NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 12th June 2024

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or https://naylandwithwissington-pc.gov.uk after the next meeting)

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece said due to forthcoming elections most matters are on hold. Repair work to the burial ground wall can proceed as it is not listed. The old cemetery and wall are included in the Local List prepared by the Conservation Society and adopted by Babergh in 2004; Lorraine Brooks will forward details. Isabelle may not be able to assist with the funding for Fairfield playground fence, however, is still looking to help towards the Harpers old bus shelter green planting. Gerry Battye asked about Babergh's grass cutting schedule for Nayland; Isabelle thought there were new contractors and would investigate the schedule.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

James Finch said Suffolk County Council (SCC) has objected to the Norwich to Tilbury pylons and called for a pause to consider alternatives. He advised that the Right of Way team are behind with the footpath cutting; the new area manager is working to resolve matters.

Dawn Harris again raised the state of the kerbside weeds and the ongoing poor state of the A134 through Nayland.

HIGHWAYS

Gerry Battye said that the Community Speedwatch Group have received training and have now started monitoring traffic in Stoke Road. It was agreed to see how things progress with speedwatch; if thought necessary at a later date the PC in conjunction with SCC could purchase Vehicle Activated Signage which could be rotated between Stoke Road and Horkesley Road.

Adam Birchweaver and Dawn Harris agreed to investigate the weeds reported in socket alley, undertake some strimming and if necessary report any other matters via the Highways reporting tool. A fallen fence alongside the alley was raised; the Clerk will write to the homeowner.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at the **Doctors Surgery 93 Bear Street** [*DC*/24/01508] for erection of single storey rear extension (for an office). At **72 - 78 Bear Street** [*DC*/24/01266] discharge of conditions in relation to DC/23/05458 for demolition of the existing conservatory, internal alterations to the existing dwelling and construction of the rear kitchen extension were partially approved.

Discussing an application at **Harpers Hill Farm, Harpers Hill** [DC/24/02305] for consent to display 2 advertisements and replace existing entrance signage with new the Council objects as the design does not seem in keeping with the National Landscape and will request, if approved, the green colour. They have concerns about inclusion of "units for rent" as permanent wording.

Councillors had no objections for applications at **Kingfishers 108 Bear Street** [*DC*/24/02135] for erection of single storey rear extension with attached brise soleil structure, alterations to rear fenestration and external engineering works to alter the raised terrace and garden steps and erection of garden shed (following removal of existing) or at **Smokey Farm Campions Hill** [*DC*/24/02437] for change of use of agricultural land and creation of fenced menage.

Owen Brown confirmed he has an email to circulate regarding the desktop search carried out by Sue Downes (Community Action Suffolk) of potential locations in Nayland for small local housing needs developments.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The lack of dog waste bins between the Mill Street and Caley Green was commented upon; it was suggested updating a map with current bin locations may be useful in raising awareness and encouraging their use.

Gerry Battye and Sally Dalton (Caley Green Sub Committee) met Tom Stiff of the Environment Agency (EA) following his request to discuss annual weed removal from the river. He met on site with Matthew Lee, Properties Offices for SCC the following day. The purpose of the meetings were to discuss the procedure for the weed removal including access to the river for truxors, what to do with the weeds removed from the river and final collection of them once they have been left for the recommended time for creatures within them to return to their habitat. Councillors did not feel the Horsewatering, Mill Lade, or Caley Green should be used for depositing any weed and hoped SCC's triangle of land could be used.

Following recent sightings of suspected sewage in the river and discoloured water at the culvert at Caley Green concern about the water quality in the Stour was raised. Dawn Harris reported that the jetty appears damaged; the Clerk will report this to the EA.

A neighbour to Pop's Piece has requested trimming of part of the boundary hedge and trees adjacent to her property; Laura Erith agreed to follow this up.

Councillors will utilise a shared comment form to give feedback and suggestions on a potential planting plan created by Dawn Harris for the Harpers Old bus Shelter site. Gerry Battye raised the question of future financial maintenance of the site; would Babergh continue maintenance or would the PC need a licence agreement to take in on.

VILLAGE HALL

Dawn Harris reported that they are organising new curtains for the hall. The Village Hall Charity will now be pursuing the replacement roof project in their own name. The Parish Council will continue to support where they can.

ALLOTMENTS

A letter had been received from a local resident/tenant of the allotments suggesting that the allotment field has been overgrazed to the detriment of wildlife. It was noted that the management of the field has been in accordance with the terms of a grant. The allotment will investigate this and invite the letter writer fo join the cub-committee.

Letters to residents regarding non-payment of rent and poorly maintained plots had resulted in one payment, others remain outstanding.

IN BRIEF

In relation to charity donations as Age UK Suffolk is no longer in operation and the PC had exceeded the charity budget with payment to the Community Pantry it was resolved to retain the £100.

Dawn Harris was pleased to report that the foliage has been cut back around the Wiston Road Street Light.

Dawn Harris has installed a polite notice by one of the Fairfield turning circle bays to designate that bay for use of burial ground visitors.

The Footpath Warden is happy to continue in her role, however, support would be welcomed. If anyone was interested, they should get in touch with the Parish Council.

PARISH COUNCIL

Gerry Battye chaired the meeting. Robin Thorogood has resigned from the Council. Laura Erith will be taking over as Chair.

PUBLIC FORUM

Mike Hunter advised that the autumn Community Litterpick would take place on 12th October.

