# 80TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE END OF WW2

The end of World War II Commemoration in Nayland Village Hall on Sunday 31st August, for which tickets are now on sale at www.naylandevents.org. It will be an evening of music, songs and readings, featuring Breckland Brass Band and Wattisham Military Wives Choir, and will include a themed supper - see advert on page 15. This will be a fundraiser for the Poppy Appeal.

The Second World War, fought from 1939 to 1945, was the deadliest war in history and involved more than 30 countries around the globe. More than 50 million people lost their lives during the war. Lest we forget.

The war began in Europe on 1st September 1939, when Germany invaded Poland. Great Britain and France responded by declaring war on Germany. The war between the USSR and Germany began in 1941 with the German invasion of the Soviet Union. The war in the Pacific began in 1941 when Japan attacked the American Naval base at Pearl Harbour and other American, Dutch, and British military installations throughout Asia.

World War II officially ended in Europe after Allied armies converged on Berlin in 1945, Adolf Hitler committed suicide and Germany surrendered on 8th May 1945; this was known as Victory in Europe Day (VE Day). The conflict continued with Japan until the formal signing of the surrender by Japan on 2nd September, aboard the United States' battleship Missouri anchored in Tokyo Bay.

#### **PARISH COUNCIL**

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

Parish Footpath Warden: Vacancy. There have been a couple

of enquiries but no volunteer as yet.

Dawn Harris was elected to continue as Vice Chair. In the absence of the Chair at meetings other councillors will rotate in chairing to give them experience in the role.

#### **PUBLIC FORUM**

Mike Hunter, on the subject of the route of footpaths 26 and GH2, advised he had forwarded updates to the PC. Councillors thanked him for pursuing this issue.

## **DISTICT COUNCILLOR**

Isabelle Reece had reported that John Ward will lead the Green, Independent and Liberal Democrat coalition administration for the next year - the rotation in leadership is a part of the coalition agreement. Isabelle was appointed to the Planning Committee and will continue on the Dedham Vale National Landscape & Stour Valley Joint Advisory Committee & Partnership.

The Government plans, for all district, borough and county councils to be replaced in 2028 by new unitary councils continue to be a priority across the whole County. The Government Consultation of Devolution has now closed, and feedback is awaited. The district and borough councils have just launched a survey asking people for their views on local government reorganisation in Suffolk.

## **HIGHWAYS**

James Finch said he has reported the poor surface of Bear Street. Dawn Harris raised the resurfacing of the A134 as only one side was done, the other side was left.

It was agreed to see if a Highways Representative could come to a future PC meeting in view of on-going strict prioritisation and therefore slow response times to issues.

## **FINANCE**

A quotation for the playpark fencing was approved and some additional work to make the fence secure.

Adoption of the Model Publication Scheme with a table tailoring the document for our purposes was agreed. The new document will be available on the PC website.

#### **PLANNING**

Councillors heard Babergh's decision on discharge of conditions at Site Adjacent Paddock Grove [DC/25/01267] relating to DC/22/06294 were approved for biodiversity but refused for landscaping scheme. A week later for Nags Corner Wiston Road (aka Site Adjacent Paddock Grove) [DC/25/02421] relating to DC/22/06294 the condition for landscaping scheme was approved.

The Appeal against refusal for retention of bracket without pub sign at 11 High Street (previously the White Hart) [DC/24/04395] was dismissed.

Between meetings to meet Babergh's deadline councillors had no objections at 25 Stoke Road [DC/25/01526] for erection of a two storey side extension including conversion of existing garage subject to advice from the Heritage Team in view of the heritage streetscape surrounding the application site or at Blincoes Newlands Lane [DC/25/01814] for erection of single storey extension, solar panels, air source heat pumps and associated landscaping subject to advice from the Heritage Team.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at 6 Willow Grove [DC/25/02488] for works to trees to reduce the height of a Silver Birch by up to 3m and reduce lateral limbs or at Sargents Farm Bures Road [DC/25/02344] for erection of ground mounted 16 panel solar array, to north of existing buildings subject to qualification of the size of the proposal.

It was agreed to discuss an item in the public interest in committee after the PC Meeting.

