NAYLAND & WISTON CALENDAR COMPETITION

VILLAGE HALL: RE-ROOFING WORKS

There has been a delay in starting the re-roofing works for our Village Hall; this has been caused by both the Leases to the Village Hall Management Committee (VHMC) and Webb's Meadow not being registered; this was essential in securing the National Lottery grant. The National Lottery has put a restrictive covenant on the land and property to protect their investment in our Village Hall and Playing Field, Webb's Meadow.

The journey to achieve the money for the re-roofing project started in 2018 with Patricia Fuller and I seeking grants. Patricia's work included dealing with Babergh District Council, whose representative initially rejected our request, but due to Patricia's insight and tenacity we obtained a substantial sum of CIL money of £100,000. There is also a grant of £10,000 from Babergh's Community Fund.

The biggest single Grant is from the National Lottery of £275,305; this grant could not have been obtained without the full support of your VHMC and our Parish Council who have also provided £60,000.

The National Lottery also required Community participation for the project together with a reduction in the energy costs for the Village Hall. This was achieved by four fundraising events, contributions from the support of the Village Lunches and the Community Council agreed to a substantial grant of £20,000. There is a grant of £10,000 from Green Nayland towards the cost of the Photovoltaic panels. The VHMC is very grateful for all the other grants; both from the societies that use the Village Hall together with the personal grants from many individuals.

The roof project will take 26 weeks approximately on site and an additional mobilisation period to enable a site setup and pre-purchase of the roof materials, including the Photovoltaic panels.

The VHMC will sign the building works contract with T J Evers who submitted the best and most complete tender received. The intention is to keep the hall open to all hirers when the works are in progress. Please be aware that, to ensure a safe roof replacement, there will be a scaffold around the whole of the Village Hall, with all of the entrances and exits available for clear and safe use.

We all should benefit from the increased roof insulation, the Welsh slates and the photovoltaic panels which will reduce the overall running costs of our Village Hall. *Iain Wright, Chairman, VHMC*

PUBLIC FORUM

Sally Dalton asked whether Matthew Lee, SCC had replied on progress following his permit application to the Environment Agency for reduction of the overgrown reed bed at Caley Green. James Finch, promised to chase up this matter yet again. He would contact Matthew Lee the following morning.

COUNTY COUNCIL REPORT

James Finch said SCC continues to object to electricity pylons on the Norwich/Tilbury line. On Devolution he said SCC's cabinet has approved an interim 'One Council' plan for local government reorganisation in Suffolk which was submitted to ministers on 21st March 25. This can be viewed at: https://www.suffolk.gov. uk/asset-library/2025-03-21-suffolkcc-lgr-interim-plan-final.pdf DISTRICT COUNCIL REPORT

Cllr Isabelle Reece said Babergh's realistic possible options regarding Devolution were a single Unitary Authority, covering the whole of Suffolk; two Unitary Authorities, with a basic East-West Divide; or three Unitary Authorities, with the Ipswich area standing alone. However, the three Unitaries option will significantly increase costs. These Authorities will not affect Town and Parish Councils.

There is a statutory requirement that Babergh, as the planning authority, notify neighbouring residents by letter about planning applications and/or display a site notice. Babergh is proposing to stop sending letters as a way of reducing costs. The PC have concerns regarding this. HIGHWAYS

James Finch continued to voice his concerns about the speed of traffic along Stoke Road. New road markings would be provided, and he had written to Suffolk Constabulary to request manned equipment checks. Councillors voiced their concerns at the state of the village road surfaces.

WALSH TRUST

Gerry Battye reported that the Walsh Trust had resolved to pass £300 income from Charity Commission investments to the Community Pantry and Hardship Fund for use by individuals or families of Nayland and Wissington who had financial needs. PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at Hillside, 14 Stoke Road [DC/25/00656] for works to trees to reduction of a white mulberry tree and lower dead branches of an oak tree; at St James' Church [DC/25/00855] for works to trees to reduce a Liquid Amber and a Prunus tree and at 5 High Street [DC/25/01114] for discharge of conditions relating to biodiversity enhancement measures

Between meetings councillors had no objections at 100 Bear Street [DC/25/01178] for works to protected trees.

Discussing recent applications councillors had concerns regarding a revised proposal at 2 Gravel Hill [DC/24/03691] for erection of double carport/machinery store. Councillors objected to the proposal on the grounds: insufficient changes have been made from the previous plan; no lighting scheme and definition has been submitted; a greater compromise is needed concerning the excessive mass of the building created by width and height; the ground levels and slope of the site remain subject to some dispute and recommend a planning officer visit to confirm the impact this would have on Birch Street properties.

PLANNING FOR THE FUTURE – NEW HOUSING TARGETS

Laura Erith reported on her attendance at a meeting organised by Babergh. It was clear message that each Parish should adopt its own Housing Needs and Neighbourhood Plan in order to better influence the judgement of Planning Applications for the Parish. National Housing Targets were driving the agenda. In Nayland, there could be prospective applications for 210 residential properties over the next 20 years.

The construction and adoption of a Neighbourhood Plan had

been urged. The main issue is to consider WHERE the Parish council would want new homes built within the Parish. It would obviously be a contentious issue.

The Council agreed that a Neighbourhood Plan would have to be a whole Village venture, involving everybody, which would then have to be formally adopted and then presented by the Council. The process is clearly laid out. This would become the main focus of the forthcoming Annual Parish Assembly.

RECREATION & OPEN SPACES

Kevin Sheath reported on the recent tree risk assessment by independent contractor who attended with the Tree Warden. 11 tree locations had been identified as requiring work and quotes for the work will be obtained.

Gerry Battye reported on the annual independent Safety Inspection of the Fairfield Playpark and Playing Field. No major defects had been identified. The inspector had commented on how well the area was maintained. An action plan based upon the report had been drawn up. This would include further spikes on equipment that showed pigeon damage.

