2024: A Special Year for the Village Choir & Conservation Society

This year marks a special anniversary for these two village organisations.

Nayland Conservation Society was founded in 1974 when the Parish Recorder and a fellow history enthusiast, started *The Nayland Record*, a quarterly journal. With some concerning changes coming to light within the village at that time the idea of forming a 'preservation' society was conceived. The Conservation Society held its inaugural meeting in the Village Hall on the 6th June 1974.

The Conservation Society will be celebrating this milestone at its annual Open Gardens on 9th June and with a 5th Anniversary Celebration on 25th June - save these dates in your diaries.

For Nayland Choir it marks their 30th anniversary. Having formed a women's choir in the village in 1992, known as 'Tapestry', Mandy Cook went on to establish Nayland Choir in 1994. This was a very exciting change and such was its popularity the Mission Hall (Church Hall) was not large enough to accommodate them so rehearsals moved to the Old Chapel. Their first concert, when they were accompanied by an orchestra, was a wonderful achievement.

They will be celebrating their milestone with a special concert on Sunday 24th March in St James' Church. They will be performing *Mozart's Requiem* and, as back in 1994, will be accompanied by an orchestra. *Further details on pages 16 and 26.*

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 13th December 2023

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM

Mike Hunter expressed his support to a resident who had offered to co-ordinate a local voluntary Speed Watch group; this would provide evidence and statistics about the speed of traffic within the village centre.

An owner of land adjacent to the burial ground raised his concern regarding 8 overgrown trees on the northern boundary of the cemetery; work commenced had been interrupted by Storm Babet in October and had not been completed. He felt the condition of the boundary fence required a maintenance plan.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece is continuing to follow up the untidy state of land by the Old Bus Shelter at the junction of Heycroft Way/ Harpers Estate.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR

James Finch said SCC remain united against the Norwich to Tilbury onshore pylons option. He provided a potential traffic calming programme for Nayland as requested.

HIGHWAYS

Laura Erith reported that the crumbling road surface edge, adjacent to the ditch, opposite Little Bulmer Farm remained a danger to drivers particularly now that bollards/cones had been removed. James Finch was asked to pursue this; he pointed out that there were limited resources available.

Jonathan Pearson has offered to set up a voluntary Community Speed Watch group; this would operate under the guidance of Suffolk Constabulary. Councillors agreed to support this proposal. James Finch agreed to speak to the co-ordinator at Newton Green and obtain useful advice.

As requested James Finch had been exploring suitable traffic calming equipment available at SCC that was suitable for Nayland. He confirmed that Horkesley Road would qualify for a Temporary Vehicle Activated sign (TVAS) which would be shared on a rota with other locations. This should be sited just outside the 30mph limit within the 40mph zone.

Stoke Road will qualify for a Speed Indicator Device; experience suggests a battery unit would be more reliable than a solar panel and did not require a tall pole. The PC would be required to fund this.

Councillors agreed to look into purchase options. Isabelle Reece would look into potential grant funding for speed management.

PARISH COUNCIL FINANCE

The Finance Committee's recommendations, which were approved, include: A Precept increase of 7%; to increase allotment rents by 10% and burial fees by 7%, that CIL monies are to be used towards a new Defibrillator for Wiston supported by a grant from the Community Council.

Other new capital projects to be prioritised for CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) monies as there is still no confirmed timescale for completion of the Village Hall roof. The funds need to be spent within 5 years of allocation. The detailed CIL returns can be viewed on the PC website.

Adam Sedgwick, Community Hardship and Community Pantry Fund management, asked whether Nayland with Wissington PC would consider allocated charity monies to the Fund within the benefice; it was agreed to invite him to the January meeting.

PLANNING
Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at Lower

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **Lower Courtwood, 13A Court Street** [DC/23/04878] for works to trees; to remove to ground level an Ash tree and a Sycamore tree.

Discussing an application at **Harpers Hill Farm** [DC/23/05311] for advertisement consent councillors object on the grounds that the size of the proposed signs was too large for this site, adjacent to Gladwin's Farm entrance and within the AONB. The need for two signs was questioned. Signage in itself was appropriate, as with the neighbouring business, but the number and design, as per application should be refused.

Councillors had no objections to listed building consent at **72 - 74 Bear Street** [DC/23/05458] for variation of conditions relating to materials providing the Heritage Team ensure the integrity of the heritage asset should not be compromised by the choice of materials; or at **52 - 54 Bear Street** [DC/23/05592] for repair of lime render on the front elevation and replacement of concrete render on brick plinth with lime render, replacement of plain tiles on the north facing roof slope and introduction of a pentice board over raised band along the front elevation as long as Heritage Team approve materials.

Owen Brown reported that investigation into future affordable housing was on-going.

The benefits of Neighbourhood Development Plans (NDP) was discussed; Isabelle Reece pointed out that Babergh's Planning Team placed great emphasis and weight on NDPs.

Tricia Fuller felt the PC should pursue whole council planning training; it was agreed that enquiries should be made at SALC and with Babergh.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The Royal Memorial project was coming to fruition: the copper beech tree with railings around and the bench are in place. A plaque is to follow. Thanks were expressed to Dawn Harris for coordinating the project, the contractors and the Community Council for their financial contribution.

SCC's work at the culvert between Bear Street and the river is completed; the rotten wooden safety rail over the culvert, adjacent to the bus shelter has been replaced.

Sally Dalton said that work on the wooden revetment isn't likely to happen in the near future but it's hoped reduction of the long reed bed will be undertaken.

Gerry Battye reported that the Fairfield Playpark equipment had been repainted. The sub-committee would need to resolve signage, both in the Playpark and the field and parking areas.

