NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

PARISH COUNCIL

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

Kevin Sheath offered to organise some leaflets promoting Council vacancies for local delivery.

PUBLIC FORUM

June Freeman explained the work done by neighbours to the Horsewatering since lockdown to improve the area and keep it looking attractive. She thanked the PC for funding 3 weedkiller treatments per year at around £50 each time but asked the PC to consider increasing their budget for the Horsewatering above £200. Due to pressures on finances it was agreed this could not be increased .

Sally Dalton asked if the PC had made enquiries with the Environment Agency to support the SCC Officer's permit application to reduce the reeds along Caley Green; they said they have offered their support to the Officer if required.

84 BUS ROUTE

The Council's support for Stoke by Nayland PC's case for making the 84 service the primary route for Sudbury to Colchester services has been submitted.

HIGHWAYS

The PC's grounds maintenance contractors have been asked to incorporate spraying the A134 by-pass islands with weed-killer twice per year into their schedule. A link has been included on the PC's website for reporting fly tipping.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **The Willows Wiston Road** [DC/24/04272] for erection of single storey rear extension or for listed building consent at **5 High Street** [DC/24/04419/20] for replacement/alteration of windows and external doors, new roof lights, internal and external alterations to rear extensions including replacement roof and render finish to rear lounge. Discharge of conditions were approved at **52 - 54 Bear Street** [DC/25/00408 for DC/24/01052] for condition 9 external lighting and at **72 - 78 Bear Street** [DC/24/05477 for DC/24/03739] part discharge of condition 3 timber frame works for gable door only and full discharge of condition 7 eaves and verges, condition 8 materials, condition 9 rainwater goods, condition 11 fenestration, condition 12 rooflight details, condition 13 mechanical ventilation and services and condition 15 details of steps.

Between meetings councillors had no objections to listed building consent at **Star House 83 Bear Street** [DC/24/04756] for removal of a fireplace, part replacement of the frontage and excavation around the fireplace to deal with an oil leak from the supply line.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at **Vine House 1 Court Street** [DC/25/00057] for construction of a shed subject to details and conditions relating to any hard surfacing/lighting scheme associated with this proposal. They had no objections to works to trees at **104 Bear Street** [DC/25/00176] to reduce 1 Lime (TPO WS233/T6) back to previous points and remove any decayed limbs or at **5 High Street** [DC/25/00244] reduce to previous pollard points 1 Beech tree, reduce mixed shrubs, reduce Bay tree to height of pagoda, trimming sides creating natural shape, reduce Dogwood to previous pruning points trimming sides creating natural shape.

COMMUNITY LED HOUSING

Tricia Fuller reported back on a meeting of the Lady Anne Windsor Charity and confirmed they are pressing ahead with a Call for Sites for Affordable Housing. The site suggested currently is on Plough Lane, Leavenheath.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

It was agreed to seek an update directly from the Environment Agency on Caley Green. James Finch agreed to seek an update from the SCC officer who made the application.

A banner erected on Caley Green without permission has been removed.

Dawn Harris and Kevin Sheath agreed to join the Tree Warden and Tree Surgeon for the Village Tree Risk Assessment on a date to be agreed.

The Independent Play Park assessor will be asked to carry out his annual inspection.

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

The annual Parish Assembly will be held on **Wednesday 30th April**. A speaker on the topic of a Neighbourhood Plan will be sought and PC reports will be delegated to each councillor as in previous years.

IN BRIEF

The village hall garden working party will be on 5th April. The village hall Roof Project is progressing well. Babergh's decision on a grant towards the roof from CIL (Commimity Infrastructure Levy) monies is due very soon.

Arrangements to review the condition of plots will be made. The allotment sub-committee will now consist of Laura Erith, Dawn Harris, Jo Reed, Tom Le Hur.

Footpaths are all very muddy but no issues have been reported. Owen Brown reported no issues at the Burial Ground

PUBLIC FORUM

lain Wright was pleased to advise that Babergh DC had granted £110,000 towards the roof replacement and upgrade works (£100K from Community Infrastructure Levy and £10K for the Community Fund. Iain was congratulated and thanked for his hard work. Documents concerning the history and ownership of the Village Hall are currently in the safe keeping of the solicitor; if and when required they can be transferred and held by the Clerk.

Sally Dalton asked if there had been any response from Matthew Lee (SCC) of James Finch regarding a EA permit to reduce the wall of reeds along Caley Green. James Finch said he will make enquiries. The Clerk will then be in a position to seek an update directly from the Environment Agency.

DISTICT COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece said further work to vegetation at the old burial ground has been carried out. The issue regarding damage to and responsibility of the old burial ground wall is ongoing.