CALEY GREEN

The Council will liaise with James Finch concerning SCC's dealing with the reed bed situation. Councillors expressed their growing frustration at the break down in information from SCC and the Environment Agency about progress. James Finch had promised contact with the Council Officer and Gerry Battye and Tricia Fuller asked that the Parish Council make its own contact with both parties so that information was available for the Parish Assembly. It was noted again that spring brought both the growing and the breeding season, so a further year had been wasted. ALLOTMENTS

Councillors expressed their concern at the continuing very poor state of a minority of allotments. The Chair offered to check with the Clerk and then liaise with the sub-committee to draw up a standard termination of lease letter. It was agreed that by the May Council meeting, the matter would be resolved.

IN BRIEF

A new street light and post (No 24) had been constructed in Elm Grove, following the tanker incident.

The overgrown condition of the footpath adjacent to the Allotment Field was discussed. Clearance work was needed. Laura Erith would prompt or enquire about responsibilities and the work needed.

The main item on the agenda for the Parish Assembly on 30th April would be A Village Plan with a Housing Focus.

PARISH COUNCIL

Gerry Battye chaired the meeting. Although not present at the meeting Laura Erith was voted as PC Chair. Other positions and working parties would be agreed at the June meeting.

PUBLIC FORUM

Sally Dalton raised 4 queries: Has there been any progress from SCC regarding reduction of the reed bed at Caley Green; have the grass cutting contractors been asked to leave wild areas under the trees on the Green; could a path be mowed through the longer grass to access the new bench; she advised that a vehicle belonging to a nearby worker has left it for days at a time in the cul-de-sac by the Green. Councillors said they haven't instructed their contractors to alter the mowing regime and will remind them to cut a path to the bench.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

Isabelle Reece had reported that Babergh contractors have mowed the grass area around the old bus shelter on Harpers Estate; councillors noted it is looking better.

HIGHWAYS

It was previously agreed that PC contractors would carry out semi-regular weeding of the A134 traffic islands; they will be asked to weed the area again.

Regarding an issue of long term parking in the Bear Street cul de sac raised in the public forum; the Clerk will write to the employer raising concerns including those of accessing driveways.

PLANNING

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **100 Bear Street** [*DC*/25/01178] for works to trees subject of a TPO to reduce 1 Lime to previous pruning points and reduce the canopy of 1 Ash as indicated on application documents; at **5 High Street** [*DC*/25/011154] for discharge of conditions 4 roof facing materials, 5 eaves and verges, 6 rainwater goods, 7 fenestration and 8 internal elevations; and at **Site Adjacent Paddock Grove (Nags Corner)** [*DC*/25/01336] for discharge of condition 6 contamination.

Between meetings to meet Babergh's deadline councillors had no objections at **Snowdrop Cottage Bures Road** [*DC*/25/01879] for demolition of existing garage and construction of an annexe, outbuilding and extension of the existing culvert.

Discussing recent applications councillors had no objections at **3 Walsh Rise** [DC/25/01906] for erection of a ground and first floor extension and additional fenestrations. They heard that the application has confirmed building materials will be delivered to the drive, contractors vehicles will park off road and work will take place between 8am-5pm. Councillors had no objections to this application.

HOUSING

A local 'Call For Sites' for Affordable Housing has been promoted; there had been no responses to date.

Following discussion at the Parish Assembly regarding the possible development of a Neighbourhood Plan councillors heard that a development of 'community-led affordable housing' would count towards Barbergh's target of new dwellings. They felt that this option would target the need better and likely to be better supported. This would require an up-to-date Housing Needs Survey and identification of potential sites. 'Neighbourhood Plan' and 'Housing Needs Survey' would be agenda items going forward. An ideas and thoughts form would be circulated between meetings with a view to making a resolution at the June meeting.

RECREATION AND OPEN SPACES

Tendring Hall Estate have written as courtesy advising that they have agreed a two season lease with two companies – Stour Kaya & The Paddle Company – to operate from estate land behind the Anchor; hours will be 10am-5pm. Kevin Sheath said he could not find any adverse comments about the company. However, he said rivercraft cannot easily travel down river from there due to shallow water and overhanging vegetation. Therefore this is likely to increase the traffic upriver. Concerns were raised regarding parking and access. The Council will respond, mentioning these issues, those of relevant planning/permits, and consideration to litter, disturbance of wildlife and private moorings in order to minimise adverse impact.

Gerry Battye has drawn up an action plan following the annual inspection of the Playpark. An updated quote will be obtained for replacement of the wooden fence. A bird spike for the basket swing will be ordered.

CALEY GREEN

Counillors heard that James Finch had spoken to Matthew Lee (SCC) about the long delay in getting the long reed bed reduced. It transpires that permission from the EA is not required as previously suggested. Matthew Lee said he would push this matter forward and advise the council by 5pm on Monday would update Councillors on further progress. It was pointed out that a season was missed so work is unlikely to take place until the autumn.

Kevin Sheath will contact Matthew on Tuesday to ensure progress is made.

ALLOTMENTS

Following recent checks on the condition of plots letters have been drafted giving notice to tenants who still are not working their plots. A tenant has advised they will be giving up their plot; there is currently no-one on the waiting list.

Debbie Hattrell will book the judge for the Best Kept Allotment competition; prizes will be awarded at the Flower Show on 2nd August.

IN BRIEF

The Community Council are progressing provision of a community access defibrillator at Wiston; the equipment has been ordered, the PC will pay for it so the VAT can be claimed back. The CC will pay half the cost and arrange installation.

Following the annual parish tree inspection Kevin Sheath will collate the results to determine which are the PC's, Babergh's and SCC's responsibility and the urgency of recommended works. The Clerk will then be able to pass details on to Babergh and SCC and arrange for quotes for Parish trees.

