### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

### Notes by observer of the meeting: 14th December 2022

### PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMANSHIP

Robin Thorogood chaired the meeting.

### **PUBLIC FORUM**

Mike Hunter asked if the Parish Council felt they could challenge Babergh DC Planning and Enforcement on their lack of support.

### **DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

Melanie Barrett said a Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) application for the maximum funding of £100k is currently being considered towards the Village Hall Roof.

Mary George said that she was investigating potential warm spaces including at Parkers Way and this will involve liaison with Melanie Barrett and James Finch.

### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

James Finch said the winter gritting program and grit replenishment is underway. Suffolk Archives have produced an online gallery showcasing our late Queen. Further hosts are needed for Ukrainian families already here or fleeing the conflict.

White Lining renewal had been ordered for the Bear Street/A134 junction. The experimental yellow lines in Bear Street to remain; the lack of consultation regarding this is disappointing.

Recommendations of the Finance Committee were approved including: A precept of £42,952(1.9% increase) for 2023/24 year; a further maximum of £40,000 on top of the £10,000 already pledged can go towards the Village Hall Roof; Allotment Rent is to remain the same for next financial year; Burial Fees will have a small uplift to allow for inflation; Parish CIL monies are to be used for the new bins, new Play equipment and Village Hall Roof.

### **PLANNING**

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at 1 Stoke Road [DC/22/04730] for conversion of garage/store to home office/ancillary room to the main house; at 21 Stoke Road [DC/22/05149] for construction of external staircase to existing double garage and installation of door; at Nayland Village Hall Church Lane [DC/22/05491] for non-material amendment relating to DC/22/01286 - to change part of the roof from slates to PV panels; at White Hart 11 High Street [DC/22/05098] for listed building amendment of conditions to render over gable end rather than exposing timbers.

Between meetings to meet the deadline councillors had no objections to an application at **Roziers Wissington Uplands** [DC/22/05633] for erection of three bay cart lodge; at **Old Brewery House. 20 Church Lane** [DC/22/05718] for erection of cart lodge with bike store and first floor home office, replacement of railings and erection of greenhouse (following demolition of existing carport and shed); at **The White House 16 Church Lane** [DC/22/05721] for erection of a cart lodge outbuilding.

Councillors objected to the application at **Oak Cottage**, **Kingsland Lane** [DC/22/05478] for erection of 2 holiday lodges and detached garage/cartlodge to replace existing buildings (re-submission of DC/21/06742). They object to further development of this site into the Countryside. The proposal is in a tranquil location in open countryside. In addition to protecting the nature of this location and not permitting any increase in the size and dominance of this site, it is essential that lighting at the proposal does not escape into the surrounding AONB and also that the footpaths in the vicinity remain unaltered

Considering Mike Hunter's question regarding the level of service from Babergh councillors' recalled applications where their recommendations were seemingly ignored, the lack of site inspections and the delays with enforcement action. After discussion it was agreed for Laura Erith and Dawn Harris to join the Conservation Society to put a paper together on the subject which can be used to challenge Babergh Planning.

### A LASTING ROYAL MEMORIAL

It was resolved it would be better to agree a whole Community Memorial. The subject would be added to the Community Council meeting agenda to gain further suggestions.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

Mary George reported on the transport group meetings and that James Finch had chased up the issue of the unsafe bus stop. Highways have confirmed they have no budget for this and were trying to put the onus on the Parish Council. It was agreed for Mary George to attend the next transport group meeting in January and get some more details.

### **HIGHWAYS – 20mph ZONE**

The speed survey has been requested; three locations in the village will be monitored in January. James Finch is willing to fund the survey but if the results determine that a report is required he asked if the PC have considered the costs involved.

### STREET LIGHTING

Outstanding invoices have now been received by SCC; the situation os now up to date. It was agreed that the PC's lights would be programmed to remain on all night on both Christmas Eve and New Years Eve in line with the County Council lights.

### **CALEY GREEN**

The Caley Green working group had a zoom meeting recently to discuss the recommendations made by the Contractors approached to help with the project. The next stage would be to discuss with the County Council and the working group were to set up a meeting in January.

### **RECREATION & OPEN SPACES**

SCC have completed the tree work identified in their tree risk assessment that we had chased them for.

The new dog bins are being installed and we had a complaint from a resident in Court Street regarding the location.

The project for new play equipment at the Fairfield was at the stage of considering quotes. The work would be completed in drier weather, so there was still time to bring proposals to the PC. In relation to general maintenance, this is being examined and the cost will be considered at the January PC meeting.

### **VILLAGE HALL**

The floor needs maintenance, but the priority is the roof. Quotes for the roof are currently being sought.

Several fund raising events are proposed for 2023. The PC have pledged £40,000 towards the roof.

### **ALLOTMENTS**

The annual allotment meeting took place; the next meeting is scheduled for 20th March in the Church Hall. Rents have been requested. There is an issue with an Ash tree; our contractors have been ask to quote for this. Regular allotment Inspections have now been instigated by the Committee. There were concerns that some allotments should be better maintained.

### **BURIAL GROUND**

The annual maintenance meeting with contractors determine work required. A general tidy costing £475 has been authorised. Heavy pollarding recommended would require alternative quotes from tree surgeons in the New Year. Mary George has updated the long term maintenance plan. Burial fees will be uplifted slightly. There had been a request for permission to install some ground level stones to a grave similar to other graves nearby; this would be looked at and considered between meetings.

### IN BRIEF

Dawn Harris will represent the PC at the January meeting of the CC

Councillors agreed a request for Nayland Bear to utilise the old bus shelter over the festive season.

Councillors heard that the unsuitable stones laid erroneously in the vicinity of Dead Lane have been removed but not yet replaced.

A resident has written requesting a bottle bank; this subject has a long history with no suitable location being identified. The PC will reply asking for suggestions.

### **PARISH COUNCIL**

Robin Thorogood chaired the meeting. Patricia Wilkie has resigned from the Council but will continue to assist on the Allotment and Caley Green working parties. There have been applications from two residents to join the Council.