HIGHWAYS

Dawn Harris said weeding on the A134 traffic islands by PC contractors has been authorised; Debbie Hattrell will check whether it has been carried out.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **Vine House 1 Court Street** [DC/25/00057] for construction of a shed and listed building consent at **Star House 83 Bear Street** [DC/24/04756] for removal of a fireplace, part replacement of the frontage and excavation around the fireplace to deal with an oil leak from the supply line or for works to trees at **104 Bear Street** [DC/25/00176] to reduce 1 Lime (TPO WS233/T6) back to previous points and remove any decayed limbs, and at **5 High Street** [DC/25/00255] to reduce to previous pollard points 1 Beech tree, reduce mixed shrubs, reduce Bay tree to height of pagoda, trimming sides creating natural shape, reduce Dogwood to previous pruning points trimming sides creating natural shape.



POLICE NOTICE: PARKING

Public have raised concerns over poor parking habits of some people picking up and dropping off children at Nayland Primary School, around the area of Bear Street and Harpers Estate.

The issues raised includes parking on yellow lines, parking at junctions, parking on pavements and blocking driveways.

Babergh Council Parking Enforcement Team would deal with yellow line offences (they are being alerted to the issue), but police will take action against people driving on paths (Section 34 Road Traffic Act 1988) and people parking on paths, junctions or blocking driveways (Unnecessary Obstruction).

If you are responsible for any of the above issues, please think about where and how you park. If the issue continues, I can guarantee I will be issuing traffic offence reports which would likely result in a fine. Police do not leave fines on windscreens, the notice would instead come through the post shortly afterwards.

PC 1293 Niall Johnson

Between meetings to meet Babergh's deadline councillors had no objections at **Hillside 14 Stoke Road** [DC/25/00656] for works to trees to remove six upper limbs of White Mulberry tree by 1.m to 1.5 m and lower dead branches of Oak Tree.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at **Church of St James Church Lane** [DC/25/00855] for works to trees reduce the height of T1 Liquid amber by up to 3 meters and reduce the lateral limbs to suit, to remove the low level lateral limb growing toward the neighbouring property and on a Prunes T2 fell 2 steams on the east side of the group overhanging the road.

Sam Treharne raised the issue of planning requirements regarding installation of solar panels on listed buildings. The current requirements will be looked into.

COMMUNITY LED HOUSING

Councillors heard that Graham Walker is promoting a local 'Call For Sites' for Affordable Housing. This will be included in the Community Times; details of potential land should be submitted to the Parish Clerk.

STREET LIGHTING

Gerry Battye advised that a damaged streetlight (No 24) in Elm Grove, following damage by an oil tanker, had been removed but not yet replaced. Debbie Hattrell said work was due to be completed by SCC on 12th February; she will chase this up.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

The SCC contractors who attended to the Willow damaged during Storm Darragh did return to remove the pile of large logs.

A date for a Tree Risk Assessment of trees in the village will be arranged.

The independent safety inspection of the Fairfield Playpark will be arranged; Gerry Battye said it is always helpful if he can attend to discuss findings for the report with the inspector.

ALLOTMENTS

Following recent checks on the condition of plots Dawn Harris felt some are being maintained a little better. Letters will be sent to two tenants who still are not working their plots giving notice. Having an annual allotment holders meeting was raised.

ANNUAL PARISH ASSEMBLY

A speaker with experience in creating a parish Neighbourhood Plan will be sought to attend the Parish Assembly on 30th April. Laura Erith will co-ordinate reports by delegated councillors. **IN BRIEF**

The village hall garden spring working party with be on Saturday 5th April.

The Community Council will progress installation of a public access defibrillator at Wiston; the PC will contribute half the cost.

The new level access from the allotments to Bell Meadow on footpath14 has been installed.

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting. **CHAIR'S REPORT:**

The Community Council enjoyed another worthwhile year in 2024 and this report is a good opportunity to highlight the work that the Council does in Nayland and Wiston.

THANK YOU

Thanks as always goes to all those involved in the Community Council and their many contributions. Our membership is drawn from village societies and we are grateful for their ongoing support with our events and activities and for the opportunity to be able to support them in their endeavours too. It all helps to keep Nayland the thriving and active village we know and love! Thanks to the stalwart Executive Committee: Bryan Smith, Lorraine Brooks, Claire Buller, Matt Cable, Jo Metson, Vicki Sargent, Julie Clark, Heike Ellwood and Maggie Ryan.

