NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 13th September 2023

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or www.naylandandwiston.net after the next meeting)

Gerry Battye chaired the meeting.

Adam Birchweaver was welcomed as a Parish Councillor; there remains one vacancy on the Council.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Gerry Battye raised the issue of County Broadband (CB); Isabelle Reece responded that the company has not consulted with the community regarding the infrastructure installations. It appears provision is being made for all properties to be able to receive the service in the future. CB have been invited to attend a PC meeting but have not taken the opportunity to come and explain. Isabelle Reece will ask them to consider attending a PC meeting or a public event to enable residents to raise questions.

PARISH COUNCIL

Due to the need for the PC to have a 'website accessibility statement', which is not available to them on their webpages on the community website, a new Parish Council website is being created. The URL will be announced when the website is completed and there will be a link to the new website from naylandandwiston.net.

Councillors were reminded that there is a variety of training available to them – planning, finance, SALC - which is well worth attending. Some gives greater understanding of the differences between working in democracy and corporate settings.

It was explained there are unusually high reserves of CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funds due to recent development in the Parish. There is a timescale of 5 years to spend, or allocate, these funds which can be used on new projects (not maintenance). Sam Treharne said the Community Council are investigating the possibility of providing a community access defibrillator to be located in Wiston and asked if this may qualify for CIL funding. Debbie Hattrell said this may potentially fall within the criteria.

Councillors heard that Babergh have granted permission at **7 Wiston Road** [DC/23/02457] for erection of two storey side/ rear extension and garage (following removal of conservatory and garage/store); at **17 Stoke Road** [DC/23/02386] for erection of two storey side extension (following demolition of existing garage, utility space and part playroom); widening of existing access including removal of part of boundary wall (re-submission of DC/23/00568) and listed building consent at **82 Bear Street** [DC/23/02387] for repair of lime render on the west gable wall of the property and replacement of concrete render on the south elevation with lime render.

Works to trees were approved at **Bridge House 27 Court Street** [DC/23/03006] to fell 3 stems from a multi-stemmed Alder (T1) leaving the fourth stem; retrieve and remove fallen Alder limbs in pond by way of winch, digger and boat; cut back branches of a Poplar (T2); re-pollard a group of Willow Stools (G1) back to previous points; fell an Elder (T3); raise canopy of a Dawn Redwood (T4) and prune back overhanging branches; reduce height of a Yew Bush (T5) by 1.5m and bring sides inside the brick pillar creating neta line; either prune back branches overhanging road of a Lime (T6) or re-pollard back to previous points following an inspection.

Discharge of conditions were approved at **5 Church Mews High Street** [*DC*/23/03010] for application for DC/23/00009 - condition 3 flue specification and at **White Hart 11 High Street** [*DC*/23/03135] for application DC/21/03616 - condition 8 plasterboard and modern internal linings specification.

Permission had been refused at Land Adjacent Nayland Primary School, Bear Street [DC/22/05339] for erection of a single-storey detached dwelling with carport and garage. Reasons included uncharacteristic development, loss of open space, heritage harm; and at 82 Bear Street [DC/23/02718] for erection of a detached single storey garden room to the south of the property.

Between meetings councillors submitted comments relating to **16 Bear Street** [DC/23/03841] for erection of cart lodge (following removal of a summer house) - councillors have no

objections providing the Heritage Officer approves the design and materials. This is an important setting in the conservation area and it is important that a cart lodge is appropriate to the host dwelling and surroundings; at the same address 16 Bear Street [DC/23/03852/3] for erection of part two-storey/part single-storey extension (following demolition of part of house including rear outbuildings). Councillors have noted the importance of these works to the structure of the main house. They feel it is essential for a representative from the Heritage Team to visit the property and consider the materials in relation to its setting and ensure that as much of the current materials are re-used as possible; and at 82 Bear Street [DC/23/03762/3] listed building consent for erection of a detached single storey garden room to the south of the property - councillors do not have any objections but point out the garden room would be visible from the public footpath as that is incorrectly stated in the application.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at **The Coach House 86 Bear Street** [DC/23/04127] for erection of first floor rear extension, extended raised patio, insertion of new French doors and Juliet balcony; or at **Timbers 22 Court Street** [DC/23/04030] for works to remove 3 lowest lateral limbs growing on the garage roof to allow 1m clearance to a Yew (T1) and fell dead stem of Hawthorn (T2).