### **PUBLIC FORUM**

lain Wright undated councillors on progress with the village hall roof replacement project. He thanked them for their pledge of £40,000 towards the project. The committee continue to apply for further grant funding; they have sent out to tender the roof works for quotes; they are planning four fundraising events this year. The events are a Beatles tribute band on 4th March, on 24th June a Midsummer Picnic in the park (Orchestra playing classics), an Afternoon Tea (background music) on 14th July, a Village Festival on 2nd-3rd September. (full report on page 33)

Volunteers from the Benefice Community Pantry gave an overview of the project and requested consideration for financial help.

Sally Dalton asked for clarification on whether it was a 20mph zone or a 20mph limit that the Council and Conservation Society were working towards as they are different and whether a public consultation will take place before public money is spent on the proposal, especially as a previous 20mph project was cancelled due to objections by residents. She also asked if the PC will ask the District Councillor to request the planning application for 5 dwellings on Harpers Hill is raised with planning committee.

Answering Sally, Mike Hunter said he thinks it is a 20mph zone. He asked when the speed survey would be conducted and confirmed that the Conservation Society have objected to the planning application for 5 dwellings on Harpers Hill.

### **PLANNING**

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at The White House 16 Church Lane [DC/22/05721] for erection of a cart lodge outbuilding and at Old Brewery House. 20 Church Lane [DC/22/05718] for erection of cart lodge with bike store and first floor home office, replacement of railings and erection of greenhouse (following demolition of existing carport and shed). Discharge of condition applications were granted at 1 Fen Street [DC/22/06255] for DC/22/01271 relating to the timber frame; at 100 Bear Street [DC/22/05791] for DC/20/04533 relating to facing and roofing materials; at Mill House 12 Mill Street [DC/22/05147] for DC/21/06087 relating to dining room fireplace and internal door detail were part granted.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections to applications at **Sandpits Farm Campions Hill** [DC/22/06362] for a lawful development certificate for existing use of the residential property and for listed building consent at **72 - 74 Bear Street** [DC/22/06331] for demolition of existing conservatory, erection of single storey rear extension, internal alterations, glazed link between house and garage, new garage roof and partial conversion of garage into guest bedroom and ensuite.

Dawn Harris reported on progress compiling a paper, in conjunction with the Conservation Society (CS), to challenge the level of service from Babergh's planning department. She said the CS are working on a paper with examples where they feel Babergh has let them down; Dawn and Laura Erith are working on examples the PC feel are relevant. Tricia Fuller raised the developments on the north side of Harpers Hill which controversially avoided the legal requirement for inclusion of low cost housing.

### Site Adjacent Paddock Grove Harpers Hill

Discussing this full planning application for construction of 5 dwellings [DC/22/06294] councillors raised a number of concerns including closeness to the road, small gardens, the scale, design and layout and that three storeys are proposed. Councillors were not opposed to something being on the site but felt this proposal was not appropriate and would raise an objection. Patricia Fuller would draft a response.

### Land Adjacent To Nayland Primary School

Discussing this recently received application for erection of a

single-storey detached dwelling with carport and garage on land in front of the old scout hut next to the burial ground councillors had a number of concerns and would request an extension for commenting as this is a controversial application. Concerns were raised including: regarding the driveway which has shared ownership; access over the recently created parking spaces and refurbish turning circle; future plans for the old scout hut as this was not stated in the application; the adjacent PROW alongside the burial ground; the design and access statement; the design was not fitting in its surrounds.

### **HIGHWAYS - 20mph ZONE**

James Finch said the speed survey is scheduled to commence on 26<sup>th</sup> January for 7 days. The locations will be: Stoke Road by the old chapel; Bear St by the school junction; Court Street by number 27.

James Finch said any public consultation would be the responsibility of the PC and would take place if, following the results of the survey data, they wish to proceed with the project. Consideration to funding the project would be discussed once the data is known.

### **BUS SERVICE**

Mary George attended the January transport group meeting. There is no progress towards provision of safer, permanent bus stops on the A134. James Finch said Chambers are still considering the 84 route which may be reduced or even lost altogether.

### A LASTING ROYAL MEMORIAL

Dawn Harris reported that the consensus at the Community Council meeting for a memorial was a specimen tree with a plaque and a wrought iron surround for the late Queen and beside it a bench and plaque for the new King situated on Caley Green. It had been suggested that planting should fit with the Coronation date and children and residents encouraged to attend.

On the suggestion of a village sign, Dawn said the CC meeting supported a village sign that but felt it was separate project. On a suggestion for plaques for the late Queen and new King in the church, Mary George said this would not be a straightforward option. Mary George again said that SCC had in the past not wanted any more trees planted on Caley Green; it was suggested they could be asked for their current opinion explaining what it is for and that it is a community request. It was felt more information should be gathered, including the tree species, proposed location, to put forward to SCC as a proposal; Dawn Harris and Gerry Battye would progress this.

### **CALEY GREEN**

Mary George said there had been no response from SCC to have a site meeting during January so there is nothing to report; she will remind SCC.

### **RECREATION & OPEN SPACES**

The project for new play equipment in memory of Margaret Underwood at the Fairfield is progressing; the working party are collating information and quotes to put before the Council for approval. Gerry Battye will update the family.

Gerry Battye suggested PC contractors were asked to look at a tree by the old bus shelter on Harpers Estate.

### IN BRIË

Damage to a section of Wiston Raod occurred when a lorry became stuck in the ditch. James Finch said it needs to be built back up as well as road repair; the work is scheduled for the third week in January but this may be affected by other road closures in the vicinity.

The next meeting with allotment holders will be on 20th March in the Church Hall. Mary George requested that details of overdue rents were given to the working party.

The amount of litter accumulated by the Anchor Car Park, which is blowing over to Pop's Piece was raised; PC contractors will be asked to litterpick, the situation will be monitored and if it continues the landowner will be contacted.

Quotes from tree surgeons for pollarding trees in the burial ground will be sought, this will require a site meeting and liaising with the neighbour to view the trees from all sides.