The Nayland community speedwatch team have been active; during an hour on 16th July they registered 5 vehicles exceeding the speed limit entering the village in Stoke Road. They are required to be clearly visible, wearing hi-vis and displaying warning signage. James Finch pointed out that there are two functions for speedwatch; 1. to collect data, 2. as a deterrent for speeding.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece said grants and funding will be changing; monies may be available for not only specific new projects but also for ongoing costs. This will apply to the locality Budget.

She confirmed that Babergh's grounds contractors are all in-house. The subject of roadside weeds was raised; James Finch said to avoid using pesticides authorities have been using double strength vinegar (acetic acid) and it just isn't doing the job. It's a waste of money and use is slowly changing back.

HIGHWAYS

Gerry Battye raised concerns about the poor state of the road on the lower section of Harpers Estate, between Bear Street and Heycroft Way. It had been reported but removed from the interactive map; James Finch said he would chase this. James will also chase replacement of the bollards on the by-pass.

Some edging on the Pop's Piece lay-by are missing and have been replaced with four bricks. This could be a hazard; Gerry Battye will report this online.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at Kingfishers 108 Bear Street [DC/24/02135] for erection of single storey rear extension with attached brise soleil structure, alterations to rear fenestration and external engineering works to alter the raised terrace and garden steps and erection of garden shed (following removal of existing) or at 27 Harpers Estate [DC/24/01791] for construction of single-storey extension (following demolition of existing single-storey building and covered way), construction of new vehicular access, hardstanding and car port and retention of close boarded fence to the north boundary or at Harpers Hill Farm [DC/24/02305] for to display two advertisements and replace existing entrance signage with new.

Babergh had no objection to works to trees at 5 High Street [DC/24/02755] to reduce 1 Copper Beech (T1) to previous points and at Roziers Wissington Uplands [DC/24/01949] for discharge of conditions relating to [DC/23/05891] condition 3 (Biodiversity/Ecological Enhancement Measures).

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections for works to trees at Lower Courtwood 13A Court Street [DC/24/02989] to reduce 1 Willow (T1) by 30% - 40% or at The White House 16 Church Lane [DC/24/03085] to crown reduction of 30% (between 1-1.5 metres) of T1 Norway Maple, crown reduction of T2 Holly and severing of Ivy and climber at base of T3 Hawthorn as well as pruning of extending branches while maintaining the natural shape, and removing accessible mistletoe from crown.

Discussing an application for lawful development certificate at 14 Church Lane [DC/24/02935] for continued use of the entire property as residential dwelling, councillors recalled that after use as a school it became the home and studio of a village weaver and potter for several decades. They had no objections to the application.

Debbie Hattrell is in the process of purchasing from SALC (Suffolk Association of Local Councils) Webinar recordings of planning training sessions; arrangements will be made for councillors to view them together.

Discussing the suggestion of community led housing which

arose from the Parish Assembly it was considered this could become a demanding project and need a committee to take it forward.

Councillors had viewed a desk-top search of potential locations in Nayland for small local housing needs developments created by Sue Downes from Community Action Suffolk; they observed that without local knowledge inappropriate locations had been listed, including a nature reserve. The Clerk pointed out this was in effect just starting the conversation; much more consideration would be needed, possibly a survey on housing needs and looking for suitable and available land that abuts the built up area. This would be discussed further at the next meeting.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Despite meeting with Tom Stiff, Environment Agency, to discuss the practicalities and permissions of weed removal from the river when the contractors arrived with their Truxors changes were necessary; they were unable to access SCC's triangle to temporarily deposit the removed weed so it was necessary to use the tunnel end of Caley Green. The weed was removed from there quite promptly. Councillors are unsure whether weed clearance had included Mill Lade and the river below the weir.

Councillors were not aware of any progress relating to the reduction of the reed bed along Caley Green but recognised this work has seasonal restrictions. The PC contractors will be asked to strim the grass closer to the reed bed.

Laura Erith had visited Pop's Piece to see where boundary bushes and trees which were encroaching on a neighbouring property; she will meet with contractors to take this forward. The usual maintenance will be carried out; Gerry Battye said it is important to keep this special area well managed.

Councillors noted that Babergh are including the Harpers Estate Old Bus Shelter site in their grass cutting schedule although it is not kept as neat as PC contractors maintain PC land. Gerry Battye said a potential low maintenance planting plan had been produced and would be discussed at the next meeting.

A map showing all the dog waste bins in the village has been created; it will be included in the Community Times, on Facebook when appropriate and possibly displayed in the village. ALLOTMENTS

Following further letters being issued to allotment holders who had still not paid rents or have not kept allotments in cultivation one tenant has given up their plot; plot 11a will be allocated to someone on the waiting list but due to the poor state of the plot initial rent will be waived and help provided if needed.

Adam Birchweaver said, following concerns of a resident about over grazing on the allotment field, that Suffolk Wildlife Trust will survey the site to establish what species exist in the field.

The Clerk explained there has been a delay organising the Best Kept Allotment Competition as the usual judge, arranged through their membership of the National Allotment Association is unwell; the NAA is unable to provide anyone else. A potential alternative person qualified to do judging is being approached, but time is short as presentation of the prizes usually takes place at the Flower Show, this year on 3rd August. IN BRIEF

Councillors heard that the Community Council has agreed to give grants to cut the grass and hedge along the permissive path that runs beside Stoke Road. They are also looking at keeping access to the stretch of path from Court Knoll to the allotments maintained.