It was requested that a microphone is used at future annual Parish Assemblies.

Of course the date is also Suffolk Day. Another reason to enjoy the day just taking it easy and enjoying your picnic. Hope to see you there O


HAVE YOUR SAY ON THE FUTURE OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT IN SUFFOLK

It's time to have your say on the most dramatic change to local government in 50 years

The national government wants to simplify how councils work. This means the current county, district, and borough councils will be replaced. Instead, all services will be run by new 'unitary councils'.

Right now in Suffolk, local government services are split up:

 Suffolk County Council is responsible for delivering services such as special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), roads, public transport, social care, libraries, and recycling centres across the county.



• Five district and borough councils (Babergh, East Suffolk, Ipswich, Mid Suffolk, and West Suffolk), are responsible in

their areas for delivering services like bin collections, street cleaning, parking, leisure services, local planning, council housing, and helping homeless people.

A unitary council is a single council that provides all these services for a specific area.

Suffolk's councils are now looking at how to reorganise to better meet the needs of residents, businesses, and communities, as part of the government's Local Government Reorganisation (LGR) initiative.

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

Executive Committee: As always new members would be welcome to join the team. Becs Spendiff was voted onto committee as Secretary.

Fundraising Activities/Events: Plan to discuss 60th anniversary plans at our next meeting

Public Access Defibrillator: Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. The defibrillator at the Village Hall is managed by the CC; it is regularly checked and is registered with The Circuit, the British Heart Foundation System linked to the Ambulance Service. The defibrillator at the Fire Station is also linked to the Circuit which means the Ambulance Service will refer 999 callers to the closest defibrillator.

The Wiston defibrillator has now been ordered. Once it has been delivered we will arrange installation. Adam Lunn of the First Responders confirmed that he is still happy to monitor and report on the Wiston defibrillator.

Online Ticketing Facility: NaylandEvents.org This remains useful for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility contact Justin Dowding.

Village Hall Gardening Morning: Community Council representatives were unable to attend the session on 5th April. It was suggested the CC could organise a separate occasion to work on their section of the garden. Iain Wright suggested waiting until after the building works are finished.

Community Involvement: Ideas to help raise participation in village groups and events welcome. If village groups have any vacancies on their committees or for volunteers please let Lorraine know so they can be promoted in the Community Times **Volunteer Vacancies** article.

Resident Volunteer List: This is a list of residents prepared to assist other residents who at times are unable to get out for themselves and would benefit from having a prescription collected, an errand run or some shopping dropped off. If anyone requires assistance or could give assistance if needed please contact Lorraine Brooks.

Plaque for Ken Willingale: Rachel Hitchcock gave a short dedication for the plaque in the HosrtSoc section of the village hall garden to commemorate Ken and Olive Willingale's contribution to the village through their involvement in many village organisations, including the CC of which Ken was a founder member and remained involved until his death last year. Rachel added that he is still remembered as a kind and community-minded man who was at the heart of the organisation and thanked Tony Fryer for producing the slate plaque.

TREASURER'S REPORT: .

Matt Cable also gave his report on finances to 30th April 2025: **Breakdown of profits:** Quiz £533, Community Times £305, Calendar £105.

Grants paid: Village Hall roof £10,000, Horse Watering £200.

Expenses:£198 for 2024 defibrillator maintenance and £112 for hall hire.

Current Position: The accounts show reserves of £29,560 represented by Deposit a/c monies £12,022, Current a/c monies £16,745, Cash in hand £793. We hold £144 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: VH roof £20,000, Horse Watering £200 and Lizzie's Fund £153. **Therefore unencumbered assets are £9,063**.

Grants & Donations:

Permissive Path Improvements: Two stretches of permissive footpath (Stoke Road and Court Knoll to Allotment field) will be monitored and Dan Bowman will be called back when seasonal maintenance is needed. The Bodpave solution for path improvement on Nayland Meadow will be monitored with a view to this being a possible solution, if approved by Tendring Hall Estate, to the wet stretch of footpath between Court Knoll and the allotments.

Horsewatering: June Freeman expressed thanks for a £200 grant to that resident group maintaining the Horsewatering. She gave an update on the work done including ensuring a spring seeding within a very tight time frame to hopefully provide a colourful summer display.

Community Times & Websites: Lorraine Brooks expressed thanks as always to all contributors.

Village Calendar: Lorraine Brooks reported the 2026 calendar is in production. Claire has gained 11 sponsors; Wendy has gained the last one required. The calendar file is prepared and the photos inserted; Wendy will now be able to write the captions. There was, with the usual prompting and promotion, a good response to the photographic competition - 35 entrants submitted 194 photographs. That's not far short of the record 215 photos in 2023. 31 people voted for their favourite images (previous record last year was 44). There were many really wonderful photos, making choices very difficult indeed. Thank you to everyone for participating. The results and a selection of scenes that didn't quite make the top 12 will feature in the Community Times. Completed calendar will be sent for a print proof in early June and final print once the proofs are checked and will hopefully go on sale at the Flower Show, this year on 2nd August and Nayland shops the week after that.

We will be planning for VJ Day and 80th anniversary of the end of WW2 commemorations - an afternoon and evening event to raise funds for the Poppy Appeal comprising music, words and refreshments in the Village Hall on Sunday 31st August. Please save the date!

Nayland Choir: They had a very successful concert at the end of March, with lots of positive feedback. They hope an increase in choir subs and a small rise in ticket prices for concerts will enable them to perform in St James' Church accompanied by an orchestra more regularly. They are currently busy rehearsing for their summer concert, 'A Summer Garland of Song' on 4th July. There will be a light supper - see page 12

Art Group: They continue to meet in the church hall on Wednesday afternoons. We have spent some time developing our pencil skills and it has been helpful to go 'back to basics' as

well as developing and refining our drawings. When painting, we usually work in watercolour to produce landscapes - sometimes using the Nayland calendar as inspiration so we are glad to see that the competition has just been run again this year!