# ELECTIONS: 4TH MAY 2023

District and Parish Council elections will take place in May. Councillors will be elected, or re-elected, for a four year term of office until 2027. The parish will continue to be served by nine elected Parish Councillors and our Polling Station will be at Nayland Village Hall as usual. Candidates must be over 18 and live within 3 miles of the parish boundary or work within the parish.

Full details of the nomination process will be available on the Babergh Mid-Suffolk website. If more than nine candidates stand for election, the ballot papers will be counted on 5th May. If the election is uncontested then all nominated candidates will be deemed to be elected unopposed. Results will then be published. The New Parish Council will hold the first meeting on Wednesday 10th May.

### **COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT**

Meeting: 4th January 2023 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

**Executive Committee:** Rachel Hitchcock advised that due to work commitments Kate Bevan would not be able to continue on the Executive Committee but is willing to help out with events and that Sophie Williams is moving away from the village. Both have been valuable members of the Exec and will be missed.

In view of this we would welcome people to consider joining the Exec. We meet just six times a year. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee and an ideal way for those new to the village to become involved and meet new friends. Contact Rachel on 07788 954309 or rachel\_hitchcock@hotmail.com if you would like to know more .

**Fundraising Activities/Events:** We have a good deal of activities being planned currently but as always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall which is managed by the CC is regularly checked; Dawn Harris agreed to share this task. Following a query by a resident advice was sought about the availability of the access code when calling 999; the Community Heartbeat Trust advised that they have weekly meetings with the ambulance services and reassured us that there are no issues with getting through to 999 (at which point the access code for the defibrillator is given if required) the issues, as we have all seen, have been with vehicles being available. For various reasons they assured that this is the most effective and safe way of providing access to the code and they advised no change. Thank you to the resident for getting in touch as this is always helpful. The annual support costs for the defibrillator to Community Heartbeat Trust in September include insurance, time expired and post rescue replacement electrodes/batteries/rescue kits, annual compliance check on defibrillator and cabinet, loan defib if out of action for more than 3 days and rescue data downloading.

**River Stour Water Level Gauge:** There has been no update on progress.

**Nayland 10k Fun Run:** <u>nayland10k.co.uk</u> The date will be Sunday 9 July. Luke Rumbelow has asked permission to hold the 2023 Nayland 10k at Littlegarth and is awaiting a response.

**Online Ticketing Facility:** NaylandEvents.org – This has been very useful, and busy in the lead up to Christmas. Justin was thanked for providing this facility. If you are interested in selling tickets using this system get in touch with Justin Dowding.

**Village Hall Gardening Morning:** The spring garden tidy session will be Saturday 1st April from 9am with refreshments. It is a sociable activity so please come along to help keep the gardens weeded and trimmed.

**Village Christmas Tree:** Claire Buller was thanked for organising this - the tree looked spectacular and received many compliments. The tree will be taken down on Sunday 8th January at 9.30am – help with this would be welcome.

King Charles III's Coronation: After some discussion regarding what activity residents may appreciate and the manpower available it was felt the best option would be a Bring Your Own Picnic on the Village Hall Playing Field either on Saturday 7th or Sunday 8th May. A decision on the date will be made as soon as possible. Currently there is no advice regarding national events to take a lead from. Suggestions for possible inclusion were screening of televised celebration, beer and Pimm's stall, Punch 'n' Judy. Offers of help with planning would be welcome.

Queen Elizabeth II and King Charles III commemorative feature: The Parish Council asked for this agenda item; they are asking for suggestions for a feature to commemorate the late Queen and the coronation of the new King. Previous ideas that have been mooted include a specimen tree and bench, village sign, water fountain, fruit trees, lights on the church.

The consensus at this meeting was for a specimen tree of stature, perhaps with a wrought iron surround and plaque, for the late Queen and a bench and plaque for the new King on Caley Green. It was suggested that planting should fit with the Coronation date and children and residents encouraged to attend. (As this is not recommended planting time it was suggested when planting the tree a wide hose for watering down at the root is inserted to enable effective watering during the dry season; this is a method used by green keepers).

As a separate project there was considerable support for a village sign; most neighbouring villages have one and they are nice features.

Village Hall Roof Project: Grant funding & Fundraising events lain Wright gave details of fundraising events; a Beatles Night is organised for Saturday 4th March; on the evening of Saturday 24th June Midsummer Music, there will be a Vintage Afternoon Tea with music on 14th July, and on the first weekend of September a Fun, Food & Music event. A VHMC led planning committee will be needed for the latter event.

Regarding the roof project lain said further grant monies have been pledged including £40,000 from the Parish Council. The fund thermometer has been updated; see page 33.

**TREASURER'S REPORT:** Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 4th January.

**Breakdown of profits:** Community Times £1,259.24, Village Quiz £392.46, Calendar £683.72, Nayland 10k £800, Bonfire Night £3,536.01, Christmas Fayre £272.47.

**Grants paid:** Nayland Choir £128, Village Hall replacement doors £10,000, Village Hall coffee machine £280. We received £270.36 as a return of grant funds provided to the Post Office Project.

**Expenses:** £2,479.63 for the Jubilee Party, £298 for defibrillator servicing and training, £393 for Christmas activities, £1,504.55 for central costs including insurance for the year.

**Current Position:** The accounts show reserves of £26,017.50 represented by Deposit a/c monies £10,748.40, Current a/c monies £13,951.97, Paypal a/c £52.20, Cash in Hand £1,264.93. We hold £268.50 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000.00, VH coffee machine £280 and Lizzie's Fund £153. Other accrued expenses total £366.19 and there is £25 of accrued income. **Therefore, unencumbered assets are £14,974.81.** 

### **GRANTS & DONATIONS:**

Nayland Bear Christmas Display: it was agreed to make a contribution of £100 towards batteries to power lights during recent and further displays in 2023. Nayland Bear has become a much loved village character. His continued appearances on various seasonal occasions - Christmas, New Year, Valentines, Easter, royal celebrations, Halloween, etc – are very much enjoyed by residents of all ages. Many thanks to Elaine Muskett and Di Green.