Councillors have requested an extension from Babergh to allow the Tree Warden and councillors to comment regarding **Stour House 23 Court Street** [DC/23/04008] for works to trees subject to TPO WS328/T8 and WS328/T10 to apply bio char and microzo fungi to a Cherry (T1); fell a Cherry (T2); remove deadwood of an ornamental Cherry tree (T3) and remove water shoots on main stem and spray woodwork mixture onto areas showing evidence of live wood worm; fell a Cherry Plum (T4); raise canopy of an Oak (T5) to a height of 1.5 meters above ground level; fell an Ash (T6); prune back 500mm of a Lime (T7) maintaining natural shape.

Gerry Battye urged councillors to familiarise themselves with an application that has just been submitted at **Hill Farm Business Centre**, **Harpers Hill** [DC/23/04190] for construction of a storage unit building comprising 6 separate storage spaces. Councillors have requested an extension from Babergh to enable discussion and comment.

HIGHWAYS

The PC are tenants of the land on Harpers Estate where the old bus shelter sits. There was damage to a tree/hedge line at the rear of the site and tree work was undertaken by Babergh but the cut debris has been left on site despite requests for removal. Their grass cutting contractors were seen cutting round the debris! Isabelle Reece agreed to chase this up with Babergh.

The bollard light on the A134 bypass has not been fixed; James Finch will be asked to chase this.

The mystery of the 'alternative portage available' signage was revealed by Sally Dalton; Essex CC had placed it on Caley Green despite the wording being inappropriate (it is supposed to warn of closure of Navigation in the river Stour at Boxted Bridge). It was moved and placed face downwards with other historic signage on the by-pass island for collection. However, Highways teams re-erected it in the middle of the by-pass despite it having no relevance. Dawn Harris said there is other historic signage awaiting collection at Nags Corner. Debbie Hattrell will request collection of the signage.

Dawn Harris has produced a survey map showing areas where road sweeping/weeding/scraping services are required which Debbie Hattrell will prepare for further consideration.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Councillors had been copied in to correspondence regarding an incident where a powered craft had been used on the river – powered craft are not permitted downstream of Henny. The Caley Green working party will consider this for future signage. It was agreed to seek advice from the Tree Warden and our

maintenance contractors regarding maintaining access along Candy Lane.

There has been an incident of two vans parking on Caley Green, near the tunnel. Gerry Battye said there had been no damage to the grass. He had spoken to neighbours who say this is not a regular occurrence. Extra no parking signs for that end of the Green were suggested.

The driveway at Fairfield is in poor condition (it is owned by the Diocese; maintenance is shared with them, the PC and Nayland House); the Diocese appointed surveyor agrees and will obtain quotes for work the needed.

The PC agreed in June for their contractors to cut the paths on Nayland Meadow twice yearly. Nayland Land Co who manage Nayland Meadow have asked if the number of cuts could be increased. Dawn Harris and Owen Brown will meet on site with the Land Co and report back to the PC.

Dawn Harris gave an update on the lasting memorial project on Caley Green. This would include a bench to commemorate Queen Elizabeth II which would sit on a concrete base and be positioned facing the river near the bench facing the A134. Close by there would be a tree to celebrate King Charles III with a railing around. Dawn confirmed this would not impede the Air Ambulance helicopter landing on the Green. The PC agreed this recommendation. The Community Council have been asked for a grant towards this.

During consultation with neighbours, the PC were asked for an additional bench near the river for the elderly and those at Nayland House to enjoy and for the path to be extended to it. This is something that could be looked into in the future.

VILLAGE HALL

Councillors heard that work continues on obtaining grant funding for the roof replacement project. The next event on 16th September, 'Nayland Family Festivities', will now only run from 1pm to 5pm and will be free entry.

BURIAL GROUND

The Jane Walker Memorial project to facilitate the creation of a fitting memorial to be erected and to renew or replace the battered and missing iron crosses that mark the graves of patients that resided at the hospital during the 1970s and 80s is progressing following a successful JustGiving appeal. The next stage will be a site meeting with the campaign team, councillors and contractors to primarily discuss and agree on the location and appearance of the memorial but also future practicalities so the details can be considered by the full Council.

IN BRIEF:

Dawn Harris reported the only streetlight in Wiston Road is not working.