Councillors were very disappointed by the delay to the repair to the Fairfield/Cemetery driveway by the Diocese. There are safety concerns for cars carrying children, visitors to the care home, funeral vehicles and ambulances using the drive with one particularly deep pothole. The Diocese will be chased again.

VILLAGE HALL

The Council has received correspondence expressing an interest in the possibility of free EV Charging points at the hall. This has been discussed by the VHMC; the electricity supply would need to be updated to make this possible. Such updating is already part of the Roof Project. Separate costings for the points themselves would have to be sought.

BURIAL GROUND

Dawn Harris reported that some individual metal crosses were being repaired and new ones being made for marking the graves of former Jane Walker residents. It will be necessary to liaise with our grass-cuttingcontractor concerning the crosses.

IN BRIEF:

Councillors congratulated the Community Council on their Christmas Fayre and other festive activities.

The allotment rents have been requested. There are currently two people on the waiting list; one from this parish and one from a neighbouring parish.

Signage has been damaged at both ends of the permissive path, created by the Conservation Society, between Nayland and Stoke; Mike Hunter agreed to liaise with the Tendring Hall Estate regarding this.

Suffolk Constabulary have re-organised local policing and a Community Policing Team has been created; PC 1293 Niall Johnson and PCSO 3092 Jo Adams are our new allocated officers.

Robin Thorogood chaired the meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM

Robert Preston, Site Manager at Littlegarth School, attended the meeting following complaints regarding powerful external motion sensored security lighting on a new building at the school. They are very bright and can be seen from some distance away from the Wiston side of the village. The original planning application specified downlighting; it was expressed that wouldn't have caused a problem. The lights illuminate the car park for the safety of pedestrians. Cleaners will be parking away from the lights to avoid triggering them in the evening. Mr Preston said residents with any concerns may contact him on r.preston@littlegarth.org

Mike Hunter proposed that the Community Litterpick was held on 20th April; councillors thanked him for organising this.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece said there would be a site meeting next week to discuss the land at the Harpers Estate/Heycroft Way junction and the future of the Old Bus Shelter as well as the Babergh garages; councillors were invited to attend. She advised that funding for the Speed Watch team could be applied for from the National Lottery Road Safety Package.

HIGHWAYS

Tricia Fuller raised the issue of repairs to a small patch of Harpers Estate (below the junction with Heycroft Way) where resurfacing had been expected. Debbie Hattrell said she would check but SCC may not have specified what work they were going to do; she will follow this up.

Regarding the bollards on the A134 by-pass not being illuminated, James Finch advised that following Power Networks failure to resolve the problems SCC engineers have decided to install new self-cleaning reflective bollards which don't require a power supply. Councillors felt this was not exactly what was requested Dawn Harris will investigate this and report back to the PC.

Mike Hunter said 6 volunteers have come forward to join the Speed Watch team; they are ready to submit their application form.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **The Old Post Office 19 High Street** [DC/23/05723] for works to trees; reduce crown of Magnolia by 2 metres, reduce height of Bay by 1 metre and remove 1 stem, reduce crown of Portuguese Laurel by 2 metres in height and 1 metre in crown width, reduce crown height of Apple by 1 metre and crown width by 0.5 metres and remove crossing and dead branches, reduce over extended branches of Weeping Birch by 1 metre, reduce height of Apple by 1 metre and remove crossing and dead branches, crown lift an Indian Bean tree to 3 metres.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Sally Dalton was asked for an update on works at Caley Green; there was no update but it is still hoped reduction of the long reed bed will be carried out. Gerry Battye said SCC have replaced the rotten wooden safety rail over the culvert, adjacent to the Bear Street bus shelter.

Gerry Battye reported that the benches on Fairfield Recreation Ground have been repaired; he will follow up on where to locate them.

The poor condition of the Fairfield/Cemetery driveway remains of concern; the Diocese reported that they were let down by a contractor and seeking another to do the work but this was 6 weeks ago. The Diocese will be chased again.

BANNER POLICY

Councillors were reminded of details of the Council's banner policy for Caley Green and Horkesley Road which was established in liaison with SCC, the landowners. Banners (and signage) are only permitted with authorisation of the PC, following an application submitted with a risk assessment and proof of PL

insurance to the PC Clerk who will check availability. Village groups may apply for display periods of 2 weeks, anything commercial may apply for periods of 1 week per month. However, only 2 banners can be displayed at any one time.

A complaint was received regarding a banner along Horkesley Road promoting the Mill Street Store & Deli during December. This had not been authorised and they have been asked to take it down. While the PC wishes to support all village organisations and businesses the banner policy is in place and should be adhered to. Laura Erith will contact the Deli regarding the policy.

VILLAGÉ HALL

Dawn Harris said that the Spring gardening morning will be held on 6th April. The VHMC are hoping to organise two fundraising events this year.

The PC has the opportunity of free installation of slow-speed EV charging points at the hall. Councillors had been informed that the current electric system at the village hall would need upgrading – which will be included as part of the Replacement Roof Project – to cater for EV charging. Councillors wondered if slow-speed chargers, rather than rapid speed, would work with the current VH electric system. Adam Birchweaver was delegated – if Iain Wright is in agreement – to express an interest in taking this forward.

IN BRIEF:

Dawn Harris advised that the allotment inspections had been carried out. Some rent renewals are overdue.

Dawn Harris has requested a quote for replacement crosses to mark the graves of former Jane Walker residents in the Burial Ground .

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

The Parish Assembly will be held on Wednesday 24th April at 7.30pm.