Nayland First Responders: in April, our volunteers attended a scenario training day. These sessions were supported by volunteers from the Casualties Union, a charity who provide volunteer actors to play patients for the emergency services. Our responders were faced with a female who had fallen from her roof, a catastrophic bleed to a leg from a hedge cutter, a stroke, and a diabetic emergency. Three well attended Basic Life Support sessions (2 at Nayland, 1 in Little Horkesley) were hosted by our volunteers for local residents. A CPR awareness night was also held in Leavenheath. They are looking for sponsorship/donations to fund a gazebo to allow them to attend outdoor engagement events. This will provide shelter while in attendance at Bures Music Festival and other Summer events. [The Village Hall offered storage for the gazebo and potentially a lifting chair which the Responders also hope to be able to purchase through fundraising and sponsorship]

St James' Church: Sunday Services continue as does the Wednesday coffee morning. Chris Hunt expressed very grateful thanks for the huge effort by those who organised another successful Church Fete on Monday 5th May. He said it is a significant undertaking and their efforts were much appreciated.

HortSoc: The Spring Morning Market takes place on 10th May. The annual Summer Flower Show will be going ahead on 2nd August. Volunteers have been secured for these events but there is still no response to the plea for committee members. Please support if you can.

Baby and Toddler Group: They have welcomed new families from the village and it is lovely to have a little group of small babies and their mums visiting us regularly. Unfortunately even though we have had a nice number of families visiting we are still struggling with the rent, especially now there has been another small rent increase. We need to pay for insurance plus drinks and snacks for our families and can't quite make ends meet. We hope to apply for another grant to enable us to continue. **Conservation Society:**

On 1st of May, in conjunction with Nayland Royal British Legion 24 members enjoyed a private tour of Ingatestone Hall. As you

may be aware the Hall has a connection with Nayland as village resident Sue Carbutts is the grand-daughter of Lady Petre who played a key part in the restoration of the building between the wars.

The spring litter pick took place on 26th April but sadly only 10 residents participated so we weren't able to cover as much of the village as usual.

On 11th May, Chris Hunt will lead members and guests on the Spring Footpath Walk. In June, John Walker will give a talk on 'Wealden Buildings' and in October Dave Steward will speak on the subject of Kentwell Hall.

Nayland Meadow: It has been good to see the cowslips flourishing, and ewes and their lambs back in residence. The warm, dry weather has not been helpful to the length of Riverside path which Danny Thurlow reseeded just over a month ago. The amount of new grass emerging so far has been very disappointing but hopefully will improve when some wetter weather eventually arrives. We were very sorry that Dipak Warren sadly passed away recently. She was a much liked and respected member of our management team since its inception, and will be greatly missed by us all.

Parish Council: The annual Parish Assembly was attended by approx 15 people. We didn't have a zoom facility which may have attracted more. This was disappointing as Paul Bryant had given up his time from Babergh DC to talk about a possible local development plan for Nayland. He was incredibly interesting. We also had Jeremy Bloomfield from Stoke by Nayland who enlightened us to the real world of making a local plan. It was followed up by several questions including the ongoing reeds at Caley Green saga - they are persevering with getting action on that. Laura Erith (PC Chair) thanked her fellow councillors who give their time voluntarily. She appealed because there were 2 vacancies on the Council.

COMMEMORATIVE PLAQUE FOR KEN & OLIVE WILLINGALE

Community Council Chair, Rachel Hitchcock, gave a short dedication to the new plaque in the village hall garden to acknowledge Ken and Olive Willingale's contribution to the village through their involvement in many village organisations. She thanked Tony Fryer for producing the slate plaque which reads *Ken Willingale, Community Council Treasurer, Chairman and President 1966-2024 and Olive Willingale, Horticultural Society Secretary & President 1980-2011". Commemorating their many contributions to the village".* This replaced the plaque for Olive, in front of Olive's tree, an *Acer tataricum 'Flame'*, planted in her honour, by HortSoc.

Ken and Olive moved to Nayland from Barkingside in 1966, living first in Willow Grove, then Fen Street and latterly in Church Mews. From the outset they became involved in the village; one of their first ventures was helping to raise funds to build the new

village hall. Ken being appointed Treasurer of a Steering Group (which became the Community Council) to take forward the project of providing a recreation ground and village hall for the community; this was achieved when the hall opened in 1972.

Over the years Ken and Olive contributed to many village groups. Ken did a stint as Chairman of the Parish Council and became a Lay Reader of St James Church. They were both members of the Royal British Legion, later being honoured as Presidents of the RBL and the Women's Section. While Olive was the force behind, and eventual President of the Horticultural Society. In 2008 they were honoured to be awarded a Babergh Achievement Award recognising community heroes. Sadly Olive passed away in 2011. As founder member and long-standing President Ken remained a valued part of the Community Council until his death in January 2024.



NAYLAND FETE:

Brief notes on the Annual Parish Assembly: 30th April 2025

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or https://naylandwithwissington-pc.gov.uk)

Speakers: Paul Bryant, Neighbourhood Officer of Babergh District Council and Jeremy Bloomfield, a member of the Stoke by Nayland Neighbourhood Plan Group.

Paul Bryant explained about the role of Neighbourhood Plans, particularly in the light of current planning law.

He outlined the current planning system and the role of the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF). Sustainability is a key element. Councils had a role in this. For example, the County Council amongst other things has a role in transport and parking, whilst the District Council has created its Joint Plan.

He explained that Neighbourhood Planning at parish level was a 'bottom up' approach with communities identifying where acceptable development might take place and where listed and non-listed heritage assets created restraints in the view of the residents. What did we want to see over the next 10-15 years? Evidence collection is the underpinning support for any Neighbourhood Plan. The local identification of green spaces was part of the Neighbourhood process. What goes into the Plan depends on what the community wants and needs. However, we must remember that it is about development of land.

