

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Notes by observer of the meeting: 8th October 2025

PARISH COUNCIL

Laura Erith chaired the meeting. Sam Treharne had resigned from the Council. David Finnigan was welcomed as a new member. **PUBLIC FORUM**

A resident praised the new fence at the play park. He reminded councillors about the damage to the Old Burial Ground wall which was reported some time ago; Isabelle Reece confirmed it is being dealt with. In discussion regarding a potential perimeter fence for the allotments he found a good example at Capel St Mary. He had canvassed some allotment holders and received support. The Clerk reminded the meeting that the PC had agreed to approve the principle and agreed the project leaders can proceed to consider the specification and accessibility requirements in consultation with all Allotment holders. Thereafter, the PC can consider any comments from Allotment holders and the specification proposed ahead of considering approval for the team to apply for grants. The importance of holding an allotment meeting inviting all the plot holders and the PC was stressed.

DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Isabelle Reece attended Macmillan Coffee Morning at Parkers Way and the working group dealing with parish and town submissions for governance and boundary changes. She confirmed the response to the sheltered housing consultation was mixed. The requests for further maintenance to the green area at the Harpers Estate old bus shelter are on-going. A sweep of the Heights has been arranged to follow the weedkilling. She is monitoring planning at Paddock Grove.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

James Finch reported progress in relation to Horkesley Road tree damage, Mill Street bridge repairs, reed cutting and village weed control. David Finnigan challenged him on other options for Local Government Re-organisation and Special Educational Needs and Disability Services.

HIGHWAYS

The arrangements for weedkilling and then sweeping the Heights had been discussed under councillor reports and dates were set in this respect. David Finnigan reported on an unauthorised vehicle parked at Parkers Way which has been reported. He is following up.

FINANCE

Enquiries will be made as to whether Samantha Treharne could attend the Finance working group as a non-councillor advisor. The Finance Working Group includes Cllrs Erith (Chair), Fuller and Finnigan. The Clerk/RFO advises the group.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections for works to trees at **Stour House 23 Court Street** [DC/25/03613] to remove to ground level a Lawson Cyprus, remove dead wood on Cherry, to crown lift by 2m a Lime tree; at **14 Court Street** [DC/25/03743] to reduce a Holly to previous pruning points, trimming to maintain shape of tree; at **43 Bear Street** [DC/25/03745] to reduce height by 1 meter creating neat straight top of Hazel, Beech, Dogwood, Holly and prune back to previous pruning points 2 Walnut trees; and at **Lower Courtwood 13A Court Street** [DC/25/03841] works to flowerbeds along driveway and in centre of lawn; cut to ground level shrubs and Bay tree, Pyracanth, Ash tree, Wisteria; remove Rose stumps; prune Oak tree.

Discharge of conditions were approved at **5 High Street** [DC/25/03986] for eaves, verges, windows and doors and a non- material amendment was approved to change window type at the **site adjacent to Paddock Grove** [DC/25/03313]

Between meetings to meet Babergh's deadline councillors had no objections at **14 Church Lane** [DC/25/03976] for removal of rear extensions, erection of rear extension, replacement of roof and solar panels, erection of garden studio outbuilding for gym, and a bicycle and bin store, conversion of toilet block to garden store; or for listed building consent at objections at **72** - **78 Bear Street** [DC/25/04069] for alterations to window, door, and external finishes following consent DC/24/03739, and the

subsequent discharge of conditions applications DC/24/05477 and DC/24/05478, but requested the heritage team to check the colours and materials used for the windows/doors are sympathetic to the host property.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at **Gladwins Farm**, **Harpers Hill** relating to [DC/25/04217] for erection of an agricultural storage building and [DC/25/04218] for construction of surfaced farm track to proposed building or at **18 Paddock Grove** [DC/25/03845] for retrospective erection of a greenhouse in the garden subject to shielding/diffusion of strip light as it is at risk of causing light pollution to neighbours.

HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY/NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING

It was noted that all relevant paperwork to the 2018 survey is in the archive room, accessed via the Committee Room. The cost of printing was not met by the Parish previously. Owen Brown agreed to obtain a quote for the survey. There was consensus that the survey was a good idea. It was agreed for the Clerk to check whether the PC CIL monies could be used towards a Housing Needs Survey.

Experience of those working towards an affordable housing project in Leavenheath suggested the importance of having either a Neighbourhood Plan in place or an up-to-date Housing Needs survey.

CALEY GREEN

Kevin Sheath confirmed a new larger dog waste bin has been installed near the A134 tunnel. A meeting regarding signs for Caley Green had taken place and he was now able to provide our requirements to SCC.

He is chasing progress in respect of the revetment. It was agreed to ask our contractors to strim close to the riverbank as the recent reed cutting has exposed more of the bank.

VILLAGE HALL

lain Wright confirmed that the roof replacement works at the village hall are on budget and on schedule for completion by Christmas and said the solar panels and batteries are now available to see. Gerry Battye thanked the VHMC for all their hard work in seeing this through.

ALLOTMENTS

Additional councillors are needed on the allotment working group; Dawn Harris will be approached to rejoin and Owen Brown will consider joining. The annual allotment holders' meeting is overdue; it will be arranged, at a sociable location early in 2026 when details, such as perimeter fencing proposals, are known. Councillors and all allotment holders will be invited.