Concerns raised by contractors about broken glass in the burial ground which could be a Health and Safety hazard and a danger to wildlife will be discussed further at the next meeting.

Tricia Fuller said there had been a possible rogue trader incident on the Heights recently; someone claiming to be doing building work nearby alerted a resident to a slipped tile on their roof. The resident did not entertain their quote for fixing it. This is also a technique used in distraction burglary and other scams so residents should be mindful. PAGE 3

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: As always we welcome new members to join the team – please spread an encouraging word to anyone who may be interested in joining us. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee that provides positive events and facilities for the community. Contact Rachel on 07788 954309 or rachel_hitchcock @hotmail.com if you would like to know more.

Fundraising Activities/Events: As always future ideas and support are welcome. A Bingo evening was suggested. The CC will also celebrate its 60th Anniversary in 2026.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall is managed by the CC and regularly checked.

Regarding the possibility a public access defibrillator in Wiston. There has been no recent progress; the PC has confirmed they will be able to assist financially via CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funding but require more detail. Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) confirmed a defibrillator could operate without a power supply; the cost would be in the region £2,300; a location by the Parish Council noticeboard in Wiston has been mooted.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: Rachel confirmed the sign is ordered (with suggested amendments made) and Danny Thurlow has ordered the oak post. It will be installed on the Caley Green riverbank (agreed by SCC) out of the way of the yet to be installed revetement and craft entering the river. Installation is scheduled for next week.

Online Ticketing Facility: *NaylandEvents.org* – This has become increasingly useful for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility to sell tickets for their events contact Justin Dowding at jpdowding@gmail.com.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: Having been unable to participate at the spring gardening session some members will pop down to do some maintenance; a low level shrub is needed for the CC section.

Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation in village groups and events are welcome. An item '**Volunteer Vacancies**' has been added to the Community Times, listing the various volunteers needed by different groups; please let Lorraine know if you have vacancies to be included along with an idea of the level of commitment needed.

It would be helpful if everyone, when they see promotions for Nayland events on Facebook, could make a comment (however brief) and not just click on 'like' which is no help. All village groups would benefit from the additional publicity.

Resident Volunteer List: This is a list of residents prepared to assist other residents who at times are unable to get out for themselves and would benefit from having a prescription collected, an errand run or some shopping dropped off. Eight people have come forward to help; three residents who would benefit from occasional assistance have been put in contact with nearby volunteers..

Plaque to mark the contribution of Ken Willingale: Members had been in favour of a suggestion for a plaque to mark the contribution of *"Ken Willingale, Community Council founder member, Treasurer, Chairman and President 1966-2024".* Rachel has liaised with Trevor Smy with a view to organising a tribute in the HortSoc section of the village hall garden where there is a plaque for his wife, Olive, for her contribution to the *"Horticultural Society Secretary & President 1980-2011".* A new plaque for the existing post, made of slate, will be engraved to honour both of them. Rachel will circulate draft wording for approval. **TREASURER'S REPORT:** Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 30th June.

Expenses: Defibrillator annual maintenance £198, Hall hire charges £64.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £26,613.86 represented by Deposit a/c monies £11,454.27, Current a/c monies £14,250.27, Cash in Hand £909.32. We hold £88.51 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, Lizzie's Fund £153, VH coffee machine £280. Therefore, unencumbered assets are £16,092.35.

Outstanding items to pay: Permissive path clearing and VH hire for both First Responders and Baby & Toddler Group. They will be paid when invoices are received.

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Permissive footpath maintenance: David Slater raised the issue of two stretches of permissive path which had become very overgrown and asked whether the CC would consider contributing to their maintenance. This involves a stretch along the right hand side of Stoke Road and a second stretch is the path from Court Knoll to the Allotments. The Stoke Road path has now been mown and strimmed (£150) - and Dan Bowman has agreed to do an autumn hedge trim at a cost of £100 - two local residents have now agreed to maintain the mowing and strimming. David will ask Dan Bowman for a quote for the stretch of path from Court Knoll to the allotments. It was agreed to reimburse David for £150 and pay £100 for the autumn cut.

Nayland School and Baby and Toddler Group Grants: The School expressed thanks for their grant of £400; they are excited to get some music projects up and running. The Baby and Toddler Group were grateful for their grant of £300 to assist with the cost of hall hire for their sessions.

Village Hall, New Curtains: The Village Hall Chairman, during a recent telephone conversation, raised the possibility of a grant towards the cost of new curtains for the hall, bar and committee room. The meeting could not discuss this fully as details and costs are not known. A grant application form had been emailed to the VH Secretary.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues. Heading towards the next deadline; please let Lorraine know if you have promotion or large items to include so adequate space can be reserved. We have lost adverting totalling £262 in 2024 against gains of £450. In 2023 £425 was lost against gains of only £187. Over the two years losses were £687 with gains of £637. Overall advertising is way down on a decade ago.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said the 2025 calendar has been produced and has gone to print. They will be on sale at the Flower Show as usual and from the usual village venues. We are grateful to the twelve Nayland businesses who agreed to sponsor the calendar.

The extended calendar team - Wendy and Lorraine, Claire and Jo - will reduce the number of calendars printed to 260. The cost will be £618 (250 was £599 & 300 was £695) Assistance with sales would be very much appreciated as would ideas to optimize sales, so if you are holding an event or run a group please let us know it you could have a few on sale.

Forthcoming Activities:

There will be a Sale of Bonfire Night tickets in conjunction with Woodland Corner's Cake Sale on 5th October in High Street and with Nayland Bear on Halloween 31st October.