The development of housing will be across the district. Babergh's target is 775 homes across the district over the next 20 years.

He outlined the Consultation Stages: The Draft Neighbourhood Plan would be out to public consultation, including residents, Babergh and Suffolk County for 6 weeks. Then Babergh drive the submitted plan with it going to an independent examiner and then facing a parish referendum. 50% +1 would be enough for a referendum decision.

There are costs involved but the real cost is 'Time' by volunteers and the PC. Grant Funding for Plans is available. The Parish may employ a Planning Consultant. It could be a 2-3-year process.

Mr Bryant agreed that things such as the Dedham Vale National Landscape, flood plain, conservation area would proportionally reduce Babergh's target of dwellings for Nayland and Wissington. A resident asked about the relevance of Housing Needs Surveys. Mr. Bryant confirmed that such surveys only have a shelf life of five years. Another resident asked about the planning importance of traffic and congestion in judging sites and future planning applications. Mr. Bryant replied that there was only so much a Plan could do. Congestion is not a planning issue. 'Highway Standards' is the measure. Mr. Bryant recommended the website, 'Guide to Neighbourhood Planning' where options were outlined.

He suggested that the Community be canvassed about whether a Neighbourhood Plan is the way forward.

Jeremy Bloomfield was a key member of the Stoke by Nayland Neighbourhood Plan Team which was formed in 2017. It has 7 members, not all of them Councillors. Voluntary time has been a crucial issue. Anybody considering a Neighbourhood Plan must be clear that it is not about stopping development, even if the Plan includes that message.

Questions and Observations

Mary George raised the issue of Babergh's decision to cut back on issuing current notices of planning applications; she felt that the system of publicising applications was already flawed and pleaded that all residents continue to be notified by letter with adequate notice. She added that not all residents had computers or ability to continually search the website, to check for very local development.

Adrian Amos voiced his frustration with the PC, County Council and Environment Agency over the continuing lack of any management of the growing reed bed on the River Stour at Caley Green. He pointed out that it had gone on for years. Nothing was happening. James Finch explained that he was currently in touch about this with the relevant County Officers. Councillors pointed out their frustrations and time spent in meetings and on site in trying to get effective reed bed management.





EVA ROLFE

Eva was a much-loved Mum to Karen and Janet, Nan to Fran, Clare, Jon, Natalie, Scarlett, and Jessica, and Great-Nanny to Helena, Chloe, George, and Eva. Last year, she proudly became a Great-Great Nanny to Albie - a milestone that filled her with joy. She adored her family and was the heart of all of us, always there through life's ups and downs. Her home in Nayland was where we gathered over the years for family get-togethers with countless treasured memories.

Born in Boxted, an only child to Sonny and Beanie Biggs, Eva grew up in Nayland and was just 11 years old when World War II began, spending her childhood and early teenage years during wartime. Eva often shared stories about the American soldiers stationed nearby, and those that were billeted in the family home. She fondly recalled cycling with friends to dances at the American airbases and would tell stories of how they would quickly abandon their bicycles and dive into ditches whenever they heard the distinctive sound of doodlebugs approaching!

After leaving school at 14, Eva worked at Dolcis shoe shop in Colchester before joining Griffins store (which later became Williams and Griffin), where she mastered the soft furnishings trade making chair covers and curtains, quickly rising to the position of 'first hand' to her employer Mr Stannard.

Eva met her husband Dick after the war, on a coach trip to Southend arranged by her mother as a blind date. They married in 1951 at Nayland Church and moved into the farmhouse at Nags Farm, where Dick worked while Eva nurtured their family and a houseful of animals. Eva loved the family pets although wasn't quite so keen on horses after riding once and falling off, stating "never again!" Dick and Eva shared a wonderfully long and happy life together until Dick's passing in 2009.

Throughout the years, Eva was an active member of the Nayland community, working in Laverty's the village shop and

being involved in the Women's Institute, the Walsh Trust and the Over 60s club. She also volunteered at St Helena's Hospice (where she had the honour of meeting Princess Diana) and served as area organiser and driver for Meals On Wheels. In more recent years, she contributed to the Village Players Amateur Dramatic Society, where she enjoyed creating costumes (and occasionally made an appearance on stage!) and served as Secretary for Nayland Carpet Bowls Club.

> Eva's community service was recognised in 1993 with a Community Achievement Award from Babergh District Council. She was always ready to lend a helping hand and participate in the local community.

Beyond her dedication to family and community, Eva had many passions, she loved dressmaking and created beautiful handmade pieces for family members over the years. She enjoyed playing carpet bowls and cherished holidays with her bowling friends. She had a love for theatre and dance, often going to see shows with her family, and was an avid fan of Strictly Come Dancing. She was

also a big sports fan, especially tennis and football, which she loved watching both on TV and at live events. She and Dick regularly attended Colchester United matches for many years and also enjoyed following another favourite team Manchester United when on the TV.

Eva touched the lives of many, she had a natural warmth about her and always took a genuine interest in people's lives. Her kind and generous nature shone through in everything she did and nothing made her happier than spending time with her family laughing and chatting around the kitchen table just putting the world to rights, especially if it involved tea and cake! (She was particularly partial to a slice of victoria sponge!) She had a smile that could brighten any day and a quiet strength that made a difference to so many.

Eva passed away peacefully at the age of 97 and will be deeply missed by everyone fortunate enough to know her.

RIVER WATCH

NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

WATER LEVELS

Despite the weather being very dry this spring there have been no reports or longterm water level fluctuations. There have been the odd occasions when the horseshoe weir almost ceased flowing but they didn't last and were probably caused by work going on upriver or at the sluice gates.