BURIAL GROUND

Contractors have reported that incidents of broken glass on graves are arising again. It was agreed to put up polite notices asking that glass vases are not used. The importance of being sympathetic to grieving families was recognised and that the contractor should avoid maintaining any grave posing a health and safety risk to their operatives.

FREQUENCY OF FUTURE PC MEETINGS

It was agreed to maintain the monthly schedule of PC meetings, which has the exception of August, and perhaps omitting the December meeting. It was resolved to also aim to be more effective between meetings.

IN BRIEF

The new play park fencing has been praised. Gerry Battye asked for play park signage to be budgeted for by the finance working group.

Owen Brown has followed up the Thermal Imaging camera offer which he is hoping to make use of for the Parish.

Laura Erith and Kevin Sheath volunteered to paint non-toxic paint over the graffiti on Wiston footbridge subject to agreement from the owner; the PC would fund the materials.

It was agreed to step up efforts to attract potential Councillors.

David Finnigan agreed to join Laura Erith as joint PC representatives on the Community Council.

PARISH COUNCIL

Dawn Harris chaired the meeting.

FINANCE

The Finance working group meeting is scheduled and will include: Laura Erith, Tricia Fuller, David Finnigan and the Clerk, Debbie Hattrell. Now is the time to put forward potential expenditure items or projects for budgeting. Suggestions including Playpark signage, contribution to village hall kitchen refurbishment, a potential village sign, and resurfacing of Star Alley were mentioned.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at 18 Paddock Grove [DC/25/03845] for retrospective application for the erection of a greenhouse in the garden; at Sargents Farm Bures Road [DC/25/03293] for discharge of conditions for DC/25/02344 relating to landscaping, biodiversity enhancement and inverter details; at Bridge House Horkesley Road [DC/25/04242] for works to trees to fell T1 Cherry and T2 Maple tree; or for listed building consent at 72 - 78 Bear Street [DC/25/04069] for alterations to window, door, and external finishes following consent DC/24/03739, and the subsequent discharge of conditions applications DC/24/05477 and DC/24/05478

At **Gladwins Farm, Harpers Hill** Babergh confirmed formal approval was not required relating to [DC/25/04217] for erection of an agricultural storage building and [DC/25/04218] for construction of surfaced farm track to proposed building.

Between meetings to meet Babergh's deadline councillors had no objections at Land and Pond Adjacent River Stour

(Nayland Meadow) [DC/25/04378] for installation of timber boardwalk with dipping platform.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at 7 **Willow Grove** [DC/25/04595] for erection of a two storey side extension infill, bay window to front elevation, single storey extension to existing porch, demolition of existing single storey rear extension and replaced with single storey rear extension; or to the re-application at **1 Fox Cottages Bures Road** [DC/25/04974] for demolition of existing garage and store and erection of new garage and store.

Discussing a non-material amendment relating to *DC/22/06294* at **Site Adjacent Paddock Grove Harpers Hill** [*DC/25/04622*] to amend front pedestrian access from ramp and steps to disability compliant steps councillors had no objection to the application.

The Clerk was asked to seek an update on the application at **Caravan Site Rushbanks Farm Bures Road** [DC/25/03427] for lawful development certificate for use of land as a caravan and tent camping site.

HOUSING NEEDS SURVEY

Owen Brown is awaiting a response from Community Action Suffolk regarding regarding conducting a survey. Debbie Hattrell confirmed Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) money can be used for a HNS.

OPEN SPACES

Councillors heard that the possibility of a village sign had been mooted. Gerry Battye said a village sign had raised considerable debate in the past. It was agreed to obtain potential cost and look at the possibility further.

CALEY GREEN

Councillors felt Caley Green looks amazing following cutting of the reeds and has received many positive comments.

Kevin Sheath reported that the Caley Green working party have had four meetings with Suffolk CC and Concertus, the engineers who are progressing the project for installation of riverbank protection.

Concertus had presented four initial options; two of these were discounted due to being generally unsuitable. They will now prepare detailed designs of the other two options. The detail designs will then be presented for further consultation.

While the reed cutting is a separate issue the Environment Agency (EA) stated to Suffolk County Council (SCC) that Enforcement Action may be taken. This could have some impact on any revetment scheme.

VILLAGE HALL

lain Wright had confirmed that the roof replacement works at the village hall are on budget and on schedule for completion by Christmas. Councillors praised those involved for the hard work with this project. The autumn gardening morning had taken place; Gerry Battye said the PC's section of the garden will need some work in the Spring.

ALLOTMENTS

Dawn Harris and Owen Brown agreed to rejoin the working group.

It was felt future plans on a suggested perimeter fencing project should be available ahead of holding an annual allotment holders meeting, although this is not a PC project. It was noted that it has been proposed by some plot holders who will gather more detailed proposals, including design, consultation with all allotment tenants and grants for further discussion with the PC prior to any approval.

An agenda will be issued for the meeting of allotment holders which will be held in a more social venue.

FREQUENCY OF PC MEETINGS

It was felt holding a meeting in December was important, including in relation to the timing of some discussions, to provide momentum and continuity, maintain the public's access to councillors and enable newer councillors to become familiar with the role.

The next meeting is scheduled on 10th December.

IN BRIEF

Councillors congratulated the Community Council on another very successful Bonfire and Firework event.

Debbie Hattrell will seek an update from Isabelle Reece regarding the requested repairs to the old flint wall at the old burial ground (the old burial ground is the responsibility of Babergh).

