### **NEW 43 BUS SERVICE**

The 784 and 84 service has been replaced by a new 43 service with variants; the 43A via Assington, the 43B via Assington and Stoke; and the X43 main road route.

There are now more buses on Saturdays and all week the last buses in both directions run much later (8.50pm and 9.50pm). Previously the last bus into Colchester was 2.30pm. There will be four buses in each direction on Sundays. See the timetable covering the two Nayland stops on *page 46*.

### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

### Notes by observer of the meeting: 23rd July 2025

(Minutes will be available on PC notice board in the High Street or https://naylandwithwissington-pc.gov.uk after the next meeting)

### **PARISH COUNCIL**

Laura Erith chaired the meeting.

#### **PUBLIC FORUM**

Sally Dalton raised issues with litter bin collections by Babergh at Caley Green during the summer months when they get greater use, adding that the collector is delayed by demand at Dedham and the need to deposit refuse at Gt Blakenham. She asked Isabelle Reece if Babergh could cater better for the seasonal demand; she agreed to investigate.

### **DISTICT COUNCILLOR**

Isabelle Reece clarified that Neighbourhood CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) can be used to fund Neighbourhood Development Plans, but Capital CIL cannot. She has been investigating funding towards a Housing Needs Survey; the position seems to be that help may be provided should the survey help towards housing targets. She explained some of the debates going on regarding the Local Government Review and the proposals for 1 or more unitaries.

#### **HIGHWAYS**

Isabelle Reece said she had requested a road sweep of the Heights. It was agreed to contact James Finch to ask about Suffolk CC weedkilling the Heights ahead of a sweep by Babergh. **PLANNING** 

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **3 Walsh** Rise [DC/25/01906] for erection of a ground and first floor extension and additional fenestrations; at **Sargents Farm Bures Road** [DC/25/02344] for erection of ground mounted 16 panel solar array, to north of existing buildings; or for works to trees at **6 Willow Grove** [DC/25/02488] to reduce the height of a Silver Birch by up to 3m and reduce lateral limbs to suit and at **9 Stoke Road** [DC/25/02654] for removal of Norwegian Maple.

Between meetings to meet Babergh's deadline councillors had no objections at **Westwood**, **Harpers Hill** [DC/25/02600] for construction of outdoor pool and erection of lightweight covered structures to existing seating patio areas to include plant; at **5 High Street** [DC/25/02567&68] to amended plans for erection of a single-storey rear extension (following demolition of the existing rear extension) subject to agreement from the Heritage Team; at **Snowdrop Cottage Bures Road** [DC/25/01879] to amended plans for demolition of existing garage and construction of an annexe, outbuilding and extension of the existing culvert; at **52 - 54 Bear Street** [DC/25/02884] to listed building consent for replacement of plain tiles on the East facing roof slope subject to agreement from the Heritage Team.

Councillors maintained their objections to amended plans at **2 Gravel Hill** [DC/24/03691] for erection of double carport as insufficient changes had been made from the previous proposal.

Nayland PC's tree surgeon has submitted an application for works to trees as identified at the recent risk assessment inspection [DC/25/03070]. These concern trees at Webb's Meadow/Village Hall, the cemetery, allotment field and Caley Green .

### **OPEN SPACES INCLUDING CALEY GREEN**

Kevin Sheath will meet our grounds contractors to ascertain how the litterpicking is prioritised and see if our contractors could suggest improvements ahead of quotes/budget for next year.

Kevin Sheath said following a query during the tree inspection SCC have confirmed they own the grass triangle adjacent Caley Green. SCC will replace the sign 'weir ahead' near the tunnel. Updating on prevention of erosion of the bay, SCC have passed this on to their contractor Concertus to design a solution.

The donation of a bench would be discussed at the September PC Meeting. The kayak/paddle board hire company on the river near the Anchor has started with no issues reported so far.

#### **ALLOTMENTS**

A termination letter for neglected plots has been drafted. There is currently no waiting list. Allotment tenants have set up a WhatsApp group for general allotment chat. The Allotment judge was booked but they cancelled at short notice; Lorraine Brooks provided contact details of the judge used last year.

A proposed Allotment Improvement Plan had been shared by an Allotment Holder. A good response had been gained from a survey leading to various suggestions. It was agreed for the Chair to invite the Allotment Holder – Darius Laws - to join the Allotment Working Group and for them to consider and potentially agree a trial of using the vacant plot as a communal one to implement some of the ideas coming out of the survey.