Councillors expressed concern that numbers attending the PA have dropped alarmingly. It is a legal requirement to hold a PA annually. It was suggested that having a speaker and/or having an interesting, topical theme may draw more residents to attend. Affordable Housing, Neighbourhood Plan, Environment Agency, Local business were subject mooted – the Council would welcome suggestions from residents with ideas for a theme for the meeting of subjects that concern them. Please let the Clerk have your suggestion prior to the next PC meeting on 14th February.

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



COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Claire Buller welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: As always we welcome new members to join the team – please spread an encouraging word to anyone who may be interested in joining us. It is an enjoyable friendly village committee that provides positive events and facilities for the community. Contact Rachel on 07788 954309 or rachel_hitchcock@hotmail.com if you would like to know more.

Fundraising Activities/Events: We have a good deal of activities being planned currently but as always future ideas and support are welcome.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall is managed by the CC.

A resident raised an issue regarding access to the Village Hall defibrillator in December. The Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) investigated the incident on our behalf and identified that because the originator of the 999 call sent someone else to get the defibrillator (just in case) the ambulance service were not able to give the code. The original 999 call had not triaged as needing a defibrillator - the operator simply asked if one was nearby (just in case) a question which applies to e.g. office buildings which might have a readily-accessible defibrillator. Because of this when the second call to 999 was placed to access the community defibrillator at the Village Hall, a code was not available. To conclude - there is no problem with our community defibrillator and our site is fully registered with the East of England Ambulance Service (EASS). The issue arose because of the ambulance service script - an issue of which they are aware and are addressing by changing over to a new system. The CHT have reported the issue and are in regular contact with them.

NB. It is not appropriate to put the defibrillator code on the cabinet as it may invalidate our insurance and risk the defibrillator being used without any record which could mean it would be unavailable for use next time it was required

Regarding the possibility a defibrillator in Wiston: Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) confirmed a defibrillator could operate without a power supply; the cost would be in the region £2,300; a location by the Parish Council noticeboard in Wiston has been mooted. The PC supports the use of their CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) funds to be used towards a community Defibrillator for Wiston supported by a grant from the CC.

Three training sessions are being organised by the First Responder Team on 17th, 20th & 24th January in the Village Hall. The CC will be funding the hire of the hall. The sessions will provide confidence in performing CPR and using a defibrillator (AED). Numbers attending each session will be limited to ensure those attending get the attention that they need during the course. Children are welcome to attend.

River Stour Water Level Gauge: SCC Properties Officer would permit the gauge to be installed on the Caley Green riverbank but exact location details (between the proposed wooden revetment and the long reed bed) should be confirmed with him. The surveyor confirmed change of location to the south bank would not affect the datum mark for the above sea level gauge. Rachel has spoken to Danny Thurlow regarding installation; he is hopeful he will be able to install the water gauge and will be meeting Rachel on site in the New Year.

Online Ticketing Facility: NaylandEvents.org – This has become increasingly useful for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility to sell tickets for their events contact Justin Dowding at jpdowding@gmail.com.

Queen Elizabeth II and King Charles III commemorative feature: This Parish Council project has almost come to fruition; just a plaque to add. Installation of commemorative copper beech tree and railing for the late Queen and bench for King Charles was installed in December. The CC awarded a

£1,538 contribution towards the project.

Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation of village groups and events are welcome. An item headed 'Volunteer Vacancies' has been added to the Community Times, listing the various volunteers needed by different groups; please let Lorraine know if you have vacancies to be included along with an idea of the level of commitment needed.

It would be helpful if everyone, when they see promotions for Nayland events on Facebook, could make a comment (however brief) and not just click on 'like' which is no help.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: The spring gardening morning tidy will be held on Saturday 6th April from 9am with refreshments served; please pop along if you can.

St James' Flower Festival: 9th, 10th & 16th December. Organised by Karen Freeman. There were 27 wonderful Christmas trees, decorated by village organisations and individuals, including the CC, on display. Those that attended enjoyed the Festival which looked lovely with some ingenious decorations to demonstrate the activities of each village society. Thanks to them, the cake producers, all who helped, the Handbell Ringers for a wonderful performance, the groups that participated and the sponsors. They raised £600; half for the Primary School and half for the Church Coffee Morning. Recent Activities:

They gave out over 110 bags of chocolate coins; these were only given to children due to demand. Many thanks to Claire, Wayne, George and John. George donned an elf costume and make up and seemed to thoroughly enjoy himself. Claire will ask George if he would kindly put us in his diary for next year.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Matt Cable gave his report to 31st Dec. *NB: these results are preliminary figures.*

Breakdown of profits: Community Times £1,013, Bonfire Night £4,369, Quiz £563, Village Calendar £430, Nayland 10K £425, Christmas Fayre £290.

Grants paid: Parish Council bench and tree £1,538, First Responders £2,165, Nayland Bear £100.

Expenses: £566 for the Coronation event and £448 for Christmas activities. £857 for central costs inc. insurance for the year.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £27,537.04 represented by Deposit a/c monies £11,165, Current a/c monies £15,250, Cash in Hand £1,078. We hold £89 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £10,000, VH coffee machine £280 and Lizzie's Fund £153. **Therefore, unencumbered assets are £16,814.**

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Nayland Choir: A lovely card had been received thanking the CC for their grant of £1,538 towards the costs for their 30th Anniversary concert.