AOB: Owen Brown has taken up Babergh's offer of free booking of a Thermal Imaging camera; the opportunity to use this free service between 18th February-3rd March will be publicised.

COMMUNITY COUNCIL REPORT

Meeting: 22nd October 2025 Chair: Rachel Hitchcock 07788 954309 Full minutes available at: www.naylandcommunitycouncil.org.uk

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: As always new members would be welcome to join the team.

Fundraising Activities/Events: It has been agreed to mark the Community Council's 60th Anniversary at our July committee meeting and discuss with Lorraine doing a feature in the Community Times.

Community Defibrillators: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall is managed by the CC; it is regularly checked and is registered with The Circuit, the British Heart Foundation System linked to the Ambulance Service. Site checks are reported to both the CHT Webnos system and the Circuit. The defibrillator at the Fire Station is also linked to the Circuit which means the Ambulance Service will refer 999 callers to the closest defibrillator.

The Wiston defibrillator has been installed on the verge outside The Houses, Bures Road, Wiston CO6 4LZ. What 3 Words: /// ahead.replying.repaying. The defibrillator has been registered with the Circuit and Webnos systems and site checks being reported to both. Adam Lunn has been added as a reporter and will carry out and report the site checks of the Wiston defibrillator. Jo Metson and Rachel Hitchcock will continue to do the site checks for the Village Hall defibrillator.

Online Ticketing Facility: NaylandEvents.org This remains the principle outlet for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility contact Justin Dowding.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: on Saturday 25th October. Jo Metson said she would attend on behalf of the CC. There would be a viewing of the Village Hall roof replacement works at 10am for those wishing to attend – refreshments would be provided and a brief resume of the overall works.

Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation in village groups and events welcome. An item headed Volunteer Vacancies is included in the Community Times, listing the various volunteers needed by different groups; please let Lorraine Brooks know if you have vacancies to be included.

Resident Volunteer List: This is a list of residents prepared to assist other residents who at times are unable to get out for themselves and would benefit from having a prescription collected, an errand run or some shopping dropped off. If anyone requires assistance or could give assistance if needed please contact Lorraine Brooks.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 18th October 2025: **Breakdown of profits to date:** Quiz £533, Community Times £960, interest income £224.

Grants paid: Village Hall roof £10,000, Maintenance of Horse Watering area £300.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £9,773 represented by Current a/c monies £7,516, Stripe account £1,131 and Cash on hand £1,126. We hold £177 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: Horse Watering area £58 and Lizzie's Fund £153. Therefore unencumbered assets are £9,386.

Expenses year to date: 198 for 2024 defibrillator maintenance, £113 for the village website and £112 for hall hire.

Matt confirmed that the new Wiston defibrillator had been added to the insurance.

GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Permissive footpath maintenance: The CC continue to monitor the two stretches of permissive footpath - Stoke Road and Court Knoll to Allotment field - and call Dan Bowman back when needed (obviously being mindful of restrictions due to nesting birds). The CC will also monitor bodpave solution at the Conservation Meadow and see how this beds in with a view to

this being a possible solution to the wet stretch of footpath between Court Knoll and the allotments, keeping an eye on how often this stretch is impassable before considering approaching others to contribute. Tendring Hall Estate has said that they approve of the bodpave solution and would be prepared to contribute £1000 towards the project.

David Slater observed that the Stoke Road stretch would probably not need further maintenance until the first part of next year.

Nayland with Wissington Remembers 1945 book: As part of the 80th Anniversary of the end of WWII commemorations a CC grant of £549 supported the initial printing costs of a commemorative book providing a permanent record of life during WW2 particularly in Nayland and Wiston. The first print run sold out and a second print, supported financially by the Conservation Society, was commissioned. This book is on sale at Forget-Me-Not for £8. All Proceeds to the Poppy Appeal.

Community First Responders: The CC agreed to cover the cost of hiring the village hall for two basic life support sessions. The session on 12 October went ahead (3 people attended) but the Wednesday 15th session was cancelled as only one booking. It was suggested that maybe future sessions could be held at the Church Hall if fewer people were attending and that it might be worth doing one next Spring with more help from CC to publicise. Thank you to the First Responders for running these sessions.

Community Times & Websites: Thanks as always to all contributors. Heading towards the next deadline; please let Lorraine Brooks know if you have promotion or large items to include so adequate space can be reserved.

Village Calendar: Village calendars are now on sale at village outlets (Forget-Me-Not, Mill Street Stores, Studio B). Posters promoting sales have been distributed.

FORTHCOMING ACTIVITIES:

Bonfire & Fireworks: *Tuesday 5th November.* Ticket sales are steady on naylandevents.org and Justin is providing a breakdown of ticket sales in order to keep track of numbers attending. Publicity has been sent out and continues to be promoted via Facebook and roadside signs on the A134 and Caley Green. The team had a useful site meeting at the Village Hall to ensure that all was in place and to make any adjustments required to allow for the scaffolding currently in place for the roof project. Positions and layout for barrier, refreshments, disabled parking and lighting were agreed along with provision for PA system and walkie talkies. Re: parking. It will be strictly blue badge parking only at the Hall. On tickets, it now asks people to enter the village via Horkesley Road and marshalls will be positioned strategically at the Court Street Pinch Point and at the end of Church Lane.

There is another booking in the hall at 1.30pm so will need prompt tidy up.