### FREQUENCY OF PC MEETINGS

Councillors discussed the possibility of reducing meetings to 6 per year - July, September, November, January, March and May. There were mixed opinions at the meeting; it will be discussed further when more councillors are present.

### **IN BRIEF**

The Community Council are progressing with provision of a community access defibrillator at Wiston.

The Village Hall replacement roof works are now in progress; the PC have issued their financial contribution towards this. A councillor raised concern about vegetation encroaching the driveway to the hall.

It was agreed to instruct our tree surgeons to plant a Field Maple (Acer Campestre) in place of the dead tree growing out of the grave; this would be planted at a suitable place in the vicinity.

Owen Brown and Tricia Fuller were awaiting information about potential funding for a Housing Needs Survey.



### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

### **PARISH COUNCIL**

Gerry Battye chaired the meeting. There was no August meeting. **PUBLIC FORUM** 

Sally Dalton alerted the PC to a non-material amendment to the planning application for 5 dwellings adjacent to Paddock Grove. Councillors said Babergh did not advise councils of non-material amendments or invite comment from them, but the Council had requested updates on this site and would again ask Babergh to advise them on any amendment relating to this location.

It was suggested that if a Housing Needs Survey was carried out that the percentage of responses may be higher if the questions were simpler, more appropriate and less intrusive than the last one which only achieved a 31% response.

Lorraine Brooks asked whether the best-kept allotment competition had been judged since the Flower Show. Gerry Battye said the Allotment Association had let them down and no other arrangements had been made.

A resident of Parkers Way said that many residents of the sheltered accommodation were distressed that Babergh's Sheltered Housing Review may lead to the decommissioning of Parkers Way; the decision by Cabinet is due on 11th November.

Isabelle Reece said the view of Babergh's Head of Housing Management was sheltered accommodation should be protected.

Following an approach to the PC regarding formation of an Allotment Working Group with the aim of raising the community spirit a resident said they have identified a need to improve the fencing to keep rabbits and muntjac from damaging produce. Councillors said consideration is needed regarding the rules and possible future expansion but agreed they could present a proposed specification for the fencing, subject to agreement with other allotment holders, pest control and accessibility. The PC could then consider the proposal before the group moved forward in seeking grants for the project.

### **DISTICT COUNCILLOR**

Isabelle Reece is working towards getting more regular grass cutting of the area around the old Harpers Estate bus stop; regular weather conditions and more frequent cutting should reduce weeds. She is also trying to get more frequent road sweeping along the by-pass. Action is being taken to resolve the issue of the dog waste bin on Caley Green, near the A134 tunnel becoming over-full in summer.

### **FINANCE**

The Audit Report was fully compliant. The PC could consider for the future that (1) the Finance committee (not working party) could be held in public; this will be monitored and put on the January agenda; (2) the Council could benefit by having its own OneDrive for backing up; documents are currently secure but the Council will apply for its own OneDrive.

Councillors agreed that: SALC would be appointed as the PC's internal auditors, to go ahead with a 3-year insurance policy renewal option to benefit from a discount. All areas of the village are checked regularly to comply with the Risk Management Policy.

Kevin Sheath will meet with the grounds contractors to establish the specification regarding litterpicking with a view to making the best arrangement going forward.

### **PLANNING**

Councillors heard that Babergh had no objections at **2 Gravel** Hill [DC/24/03691] for erection of double carport/machinery store; at **Snowdrop Cottage Bures Road** [DC/25/01879] for demolition of existing garage and construction of an annexe, outbuilding and extension of the existing culvert; at **25 Stoke Road** [DC/25/01526] for erection of two storey side extension including conversion of existing garage; at **5 High Street** [DC/25/02567&68] to amended plans for erection of a single-storey rear extension (following demolition of the existing rear extension) and for **Nayland Parish Council** [DC/25/03070] for works to trees as identified in the Tree Risk Assessment at the Village Hall/Webbs Meadow, Burial

Ground and Caley Green.

Listed building consent was granted at **52 - 54 Bear Street** [DC/25/02884] for replacement of plain tiles on the East facing roof slope. Discharge of Conditions was granted at **3 Walsh Rise** [DC/25/03306] relating to 3 biodiversity, 4 Decking/Patio, 6 construction management plan and at **52 - 54 Bear Street** [DC/25/03962] for DC/23/05592 relating to timber frame, infill and brickwork repairs.

Between meetings to meet Babergh's deadline councillors had no objections at **1 Fox Cottages Bures Road** [DC/25/03186] for erection of new garage and store (following demolition of existing garage and store) and at **Stour House 23 Court Street** [DC/25/03613] for works to trees: T2 Lawson Cyprus remove to ground level, T3 Cherry tree remove dead wood T4 Lime tree crown lift by 2 metres.