The winners of the Best Kept Allotment competition were Tom Gardiner, Jo Reed and Jenny Hoskins (equal second) and Anna Easdown; prizes had been awarded at the Nayland Flower Show.

Sally Bartrum, the Footpath Warden, has reported to SCC that the bridge on the footpath beyond the cemetery has collapsed.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 4th September 2023 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 263169 www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: We were pleased to welcome Heike Ellwood to the Exec. As always we welcome new members to join the team. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee that provides positive events and facilities for the community. Contact Rachel, details above, if you would like to know more.

Fundraising Activities/Events: We have a good deal of activities being planned currently but as always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall is managed by the CC.

Rushbanks have confirmed that they have a defibrillator but it is not linked to the local ambulance service and is a little inaccessible for public access. Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) have confirmed there is now a defibrillator which can operate without a power supply which would open up more options; the cost would be in the region £2,300. Laura Erith will explore if this would be eligible for a CIL grant from Babergh. A location by the Parish Council noticeboard was once again mooted.

Rachel and Tracy Le Grys will progress organising another first aid course in due course, which two of the first responders are now qualified to deliver.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel Hitchcock has spoken to the SCC Properties Officer (he is all things Caley Green) who confirmed that there would be no problem with the water level gauge being installed that side of the river - we will obviously need to confirm exact positioning. A spot near the end of the long reed bed would make sense. The cost totalling £1,380 inc. VAT was agreed in May 2021.

The surveyor has confirmed moving it to the Caley Green riverbank would not require another datum mark for the above sea level gauge. An appropriate installer will be sought.

Nayland 10k Fun Run: <u>nayland10k.co.uk</u> Sunday 9th July. This was the sixth 10k, 5k, 1k Nayland Fun Run. There were over 400 runners taking part. Thanks to all the volunteers who gave up their Sunday morning to help. It was necessary at the eleventh hour to change the venue from Littlegarth to the village hall; well done to Luke for managing to get round this problem. The event donated £425 for the CC.

Online Ticketing Facility: NaylandEvents.org – This continues to be very useful for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility to sell tickets for their events contact Justin Dowding at jpdowding@gmail.com.

Queen Elizabeth II and King Charles III commemorative feature: This is a Parish Council project, however, they sought our suggestions for a feature to commemorate the late Queen and the coronation of the new King. Parish Councillor, Dawn Harris, who has been progressing this hopes the tree will be a Copper Beech and has confirmed that positioning will not prevent the Green being used if the Air Ambulance needs to land there.

Village Hall Roof Project: Grant funding & fundraising events. Iain Wright said they are very grateful to have had received a donation of £1,000 from HortSoc. They will be visited this week by a representative from the National Lottery regarding their grant application. The Vintage Afternoon Tea event made £950 profit.

On 16th September a 'Nayland Family Festival' incorporating Woodland Corner's 'Inflatable Day' will be held. Since the meeting it's been announced this will now run from 1pm-5pm and entry will be free.

Nayland Post Office: The Sorting Office closed at the end of August. The Post Office is still open. We have no details on when the current postmistress will be retiring and when the proprietors of Mill Street Store & Deli may be taking over the premises in which they were proposing to maintain a Post Office counter service.

Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation of village groups and events are welcome. An item headed **Volunteer Vacancies** has been added to the Community Times, listing the various volunteers needed by different groups; please let Lorraine know if you have vacancies to be included along with an idea of the level of commitment needed.

Please note, it would be helpful if everyone, when they see promotions for Nayland events on Facebook, could make a comment (however brief) and not just click on 'like'.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: The next Gardening session will be on Saturday 28th October from 9am - please support this if you can; it is a pleasant social activity and refreshments are provided

St James' Flower Festival: 9th & 10th September. Organised by Kathy Hunt. Rachel Hitchcock and Claire Buller agreed to include a CC floral display. There will be a display of clergy vestments and refreshments.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Matt Cable gave his report to 4th Sept. **Breakdown of profits:** Community Times £515.74, Quiz £564.44, deposit interest £199.95. **Grants paid:** Nayland Bear £100, First Responders £2,165.60. **Expenses:** Coronation Party £519.81, Bonfire night pre-payment £500, Hall hire charges £32. **Current Position:** The accounts show reserves of £23,811.04 represented by Deposit a/c £11,034.01, Current a/c £12,115.35, Cash in Hand £661.68. We hold £112.50 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, VH coffee machine £280 and Lizzie's Fund £153. **Therefore, unencumbered assets are £13,265.54.**

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Parish Council: would like a contribution of £1,538 towards installation of a bench, commemorative tree and railing for the late Queen and King Charles. The total cost will be £4,158. As several members of the Exec were absent it was agreed to make a decision on this between meetings.

