there had been no evidence of wildlife living in the culvert. He dug out a few old bottles and wooden planks; this confirms that previously wooden revetment was in place all round the bay. He also said the silt deposit sitting on top of the gravel river bed is about 8 feet deep which considerably reduces the capacity of the river for holding flood water.

Repair to the rotten railing on Bear Street above the culvert has not been carried out; the work has been ordered and is being chased by the Parish Council.

THE LONG REED BED

SCC remain hopeful that their contractors will carry out a reduction of the 'wall of reeds' along Caley Green this year.

RIVERBANK LITTER BY SLUICE GATES

SCC are the landowners of the triangle of land between the A134 and the fork in the river adjacent the sluice gates.

They were alerted to a considerable amount of litter and flytipping; their appointed contractor did not carry out the rubbish clearance properly. This is matter is in the hands of the Properties Officer who will look once again at getting the matter rectified.

RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

Suffolk County Council (SCC) have indicated that wooden revetment will be installed around the bay at Caley Green to protect it from future erosion and that they will fund the work and manage the project. There is no further update on this but work is not expected to take place this year.

LASTING MEMORIAL ON THE GREEN

The Parish Council's project to install a bench to commemorate Queen Elizabeth II and a tree to celebrate King Charles III on

Caley Green is coming to fruition. The tree - a Copper Beech - has been planted and the concrete base for the bench has been laid. The bench will be installed very soon and railings around the tree in the near future. The Community Council awarded a grant of £1,538 towards this project.

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



Due to a change in the release date for 'Oppenheimer' we were unable to screen this film as scheduled on Friday 17th November and instead swapped our remaining films of the year to accommodate this change. This gave us the opportunity to schedule the screening of 'Oppenheimer' as a matinee which was opportunistic indeed due to the length of the film!

We won't unfortunately have Tim providing pizzas at this screening and the bar will be closed but we will be offering teas/coffees and mince pies (or alternative for non mince pie lovers!) included in the £5 ticket price.

We won't have received our next film menu in time for the Community Times deadline so please take a look at the Nayland Village Hall website for future dates and films. The first film of the new year on Friday 19th January will once again be a matinee screening then reverting back to evening performances from February.

Due to the increased costs of screening films we are now only able to screen those listed on the Moviola film menu. Any other films screened outside of this are subject to a minimum guarantee which unfortunately due to the generally low numbers attending isn't a viable option. Having said this however the film menu does encompass new releases with quite a mix of genre so hopefully there will be something in the collection to suit.

We are very much hoping that 'The Great Escaper' will feature on the menu with Michael Caine playing the spirited war veteran Bernie Jordan who sneaked out of his care home to attend the D-Day anniversary in France. This film is based on a true story. Poignantly it's also the late Glenda Jackson's final role and she brings gravitas and humour as his wife.

The next films chosen from the Moviola film menu will be:

• Friday 1st December: : 'Oppenheimer' (2023). A dramatisation of the life of J. Robert Oppenheimer (Cillian Murphy), the physicist who had a large hand in the development of the atomic bomb, thus helping end World War 2. In 1942, amid World War II, General Leslie Groves Jr. (Matt Damon) recruited Oppenheimer to lead the Manhattan Project to develop an atomic bomb. When Germany surrendered some scientists questioned the bomb's relevance. Oppenheimer and Albert Einstein (Tom Conti) discussed whether atomic detonation could trigger world destruction. His work comes to fruition in 1945 when President Truman ordered Hiroshima and Nagasaki to be bombed, forcing Japan to surrender and forever changing the course of history. Oppenheimer is thrust into the public eye as the "father of the atomic bomb", but the immense destruction and mass fatalities haunt him. As an advisor to the US Atomic Energy Commision, Oppenheimer advocated against further nuclear research, especially the hydrogen bomb. Oppenheimer's stance becomes a point of contention amid the tense Cold War with the Soviet Union.

Cinema dates to add to your diaries are: 19th January, 16th February and 23rd March.







We have limited availability for Pre-School sessions until September 2024 but please phone or email us to arrange a visit. Our extended schools are also nearly full with only a few spaces remaining!