Christmas Trail: (Windows & Trees) There are some volunteers for Christmas Trail already but more are needed. Rachel to try and secure more participants and asked for people to spread the word to friends and family and to get in touch if they are able to take part.

SOCIETY REPORTS

First Responders: October the 16th was the British Heart Foundation's Restart a Heart Day. We had 3 attendees for one of the basic life support sessions planned, the second session was cancelled due to poor take up. However, the social media campaign has drawn attention from two local groups who have asked for a session each.

We were successful in a grant application from the Bures Musical Festival; the funds will be used to upgrade our training equipment. The manikins and training AEDs will be used by the team for clinical training, and members of the public during the training sessions. We will be attending the Remembrance Day Parade in Nayland on Sunday 9th November.

Conservation Society: The Autumn litter pick was well attended with 15 volunteers. Following our October meeting on the subject of *'Kentwell Hall'* on 11th November, Jackie Marshall will speak on the topic of domestic service in Victorian times in her talk *'Upstairs Downstairs'*.

We were recently advised that the overgrown area next to Mill Lade in Mill Street, known as the Swan's Nest, was coming up for auction at the end of October. It was agreed we should investigate acquiring it with the intention of using it as a green space for use and enjoyment by the village and its visitors. However, the vendor was unable to agree to a delay in the auction and a sale went through. The Society will have a stall at the Christmas Fayre.

Parish Council: We are pleased to have a new councillor, David Finnigan, but sadly lost Samantha Trehane. We have stepped up promotion for vacancies. We are currently considering undertaking a housing needs survey and the possibility of a new wildlife proof perimeter fence for the allotments is being explored.

Nayland Meadow: During the next six months we hope to remove silt that has accumulated in the pond over the last 20 years, plus about half of the existing reed growth, and then construct a timber access and viewing platform into the pond from the existing footpath. The process of getting all the required funding, permissions, certificates, licenses, approvals and quotations has been time consuming and expensive. If we are able to go ahead, the whole process will undoubtedly be messy but should not cause too many issues with regard to use of the footpath.

Date of Next Meeting: will be **Monday 5th January 2026** at 8pm (Exec 7.30pm in the Church Hall).

VILLAGE HALL ROOF

Progress with the re-roofing of the Village Hall is nearing completion with the temporary roof being removed, by the time the Community Times is delivered most of the scaffolding will have been removed.

The current programme for the works indicates an anticipated completion date is the 19th December 2025.

WATER LEVELS

The long summer heatwave and low rainfall took their toll on the river and the countryside. The weir was dry, all summer with pipes installed in an endeavour to prevent the weir from completely drying out. Flow returned by mid October due to some rainfall. The flow was quite strong compared to the amount of rain locally so perhaps the EOETS (Ely Ouse to Essex Transfer Scheme) was re-activated.

WILDLIFE & SWANS

Thank you to John Dalton for the photo, below, of a grass snake in the river at Caley Green. Grass snakes (*Natrix natrix*), aka the ringed snake or water snake is non-venomous and semi-aquatic so are strong swimmers and may be found close to fresh water as they feed almost exclusively on amphibians, such as frogs, toads and but they also take fish, small mammals and birds.

They are typically dark green or brown/grey/black with undersides whitish with irregular blocks of black and they have a characteristic yellow or whitish collar behind the head.

Their preferred habitat tends to be open woodland and there field margins and areas near ponds and water, including gardens. Gardens with warm compost heaps are a useful location for them to lay their eggs. Grass snakes, like most reptiles, are at the mercy of the thermal environment so may winter underground.

The Swan family that raised five cygnets this year have been teaching their cygnets to fly as they gradually become independent. They appear to have benefitted from having the width of the river restored. It has also been noticeable how considerably more ducks visit Caley Green since the work was carried out and they like gathering on the bank where the reeds previously inhibited their access.

Cormorant have also been seen and as mentioned on page 22 an otter family was seen playing in the river to the rear of Bear Street.

"OH, WHAT BIG TEETH YOU HAVE"

Thank you to Nayland House for capturing this revealing photo of a swan eagerly taking bread from the residents on one of their regular visits to Caley Green.

With panto season approaching, when first seeing the photo, "Oh what big teeth you have" sprang to mind. Of course, swans do not have teeth as such but as the photo shows their strong beaks have

serrated edges that look like small, jagged teeth. These serrations, called tomium, help them catch and eat aquatic plants and algae, and they can also be used to capture small animals like molluscs, small fish, frogs, worms, as well as algae and other slippery aquatic organisms. They are used to cut leafy vegetation and to help them graze. You'll notice that their tongues have the same serrations as they have on their beaks. This 'dental structure' not only helps them feed, it filters out mud so they digest only what they need.

The hard black tip on a swan's beak is called the 'nail'. This is used for foraging among silt and roots, is a multi-purpose tool for grooming, and used in self-defence.

FEEDING SWANS

There has been debate about feeding swans and other waterfowl bread but experts confirm there is no reason not to, provided it is not mouldy. While bread is not the best dietary option for swans compared to their natural food it has become a much needed source of energy, supplementing their natural diet and helping them to survive the cold winter months. The food should be thrown onto the water so that they can swallow water with the food. However, instead of bread, it would be preferable to feed specialist swan food (which floats).

Swans are not greedy creatures and will only eat what they need.

WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE

Last issue we heard that the Essex and Suffolk Rivers Trust together with Essex Rivers Trust have been encouraging local people to become involved in taking action to help restore the status of our rivers. They have set up Essex River-Watch, a citizen science project to collect information about water quality across both Suffolk and Essex. We were delighted that Gill Boardman undertook this training and was able to report on the monthly testing which is now carried out at Caley Green.

The most recent test was carried out on 10th November and Gill has reported that nothing unusual was detected in the nitrate, phosphate and ammonia levels. Turbidity was also normal. They don't test for bacteria. NB: nitrate and ammonia in the water mainly result from agriculture while in the River Stour phosphate is mostly from sewage works.

BANK EROSION AT CALEY GREEN

Engineering company, Concertus, continue with the project to prevent riverbank erosion around the bay on behalf of Suffolk CC. This has involved commissioning topographical and ecological surveys and may require other permissions and permits.

They came up with four initial solutions; two were discounted during meetings between Concertus, SCC and the PC's Caley Green Working Group.

Concertus will now move on creating more detailed designs of the other two options. These designs will then be presented for further consultation.

Once a design is agreed any permit, licence and planning applications necessary will be submitted to the EA, Babergh,

Another Tawny Owl Rescue in Nayland

At the end of September Colchester Owl Rescue took another Tawny Owl from Nayland into their care. Several residents were involved in getting the owl which was hanging in a tree about 20 feet above the river by the A134 tunnel down. A great team effort - huge thanks to them. It was then wrapped up and taken to Katrina Myers at the Rescue. She reported that: "The owl was totally exhausted and in pain. We had to cut the fish lure away from the hook to get the hook out. I have given him antibiotics and pain relief, once the pain relief had kicked in I gave him a good clean up now he is resting and drying off. At the moment the wing looks like it should be ok but should know better tomorrow after he has rested."

"It is not uncommon for the Rescue to receive an owl caught up in lost or discarded fishing line with hooks. This is a horrible nasty and unnecessary accident for them to go through and when it's wing related can take a long time to get back to normal."

On 21st October, having been cared for by Katrina for 3 weeks, the Tawny owl had fully recovered and was released. Katrina said: "She had been very fortunate not to have too much damage to her wing and healed quickly; when she finished her medication she was put into the flight aviary and I was surprised she flew effortlessly straightaway, so she just needed time to build up her strength ready for her release."

Amy Schmitz, who took the owl to the Rescue had the honour of releasing her with several residents involved in the rescue delighted to witness her return to good health.

Thos was the third rescued owl release that evening; they are incredibly busy and have good success with owls and birds of prey.

In early July the Rescue saved another Tawny owl from Nayland who had been hit by a car and found still alive but in very poor condition (as reported in the Community Times). At the

While these incidents may indicate there are a number of Tawny owls in the area it also reveals their vulnerabilities; in this latest case may we appeal to those enjoying fishing to please be vigilant and take home all your hooks, line and other gear. If discarded it can be a danger to many forms of wildlife.







I would like to inform you of our new prescription protocol from **1st October 2025**. We implement these changes to ensure high levels of safety when issuing your medications. Our Dispensary staff work very hard to ensure each prescription is ready to collect on time, but please be aware that some factors are beyond our control.

Due to an increase in demand for prescriptions, prescription issuing process and supplier issues, Dispensary requires at least 5 working days for a prescription. Please ensure you remember when your request was handed in and note the collection date will fall 5 working days later. This includes online requests.

<u>Please note:</u> According to NHS prescribing guidelines we can only issue 28 days' worth of medication at one time. We have zero-tolerance policy against rude and argumentative behaviour towards our Dispensary and prescription staff.

<u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: Due to how Christmas holidays fall this year - <u>please submit your repeat prescriptions 10 days before collection.</u>

MYCHART: is a new free App which allows you to access your <u>hospital</u> health record. The app, or website, means you can access real time information about your hospital care, as well as directly contact your clinician or the team looking after you. MyChart helps you be actively involved in your care. Patient information on MyChart began from time of launch (02 October 2025) Backdated historical data isn't available. MyChart does NOT link to SystemOne, so patients will not be able to see their primary care record through this App. You can view primary care information via NHS app. Please pop into the surgery for information on how to sign up.

Nayland with Wissington Crime Review

September: 2x Non Crime incidentS

We are now in a time of year when, due to the cover of darkness, burglaries and vehicle thefts/break-ins are more likely. At this time of year house burglaries tend to occur in the evenings, while shed and outbuilding break-ins often happen late at night or in the early hours of the morning. Vehicle crime also increases, with car break-ins typically occurring during the evening or early morning. Offenders sometimes go from car to car trying door handles.

Here are the most important tips to help prevent becoming a victim of these offences:

MAKE IT APPEAR SOMEONE IS HOME: If you are going out in the evening, leave some lights on. Consider using a television LED simulator that mimics the glow of a TV. If you will be out during the day and not home until after dark, have timers on a couple of lights so they turn on automatically.

CCTV: Even a basic video doorbell can deter criminals. Police recommend the Defender Video Doorbell because it is secure, works without a subscription, it just needs Wi-Fi to work. Better still, invest in a CCTV system - wireless options are available. Burglars do not want to be seen and will usually flee if they suspect they are being monitored. Even a fake CCTV system is better than none.