#### **HOUSING NEEDS - NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING**

The new government housing targets were discussed which have been divided into the various parishes. This does not consider flood risks or protected status. However, there is pressure to have some influence by the Parish as to where development will happen. A Housing Needs Survey would help evidence the need and potentially pro-actively fulfil some of our obligations as a Parish. However, that does create more cost and work. It was agreed for Owen Brown and Tricia Fuller to form a working group to investigate this further between meetings.

#### **CALEY GREEN**

Information regarding the wooden revetment at Caley Green has not been forthcoming from the SCC Properties Officer dealing with this; it was agreed Kevin Sheath would contact the officer. It has been confirmed that permission in relation to the reed cutting doesn't need Environment Agency permission; this should take place as soon as possible after 1st September.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

A termination letter for neglected plots has been drafted. There is not currently a waiting list. Allotment tenants have set up a WhatsApp group for general allotment chat. The Allotment judge for the Best Kept Allotment has been approached and dates are being considered. Laura Erith will arrange removal of a wasp nest in the shed on plot 8A. The Allotment Sub Committee noted the need to review fencing.

## FREQUENCY OF PC MEETINGS

Councillors discussed the possibility of reducing meetings to 6 per year - July, September, November, January, March and May. It was agreed to include on the agenda for the July meeting for a decision. The Clerk explained Leavenheath PC are trialling a similar arrangement for a year. The Clerk was asked whether it would create more work in respect of administration. She confirmed for Leavenheath it is early stages, so the PC were learning as they go. The arrangement is more work in some respects and less in others.

The Community Council are progressing with provision of a community access defibrillator at Wiston. The Invoice for the defibrillator has been paid in full by the PC and the CC have been asked for their contribution.

The PC have issued their contribution towards the Village

# DRUMATHON IN AID OF LIZZIE'S FUND

George Romer-Lee is raising money for The Brain Tumour Charity on 31st October at Nayland Village Hall.

#### George's story:

When I was 3 years old, I became special friends with Lizzie Bramall. We got on really well and shared many memories together such as performing together in school plays (we were police officers!), enjoying music together, being in the same classes and going to Church together.

On Valentine's Day 2018, I had a visit from Mark Bramall, hand-delivering a Valentine's Card to me (aged 9) from his daughter Lizzie (also aged 9)... with the earth-shattering news that just a few days before, beautiful Lizzie had been diagnosed with a catastrophic, inoperable brain tumour of the brainstem (DIPG - Diffuse Intrinsic Pontine Glioma). DIPG affects around 25 children in the UK each year, with an average life expectancy from diagnosis of just 9 months.

Indeed, just 9 short months later, on 15th November, Lizzie tragically lost her battle to this brutal disease. She died in her parents' arms... only a week before her 10th Birthday.

In memory of Lizzie, I have chosen to play the drums, non-stop for 12 hours. There will be different sessions to keep me going and to keep the crowd flowing. They will include: Lunchtime Jazz and Easy Listening (being a rock drummer, this will be a challenge in itself), workshops for young enthusiasts, Trick or Treat hour (Halloween-themed rock) and the final countdown (playing whatever I can with the little energy I have left in the tank)! Friends are welcome to bring an amplifier and their instrument and jam along with me. **See details on the Drumathon on page 13**

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

**Executive Committee:** As always new members would be welcome to join the team.

**Fundraising Activities/Events:** Ideas and potential dates were discussed for the 60th Anniversary celebrations of the Community Council in 2026. Ideas included barn dance in the village hall with dancing or picnic at the village hall with local musicians. Rachel Hitchcock will identify appropriate dates and circulate for committee's consideration.

**Public Access Defibrillator:** Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. A new community defibrillator to be installed in Wiston has been delivered to Rachel Hitchcock. Installation has been agreed with Danny Thurlow; they will meet with Adam Lunn and Corinne Spooner of the First Responders (who will monitor the defibrillator) to identify the exact location.

Note: the Parish Council noticeboard adjacent to the proposed site for the defibrillator looks in need of some repair. Rachel will contact the PC. The CC noticeboard in High Street may also require repairs.

**Village Hall Gardening Morning:** the autumn tidy will be on Saturday 25th October - as usual refreshments provided, it is a friendly morning, please come along if you can (work on the VH roof begins 7th July for 26 weeks but it will not affect most areas of the gardens).

Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation in village groups and events welcome. If village groups have any vacancies on their committees or for volunteers please let Lorraine know so they can be promoted in the Community Times Volunteer Vacancies article.

**Resident Volunteer List:** This is a list of residents prepared to assist other residents who at times are unable to get out for themselves and would benefit from having a prescription collected, an errand run or some shopping dropped off. If anyone requires assistance or could give assistance if needed please contact Lorraine Brooks.

Permissive Path Improvements: The CC continues to monitor vegetation growth on two stretches of permissive footpath (Stoke Road and Court Knoll to the Allotment Field) and will call Dan Bowman back when needed to cut back the hedges (being mindful of restrictions due to nesting birds). It was noted that the nettles on the Court Knoll stretch are very overgrown. We also continue to monitor the stretch of path between Court Knoll and the allotments that get particularly wet which may benefit from Bodpave installation. Tendring Hall Estate has said that they approve of the bodpave solution. and would be prepared to contribute £1000 towards the project. Rachel has replied to say that this is a really positive offer but that the remaining funds will need to be sourced and the success of the bodpave on the Nayland meadow monitored – we will go back to them if/ when ready to proceed with this.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT:

Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 30th June 2025:

**Breakdown of profits:** Quiz £533, Community Times £585, Calendar £380.

**Grants paid:** Village Hall roof £10,000, Horse Watering £200. **Expenses:**£198 for 2024 defibrillator maintenance and £112 for hall hire.

**Current Position:** The accounts show reserves of £10,043 represented by Current a/c monies £9,250 and Cash on Hand £793. We hold £177 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: Horse Watering area £8 and Lizzie's Fund £153.

Therefore unencumbered assets are £9,706. GRANTS & DONATIONS:

During the morning, at 11.15am, there will be a short memorial service in St James' Church.

**Community Times & Websites:** Lorraine Brooks expressed thanks as always to all contributors.

**Village Calendar:** Lorraine Brooks reported the 2026 calendar has been produced and has gone to print (225 copies). Posters promoting sales have been produced. Sales will as usual begin at the Flower Show on 2nd August and Wendy Sparrow will manage sales at village shops. Claire Buller confirmed 12 parish businesses kindly sponsored the calendar.

Claire will attend Woodland Corner's Inflatable Day on 13th September with calendars for sale; there will be no October cake sale. She will notify committees of other events and seek volunteers who may be able to help with calendar sales. The CC will not have a Halloween sale of Bonfire Night tickets as all sales will be online. Although enjoyable, alongside Nayland Bear's Halloween display this generated very limited sales.

# **FORTHCOMING ACTIVITIES:**

Bonfire & Fireworks: *Tuesday 5th November.* Rachel Hitchcock, Claire Buller & Jo Metson leading. Firework Crazy is booked. The Executive committee reviewed and approved new prices proposed by Matt Cable as circulated prior to meeting including comparison table with other local firework displays. New prices proposed are Family £18, Adult (over 16) £8 and Child £3. For a family of 4, the increase is only £2 (12.5%). For a family of 5 there would be no increase. For individual adults the increase is bigger at £2 (33%). For an individual child the increase is £1 (50%). From the comparison table with other local displays this pricing would leave us about average on the adult price but still good value for families and children.

It was also agreed that no paper tickets will be printed as now all online. Anyone who is unable to get online will be able to contact committee member for assistance in ticket purchase. # WORK ON THE VILLAGE HALL ROOF HAS BEGUN



The works to your Village Hall roof upgrade have started with the erection of the access scaffolding which will not only provide a temporary roof covering but enable safe access for the works to be carried out. The anticipated completion of the Scaffold is around the end of July/early August.

When the temporary roof is complete the existing concrete tiles will be removed, the membrane placed between the rafters and additional insulation provided. Then to increase the thermal performance of the roof construction another layer of insulation will be provided, this layer also has a membrane on top. The battens to support the Welsh slates will be installed together with the framing for the Photovoltaic (PV) Panels. The roof is now watertight and the temporary covering and the upper scaffolding will be removed in November. The PV panels will be installed, together with new external downlighters to hopefully achieve a contribution to the previously agreed dark sky policy within the Village Hall environs. The roof project is not only designed to achieve better thermal performance but also there is an improvement in the acoustic performance resulting in a substantial reduction in sound escaping through the roof.