THE NAYLAND AND BOXTED

SILVER BANDS

This Christmas we look forward once again to the Boxted Methodist Silver Band accompanying our carol singing around the Christmas Tree in the High Street. Christmas would not be complete in Nayland without the annual evening visit of this popular local band.

In September this year the Boxted band celebrated its 125th anniversary with an impressive and unforgettable concert at Littlegarth School. Over 200 people attended, including many Essex and Colchester dignitaries, and the audience was entertained by 33 members of the band. For part of the concert they were joined by musicians from elsewhere in the

country, making the event the biggest gathering of brass and silver band musicians in the area since the last Colchester Military Tattoo event in 1990.

The band's roots can be traced back to 1860 when a woodwind and brass music group was formed by members of the Boxted Wesleyan Methodist Chapel. In 1898 it became an all brass band and by 1938 was known as The Boxted Methodist Silver Band. Despite many setbacks over the years the band steadfastly kept going even when the Methodist Chapel and hall where they played were closed in 2019. During the Covid pandemic the band remained in contact and afterwards it was able to meet in temporary venues to practise until the Boxted Primary School offered the use of their hall and normal service was resumed.

Did you know that Nayland had its own band during the 1930s? There were many village bands in existence at this time but Navland owed its formation to several members of the Boxted band.

The Nayland & District British Legion Silver Band was formed under the auspices of the local branch of the British Legion in 1936 by Herbert Taylor, an ex-military bandsman. He had previously been bandmaster of the Boxted Silver Band but following a disagreement he and other bandsmen left and started the Nayland Band. Herbert Taylor lived in Mill Street, Nayland, where he ran one of the three bakeries which Nayland was fortunate to have at that time.

Ernie Hatten whose family ran Hatten's shop in Bear Street for over a hundred years, until it closed in 2017, became a member of the band. He told me that he joined when he was 16 and Herbie Taylor taught him to play the cornet. Some of Ernie's friends joined and soon they were all enthusiastically practising in the Mission Room (now the Church Hall in Bear



Street), on instruments loaned by the British Legion. In no time at all the band was playing at local functions. One of many was a United Service and Church Parade in Nayland in July 1936 when all ex-service men and women were invited to join the parade, the proceeds of the event going to the Nayland and Stoke Nursing Association.

The band became very successful and was in great demand for functions such as flower shows, fetes, British Legion rallies and carnivals. It played in the Colchester Carnival procession and regularly entertained holidaymakers at Walton but, with the coming of the Second World War, several of the band members left Nayland to join the forces and the band folded up.

Sadly when peace returned the Nayland band was never reformed. It was not the only band to fall by the wayside at this time but the enduring Boxted Band kept going and survived. In fact, when peace festivities were held in the area and a big military parade was organised through Colchester town centre, the Boxted Methodist Silver Band was the only civilian band to take part.

And so, we look forward to some members of this excellent band returning once again to Nayland as it has been doing for more than 50 years. At the appointed time the musicians take up their position in the High Street at St James's gate, whatever the weather. As they start to play people begin to gather round with their torches in the darkness, whole families well wrapped up, all coming to sing carols together in the lights of the Christmas tree. Sometimes the snow is falling but the band plays on!

NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: September & October 2023 by David Lowe

September was an exceptionally warm month, having a higher average temperature than both July and August, and equal to that of June, which itself was a record breaker for warmth.

But the fact that July and August were cool and wet shows that it is not warmth all the way.

Mean temperature was 17.5°C (14.88) the highest over the 16 year record period, but only 0.3°C ahead of 2016. The high temperature of 31.1°C (26.14) was well ahead of any previous year – next nearest 29.6°C. This September was the first time 30°C has been exceeded – and did this on no less than three occasions. The no. of days over 20°C was 20 (12.12) a record, over 25°C, 8 (2.25) a record. There were no days less than 15°C (1.25) and only 10 less than 20°C (17.75).

The odd thing was that sun hours and solar energy were not that high – sun hours 248.7 (244.51) and solar energy 8200 Ly (7683). This emphasises that the warmth was due to imported air from the tropics. There was a cooler and wetter period form the 13th to the 23rd, which affected the statistics.