Special thanks to Lorraine who has been keeping us all organised for many years now and who is relinquishing her role as Secretary following this AGM. Lorraine is tireless in all she does for the Community Council and other village organisations and thankfully she will be continuing to produce the excellent Community Times as well as many of her other activities. We are very grateful for all she does and we look forward to continuing to work alongside her.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

Thank you to everybody who helps with Community Council events – it's a credit to everyone that we are able to have such a full diary, raising funds to put back into supporting village activities

Bonfire Night: Another fabulous sell-out event with over 1400 people coming along to enjoy Firework Crazy's brilliant display. We are in the process of signing them up for our 2025 display which will once again be on 5th November. Thank you as always to our many helpers at this event, including Fred Bugg for the bonfire, lain Wright for the multitude of lighting and sound equipment and general 'kit' and of course everyone who helped on the refreshments, gate and stalls. Thanks too to naylande-vents.org, Forget-Me-Not and Mill Street Store and Deli for their invaluable assistance with sales and to Mill Street Store for supplying the sausages. This is a real team effort, a fabulous community event and the Community Council's biggest fundraiser raising an amazing £4,816 in 2024.

Christmas Fayre: As always, thanks is due to all the village societies, including Woodland Corner, the Women's Institute, the Horticultural Society and the Conservation Society for providing Christmas stalls and to St James' Church and Nayland Baby and Toddler group for their children's activities. Thanks too to the external stallholders who brought a fantastic range of goods and wares to help kick start everyone's Christmas shopping. Nayland Primary School children entertained everybody performing a medley of numbers from the Polar Express and of course Father Christmas paid us a visit again for which we were very grateful. Finally, a big thank you to our refreshment team who kept everybody supplied with hot chocolate and mince pies.

Father Christmas, Christmas Eve Village Tour: It has become a tradition that Father Christmas pays the village a visit on Christmas Eve and this year was no exception with lots of families coming out to greet him on his route around the village. His mode of transport was once again George Pratt's tractor and trailer, driven by George's father Jim – thank you to them both and also to Father Christmas and his elf for turning out on such a busy day.

Christmas Trail: Started during Covid to bring some much needed Christmas cheer, our village Christmas Trail has also become a Christmas fixture. Thank you to all the households and businesses who participated in 2024, with the trees, wreaths and advent windows adding some festive fun throughout the village.

Village Christmas Tree: Thanks to Fred Smith for supplying our village tree, to Claire and the team for putting it up despite the, once again, inclement weather conditions! It looked lovely in its position at the centre of the High Street – thanks too to Nayland Dental Surgery for supplying the electricity.

Village Quiz: The Annual Village Quiz continues to be well supported with 26 teams turning out for some good-humoured competition in the 2025 guiz which has already taken place.

Public Access Defibrillator: The Community Council continues to monitor the Public Access Defibrillator located at the Village Hall, sending regular reports to the Ambulance Service through the Community Heartbeat Trust and their Webnos application. Funding was agreed in 2024 (from the Community Council and the Parish Council) to provide a further Public Access Defibrillator on Bures Road, Wiston to serve the more rural parts of the village.

Water Level Gauge: After some time on our agenda I am delighted to report that the water level gauge was installed in the river at Caley Green on 23rd July. Thanks to Danny Thurlow Landscapes for installing the gauge which provides two water level readings; local depth and height above sea level.

Permissive Footpath Maintenance: The Community Council were pleased to support the ongoing maintenance of two stretches of permissive footpath in the village; the first along the right-hand side of Stoke Road and a second stretch between Court Knoll and the Allotment Field after it was highlighted that these had become very overgrown but that regular maintenance would mean that they could be easily used year round.

Resident Volunteer List: Thanks to Lorraine Brooks for co-ordinating this list of volunteers prepared to assist residents with errands such as prescription collection.

GRANTS: One of the roles of the CC is to provide grants to village organisations whose activities support our constitution. Grants issued in 2024 were: Nayland First Responders Training Sessions £157 to cover the cost of hall hire for the CPR and defibrillator training sessions held at the Village Hall; Nayland Primary School £400 to support re-establishing music projects within school Baby and Toddler Group £300 to assist with the cost of hall hire for their sessions; Nayland First Responders £155 to cover the hall hire costs for the fundraiser featuring Anthony Roberts performing Dickens' Christmas Carol. Nayland Village Hall £10,000 towards the replacement roof project subject to National Lottery Grant approval.

GOING FORWARD

Another full programme of activities is planned for the coming year and, as always, we would be delighted to welcome some new members to help in our efforts to support our vibrant community.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Matt Cable presented the year end accounts which were adopted.

Matt Cable also gave his report on finances to 23rd February 2025: **Breakdown of profits:** Quiz £608.

Grants paid: Village Hall roof £10,000 - accrued to be paid at a later date.

Expenses:£198 for 2024 defibrillator maintenance and £112 for hall hire..

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £29,034 represented by Deposit a/c monies £11,888, Current a/c monies £16,457, Cash on Hand £688. We hold £144 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £20,000 and Lizzie's Fund £153. Therefore unencumbered assets are £8,737

Over the course of 2024, the Community Council's principal sources of income were Bonfire Night (net income of £4,852), the Community Times (£730) and the Village Calendar (£799). The Village Quiz (£664) and Christmas Fayre (£283) also made helpful contributions.