The teleporter movements will be supervised by a suitably qualified banksman. Please be aware when the movements are taking place and your VH is being used.

Your Village Hall will remain open with all but one of the fire exits available. The changing room and the side passage are closed for the duration of the works. During the scaffolding operations of erection and dismantling the use of the car park will be restricted, please be accommodating and try not to obstruct the Builder's movement of materials. Building work generally stops at 4.30pm each day Monday to Friday. Some work on Saturday mornings may be required.

We are grateful to the Parish Council grass cutting contractor for maintaining the path width for walkers and their dogs. With a possibility of grant funding they are in the very early stages of considering a proposal for the erection of a viewing platform over the pond alongside the existing path. This would allow, and encourage, much improved observation of pond life. A proportion of the reeds would need to be removed to allow a worthwhile viewing experience.





# **RIVER WATCH**

#### WATER LEVELS

Well, the summer heatwave and low rainfall have taken a toll on the river. Water levels have been low and the weir has been looking a sorry state.

In Wiston it's reported that the levels have been about a foot lower than usual much of the season.

With low rainfall nationally and hosepipe bans likely the Ely Ouse to Essex Transfer Scheme (EOETS) which since 2015 has brought water from Denver in Norfolk to Abberton Reservoir is probably currently suspended. The very wet winter would have helped groundwater aquifers, which act as natural reservoirs, recharge.

Aquifers can slowly release water into rivers, helping to maintain river flows, especially during dry periods; a phenomenon known as baseflow. This may have - so far at least - helped avoid a reoccurrence of 2019 when sections of the river through Nayland dried up and fish needed to be rescued.

# **WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE**

There is currently no news on water quality and testing.

## **REED & VEGETATION GROWTH**

The situation with reeds around the Horseshoe weir (and other areas of the river through Nayland) remains disgraceful. The EA are the riparian owners around the weir.

The EA contractors did come along in Truxors to undertake an annual weed scoop. Some have complained it has made little difference in improving navigation.

## THE LONG REED BED AT CALEY GREEN

After several years of lobbying there is good news - hopefully. Suffolk CC, riparian owners at Caley Green, have instructed a river engineer to cut the reeds at Caley Green. The SCC Properties Officer said this should take place as early as possible after 1st September, once birds have finished nesting. Of course we were at this point in February, until at the eleventh hour a complaint was made.

Note that the reeds will only be cut, not pulled, so they will grow back. They have created reed beds and made the water shallow. Reeds thrive in shallow and silted up rivers - you will notice there isn't a reed problem above the sluice gates where the river is deeper.

# WILDFOWL & SWANS

Swan activity has been very strange, certainly not the predictable behaviour, much appreciated by residents, of the past. Once again we have not had a resident pair of swans nesting in Nayland.

Swans, lone and pairs, have come and gone on the river and the Meadow pond; in the spring there was the odd scuffle for territory but no residency materialised. There were delighted reports that a pair of swans with five cygnets arrived on the Nayland stretch of the river on 5th June; it is thought they may have nested upriver of the A134. However, they have not remained here all the time.

On 17th June there were reports of ducklings holding up traffic on the A134. The next day the family of swans with five cygnets were walking along the A134 at the top of Harper's Hill. And on 8th July two reports of ducklings at the lower end on Harper's Hill, which were ushered to the river. There have been suggestions that the river, which has a resident heron waiting to pick prey off, is not safe to raise ducklings so ducks are more frequently nesting elsewhere. The heron has also been targeting young moorhens. The young waterfowl have other predators too, above and below the water.



## BANK EROSION AT CALEY GREEN

These photos, taken from 2019-25, reveal the erosion in recent years.

Many residents will recall the efforts of the Parish Council and Save Caley Green Campaign, with advice from several local river engineers, to come up with a solution to future erosion which was practical and maintained residents' enjoyment of the area.

The consensus of opinion was to install replacement wooden revetment round the whole of the bay area. The PC passed this information on to the SCC. That was in June 2023.

Since then Suffolk CC agreed to action and fund the project. The current situation is that, rather than use local river engineers SCC are employing one of their large contractors to take the project forward. The properties officer said "the brief they have been given is to come up with a design to solve the erosion problem and that may not be wooden revetment".