Monthly rain was 33.4 mm (40.17) and evapotranspiration 68.6 mm (62.15). Greatest rainfall in a day was on the 20th, when 15.2 mm fell (14.69). Some of this was very heavy, coming down at 221.6 mm/hr (95.6).

Average wind speed was 3.7 mph (2.93) with highest daily average 8.9 mph (7.54) on the 19th. The 19th also had the highest gust of 36 mph (31). Predominant wind direction was SW.

October. What a month! Record warmth in the first 11 days, and then record rainfall in the last 20!

The first 11 days had 8 days over 20°C and 2 over 25°C, the first of the latter since 2011. And then the heavens opened, with a massive 53 mm on the 20th, 20.4 mm on both the 18th and 28th and over 10 mm on four other days. All these figures break the 16 year record – while the monthly total, 172.2 mm,

breaks the overall 16 year record of 146.3mm set in June 2017 by a wide margin of 26 mm. Between the 12th and 31st, there were only 5 days on which it didn't rain. At the end of October, we have had more rain this year, 710.7 mm, than any year in total except 2012. This had a total of 829.8 mm but stood at 649.9 mm at the end of October.

So what happened? For the first 11 days the Jet Stream was generally to the north of us, funnelling low pressure to the north, while after that, it was over us or to the south, funnelling low pressures at southern England. At the same time, during the latter part of the month, high pressure was located over the 'gap' between Iceland and Norway, which, at this season, low pressures normally head for.

Another factor was that many of the low pressures approached the UK for the south, which means east/southeast winds here as they arrive. With the absence of the rain shadow effect of westerly winds, we receive much higher rainfall in the east. Also, coming from the south, large quantities of tropical moisture had been scooped up by the lows; many also became slow moving over us.


Overall statistics don't fit this October very well, but, for consistency, we should review these. Mean temperature was 12.9°C (11.74) with a high of 25.4°C (21.07) and low of 0.3°C (1.96). There were two grass frosts and 1 (1.25) ground frost.

Bright sun hours 180.3 (166.49), solar energy 4900 Ly (4655).

Rainfall, as already detailed, was 172.2 mm (67.14) compared to 40 mm evapotranspiration. Highest rainfall rate was 175 mm/hr (81.83). Other rainfall statistics are set out in the 2nd paragraph.

Average wind speed was 4 mph (3.44) with highest gust of 37 mph and three days over 30 mph (1.25). Highest daily average was 10.5 mph (7.46). Mean direction was WSW.

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NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

ROY CHAPMAN

May 1930 - September 2023

Did you know that Roy once worked for Harrods? Not for long, but had he persisted, it's interesting to consider how he would have struck it off many years later with Mr Al Fayed.

That surprising nugget of information about Roy is an example of what one can learn about an old friend whose life one has come to celebrate. You run no such risk today, for was there ever a more transparently genuine man than Roy Chapman? What you saw was what you got.

How can one do justice in a few minutes to the memory of such a man, family man, sportsman, professional and businessman, colleague, dear friend, adviser, charity fundraiser, host and, of course, supreme luncher?

Roy was born in 1930 at Clacton-on -Sea where his father, was a police constable, later to become the legendary Inspector Chapman keeping law and order in Halstead. In 1939, Roy was evacuated and spent the next few years with his grandparents in Witham from where he won a scholarship to Westcliff High, and made his presence felt; Cricket Captain at 16, Captain of Rugby 2nd XV and first Tennis Six. He then at 17, with that characteristic

independence, left school without troubling his parents with any consultation.

And this was when Roy took up employment at Harrods, living in digs in Barnes (he had a certain style, even in those days).

There then followed eighteen months' National Service, mostly spent playing cricket for the RAF, with tours to Holland and to Germany, the high point of which was catching out Ken Barrington on the boundary.

There then followed Roy's first taste of the property world, when in 1950, looking for a job with (as he described it to me) as little work as possible, good pay and a car, he took up employment in Robert Balch's office in Chelmsford. The job didn't meet any of those criteria but did provide the truly life-changing event of meeting Mary, who was Robert Balch's secretary. Roy told me that on the day of his interview when he met Mary, he determined that she must become his wife.