If the dry spell becomes a drought the authorities may suspend the Ely Ouse to Essex Transfer Scheme (EOETS) which since 2015 has brought water from Denver in Norfolk to Abberton Reservoir. We are told that the Rover Stour benefits by as not all the water transfrerred is extracted.

Should you feel there is an issue use the above sea level measurement to report to the EA hotline, and Lorraine would be pleased to be advised in order to keep a note of incidents (*details as above*).

WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE

There is currently no news on water quality and testing. A local tester suggests the quality tends to be poor after rain; that may be something to consider if you wish to swim in the river.

REED & VEGETATION GROWTH

The situation with reeds around the Horseshoe weir (and other areas of the river through Nayland) remains disgraceful. The EA are the riparian owners around the weir.

I have reason to look back at a report sent in 2022 to the CEO of the EA in which I quoted from their own publications:

"Aquatic and riparian plants need to be managed because they can: reduce channel capacity, raise water levels and impede flow resulting in water logging or flooding, impede navigation, prevent fishing and damage of fish spawning habitats, reduce amenity value, destroy wildlife habitats and lead to the domination of a single species."

Regarding vegetation they say: "Emergent species (like the Phragmites australis at Caley Green) are those which are rooted in sediments at the bottom of watercourses and grow in water usually no more than 1m deep. They can be very problematic. Key problems caused:

Dense networks of rhizomes can form large stands which impede flows.

- Once established, the roots and rhizomes trap silt and extend the area that they can colonise, which further impedes water flow in the long-term.
- Dense stands can also impair fishing and other recreational activities.

• Following die-back during the winter months, the robust stems can remain standing and continue to cause problems.

They suggest a solution is "Creating a deeper central channel of more than 1m should help in preventing encroachment across a watercourse, allowing just a fringe to develop along the bank toe."

You have to wonder why they produce these booklets but don't act in accordance with them!

THE LONG REED BED AT CALEY GREEN

There has been a glimmer of hope regarding the very long running saga regarding reduction of the enormous and expanding wall of reeds along Caley Green. It has very recently transpired that the EA now say a permit is not required. The SCC officer dealing with this, like us, is frustrated. We hope to have some news but this will be next week once the CT had gone to print.

FISHING ROD LICENCES

The closed season, when you cannot fish on rivers and streams, is 15th March to 15th June so anglers may soon be seen along the riverbanks - where they can get to the river that is.

At any time of year a rod licence must be carried if you are aged 13 or over and you fish for freshwater fish. Licences can be purchased at Post Offices, online at <u>https://www.gov.uk/fishing-licences/buy-a-fishing-licence</u> or by telephone to the Environment Agency fishing licence service on 0344 800 5386.





The water level dipped briefly - if you notice any issues please make a note or take a photo and pass details on

All craft must be registered to take to the water on any part of the Inland Waterway network of England. The Environment Agency takes enforcement action if it finds any boat moored or in use if it is not displaying a current, valid registration plate.

The **River Stour Trust** can issue craft registrations on behalf of the Environment Agency. Registered craft are permitted to travel the whole length of the Stour Navigation, from Brundon Mill to Cattawade. The annual fee (1 Apr 2025 - 31 Mar 2026) is £52.90 per private unpowered craft. Monthly and weekly licences are available.

Alternatively, membership of **British Canoeing** includes a licence for many waterways in England. They have a number of membership plans: individual adult costs $\pounds 60$ (renewal $\pounds 47$). Membership covers the member and not the craft.

Wherever you obtain your licence you need to carry proof with you when you paddle; if you don't have proof when you're asked you could face a hefty fine.

An eye will be kept on the situation this year - if you see anyone depositing waste anywhere please report (details on right) it and also notify the Parish Council.

Feathered activity is not what it used to be, particularly when it comes to ducks and swans which we have always enjoyed, especially the children who would love feeding them and getting close. It is very sad. As mentioned on page 25 one duck has thus far managed to protect 3 of her ducklings. She will have been vigilant to have saved them from all the predators out there.

RSPB BIG GARDEN BIRDWATCH

Starlings came in at number 6, but it is years since we've seen any in our garden in Nayland, likewise with Magpies - they stopped coming in when the neighbouring property was redeveloped (goodness

knows why it's not that close and we are quite rural on the edge of the village). We see all the other species listed. A robin is always about following

us around the garden. We've also had wrens nesting; numerous times under the porch. There's a washing line running through it for damp windy days and when their young fledge they are frequently seen hanging upside down on the line... until they find their wings.

We have noticed a huge drop in the number of Chaffinches and Greenfinches; Chaffinches came in huge numbers a decade ago. But I was pleased to see there's been a slight increase in sightings of the Song Thrush. We have had a Thrush nesting in our garden for the last 2 years, but for about a decade we hardly ever saw a Thrush. They line their nests with mud so a pot of bare soil in the fringe of the little pond helps them.

We miss the pheasants since Tendring Hall Estate ceased having shoots. Before that every year a cock pheasant would treat the garden as his HQ and bring his harem of hens in for food and a drink; some 9 Long Tailed Tit nested here. **10 Collared Dove**

Swarming is a natural process. It is the colony reproducing by the old queen leaving

Swarms are not usually aggressive or sting but it is wise to stay away from the swarm

Should you be in need of a beekeeper to collect a swarm; Simon Cousins - 07845

Please note: Beekeepers will only remove honey bees; they do not deal with bumble


It's a highly effective predator of insects, including honey bees and other beneficial species, which can cause significant losses to bee colonies, and potentially other native species.

Eradicate them with care; like other hornets and wasps they have a nasty sting.

On the whole we stopped feeding the birds recently – sacks of peanuts and sunflower hearts become so expensive, especially when squirrels and the crow family were taking the majority. At times it was like a scene from Hitchcock's 'The Birds' - we don't miss them, they were bullies. But we still have numerous birds nesting here and they come in, especially morning and evening for a drink and a bath in the little pond. Some evenings we can hear and see an owl perching in the evening which is a delight.