This seemed concerning, bearing in mind the controversy around other forms of revetment that had previously been considered. However, he added that he does not want to do something that is not wanted. So we need to watch that space carefully.

# **TAWNY OWL**

On 3rd July this injured tawny owl was found on the edge of Nayland village. Luckily it was reported to Colchester Owl Rescue. Katrina Myers has provided a 24hr service for Owls and Birds of Prey for the last 25 years; where at all possible the birds are treated, rehabilitated and released back to the area they came from

Katrina confirmed "The tawny owl from Nayland had been hit by a vehicle and suffered head trauma and concussion, had a tender left wing and was unable to feed herself. She was given some pain relief, medication and some food. After a few days she began feeding herself again and will be back to Nayland after about a week's recuperation."

On 30th March another Tawny owl was not so lucky when it was found dead on Bear Street, near the school, early in the morning. It was moved to Caley Green where children arriving for school would not be confronted with the body. It was reported to DEFRA. This too was likely to have been a casualty of a traffic collision the night before.

Owls, especially tawnies are nocturnal and can be very hard to see and avoid when driving. A good 75 % of casualties are vehicle related, some are very lucky and just suffer with concussion and if not properly cared for will starve to death.

Others suffer with broken bones/wings; the whereabouts of the break usually determines whether return to the wild will be possible.

# What a difference a year makes

Thank you to Mike Hunter for these photos of the delightful ox-eye daisies which light up the meadow on the valley side; left taken this year, right taken in 2024. Although still very impressive the display didn't last quite as long this year - perhaps due to the heatwave and drought conditions.

The flock of gulls, which swooped down each evening last year to feast on flying ants, were only seen a few times and in very small numbers... could the weather have caused the change? This phenomenon is quite commonly seen in the warmth of summer when ants produce a brood of fertile winged offspring which fly off to form new nests, often in mid July. The ants contain formic acid, which can cause gulls to 'trip on acid' and appear drunk after eating them. Gulls get very excited over ant treats!

We always welcome guests and new members to our meetings - keep an eye on the WI noticeboard in Nayland High Street for details or in your Community Times.




# **NAYLAND CINEMA**



It has been hot ..... and I am guessing we will see and feel even hotter yet this year. Attached is a photograph of the sheep happy in the shade of the shade cover at Nayland Meadow. Suitable shade prevents heat stress in animals. It is a necessity not a luxury: it does not need to be complicated or elaborate. Nature usually provides it but when fenced humans need to.

Signs of heat stress including panting, open mouth breathing and lethargy. So please be vigilant: you are always our best eyes and ears. Around the meadow are signs giving the shepherd's mobile number so anyone can alert him to any issues. It is

always better to call than ignore.

So that said I am delighted to be able to report that in the last two months we have had two separate offers of

rolls of bamboo from local people's gardens. This has been wired on expanding the existing sheep shade. Great thinking, great recycling and great Naylanders!

Although the riverside path is still readily usable, the reseeding has not been the success we hoped for. This is due to the prolonged spell of warm and dry weather. Far more successful has been the wildflower mix we planted alongside the path with a wonderful display of wild flowers and very energetic cow parsley over six foot tall! We are grateful to the Parish Council grass cutting contractor, Chris Mortimer, for maintaining the path width for walkers and their dogs.

We are investigating with others possible funding for the erection of a viewing platform by the pond alongside the existing path. This would facilitate improved observation of pond and bird life for young and old alike. An area of the reeds would be removed to give a worthwhile viewing experience as well as enhancing sheep access to water.. Watch this space...

Suffolk has 28 separate Community First Responder groups. In May 2025 the Nayland CFR group combined time that our volunteers were booked on for was 229.2 hours, making us the 7th most booked on group. May and June numbers; 391 hours booked on duty by our volunteers and 10 calls were attended.

At the recent Community Council meeting Adam Lunn and Corinne Spooner demonstrated the lifting chair and explained how in certain circumstances it can prevent the patient waiting for an ambulance and hospital admission. The first responder group are currently raising funds for the chair.

## Nayland with Wissington Crime Review May and June 2025:

1x Assault, 2x Adult welfare referrals.

I have recently dealt with an incident involving primary school children, the creation of a WhatsApp group which grew to over 100 users, and then people within the group sharing an inappropriate image of a naked man and an indecent image of two children. This incident highlights the importance of discussing

the pitfalls children can fall into when it comes to youth-produced sexual imagery.