Grants were made to support Nayland Choir (£1,500), Nayland School Choir (£400), and the Baby and Toddler Group (£300).

The Community Council spent £1,045 installing a new water level gauge on the river, £900 on maintenance of paths around the village and £633 on the annual insurance that covers the various events we run. We spent £446 on the village Christmas tree and other festive activities.

At the end of the year the Community Council held £29.5k in cash, mainly in its current and deposit accounts. After net accruals of £10.9k this left unencumbered assets of £18.5k as shown in the accompanying financial statements and footnotes.

I have examined the books of The Nayland with Wissington Community Council (without carrying out an audit), and in my opinion, the accounts for 2024 represent a true and fair record of the Society's financial affairs. Maggit Ryan FCA

raised over £600 for council funds.

Community Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall which is managed by the CC. The defibrillator at the fire station has now been registered with The Circuit (the British Heart Foundation's register of Public Access Defibrillators) which is linked directly to the Ambulance Service. The defibrillator at the village hall is already linked. This is important as it means that the Ambulance Service will refer 999 callers to the closest defibrillator. Community Heartbeat Trust (CHT) have confirmed that the location by the Parish Council noticeboard on Bures Road has a good reach for access by properties in the more rural part of Wiston. The total cost is £2,695 + VAT of which the Parish Council agreed to contribute half. There is also an option for a managed service whereby the CHT supply the defibrillator minus VAT but retain ownership of it for 4 to 8 years. No specialist installer is required - the post will simply need concreting in place. Update: The Parish Council are able to claim back the VAT on this item and so will make the purchase

(Rachel will organise) and the CC will reimburse their share. Plaque for Ken Willingale: the plaque to commemorate the contribution of Ken Willingale to the CC (including the existing commemoration to his wife Olive for her contribution to HortSoc) is now in place in the HortSoc section of the village hall garden. The plan was to officially unveil it on 5th April at the VH Gardening morning but unfortunately Rachel is now going to be away and other members of the committee were unavailable. It was therefore decided that the committee should establish an alternative date.

Nayland Choir: Kathryn Niven reported that they had three very successful concerts in 2024. Their next concert on 29th March will be *Puccini's Messa di Gloria* and three short pieces with an Italian connection. They will have a summer evening of song with a light supper in July. New members are welcome.

Baby & Toddlers: Gillian Manser reported they have been busy with lots of new families attending during January and February. Their sessions to Easter will be 21st and 28th March. Royal British Legion: Robert Dossor reported on 1st May a visit to Ingatestone Hall; 1st June Pat O'Malley will continue the story of his father's exploits in the Far East. 





WATER LEVELS

There has been no real need to refer to the water level gauge at Caley Green as levels have not been outside the normal variations for the season.

Should you feel there is an issue use the above sea level measurement to report to the EA hotline, and Lorraine would be pleased to be advised in order to keep a note of incidents (details as above).

WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE

There is currently no news on water quality and testing results.

REED & VEGETATION GROWTH

The situation with reeds around the Horseshoe weir (and other areas of the river through Nayland) remains disgraceful. The EA are the riparian owners around the weir. In mid March a small army of EA people were seen looking are the Horseshoes Weir and pointing fingers; they then walked up to the sluice gates. The reason for their visit is unknown.

WILDFOWL & SWANS

As many will know the Nayland cob swan (ring No F4GV) had an injured wing and he was being monitored. As a precaution a swan expert came to examine him and revealed that he was in good

health overall but he had broken his wing and it had healed out of alignment. This was not causing him discomfort but would prevent him from flying.

Other swans have been coming and going to the river and the Meadow pond. Currently there is a pair on the pond and a lone cob on the river. There has been one serious fight which was interrupted by a brave resident. Wildlife and nature



FISHING ROD LICENCES

The closed season, when you cannot fish on rivers and streams, is 15th March to 15th June 2024.

At any time of year a valid rod licence must be carried if you are aged 13 or over and you fish for freshwater fish, smelt or eel or you could be prosecuted and you can be fined up to £2,500.

A yearly 2-rod course fishing licence costs: £35.80 for adults, £23.80 for over 66 or the disabled and is free for 13-16 year olds. 1-day or 8-day licences are also available.

Licences can be purchased at Post Offices, online at https://www.gov.uk/fishing-licence or by telephone to the Environment Agency fishing licence service on 0344 800 5386.



All craft must be registered to take to the water on any part of the Inland Waterway network of England. The Environment Agency takes enforcement action if it finds any boat moored or in use if it is not displaying a current, valid registration plate.

The **River Stour Trust** can issue craft registrations on behalf of the Environment Agency. Registered craft are permitted to travel the whole length of the Stour Navigation, from Brundon Mill to Cattawade. The annual fee (1 Apr 2025 - 31 Mar 2026) is £52.90 per private unpowered craft. Monthly and weekly licences are available.