**99 Bear Street Christmas Lights:** It was agreed to make a contribution of £100 towards electricity to power lights for this very popular seasonal spectacle. The Caley Green entrance to the village looked fabulous once again; many thanks to John Spooner for his wonderful display.

Nayland Village Hall: a request has been made by the VHMC for a contribution towards framing of photographic enlargements of historic community events. The enlargements ranging in size between A0 and A2 have been printed; the framing cost has been given as £1,700. The possibility of donating the profit of the Quiz raffle was suggested. This request will be further considered via email among the Exec and on the Agenda for next meeting.

### Recent CC Activities:

**Sale of Firework Night Tickets:** 31st October. This worked well alongside Nayland Bear's display at the Harpers Estate old bus shelter. Lots of children and their parents visited.

Community Council report continued.....

**Bonfire & Fireworks:** *5th November.* Rachel Hitchcock said this went really well; the CC should be proud of themselves! The professional display company, Firework Crazy, were excellent. The CC made £3,500 which was especially good as the event fell on a Saturday with greater costs and more competition.  $\underline{A}$  huge thank you to everyone who helped.

**Christmas Fayre:** 3rd December. Rachel said it was good that the Fayre was back; it went very well and was much enjoyed by visitors and those participating. Next year further consideration will be given to including outside stallholders and potential seasonal activities.

Christmas Trail: Advent Windows, Christmas Tree Trail & Wreath Competition. This was fantastic and received many positive comments. Many other properties were adorning festive delights including the deer and new lights opposite Caley Green and this year around Nags Corner. An online photo album is being assembled. Thank you to everyone who participated.

**Father Christmas:** 24th December, tour of Nayland in Foster Jones' vintage car. He gave out about 75 bags of chocolate coins. There were many comments of how lovely this was and how much it was enjoyed... by all ages! Thank you to Foster and Jan Jones and to Father Christmas and his elf.

**Community Times & Websites:** Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues. Printing costs increased in 2022 but there was a slight increase in advertising during the year.

### **SOCIETY REPORTS**

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said on Tuesday 14th March the spring speaker will be Roger Hanse (a professional photographer) on 'Landscapes throughout the British Isles'; on Saturday 25th March the Spring Flower Show; on Tuesday 18th April the AGM and Fun Quiz and on Saturday 13th May the Morning Market. They will be introducing a 'Tallest Sunflower Competition' to the Summer Flower Show; this will involve giving out seeds this spring for residents of all ages to participate

**Friends of Caley Green:** Sally Dalton reported dedicated canoeists and paddle-boarders have continued to use the Green. It has been good to see more ducks again and there are currently two pairs of swans – one on the river, the other on the Meadow pond.

**First Responders:** Tracy Le Grys reported that they have 4 fully trained responders and another awaiting training which is really positive.

**Art Group:** Kathryn Niven reported that they continue to meet regularly and have tackled some more watercolor challenges. Before the holidays, we all contributed to a group Christmas card for one of our members who has moved away from the area with each of us representing one of the twelve days of Christmas. These were painted, drawn, collaged and even embroidered so it was a very creative task that we all enjoyed. We had a very enjoyable Christmas meal at the Crown in December.

Nayland Choir: Justin Dowding said it had been freezing in the church for their concert 'Tis the Season' with Christmas music but Rachel added that the music was beautiful. Justin said their next concert would be on 26th March in St James' Church. Rehearsals will be held on Thursday evenings starting at 8pm.

**Village Players:** Justin Dowding said the pantomime, Andrew Walker's *'The Oz Factor'*, was quite something and was a sell-out. Their next production of *'Snake in the Grass'* has been cast and performances will be on 23rd-26th March.

Parish Council: Dawn Harris said the PC have approved an additional funding pledge for the village hall roof project of up to 40k from capital reserves; they are working towards installing additional play equipment (a sunken trampoline and basket swing) and refurbishment of the Fairfield Play Park; renovations to war memorial, milestone and horse-trough including reinstatement of the original plaque are complete; SCC have advised they have no funding to create safer bus stops on A134. The PC welcome suggestions for a Coronation and Queen's memorial.

Land Company (Nayland Meadow): David Slater said that hedges will be trimmed soon and the coppiced hedge will be managed. They hope to gain funding to improve the accessibility of the footpath (yet to be fully confirmed). This would allow a relatively small section at the base of the steps to be improved; this would be a start and hopefully more can be done in future.

Royal British Legion: Robert Dossor reported that the branch had a fascinating visit to Fairfield's Crisps on 30th November, and has its next meeting on Monday 16th January to hear Terry Bannister recall the adventures of her father during WW2. On Monday 13th March Commander Mark Leaning RN will describe his adventures in the Falklands Islands. New members always welcome and we are still looking for a Secretary!

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter reported that in November Professor Jules Pretty gave a fascinating talk based on his new book entitled 'Sea Sagas of the North'. They have a full programme of speakers arranged for 2023; in March will feature talented resident Mark Wilkinson who will talk on the topic of postage stamp design.

Planning permission has been submitted for a new residential development on the western side of Harpers Hill; It is of considerable concern; they have lodged an objection. The Society is concerned by the failure of Babergh to take notice of local objections; they are discussing the position with the Parish Council with a view to making joint representations to Babergh.

The scanning of the Rev. Jones book 'Ten Church Pieces for the Organ' has now been completed and it will soon be available to view on our website.

Foster and Jan Jones of Fen Street have another book written by Jones entitled 'Letters from a tutor to his pupils' published in 1822. There are 26 'letters' on subjects ranging from 'Good Manners' to 'the use of mathematical learning'. This will also be prepared to view on our website and it is hoped both books will be housed in a display case located in St James' Church.

Nayland with Wissington Community Council celebrated the start of the festive season with a successful Christmas Fayre on 3rd December.



### WATER LEVELS & QUALITY

While some are complaining about the wet weather hopefully it is going some way to making up for the long conditions during summer of '22.

River levels are back to a seasonal norm and Nayland's flood channel has been flowing when needed. If there is too much water at once and the river flows too fast with silt and debris then water cannot be abstracted to Abberton Reservoir to restore levels there.