That job, however, was not gripping, and he decided, encouraged by his father, to give the Police Force a try. He passed out of the National Training College (naturally) top of his course, and was posted to Chelmsford, and point duty. Can you imagine Roy on point duty? It was not really "him", somehow, so he decided to move on, despite the entreaties of no less than the Chief Constable, Sir Jonathan Peel, and returned to Balch & Balch in March 1951 at £6 a week, where encouraged by Mary, and by dint of a correspondence course, he trained and qualified as a Chartered Auctioneer and Estate Agent in 1956, later becoming a Chartered Surveyor.

Meanwhile, in 1953 Roy and Mary were married, and if there is one thing about Roy which everyone here must know, it is what a wonderfully happy and supportive marriage it was. Sadly, Mary's mother died of cancer ten days before the wedding, and that event led some years later to their extraordinary efforts in forming a committee and leading activities in aid of Cancer Research UK, which during Roy's time in office raised over £1.6m.

Newly qualified in 1956, Roy joined the Inland Revenue Valuation Office, gaining valuable experience and knowledge in the offices at Chelmsford and Colchester, and beginning to make his name in the profession.

In 1959, Roy was approached by Stan Skinner, with whom he had played cricket, and who with Tony Simmons practised



as surveyors and estate agents as James Abbott, with an offer to join them, which he accepted. Two years later he became the third partner, charged with growing the business. There followed a remarkable period of growth of Abbotts until in 1986, with 23 partners and 32 offices around East Anglia the business was acquired by Hambro to become Countrywide. A number of Roy's colleagues of those days, describe him as a man who was energetic, hugely popular, trusted, and respected and the very best role model.

A couple of years later, Roy left Countrywide and established his own practice, later welcoming John, then Robert to join him, and which he happily continued at West Bergholt, and later at Nayland until Robert joined Carter Jonas and John, Jackson Stopps, when he retired.

Family life was at the centre of Roy's life: his and Mary's devotion to each other was legendary, and wherever possible they combined their interests and activities, and gloried in each others' company. Robert and John remember them both with immense affection and gratitude. They describe him as "a fantastic father - always there for us, and for Sally and Jackie". As

a grandfather, he enjoyed a very close relationship with Sam and Emma, taking a deep and proud interest in his achievements at cricket and football, and hers at eventing and show jumping.

Notwithstanding the calls of a demanding professional and family life, Roy found time to play an active role in many outside activities - I have already mentioned Cancer Research UK-but to mention a few others, Gents of Essex Cricket Club, Rotary International, he was Centenary Chairman of the Essex Branch of the Institution of Chartered Surveyors, Father & Sons' Dinner Club which he founded 50 years ago, Divestus, Green Bottle, and, of course horse racing and breeding - a passion he shared with Mary.

Mary was particularly interested in the breeding of horses, and two of their highs were sharing the winner's enclosure with HM The Queen at Royal Ascot, and having a winner at the Cheltenham Festival. Roy was in recent years a well informed television follower of horseracing. It was an extraordinary coincidence and irony that Mary's last bred foal, Crail, long retired, died on the very same day as Roy.

Of course, Colchester United Football Club must be mentioned. Roy joined the board in the mid 1960s, becoming Chairman in 1971 when the Club was faced with the threat of relegation from the Football League. With characteristic determination he used his boundless energy and powers of persuasion to secure Colchester's re-election.

Roy's Nayland days brought great happiness to him, and to his many friends and neighbours there, organising events and visits - it is recalled that there was always smoked salmon and champagne on the coach, bridge, and of course his monthly open door "Happy Hours". And most importantly, the companionship of Sue. She introduced him to bridge which became an important feature of his life and they shared the love of Scotland, music and the theatre.


I have, of course, in recent weeks sought impressions from many (but only a small fraction) of Roy's friends and colleagues. The picture is of a big man, with a big personality, a gentleman, an understanding man, a man of generous spirit, an active and energetic man, an enthusiastic man, a man upon whom one could rely, and in whom one could trust absolutely.

Dear Friends,

We are entering the season of Advent leading us to Christmas and all the joy and family time that we love. Schools are performing in front of the parents some carols and we go on village greens and in churches to sing these carols out loud, ears full of the merry of the words.