Discussing recent applications at **18 Paddock Grove** [DC/25/03845] for retrospective application for the erection of a greenhouse in the garden councillors have no objections subject to shielding/diffusion of strip light as it is at risk of causing light pollution to neighbouring properties. Councillors have no objections to works to trees at **14 Court Street** [DC/25/03743] to reduce a Holly to previous pruning points, trimming to maintain shape and form of tree vegetation; at **43 Bear Street** [DC/25/03745] to reduce height of Hazel, Beech, Dogwood, Holly and to prune back to previous pruning points 2 Walnut trees; and at **Lower Courtwood 13A Court Street** [DC/25/03841] for works to various trees and vegetation.

The application at Caravan Site Rushbanks Farm Bures Road [DC/25/03427] for lawful development certificate for use of land as a caravan and tent camping site required evidence of previous use, if any was available, was discussed. Councillors agreed to send some photos of the site taken in August this year but have no other evidence to add.

### **CALEY GREEN**

Kevin Sheath reported that Caley Green working party met with Suffolk CC and Concertus, the engineers who will progress the project for installation of revetment to protect the riverbank. A permit from the Environment Agency will be required, but they have declined giving pre-application advice. Concertus are gathering information and survey to progress a permit application.

The replacement 'weir ahead' sign has been replaced. The Willow previously severely damaged in a storm has been felled and removed. Councillors felt that a suitable location for a new memorial bench may be in the area of Caley Green near the Darts Association bench once the reeds have been cut.

### FREQUENCY OF PC MEETINGS

Councillors discussed the possibility of reducing meetings from 11 to 6 per year. There were mixed opinions at the meeting; several councillors felt reducing the meetings would slow progress in getting things done; would not provide a good service to the residents and reduce the public's access to councillors. One councillor suggested it may encourage working residents to join the council; another felt more engagement was needed to attract new councillors. The Clerk said for a reduction in meetings to be successful Council would need to pre-empt issues, be organised well ahead and it would create more work between meetings. This will be discussed further when more councillors are present.

### **IN BRIEF**

Councillors are pleased with the new fencing around the Fairfield PlayPark.

The new community access defibrillator at Wiston, funded by the Community and Parish councils has been installed at Wiston. A Parkers Way resident asked if consideration could be given to installing one at Parkers Way.

T J Evers are on schedule with the replacement roof on the village hall and expect to finish by the Christmas holiday.

A potential Housing Needs Survey will be put on the agenda for the October meeting

Rachel Hitchcock welcomed members to the meeting.

**Executive Committee:** As always new members would be welcome to join the team.

Fundraising Activities/Events: It was agreed to mark the Community Council's 60th Anniversary in 2026 at their July committee meeting and to discuss with Lorraine Brooks including a possible celebration of the CC in the Community Times.

**Public Access Defibrillator:** Defibrillators are located at the Village Hall and at the Fire Station. A new community defibrillator for Wiston is kindly being installed by Danny Thurlow without charge on 9th September. It will be located on the verge outside the houses, Bures Road, Wiston CO6 4LZ in place of the Parish Council noticeboard which is no longer needed. What 3 Words: ///ahead.replying.repaying. Like the other community defibrillators it will be registered with the Circuit and Webnos systems with regular site checks reported to both systems.

Online Ticketing Facility: NaylandEvents.org This remains the principle outlet for selling tickets to village events. If village organisations wish to use this facility contact Justin Dowding. Village Hall Gardening Morning: the autumn tidy will be on Saturday 25th October from 9am - as usual refreshments will be provided, it is a friendly morning, please come along if you can. Jo Metson will attend on behalf of the CC

**Community Involvement:** Ideas to help raise participation in village groups and events welcome. ### TREASURER'S REPORT: .

Matt Cable gave his report on finances to 31st August 2025: **Breakdown of profits to date:** Quiz £533, Community Times £388, interest income £224.

**Grants paid:** Village Hall roof £10,000, Maintenance of Horse Watering area £300.

**Current Position:** The accounts show reserves of £10,372 represented by Current a/c monies £9,059, Stripe account £366 and Cash on Hand £947. We hold £1,741 for the RBL Services Fund and grants are pending for: Horse Watering area £58 and Lizzie's Fund £153. **Therefore unencumbered assets are £8,420.** 

Expenses year to date: £600 deposit for the firework display, £198 for 2024 defibrillator maintenance and £112 for hall hire. GRANTS & DONATIONS:

Permissive footpath maintenance: The CC continue to monitor the two stretches of permissive footpath - Stoke Road and Court Knoll to Allotment field - and call Dan Bowman back when needed (obviously being mindful of restrictions due to nesting birds). The CC will also monitor the bodpave solution at Nayland Meadow and see how this beds in with a view to this being a possible solution to the wet stretch of footpath between Court Knoll and the allotments, keeping an eye on how often this stretch is impassable before considering approaching others to contribute. Tendring Hall Estate has said that they approve of the bodpave solution and would be prepared to contribute £1000 towards the project.