Primary School: A grant application is pending to support their participation in Young Voices this year and towards formation of a new 'Young Voices' Choir and Music group which will be aimed at the youngest children in the school.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said the calendar is on sale at the Post Office, Studio B Hair Salon, Forget Me Not and online. Wendy Sparrow is as usual dealing with sales from some local shops and venues. Gladwins Farm shop has a few. They will be available at the Church Coffee Mornings, Choir rehearsals, Table Tennis sessions and Wiston Church. Thanks to all who are helping. Suggestions for maximising sales would be much appreciated. If you attend/ organise any events, venues where calendars could be sold please let Lorraine know.

Forthcoming Activities:

Bonfire & Fireworks: *Sunday 5th November.* Rachel Hitchcock, Claire Buller & Jo Metson leading.

Sale of tickets: at a WC Cake Sale to be held on 7th October in the High Street and with Nayland Bear on Halloween; Tuesday 31st. They will be available via naylandevents.org, village shops. Cut off for tickets sales needs to be 1400.

Promotion: Details will remain the same but "Guy & Bonfire after Fireworks" will be added and 'CHILDREN'S TREATS' after ICE CREAM as Woodland Corner are having a stall. The introduction of selling beer was popular and will be organised again. If anyone is able to help on the gate from 6pm-7pm and selling drinks, etc please see contact details on page 9.

Christmas Fayre: *Saturday 2nd December, 10am-12.30.* Rachel Hitchcock & Vicki Sargent are leading. Six potential stallholders have come forward. A few more stallholders would be welcome.

WATER LEVELS

On the whole water levels seem to have maintained their seasonal norms. The wet summer will have helped maintain levels. However, on 13th September the weir did stop flowing; the reason is not known.

REED GROWTH AT THE WEIR

During this summer the reeds growing at the head of the weir were virtually all the way across as well as other vegetation growing down the sides of the structure, as seen in the top photo taken on 3rd September. In the photo taken on 13th September some of the vegetation had been pulled into the weir and there were piles of pulled reeds at the foot of the weir. Neighbours do not know who may be responsible for this.

WEED CLEARANCE

It was reported last issue that EA contractors, Aqua Solutions in their Truxors were expected to clear weeds down the centre of the river from the A134 to the Horseshoe Weir. This was carried out on 2nd August when two Truxors arrived to do the job. Unfortunately there was no reduction to the reeds. Truxors can be fitted with different tools, these just has forks for scooping out weed.

A few riverside residents have, or are looking at, getting contractors to reduce the reeds alongside their own banks.

POWERED RIVER CRAFT

There have been no more reports of powered craft being seen on the river; powered craft are not permitted downstream of Henny Street.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

The Nayland river swans with their eight cygnets have done well this year, with no territory wars reported.

This photo from Nicola Thorogood shows the Nayland swans with their 8 cygnets on an excursion to Wiston on 23rd August. Laura Erith and Jackie Clarke also spotted them out and about in Wiston. By early September there were only 7 cygnets. On occasions in between only 6 were seen in the family group. They have been stretching their wings and becoming more dependant; it's not known if one has safely left the family or something else has occurred.

We don't hear much about the Wiston swans, unless they travel down to Nayland; if anyone would like to reveal news about them please get in touch.

RIVER STOUR NAVIGATION

A few people have been bewildered at the appearance of signs appearing at Caley Green and on the central reservation of the by-pass saying "Alternative Portage Available". This seems to have no meaning or relevance. See photo on page 20

It transpires that due to the closure of Boxted Bridge and the Navigation there that Essex CC Highways needed to warn river users of the closure of Navigation ahead. Still puzzled?.... Essex Highways should have used a sign like they did at the Anchor Inn which says "Boxted Bridge Closed No Navigation". As they didn't have another such sign they placed an irrelevant sign at Caley Green. Upon inquiry it was agreed the sign should be removed; it was placed face down with other historic old signage on the by-pass for collection. Instead of collecting the signs a Highways vehicle stopped and put the sign back up in the central reservation of the by-pass. It was laid back down but, you guessed it, Highways put it back up again! The PC are now requesting its removal along with other old signage.

protect it from future erosion and that they will fund the work and manage the project. There is no further update on this.