Children seem to be getting mobile phones at younger ages than ever before. According to Ofcom, 90% of children own a mobile phone by age 11, and three-quarters of children aged 8–17 have social media accounts - despite most platforms requiring users to be at least 13 (including WhatsApp). Smartphones can obviously take images and record video. The creation, possession, or distribution of indecent images of anyone under 18 is a criminal offence. Even if the image is self-generated and shared consensually between peers, it can still result in police involvement and, in severe cases, prosecution. Many cases involving children are handled with education and safeguarding in mind. The legal framework exists to protect children from exploitation and long-term harm.

To help your child avoid this issue, it is essential to have an open conversation with them about digital safety, privacy, and the permanence of online actions. Tools like parental controls and family media agreements can also help set boundaries. Explain to them how it is against the law for them to take an image of their own private areas—even if they simply retain it on their own phone (this constitutes possession of an indecent image of a child). As soon as it is shared, it becomes a distribution offence. If any of these types of images are on their phone, make sure they are deleted.

When authorities become aware of these incidents, crimes may be recorded, and an investigation begins to determine whether education or enforcement is required. Police also ensure there is no exploitation, coercion, or threats involved. If an adult is involved, it is dealt with robustly.

With all that in mind, please also check the settings on their social media and WhatsApp. There are settings within WhatsApp that prevent your child from being added into a group without their permission.

If you are concerned about a child sharing this type of image with yours, delete the image(s) and report it to the police. If there is any coercion, threat, or an adult is involved, retain everything until police can advise. Never transfer the content to your own phone, as even with the best intentions, you would then be in possession of an indecent image of a child, which, as previously explained, is against the law.#

# NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: May & June 2025 by David Lowe

May was a dry, warm and sunny month as a result of the weather being dominated by high pressure. However, no records over the 17 year record period were broken. This was probably due to winds being off the cold North Sea – which also resulted in increased cloud cover, compared to most other parts of the country.

Mean temperature was 14.1°C (12.59). 2024 was actually higher at 14.3°C, but 2025 was second highest over the record period. Max temp was 27°C (23.75) somewhat oddly, on the first of the month. This was behind 2020 at 27.2°C. Lowest temp was 3.2°C (1.75) and lowest max was 13.6°C (12.59). Frost was limited to one day with grass frost.

There were no days when 10°C wasn't reached, 6 when 15°C wasn't reached (7.82 and 15 when 20°C wasn't reached (23.18).

Bright sun hours were 355 (338.08) beaten by 2020 which had 375.2. Solar energy was 12400 Ly (12797) well down the high scale, led by 2020 with 16750.

Monthly rainfall was 22 mm (50.24) with highest rainfall rate at 53.6 mm/hr (42.77). There were no days of 10 mm or more. Evapotranspiration was 121 mm (95.59) behind 147.5 in 2020.


Mean wind strength was 5.3 mph (3.86). The dominant

**June** was a dry and sunny month, with much the highest mean temperature of the 17 year record period - 18.9°C (15.91). The next highest was 2023 with 17.5°C. Sunshine hours were also a record – 374.5 (345.02). Perhaps, surprisingly, wind strength was also a record 5.1 mph (3.45). Rainfall was below average at 29.4 mm (47.46) but higher than 2024, 2023 and 2022.

The highest temperature was 30.9°C (28.49) exceeded in 2011and and 2022. Lowest temp was 8.8°C (7.29). Lowest max was 16.9°C (14.16). There were no days with less than 15°C max (1.35) and 6 with less than 20°C max (12.18) equal least with 2018. No. of days over 25°C was 17 (4.59) a record and over 30°C, 2 (0.29) also a record. Solar energy was 14750 Ly (13,514) equal with 2009.

Evapotranspiration was 143 mm (106.56) a record. There were no days with 10 or 20 mm of rain, and the highest rainfall rate was 22mm /hr (26.24).

Highest daily average wind speed was 8.6 mph (7.65) and highest gust 29 mph (28.47). The notable thing was the strength of the wind on virtually every day, with no day with a really light wind. This had some effect in moderating the effect of the high temperatures, but increased the evapotranspiration.