Nayland First Responders' Training Sessions: Following their offer to organise free of charge CPR and defibrillator (AED) training sessions in Nayland on 17th, 20th & 24th January it was agreed to award a grant of £157.50 to cover the cost of hall hire for the courses.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks thanked all for contributing to recent issues.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks said the 2023 income is currently £430. There is an additional £112 collected; a further estimated £110 expected and there will no doubt be some late sales. There is an outstanding sponsorship of £25. Potentially this would be £677 profit for the 2024 calendar.

The current calendar team has dwindled down to just Lorraine and Wendy Sparrow in recent years and by themselves they cannot maximise sales. Claire Buller and Jo Metson have kindly agreed to join the team with a view to boosting sales. Opportunities such as Firework Night, busy times on Caley Green, including when the fish and chip van was present were mooted. Many thanks to everyone involved in the 2024 calendar; sponsors, those submitting photos, those selling the calendars and of everyone who bought copies. As we move into a new year don't forget to take photos ready for this year's calendar photo competition – details will be promoted in the Community Times. Forthcoming Activities:

SOCIETY REPORTS

HortSoc: Trevor Smy said they enjoyed participating at Christmas Fayre. They are planning their 2004 activities; Spring Flower Show on 23rd March, AGM & Fun Quiz on 16th April, Morning Market on 11th May, coach outing to Hyde Hall on 12th June.

Friends of Caley Green: Sally Dalton reported the lone swan on the river is still alone. There is a pair of swans on the Meadow pond and most of the ducks spend the winter on the pond. The rotten railing on Bear Street above the culvert has been replaced. A few residents attended a Solstice Picnic on the new bench on the Green but it was a very cold day; not for the fainthearted.

First Responders: Tracy Le Grys said their third defibrillator kit

will be up and running in the very near future. They are holding three sessions for CPR and defibrillator training on the 17th, 20th and 24th January. The course lasts approximately 2 hours and as well as a slide show presentation, there are demonstrations and role playing. Children are welcome to attend. The Community Council will fund the hire of the Village Hall for these sessions. Parish Council: Sam Treharne said they support a community speed watch within the village run by residents under the guidance of the Suffolk Constabulary. Data will be gathered as evidence of vehicles speeding within the village. The PC will look into the addition of traffic calming equipment within the village, such as a temporary Vehicle Activated Sign in Horkesley Road and a re-active sign which displays the speed in Stoke Road. The Royal Memorial tree, railings and bench are in place, the plaque is yet to be installed. The PC has objected to an application for signage at Harpers Hill Farm. Policing - Suffolk Constabulary have re-organised local policing and a Community Policing Team has been created: PC 1293 Niall Johnson and PCSO

3092 Jo Adams are our new allocated officers. **St James Church:** Chris Hunt said the Christmas Tree Festival was very successful. During December both Littlegarth and Nayland Primary schools held their carol concerts; they were as usual very good. On the 17th nine lessons and carols was held with mulled wine and mince pies afterwards. On Christmas Eve the Christingle Service was slightly different this year as we had no organist so we sang unaccompanied with thanks to David Pryor for leading us. On Christmas Day a family Eucharist was held. All these events were well attended and hopefully enjoyed by all. Some repairs to the roof on the south side (bordering Newlands Lane) are expected to take place soon. The Wednesday Coffee Mornings will recommence from Wednesday 17th January.

Conservation Society: Mike Hunter said their speakers for 2024 have been booked. Local resident Mick Inkpen will be talking about his career as a children's book author and illustrator at their AGM on 12th March. On 25th June we shall be celebrating the Society's 50th anniversary with a drinks reception for members followed by memories from three of our longest standing members and a contribution from local comedian Chris Hunt! Our October talk features Nigel Amies speaking on the subject of the Home Guard and our final speaker in November is David Pryor who is involved in the building of a Viking longship.

Open Gardens will take place on 9th June. We would be most grateful if the many excellent gardeners on the Heights would consider opening their gardens; many gardens open in the older part of the village and it would be a pleasure to spread the event more widely. Other significant events will include our Spring Footpath walk and our spring litter pick; dates for both events will be confirmed shortly.

Land Company (Nayland Meadow): David Slater said a tree that came down across the footpath during Storm Henk has been removed; adjacent trees are being checked and may require work. Phase 2 of the path improvement work is due to be carried out. Phase 1 saw works to 230 metres of path completed; for phase 2 it's hoped over 400 metres of the permissive path – from the bench down to the Horkesley Road entrance and to the river – will be completed if weather permits by the end of March. We will endeavour to minimise inconvenience to walkers

Village Hall: Iain Wright said that the 2023 fund raising events made £7,500 for the replacement roof fund. They are still waiting for news on their Lottery grant application. They are still trying to overcome technical issues involved in installing a noise limiter at the hall; neighbouring houses have reported incidents of late night noise from the hall.

AOB: Volunteer List: The need for establishing a list of a few volunteers willing to collect prescriptions, and perhaps help with other errands for those in need was raised. It was felt this would be helpful. The way forward and promotion in the CT would be discussed further via email.

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
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

WATER LEVELS

As highlighted last issue and as reported in David Lowe's weather report on page 34 the rainfall continued to be very high. Consequently river levels have been high and flooding continued.

Drawing on a positive from this, at least levels in Abberton Reservoir and the groundwater chalk aquifier should stand us in good stead should we have a long hot summer... and our poor under-maintained river shouldn't stop flowing.

REED GROWTH AT THE WEIR

Reeds have died down and been dormant during the winter. With spring on its way that will soon change and the well established reed beds will soon be romping away to claim more of the river and reduce its water holding capacity.

The likelihood of the EA undertaking any much needed reed management or removal seems unlikely given their previous broken promises.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

As reported last issue it was feared that the pen (female) swan had been injured and disappeared. The cob swan has overwintered on the river and Caley Green alone.