RIVERBANK LITTER BY SLUICE GATES

SCC are the landowners of the triangle of land between the A134 and the fork in the river adjacent the sluice gates. They were alerted to a considerable amount of litter and flytipping and a contractor came to clear the site in October 2022. However, they did not complete the task adequately. This is another matter now in the hands of the Properties Officer who will look once again at getting the matter rectified.

CALEY GREEN

The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and the wildfowl. It is a much loved open space and lovely to see it being used and enjoyed.

During summer and the heatwaves the Green has been well used by residents and visitors. There was a brief issue with collection of waste and dog bins by Babergh. John Ward, Deputy Leader at Babegh, explained there had been a staffing issue which has been resolved.

THE CULVERT

Following postponement of work by a contractor to clear the ditch and repair of the fence the Properties Officer says that the work is ordered and a contractor in place but they are awaiting approval from the Environment Agency.

This work is necessary to prevent flooding of the ditch due to blockage by debris and the overgrown island of reeds at its mouth into the River.

LASTING MEMORIAL ON THE GREEN

The Parish Council have agreed to the recommendation to install a bench to commemorate Queen Elizabeth II which would sit on a concrete base and be positioned facing the river near the bench facing the A134. Close by there would be a tree to celebrate King Charles III with a railing around. It would not impede the Air Ambulance helicopter landing on the Green. Dawn Harris has suggested a copper beech tree. The Community Council are being asked for a grant towards the cost.

During consultation with neighbours, the PC were asked to consider an additional bench near the river for the elderly and those at Nayland House to enjoy and for the path to be extended to it for easy access for those less mobile.

RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

Suffolk County Council (SCC) have indicated that wooden revetment will be installed around the bay at Caley Green to

MILL STREET BRIDGE

Thanks to James Carver for recording recent works in Mill Street when the road was closed and the bridge was inspected for structural weakness. A dam was created in Mill Lade to empty the water under the bridge and divert it back into Mill Stream in Fen Street to keep the fish alive. Various pumps and pipes were used; one route utilised the flood prevention pipework installed last year.

Using the digital measurements obtained from under the bridge a series of structures will be made elsewhere, and placed under the bridge to support it. They come back next year to fit the new prefabricated foundations under the bridge.

Two objects were found in the mud during the works.



As the CT goes to print an 'Evening with the Beatles' is scheduled for Friday 29th September.



Robert Oppenheimer (Cillian Murphy), the physicist who had a large hand in the development of the atomic bomb, thus helping end World War 2. His work comes to fruition in 1945 when President Truman ordered Hiroshima and Nagasaki to be bombed, forcing Japan to surrender and forever changing the course of history.
- Friday 1st December: 'Local Hero' (1983). Felix Happer (Burt Lancaster) the eccentric owner of the Houston conglomerate Knox Industries sends ace dealmaker 'Mac' MacIntyre (Peter Riegert) to a remote sleepy Scottish village to secure the property rights for an oil refinery they want to build. As time passes, Mac becomes more and more conflicted as he presses to close the deal that will end the quaint little village way of life. Happer decides to negotiate personally with an elderly old beach-comber who lives in a driftwood shack and owns part of the beach and in the process, discovers a kindred spirit.



Many thanks to Sally and John Dalton (again) for clearing the steps to the Meadow from the A134. As you would've seen the wildflower meadow has been cut. It is very important to do this to keep the grass at bay. The removal is also necessary so as to reduce nutrients in the soil which will help the wildflowers. Sheep will soon be gone as another season begins to end.

HOW BATTY IS NAYLAND? BAT BOXES

There are thought to be at least 17 different breeding species of bat in the UK. Sadly their populations have declined severely in the last hundred years. And this notwithstanding the fact that bats and their roosts are protected by law. Few of us are probably surprised at the decline but we feel it is time to do our bit to reverse that position at the meadow.

A top quality, durable bat box costs just under £50 (there are cheaper models). The Land Company is intending to put up 10 bat boxes in, on and around the meadow and to raise £500 now for this purpose. Bats utilise crevices and cavities in trees for routine roosting during the day and may also use them (in addition to buildings) as maternity roosts where the females give birth. Our landholding contains few mature trees and so there are currently few suitable roosting sites. This deficiency can be addressed by providing bespoke bat boxes which we will attach to trees around the site.