### **REED CONTROL AT THE WEIR**

As mentioned last issue, despite the assurances to a local resident, and indications published on the internet that some reed management would take place at Nayland Weir in 2022 this did not happen.

Recent photographs of the river and those taken near the weir show that despite it being winter when much reed growth dies down the amount of reed vegetation has escalated, trapping sediment and extending the reed bed further.

### WILDFOWL & SWANS

There are currently two pairs of swans in Nayland; one pair on the Meadow pond and the other on the river. Recently they have been stalking each other and sizing each other

up - hopefully any territorial disputes will be minimal.

As mentioned last issue the cygnets have departed; the river seems bare without them. On the other hand there have been a number of ducks at Caley Green, more than we have seen for some time. It's hoped they continue to stay clear of Avian Flu.

Hopefully the swans and ducks will be mating again very soon and the whole cycle will begin again.

### FATHER CHRISTMAS COMES TO NAYLAND

Once again, Father Christmas and his Elf visited Nayland on Christmas Eve for a tour of the village in Foster Jones' wonderful open-top vintage car, a 1927 Humber.

They were greeted on their travels by many excited children, parents and 'big kids' out to see the visit by this special man.

The photographs show residents greeting the tour when it arrived in the High Street. It then went via Court Street to Caley Green and then down Bear Street to Stoke Road and then to Fen Street.

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### **CALEY GREEN**

During the winter season the Green has been quieter but still much enjoyed by residents and some dedicated river users. The wildfowl are present despite concerns about the outbreak of Avian Flu. The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and the wildfowl.

### THE LONG REED BED

It was very disappointing that although SCC's Properties Officer said that some of the tall Norfolk reeds would be cut during 2022 and a future management plan put in place nothing has been done to date. Residents are particularly frustrated as a community solution could have been considered; the autumn window of opportunity has been lost.

However, the SCC Officer has recently apologised for the delay and said this will be moved forward.

### LASTING MEMORIAL ON THE GREEN

Suggestions have been conveyed to the Parish Council for siting a specimen tree of stature, possibly an Oak, to

commemorate the late Queen and a bench and plaque for the new King on Caley Green. The SCC Officer has indicated this should not be a problem; saying it would be a lovely idea.

### RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

As reported last issue four specialist contractors visited the site and gave their advice on the best solution to the prevent further erosion. The information was collated and discussed by the working party. The consensus of advice was to install replacement wooden revetment round the whole of the bay area. The SCC Properties Officer has been asked to attend a site meeting to discuss the proposal and funding for the work. This is necessary as SCC own Caley Green. There has been no official response but he has recently been reminded.

### THE CULVERT

Again, there is no progress on this. Silt and vegetation continues to accumulate in the mouth of the culvert. SCC were asked to clear the debris; this has not been attended to yet.

### **NAYLAND SURGERY:**

We all sit in our homes at times and we reminisce about the past. Perhaps we hanker for those "good old days" when life was so much more simple. Perhaps there was a day in the past when you were not feeling so good and you thought that you really should see the local doctor or nurse - all the villagers knew them then by their name of course - and they were nearly always to be found at their workplace at their Surgery in Bear Street. And very comforting it was to know. So you'd ring the surgery on 262202 (or call-in) and the receptionist would make you an appointment - normally for the same day - and all done within a minute or so. How we took it all for granted then !!!

Until the day came when we all had to call the Creffield Road Surgery on 01206 570371 ......

They say we should embrace change and I think most of us do - but you also naturally compare these changes to what you had previously. This particular change is not an improvement. Hanging on a phone for well over an hour is not acceptable. To be told that there are no appointments available and to ring back the following day at 9am is not a service. To be told you are number 82 in the queue and then cut-off when you get to number 26 is not ok. Nor is it acceptable to hang on for over an hour and then be cut off without speaking to anyone. This

is not progress nor is it a change for the better.

When this new phone system was first introduced we were promised it would certainly improve things. I have to say that it is far worse and most of us dread having to ring the surgery at all. Frankly, it is not working and needs to be changed.

When we go into the surgery to collect a prescription the waiting room is often empty !! It should be heaving with patients but it is not. Very strange particularly after being told that no appointments are available that day. There is something wrong here and this new phone system is certainly not working well for such an aged population in Nayland. Lots of us are working very hard but we don't always want to be told by a recorded message that the NHS is working very hard despite illness and shortages - and NO I haven't been to Wuhan recently !! Isn't it about time some of these recorded messages were changed.

We are a small village community that used to have a very good local doctors surgery. With a front of house receptionist who could take phone calls and make appointments. Never were people expected to wait in a queue for such a long time when they were in a short walking distance of their surgery or were feeling stressed or poorly anyway.

This is a plea for the Nayland surgery to go back to the good old days where the surgery was an integral part of the community - surely that would be a vast improvement on what we have now.

We reported the damage to the green by a SCC highways vehicle recently and it was repaired. Thanks go to County Councillor Finch for the quick resolution.




### NAYLAND ART GROUP



In the last edition of the Community Times I mentioned the book by the Reverend William Jones acquired by the Society and its contents will shortly be available to view on the Society's website and in due course the original volume will be displayed in St. James Church. The publicity arising from the book's acquisition resulted in an approach from Society members Foster and Jan Jones. Foster advised me he was in possession of another book written by Jones entitled "Letters from a tutor to his pupils" published in 1822. There are 26 "letters" on subjects ranging from "Good Manners" to "The use of mathematical learning". Foster and Jan have very kindly donated the book to the Society and we are arranging for this book to be scanned with the intention of adding it to our website to permit general access. The original book will also be placed in the same display case in St. James. Our thanks to Foster and Jan for their kind donation.

The appearance of the residential development known as Paddock Grove on the western side of the A134 has not met with universal acclaim (the Society filed a strong objection to the original application which was ignored by Babergh District Council) and it is with some concern that a new application has been lodged for 5 dwellings on a site immediately to the south of Paddock Grove. Another lengthy objection to this new site has been lodged by the Society which can be viewed either on Babergh's planning web site or on the Society's web site at <a href="http://naylandconservation.org.uk/PlanningApps.html">http://naylandconservation.org.uk/PlanningApps.html</a>.