Bonfire & Fireworks: *Tuesday 5th November*. Rachel Hitchcock, Claire Buller & Jo Metson leading. Firework Crazy is booked.

Christmas Fayre: Saturday 30th November. <u>Note change of</u> <u>date</u> as several key people were unable to help on 7th December. Confirmation is needed whether Nayland Primary School can

provide a performance and Father Christmas can attend. **Other Christmas activities:**

Christmas Trail (Windows, Trees & Wreath Competition): Lorraine & Rachel will lead.

Village Christmas tree: up on 8th December. Claire has in hand. *Father Christmas' Tour of Nayland: 2pm on 24th December.* Claire has made arrangements.

SOCIETY REPORTS

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said the Morning Market in May was a great success. They did not manage to fill the coach for the June outing to RHS Hyde Hall but the loss was fairly small. They now look forward to the annual Flower Show on Saturday 3rd August. There is also a fun tallest village Hollyhock competition - just photograph any tall Hollyhock you spot within the parish and enter by 27th July. They have planned an outing to Polhill Garden Centre near Sevenoaks on 13th November but whether this goes ahead will depend on support; if interested please let Trevor know.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton reported the Green has been busier with the summer weather, including the school annual picnic, and groups of river users coming some distance. The swans did not produce any cygnets, neither have the Wiston swans. Weed growth is considerable, making paddling more difficult, but the EA have a planned schedule of weed clearance which includes Nayland so the Truxors will be back soon to carry out the work. This doesn't include the ever increasing reeds.

First Responders: Tracy Le Grys said they now have six fully trained responders covering the area. Arlene Howard is the newest member of the group and she lives in Assington which gives us even more coverage for the local area. On July 9th and 16th the Nayland First Responders will be in the Anchor to give CPR training and to answer any questions that people may have.

Parish Council: Laura Erith said a dog waste bin map has been produced with Lorraine's help; this will be circulated on Facebook, Community Times and various locations around the village. The 'parking for the burial ground' sign at Fairfield has been removed - it will be replaced. There are no planning issues. They persevere with the Caley Green/river issues. The signs on the A134 have been put back no weed killer applied to the islands. The next PC meeting will be on the third Wednesday of July (17th) due to a clash with another VH booking.

St James Church: Kathy Hunt reported regular services continue. We have held 4 weddings, 2 baptisms and 3 funerals. The coffee mornings continue and with the warmer weather tables are set up in the Churchyard. Thanks to those who cut the grass but more help is needed; perhaps there are some

younger villagers who like to see the Churchyard looking neat and tidy and could help with the grass cutting. Thanks also to the cleaners and flower arrangers all these jobs take time and more volunteers would be welcome. There is a vacancy for a minute secretary for the PCC meetings.

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter reported this year's Open Gardens was very successful, producing our second highest gross income of around £4,400 and 563 visitors. Our thanks to all the open gardeners and the many volunteers without whom the event could not take place. Two weeks later the Society held its 50th Anniversary celebration at the Village Hall when almost 80 members attended for a free glass of fizz and to hear the reminisces of four members of the Society, namely, Wendy Sparrow, Mary George, Andora Carver and Chris Hunt. In addition, Wendy had prepared a substantial number of display boards charting the history of the Society which was available for inspection by our visitors before the speeches. Our next speaker meetings will be taking place in October and November. Land Company (Nayland Meadow): David Slater said there are now small Green plaques, on or near the four gates to the meadow, showing the telephone number to ring if any sheep are thought to be in distress. The paths are now kept tidy with regular mowing by the Parish Council's contractor which is appreciated.

A 'Nayland Meadow' Facebook group has been created – please visit it and complete the very short survey about the paths before 15th July. The Land Co trustees wish to check that Nayland residents were happy with the path improvement carried out so far and to ascertain whether they would approve of the 'loop' being completed in a like manner. Members present at the meeting unanimously supported the proposal for continuing the path improvements; they felt it would be of great benefit to all.

RBL: Robert Dossor reported the branch held a short service at 11am on 6th June to mark the D-Day anniversary. The service was conducted by Rev Javelle and a number of members attended. Standards were lowered by the Branch Standard Bearer Cathy Hunt and by David Wiles. On 24th July they have an outing to the 100th & 95th Bomb Groups' museums. The outing is open to all. Cost will be £25 per person plus lunch.

Village Players: Justin Dowding said auditions for their pantomime *'Rapunzel'* will be held this week – 7th & 11th July. Performances will be on 4th, 6th & 7th December.

Nayland Choir: Justin Dowding reminded the meeting the concert 'Shakespeare in Song', was this Friday - 5th July.

This path was created by the Conservation Society in 2014 to provide a safe walking route to Stoke by Nayland with permission of the Trustees of the Tendring Hall Estate.


The Community Council are looking at providing maintenance of another popular permissive path between Court Knoll and the Allotments.

RIVER WATCH

WATER LEVELS

With rainfall remaining high the river levels remained normal until 18th May and again on 3rd July when they dropped very briefly and the horseshoe weir stopped flowing; presumably that was due to maintenance.

Low levels had been reported in Dedham the preceding week.

WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE

As reported in the last CT suspected sewage was spotted in the river at Nayland/Wiston in early May. Recently Dedham Parish Council commented that our rivers are graded 1-15 on cleanliness with 15 being the cleanest and the Stour at Dedham currently rated at 3 - so not at all clean. With this in mind some enquiries were made regarding the monitoring of river water.