Thank you to David Slater – and also Mille Single and Jonathan Pearson – who have done interim maintenance on the Stoke Road stretch of permissive path to keep it accessible.

### Royal British Legion, 80th Anniversary of the end of WWII:

The event on 31st August was very well attended and well received. Well done to the Royal British Legion and the team of

organisers for a thoughtful, sociable and entertaining evening including a supper of appropriate wartime fare.

A CC grant of £549 supported the printing costs of a commemorative book providing permanent record of life during WW2 particularly in Nayland and Wiston including photos, documents and personal family memories. This book will is on sale at Forget Me Not for £8. All profits go to the RBL Poppy Appeal.

**First Responders:** A grant application for £90 to cover hall hire for 2 Basic Life Support sessions in October was agreed. The sessions will teach local residents how to give CPR and use an AED. This will be excellent timing to coincide with the installation of the new public access defibrillator at Wiston. Dates of sessions: Sunday 12th October 9.30am to 12pm and Wednesday 15th October 6pm to 8pm.

**Community Times & Websites:** Thanks as always to all contributors. Heading towards the next deadline; please let Lorraine Brooks know if you have promotion or large items to include so adequate space can be reserved.

Village Calendar: Village calendars are now on sale at village outlets (Forget-Me-Not, Mill Street Stores, Studio B). Wendy sold 22 at the Flower Show which was a good start to sales. Vicki will have a stall at the Woodland Corner Inflatable Day on 13th September. Posters promoting sales have been distributed. Thank you to Lorraine Brooks, Wendy Sparrow and Claire Buller for all their efforts in bringing this to fruition .

### WATER LEVELS

The long summer heatwave and low rainfall have taken a toll on the river and the countryside. The weir has been dry, overgrown with surrounding reeds and looks in a sorry state. Pipes have been installed in an endeavour to prevent the weir from completely drying out but there is no flow.

Rainfall returned with a few short downpours in the second week of September; hopefully more will come to replenish the rivers, groundwater aquifer and help our very dry gardens, farms and landscape.

### WATER QUALITY & SEWAGE

A Nayland resident has trained with RiverWatch to monitor the water quality in the river Stour at Nayland. It will be interesting to see the results of the testing here - see page 21.

### **REED & VEGETATION GROWTH**

The situation with reeds around the Horseshoe weir (and other areas of the river through Nayland) remains disgraceful as can be seen in the photo. The EA are the riparian owners around the weir.

### WILDLIFE & SWANS

The Swan family who spend time in Nayland, although didn't nest here, are doing well. And no territory wars have been reported. Their five cygnets have grown quite big and it won't be long before they start stretching their wings, take flying lessons and become more independent. The number of ducks remains low and the few there are can often be seen sheltering under riverside revetment platforms staying safe from predators.

The weir this August was totally overgrown and dry with temporary pipes inserted to try to retain some water within the weir.





### **RUSH HOUR ON THE RIVER**

Some residents may have enjoyed hiring a kayak, Canadian canoe or paddle board from Stour Kayak who have been operating on Tendring Hall Estate land behind the Anchor this summer. It certainly appears to be popular, suggested by the high level of traffic and queues to use the portages near the weir.

### NAYLAND WITH WISSINGTON COMMUNITY TIMES

A family of otters were spotted on the Meadow pond very early on 30th August; unfortunately they managed to dodge the camera and then disappeared behind the reeds.

There have been sightings of water vole and burrows which are above the river (these will link to underwater entrances); along the river. These are not near the wall of reeds at Caley Green, where burrowing would be impossible for them.

### **BANK EROSION AT CALEY GREEN**

As reported last issue SCC, owners of Caley Green, have asked engineering company, Concertus, to progress with the project to prevent riverbank erosion around the bay.

An ecologist review and topographical survey will be carried out. There has been a site meeting with SCC, Concertus and the Parish Council Working Party.

Concertus, with local evidence gathered (uses of the area by the community, visitor numbers, demographics, and proof of previous wooden revetment), will undertake the design work, submit a permit application to the Environment Agency (EA) and manage the work.