New Signage on Permissive Paths

You may have noticed some slight changes as you benefit from the permissive paths to the east side of the village. There is a new bench near the Court Knoll path for walkers to enjoy. There is also new signage requesting dogs are kept on leads.


Please remember these paths are not a Public Right of Way; the landowner - in this case the Tendring Hall Estate - has granted permission for public access, but this could be rescinded. Please respect this facility so everyone can continue to enjoy the benefit.

USE OF PERMISSIVE PATHS

The Tendring Hall Estate ("THE") is one of the largest land owners in the immediate vicinity of Nayland having been owned by the Rowley family since it was acquired by Sir Joshua Rowley in 1750. The estate is now held by a family trust and we are fortunate that the trustees act very generously in permitting public access on various permissive paths that they have created over the estate lands.

A permissive path is a path where the landowner has granted permission for public use but such permission can be withdrawn at any time.

On the map right, you will observe that the THE have created a permissive path in Nayland (in addition to other permissive paths in the parish) on the outer edge of the large field, known as Anchor Marsh, which lies immediately to the north of the River Stour. At the western end of the field the permissive path on both the northern and southern sides are confined to the path between the fence and the adjoining hedgerows. At the eastern end of the field the permissive path heads south, crossing the field directly to the river. Once the river is reached you can either turn left towards the stile leading to the Fen or right to head towards the public footpath which ultimately leads to the footbridge over the river. Please note there is no right of access over the field





generally and it is important that everyone keeps to the permissive path routes and recently a number of signs have been erected to assist everyone in recognising same. Sadly, a number of signs have already been destroyed in mindless acts of vandalism. Bearing in mind the right of access is dependent upon the goodwill of the landowner it is difficult to understand the mentality of anyone behaving in such a manner.

As a further act of generosity, the THE trustees have recently erected a bench at the western end of the permissive path, close to Court Knoll, for public use. It is to be hoped in future that all users of the permitted paths will show their appreciation by respecting the designated routes.

of these sessions were held at Nayland Village Hall, with hall hire costs being donated by the Community Council. The third was held in Little Horkesley. All sessions were well attended.

A separate CPR awareness night was also held in Leavenheath. This was arranged by another member of East of England Ambulance Service staff and was supported by volunteers from our group.

We also had volunteers at the Nayland Village Fete where they demonstrated CPR and defibrillator use to visitors to our stand. It was lovely to meet more villagers and explain about our charity.

In April, our volunteers attended a scenario training day, arranged by the East of England Ambulance Service Community First Responders Training Team. These sessions were supported by volunteers from the Casualties Union, a charity who provide volunteer actors to play




Nayland with Wissington Crime Review 5/03/25 – 5/05/25:

Within this period Nayland with Wissington has had the following crimes – 1x Criminal Damage, 1x Fraud, 1x Assault, 1x Harassment, 1x Anti-Social Behaviour Incident.

This month, I thought I would highlight some good crime prevention techniques for reducing the chances of your bicycle being stolen. Bikes being stolen are unfortunately a fairly regular occurrence, with E-bikes or more expensive pedal bikes at larger risk.

Always lock your bike with at least one good quality lock, a lock which meets 'Sold Secure Gold Standard'. Using two different types of lock at the same time means the thief will require different tools to cut the locks, which will take longer, make more noise and increase the chances of the thief being seen.

- · Choose a quality D-lock and substantial chain and when locking, make sure they are as tight as possible.
- Never leave your bike unlocked, even for a moment, whether you are out or at home.
- Secure any lock away from the ground to prevent it being smashed.
- Lock your bike to a secure purpose made cycle stand or another immovable object, never leave your bike attached to a
 movable object such as a temporary sign outside a shop or a plastic drainpipe.
- If possible, leave your bike where it can be seen by passers-by, in a well-lit area and covered by CCTV.
- Remove or secure any valuables, including wheels, saddles, lights and devices.
- Register your bike for free at www.bikeregister.com.
- Take photos of your bike and make a note of the serial number and anything unique.

Don't buy a bike you suspect may be stolen, if the price is too good to be true, be very suspicious, meet the seller at their home or work address, check security markings using a UV torch, check the website above prior to purchase to make sure it is not flagged as stolen.

NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: March & April 2025 by David Lowe

March was a sunny, dry, warm month – with 18 year record figures on the first two. However, on some criteria, the margins were close.

Bright sunshine hours were 258.3 (closest 254.2 in 2014). Solar radiation was 8600 Ly (nearest 254.2 in 2014) and rainfall 5mm (38.69mm) nearest 11.2mm in 2011. Evapotranspiration was 63 mm (48.94 mm) second highest.

However, mean temperature was not a high – this was 7.8° C – beaten by 2024 (9.2°C) 2019, 2017, 2014 and 2012. Clear skies led to cold nights.

The highest temperature was 18.6° C (beaten by three other years) and the lowest – 3.8° C – third lowest. There were 8 air frosts (average 4.59) 11 ground frosts (8.88) and 16 grass frosts. There were 9 days with less than 10° C max (11.65) and 18 less than 15° C max (26.76).

Mean wind speed was 4.3 mph (4.97) and highest gust 29 mph - first time a March without a gust of at least 30 mph.

All in all, an unusual month.

April was a sunny month and certainly atypical – where were the April showers? However, locally, it was not record breaking

on any statistic, as the Met. Office claimed it was nationally.

Bright sun hours were 307.5 - beaten by 2021 with 309.5, mean temperature was 11 - beaten by 2011 with 12.4 and max temp was 23.2 - beaten by 2020, 2018 2015 and 2011 - the latter being the highest at 25.4.

Nor was it the driest – with 33.4mm, slightly in excess of the 17 year average of 31.48mm, though this was largely down to two random, heavy showers on the 21st April.