HIDE YOUR VALUABLES: Hide valuables such as cash or jewellery well, so they cannot be easily found even if drawers are emptied. Do not leave anything of value in your vehicle, or items that look like they might contain valuables (such as bags). LOCK HOUSE/CAR DOORS AND WINDOWS: Ensure all doors and windows are closed and locked, including back doors,

even if you are at home. Last year, there was a spate of burglaries where the offender entered through an unlocked back door mid evening, whilst the occupant was home, and stole items from accessible rooms (e.g., handbags from kitchens). Consider a chain or secondary lock on your front door - if a burglar cannot enter silently, they may give up or make noise, alerting you. Keep your vehicle locked.

KEEP YOUR CAR KEYS SECURE: Do not leave car keys near the front door. Hide them. If you have keyless entry, store keys in a Faraday pouch or box to prevent signal cloning.

HOUSE ALARM: Consider installing a burglar alarm, especially if your home is secluded or rural. Even a fake alarm box mounted high on the front of your home can deter most burglars.

FORENSIC MARKING: Mark up your property with UV pen or for some items special embossing. Keep note of serial numbers. If you have power tools or other items you are never going to sell, make them as unattractive to criminals as possible, paint them or mark them in ways that make them less attractive to steal in the first place and sell on.

As you may have seen, Suffolk remains a low crime county and a very safe place to live, so being a victim of these offences is quite rare. But offences can and do happen in your area, with a spike in burglaries typically seen in the darker months, so please take as many of these precautions as you can to make it harder for criminals. I feel it is human nature for some people to think it will never happen to them, but it is obviously happening to some people, so protect yourself against it as best you can. If you follow those tips above, you are dramatically reducing the chances of being targeted in the first place and if you were still unlucky enough to be a victim, the offender would not get away with much and anything they do take is potentially identifiable to which helps when police recover property.

We have two exciting projects planned for Nayland Meadow over the next few months. These are the desilting of the pond and the construction of a short boardwalk and dipping/viewing platform at the west edge of the pond. The pond was dug by the Environment Agency in 2005, and since that time silt has gradually

accumulated, leading to a significant reduction in water depth and contraction of aquatic habitat. Surveys we carried out earlier this year showed that the depth of silt was typically 40 to 60cm, about half the overall depth of the pond. In addition, the growth of vegetation has reduced the connectivity between the pond and river, hampering the ability of fish to move freely between the two water bodies. The project will entail removal of silt from the centre of the pond and a reduction in the width of the fringing vegetation, whilst taking care to leave plenty of habitat for wildlife. The work is being carried out in the winter in order to minimise the impacts on biodiversity. Desilting will require drainage of the pond and fish will be rescued and transferred to the river as part of this process. The pond restoration will temporarily impact on water vole habitat and we have had to obtain a Strategic Water Vole Licence from Natural England, the Government's statutory advisor on nature conservation. This licence ensures that the impact of our work on water voles is fully compensated for/mitigated. Overall, the restoration project, once complete, will ensure that the pond continues to provide suitable habitat for fish, water voles and breeding birds for many years to come.

The 6m long boardwalk and 12.9 square metre platform will, subject to planning permission, be constructed along the western side of the pond. This is an accessibility project, funded by the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs and strongly supported by the National Landscapes Team. It is designed to complement and link in with the recent footpath improvements on the meadow. The facility will allow visitors a closer connection to nature and provide educational opportunities for children and others. We consider these benefits to outweigh any small increase in local disturbance to wildlife using the pond. The structure has been designed specifically to minimise visual intrusion, with the platform constructed approximately 0.5m below the level of the footpath/bund around the pond edge. The platform and boardwalk combined will occupy less than 1% of the pond area.

Both projects will be carried out in such a way that they avoid any need to temporarily close the riverside footpath. Any queries feel free to contact me.

In October, between our volunteers, we gave six days to the East of England Ambulance Service Trust to help train ambulance crews, air ambulance clinicians, police officers, and firefighters, from across the region, in responding to major incidents such as terrorist attacks. Our volunteers played the part of simulated casualties, helping to bring a degree of realism to the scenarios.

On 21st October, Kevin and Mark from the men's senior golf team at Stoke-by-Nayland Golf Club, undertook a 26 mile sponsored walk to raise money for us. Kevin, the team captain, chose us as the captain's charity of the year for 2025 and we are extremely grateful for the support they have been providing us.

We have been very lucky to receive a grant from the Bures Musical Festival. The 5day event raised £24,000 for good causes this year and our grant will be used to replace our aging training equipment which we use for ourselves and to provide our public education sessions.

The Christmas Day service (Family Eucharist) will be held at 11.15am.




Nayland Primary School: Celebrating Our Community Connections

NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: September & October 2025 by David Lowe

September was a fairly average September, but, nonetheless, threw up a few interesting statistics. Mean temperature was 15.2°C (15.94) with a max of 26.3°C (26.16). Lowest max was 16.3°C (15.06) and lowest minimum 3.8°C (4.94). There were 2 days on which 25°C was reached (2.17) and 17 over 20°C (23.78). There was 1 grass frost and. On 20 nights, the temperature stayed above 10°C.

Bright sun hours were 242.5(244.12) and solar energy was 7350 Ly (7693.05).

Monthly rain was 42 mm (42.32) with a highest daily fall of 11.4 mm (14.53). Evapotranspiration was 73.5 mm, still way over rainfall.

Average wind strength was 5 mph (3.17) second highest over the 18 year record period. Highest daily average was 14.3 mph (8.02) well over anything else recorded in September. Highest gust was 42 mph (31.78) second highest over the record period. There were 4 days over 30 mph, 2 over 35 mph and 1 over 40 mph. The 30 and 35 figures were also records. The predominant wind direction was WSW.