The committee of the Society has been so concerned with the apparent disregard by Babergh District Council on so many planning applications and enforcement issues that a written representation is being made outlining our concerns and requesting a meeting with the Chief Planning Officer and Chair of the Planning Committee. The Parish Council may join us in making this representation although at the time of writing this report their final decision has not yet been reached.



Speed testing for the 20 mph zone is due to start on 26<sup>th</sup> January. You may recall that for the village to be considered as a suitable location for such a zone the existing average speed of traffic must be 24 mph or lower. Those readers who are supportive of this scheme will no doubt bear this in mind when they observe the speed sensors as they drive through the village!

The Society's first speaker meeting of the year will take place at our AGM in Nayland Village Hall on 7<sup>th</sup> of March when talented local resident Mark Wilkinson will talk to us on Stamp Design. Mark is famous for his LP covers for bands such as Iron Maiden, Fish, Marillion and Bon Jovi but on this occasion, he will concentrate on his stamp design work.

Finally, news of progress relating to the Court Knoll Project has been thin on the ground since the pandemic started but I am pleased to advise you of a recent important development. You may recall that a number of high-status ceramic tiles were recovered from the excavations. These were to be analysed against similar tiles which had been found at Bury St. Edmunds. Unfortunately, the Bury tiles had been mislaid and the analysis was delayed. However, they have now been found and it is hoped that once the results of the analysis are to hand we can progress to the final report.



Eventually the existing fossil-fueled boiler could be replaced as another major contribution to reducing emissions directly associated with the running of the building.


PVs are relatively low maintenance compared to most central building plant. With no moving parts and only electrical services to periodically check, PVs will assist with reducing maintenance costs. The specified PV installation will act as a roof finish, so that a separate roof finish is not required (compared to, for example, retro-fitted PVs commonly seen on pre-installation


Another aspect of environmental sustainability considered as part of the design of the re-roofing was the choice of thermal insulation. The selected products provide a good level of 'breathability', letting internal moisture vapour (invisible within the air in the building) to migrate to the exterior. This reduces the chances of condensation forming within the building - a good principle to adopt to safeguard the fabric of the building. Additionally, the increased thickness of insulation material will assist with noise insulation, from the exterior and from the interior.


Next steps in the sustainability strategy for the Village Hall could include consideration of the other building services; how their energy consumption can be reduced and their operational carbon footprint possibly removed completely.

# Garden Notes

Venturing out into his garden in the teeth of a bitter North Westerly the OM/S was happy to spot the first harbingers of Spring, the golden Aconites in full flower. One often thinks that Snowdrops deserve that title but the Aconites beat them, to borrow a bit of racing parlance by at least a short length.

Many years ago the OM/S introduced a few clumps into St James' churchyard – look as you go down the path – and they have survived and increased. Snowdrops are more effective with their single and double white flowers, and some Galanthophiles (as they are termed) go mad and spend large sums of money on rare varieties.

If bought and allowed to dry out, they can take time to settle down, but are best dug up in the green as the saying goes. The OM/S, whose cover, as they say in the best spy stories, has surely been blown would be happy to give some to anyone who asks on a day without frost.

Despite repetition the OM/S will not apologise for again recommending that North African export Iris Stylosa. Here they flower freely on non-frosty days, and will survive indoors for several days in water.

Next time we meet Spring will be here, and gardens will have woken up.

For anyone thinking about adding Snowdrops to their gardens with autumn planted bulbs. I would highly recommend the Anglia Bulb Co based just up the road at Boxted. On seeing my first purchase of Snowdrop bulbs from them I thought there must be a mistake; the bulbs were enormous, more akin to a narcissus bulb. They have been very successful too. Many of the small bulbs from garden centres do not come to anything. ### THE BUTTON FAMILY: TANNERS OF NAYLAND

The following poem was written in 1825 about the wedding in Ipswich of Thomas Button whose family were Tanners in Nayland in the 18th and 19th centuries. Thomas was the son of Nathaniel Boosey Button and Hannah Stammers. The tannery was on the site of what is now Numbers 1-7 Stoke Road and the Button family lived in the adjoining house. The tannery was followed by a maltings and then a garage before the four cottages were built in the 1990s. The Button family had been united through marriage in 1793 with the Stammers family who owned the Nayland mill and in the 1830s Thomas Button, his brother, William Stammers Button, and their families all emigrated to Tasmania where their descendants still live. More about these enterprising families will be told at a later date.

Ding dong sound the bells from Nayland's old spire And to find out the reason I sought to enquire. Old Thearcroft replied "tho' a long time he's tarried Master Thomas the Tanner at last has got married, And we are expecting both him and his bride, For as soon as all's over, from Ipswich they'll ride."

Parson Edgar has done and has spliced them together And off they all start, for 'tis very fine weather - Mr Clarke and Mamma, sisters, uncles and friends; The day thus begun, we'll see how it ends.

As they passed thro' Stoke Street, Wood was stuffing a collar But he put down his work when he heard the folks holler And stood at his door to wish joy to the pair, And he made them a bow with a very good air.

The Temple they've passed and the last corner turned By those on the Steeple they're quickly discerned, And now the old bells seem as if really they're mad, Such a jingling they made and the folks all seem'd glad.

The Meeting House now opens on to their view, And Reverend stands ready to give them their due. What he said was all lost in the midst of the sound But I'm sure that he made them a bow to the ground.

When the corner they tuned going up to the Mill I thought the post-chaise the fair couple would spill. The mill boys and bark peelers set such a squalling, The horses were frightened and near unto falling!

But soon all were safe landed at Aunt Button's door, From gigs and post chaises at least half a score. Dear Aunty appears (with her hands white with flour) To welcome the bride and open the door.

How her face brightened upon seeing her niece, As she viewed her in white with a satin pelisse. An emblem of innocence sweet to the eyes -And for my friend Tommy an acceptable prize.