The lowest temperature for the month was 0.8° C (-0.82) and the lowest max, 11° C (8.83). There were no air or ground frosts – but 9 grass frosts.

There were 9 days with a max of less than 11° C (18) and 6 over 20° C. Solar energy was 12000 Ly (10617) beaten by 2010 and 2020. Evapotranspiration was 97.5 mm (76.27) beaten by 2020.

Highest daily rainfall was 15mm on the 15th, with a further 10.6 mm on the 21st. Highest rain rate was 50mm/hr (32.76) on the 13th.

Mean wind speed was 4.9 mph (4.58) with highest daily average 10.5 mph (9.73). Highest gust was 30 mph (33.71) on 2nd – the only day over 30 mph. Mean direction was east.



THE RECYCLING OF GARNETT AUTOMOBILES



These days we are constantly being urged to recycle everything we possibly can. Villages like Nayland have many old buildings which have been altered and extended over the years often using materials salvaged from other old buildings, this could also be described as recycling.

One of the best examples of recycling I know of concerns the garage which used to stand in Stoke Road on the site where today numbers 1-7 stand. These cottages were built in 1986 after the garage closed.

The site has a long history but many people remember the garage which was built in the 1960s when the old maltings, which stood there previously, were demolished. Some years ago Mrs Rosemary Knox told me an interesting story about the garage. It seems that the architect who worked for her in the 1960s also designed the new garage in Stoke Road.

When the garage closed in the 1980s the building was not demolished as most people believe, but was dismantled and removed from the site. It had been designed especially to be easily dismantled and it was subsequently sold to someone to use for a seaside home in Scotland. This was not the end of the story however as it seems that some years later the building was once again dismantled in Scotland and continued its roving life. This time it went off to Portugal and became a surfing school!

Looking back to Nayland's busy industrial past, there are many references to malting and brewing. During the early 19th century there were three farmers in Nayland and Wiston who were maltsters and one of these, James Cuddon, founded a brewery behind the church.

On the 1838 Tithe Map John Brown, maltster, was shown as a tenant of William Synnott, occupying the "House and Malt Office" in Birch Street, site of the garage. By 1920 the Birch Street maltings stood empty. The brewery had also closed, having previously been taken over by the Colchester Brewing Company. The former Birch Street maltings was then used by several people including William Norfolk, farmer and founder of Nayland's bus company. He used it for storing oats for his horses, the oats previously being crushed at the Leavenheath windmill; it was the Headquarters of the Home Guard during the war; Sid Butler, of Beaumont's shop (now Forget-Me-Not) bought the building and for a time used to grow mushrooms there.

In 1946 Mr Butler sold the building and adjoining house to Reginald Wingfield who set up "Competition Cars"during the 1950s in the old malting building and lived in the adjoining house. At that time the maltings and adjacent house were joined as can be seen in the old photograph, the access to the rear being at the other end of the building. The maltings were demolished in the early 1960s, the modern garage built on the site by Garnett Thompson, and he and his cousin Reginald Wingfield started the garage we remember. Eventually the business was renamed Garnett Automobiles when his cousin left.

> And so, when the garage building went off to its new life in Scotland in the 1980s a planning application was made to build houses on the site. The year after the houses were built a major event occurred. Everyone remembers the hurricane of 1987 and just before it happened I stood on the vacant site where the garage had been to look at the wonderful view across to St James's Church, knowing that when the new houses were built only the residents of the new houses would be able to see it. The focal point of the view was of course the church but in the foreground was the magnificent Cedar tree in the garden of Mill House. The demise of this ancient tree in the hurricane was a tragedy but I am glad to have a photograph of it and another of the garage which like the tree is now just a memory.

Dear Friends,

The sun is shining, the weather is warm and the promise of Easter fills me with hope. Because Easter Day was about as late as it can be this year, we are still in the middle of the Church's Easter season. It closes with the celebration of Pentecost or Whit Sunday on 8th June, taking a full fifty days to reflect on the meaning and significance of those events some 2000 years ago. For Easter is the heart of the Christian faith. Christianity is not merely a moral code, the sublime teaching of an inspirational man who lived 2000 years ago but a belief in the resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth, the son of man and the son of God. A man who suffered the worst that humanity can do, yet overcame it all. He did not fight back but forgave his enemies and even found the strength to give a convicted criminal hanging beside him, comfort and reassurance despite his own agony. Overcoming evil with good, his resurrection to new life affirmed his promise of new life to all who follow him in the way of goodness -not evil, love -not hate.

It is hard to believe: even his followers thought that it was an idle tale, a delusion of the heartbroken women who had gone to prepare his body. Until they saw for themselves and then- this little huddle of terrified, demoralised men and women were transformed. From hiding away in the upper room, they told their story to the crowds in the street, to the religious leaders in the Temple, in front of the very men who had conspired to execute their master. And they continued to tell their story of the good news of God's love manifested in the life, death and resurrection of one man, Jesus Christ, even though they were then themselves, persecuted and killed.

Some people then and now, think they just made it up, they couldn't admit they were wrong about Jesus. But if they did,

why would they have included their own failures, their denial of him and their desertion when he was arrested in their telling of this story, admitting openly their own lack of understanding and belief as events unfolded.

A lawyer, Frank Morison, once set out to write a book to prove that the early Christians had indeed made it up: it was all nonsense. He was not a militant atheist like Richard Dawkins. He believed that Jesus was indeed a great moral teacher, a pure and noble soul but miracles he did not believe. Looking at all the evidence, he was amazed to find that he came to a very different conclusion and it changed his life. He wrote a very different book called 'Who moved the stone'.

The reality of the resurrection has been changing lives for two millennia. If you admire the moral teachings but don't buy miracles, "those relics of a more credulous age", I challenge you to look again. You have nothing to lose and everything to gain. 'You will know the truth and the truth will set you free.' John Ch. 8, v. 32