There was encouraging news in January when another pen swan started visiting our cob swan at Caley Green. This became more exciting on 16th January when the pair were spotted mating several times down near the Horseshoe weir. Fingers crossed that they settle together here and she is not a promiscuous, fly by night pen.

There are currently no swans on Nayland Meadow.

Kingfishers have continued to delight passers by, and during the first two weeks of January there were several sightings in Wiston of a White Stork.

RSPB BIG GARDEN BIRDWATCH

Don't forget to take part in the annual RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch; it will be on 26-28 January.

With 1 in 4 birds in serious decline, it's never been more important to monitor the UK's bird populations.

THE RIVER AS AN AMENITY

With the days gradually getting longer and signs of spring arriving all around us it perhaps time to get excited about the prospect of outdoor activities. This does bring with it a few rules and regulations to be aware of....

RIVER CRAFT

All craft must be registered to take to the water on any part of the Inland Waterway network of England. The Environment Agency takes enforcement action if it finds any boat moored or in use if it is not displaying a current, valid registration plate.

The River Stour Trust can issue craft registrations. The annual fee (1 Apr 2023 - 31 Mar 2024) is £47.70 per private unpowered craft. Monthly and weekly licences are available. Register at: https://www.riverstourtrust.org/boat-trips/paddling -the-river-stour/craft-registrations/

Alternatively, membership of British Canoeing includes a licence - but it covers the member and not the craft. individual adult costs £47. Join at https://www.britishcanoeing.org.uk/

FISHING

The closed season, when you cannot fish on rivers and streams, is 15th March to 15th June 2024.

At any time of year a rod licence must be carried if you are aged 13 or over and you fish for freshwater fish, smelt or eel or you could be prosecuted and you can be fined up to £2,500.

A yearly 2-rod course fishing licence costs: £33 for adults, £22 for over 65 or the disabled and is free for 13-16 year olds. 1-day or 8-day licences are also available.

CALEY GREEN

The Friends continue to keep an eye on the Green and the wildfowl. It is lovely to see it being enjoyed even during the winter months.

THE CULVERT

Suffolk County Council (SCC) completed clearance and re-profiling of the culvert alongside Caley Green and removal of the island of reeds at its mouth in October. During the heavy rain during winter the flow down the culvert has been much improved.

Repair to the rotten railing on Bear Street above the culvert has also now been carried out.

THE LONG REED BED

SCC remain hopeful that their contractors will carry out a reduction of the 'wall of reeds' in the near future.

RIVERBANK LITTER BY SLUICE GATES

SCC are the landowners of the triangle of land between the A134 and the fork in the river adjacent the sluice gates.

They were alerted to a considerable amount of litter and flytipping; their appointed contractor did not carry out the rubbish clearance properly. The SCC Properties Officer said he will look once again at getting the matter rectified.

RIVERBANK PROTECTION UPDATE

SCC have indicated that wooden revetment will be installed around the bay at Caley Green to protect it from future erosion and that they will fund the work and manage the project. There is no further update on when this work is likely to take place.





LASTING MEMORIAL ON THE GREEN

A memorial bench to commemorate Queen Elizabeth II, engraved 'Queen Elizabeth II 1926-2022', and a tree - a Copper Beech - to celebrate King Charles III have been installed on Caley Green.

BANNERS ON CALEY GREEN & ALONG HORKESLEY ROAD

In order for advertising banners or any promotional signage to be placed on Caley Green or along Horkesley Road permission must first be granted by the Parish Council.

A banner policy was established in liaison with SCC, the landowners:

- Permission should be obtained prior to the banner being displayed. An application must include a risk assessment together with proof of Insurance.
- The Parish Clerk will check availability; there can be no more than 2 banners there at any time.
- Village groups may apply for display periods of 2 weeks, anything commercial may apply for periods of 1 week per month.
- A banner may not be erected more than 14 days before the event being advertised and must be removed no later than 48 hours after the event.
- The banner should be at least 2 metres from the A134, be very securely staked and tied and not be placed so that they obstruct visibility to users of the highway.



Our December film 'Oppenheimer' was a long film but benefited from being screened as a matinee as it was punctuated by a longer than usual interval with mince pies and refreshments available as part of the ticket price.

Rowena has hired Joyce to commune with her daughter Alicia (Rowan Robinson), who committed suicide after her fiancé, chef Maxime Gerard (Kyle Allen), ended their engagement. When one of the guests is murdered, it is up to the former detective to once again uncover the killer. The ensemble cast also includes Kyle Allen, Jamie Dornan, Jude Hill, Ali Khan, Emma Laird and Riccardo Scamarcio
- Friday 15th March: 'One Life' (2023) is a 2023 British biographical drama film directed by James Hawes. It is based on the true story of British humanitarian Sir Nicholas Winton as he looks back on his past efforts to help groups of Jewish children in German-occupied Czechoslovakia to hide and flee in 1938–39, just before the beginning of World Warr II. The film stars Sir Anthony Hopkins and Johnny Flynn as Sir Nicholas, and Helena Bonham Carter as his wife Babi Winton
- Friday 12th April: 'Napoleon' (2023). Against a stunning backdrop and with some of the most dynamic battle sequences ever filmed director Ridley Scott captures the iconic Napoleon Bonaparte (Joaquin Phoenix), confident in his abilities as a military strategist, infused with terrific ambition, and a desire to bring Europe peace through war. The Napoleon represented here by Joaquin Phoenix presents a dour man who through sheer will wins the affection of the love of his life, Joséphine de Beauharnais (Vanessa Kirby). However, Napoleon is pulled by an obsession stronger than his love for Joséphine. His desire for acceptance by the aristocracy of the other major European powers and their petty conflicts leads to his making war to extend French control beyond her borders. General turned Emperor, Napoleon seeks to achieve through conquest what he could not otherwise, but it leads to exile, resurrection, and eventual downfall.