There are fairly local groups - PACE at Manningtree and Natural Boxford - who do river water testing. These groups are helping to assemble a picture of global water quality. The EA do not engage with sewage pollution, only where bathing water status is sought. Which begs the question, how can it benefit us locally?

PACE test the Stour monthly for invertebrates and they take water samples for the University of Essex (UoE) who record the levels of bacteria such as E-Coli and Enterococcus as indicators of sewage pollution.

Setting up and registering such groups will involve platform and kit costs. Testing can be rather complex and training may be needed for certain types of testing. They can record ecological, hydrological, chemical and optical measurements.

The simplest tests involve just a chemical test to find nitrate and phosphate levels and on optical Turbidity test to see how clear the water is using a Secchi Tube.

The main concern in Nayland would probably be water quality for health as a number of residents, including children, play and swim in the river and there are many paddle-boarders and kayakers using the river and a few wild swimmers.

Someone in our Parish has recently started testing for E-Coli with the UoE and so far has experienced ever mixed results. It will be interesting to know what their results reveal going forward.

HOW POLLUTION MAY AFFECT RIVERS

Following the recent concern about our river water quality a resident wondered whether the reason there are no cygnets inNayland and Wiston and very few ducks this year could be down to pollution. The amount of floating weed (duckweed, pennywort, algae, etc) in our river has also increased and particularly bad this year and has been removed by the EA. This can be a sign of excessive nitrates, which can be caused by sewage and other contaminates.

Too much weed blocks out sunlight killing other aquatic plant species, preventing photosynthesis and reducing oxygen levels in the water and killing fish and other organisms. This would have a huge impact on the whole ecosystem, endangering swans and other waterfowl and it could affect birds, badgers, foxes and other mammals who use the river as a food or water source.

However, water crowfoot is a good indicator of the reasonable health of a river....when that disappears we really need to worry.

REED GROWTH

Reeds around the Horseshoe weir, and along the river continue to thrive at the expense of biodiversity (as they squeeze other species out).

WILDFOWL & SWANS

Both the Nayland and Wiston swans failed to produce a family this year; the first time that are no cygnets in the Parish. Sadly, ducklings have become something of a rarity; a few ducklings were seen briefly but very few seem to survive presumably as they have so many predators.

CALEY GREEN

The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and wildfowl. It is lovely to see it being enjoyed,

There has been further erosion of the bay; partly due to the very wet weather and and traffic (people, craft and Truxors) which has caused the bank to crumble into the river.

The Parish Council have recently refurbished the 4-seater bench on the brow of the hill.

The EA contracted Aqua Solutions and their Truxors to remove the weed form the centre of the river; this is done as they are obligated to maintain navigation of the river Stour. Although plans had been made to leave the discharged weeds on SCC's triangle of land on the other side of the A134, the Truxors were unable to navigate under the tunnel. With protective matting down the weed was put on Caley Green. It was left briefly to allow creatures time to make their way back to the river before it was carted of the site.

THE LONG REED BED

The long running saga regarding reduction of the enormous thick wall of reeds along Caley Green continues still! SCC is very aware of the overwhelming desire of residents to have management of them undertaken. It's hoped this autumn will see some action.

RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

While SCC have indicated they will fund and take forward installation of wooden revetment around the bay at Caley Green to protect it from future erosion, there is no further update.

There has been further erosion of the riverbank round the bay this summer, due to the wet weather, and traffic (people, craft and Truxors).

LITTER BY SLUICEGATES

Clearance of litter and flytipping on SCC's triangle of land adjacent the sluice gates was reported to them in late 2022; clearance by their contractor is still awaited.

WISTON MILL PORTAGE

The EA have advised that the river portage at Wiston mill is scheduled to be repaired and re-planked by end of July.

S2C - SUDBURY TO THE SEA

Last year the event became a single day Sudbury to Wiston due to closure of the navigation at Boxted. This year they have overcome the closure and it will be held over the weekend of 14th/15th September. So be prepared to wave to up to 300 paddlers as they go by on the Sunday morning.

Harpers Hill County Wildlife Site - is NOT a place to deposit garden waste!!

It has been dreadful to discover that - presumably a nearby resident/s - has been dumping their garden rubbish and grass cuttings on the Harpers Hill Wildlife Site. No excuse - subscribe to a brown bin or use a compost bin!

SCC are the landowners of spare land left over from when Nayland by-pass was built in the 1960s. This includes the triangle of land adjacent the sluice gates, Caley Green and an area between Harpers Hill and the old A134. SCC have been alerted to this and the vegetation dumped at the roadside has been removed by a Babergh team. A larger vehicle is needed to remove the remaining rubbish which was dumped further in the site.

For those who did not realise... the patch of grassland on the right as you go up Harpers Hill between the A134 and the lay-by, to the east of the main road is a Suffolk County Council County Wildlife Site (CWS).

CWSs play a key role in the conservation of Suffolk's biodiversity. Suffolk has over 900 County Wildlife Sites, amounting to 19,200 hectares and covering 5% of the county. They are often designated because they support characteristic or threatened species or habitats. Sites may vary in size and shape from small meadows, green lanes, dykes and hedges to much larger areas of ancient woodlands, heathland, greens, commons and marsh. The site at Harpers Hill, consists of a small area of species - diverse grassland, bordered by a ditch and dense hedge of brambles along the roadside. Despite its small size, 0.6ha, the site supports a very good range of flowering plants; a total of ninety-five species have been recorded here. This includes many common wild flowers, for example wild carrot, agrimony and common centaury. The site was noted for a sizeable population of bee orchids (approximately fifty spikes were found in 1988). Although a comprehensive butterfly survey has not been carried out, it is clear from casual observations that the site supports a good range of invertebrates, particularly butterflies and moths, grasshoppers, and ants. The grassy areas contain several anthills which are an unusual feature associated with unimproved grassland.