DOG WASTE FOUND INSIDE ST JAMES' CHURCH !!!

There is no excuse! As a reminder – to others that also don't clear up after their dogs – there are plenty of dog waste bins around the village – check the map...





The dispensary will also be closed all day on Monday 14th April due to stock taking.

NEW APPOINTMENT SYSTEM

As you may or may not be aware, the Surgery has undergone a change in how patients can now book appointments. NHS England have steered the focus of General Practice in the direction of Digital Health. Digital Health in simple terms means increased access via digital avenues to access healthcare. This does not mean healthcare is exclusively delivered digitally, nor does it mean access for those who do not use the digital platforms is limited. It simply allows those who can submit requests digitally can do so from their home, workplace, during school run etc. Those who cannot access the surgery are still able to call via our phone lines and we anticipate waiting times on our phones will decrease significantly.

How to request an appointment

Simply log onto the Creffield Medical Group Website (at time of press we are still awaiting the system to be uploaded onto the NHS app). Click on the Contact us tile on the front page (RED TILE) and complete the relevant form (either Admin enquiry or medical enquiry) **Please ensure you do not add a medical query to the admin form as this may not be dealt with within timescales required**. Please include as much information as possible as this will help us to manage your request or query efficiently for you. If you telephone us, we will complete the form on your behalf.

What happens next

Once your medical enquiry has been submitted one of our Lead GP partners will view your request and mark the urgency and correct Practitioner suitable for the medical appointment, we will then send an appointment via text or phone call. This system will allow the urgency of patients medical needs be the forefront rather than the old system of "first come first served". For administrative gueries, these will go direct to our admin team.

How long will it take

We will process your request or query within 2 working days dependent on clinical urgency. If you need to see a clinician in an absolute emergency, please visit the Urgent Treatment Centre within the grounds of Colchester General Hospital. However, we are delighted to advise that most medical enquiries are processed in one day.

Feedback - This process has been in place for 2 weeks and we have had a lot of positive feedback from our patients.



Hopefully the sheep will be on Nayland Meadow by the time you read this... if not soon !!! A lot of hard work has recently gone into trimming the hedges! Enjoy. NB the hedge was not planted or tended to be a place to hang dog poo bags....

In anticipation of the new bird breeding season the nest boxes at Nayland Meadow have had their annual inspection/repairs/refurbishment. The key headlines are as follows:

- Overall we have 14 nest boxes of various types in place on site.
- Nine were occupied in 2024, compared with ten in 2023 and seven in 2022. This is a high level of occupancy and demonstrates a lack of natural nesting sites for hole nesting species.
- The boxes were likely to have been used mainly by blue tits and great tits.
- Larger nest boxes (large open front nest boxes and the barn owl box) have been used for breeding attempts by wood-pigeon/stock dove.
- Four nest boxes have been successfully used in each of the last three years. Only one nest box has not been used in any year. This will be moved at the end of the season if it again remains unused this year.

A good tip re Apps is the free Merlin Bird ID. Hear a bird, put this on and you will learn what it is. Amazing!!!

PATH IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

East of England Ambulance Service Charity

The new year means the first few monthly training sessions the volunteers must attend are set aside for them to be assessed. All our volunteers have passed their assessments, meaning they can continue responding for another year.

Our volunteer Team Leader Adam, and volunteer responder Corinne, attended their yearly Falls Training refresher course. This allows them to deploy a specialist item of equipment while conducting supplementary shifts on the North Essex CFR car. As Falls Responders they can see a reversal in their role whereby 999 ambulance crews request the CFRs to back them up,

and assist them in helping patients up from the floor who may be too frail or elderly to help themselves. After deploying the Raizer 2 lifting devices, the ambulance clinicians and/or CFRs then try to leave the patients at home (where safe to do so) and try to avoid unnecessary hospitalisation.

We will be running our free Basic Life Support sessions at Nayland Village Hall on March 25th and April 26th. 

Nayland with Wissington Crime Review 10/01/25 - 04/03/25:

Within this time frame Nayland with Wissington has suffered the following crimes: 1x Criminal Damage, 1x Garage Burglary, 1x Child Safeguarding Referral.

I have some information on fraud and scams, due to an increase of incidents targeting people in Suffolk. Put simply, fraud scam is where someone is tricked out of money by another person. I am sure most of

us have received scam calls, texts or emails attempting this. People are being called on the phone and the caller pretends to be a police officer from Suffolk Police and asks them to withdraw money. The scam can include a claim that their bank account has been compromised and/or that they want the victim to work alongside police. A person then attends their address in an attempt to collect cash. If a fraud is in progress and someone has just turned up at an address or is expected to turn up, call 999 immediately. Local police can complete any immediate actions necessary to try to safeguard the person targeted, help prevent loss and potentially catch the suspect attending the address in those crucial early stages. But if a fraud is long over and no one is in any further danger, all frauds should be reported to Action Fraud by calling 0300 123 2040 or online at www.actionfraud.police.uk. Action Fraud assess each report and determine what actions any local police force across the country need to complete and request this work, they can also look for patterns and trigger police action in relation to fraud as well.