The dinner and tea and so forth are all done.

Night comes on at length with a time for all fun

And now they are gone I'll wish them Good-night

'Till Mrs Button the Second appears at daylight.

May providence bless them and lengthen their lives

And they become patterns for all husbands and wives.

Oh, I wish I'd been there to have seen all the fun! With teasing the bride I'd never had done; But as I was not, send a thought after me Who remembers you thus across the wide sea.

Notes: Old Thearcroft was the Parish Clerk; Wood, a saddler in Stoke-by-Nayland was "stuffing a collar"; The Temple in Stoke Road, the former fishing lodge at Tendring Hall; Bark peeling was a part of the tanning process; Meeting House, the former Congregational Church in Stoke Road, demolished in 1864 and replaced by the present building.

### WEATHER SUMMARY: November & December 2022 by David Lowe

**November** was wet and warm, compared to the average, with record rainfall for the past 15 years for November of 117.6 mm (65.81 mm average and next highest 107.4 mm in 2009). Mean temperature was 9.6 (7.97) just behind 10°C in 2010 and 9.9°C in 2011.

The weather was dominated by a succession of depressions and their associated fronts moving across the country from the Atlantic, dropping generally moderate amounts of rain on each occasion. It was the frequency of their passage that was the issue. So flooding issues were modest.

Highest temperature for the month was  $16.1^{\circ}\text{C}$  on the 1st (16.2) and lowest  $1^{\circ}\text{C}$  (-1.91). The lowest max was 7.5  $^{\circ}\text{C}$  (5.35). There were no days with a max of less than  $5^{\circ}\text{C}$  (1.0) 5 with a max of less than  $10^{\circ}\text{C}$  (11.07) and 27 less than  $15^{\circ}\text{C}$  (27.47).

There was 1 grass frost – with no ground or air frosts. Bright sun hours were 72.4 (82.05) solar energy was 2015 Ly (2189) and evapotranspiration 16.8 mm (17.59).

Monthly rainfall, as already stated, was 117.6 mm (65.81). There were 5 days on which over 10 mm fell (1.2) a record but none over 20 mm. Highest rainfall rate was 72.4 mm/hr (47.54).

Average windspeed was 4.3 mph (3.79) with highest daily average of 8.9 mph (10.28). Highest gust was 42 mph (32.47).

**December** was noteworthy for the cold spell between the 7th and 18th, the high level of sunshine hours and low rainfall.

The cold spell was the coldest/longest since 2010, with 9 days

with a mean of less than 0°C and three nights with temperatures in the -6°C to -7°C range. Unusually, there was only a smattering of snow, but ice thicknesses built up to 100 mm or so. This was the first year since 2010 when a week's ice skating was enjoyed in the East Anglian Fens, mostly in bright sunshine.

However, temperatures were not as low as in 2010 (-12°C minimum) and while December 2010 was not exclusively cold, tropical air did not reach the country at any point. This December, tropical air moved in on the 19th and brought about a remarkably rapid rise in temperature from the 17th to the 19th, when the mean temperature rose from -0.8°C to + 11.5°C, with a max of 13.2°C!


The mean temperature for this December was  $4.4^{\circ}C$  – while that of 2010 was  $0.7^{\circ}C$ . Both December 2008 and 2009 had lower means than this year. The December mean average is  $5.5^{\circ}C$ . 11 days had a maximum of less than  $5^{\circ}C$  (6.13) and 23 less than  $10^{\circ}C$  (21.2).

Bright sun hours were 58.7 (48.05) third highest over the last 15 years (which 2010 was not amongst) and solar energy 1610 Ly (1385.33) second highest for the 15 year period. Evapotranspiration was 11.9 mm (12.99).

Monthly rainfall was 40.2 mm(61.02) leaving a record deficit for the year of transpiration over rainfall of 192.6 mm (77.3). Highest rainfall rate was 10.8 mm/hr (12.4). Only one day had over 10 mm of rain (1.13).

Average wind speed was 4.6 mph (4,17) and highest gust was 37 mph.

#### 2022 RAINFALL & EVAPOTRANSPIRATION







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

#### Pastoral letter for January 2023

A year now has gone since I arrived as your new vicar. Once upon a time, new vicars used to spend a whole year just observing and following the flow of what pre-existed their arrival. I'm afraid that due to a mix of urgent needs and my character, the tradition was very quickly disregarded and I have started making some changes.

The most obvious consequence for the regular church-goers was the change of the Sunday service rota and the addition of week days services. Nothing revolutionary, just making sure services were at the right time, that no parish was neglected, that all the traditions could be available across the Benefice and every one had a chance to see the vicar at least once a month. Having week days services makes us a praying community that doesn't think that faith is just on Sunday morning.

The most spectacular for the wider community has been the blossoming of our Community Pantry & Hardship Fund. Through the combined dedication of some church-goers and members of the wider community, what was initially one community pantry and a small amount to provide emergency help, has become four pantries across the five parishes and more substantial amount to support children of our two schools, to help struggling families and lonely people, as well as to offer or to sponsor warm spaces during the cold months.

There are many other things on our plate, like the ongoing reshaping of the website (a new one will come at the beginning of the year). The reference I take to shape all our actions is always what is called the Nazareth Manifesto. During His first public appearance, Jesus read a passage of Isiah at the synagog to tell what was His plan: feed the poor, heal the sick, give sight to the blind, liberate the captive and proclaim the good news. There are many ways of fulfilling this list literally or symbolically, I will always focus on that.

My reflection on what we have achieved so far and on what

I have observed of our needs is the following: our church buildings are consecrated not only for Sunday worship use but also for the benefit of all. This means our churches need to be more comfortable and welcoming, become proper community hubs and events venues and not freezing spaces. This is why the pews at the bottom of St James' Nayland have been removed to offer more space, St Mary's Stoke-by-Nayland had its children's corner refreshed and one was created in St Mary's Polstead, a new disabled access was built in St Mary -the-Virgin's Wis(sing)ton and a reshaping of St Matthew's in Leavenheath is in project. But that's not enough. It is terribly frustrating to realise that we cannot offer the churches as warm spaces during the cold months and that we need to hire venues to meet this need.