The appropriate management and protection of these sites for wildlife is important as wildlife habitats can deteriorate if neglected or managed in an unfavourable way. The Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) and Stour Valley Project volunteers undertake a cut and rake every autumn removing all the arisings. This ensures no extra fertility is added to the grassland which if left would increase the soil fertility and encourage the more vigorous grasses and wildflowers to grow.

OX-EYE DAISIES

Thank you to Mike Hunter who spotted this amazing valley view across a field carpeted with delightful ox-eye daisies.

From another angle it was noticed that every evening, like clockwork at shortly after 9pm, a flock of gulls would swoop down back and forth over the hillside field. Was it the ox-eye daisies, which especially in the evening became more intense white than seen here, that were attracting them?

Research suggests that their interest was likely to be ants. This phenomenon is quite commonly seen in the warmth of summer when ants produce a brood of fertile winged offspring who climb to the highest point they can find, and fly off to form

new nests. Gravel Hill is known to be popular with ants. A somewhat amusing snippet stated that ants contain formic acid, which can cause gulls to 'trip on acid' and appear drunk after eating them. Gulls get very excited over ant treats!

PARKING FOR BURIAL GROUND

As you may well have read in the Community Times in recent months following requests from visitors to the burial ground, who found nowhere to park the Parish Council erected a sign dedicating one parking space on Fairfield for use of the burial ground only.

Visitors to the cemetery will often have flowers or gardening equipment to carry for tending graves; some will be elderly, or have poor mobility so need to park nearby.

So it was astounding that no sooner had the sign been put up by the PC that it was wrongfully removed.

We have to accept that parking in the village is difficult, particularly near the School and Woodland Corner. However, those parking frequently and for long periods could plan parking arrangements that don't cause obstruction or loss of access to others.

It has been noted also that on several occasions vehicles have parked in this space, when the other spaces are empty, yet the driver is not going to the burial ground. This only serves to create an unnecessary divide in the community.





Within this period in the Nayland and Wissington area, there have been the following incidents reported to police – Two domestic non crime incidents and a domestic ABH assault in Nayland. An overnight office burglary and theft of a vehicle on Bures Road in Wissington, which at time of writing is under investigation by CID. Also damage caused to a fence in garden of property on Campions Hill.

As there has been a recent drink spiking incident in a pub in Hadleigh, I will now share some crime prevention tips in relation to that. Spiking, where someone adds drugs or alcohol to someone's drink without them knowing, is illegal. Recently we have also been aware of some people appearing to have been injected with some form of drug. Whether it's done as a prank or with the intent to steal from or assault the victim here are some ways to avoid this happening to you or your friends. Keep an eye on your drink - never leave it unattended, be extra careful when drinking with strangers, stick with friends (have a buddy system). What to do if you think you have been spiked - as soon as you suspect you might have been spiked, do not drink any more, tell someone you trust immediately as substances can take effect quickly and can make it harder to communicate, be cautious when asking strangers for help. If you need urgent help, call 999 or have the person caring for you take you to A&E, telling them you think you've been drugged.


We have now broken up for summer but ended last term at toddler group having lots of fun playing indoors and outside when the weather permitted. We have welcomed lots of

PRODUCTIONS DELIGHT AUDIENCES: YEAR 2 AND YEAR 6 SHOWCASE TALENTS



NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: May & June 2024 by David Lowe

May was very wet – and to my, and, no doubt, the surprise of others, very mild. Rainfall was at a record high for the sixteen year record period – and so was the mean temperature.

To statistics, rain was 106.6 mm – the previous highest was 104.2 mm in 2021, while the monthly average is 52.0 mm – so we were more than double that. The mean temperature for May is 12.5° C – and the previous maximum, 13.6° C in 2011 and 2018. This May's figure was 14.3° C – almost 1 deg more. This was without any mini heatwave, which normally occurs in May, though the period from the 9th to the 20th had some warm days.

What was the cause of these somewhat contrary statistics? Reviewing weather charts over the month, it is apparent that the circulation was very slow – with low pressure areas frequently stagnating close to or over us, rather than sweeping through to the north, in the customary fashion. This may be a hang over from the late season Stratospheric Warming that took place over the North Pole, which led to the suppression of the Polar Vortex, which drives weather systems west to east in the northern Hemisphere.

The maximum temperature was 23.2° C (23.55) and the lowest, 12.5° C. There were only two days on which 15° C was not reached (7.94) the least to date, and eighteen on which 20° C was not reached (equal with 2018 and 2019 and beaten by fifteen in 2020). There were no days over 25° C (0.5).

Bright sun hours were 308.3 (337.02) the least of the sixteen year record period. This is an interesting statistic, against the record warmth. Solar energy was 17750 Ly – equal least with 2021 and 2013. Evapotranspiration was 88 mm (95.06).

Highest rainfall rate was 87.2 mm/hr (42.09) second highest

and there were three days with over 10mm (1.37) 2021 being the only other year to reach this level. 40.4 mm fell on the 21st, probably the highest daily total in May for the record period. A number of places to the west of us had c. 65 mm – the quantity of rain over the Stour catchment caused a valley flood – including at Nayland - very unusual outside the October to March period.