## **ROD WALKER'S MEMORIES**

It is always a pleasure when former Nayland residents share their early memories of the time they spent here. Rod Walker contacted the Conservation Society recently and told us that he moved to Nayland soon after World War 2 with his family when he was five years old. They came to run a greengrocery shop behind the milestone in the High Street (now the dentist's).

Despite being a very small boy, Rod remembers the property well. "It was a long house divided into two. To the side there was a cobbled yard leading down to an old barn with an apple store above, reached by a ladder and trapdoor. Up in the store there was a large window overlooking the churchyard, made from many little panes of glass with bubbles in. The house was several hundred years old and there was a very limited electricity supply and no gas. The electricity was just adequate for one 3kw electric fire, if you tried to switch anything else on the lights would go out".

Rod has vivid memories of rats in the house and shop and that his parents set traps to catch them. One day they followed a foul smell up to one of the bedrooms where they removed some wall cladding and discovered a decomposing rat in a void. This void could once have been a wardrobe or cupboard but the children were convinced it had been a 'priest's hidey hole' from days gone by as the house was very close to the church. Another time when playing hide and seek with his sister Lois, Rod found her up in the old apple loft watching a rat which she had cornered after chasing it around the loft. However it got away.


NAYLAND: Rod remembers the village as being very rural but was virtually self-sufficient with its bakers, butchers, Post Office and other shops. He particularly enjoyed seeing the village fire engine which was kept just across the road at the White Hart. "As a small boy I was enthralled when the vehicle came out ringing its bell. One day I looked out from my bedroom window opposite and saw a fireman jumping on to the back of the engine as it pulled away but he missed his footing and fell onto the road. The driver didn't notice and just carried on. I have often wondered if that fireman ever got to the fire."

"I remember that one of the village bakers would put people's weekend roast joints in his oven and there would be lots of villagers walking to the bakery with their joints and then later going back to collect them. I was fortunate that I never had to take or fetch the roast as I was too young and may well have dropped it on the way".

SCHOOL: "I remember the village school was on the other side of the churchyard from our house but I was always told to walk round Church Lane to get there. My father was a Primitive Methodist Minister and forbade me to walk through the churchyard to school! "

Rod enjoyed school and particularly remembers arithmetic lessons. At the end of the day the children had to recite their times tables and answer questions. "I enjoyed this because my mother had always played number games with me and my two sisters before we started school which I think must have helped because we all became teachers. I remember the children all had a small bottle of milk each day (1/3 of a pint) which was delivered to the school by the milkman in the early hours and left by the school gate. Sometimes in the winter the milk would be frozen and it would be stood by the pot-bellied stove in the classroom. In the summer it would sometimes be left out in the sun too long. Milk bottles had cardboard tops which the children would use to make woollen pompons of many colours. The girls and small boys attached these pompons to the top of their knitted hats."

"It seemed we had a lot of snow in those days and the village was often cut off. One day after the Christmas holidays several of us small boys made a snow ball and rolled it down Church Lane to the school playground. As we rolled it along it was getting bigger but was picking up gravel from the road. A couple of days later it melted and left a pile of gravel. We were summoned by the



headmaster and received the usual corporal punishment and then had to sweep it up. When I got home I was seriously admonished by my father because he said I had had the cane. I protested that I had not. I wasn't telling a lie, it was a walking stick!"

FISHING: "The first fish I caught was in Fen Street. I remember how the millstream ran behind the houses in Bear Street until it reached Mill Street then continued its way under the road and the old mill on the corner of the street, finally joining the river further downstream. The stream wasn't very deep and we would try to catch tiddlers. Some residents whose gardens bordered the stream kept canoes there and one day we found a pike, about 9 or 10 inches long, trapped in a sunken canoe. We caught it with our hands and I took it home in a bucket. A couple of days later I realised the bucket had gone and I was heartbroken that my dad had got rid of my 'prized fish'.

Rod of course knew the village well before the bypass was built in 1969 when the road and river layouts changed. He remembers playing in the Horseshoe Weir. "One day when I got home from playing there I told my parents that there were some black worms that stuck to my legs. Horror of horrors. My mother explained that they were leeches. I don't think this bothered me because I went there to play many more times and have been fascinated by them ever since".