This is why I have started reflecting with my Ministry Team and the five PCCs of the Benefice on how we can produce energy and provide proper heating in the buildings. A few years ago, a first attempt to install solar panels on St James' roof was rebuked for conservatory reasons. But times have changed and authorities are more keen on allowing such projects. There are so many things that are possible now. Not only solar panels have improved their efficiency but also solar tiles exists and wall batteries to store the energy. Silent wind turbines have been invented as well as tree shaped ones or vibrating pillars. You can put panels on a roof or on land. There are now a great variety of heating systems with low consumption of energy.

For that long term project, I will need volunteers of any kind of expertise/experience of project managing, environmental issues, energy, communication, fund raising etc... I know I should be wishing you a happy new year, but instead I wish that we will bring to all a happy new year! All my blessings for 2023.

### COMMUNITY PANTRY & HARDSHIP FUND

It is a pleasure to start 2023 with some good news about the Community Pantries in the villages of Nayland, Stoke, Polstead and Leavenheath! Christmas saw many acts of generosity with specific donations of seasonal food, while other people gave money for the purpose, enabling us to stock up on 'extras' to help with the cost of Christmas. Someone who won a hamper in a raffle immediately gave the contents to the Nayland pantry, so all in all, it was heartening that there was so much support.

The new year has brought us an entirely unforeseen windfall, thanks to the untiring efforts of someone in the community who is always looking for ways to support the work of the Community Pantry/Hardship Fund (CP/HF). This large consignment of mostly tinned foods will certainly help in the difficult few months ahead.

Dogs are not forgotten either! A local dog-lover, horrified at the idea of dogs having to be given up because of the cost of feeding them or of owners going hungry in order to provide for their animals, has donated a dedicated sum for dog food: we are currently looking into getting the best possible value for this thoughtful donation.

All that is positive news, and heaven knows we can do with some! There is, however, no sign of an imminent easing of the cost of living crisis, and though just at the moment the four pantries have had an unexpected boost, funds are still needed to maintain them throughout the year, not just for food, but also to provide the cleaning and personal products which are such an additional drain on household budgets. On top of this, there are increasing demands on the Hardship Fund which is administered in confidence by Rev Stéphane Javelle and Rev Valri Armstrong (telephone numbers 01206 263589 and 01206 272812 respectively). Help is being targeted at families in particular need via the two primary schools from this fund, and it would be good to extend this to as many as possible.

Sadly, everywhere we look, be it on television or in newspapers, we are asked to support people in need or myriad other good causes. Faced with this, it is easy to think that donating £5 or

so to the CP/HF each month would make little difference, but it would. It could buy 5 bottles of washing-up liquid, or 5 kitchen cleaning sprays, or 5 deodorants, or 5 jars of peanut butter.... so if ten or more people were to do the same each month, it would add up over a year to a significant sum.

Would you give it some thought? If you don't already support the CP/HF fund a standing order can be set up using the following details: A/c name — Community Pantry/Hardship Fund; Sort code 30-99-50 (Lloyds Bank); A/c number -24195560. Of course, bringing items to the pantries themselves is an option, but please only tins and packets, and bear in mind that fuel prices mean that microwaveable foodstuffs are preferable to things that need long cooking.

So thank you to everyone who has enabled this small benefice to open three new pantries in the past year and to keep all four open 24/7 - something of which we can be proud. With very best wishes for 2023 from the CP/HF team.

#### VILLAGE PLAYERS: 'THE OZ FACTOR'

The Village Players' latest production was a return to an old theme – but with a difference. Holding its first pantomime for four years, instead of opting for the traditional Snow White, Cinderella, Alladin, Pied Piper, Dick Whittington or Jack and the Beanstalk, the Players decided to do all SIX – and more besides!

Brilliantly scripted by the Players' own Andrew Walker *The Oz Factor* was a non-stop gag-fest appealing to young and old and selling out on three of the four performances (with only a handful of seats left for the other show).

At the top of the bill was Charlie Erith, narrating the whole piece from his comfy chair, wearing a smoking jacket. He worked wonderfully with young Dorothy (Alice Gurden) who, in a plot twist, turned out to be his daughter! Somehow Andrew managed to weave in a Star Wars narrative which was a recurring theme throughout the show.

John McCarroll as a middle-aged Jack was sublime and formed a perfect partnership with his mum (Jim Bond – always comfortable in a dress). Heading up the "villains" was Eville Queen (Emma Wallis) who teamed up well with Mark Russell as Mirror Mirror (the moaning northern, well, mirror). Lining up in their evil ranks were Nick Moriarty as the wicked Jafar, Adam Walker as the word-perfect rapping King Rat (who then sang a lively duet of "Sultans of Swing" with Jafar), brother Matthew Walker as the lothario Prince Charming (with some very close to the knuckle comments about...another prince) who sang "Take on Me" perfectly, the very tall Henry Tasker as Cap'n Hook (yaaargh!) and Lou Fortunato (the catty social media influencer Goldilocks) whose amazing voice rounded off the main performance with a touch of R-E-S-P-E-C-T.

As for the "Heroes" Alladin (Arthur Allen) showed great comedic timing as he had a stand-up row with Jafar who thought he'd gone too far; whilst Lucas Williamson as Puss in Boots "meowed" his lines faultlessly before belting out "Don't Stop meow." Alex Walder as Dick Whittington superbly parodied a certain recent politician before giving a sweet rendition of "Politics of Dancing". Another memorable performance was the bearded "Furry Godmother" played by Debbie Lock, who then did a duet with Hook (which was rudely interrupted by the attention-seeking Jack's mum singing "All That Jazz").

Meanwhile, the hilarious Mark West as Tinkerbell was flitting around the stage, believing that she was still teeny-tiny (before dramatically removing his wig to reveal a bald pate!). Tim Dotchin was perfectly cast as the wizard who had the temerity to steal the clothes from the Wizard of Oz (magnificently played by Wayne Buller).



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