While the consensus of local opinion was to install replacement wooden revetment round the whole of the bay area this may be subject to the outcome of the topographical survey and EA approval: the EA have stated they are unable to provide pre-application advice.

It is hoped, going forward, that a regular maintenance contract can be established with SCC - which would include control of vegetation along Caley Green - so that this popular public open space can always be enjoyed by residents.

# CITIZEN SCIENCE PROJECT: RIVER STOUR WATER TESTING

The Essex and Suffolk Rivers Trust together with Essex Rivers Trust have been encouraging local people to become involved in taking action to help restore the status of our rivers. They have set up Essex RiverWatch, a citizen science project to collect information about water quality across both Suffolk and Essex. This is to help target action where it is most needed.

Along with several other volunteers from the River Stour Trust, I have been trained by RiverWatch to observe the state of the river, and to record local wildlife and any signs of pollution. We have been taking samples of the river at Caley Green once a month

We are able to measure chemical and physical characteristics. These measures comprise temperature, total dissolved solids, turbidity, ammonia, nitrates, and phosphates. We're unable to

measure bacterial load, as this requires costly laboratory analysis. The information from Nayland is recorded on a national database.

We have been taking and measuring samples since July, and am pleased to say that the results to date have not exceeded the expected safe standards (see table below).

Please note that we cannot say whether it is or is not safe to swim in the river at Nayland, as this requires bacterial assessment, but if you are keen on wild swimming you might like to take advantage of the Designated Bathing Water on River Stour at Friars Meadow in Sudbury.

This status was awarded in 2024 following a campaign led by River Stour Trust members. Water at that location is now tested for bacterial contamination by the Environment Agency once a week during the bathing season (May 1<sup>st</sup> to September 30<sup>th</sup>). Data can be viewed by going to the government's Swimfo website and searching for Friars Meadow.

If you would like to volunteer for River-Watch by reporting on a stretch of river, have a look at the River-Watch website and get in touch with them. Training and testing kits are free, though of course donations are always welcome.

### BARN OWLS IN THE COMMUNITY BARN OWL BOX

2025 has been a poor year for Barn Owls in Suffolk but there is good news for Nayland. The long, wet winter delayed breeding, then the weeks of high temperatures created additional problems. In early June, four newly hatched chicks were seen in the parish Community Barn Owl Box by the official Barn Owl Inspection team. Two of them grew into strong healthy young owls and were ringed and recorded in mid-July. They fledged during August. The mother had been ringed at the first inspection.

Sadly, last year was a disaster for the owls using that box. Although four Barn Owl eggs were seen in June, the box had been 'invaded' by a duck species to lay its own eggs. None hatched. The culprit was probably an Egyptian Goose - a nonnative subspecies of shelduck rather than a goose. These often choose to lay their eggs in tree holes, ledges or owl boxes. They are aggressively territorial, take over existing habitats of native owls and osprey in areas they spread to and have been seen on our local river in recent years.



The event attracted a full house of supporters who enjoyed the evening, raising about £2,000 for the Poppy Appeal. Many thanks are due to all those involved in creating this successful event and all those who came along.



The following day a number of residents and family of Lt Gumm visiting from America gathered at his memorial bench by the War Memorial for a moment of reflection and a short ceremony was

held with Revd Stéphane Javelle. Members of the United States Air Force laid a wreath. Nayland's Legion Standard Bearer, David Wiles and bugler, Yo Burgess of the Boxted Silver Band gave the Last Post.

At Court Knoll, the location of the crash that took Lt Gumm's life, Richard Turner, from Boxted Airfierld Museum, read witness accounts in the official military accident report. Sir Bob Russell and Emily Cartlidge, wife of the local MP, were among those attending. The evening concluded at the Anchor Inn sharing memories and a British pint with our American visitors.

Ashley Otto, great-nephew of Lt Gumm who was attending, said, "I am beyond thankful for the love and hospitality of the Nayland people and community for keeping Uncle Charles' memory alive."





### **OTTERS & WATER VOLES**

Well the good news is that we now have confirmed sightings of both otters and water voles at the pond on Nayland Meadow! This summer a female and cubs were seen on at least one occasion in the pond. One was also seen in the millstream earlier this year. So here is some information to help you if you spot something surprising and furry brown in Nayland next time you're out and about. Any sightings or photos of Whiskers and or Ratty..... please let us know and post on Nayland Meadow's Facebook page.