The species most likely to be encountered in Nayland include the common pipistrelle, soprano pipistrelle, Daubenton's bat and brown long-eared bat.

Some Press Cuttings from the 1930s

The Evening News 24 December 1938.

SHE'S 79 TODAY – AND A VERY BUSY DOCTOR. Dr Jane Walker, pioneer warrior in the modern battle against tuberculosis, enters her eightieth year today. At the age of 79 she is believed to be oldest practising woman doctor in the country. But seeing her today, noting her rosy cheeks, her vigorous voice, her brisk movements and manner you could not believe that she is the oldest anything.

For nearly 60 years she has been a doctor and divides her busy life between her Harley Street consulting room and her famous sanatorium at Nayland, six miles north of Colchester.

Her Harley Street waiting room gives you an idea of her wide interests in life for the walls are covered with modern pictures. "Collecting pictures is my great hobby" Dr Walker said, "Since the age of 14 I wanted to be a doctor. In those days women doctors were not supposed to be wanted and many of my family were against me. Fortunately I had the support of my father and he helped me through". The article goes on to describe her life and work in her own words.

[Jane Walker died the following year, 1939, and was buried in St Mary's Church, Wissington]

MARTHA SEXTON. The sudden passing last week of Miss Martha Ann Sexton has removed from Nayland a very popular and deeply loved woman. Miss Sexton had been in charge of the Nayland Sanatorium Laundry for over 30 years and was one of the few remaining pioneers of that great work commenced by Dr Jane Walker, She had endeared herself throughout the institution and the whole district in which she lived, always loved and cherished by all as "Our Martha".

The bellringers had recently given Dr Slade a pipe and case. To both was presented a picture of Nayland with a good view of the parish church, the artist being Miss Corry of Nayland.

Local Essex County Standard 11 December 1937

MINISTRY OF HEALTH INQUIRY at the Angel Inn, Stoke-by-Nayland, re Melford Rural District Council's application for consent to the borrowing of £8,100 for the provision of a water supply for Nayland-with-Wissington and Stoke.

Mr J O Steed, County Council Clerk, said that Nayland was developing into a dormitory for Colchester and a water supply was desirable for its growth. The main object of the scheme was the supply to Nayland, it being the larger parish, but Stoke would also benefit and the scheme could be facilitated by the fact that Stoke was on very high ground. A number of houses had been built in Nayland since 1919 and more were planned.

There was in Nayland already a public water supply provided in the distant past by a public spirited gentleman who left it as a legacy to the parish. It came from a spring on high ground and was conveyed by pipe down to the centre of the village. This could not be used as a supply to houses, the most it could be used for was for standpipes in the streets. Most private wells were shallow and were liable to pollution, the provision of pure water was urgently needed in both villages. Two Nayland parish councillors felt that sufficient attention had not been given to developing their own supply and the Secretary of the East Anglian Sanitorium said that any increase in the rates would be a serious matter for the Sanitorium as it was completely self contained and would receive no benefit from the scheme.

[Mains water eventually arrived in Nayland in 1939]



District News 2nd October 1937

PRESENTATION TO DR AND MRS SLADE ON DR SLADE'S RETIREMENT. A crowded room was a striking tribute to the esteem in which Dr and Mrs Slade are held in the village and the regret at their departure this week for their new home in Somersetshire.

The Vicar, voicing the feelings of the village, paid a glowing tribute to the professional side of Dr Slade's work. He also mentioned how Dr Slade had the gift of uniting amicably the various divisions in the civic life of the parish on all special occasions. Of Mrs Slade he made mention of her excellent work and gift in the cloth on the altar in the parish church. She was presented with a case of embroidery scissors. To Dr Slade there was given a pair of field glasses, a cheque to purchase a steel bow (he being interested in archery) and a framed certificate from the local branch of the British Legion.

THE PEST HOUSE. Those wishing to see this, one of the very few remaining relics of

public health as practised in the reign of George II, should visit the old "Pest House" at Nayland before it collapses as it is now in a very dilapidated state of repair. It was built in 1756 by the Nayland Feoffees at the cost of £64 16s 6 ½ d. The lean-to and bakehouse at the south end were added in 1756, the material being obtained by demolishing a property of the Feoffees at the church gates.