Average wind speed was 3.9 mph (3.77) with the highest gust at 25 mph (31.75 mph) very low. The highest daily mean was 8.8 on the $31^{\text{st}} (8.84)$. The predominant wind direction was WSW.

June's weather was a break from the previous several months of mild and wet – it was cool, sunny and relatively dry. This may, nonetheless, seem an odd combination! It was due to the frequency of winds from a broad northerly direction, but often with clear skies. This gave the sunshine but a number of cold nights – 14 below 10° C.

The mean temperature was $15.7^{\circ}C$ (15.72) the coolest since 2016. There has been a marked warming of Junes since 2016. Maximum was $28.3^{\circ}C$ (28.34) and minimum $5.1^{\circ}C$ (5.7). Lowest maximum was $15.4^{\circ}C$ (13.99). There were no days with less than $15^{\circ}C$ max (1.44) and 10 less than $20^{\circ}C$ max (12.56). There were five days over 25 max (3.81).

Bright sun hours were 365.4 (343.17) and solar energy was 14250 Ly (13437). Evapotranspiration was 109 mm (104.28).

Monthly rain was 26.2 mm (48.7) and highest rainfall rate, 51 mm/hr. There was only one day with over 10 mm of rain.

Average wind speed was 3.8 mph with no days over 30 mph. The highest daily average was 9 mph (7.59). The predominant direction was WSW .

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NAYLAND IN THE 1970S

Several anniversaries are being celebrated this year but the 1970s were eventful in many ways, as will be seen in the following extracts from local press cuttings.

Suffolk Free Press (SFP) 24.1.74 **Drive the Buses or services may shut down**. W Norfolk & Sons – the oldest privately operated bus company in Britain – has taken the unprecedented step of appealing to villagers to drive the buses themselves in a bid to fill driver vacancies. If more drivers are not found services to many villages and towns might be scrapped. The company is willing to train women as drivers if suitable candidates come forward.

SFP 27.6.74 **Nayland School farewell and Welcome for new Vicar**. Children, staff and parents assembled in Nayland Primary School hall to pay tribute to their headmaster, Mr NC Oliver, who is leaving after 5 ½ years. He was presented with a wall hanging made by local weaver Peter Collingwood. A large congregation filled St James's Church last week for the institution and induction of the new Vicar, the Rev Anthony C Bickersteth, who has replaced the Rev John Wade.

SPF 27.6.74 **New Playgroup.** Two young mothers, Mrs M Young and Mrs G Gladwyn, were trying to form a village playgroup and asked the parish council for financial help. Members appreciated the need and asked for more details. [The Playgroup opened in September]

Nayland PC leaving. Nayland's resident policeman for the past 10 years, PC Arthur Pearce, is leaving to take up duties at Lowestoft. He and his wife had both been members of various village organisations but they were seeking a change from the rural scene.

SFP 28.11.74 **New Youth Club formed at Nayland**. A plea was put forward by four teenagers at a meeting of the Village Hall committee. Two committees were elected and various ideas for activities were proposed. Mr David Mitchell said he was delighted the club had been launched. "We feel these are responsible youngsters and it is much better for them to be using the hall for their club than wasting time hanging about on street corners" he added.

ECS 13.9.74 **Percy Swann, 87**, of Birch Street died. He had lived in Nayland all his life and was the son of one of the last river bargemen, working from Nayland Mill, who plied between Sudbury and Mistley. Mr Swann worked in Mr Butler's Birch Street bakery and after serving in the Army during World War I he returned to the bakery where he stayed until it closed in 1954.

SPF 29.11.74 **Jane Walker Hospital.** The first Christmas fair held at the hospital raised \pounds 90. It was organised by the Friends of the hospital and a newly formed Staff Social Club which was described as very successful by hospital secretary, John Dyble, who believed that an active social club was vital for staff welfare in an isolated community like the hospital.

SPF 13.3.75 **Professor threatens to sue over bridge**. A University Professor says he will sue the Parish Council if he is forced to stop work on a footbridge he is building from his home, Lock Cottage, across the river to the Horse-watering, a piece of Common Land, in Bear Street. The Council decided to seek legal advice.

East Anglian Daily Times (EADT) 22.7.76 **Nayland set to lose its working men's club.** Following a planning application for permission to change the building in Fen Street into a house Mr David Mitchell said the building was not on the sewer. Club members had to walk up the road to a public house to use the lavatory. He helped to form the club in 1959 and said the club would be ousted if planning permission was granted.

SFP 2.7.76 **River Revellers** scoop £20. The "Nayland Nits" made their mark – with a resounding splash – on the grand river jumping contest at Wiston. The team – Ivan Kerridge, Pat Day, David Cant, Ian Harris and Billy Evans – walked off with the first prize of £20 and a silver cup. The river jump was part of a fund raising barbecue in aid of Wiston Church belfry fund.

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

ECS 29.7.77 House now restaurant. One of Nayland's oldest houses took on a new lease of life last week when it opened as

houses took on a new lease of life last week when it opened as a restaurant called The Bear. The house formerly known as Stourbank dates back to the 15th century and although no written evidence has been discovered there is strong local belief that it was once an inn.