#### What Do Otters & Water Voles Look Like?

Otters are a lot larger than water voles. Water voles vary between 14 and 22cm in length, with a tail 9 to 14cm long, and typically weigh 200 to 350g. They are the largest species of British vole. By contrast, otters have a body length of 60 to 80cm, a tail between 32 and 56cm in length, and can weigh over 10kg. IMPORTANT - a water vole is not a rat !!!!! Rather unhelpfully the water vole in The Wind in the Willows is called "Ratty"! Sadly it may prove too hard to convince people now on names.

### What Does An Otter & A Water Vole Eat?

Otters are carnivores, whereas water voles eat an exclusively herbivorous diet. The great majority of an otter's diet consists of fish, although they will also sometimes prey upon birds, amphibians and mammals. A water vole's diet is dependent on the seasons and what foliage is on offer. During the spring and summer, they will eat grasses, reeds and water and wetland plants. During the autumn and winter, they will eat roots, bulbs and bark.

### Where Do Otters & Water Voles Live?

In the case of otters their presence is likely to be fleeting as they periodically pass through their territory in search of food. Both otters and water voles can be found throughout the UK. Both species are dependent on wetland habitats. Water voles excavate burrow systems in river banks, and otters typically use natural features such as cavities in riverside tree roots as their holts or resting sites. They may also rest up above ground in undisturbed areas where there is sufficient cover. Water voles have a home range of a few tens or hundreds of metres, whereas otters can have home ranges of tens of kilometres.

### **Breeding Habits of An Otter & A Water Vole**

Otters breed at any time of the year, water voles more commonly breed between March - October. Otters usually have 2 or 3 cubs; however, water voles normally produce between 2 - 5 litters a year with 2 - 8 young. As well as their breeding habits, their parenting styles differ too. With water voles, their young leave after 28 days but otter cubs stay with their parents for over a year.



### THE VILLAGE LUNCH

Eighty years ago, people in the United Kingdom joined the World in a day of mourning for the war dead - worldwide, the cost of WW2 was nearly 80 million dead - the majority non-combatants - and praying for a better future.

### Nayland with Wissington Crime Review

Non Crime investigations can include matters like Child or Adult Welfare Referrals, Domestic Non Crime Incidents, Domestic Violence Disclosure Schemes, First Instance Harassment reports and Sudden Deaths.

This month I would like to highlight a free phone app called What3Words, which can help in certain emergency situations. What3Words is a location technology app designed to make it easier to communicate precise locations anywhere in the world. The map is also accessible on the website <a href="www.what3words.com">www.what3words.com</a>. It works by dividing the entire globe into a grid of 3 metre by 3 metre squares, with each square assigned a unique combination of three random words - for example, ///relegate.hexes.hazy

Suffolk Police use this app (along with other systems) and from a frontline policing perspective, the What3Words app has proven to be a valuable asset in improving public safety and operational effectiveness. It allows officers and control rooms to pinpoint exact locations using a simple three-word code, which is especially useful when dealing with incidents in areas without clear addresses - such as open countryside. In emergency situations, time and clarity are critical. Victims or witnesses often struggle to describe their location under stress, particularly in unfamiliar or remote environments. What3Words enables officers to receive precise location data, reducing delays and confusion. This has been particularly beneficial in Suffolk, where rural geography can complicate response efforts. Other agencies would also find an exact location helpful, for example - reporting fly tipping to the council. Given it is a global map, it could also help if you were abroad and needed assistance to a particular location.

When dealing with my own community police reports, I will often ask for the What3Words location if the area is unclear, or I just simply want confirmation. This helps me focus on the exact location to assess and deal with the issue.

### NAYLAND WEATHER SUMMARY: July & August 2025 by David Lowe

**July** was another warm month, with a mean temperature of 19.5  $^{\circ}$ C (17.91) second warmest over the 18 year record period. The maximum temperature was 34.2  $^{\circ}$ C – on the 1st – (30.31) third highest over the record period. Lowest was 10.4  $^{\circ}$ C (highest over the record period). Lowest max was 19.9  $^{\circ}$ C (18.09) second lowest. There was only 1 day with less than 20  $^{\circ}$ C max (5.11) no. of days over 25  $^{\circ}$ C was 14 (8.5) and over 30  $^{\circ}$ C – 1 (0.78). On no night did the temp go below 10  $^{\circ}$ C.

Bright sun hours were 345 (342.39) with solar energy at 11750 Ly (12855). Evapotranspiration was 118 mm (109.38).

Rainfall was again below average at 41.6 mm (55.17) with a lot of brown lawns around. There was 1 day over 10 mm (1.61 mm) and the highest rainfall rate was 86 mm/hr ((97.28).