If you get a suspected fraud call that you do not fall for and the phone number is displayed, send a text to 7726 with the phone number, your provider should then look to investigate the origin of the call and arrange to block or ban the sender if it is found to be malicious. The same goes for scam texts, forward the text to 7726 for the same process. You can report scam emails and websites to the email address report@phishing.gov.uk (screenshots of texts can also be sent there). You can also report online scam adverts to the Advertising Standards Authority, by selecting the 'Make a complaint' section on their website www.asa.org.uk. By reporting you can reduce the amount of scam contact you get, you also make yourself a harder target for scammers and it protects others from cyber crime online. According to the National Cyber Security Centre website (as of November 2024) 25 thousand phone numbers used by scammers have been removed as a result of the 7726 text service and 202 thousand website scams were removed due to reports.

The best way to protect against fraud is to be immediately suspicious and never confirm or pass personal details over the phone. Police would never be asking someone to take cash out of their account for safe keeping or to assist with an investigation. The scammer preys on peoples politeness and trust, so please do not be afraid to challenge someone robustly and stand your ground. If you want to confirm you are talking to a police officer, take the persons details and then call 101, explain the circumstances to the call taker and ask to be put through to that officer (if they exist). If the officer's name exists within Suffolk Police, there is still a chance the fraudster could simply be using that name, make sure you have properly hung up from the person before you call 101, as the suspect can sometimes hold the line open and pretend to be a police operator and in turn pretend to pass you through to a police officer.





JOIN YOUR CONSERVATION SOCIETY NEW MEMBERS ARE WELCOME

The Nayland with Wissington Conservation Society is a friendly organisation which holds several interesting speaker meetings each year as well as arranging an annual footpath walk, visits to historic houses and organising the very popular Nayland Open Gardens.

The committee would love to share our activities and knowledge with a wider audience so do take a look at what we do and consider joining us. Membership ranges from just £10 for single annual to £60 for double life membership.

The Society was founded in 1974 and since then has achieved a great deal. Perhaps most notable was the purchase in 2005 of the seventeen acre field beside the River Stour; this can now be enjoyed by parish residents in perpetuity. We have organised test pit digs in numerous locations around the village for research by Cambridge University and a major archaeological excavation in the village at Court Knoll which is an ancient monument. The Society has commissioned four very interesting books on the history of the parish and has a huge archive of historic photographs which can also be viewed online.

NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: January & February 2025 by David Lowe

January had an average mean temperature but was wetter than normal. Sun hours were a little below average. It was cold enough between the 11th and 12th to permit extensive ice to form - with ice skating possible on the 12th on shallow, flooded fields.

Mean temperature was 4.2° C (4.45) with a max of 12.9° C (12.75) and min of -5.6° C (- 4.8). There were 13 days each with grass and ground frost (average 14.37 ground) and 7 air frosts (9.62).

There were no days when the temperature failed to reach 0° C (0.23) with a max of less than 5° C recorded on 11 days (9.25) and 25, less than 10° C (23.75).

Bright sunhours were 63.5 (66.09) solar energy was 1840 Ly (1833.75) and evapotranspiration 11.8 mm (15.81) less than half as much as last year.

Monthly rain was 74 mm (51.3) with the highest rainfall in a day of 24.4 mm (the highest in December recorded over the 17 year record period.) There was 1 day over 10mm (1.19) and a highest rainfall rate of 39.2 mm/hr (38.26).

Average wind speed was 4.2 mph (4.51) with highest gust of 40 mph (38.59). There were 5 days with gusts over 30 mph (4.87) 4 over 35 mph (2). The dominant direction was WSW.

You will see on the monthly spreadsheet that some of the stats have a blue background. This is because the 2014 entry is missing because of a station breakdown at the time. Some of the earlier years' averages may be inaccurate because of this.

My memory of **February** is of a cloudy and cold month, but reviewing the statistics shows that while sunshine was below average, 5 years out of the last 17 had less, with 2011 having very much less; the mean temperature of 5.4 °C compares with the 17 year average of 5.42 °C.

The highest temperature was 16.1 $^{\circ}$ C (14.52) and lowest, -2.7 $^{\circ}$ C (-3.3). The lowest maximum was 4.5 $^{\circ}$ C (3.32). The highest dewpoint was 12.2 $^{\circ}$ C (10.86) and lowest -3.3 $^{\circ}$ C (-4.27).