SPF, 29.7.77 **Nayland Guides.** The Guides are in urgent need of a new leader. Since the sudden death last year of Miss Kathleen Macbeth, the group has been kept together by three young helpers. It was started in 1942 by Mrs Mary Macbeth. Her daughter Kathleen had run the Guides since 1960 when Mrs Macbeth took over the Brownies. At present the Guides have 20 members with a flourishing Brownie pack.

ECS 1972 **Nayland's bells.** Nayland's church bells have rung out over the parish once again. The 6 bells which date back to 1605 have been in mothballs for 15 years during the renovation of the 15th century church tower. Workers took two days to haul the bells up into the tower - one of them weighing 17 cwt. The bells were rededicated by the Archdeacon of Ipswich during the weekend when the opening of the new **Village Hall** was also celebrated.

EADT 29.4.74 **Butcher puts up the shutters on family firm**. After 60 years as a village butcher, Mr Frank Webb put up the shutters of his ivy clad shop in the High Street at Nayland for the last time at the weekend. Mr Webb, 73, has decided that the time has come for him and his wife Amy, 72, to retire from the business his father began in 1899. It started in Birch Street and moved to its present premises in 1903.

Colchester Gazette (CG) 29.3.78 **Historic day as Nayland land first big trophy**. Nayland Rangers Football Club won the first major trophy in their 40 year history when they captured the East Essex League knock-out cup at a packed Bromley Road ground in Colchester on Easter Monday. It was a great moment for John Curtis [Landlord of the Anchor Inn] who has been club secretary for many years.

5.4.78 CG **Mill is now a smart self-service store**. The old mill which has been a landmark in Nayland for centuries reopens tomorrow with a new commercial identity. John Oakes who has had an electrical business in the village for 20 years and his wife Kathleen have converted the first floor of the mill into a self-service grocery store.

THE COUNTRYSIDE CODE

Respect, Protect & Enjoy OUR Countryside

We are particularly lucky to live in a beautiful AONB, often referred to as Constable Country. So let's look after it.

As children we were taught about the Countryside Code but do we recall that in the 1950s Norman Thelwell designed a series of cartoons to help to promote the new Country Code.

Thelwell was a master of sharp social comment and sheer zany humour and was regarded as the unofficial artist of the British countryside and possibly the most popular cartoonist in Britain, since the Second World War. He commented on many aspects of human behaviour, but he is perhaps most synonymous with little girls and their little fat ponies. They have helped to ensure his continuing popularity and his immortality.

The cartoon scenes together with the rhymes became well known::

No 11:

Sharp tins and bottles left in grass

May injure animals that pass.

Protect them, and preserve the view,

By taking litter home with you.

Unwanted rubbish can easily be carried away in a bag, or in the pocket, for disposal at home.

No 7:

A moment's carelessness of haste

May turn fair scenes to blackened waste;

Then think upon the danger dire

And guard against all risk of fire.

Country fire can flare up suddenly. Camp or picnic fires not properly put out or lighted near dry crops, can quickly start a blaze.

No 5:

Those living things that pleasure give,

Give pleasure only while they live.

Then let things live, that live to please; Protect wild life, wild plants and trees.

If flowers are uprooted, they will soon become rare. Trees can be spoilt by breaking branches. Birds will desert their nests if they are frightened.

Also messages such as....

A farmer does not love at all

The folk who force hedge, fence or wall;

To save him sorrow and expense

Respect his wall, and hedge, and fence.

And...

A farmer frowns on lad or lass Who treads his crops, of tramples grass; So single file (not hand in hand) Keep to the paths across farmland.



Dear Friends,

Hello summer, I hope!

Last week, my son in Manchester (Connecticut, not Lancashire!) got sunburnt and my Ukrainian guests were worried about friends and family coping with 40+ degrees back home. Not that I am wishing for either of those situations but a little warmth and settled weather would be nice. I find that not only do I feel better on bright, fine days but I have more energy, more resilience and more optimism.

But feelings are a bit like the weather, they are changeable and unreliable, at least at the superficial level. I'm sure that at times, like me, you have been furious at your spouse, child, parent or friend. But at a deeper level, your love for them hasn't changed. However much you've been hurt or disappointed, if they were in real trouble or danger you would be the first to help.

There have been times in my life when I have felt the presence of God so profoundly that I could almost touch him and the peace that filled me was beyond description, beyond understanding. Those times are wonderful and precious and rare. But these feelings are not the basis for my faith, they are just a foretaste of what is to come. I believe because I have found throughout my life and irrespective of my feelings at any given moment, God has kept his promises, he has been with me always. He has given me what I needed, though not necessarily what I thought I needed or wanted! And alongside the promises, he has also given commands' Love God, love your neighbour as yourself'. The promises and the commands are two sides of the same coin.

As a Christian, I am called, not to sit in a corner, like Little Jack Horner indulging himself with spiritual plums and self satisfaction "Oh, what a good boy am I", but to share what I have learned, sometimes the hard way. Knowing that we belong, knowing that we have a purpose, knowing that we are loved, is what we all need to live fulfilling and meaningful lives, to realise the potential God has given each of us. That inner hunger is a God shaped space that only he can fill.

In this holiday season, whatever the weather, I hope you will have time for rest and renewal and time for spiritual reflection. The church is there for all, the building and the people are there to serve their community. You are always welcome.

This summer, come and discover more about one of our local churches. On 5th August, 10am, in Leavenheath church, there will be a church detective event, in the little church that is hidden in the dip off the A134. A fun challenge to find interesting and perhaps surprising things about your local church for all ages. 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