Mean wind speed was 4 mph (3.13) with highest gust of 27 mph (29.44). Prevailing direction was SW.

August was a further warm and dry month, with a mean temperature of 18.8 °C (17.54) the fourth warmest over the 18

year record period. Monthly rainfall at 14 mm (57.77) was the second lowest.

Highest temperature was  $30.6\,^{\circ}\text{C}$  (28.63) and lowest  $9.1\,^{\circ}\text{C}$  (7.97). Lowest max was  $19.5\,^{\circ}\text{C}$  (17.54). This was the only day that failed to make  $20\,^{\circ}\text{C}$  (5.61). There were 11 days over  $25\,^{\circ}\text{C}$  (6.22) and 1 over  $30\,^{\circ}\text{C}$  (1.11). On 2 nights the temp fell below  $10\,^{\circ}\text{C}$ .


Bright sun hours were 322 (306.62) fourth highest over the record period. Solar energy was 12500 Ly (10706) equal highest with 2019. Evapotranspiration was 110 mm (91.39), second highest over the record period.

The highest rainfall amount in a day was only 3.8 mm (20.49) and highest rainfall rate, 50.6 mm/hr (108.65).

Average wind strength was 4.2 mph (3.13) with 2 days with gusts over 30 mph (0.83) and 1 over 35 mph (0.28). Highest daily average was 8.2 mph (6.58). The prevailing direction was SW.

# FOOTPATHS IN NAYLAND AND WISTON

What could be more pleasant on a sunny day than setting off for a walk along one of the many footpaths in Nayland and Wiston?

For centuries residents have walked most of these paths but in recent years several new paths have been designated as "permissive paths". Some of these are in fact paths which we have unintentionally walked without the permission of the landowner but now, since being designated, the landowner has the right to close them at any time. They are not recorded on the Definitive Maps of legal Public Rights of Way held by County Councils which were created after the Second World War, but those for Nayland can be seen on the local map published by the Conservation Society (Second Edition dated November 2012).

Back in 1894 the Nayland with Wissington Parish Council was

created and one of the first things they did was to set up a Footpath Sub Committee to investigate the condition of footpaths in the parish. In 1900 this committee, chaired by George Brooks Mills, village schoolmaster and Parish Councillor, compiled a report listing 23 footpaths. Some of these footpaths are listed below, as described in the report, and with an update in brackets.

- 1. From Court Meadow Gate through Court Knoll to Horkesley Lock, thence to Park Road. This path is well defined [Note: Not many years later the lock fell down and the well-used bridge over the river went with it. The county authorities refused to replace the bridge, saying that the cost could not be justified. Therefore the footpath was no more until 1995 when a major project to clear the Horkesley Lock site was carried out by the National River Authority and two new bridges were built, thus restoring the footpath.]
- 2. From Newlands Lane across Bell Meadow to Allotment Field, through the Allotment Field to the Fens. Years ago this path was continued over the Fens to a bridge over the river and thence to Boxted. This bridge has disappeared. This path is also well defined. [Note: This bridge was never rebuilt and the path disappeared]
- 3. From Vicarage Gate through Fair Field past the cemetery, then through Town Ground to Leavenheath Road near Mark's Grave. Well defined. [Note: At this time there was no playing field or school in Bear Street and the track only went up to the cemetery and Vicarage, the footpath was as it still is. It would be interesting to know who Mark was]
- Near Town Ground Barn a branch from No 3 leads to Nayland Hall or Spring Farm. Thence to Honey Tye, Leavenheath. Fair condition.
- 5. From opposite Nags Barn through Pound Field, Hawes' Meadow, Harris Mead and Long Field to Wiston Mill Lane, thence to Cart Bridge over the river. Here it divides one part going to Lt Horkesley and the other to Wormingford Mill and Bures. Bad condition.
- 6. From Crocus(?) Lane on top of Gravel Hill through the Gore Field past the Pest House to Path No 3. Fair condition.

The rest of the paths described are all in Wiston and pass near or round all the farms which still exist, also around the church and rectory, the mill, the Fox Inn and the "Sanatorium" [later to become the Jane Walker Hospital.] The footpaths pass through many named fields such as Barton's Meadow, Top Field, the Dalleys, Headlands Field, 8 Acres Field, Sandpits Bottom, White Post Field, Little and Great Griffs, Homely Field, Cherry Field, Triangle Field, etc. I wonder how many of these fields still bear their old names. If there is someone who would like



ovember 2012). Bridge over the river at Horkesley Lock which linked the footpath between Suffolk and Essex until it fell down in the early 20th century. It was eventually replaced in 1995.

to see the list drawn up in 1900 with a view to finding out if all these paths still exist please let me know.