Dear Nayland with Wissington residents,

A new policing model has been introduced by Suffolk Constabulary. There are now Community Policing Teams (CPT) who have responsibility for long term problem solving and engaging with the community. The area I will be responsible for includes the following parishes ...

Aldham, Capel St Mary, Elmsett, Hadleigh North, Hadleigh South, Higham, Holton St Mary, Kersey, Layham, Wenham Magna, Wenham Parva, Nayland With Wissington, Nedging With Naughton, Polstead, Raydon, Semer, Shelley, Stoke By Nayland, Stratford St Mary and Whatfield.

I have help with my area from PCSO 3092 Jo Adams, we are based out of Hadleigh Police Station. Other officers, such as those on the Response Investigation Team (RIT) are responsible for dealing with most crime and emergency incidents reported to Suffolk Police.

My new role incorporates visiting schools, holding engagement events, identifying and tackling any ongoing issues, dealing with anti-social behaviour and some other specific matters. The new approach should mean you see police a bit more and gives me the flexibility to patrol around my area and target anything that is going on and hear from the public directly about any issues that need police attention.

When it comes to Nayland and Nayland with Wissington, it remains a typically very safe place. However, at time of writing, since 1st November 2023, there have been 4 crimes reported in your area, and these are not just isolated to the early hours of the morning either, with at least one occurring in the afternoon. The crimes include a house burglary in Wissington (Nov), theft of a car (Nov), damage to a house (Dec) and theft of number plates (Jan) all in Nayland. Due to this I will be continuing to visit Nayland at key times. You can find good crime prevention advice on the Suffolk Police website - www.suffolk.police.uk. The website also has a map showing what crime and anti-social behaviour is happening around you, just click on the "Policing in your area" and choose "Hadleigh and Nayland" then view the crime map and zoom in on your home area.

Please consider following the Hadleigh Police Facebook and X (formally Twitter) pages, as along with a colleague responsible for the East Babergh area, I post on there and will advertise where I will be for each of my monthly engagement events.

I will be in the Nayland Village Hall between 9:30-midday on Friday 9th February if you have any questions or information to pass to me.







We have received overwhelmingly positive comment on the improvement we made last year to approximately 200 metres of the previously muddiest section of footpath around Nayland Meadow. It has stood up well to a prolonged period of record rainfall, which in previous years would have turned that length of path into an ever-widening quagmire of mud and water.

We have been able to acquire funding to carry out the same process this year, with the same local contractor (Danny Thurlow) on a further 430 metres running from the Community Council seat along the permissive path to the Anchor Car Park and the river. This is to be completed before the end of March 2024.

This should not be a problem if the weather is reasonably kind to us but regret that there will inevitably be some disruption to normal use of the footpath during construction. Limited alternative routing may be possible at times.

We are assured that the improved path will tolerate periodically being under water. After flooding there should be a mud-free path much sooner than on normal soil.

We are very grateful to The Anchor for their sponsorship of a bat-box on the meadow. More details to follow when installed. The first of many we hope. Other would-be sponsors please get in touch.

Wildlife Sightings

With the exception of rabbits and grey squirrels, mammal sightings on the meadow are relatively infrequent. However, a muntjac has recently been seen twice in the vicinity of the laid/coppiced hedgerows. Although frequently seen in other parts of Nayland this small deer, a non-native species originating from Asia, has not been recorded on the meadow before, perhaps

due to the relative lack of cover and the partial isolation of the site due to the surrounding roads.

Otters are faring well in the Stour catchment but are rarely seen. They are predominantly nocturnal, though with luck can sometimes be seen in the daytime if there is lack of disturbance. More often their presence can only be detected through field signs, including footprints and their droppings, otherwise known as spraints. Otters typically spraint on prominent features such as stones and tree limbs at the water's edge. On the meadow the removal of the fallen willow by the culvert between the river and pond has left a stump that now provides a perfect sprainting site for passing otters, and the keen-eyed among you might have noticed recent spraints here. These are black and oily when fresh (with a pleasant jasmine odour) but become paler as they dry out. Upon close inspection you can often make out scales and bones from the fish the otters have eaten.

One highlight from 2023 was the recolonisation of our river frontage

by water voles. An individual was seen swimming back and forth across the river in May and further investigation revealed feeding signs and droppings along the Land Company owned bank. Water voles are exclusively vegetarian and benefit from

the cover and food supply provided by the wide strip of vegetation along the margin of the river. They are an endangered species, and both the voles and their habitat are strictly protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act. Their welcome return has been aided by a concerted effort from landowners and conservation organisations to control populations of the invasive non-native American mink, whose

predation of voles has been a major cause of the historical decline.

Bird highlights over the past year include several reed warbler holding territory last summer (and almost certainly breeding) along the dense vegetated margins of the river and pond. Reed warblers are a migrant species that overwinter in Africa before returning to the UK in summer to breed. A male reed bunting was recorded singing beside the river in May, though there was no confirmation of breeding. Between October and December a Cetti's warbler could frequently be heard calling along the river frontage by Caley Green and from the pond margins. Cetti's warbler is a strictly protected species which is gradually expanding its range in the UK since first breeding in Kent in 1972. With luck it may stay on and breed along the river in 2024.