October was a cloudy and windy month, with slightly above average temperature and just below average rainfall.

Mean temperature was 12.4° C (11.78) with a high of 21.6° C (21.06). The lowest was 4° C (1.92). Lowest max was 12.3° C (10.67).

There were no days when 10°C was not reached, 13 when 15°C was not reached (12.65) and only 1 day when 20°C was reached (2.23). There was 1 grass frost.


Bright sun hours were 145 (166.43) the least for the 18 year record period. Solar energy was 3750 Ly (4644.12) second lowest. Evapotranspiration was 33.8 mm (36.55) well below rainfall, as expected in October.

Rainfall was 59.2 mm (67.31) with highest daily rain 11.2 mm and highest rainfall rate 62 mm/hr. There were 2 days with over 10 mm of rain (1.88).

Average wind speed was 4.5 mph (3.44) third highest of the record period. Highest daily average was 12 mph (7.38) highest of the record period. There were 4 days over 30 mph (1.23) equal highest and 1 over 35 mph (0.18). Dominant direction was WSW.

NAYLAND: RAINFALL & EVAPOTRANSPIRATION IN 2025

To the end of October, rainfall is 361mm and ET 775.9mm, more than twice as much. There should be some rainfall catch up in November and December, as ET is so low in these months. November & December figures are averages for months ahead.



PUBLIC ACCESS DEFIBRILLATORS IN NAYLAND & WISTON

There are now 3 public access defibrillators in Nayland and Wiston with a new defibrillator (jointly funded by the Parish Council and the Community Council) installed on 9th September at Bures Road, Wiston to serve the more rural areas of the parish.

Where are the 3 public access defibrillators in Nayland?

- Nayland Fire Station, Bear Street, Nayland. CO6 4HY on the outside wall by the entrance
- Nayland Village Hall, Church Lane, Nayland CO6 4JH on the outside wall to the right of the main entrance
- The verge outside the houses on Bures Road, Wiston CO6 4LZ. What3Words: ///ahead.replying.repaying

Please familiarise yourself with these locations and let your friends, family and neighbours know.

All of our public access defibrillators are registered with The Circuit, the British Heart Foundation system linked to the Ambulance Service. This means that the Ambulance Service will refer 999 callers to the closest defibrillator if needed.

ALWAYS DIAL 999 IN AN EMERGENCY.

THE CALL HANDLER WILL KNOW THERE IS A DEFIBRILLATOR NEARBY.

Training is not necessary as the device provides clear visual and audible instructions.

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MORE ABOUT CHARLES GUMM'S SEAT & LEO MARKS

It was a pleasure to meet four members of the Gumm Family at the 80th Anniversary event of the ending of the Second World War on the 31st August. USAAF 1st Lt Charles Gumm's story is well known in Nayland but it is remarkable that 80 years after the tragedy his memory still lives on. As time goes by there are very few people who remember the crash on the 1st March 1944 but he will always be very much a part of Nayland's history.

Charles's relatives visited the field near Court Knoll where he died when his plane crashed. Even though there were press reports at the time of the drama and his story has been told beyond Nayland many times, the exact spot of the crash will probably never be known. No matter, we know that Lt Gumm's plane was in trouble but he managed to avoid the village before his plane crashed.

One local newspaper report said that the Vicar at that time, Canon William Wright, saw the plane coming down, "mounted his minutes later".


The doctor was already there, probably Dr Crann who was Nayland's GP before Dr McMichael who came just after the war in 1946. The report also said that Mr HF Beady, an ARP Warden and landlord of the Anchor Inn at that time, saw the plane skim over the houses and said, "If ever there was a plucky youth, it was he. He did everything possible to avoid hitting the place."

It was Canon Wright who arranged the special service in St James's Church after the crash and the installation of a memorial seat in the burial ground off Bear Street. This seat was eventually replaced by the Parish Council in 2001 with the new one which stands next to the war memorial in the High Street. Two brass plaques were removed from the old seat and fixed to the new seat, one recording Charles Gumm's birth and death dates and his rank, and the other was engraved with a well-known poem by Leo Marks.

The original seat still stands in the burial ground and many visitors to the burial ground who sit on it are probably quite unaware of its history. These days it looks a little sad, neglected

bicycle and arrived at the scene a few Leo Marks's poem on the Charles Gumm seat in the High Street

plaques since I read about its history in a book kindly loaned to me by a friend. It seems relevant at the time to Charles Gumm's death and wonder if it was Canon Wright who chose

Leo Marks (1920-2001) was only 22 when he worked as a cryptographer during World War II. He worked for the Special Operations Executive which organised and supported the resistance movements behind German lines. It was Leo's job not to break codes but to create them for agents who were parachuted behind enemy lines.

Leo met and fell in love with a nurse called Ruth during the war who was training for air ambulance work but she was sadly killed in an air crash in 1943. The following Christmas Eve in his grief Leo wrote a poem to her entitled "The Life that I Have", sometimes called "Yours".

It was only a few months after this, in 1944, that Leo gave the poem to Violette Szabo, a young French resistance worker who had been working under cover in German occupied France. Secret agents had to memorise a verse whose letters created a code that was unique to them to enable them to send messages back to Britain. Tragically a few months after receiving this poem Violette was captured by the Germans in

France, was tortured and executed.