The 1900 report concludes: "As will be seen by the paths above enumerated Nayland is not so well provided with footpaths as is her twin sister Wiston but these, few though they may be, are very convenient and were not chosen haphazardly by our forefathers but had a certain definite purpose, viz that of providing a direct and short road from each farmhouse and cottage to the Parish Church, and in time this was the means of forming an elaborate network of paths over the country between the main roads and which would be otherwise inaccessible to pedestrians.

"Taking Nayland with Wissington as a whole your committee venture to say that few parishes in England are blessed with such pleasant, interesting and beautiful walks as those supplied by these footpaths. Lovers of Nature can revel in the marvels of Creation, the mysteries of Life, while to the weary labourer short-cuts are provided which save him many a long toilsome journey to his daily work. The footpaths also circle round the healthiest parts of the neighbourhood and so bring without fee or payment the purest of fresh air, which is so necessary to the convalescent.

"The general opinion is that Suffolk is most uninteresting as regards scenery – in fact is quite devoid of such a thing – but this opinion vanishes when our footpaths are traversed for they open out to view scenery which is not only pretty, but very beautiful and unique in its pastoral character.

"Your Committee are of the opinion that the obliteration of any of the paths mentioned would be a loss to all in the Parish."

## Dear Friends,

There are no hoops to jump through, no forms to fill in, only a willingness to help where we can.

For as Christians, hospitality, generosity and service are the pattern that Jesus set for us. When he washed the disciples' feet, he told us to follow his example of practical service. For centuries, the church has provided medical care, education and help for the poorest. Parish churches are rooted in their communities and seek to serve them in many different ways, not just spiritual care but as whole human beings. For years, across the benefice, the church has provided coffee mornings and social spaces in our villages. Following the shutdowns of Covid, we have been looking to find ways of supporting our young people. In the new year, we are hoping to launch two groups, one in Leavenheath and one in Nayland, to give young people a place to socialise and

relax, as we do for older people. A safe space for 11-14yrs, to hang out with friends, and optional activities eg a gaming space, football table, table tennis or Lazer tag games, with drinks and snacks. Initially, monthly and possibly weekly, if required. # GARDEN WASTE & BONFIRES



With winter approaching and gardens in need of a final tidy the question of what to do with our garden waste comes to the forefront. There are various options for disposal; composting at home, using Babergh's Brown Bin Scheme, taking the rubbish to a Waste and Recycling Centre: :

- Hadleigh: Crockett Way (off Lady Lane Industrial Est) IP7 6RH
- Sudbury: Sandy Lane(off Ballingdon Hill) CO10 7HG Please note there is a very efficient booking system. https:// www.suffolk.gov.uk/planning-waste-and-environment/wasteand-recycling/book-a-recycling-centre-time-slot/
- Colchester: Maldon Road, Shrub End CO3 4RN

#### Another option is to have a bonfire...

The bonfire takes its name from the medieval 'bon-fire of animal bones'. While modern day bonfire ingredients are on the whole less gruesome, burning waste materials can cause pollution and local nuisance.

Occasionally a bonfire is the best practicable way to dispose of woody or diseased waste that cannot be composted. If you chose this option please adhere to the guidelines:

- Speak to your neighbours, to agree the best time for the fire.
- Do not light it when your neighbours' washing is out or their windows are open.
- Avoid lighting a fire in unsuitable weather conditions smoke hangs in the air on damp, still days. If it is windy, smoke blows into neighbours' gardens and windows and across roads. In the evenings atmospheric pressure keeps the smoke down.
- Avoid burning at weekends and on bank holidays when your neighbours have a right to enjoy their gardens
- Never use petrol or oil to light a fire
- Ensure that only dry material is burnt. This will produce the minimum of smoke.
- Do not burn plastic, rubber, household rubbish, or other materials which cause dark smoke and noxious fumes
- Never leave a fire unattended or leave it to smoulder put it out

There are no specific controls, such as permitted times, over the lighting of domestic bonfires to burn waste. However, smoke and emissions from a bonfire (or any other process of burning) can be considered a Statutory Nuisance. Environmental Health is responsible for investigating complaints.

#### If You are Troubled by Bonfire Smoke...

- Try talking to those responsible for the bonfire. They may not be aware that they are causing a problem and a reasonable approach may encourage a reasonable response.
- If this fails, environmental health at your local council should be notified. They must investigate your complaint and must issue a notice under the Environmental Protection Act 1990.