The recent flooding of the meadow from the river has provided a glut of invertebrate food and as a result attracted large numbers of birds, mostly gulls, starlings and corvids (rooks

and jackdaws). These included a total of 310 black-headed gulls on 22nd October. Little grebes have been noticeable on the river and pond during these periods of high river flow.

AROUND THE CHURCH

Looking at old photographs of Nayland in the past century or so it seems most street views have not changed a great deal. However, one part of the village which was transformed in the 19th century is the area around the church. With the old school and the adjoining gas works cottage currently up for sale it is a good time to remember some of the changes in this quiet area of the village.

The relevant section of the Tithe Map of 1838, below, shows the historic area around the church where several properties have come and gone since then. Cuddon's Brewery, the large building seen south of the church, was already established by 1838

but the Church of the Sacred Heart is not to be seen, nor the School or the Gasworks. The Village Hall was not even thought of. There were several cottages shown in Newlands Lane but most of these were replaced in the 20th century.

Nayland's first school was founded in 1707 and later schools over the years occupied several different buildings around the village. The school in Church Lane was built in 1848 and remained as a school until 1957 when a new building was provided in Bear Street, the old one being sold as a private house. It seems from the 1838 map (No 149) that the site had previously been partly occupied by cottages which would have been demolished to make way for the school.

Nearby, Cuddon's Brewery was founded in the 1830s by James Cuddon. Several generations and members of this large Catholic family ran the business and the last owner, Thomas Cuddon, died in 1918. It had been taken over by the Colchester Brewery Company a few years previously but was demolished in the early 1920s, leaving the adjacent brewery house.


The Cuddon family have an important place in Nayland's history for another reason. As well as founding the brewery they were responsible for the building of the Church of the Sacred Heart in 1902 on their land in Church Lane (No 144), a short distance from the brewery. The nearest Catholic church was at Withermarsh Green and one of the Cuddon daughters was instrumental in gaining permission for a new church to be built in Nayland. After celebrating its centenary the church sadly closed in 2010 and is now a residence.

The Village Hall behind the church was built in 1972 on Webb's Meadow. This land had also been owned earlier by the Cuddons but the Webb family.

earlier by the Cuddons but the Webb family, butchers in the High Street from 1903 and previously in Birch Street, were their tenants and used it for their animals for many years so that it became known as Webb's Meadow as it still is.

The Nayland Gas works was opened in 1866 by the Ipswich Gas Company and closed around 1920 when the last owner, Mr William Hindes, established the Nayland Electric Light and Power Company at the old mill in Mill Street. The gasworks was built on what was shown as open land on the map, behind the school site, part of the meadow which in 1838 was owned by Thomas Whittaker (now Webbs Meadow).No 150 on the Tithe map was described as a cottage and yard belonging to the Nayland Feoffees. This property was sold for £40 in 1897 and was absorbed into the gas works site.

An interesting Auction Notice in 1844

describes two cottages to be sold at the White Hart on the 31st January that year. Lot 1 is No 151 on the Tithe Map and was described as a freehold double cottage and garden owned by John Lungley. The house was timber built and tiled with a large garden, a row of Victorian cottages later being built on part of the garden.


Lot 2 appears to be No 156 in Newlands Lane on the map and was described as timber built and thatched. What a pity there are no photographs of the lane at this time. There were several thatched cottages in the village in the past and now there are none, except in Wiston.

On the Tithe Map the existing Almshouses in Newlands Lane, numbered 152 to 154, were listed as being cottages owned by the Nayland Feoffees (later known as the Nayland Charities) and these were rebuilt in 1882 by George Nevard, a Nayland builder.

Some years ago I was given a picture postcard of Dijon with a Paris postmark of 1914. It was sent by the Rev William Farmiloe, Nayland Vicar at that time, to a Mrs Cole whose address was the Gas works Almshouses, Nayland. He writes: "With kindest remembrances. Hope to find you better on my return".

Today it is difficult for us to believe that this tranquil and attractive part of Nayland was once a busy industrial area with toxic fumes from the gasworks and the brewery, as well as noisy horse drawn transport moving coal and barrels of beer through what is a narrow lane. It could not have been so pleasant then, as now, for the residents or for the children at the school.

NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: November & December 2023 by David Lowe

November did not give rise to the excitement of previous months, but still had its moments.

Up until 23rd, it was broadly mild, but cooled down considerably thereafter, with two air frosts. This was sufficient to give a mean temperature of 7.5°C (7.94) for the month, a bit cooler than average.

Bright sun hours at 91.5 (82.62) were above average (third highest over the 16 year record period), as was solar energy at 2500 Ly (2208.75) second highest. Evapotranspiration was a record 24.5 mm (18.02). There was certainly plenty of water about to evaporate! 21.6 mm of rain (15.96) was the second highest daily fall over the 16 year record period.

Looking at the statistics more generally, the highest temperature was 15.4° C (16.15) and the lowest was -2.6° C (-1.95). The lowest max was 5.8° C (5.38). There were 3 air frosts (2.94) 6 ground frosts and 11 grass frosts. There were 11 days with less than 10° C (11.06) max, and 29 less than 15° C (27.56).

Highest rainfall rate was 21 mm/hr (45.88) with 2 days having over 10 mm (1.69) of rain and 1 over 20 mm (0.19). Monthly rain was 79 mm (66.63).

Mean wind speed was 5 mph (3.86) with highest gust 41 mph (35.62). Highest daily average was 9.8 mph (10.25). There were 5 days over 30 mph (2.5) 3 over 35 mph (2.5) and 1 over 40 mph. The dominant direction was WSW.