It was used as an isolation hospital chiefly for smallpox, until the comparatively recent date of 1872. It is frequently mentioned in the parish records, e.g. 1776 Paid Butcher for carrying coals to the Pest House 3d; 1775

Paid for a Breast of Mutton to the Pest House 3d; 1775 John G Smith's Grocer and draper's bill to the Pest House £1 10s 6 % d; 1812 Removing Pitcher to the Pest House 10d.

PARISH MEETING: ARP. Col. Sykes, chief air raid warden, gave an outline of the necessary steps to be taken in case of an air raid. This included the positions of the first aid posts, the number of first aid parties and stretcher bearers who would do duty for eight hours. He also mentioned the number of cars and trade vans which would be required for ambulance work. All those who had sat for the first aid examinations has passed, some obtaining nearly full marks. Gas masks had been issued although some 150 persons had not yet applied for them.

WEATHER SUMMARY: July & August 2023 by David Lowe

July was a disappointing dull and windy month, particularly compared to recent years. Sun hours and mean temperature were amongst the lowest, over the 16 year record period – and rainfall and wind, second highest. This was down to low pressure systems and their associated fronts affecting the UK through the month, without let up. However, winds were often from the SW, which generally kept temperatures above what they might have been.

Mean temperature for the month was 17.2°C (average 17.82 and lowest 15.5) with a high of 28.4°C (average 30.11 and highest 36.3). The lowest temperature was 8.4°C (8.13).

There were 7 days with less than 20°C (5.37) 3 days over 25°C (8.31) and none over 30 (0.81). Bright sun hours were 333 (342.19) amongst the lowest with solar energy at 10800 Ly (12958) the lowest over the 16 year record period. Evapotranspiration was 96.35 mm (109.37) again at the low end of the scale.

Monthly rainfall was 83.8 mm (54.06) second highest with highest daily rainfall at 19.8 mm (14.81). Highest rainfall rate was 65.4 mm (100.45) and there was only one day with over 10 mm (1.5). The high rainfall total was down to the frequency of moderate totals rather than any particular event.

Average wind strength was 4.9 mph (3.05) equal record highest, with highest gust at 34 mph (30.12) second highest. Highest daily average was 9.5 mph (6.63) and dominant direction was SSW.

As with July, **August** was a disappointingly cool, cloudy and wet month. However, it was not just wet – but very wet, with double the then normal August rainfall (122.2 mm/62.61 mm). 122.2 mm is the second highest monthly total rainfall over the 16 year record period, beaten only by June 2016 at 146.3 mm.

The bulk of the rainfall was concentrated in the first 8 days of the month, when 99 mm fell. There were 4 days with 10 mm or more – with the highlight being the 5th, when 64 mm fell. This is more than the average total August rainfall 61.13/62.61 mm in one day.

I reported this to Simon Keeling of Weatherweb.net, to which I subscribe. He prepared and issued a report on this which I circulated. The amount experienced at Nayland was exceptional compared to other Suffolk stations – he felt this was down to a localised small packet of particularly humid tropical air within the circulation of the depression passing very close to us. It is also worth noting that the wind was from the east, from which direction most of our


heaviest rain and snowfalls come (not reduced by passage over land).

The maximum rainfall rate was high (125 mm/hr) but nothing exceptional. Double that has been experienced in Nayland. However, most of our heavy rainfall rates are of very short duration - a few minutes. At the other end of the spectrum, 'normal rain' often falls at 1 mm per hr or less, for 2/3 hours. This experience averaged 12.8 mm/hr over 5 hours, with peaks of 55, 50 and 40 mm per hr, apart from the 125. So something very notable.

Mean temperature for the month was 17.1°C (17.5). Highest temperature was 25.2°C (28.39) with a minimum of 7.5°C (7.84). Lowest max was 15.2°C (17.45) equal lowest and not surprisingly, on that very wet August 5th. There were 8 days of less than 20°C max (6.19). There was 1 day over 25°C (5.44) and 0 days over 30°C (1.12).

Bright sun hours were 306.8 (305.41) surprising, and solar energy was 10100 Ly (10544). Evapotranspiration was 89 mm (89.37). For a short period after the 5th August, annual rainfall exceeded annual transpiration, which is pretty exceptional for August.

Mean wind speed was 3.9 mph (2.99) with highest gust of 25 mph (29.87) and highest daily average of 8.5 mph (6.39). The dominant wind direction was SW.