It is also traditionally the time when we pay more attention to the poor at the local level and pray for peace in the rest of the world. No need to say that these two points of focus are definitely worth the attention nowadays. Poverty is definitely not a myth and the Church in this Benefice with its Community Pantry & Hardship Fund can actually bear witness that there's a real need. War is a reality whether it's at our door step in Ukraine or further East on the Holy Land. We have an even more vivid perception of the reality of this than we've got a constant flow of information on these conflicts and we've been exposed to the situation of refugees on each geographical side.

Often we feel powerless in front of the conflicts. We know how to deal with our local people in need for support and how to welcome refugees in our families and schools. But bring peace to the world, that's another story! There's not much we can do at our humble level besides educating ourselves about geopolitics, choosing carefully our politicians and praying Jesus-Christ, the Prince of Peace, to help us.

However, we forget that peace is also built for the future at the local level. All these rulers, heads of state or government,

TALK BY TONY PALMER

When I was asked by fellow Nayland resident Mark Ede who we might invite to give a talk at the inaugural event of Nayland Arts Society, I suggested Tony Palmer. I'd attended many screenings of his films at the BFI after designing DVD packaging for him. Tony has over 120 films to his credit, covering a wide spectrum of subjects, from pop-music related documentaries in the 60s and 70s (after befriending John Lennon during a press conference for Hard Days Night), to many films about many composers such as Benjamin Britten, Vaughan Williams, Stravinsky and Shostakovich. He also made films about people that fascinated him: Richard Burton, Peter Sellers, Leonard Cohen, Liberace and Hugh Hefner, to name but a few!

I rang Tony to ask if he would come to Nayland. He agreed to take part and, possibly because our past relationship, only charged us minimal travel expenses. In his eighties now and though no longer making films, Tony is very active, and told me he'd given a talk to 400 students at Durham University one week in September, followed by another the following week, at Trinity College Cambridge, where he'd once been a student himself. He asked if we had a decent film projector and screen, I said yes (courtesy of Nick Moriarty, who was a life saver on the night). Tony chose some film clips and I drafted out questions for a Q&A format with him. As it turned out, I needn't have bothered...no questions I had could have stemmed his flow or match his stories, which appeared one

used to be children, to live in a community, to have neighbours. When you take time to pay attention to the story of each warmonger, dictator, autocrat, falcon etc.. you discover children ill-treated or bullied, frustration, resentment, discrimination and other life experiences that are negative. We often don't realise it but our behaviour shapes the future. Any child, any neighbour could potentially become one day someone in a position of such power that they can either bring peace or war.

So more than ever, the wisdom of Jesus-Christ about human relationship is relevant, for now and for the future. And it's not that difficult: teaching children to be kind, generous and careful with each other at school; being kind and patient with your neighbour, because even if they get on your nerves, you never know the full story behind; being smiley, openminded and generous with the stranger, and above all, in any circumstances, do not judge.

I have got the feeling I am stating the obvious, but it's neither with indifference, nor hatred, nor disdain, nor ignorance that we build security or peace, but indeed with love and compassion. My brothers and sisters in Christ, it's with everyday simple acts of kindness that we build peace and make this world a better place. As simple as a smile.

One minute he was telling the sell out crowd about meeting Stravinsky (who only agreed to be filmed if Tony introduced him to The Beatles), the next with Nelson Mandela, followed after that by the deeds of the Queen Mother. My job was to move him on as politely as possible, otherwise we'd have overrun by hours and only concentrated on one or two films.

"I want to upset the ordinary traditional way of seeing things", he once said about his films.

Melvyn Bragg described him as an 'impact director'. His talk in Nayland certainly had an impact. Some of the audience were moved to tears by his film about Maria Callas as she sang 'All for art - all for love!' Tony Palmer's credo was always "you cannot separate the artist and their lives and times if you want to understand their music. Music always 'means' something". That is as good a summation of his life and work as anything, and he delivered that message loud and clear on the night.

It was a very special evening which coincided (October 10th) with 'World Homeless Day' https://www.daysoftheyear.com/days/world-homeless-day/ and as we all know homelessness is on the increase, Nayland Arts Society (all volunteers) have decided to pay profits from this event to Colchester Nightshelter: https://cens4homeless.org.uk

An extraordinary and memorable evening all round.

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
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
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