With the exception of the first week of **December**, the mild wet weather that had dominated the preceding months, continued. It wasn't surprising, then, when the 16 year annual rainfall

record, which we had been statistically homing in on for some months, went on December 12 – and now stands, at the end of the month, at 877.7 mm (previously 829.8 mm, set in 2012).

Mean temperature for the month was 8.1° C(5.67) the second highest over the 16 year record period. The highest was 15.4° C on Christmas Eve, again second highest. Lowest minimum was -2.5° C (-3.72). The lowest max was -0.3 °C (2.74) on the second, interestingly the second lowest over the record period.


There was 1 day with a mean temp of less than 0° C (2.12) 3 days less than 5° C max (5.94) and 10 days less than 10° C max (20.5). There were 4 days (7.37) with air frost and 5 each with ground (10.5) and grass frost.

Bright sun hours were 32.3(47.06) solar energy was 1240 Ly (1376.25) and evapotranspiration 20.1 mm (13.15) presumably so high because there was so much water about – together with high average temperature and wind.

Rainfall was 88 mm (62.71). Highest daily rain was 16.6mm (12.66) and highest rainfall rate 63.2 mm/hr (35.79) second equal highest. There were 3 days of over 10 mm (1.25) second highest. There has only been one December day over the record period with 20 mm +.

Mean wind speed was 7.2 mph (4.36) much the highest for December and quite probably, for all months. There were 8 days over 30 mph (3.94) 3 over 30 mph (1.19) and 1 over 40 mph (0.62). During the 4 days between the 21 and 24, the average wind speed did not drop below 10mph, which I suspect is a record. Dominant wind direction was WSW.

Dear Friends,

It is probably a bit late for 'Happy New Year', but if you are still in the New Year mode of health kicks and resolutions, I can heartily recommend a pilgrimage walk to see the earliest known depiction of St Francis of Assisi in the country. It might not be as far away from where you are reading this now as you think!

Anyone who took part in our Christmas Day, Morning Prayer service retelling, of the Nativity story will already know that 2023 was the eight hundredth anniversary of the Christmas crib. Francis of Assisi is known for his devotion to Christ, and for his commitment to making Christ's love known as widely as possible. In the winter of 1223, less than three years before his death, Francis created the first 'living' crib in the village of Greccio in the Rieti Valley of Italy.

A few weeks before Christmas in 1223, Francis persuaded a nobleman to lend him an ox, a donkey, and a stable, and invited the local population to join him. Many people came, carrying candles and torches to light their way. The manger was prepared, and hay carried in. The donkey and ox were led into the stable. To quote Thomas of Celano, the first biographer of St Francis, "Out of Greccio is made a new Bethlehem."

Every year in a field just below the hermitage of Greccio, tiers of seats are assembled, a stable is erected and the local inhabitants join the Franciscan friars in re-enacting the first Nativity. They are joined by visitors from Italy and other nations, gathering to relive the events of 1223. In towns and villages across Umbria and neighbouring regions, 'presepevivente' – a live Christmas tradition – are held, including a baby from the town being given the special honour of representing Gesú Bambino in the stable scene.

In all five of our Benefice churches, Nativity Scenes were created in December, many of which have been lovingly put together by generations past, and displayed year on year. In St Mary's Wiston, our stable scene had clay figures made some 40 or more years ago, and placed on the straw each year, with the baby Jesus arriving on Christmas morning, and the Magi a week later at our Epiphany carol service.

Around the gallery of the sanctuary church of Greccio, a permanent collection of crib scenes from around the world are displayed alongside the extensive wall paintings that illustrate scenes from Jesus' earthly ministry and the life of St Francis. While it might be a deeply spiritual place for a pilgrimage visit, as undertaken by Pope Francis, it is much easier to see fine medieval wall painting within the Dedham Vale AONB.

As is explained on the *A Church Near You* website <u>www.achurchnearyou_.com//church.2035</u> regarding Wiston Church: "dedicated to St Mary the Virgin", this small, charming eleventh century Norman church (Grade 1 listed) stands near the River Stour (AONB) with a notable ornamented south door, fine Norman chancel arch and a unique C15 font. **It is open every day for private prayer and visiting.**

Gifted to Cluniac monks in the reign of Henry I (1100-35), the interior has a cycle of wall paintings dating from about 1280 which includes an early depiction of St Francis of Assisi and an unusual nativity sequence similar to that found in Autun Cathedral (Burgundy, French Romanesque, 1120-46)."

Back in August 2019, Simon Knott at the website <u>www,suffolkchurches</u> <u>.co.uk/wissington.htm</u> wrote: "There are two major paintings on the







north wall, and they are both really quite extraordinary. One is above the former north door, and shows a large ferocious dragon. Being a later addition of the 15th Century, he is quite out of scale with the other images. At the other end of the north wall, however, is the earliest known English image of St Francis. He is shown preaching to the birds in the tree. If 1280, the estimated date for this work, is broadly correct, then this could have been painted by people who were alive in the lifetime of their subject."

Wiston's doors are always open. It is a calm and quiet place for prayer and contemplation, and it is filled with quiet, colourful treasures that have helped to share the stories of the Bible to many generations. If you do get the chance to visit, it is always worth a glance at the visitors' book. We receive such lovely comments from visitors from all corners of the globe, who are moved to record their personal discovery of this still much loved and thriving community space.

Of course, this is just one of the five magnificent church buildings you could choose to visit across our benefice, all of which have been lovingly cared for and treasured by their communities across the centuries. All five churches remain at the heart of our communities, and like St Francis and his living Nativity at Greccio, make a new Bethlehem at the turning of each year. 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
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
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