ALFRED MUNNINGS: "I remember that there was a little room at the side of our shop with a window looking out onto the mile stone. This room was used as a store room and my mother made it into a tea room, my sisters helping with the teas. We had one fairly regular visitor who always sat by the little window. This was Sir Alfred Munnings, the artist. Living in nearby Dedham he used to call in for an afternoon cup of tea every so often when visiting a friend in the village."

HORKESLEY PARK: When we lived in Nayland, Horkesley Park (Littlegarth) was owned by the Rodwell family whose son Stephan went to boarding school but was my best friend in the holidays. "I spent a lot of time playing on their farm with Stephan and his sister. We also used to collect the eggs, feed the pigs and help with milking their cows. Horkesley Park farm was a mixed farm, growing cereals and hay but they also kept cattle, pigs and poultry which they would sometimes cull themselves and my mother helped with the butchering, so we were never short of meat. Combine harvesters were only just coming in so the corn was cut by a mechanical reaper and most of the farm hands were involved in harvesting. We also joined in when everyone was armed with stout wooden sticks and followed the reaper. As it got nearer the centre of the field the rabbits would run out and we would try to kill them for the pot. I don't think that I ever got one, I wasn't quick enough."

Rod visited Nayland a few years ago and not surprisingly found the village in some ways much changed but his former home still stands at the heart of Nayland. He would be very pleased to hear from anyone one who shares his memories and I will be happy to pass on his contact details.

## OUR ONLY DAUGHTER DIED AGED NINE - WE MOVED BUT DIDN'T MOVE ON


After Lizzie Bramall died from a rare brain tumour, grief led her parents, Mark and Sally, to a new healing home, five doors from their old one

Lizzie Bramall was just shy of her tenth birthday when a rare brain tumour took her life in 2018. Her parents Sally and Mark decided that to manage their grief, they would sell the family home but stay in the community that provided invaluable support, moving five doors down the same street. "We moved but will never fully move on," Sally says.

Diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma is an inoperable form of brain tumour and affects about 40 children in the UK each year. Lizzie's diagnosis came just two months after the family moved into a medieval house in picturesque Nayland. The plan was to renovate but, with Lizzie losing her life within nine months of diagnosis, they didn't have the heart to follow through with the dream.

Selling up was a difficult decision; the couple needed to mourn

but keep their memories close. By fate, a similar house came back on the market just at the right time. "It was the same side of the road as our old house, backing onto the river," Sally says. As they opened the door to view it, in flew a damselfly, which is the symbol the Bramalls chose for their charity, Lizzie's Fund (linked to The Brain Tumour "It's common to the  $\,$ Charity). River Stour and they frequently clustered around Lizzie when she was canoeing with Mark - that's why we chose it - so seeing one inside Forge House was a sign: Lizzie telling us this was the right house," she says.



They completed in 2019, six months after Lizzie died. Packing

the day she collected her Blue Peter diamond badge. He favourite books stand in a bookcase and under the bed are memory boxes. "Our new house has enabled us to heal. There's an analogy of grief being like a bouncy ball in a room, which hurts every time it hits you; over time the ball, your grief, doesn't diminish, but the room gets bigger, so the ball hits you less often. But it still hurts. We never wanted to run away from our life here," Sally says.

The Bramalls have thrown themselves into fundraising for the charity. Staying close to friends and family has enabled them to do that. "We're part of the community, and the community is part of us — it's a two-way thing".

The local pub, the Anchor, has adopted Lizzie's Fund as its charity, and touches of remembrance are all around the village. "To leave all this would be too much. Lizzie is buried in the church in Little Horkesley, five minutes up the road. Moving away would be leaving her there alone. I want her to know her mummy loves her." Sally says.

Walks with their cockapoo Ella means passing their previous residence, now inhabited by a family with three sons – the Bramalls are delighted the new owners have realized their vision of the house with their own renovations.

Living in a close-knot community can also mean bumping into Lizzie's former classmates, which the couple say can be both

a trigger and a comfort. Sally says "Many of Lizzie's friends give me a hug, but sometimes I get panicked if I don't recognize one of them; they've all grown up so much. She would have been sitting her GCSEs this summer, just like them."

The door knocker of Forge House is a damselfly. It signals arrival to the home that has been so healing but never forgets, nestled within the village that experienced such grief yet provided comfort when it was most needed.