After the war in 1958, Violette's story was made into a film called "Carve Her Name with Pride" starring Virginia McKenna and Paul Schofield, which many people will remember. Seeing this true story which featured the moving poem by Leo Marks was an unforgettable experience for many who saw the film as the war was still fresh in the minds of many people.

When Charles Gumm died in 1944 the poem Leo Marks had written in memory of his girlfriend had only been composed a few months before; he then gifted it to the brave Violette Szabo and just a few more months after that she also died. All these events happened coincidentally within a few months of each other. I wonder if Canon Wright knew about the poem's history, thought it was appropriate and decided to install it on the plaque which was fixed to the original memorial seat in the burial ground.

CALEY GREEN

23rd September 2025 was a joyous day for many residents... when after much lobbying, for a long time, work began on cutting the reeds that had established themselves through neglect.

It is wonderful to see this section of the riverside restored to as it was created to be.

Ducks have gathered, as they used to, Moorhens have been seen and the swans have made more use of the space.

Human activity on the river has been more enjoyable too.

Residents, especially those less mobile, have been enjoying the open view, others have been seen fishing - as is their right.





Many positive comments have been made about the improvement.

A number of people have expressed gratitude to Suffolk County Council, and others, for their efforts made towards restoring the Green.

John Spooner, who has lived near the Green most of his life, recalls that when the A134 by-pass was constructed in the 60s much of the excavated earth was used to landscape the Green and it was designated for use by residents. Fishing rights were given to residents.

The Environment Agency, (since 2005 in Nayland) no longer managed riverside vegetation, or silt build up.

This work was contracted out by SCC, owners of the Green, after years of requests from villagers. Ecologists and the Environment Agency were consulted. They were only allowed to cut the reeds, not pull them.

Nevertheless it is hoped this may allow greater biodiversity as the brutish reeds have prevented growth of other less robust species of riverside plants.





Two decades of neglect resulted in this being a large job to undertake and it may take a little while for the area to settle.

As well as Suffolk CC, the Parish Council, the Friends of Caley Green and other residents have contributed to the efforts in pushing this work to fruition. So thanks to everyone.

Now we can all enjoy this wonderful public open space as it has been intended all along.


REAL CHRISTMAS TREE RECYCLING

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

My dear all,

This time, I would like to tell you a tale from the region I was born: the county of Provence in the South of France. It is a beautiful story teaching you how easily we can be distracted from what Christmas actually means. Read it, have a thought and answer the question: what is Christmas, the activity, the Incarnation of the Word of God?

THE THREE WHISPERED MASSES. A CHRISTMAS TALE

This is a story that happened in the 17th century in the south of France. It was written by Alphonse Daudet in his "Letters from my windmill".

The story is set in the castle of Trinquelage on Christmas Eve. Don Balaguère, reverend chaplain of the castle is discussing with his sacristan Garrigou in the vestry. The two men are not discussing about the preparation of the service but of the meal that is to follow. The reverend is captivated by the amount of details that his sacristan is giving to him. The sacristan spent the whole day with the kitchen preparing. He knows very well what kind of birds was on the table. He knows everything about the variety of fish that were prepared. He knows the kind of wine that was set on the table. He knows everything about the dishes, glasses, the centrepieces, the flowers and candelabra that were displayed. He describes so much wonders that will trouble the mind of the reverend before he gets to the sanctuary.

There are actually two things to know. First as you will understand, is that his clerk is actually the devil himself for tonight. Second is that at these times in the Catholic Church, it was the tradition to attend to three masses in a row at Christmas Eve.

So, while both men were preparing for the mass, the population and the nobility of the region were aiming to the chapel of the castle. The first mass went more or less well. The mind of the priest was sometimes digressing, thinking about all the delicacies waiting for him at the table of his lordship the marquees of Trinquelage. The coming in and out of all the personal working in the kitchen at the back of the chapel troubles him again. And

without realising it, he says the grace instead of a blessing. Garrigou spends his time ringing the bells with a pace that accelerates. More or less the priest ends the mass with a pretty acceptable standard.

Just the time to breathe and now starts the second mass. But this time the bells won't stop ringing and the images in his mind won't go away. The reverend is now swallowing the pages of his book of prayers with avidity. When he starts with "The Lord be..."; he sacristan interrupts him with an "also with you". The pace accelerates. The churchgoers start to wonder what is happening.

"Two! One last more" says to himself Don Balaquère.

And now starts the third mass like a race. The bells are ringing frantically. Pages are jumping. The celebrant is mumbling. The congregation doesn't know when to stand, kneel or sit anymore. The creed is omitted. After all, nobody complains because everybody has got all the beauty, the smells and taste of the promised meal blurring their mind. And at the moment the priest bursts in a "go in peace to serve the Lord", everybody is already running to the dining room.

That night, Don Balaguère ate a lot. So much that he died of a heart attack. It is now time to face the judgement. He hasn't got the welcoming he would have hoped. The Eternal greets him with fury.

"So you've stollen me a mass?! You dragged your whole congregation in an unforgivable sin of gluttony. Did you think a life a virtue would cover this disgrace? You've stollen one, you will say 300 before you and all your parishioners go through these gates!"

Since that day, the shepherds of the county have been telling to who would listen, that every Christmas Eve, among the ruins of the former castle, you could see people dressed in old clothes, congregating to the chapel. A priest was saying a silent mass, accompanied by a servant ringing silent bells.

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
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