DIANA WHITING (17/12/1930-18/6/23) **AND ROLIE WHITING** (11/1/28-30/11/2018)

A tribute by their daughter Christine

Long-time residents of Nayland, my parents Diana and Rolie met at Old Time dancing. Romance blossomed and on 4th October 1958 they were married. After this Diana moved into 10 Harpers Estate, Nayland, where Rolie had already been living with his parents, and this remained their home for the rest of their lives. Rolie's mother had sadly died shortly before their wedding, but his father Adrian (known as Pop) lived with them and Diana looked after Pop for 26 years. Long-term residents of Nayland Heights may remember Pop pushing his home-made wooden barrow (set on an old pram chassis) round the estate, selling surplus vegetables he had grown in

the large garden at number 10.

After I was born Diana stopped work until I was old enough to go to Middle School. She got a job as a kitchen assistant at Nayland Primary School, where they had to cook everything from scratch; no ready-prepared meals in those days! She later became a playground supervisor at the school for several years.

Diana was a member of several village organisations in Nayland and Treasurer of some of them; Young Wives, the WI, the Village Hall Management Committee, Over 60s and Nayland Carpet Bowls Club. Diana was very helpful

in her role as Village Hall Booking Secretary; a role which she dedicated herself to for over 30 years .

In 2010 she received a Community Achievement Award from Babergh District Council in recognition of an outstanding contribution to her local community. The framed certificate was proudly displayed on the wall at home. Other former committee members have told me with a smile that Mum could have very firm ideas and express them in no uncertain terms at meetings.

However, her heart was in the right place, and someone recently said of her: "It didn't matter how big a muddle you got yourself into, Diana would always listen, and she never judged".

Diana enjoyed playing carpet bowls for Nayland; she was good at it and won several trophies.

Rolie was a keen church bellringer, and was tower captain at St James' church, Nayland for several years. He taught me to ring as a child and together we would go to practice nights in many of the surrounding villages and help out at weddings and Sunday services. I had a break from ringing for many years, but now when I introduce myself as 'Rolie Whiting's daughter' there is usually a smile of recognition and the words "Oh yes, we know Rolie".

He set up a handbell ringing team in Nayland that is still going, now under the leadership of Chris Hunt (also now tower

captain of the church bells).

Rolle also put his hobby of mending clocks and watches to good use, assisting when the church clock at St James was refurbished.

On 4th October 2018 Rolie and Diana celebrated their 60th Wedding Anniversary, with a card from the Queen later framed and given pride of place on the wall.

Sadly, Rolie was taken into hospital that evening and died soon after, at the age of 90. His ashes are buried in a quiet spot in Nayland Burial Ground.

Diana sadly passed away on 18th June this

year, after a very short illness, at the age of 92. She had remained very independent until shortly before she died, living alone and looking after herself, albeit discreetly kept an eye on by me, her sister Barbara and various neighbours. Her ashes will join Rolie's, so that, reunited after a short time apart, neither will ever leave the village they lived in for so many years and served so well.



Dear Friends,

A while ago, I wrote a letter from the church for the August edition and I remember beginning something like this. Hooray! School's out, the holidays are here! And I am sure that was true for many people. But for me, and I suspect I'm not the only one, this year I feel like saying,

Hooray! The holidays are over, the schools are back! Back to a more regular routine and an end to the showery, cool and unpredictable summer, bookended by a week or so of heatwave conditions. An end to juggling childcare and work commitments and hopefully the end is in sight for an end to the disruptions caused by strikes and disputes and finally, a downward trend for inflation. Whilst the financial situation is easing for most people, for some it is still difficult and if that is you or someone you know, please make use of the community pantries and the hardship fund. It is what they are there for.

Routine and normality help us to cope in uncertain and challenging times. The support and comfort given by family and friends, and at times strangers, lift us up and shine a ray of hope along our path. So if you have always thought of the church as a place of rules and "Thou shalt not's", where you are required to believe 10 impossible things before breakfast, perhaps it's a good time to reconsider. When all is not well in your life and you need, well.... something, the church is there for you. Whether you choose to just sit quietly by yourself, immersed in the peace and otherness of the place or in a service, letting the words of forgiveness and love, the wonder of the hymns and the sense of community wash over you; you may well be surprised. As we head into the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness, don't forget the soul needs food, just as much as the body does.

And may the peace of God, which passes all understanding, rest upon you and those you love and care for.



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

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