There were no days with -5 min or less and only 3 air frosts (6.23) 6 ground (10.29) and 10 grass. There were no days on which 0 °C was reached (0.29) 0 when 5 °C wasn't reached (5.23) but 20 when 10 °C wasn't reached (15.82). 15 °C was only exceeded once (27.59)101.5

Bright sun hours were (118.29) solar energy 2760 Ly (3124.41) and evapotranspiration 18.9 mm (25.31 mm).

Rainfall was below average at 40.4 mm (45.51 with no days of 10 mm or more. (Over the 17 year record period, there has never been a day with 20 mm or more). Highest rainfall rate was 24 mm/hr (29.63).

Mean wind speed was 4.8 mph (5.2) with 2 days (4.06) with gusts over 30 mph (none higher). Highest daily average was 13.8 (11.74) while the dominant direction was south.

THE NAYLAND LAWN TENNIS CLUB

Now that Spring is here many people will be looking forward to playing outdoor sports. Photographs and records exist of the many Nayland sports events and clubs which have come and gone in days gone by and one of these was tennis.

Some of the larger houses here have always had their own courts including the old Victorian Vicarage off Bear Street (now Nayland House Care Home) where years ago the vicar, his family and friends played. However, in the 1920s a village tennis club was formed. The earliest known reference to the club was in the Parish Magazine of March 1923 in which there was an item about the Nayland Tennis Club "which hopes to commence playing on the 1st of May". It seems the club was set up and ran smoothly until July 1924 after which the magazine references peter out. Where the club originally met is not known but in the December 1924 edition of the magazine the Honorary Secretary of the club, Mr G Taylor, wrote: "It seems a great pity that a club ... should be in danger of falling through for want of a ground. It is hardly necessary to state that we would be willing to pay a fair rental".

Whether a place to play was found at this time we do not know but on the 5th May 1932 a newly formed Nayland Lawn Tennis Club held its first annual general meeting under the chairmanship of Colonel Rundall and this venture proved much more of a success, lasting until the middle of the Second World War. By this time the club was playing on a court near the allotment field in Candy Lane which was then called Lye Lane.

In that first year the club held a tennis tournament and in the Men's Singles

competition a medal was won by 18 year old Ewart James Russell who lived at Wiston. His father was manager of the farm at the East Anglian Sanatorium. A few years ago Ewart's sons, David and Bob Russell who spent their early childhoods living in Nayland, very kindly donated the medal their father had won to the village archives.

I also have two cups from this period of the tennis club, one for the ladies' singles and one from the men's singles. One of these cups was presented by Dr Slade, Nayland's GP at that time, and the other by Mrs Violet Walsh who lived at Stourbank. She and her husband Captain Walsh were keen supporters of village activities in Nayland for many years.

A brochure of the club's Rules and Regulations states that Members would consist of (a) Ordinary or Full members and (b) Junior members between 12 and 16 years. Annual Subscriptions were 5/- for Ordinary Members and 3/6d for Junior Members.

It seems there was a lapse again after the war but the club was reformed on 3rd of July 1952 with Major Barlow as Chairman, although it appears to have wound up about a year later.

In more recent years, during the 1990s, residents lobbied the Parish Council for the provision of a public tennis court. Again, the problem was finding a suitable site. Webb's Meadow was a popular choice but after much time and effort by the Council it was decided this would not be suitable, much to everyone's disappointment. So, will Nayland ever have another tennis club?

Annual General Meeting: 3rd March **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**

Our grateful thanks go to the late Peter Mann for his diligence in managing the village hall finances and to his widow, Anna, for her continued support while we are attempting to change the banking parameters with Santander Bank. This has been a very difficult year, not only due to the sudden death of our late Treasurer, Peter Mann, but also in dealing with the various different people at the National Lottery, causing the application to be re-submitted.

In addition to that Santander Bank has proved to be extremely difficult a) in removing Peter Mann and b) to move to on-line banking. Hopefully the latter is nearly resolved.

A further complication was the fact that the National Lottery insisted that not only was the property and Webb's Meadow registered but also the Lease. This is on-going.

Our grateful thanks are due to all of the people who hire the hall, especially those organisations from within the village and its immediate neighbours.

The VHMC has benefitted from additional sources of funding during the year. We are grateful to Terri Bannister, Gale Scott and the team for enabling the village lunches to take place. The village cinema, run by Karen and her team, is going from strength to strength with the option of supper before the start of the film; we are grateful to all involved.

Our grateful thanks also extend to our cleaning team, headed by Amy Christy and assisted by Sara Smith, for keeping the hall presentable to a reasonable standard for incoming users.

The VHMC are grateful for all the promised donations to ensure that the re-roofing and photovoltaic panels will take place. The current donations include: £60,000 Parish Council (PC); £20,000 Community Council; £10,000 each from Green Energy Nayland, the Village Players, Horticultural Society, Conservation Society and from Suffolk CC Locality Budget; together with other personal donations.

We have received a significant grant from the National Lottery of £275,305 and Babergh DC has agreed to contribute £110,000 (£100K from Community Infrastructure Levy and £10K for the Community Fund).

The construction costs for the re roofing are in the region of £475,000. There are also additional costs for the professional services of the Architect, the Principal Designer, under the Construction and Design Management Regulation, the Quantity Surveyor.

In addition, as part of the National Lottery requirements, we have had to register the Title of the property and our Lease. The PC is in the process of registering the Title because they are the landowners; the VHMC being the tenants.

TREASURER'S REPORT

As the VHMC has no Treasurer, the Chairman presented the accounts which were prepared by a chartered accountant. The hall made a small profit of £1,095 last year; this was a direct result of the village cinema and the village lunches; the committee is grateful to those involved.

The hire charges cannot sustain the village hall which is now over 50 years old and will require regular to keep it in good condition; it has been decided to raise the hire costs by 5% from 1st May.

With regard to the roof replacement costs there are significant additional legal costs for dealing with property registration and to meet National Lottery's and any other conditions. The total anticipated project cost is

£547,851.75 which includes allowances for contingencies. We have benefitted from both grants and services 'in kind' to enable the lottery match funding criteria to be met. Our grateful thanks go to all those involved. Being cautiously optimistic, we hope to start the installation of the PV panels and re-roofing in April of this year.

LADY ANNE WINDSOR CHARITY

The charitable purpose of the Lady Anne Windsor Charity (LAWC) is to provide for local housing need in the Stoke by Nayland, Nayland and Leavenheath area.

LAWC has owned and made available the almshouses on The Downs in Stoke by Nayland since they were built around 1608. Planning permission has recently been granted for a major remodelling to provide accommodation for the 21st century while respecting the historic building.

LAWC also owns a field at the western end of Plough Lane, close to the A134. This presents a unique opportunity to develop new accommodation on this site to meet local needs. The principle of developing community-managed almshouses on this site has support from the Leavenheath and Nayland with Wissington Parish Councils.

Our intent aligns with Babergh Policy LP07 (Community-led and rural exception housing). Discussions are ongoing with BDC Strategic Housing, a Rural and Community Housing Enabler and District Councillors.

LAWC is regulated by the Charity Commission to ensure that all the accommodation developed on the site to meet specific local housing needs will remain in the ownership of the charity, and devoted to local housing needs, in perpetuity.



Lent, Holy Week and Easter.

This is an important season that comes in the rhythm of Christian life every year. It looks very familiar to us as we all have some knowledge or experience of it. Through family, school, society, news or our own belief, we all have a certain understanding of what it is. Some of us take it as a good opportunity to discipline themselves on a critical topic, others regard it as a pivotal moment of their spiritual life, some are completely indifferent about it.

As always it is important to get back to the basics to review our attitude towards this season.

- Lent: Lent is a reflective season to prepare ourselves for the Holy Week and the celebrations of Easter. It is a time of selfdiscipline where we want to get closer to God by abstaining from frivolous things that can distract us and by focusing on the study of the Scriptures and the service of the poor.
- The Holy Week: From Palm Sunday to Good Friday, we reenact the events that happened between the recognition of Jesus as the Messiah and Christ towards his crucifixion.
- Easter: The affirmation that the tomb was empty, that Christ is risen again and that women were the witnesses of this event and that Jesus visited his disciples.

Now what do we do with that? How is it relevant to us as an individual, as a community, as human beings?

As individual, the experience of Lent is a moment of realisation that we should be liberated from everything that distract ourselves from what is important in life. Putting down our smartphones to look our neighbour in the eyes. Stop thinking about money, carrier, achievement, success to spend more time with family and friends, to open our heart to the poor and the stranger. Educating ourselves reading books instead of fuelling our anxiety with news on media and social networks. Etc... And most important of all, instead of complaining about our violent and selfish world, changing it with our everyday charity and kindness.

- As a community, commemorating together the Holy Week to be connected with history. This moment two thousand years ago when people realised Jesus was the long waited Messiah because he was feeding us, healing us, teaching us, comforting us, making us feel worthy. And then rejecting him, because he refused to lead an army, cease power, conquer territories to give us glory. How much have we got to learn our lessons from history and be humble!
- As human beings, Easter / the Resurrection, this extraordinary event makes us realise that violence is never the solution and that love will always triumph. This teaches humanity that we should stop admiring autocrats, dictators, mighty leaders, successful businessmen and start valuing those who are quietly making this world a better place through caring, teaching, empowering, sharing, comforting, fighting only for justice not for greed, glory or power.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ, reflecting on this extraordinary season we are celebrating, let us be vigilant to pick the real fight as Christians. It is not about abortion, sexual morality, bums on the pews or definition of gender. It is all about what Jesus showed us: feed the poor, heal the sick, liberate the captive, give sight to the blind and proclaim the Good News.

Because Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!



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
